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AUDITORS' REPORT.

The Auditors of the Town of Westport respectfully submit the following report of the financial condition of the town for the year ending, February 1, 1901.

We have examined the vouchers of the serveral departments of the treasury and also those of the collector of taxes finding their accounts correct.

In every case where bills were entered in the wrong department we have caused them to be entered in their proper place.

John C. Macomber who retired from office last March had faithfully served the town as treasurer and collector of taxes for fifteen years in succession and declining a further reelection retired from office, with the respect of all citizens, irrespective of party, and was succeeded by Cortez Allen, who had held the office a number of years ago.

On account of a vote passed at the annual meeting in March, the auditors were refused authority to transfer unappropriated money to balance departments wherein there might be a deficit.

The consequence was that the collector not being able to collect enough tax to equal the appropriations, the auditors have been obliged to balance nearly all of the departments by amounts due from uncollected taxes, thereby leaving the various departments without any funds to pay bills against the town.

In consequence the treasurer will not be able to settle bills until he has authority to hire temporary loan after the annual meeting.
