CLAIMS AGAINST THE TOWN.

The claim of Antoine Ferreira against the Town for injury received while working at the stone crusher plant, resulting in the loss of an eye, has been settled by paying Mr. Ferreira five hundred dollars.

The suit brought against the Town by Byron W. Cottle for damage received by reason of an alleged defect in the highway has not been reached. It will probably be tried at the April term of the Superior Court at Fall River.

AUTOMOBILES.

September 10, 1907, the Selectmen adopted a regulation limiting the speed of automobiles to eight miles an hour through the villiages and fifteen miles an hour over the other roads of the town.

To this regulation a protest was filed with the State Highway Commission.

So far as the board knows no action has been taken by the commissioners on either the regulation of the protest.

NEW SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

Insurance has been placed on the new school building at the Head of the River through the office of A. G. & W. J. Howland in the following mutual companies:—

Dorchester of Boston, fifteen hundred dollars; Traders and Mechanics of Lowell, fifteen hundred dollars; Quincy of Quincy, two thousand dollars; Holyoke of Salem, two thousand dollars, also five hundred dollars on the furniture.

The insurance has been renewed on the new school building at Westport Point through the same office for the sum of three thousand dollars.

ELECTRIC ROADS.

On July 9, 1907, the board granted a franchise to the Dartmouth and Westport Street Railway Co. to construct a double track along the highway from the westerly end of the state highway to the Fall River line with the exception of a short space where the tracks cross the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Co. tracks, where the single track as at the present laid will remain.

Beginning at the point where the single track leaves off westerly from said railroad tracks and continuing to the junction of the Hicksville road the rails are to be 70 lb. T. rails laid parallel with and southerly from the present tracks. Between the point near the junction of the Hicksville road and the City line the present tracks on the southerly side of the highway are to be removed, and two parallel tracks are to be laid in the center of the 80 ft. way as laid out by the Selectmen, September 19, and excepted by the Town October 3, 1894.

The rails to be used in this section are to be nine inch girder rails, and the space between the rails and eighteen inches outside of said rails are to be block paved with standard granite blocks laid in sand.

Inasmuch as the location of said tracks reasonably necessitates the widening of the causeway at the Narrows to include the entire width of said layout, involving the building of a new retaining wall and filling the causeway the said Street Railway Co. will make such widening at its sole expense. Said work of alteration and construction is to be completed within a period of one year from the date of this franchise, thus making practically a double track service from the Dartmouth line at Westport Factory Village to the Fall River line at the Narrows.

June 26, 1907, the board received a petition from a majority of the board of directors of the Shore Line Street

Railway Co.,(a corporation in process of organization) asking for a location for the tracks of the proposed Railway Co. as follows:

To begin at a point in the location of the Dartmouth and Westport Street Railway Company's tracks at the town line between Dartmouth and Westport, and to extend through the town in a southerly direction over the following roads. Line road and Forge road to Head of Westport Village, Pine Hill road to South Westport, South Westport to Akin's Corner, Line road to Horsen Beach, thence over Beach road and Horseneck road to Westport Point Bridge, its terminus.

After learning that a Mr. Sheldon of Boston had charge of the matter the chairman wrote to him asking when it would be convenient for some one of the proposed company to be present at a hearing. Failing to get any reply and being in Boston July 30, on another matter, we called on Mr. Sheldon at his office. Mr. Sheldon said that he received the letter but was waiting to hear from some one in the West. He thought that he could advise us in relation to the hearing within a week.

Having heard nothing more from him we have taken no further action in the matter.

TELEPHONES.

During the year permits have been granted to erect poles and wires along the highways as follows:

To Charles Williston of Fall River from State Highway at Beulah, to his farm on Gifford road, (this permit has since been transferred to the Southern Mass. Telephone Company).

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To Southern Mass. Telephone Co. from Westport Factory Village, line road northerly to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad tracks.

Also to re-construct the line from Westport Factory Village to Westport Point and from Central Village to the Rhode Island line.

Report of the Board of Health.

The undersigned respectfully submit the following report from the records of the past year.

The board organized March 30, 1907 and elected John D. Tupper M. D., chairman and secretary. The board appointed Edward L. Macomber, agent. April 27, the board appointed Eli Handy, Albert E. Dávis, John E. Perry and Sylvester C. Manley, inspectors of meats. Granted undertakers' licenses to Hicks & Potter and George E. Gifford. Issued 55 burial permits. Issued permits to disinter the remains of 27 bodies.

The board received notices of the following number of contagious diseases: Measles, 4; Scarlet Fever, 4; Diphtheria, 1.

The board deem it advisable to again reprint the revised laws pertaining to diseases dangerous to the public health. In the past there has been negligence on the part of physicians and householders probably more from neglect than to evade the law. The following is therefore inserted particularly to call their attention to the same and the penalties for a non-compliance.

