To the Citizens of Westport:

We have examined the books and vouchers of the Treasurer and Collector and found them approximately correct. We have made the necessary corrections and adjustments and present the receipts and expenditures for the year 1922, classified in accordance with a vote of the Town whereby the classification recommended by the State Bureau of Statistics was adopted.

SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The School Committee during the financial year of 1922 have tried conscientiously to discover ways and means of cutting down school expenses without injuring the educational efficiency of our schools. In view of the fact that two of our members have seen less than one year of service and are therefor lacking in experience, we believe our task has been an especially difficult undertaking. Nevertheless we do feel that we have overcome these problems and made a remarkable progress in the right direction.

The School Committee has had at its disposal during 1922 \$45,000.00 appropriated at the March town meeting, and \$6,900.00 at a special meeting, a total of \$51,200.00. Of this amount \$16,990.00, or about one-third of the total appropriation was spent during January, February and part of March, 1922. A majority of the Committee had no action in these expenditures. We draw attention to the fact that there is an unexpended balance of over \$700.00 which will more than pay the left over bills of the year 1921, which bills the Committee are still receiving and having to pay out of their appropriation.

This year there will be no 1922 left over bills to reduce the amount available, as all have been paid in full. The appropriation of 1923 this year will be started absolutely clean. In fact we have on hand and paid for school repair supplies, janitors material and regular school supplies which will be used this year, 1923.

In accordance with the demands made by the State Board of Education we have this year completed the establishment of a four year High School. This called for an extra teacher and a revised course of study. It was a ques-

tion with the Committee whether the additional courses of study should be classical or of a practical nature. We adopted practicable household arts, because it is accepted for college entrance, is required for Normal School entrance and is the most valuable to those that do not go beyond our own High School. We find that while this course is in its infancy it is meeting the approval of the parents and scholars. This course will prove as valuable as the popular Commercial School Course. The Committee are particularly pleased with the improvement shown in the High School thus far this year. We especially call your attention to the unusually effective work being done by the Commercial Department. It is an unusual good fortune for a town the size of Westport to be able to secure the services of such a capable and experienced teacher as our present one.

We have been able to retain the services of many of our elementary teachers in the face of city competition and feel that on the whole our teaching force is improving in efficiency. This improvement has been attained by an additional cost of \$1,700.00, but the Town Treasurer received in November the sum of \$3,530.00 as a direct result of salaries we are paying, this sum going into the general funds of the Town, not a cent to the Committee.

We call your attention to the Superintendent's Report, which the Committee indorses in whole, drawing your particular attention to those sections of his report dealing with the need of a new schoolhouse at Suburban Park (Greenwood section) and to the one room addition to the Brownells Corner School. We believe that unless the Town does adopt this much of the Superintendent's building program at once it will be impossible to house the children next September. Our itemized budget will be in the hands of every voter present at the Town meeting in March. We earnestly request that you give your careful consideration to our reports and consider our position. We feel that all know the short-

age of school room throughout the town and believe you will be able to see the necessity for appropriating the sums requested.

SCHOOL NURSE AND HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

We have as in the past worked with the Red Cross Association in employing a School Nurse.

We are forced to employ a nurse by the State Board of Education which without this joint work would cost the School Department at least \$120.00 per month.

Up to this present school term we have been paying only \$45.00 per month for the work we have been so kindly helped with, and the Committee after due consideration, voted to increase their portion of the Nurse salary to \$60.00 per month.

Through the efforts of the Red Cross and the District Nurse we have established a dental clinic in the North Westport School where Wednesday and Friday afternoons the District Nurse with a dentist has the children report for their teeth inspection and attention.

The work is more than satisfying the parents and your Committee. We are gratified to know that the money spent for this cause is appreciated. Much credit can be given Miss Barbara Snyder for her personal effort and results of same.

The Health Department, under Dr. John D. Tupper, has also made some remarkable progress. The schools have been well looked after as well as the health of the children. We have had no sickness nor contagious diseases to incapacitate our schools.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Committee of Westport:

I have the honor to submit this, my fifth annual report, as your Superintendent of Schools.

