The School Board submits its annual report this year under three divisions (one from each number) as follows:

Your Board has conducted its business under trying conditions. Our last annual Town Meeting cut appropria-

tions for schools very materially and it would have been impossible to continue business during the year with that appropriation. An extra sum granted at a special Town Meeting has been nearly sufficient to complete the year. We have done the best we could under difficult circumstances.

Your committee feels that its work could be made much easier by closer co-operation on the part of the citizens of the town and, at least an effort for a sympathetic understanding of its problems.

During the year we have had to make several changes in our teaching force. Quoting from a report of a few years ago, seven new teachers were employed, some were entire failures, while three are doing exceptionally good work." This year eighteen (18) new teachers have worked into our schools and it is with much gratification that we are able to state only three or four can be classed as failures. As a Town we can consider ourselves very fortunate that the percentage is so low.

Transportation is still a serious and difficult task in Westport. However, if our routes had remained as last year we would have kept within our appropriation for transportation and had about \$300 left. Owing to conditions which we could not foresee it has been necessary to enlarge the trucks on two routes and to establish a new one.

In accordance with what we felt to be the wish of the Town Meeting your committee tried this year to have its large repair jobs done by contract. This method has not proven satisfactory. In one case a contract was awarded only to be rejected by the contractor causing a waste of much time. Another job was done by day-work at a cost of \$205 and a few cents; the lowest contract price for the same job was \$420.

Our janitor force is as a rule quite efficient, the School Board wishes in this public way to acknowledge its appreciation of faithful service. In this connection, also your

Board wishes to go on record commending the faithful and efficient service of our Superintendent, Mr. Edward L. Hill. Criticisms abound, but those who are thrown more closely into association with a person know him best and we feel many criticisms are unfounded and unjust. We have found him to be a conscientious worker always working for the interests of Westports greatest asset, our children.

We feel that an instructor in drawing and music would greatly benefit our schools, in fact it would be hard to find a town that does not have a supervisor of music and drawing. Our children have been deprived of this because we have not had the necessary funds to cover even the more necessary instruction.

A careful perusal of the Superintendents' report found on another page will bring to your attention many facts for consideration.

The condition of our schools is not what it should be but your Board is trying its best to improve them and will in time we feel make some success in their endeavor.

While the voters of Westport were more liberal last year than ever before in their appropriations for education we will need fifty thousand dollars this year, a slight increase over last, owing to conditions which are stated in the reports of our school officials and can be found by any one who is interested enough to look them up.

We, therefore, ask for close co-operation of parents and voters and in return will give our best efforts toward securing for Westport the best schools possible.

The school committee has endeavored to the best of its ability to give an efficient and economical administration of its department. When the added expense of transportation, books, supplies, teachers, etc., which have been necessary because of the increase of pupils in the town, is considered, it will be evident that so far as it was possible, we

have succeeded. On the transportation routes of Mr. woodcock the pupils increased so that it would be necessary to make three trips to carry them all.

On Mr. Normand's route it would have been necessary to make two trips. It will be seen that in order to make these trips some children would be obliged to leave home very early and arrive home very late. The committee feels justified in its action in making new contracts for trucks large enough to obviate this trouble, though the cost was slightly larger.

On Division Road a new family with three children moved in and we were obliged to furnish transportation for them as the Dartmouth truck was over crowded.

The law requires that all children living beyond a reasonable distance from a school shall be transported all or a part of the way. The courts have ruled that two miles is a reasonable distance, therefore any child living more than two miles from its school is entitled to transportation all or part of the way. It is the policy of the committee to carry children living within the two mile limit if there is room in the truck.

Another added expense this year was the opening of the Sanford Road School. The expense of repairs, furniture, teacher and supplies was well over \$2000.00. After much deliberation it was found that in order to make the roof of the schoolhouse at North Westport, tight that it would be necessary to remove the shingles and put on new paper. This being done.

It has been decided that a new furnace at the Head school will make it possible to heat the building. This will cost less than \$200.00 while the steam heat would cost about \$5000.00.

The expense for teachers was materially reduced.

You will see by referring to the report of the superintendent that we are well below the average of towns of our size in the matter of cost per pupil. Some criticism has been made of the committee because the members have

not spent more time in the schools. It is not the duty nor is it for the best interests of the schools for the committee to interfere with his phase of the schools. This is the duty of the superintendent who is the only person qualified by training and experience to do this intelligently. The School Committee's duty is to conduct the business of the schools and not meddle with matters which are beyond the ability of one not specially trained. The directors of a hospital do not go into the wards and tell the doctors how to treat the sick.

By contributing toward the salary of the Red Cross Nurse we have been able to obviate necessity of employing a school nurse, thereby saving a large amount of money.

nothing else can.

To the School Committee of Westport:—

I submit herewith my fourth report as your Superintendent of Schools.

