Report of the Board of Health.

The undersigned respectfully submit the following report from the records of the past year.

The board organized March 25, 1905, and elected John D. Tupper, M. D., chairman and secretary. The board appointed Edward L. Macomber agent. Granted undertaker licenses to Jonathan B. Hicks and George E. Gifford. Issued 46 burial permits. Issued permits to disenter the remains of five bodies.

The board received notices of the following number of contagious diseases: Diphtheria, 2; scarlet fever, 2; measles, 8.

Manuel A. Azevedo, having been exposed to small-pox was quarantined by the board twenty-one days.

It is the opinion of the board that some suitable building be provided in which contagious and infectious diseases can be cared for.

The board deems it advisable for the benefit of those who are not familiar with the Revised Laws to have the following inserted.

Chap. 251 of the Acts of the Legislature 1905. The amended Sections reads as follows:

Section 49. A householder who knows that a person in his family or house is sick of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other infectious or contagious disease dan-

gerous to the public health shall forthwith give notice thereof to the board of health of the city or town in which he dwells. Upon the death, recovery or removal of such person, the householder shall disinfect to the satisfaction of the board such rooms of his house and articles therein as, in the opinion of the board, have been exposed to infection or contagion. Should one or both eves of an infant become inflamed, swollen and red, and show an unnatural discharge at any time within two weeks after its birth, it shall be the duty of the nurse, relative or other attendant having charge of such infant to report in writing within six hours thereafter, to the board of health of the city or town in which the parents of the infant reside, the fact that such inflammation, swelling and redness of the eyes and unnatural discharge exist. On receipt of such report, or of notice of the same symptoms given by a physician as provided by the following section, the board of health shall take such immediate action as it may deem necessary in order that blindness may be prevented. Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars.

Section 50. If a physician knows that a person whom he is called to visit is infected with smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other disease dangerous to the public health, or if one or both eyes of an infant whom or whose mother he is called to visit become inflamed, swollen and red, and show an unnatural discharge within two weeks after the birth of such infant, he shall immediately give notice thereof in writing over his own signature to the selectmen or board of health of the town; and if he refuses or neglects to give such notice, he shall forfeit not less than fifty nor more than two hundred dollars for each offence.

It is a satisfaction to be able to report so few cases of contagious diseases during the past year. If every house-holder will act in conjunction with the board of health, regarding sanitation, i. e. in the care of milk, vegetables, etc., by keeping stables and cellars whitewashed, drains and cesspools kept clean, it will add greatly to a continuance of the clean report as made by the board for the past year.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS OF

Public and Town Landings.

Westport, Mass., Jan. 6, 1906.

HORSENECK LANDING.

During the year four new houses have been built and some alterations and improvement made upon those previously erected.

The amount of rents collected, \$134.50.

The history of the case of Edmund G. Gifford, which has attracted considerable attention, and about which there seems to be more or less misapprehension is here inserted.

In 1901 Mr. Gifford erected, upon the site of an old building built in 1857 or '58 and which had fallen into complete decay and ruin, a boathouse, which upon the survey and plan of the landing came within the limits of lot No. 16, and from which he claimed to be exempt from the payment of rent, under a prescriptive right gained by his father by maintaining the old building.

At a meeting of the commissioners held Feb. 16, 1904, they voted: "That notice be sent to Edmund G. Gifford to remove his building from lot No. 16, on the landing at

Horseneck," acting under section 8 of the "By-Laws for government of public and town landings." This he declined to do and the commissioners, acting under the advice of counsel, removed it from its position to another location.

He immediately moved it back, and Feb. 27, 1905, Mary E. Gifford sued out a writ praying the court to issue a writ of injunction against the town of Westport and the landing commissioners, "that they be restrained from removing and destroying or otherwise interfering with her boathouse, etc.

The case was called for trial at New Bedford and June. 16, J. Pierce filed his decision: "It is ordered that a decretal order bill dismissed with costs, be entered."

On June 24 an appeal was entered by the plaintiff to the Supreme Judicial Court where it was argued the first week in October. Their decision has not yet been handed down.

At the landing at the Head of the River no changes have been made, except the ownership of one building and the amount of rent collected to Dec. 31, 1905, is \$\frac{*3}{25}\$ 83

A section of the act creating the town and public landings in the town of Westport authorizes the commissioners to "beautify and adorn the landings with trees, shrubbery, etc.," and invites the co-operation of the citizens to furnish trees and shrubs to be planted under the direction of the commissioners and to be cared for and protected by them. The landing at the Head of the River has great possibilities in this direction, and with the support of the public, may very easily be made an ornament to the town of which any community may well be proud. No more lasting memorial may be made by any person than to plant a tree thereon, to be cared for and protected for all time, and be labeled with the name of the donor. The schools, too, might on each Arbor Day, plant a classtree, which, in later years would be a continued object of interest when the members of the class return to their native town from their scattered homes.

To this end which we believe to be in the interest of our birth-place, we ask the cordial support of all our citizens and further information will be cheerfully furnished upon application.

Now is a good time of the year to select the tree, to be delivered later. Let us make a beginning the coming spring.

The whole number of books in the library not including public documents and other reports is 1563. This number includes the books formerly belonging to the Central Village Library Association, which numbered 392. The number of books drawn from the library during the year was 1111. The amount received for fines during the year was \$6.98.

It is hoped by the trustees that some satisfactory arrangements may be made in the near future, whereby the people residing in all parts of the town may receive equal benefits from the library with those living nearer to the town hall.

It will be necessary to make an appropriation of one hundred ten (110) dollars for perpetual care interest account.