The one big problem confronting the Town so far as school matters are concerned, is the lack of room. The time has come when more school space must be provided. So far as present facilities go, we are at the end of the road. The resources of the School Department are exhausted. This year saw the last that can be done in schemes and contrivances to get along with the present plant. It is now up to the voters to deal with the situation and to provide more room.

Since this is the big matter before us at the present time, and since, in dealing with it, the voters should be as fully informed as possible in order that they may act intelligently upon the articles in the warrant bearing upon the need for more schools, I shall confine this report entirely to this one subject. I shall state the conditions as they existed in the last week of January in each school in town.

In some ways it would be better to take last September as the basis of reckoning, because that is the time when enrollment is always the largest and the time actually taken is always the period when matters are at their best. There seems to me, however, to be something savoring of deceit to talk now about more pupils than seats in a room, because it was true last September and will be true again next September when as a matter of fact at present there are three or four seats in the room not occupied. When in the material that follows it is stated that a room will be overcrowded

next September this is based upon present enrollment and is derived by adding to the number of pupils now in the room who should remain, the number of pupils now in the room below who ought to enter next September.

I will now take up each school in detail:

The High School.

The present enrollment of the High School is 57 pupils of which 20 are in the first year, 16 in the second year, 13 in the third year and 8 in the fourth year class. Of the 23 eighth grade pupils now in town, 20 intend to enter High School next year. If we make no allowance either for present pupils leaving school or for new pupils entering school, but base next year's enrollment only on the fact that 8 will graduate this June and 20 expect to enter next September, there will be in the High School next year 69 scholars. If each of these pupils is to be assigned a desk, it will be necessary to use all the seats in the building except fifteen, thus using room now housing grades seven and eight.

If the pupils now in the building as seventh grade remain as eighth grade next year, and then a seventh grade is organized upon the same basis as this year, the enrollment in these grades will be 30 in the eighth grade and 33 in the seventh, or 63 pupils in all. The room in the building now used by these two grades contains 42 seats and not more than six can be added. To continue the present management for another year would require all the room now being used by these grades and also seventeen seats now being used by High School scholars. In other words the present organization will mean 132 pupils next year in a building that contains but 84 seats.

The space in the High School building presents some peculiar features. In the first place so far as the total amount of floor area in the building goes, there should be

room enough for 150 pupils. The difficulty comes from the manner in which the building has been divided up into rooms. Some of them are too small to be satisfactory for any purpose except office use or store room, and certainly not available as a place in which pupils may sit. Another cause of the present small capacity of the building is the particularly large size of the desks in the main High School room. This room is fully one and one-half times the size of the room on the other side of the hall, yet, because of the difference in size of the desks, the smaller room can readily seat six more pupils than the large room.

There are but two possible courses, enlarge the building or change the furniture. It is, of course, obvious that the cost of changing furniture would be but a fraction of the expense of enlarging the building. The choice is actually between some furniture alone, or some furniture plus enlarging a building to find a place for it along with the present equipment. Another point to be considered is that extra rooms call for extra teachers. As a final consideration it seems to me to be extremely poor business management to allow a relatively cheap item like furniture to prevent the fullest possible use of the most expensive thing in school administration, school space. Furniture cannot cost more than twenty dollars per pupil it usually costs less to provide additional space in such a building as the High School would cost at least one hundred dollars per pupil plus the same figure for seats. In this matter there seems to be but one sensible thing to do and I recommend a change in furniture before next September.

In detail, the change in furniture recommended is as follows:

In the main High School room change the position of the seats so that in place of five single rows there shall be three double rows, thus gaining one row. Retain 24 of the present large seats in this room to make the rear four seats in each double row, and remove all other seats for future use. Put into the space thus made 36 desks with smaller

tops, but otherwise as large as the present desks. In the recitation room on the same side of the hall, in place of the present recitation chairs, place 32 desks similar to those in the larger room with movable chairs. In the commercial room, in place of the present large size desks which will at least in part be needed for teachers desks in the new rooms that must be provided in town, place 18 standard commercial desks. In the remaining room, if needed, place six more desks of the present type. These changes will increase the seating room in the building from 84 to 146 pupils, which will be ample for next year at any rate.