During the first three years my work was largely that of improving the material equipment of the schools and of providing for the rapidly increasing enrollment. Each year it has seemed that possibly the end had been reached, but each year schools have opened with a large excess of scholars to be cared for. I should like to say that this phase of my school work is over, but I see nothing that leads me to believe that increases are about to cease and next year will be like other years, we will have extra pupils to care for.

This large increase in pupils that has been going on during the past few years and is still going on, is the outstanding feature of our present school situation. The en-

rollment for the last three years is as follows: 1919, 440 pupils; 1920, 546 pupils; 1921, 618 pupils, in the grades. This year we have in the grades, 642 pupils. The High School has shown an even greater increase, namely from 25 pupils in 1919, to 59 pupils at the present time and the possibility of 80 pupils next year. The average increase in pupils throughout the State is one and one per cent per year during the last ten years. At this rate Westport should now have less than 105 pupils for each one hundred pupils that we had three years ago. As a matter of fact, we now have 158 pupils for each one hundred that we had three years ago. Our increase has been twelve times as rapid as the average of the State. In the grades we have one extra pupil for every two instead of one for each twenty and in the High School, one extra pupil for each one in school three years ago. The High School has doubled and looks likely next year to treble the figures of three years ago.

I state these facts in considerable detail in order to make plain why every bit of school accomodation in Westport is in use and why we must have further accomodations next year. It is absolutely impossible to take care of the children without additional buildings. The children are here and they must be cared for.

It should be plain that a large number of pupils cannot be cared for at the same cost as a smaller number. Increasing enrollment necessarily means increasing expense. We feel, therefore, that there is no occasion to apologize for the amount expended, for the situation just described amply explains it.

In this connection, however, I believe a comparison of the cost per pupil in Westport with the cost per pupil elsewhere will be enlightening. Some items, as for instance, textbooks and supplies, run high, as they must when large numbers of new pupils must be equipped each year. The same applies to new equipment, when schools out of use are re-opened and fitted up. In spite of all these things never-

theless, the total cost per pupil is not high, because with increased enrollment there has been increased economy of **WESTPORT — THIRTY-FIVE** . . . . . management. The last basis of comparison is the returns made last August to the State Board of Education by all the towns and cities in the State. Westport belongs to the group of towns with less than five thousand population and maintaining a High School. There are one hundred and fourteen such towns in the State. Westport spent from all sources fifty eight dollars and seventy four cents per pupil. Of the one hundred and fourteen towns in question, fifty seven spent more and fifty five spent less than this amount per pupil, consequently we are certainly for from high. It will be clearer to show in respect to the fifty seven towns spending more than us, just how much more they spent. I give therefore the names of these towns, listed in order of the amount spent. I hope this list will be carefully looked at to see who is in it:

To summarize, of the fifty seven towns, four spent per pupil, over one hundred dollars; two between ninety dollars and ninety five dollars; three between eighty five and ninety dollars; three between eighty and eighty five dollars; seven between seventy five and eighty dollars; twelve between seventy and seventy five dollars; seven between sixty five and seventy dollars; fourteen between sixty and sixty five dollars; and one between fifty nine and sixty dollars. Of these towns one fourth spent more than eighty five dollars; one half spent over seventy two dollars; and three fourths, spent over sixty five dollars. The fifty eight dollars and seventy four cents spent by Westport per pupil consequently is not high from any standpoint and considering the unusual burden that has been placed upon us, it is decidedly low and deserving of commendation rather than censure.

A comparison with the nearby cities of Fall River and New Bedford, will be enlightening. The cost per pupil are as follows: Westport, \$58.74; New Bedford, \$56.15; and Fall River, \$53.30. On the surface of things it would seem evident that Westport is spending too much money. Take into consideration, however, the cost of transportation in each of these three places, and the matter takes on a different look. Westport paid for transportation \$7,954.20; Fall River, \$2,380.; and New Bedford, \$2,003.75. Westport has four times the cost to distribute among one twenty fifth the number of pupils, with a result that transportation costs New Bedford, twelve cents per pupil per year, Fall River, thirteen cents, and Westport twelve dollars and nineteen cents. Take in each case these amounts from the cost per pupil and we find the cost of conducting the schools. In Fall River, this is \$53.17 per pupil; in New Bedford, 56.03; and in Westport \$45.83. The actual cost of the schools in Westport is therefore, ten dollars per year less per pupil than in New Bedford and seven dollars per year less than Fall River. We run in fact twelve dollars per year less than the average of thirty eight cities in the State who can because of their size, conduct compact and relatively economical school units. Of the cities only five namely; Newburyport, Methuen, Everett, Chelsea and Quincy, have a cost per pupil less than Westport after transportation is deducted. The point of this whole matter is, that when all facts are taken into consideration the schools of Westport are being run as economically as they can be and at a price that compares very favorably with school costs elsewhere.