Your attention is called to the fact that sections 49 and 50 of chapter 75 of the Revised Laws, as amended by chapter 251 of the Acts of the year 1905, and section

52 of chapter 75 of the Revised Laws, have been amended by chapter 480 of the Acts of the year 1907, so that the same now read as follows:—

Section 49. A householder who knows that a person in his family or house is sick of smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other infectious or contagious disease declared by the state board of health to be dangerous to the public health shall forthwith give notice thereof to the board of health of the city or town in which he dwells. Upon the death, recovery or removal of such person, the householder shall disinfect to the satisfaction of the board such rooms of his house and articles therein as, in the opinion of the board, have been exposed to infection or contagion. Should one or both eyes of an infant become inflamed, swollen and red, and show an unnatural discharge at any time within two weeks after its birth, it shall be the duty of the nurse, relative or other attendant having charge of such infant to report in writing within six hours thereafter, to the board of health of a city or town in which the parents of the infant reside, the fact that such inflamation, swelling and redness of the eyes and unnatural discharge exist. On receipt of such report, or of notice of the same symptoms given by a physician as provided by the following section, the board of health shall take such immediate action as it may deem necessary in order that blindness may be prevented. Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars.

Section 50. If physician knows that a person whom he is called to visit is infected with smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or any other disease declared by the state board of health to be dangerous to the public health, or if one or both eyes of an infant whom or whose mother he is called to visit become inflamed, swollen and red, and show an unnatural discharge within two weeks ofter the birth of such infant, he shall immediately give notice thereof in writing over his own signature to the selectmen or board of health of the town; and if he refuses or neglects to give such notice, he shall forfeit not less than fifty nor more than two hundred dollars for each offence.

Your attention is further called to the fact that having been directed by chapter 183 of the Acts of the year 1907 to define what diseases shall be deemed to be "dangerous to the public health " as the term is used in chapter 213 of the Acts of the year 1902, entitled "An Act Relative to compensating Cities and Towns for caring for Persons infected with the Smallpox or Other Diseases Dangerous to the Public Health" the State Board of Health, at a meeting held August 1, 1907, voted to define as "dangerous to the public health," within the meaning of said chapter 213 of the Acts of the year 1902, the following diseases:

CEREBRO-SPINAL MENINGITIS, TUBERCULOSIS, GLANDERS, MALIGNANT PUSTULE,

SCARLET FEVER, SMALLPOX, TYPHOID FEVER, TYPHUS FEVER, WHOOPING COUGH, YELLOW FEVER.

It is a satisfaction to be able to report so few cases of contagious diseases during the past year. A cheerful compliance of the above laws and acting in conjunction with the board of health will add greatly to a continuance of the clean report as made by the board for the last few years.

The trustees of the Free Public Library respectfully submit the following report, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1907:

Number of books in the library, Dec. 31, 1906, 1629
Number added during the year, 87
Number of books taken out during the year, 1454

Owing to the fact that this year's appropriation was rather larger than heretofore, the trustees have been enabled to place in the library room a most excellent unabridged dictionary and also to purchase a much needed card index, besides expending rather more than usual for new books. The larger part of the books purchased have been works of fiction but the aim has been to add each year a few standard works and reference books so that in time the Westport Free Public Library may become well equipped along the most essential lines.

Since quite a number of public school children hold library cards and regularly use them, books helpful to them have been chosen whenever possible. Several magazines have been subscribed for, for the year and it has been voted to exchange some books with the Westport Point library.

More shelf room will be necessary the coming year and it is to be hoped that the yearly appropriation will be sufficiently large to provide this without lessening the amount usually expended for books.

Statement of the Receipts and Expenditures.

For the financial year ending Dec. 31, 1907, for the town of Westport.

The auditors of the town of Westport respectfully submit the following statement of the financial condition of the town for the financial year ending December 31, 1907.

We have examined the vouchers of the several departments of the treasury and have carefully compared them with the entries in the books of the treasurer, and caused all errors found in the entries to be corrected and where vouchers were found missing, have caused vouchers to be procured or other sufficient evidence in the form of cancelled checks to be shown that such entries have been paid.

We have also examined the collector's books and you will find a statement of their accounts in the the collector's accounts.

We find the sum of five thousand (5000) dollars on notes and interest to the amount of one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine (1849) dollars, making a total of six thousand, eight hundred and forty-nine (6849) dollars to be raised by taxation to cancel maturing notes and interest during the financial year of 1908.

We find that all the funds deposited in the town for the perpetual care of burial lots have been invested in the New Bedford Institution for Saving and respectfully ask that the auditors of the year 1908 be authorized to transfer from unappropriated money a sufficient sum of money, which, together with the amount of interest accrued on funds heretofore invested will equal the sum of seven hundred and fifty-six dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$756 79), the amount now available for the care of the several lots for which deposits have been made.

We recommend the transfer of the amount due the Westport Point crusher account of seven hundred and nine-ty-five and twenty-one cents be transferred to Aiken's Corner crusher account or such other department as the town may determine. We also recommend that the balance now standing to the credit of the Monument account of twenty

dollars be transferred to some other department.