The cost of the furniture should be approximately as follows: 36 desks, fixed chairs at \$9.85 each, 32 desks at \$6.25 each, 18 desks at \$16.00 each and 50 chairs at \$3.75 each, which will cost in all \$1,028.50.

The next element to be considered regarding the High School enrollment is the distribution of the pupils and their transportation. The distribution of next year's pupils is as follows: Within walking distance 15, south to Point 22, Adamsville Road and Acoaxte 13, Sodom Road 13, Brownell Corner by way of G. H. Gifford Corner to Central Village 10, Drift Road 13, Pine Hill Road 22, Head of Westport 9, at Factory and ones coming on car to Westport Factory 15. The present transportation routes can care for these numbers if they are not called upon to carry in addition elementary school pupils—this last feature must be avoided next year by more ample elementary schools in town or transportation cost will be prohibitive. I assume that such provision will be made. Enlarged carrying capacity will, however, be required on the Pine Hill and the Point routes. In the first case probably by a larger truck, and in the second case possibly doubling back as at present.

In general the High School situation next year is possible at any rate. To the inevitable question as to why we do not avoid all this expense of furniture and get rid of some of this transportation expense by leaving at least the seventh and eighth grade pupils in their home districts, that answer

is that in these home districts there is neither furniture nor space for them. The same amount of furniture would be required any way and to provide space would call for enlarging every school building in Westport before next September. Furthermore, the home district of some of these children is in Central Village itself and merely to care for them would involve about as much as to care for all the children in question as outlined above.

Seating situation at High School:

Present seats,	84

North Westport.

At the present time this building houses 85 pupils. In the Spring and Fall this number regularly rises to over 100 to decrease to above the present enrollment in the Winter. This means in the middle of year a comfortably well filled school, (there are now six seats vacant in one room and five in the other), but all the pupils two teachers can care for. Each Fall and each Spring there is a school attendance beyond the proper capacity of either the school or the teaching force.

Assuming the entering class of next year to equal that of this year, the enrollment will be 45 in one room, Grades 1-3, and 47 in the other room, Grades 4-6, when down to normal. This is a full building and allows no room for the inevitable extra pupils. Of the 85 pupils attending the school, 56 live within walking distance at present. Eight in the upper room come on the school truck from Sanford Road, and the remaining 21 come on the car line from Beulah Road and beyond. Next year there will be at least 12 pupils on the truck. If the school should serve only those living in North Westport and the northern portion of San-

ford Road, there would be room enough to care for the pupils at all times of the year. The Winter enrollment would then average about 35 pupils in each room, which is enough if school work is to be of a satisfactory quality. It would seem that next year provision must be made for all those children who now come on the car line to North Westport to attend somewhere else. There are two plans possible. We may send all to the Factory School and go on to a double shift, or we may provide school accommodations where the children live, so that they may have the same educational advantages as the other children of the town. In my opinion the second plan is the only one worthy of consideration, and it is the one that I not only recommend, but most strongly urge as the least that can in decency be done.

NORTH WESTPORT.

Beulah Road.

This school opened in September with an enrollment as follows: one pupil in Grade 1, 9 pupils in Grade 2 and 7 pupils in Grade 3. At that time eight fourth grade pupils from this district were in the North Westport School without seats to accommodate them. As a result the one first grade pupil was transferred to North Westport and the 8 fourth grade scholars were returned to the Beulah Road School. This gave an enrollment of 24 pupils in Grades 2, 3 and 4. Small as this number is it constitutes overcrowding

because the present school furniture is absolutely unsuited to the pupils. These are large wide old-fashioned non-adjustable seats in which many children sit with their feet several inches from the floor. This alleged school furniture should be removed next year, and modern primary furniture be provided, and at the same time the present teachers platform should be removed. With these changes the school can care for the small children in the immediate vicinity so long as conditions of population do not greatly change.

It should be noted that from time to time appropriate furniture has been bought for this purpose, but it has always been required elsewhere before it could be installed.

The older pupils of the district must be cared for somewhere else, and for them there will be no place next year but the Factory School upon half time unless the new building is provided somewhere along the State Highway.