I wish to draw attention to the report of the High School Principal and particularly to the matter of overcrowding and the need of more room, which is mentioned therein. It will be impossible to get along next year with the present quarters. I wish to state that the situation at Central Village is at the present time the key to the whole situation in regard to the entire town. If school popula-

tion remains substantially the same next Fall as now, proper relief given here, will take care of everything, while relief given elsewhere will not help here. It will be necessary to have a portable building at Central Village next year. With this the seventh and eighth grades for the center of the town, may be housed in the High School building. This will enable us to keep these grades in one room at the Factory School instead of two, which will give us forty two extra seats to take care of increases in the north end of the town. It would seem that this year the town may choose between a two room portable building at Central Village at a cost of about five thousand dollars and nothing else, or between the portable building and a large building at Beulah, at a cost of over thirty thousand dollars. The big building may be necessary sometime, but with a portable building at Central Village we should be able to postpone its erection for at least one year.

Another situation demanding attention is the Brownell's Corner School. It is at present overcrowded with only grades one to three attending it. From this district next year there will be at least thirty pupils transported to the Head and the Factory Schools. There has been a considerable demand for less transportation and here is an ideal place to curtail same. An additional room built on the Brownell's Corner School will stop this transportation, relieve all overcrowding at the Head, and also prevent overcrowding in the North Westport School by upper grade pupils living on Sanford Road.

This is the first year of transition from a two year to a four year high school. We secured permission from the State Board to run this year without an extra teacher, but next year when a full four year course is being given, one more teacher will be required.

There are one or two matters that I have been asked to explain. One of them is the regularly asked question as to why I have bought so many books. There are several reasons. One is, the increasing numbers in the schools. In

the last three years I have had to equip extra scholars as follows: First grade, forty six; second grade, thirty nine; third grade, forty three; fourth grade, sixty five; fifth, thirty six; sixth grade, none since 1919; seventh grade, six; eighth grade, twelve; high school, thirty four. Another reason is the generally run down condition of most of the texts in use when I came here. A geography minus maps is not a geography and any book minus many pages, is useless in a school room. Another reason, is one I mentioned in my first report four years ago. At that time the schools were equipped for only six grades of work and before any standard seventh and eighth work could be done, all the materials for these grades had to be provided. A further reason is that when I came here, it was understood that a standard of instruction was desired similar to that which had been required of me elsewhere. The books that I found in town were not adapted to give the instruction that is given in progressive schools everywhere. I have consequently gone ahead building up the standard to that of elsewhere by providing the pupils with the same equipment that they would have had in any school system with which I have been connected. For this I take full responsibility. I have simply done what ought to be done and what the children of the town are entitled to have done for them.

I may say now, however, that the greatest need of the schools in Westport is not more equipment, but an adequate course of study. It is to this matter that attention will be particularly given in the immediate future.

Another matter of importance is grading. We are using at the present time, a series of Standard Tests, which disclose with great clearness what may be done in this respect and upon this basis, which is accurate, scientific, and absolutely free from any personal bias, some readjustments will be made.

Another question asked, is as to why the schools are providing basket balls and other athletic equipment. The reason is that the last session of the Legislature passed

a bill requiring the teaching of physical culture, including outdoor and indoor games in schools and this requires appropriate equipment. The original bill called for a Supervisor of such training in each town, but in its final form the matter was left in the hands of the local school authorities.

May I close this report by saying in regard to the condition of the schools as a whole, that tests and other means of investigation show that we are well up to the standard and in some particulars, greatly above standard. Our high standing rests however, too largely upon Arithmetic and rate of reading. We are relatively lower in the thought work in arithmetic than in mechanical processes and there is a distinct need for greater emphasis upon the comprehension of the thought in all school subjects.

Dear Sir:

I have the honor to submit my first report as Principal of the Westport High School.

My report will necessarily, be an optimistic one, but at the same time, the public must see the existing fear of the future in our building. The last school year closed in June, 1921, and showed an enrollment of 55, and we now have 58. Here is an increase of 53% instudents, which, under all educational regulations calls for a corresponding increase in teachers and building accomodations. Neither of these last mentioned factors has been increased.

In June 1922, we shall lose by graduation one student, and in September, 1922, the schools will open with the remaining 57 students now enrolled, and a Freshman class of at least 30. Thus making an increase of 181% over the enrollment of the 1920-1921 school year. And it is an unalterable fact that the High School building accomodations

equipment, and teaching force should be correspondingly increased. The intermediate and primary rooms in our building show an increase, which, while not so great as in the High School, yet, certainly great enough to call for increased space.

In this report I wish to include the curriculum which I have drawn up, to cover the course which we hope to be able to give next year. Our hope is based on an increase in our teaching force. With this curriculum, our High School can be more favorably compared with others.

The Classical Course furnishes a complete and thorough preparation for College and Normal School. The General Course, or Scientific Course, is the one best suited for boys intending to continue their studies in Technical Schools and for those whose school-days end with their graduation from High School, and the Commercial Course adequately equips students for general office positions.