Westport Factory.

The Factory School presents the same situation as at North Westport. The enrollment in the Fall and Spring is greatly in excess of that in the Winter. Each Fall there have been more pupils than seats in first six grades, but there are now some vacant seats in all class rooms by Christmas. Next year this school must care for all the children east of Beulah Road, besides the older ones on Beulah and Davis Roads. Next year the situation based upon Winter enrollment would be as follows in Grades 1 to 6: The Primary Room Grade 1-2, 56 pupils; in the next room, Grades 3-4, 39 pupils, and in the third room, Grades 5-6, 54 pupils. It will be seen that even under smallest possible enrollment the building will not next year take care of all the pupils who attend the school and these figures do not include the large increase that will be with us by Fall. There must plainly

be more room provided or a double shift. In this connection it should be noted that of the 123 pupils now in Grades 1 to 6, all but 46 come on the cars from all points as far west as Beulah Road. Upon this basis of facts, I recommend a new building as soon as possible.

In discussing overcrowding of the Factory School, I have not mentioned Grades 7 and 8, as in there, there will apparently be enough room and three seats over next year.

In order to give an idea as to where the new building should be located, I give herewith the distribution of the children at present in school, who must come on the cars to the Factory until a building is provided. Berryman's and vicinity 34, Railroad Park 10, Beauregard 3, Greenwood 29, Warren avenue 4, Hill Crest 5, Beulah and Davis Roads 39. In the district over fifty new scholars appeared between closing time last June and opening time last September, and according to all indications this year, should do somewhat better. There cannot next year be less than 175 scholars living in the general area mentioned and the center of this population is at Greenwood Park.

Obviously this number of pupils calls for a schoolhouse and also the center of the population shows the general location in which it should be placed. It should be borne in mind, however, that the nature of the traffic on the main Fall River, New Bedford Road, the lack of any sidewalk there, and the frequency of fatal accident to those walking on this road, make it highly improper to place a schoolhouse on the main highway and expect children to walk to it. To ride on the cars and to go to school but half a day would be far better than to lose one's life, but there should be no need of doing any of these things. If, as I understand, a roadway leading from Greenwood to the Beulah Road, with other streets leading from it to the lower Mill and toward the Head is to be opened up this summer, there is the safe and logical site for the New School.

FACTORY SCHOOL.

NOTE. This does not include all children, only those now in the Factory School, and doesn't show by at least 60 the scholars from this area that must attend the Factory School next year.

The Head School.

In this school next year, there will apparently be, according to present arrangement 52 scholars in the first and second grade rooms. Forty-four in the third and fourth grade rooms, and 41 in the fifth and sixth grade rooms. This does not constitute a serious overcrowding, but the enrollment does exceed the number of scholars that the teaching force can take care of to the best advantage. It also means that if any new scholars move in, there will be overcrowding, and since this is bound soon to occur, the situation calls for considerable measures of relief now while there is yet time to effect them before discomfort overtakes us.

The pupils now in the school are distributed as follows: 59 walk, 18 live on Pine Hill Road, 20 on Drift Road and 27 come from the Central Village and Charlotte White Roads. It will be noted that while there is room for them in the building, the number of pupils transported is exceeding the comfortable capacity of transportation and unless room is provided nearer home, an increased transportation cost is an assured thing. How to prevent this will be spoken of in connection with the situation at Central Village.

Central Village.

Due to the necessity of utilizing the space in the High School building for High School pupils, Central Village lost this year its local school. This year the children of this district are dispersed about the town as follows: 17 in grade one to three attend at Macomber's Corner, 14 attend the Point School, 6 attend at Acoaxet and in the Head School there are 25 scholars who live in Central Village or could attend there as readily if not more readily than at the Head. As a matter of fact Central Village itself, that is the region right around the High School has at present no children. The general district has two distinct groups of children, those living south or west of the Town Hall, and those living well to the north of the High School building. Those living north of the High School are the larger group. Of the 17 attending Macomber's Corner 11 live north of the High School and this is also true of four attending the Point School, five attending at Acoaxet and of course all 25 attending the Head School. A school at or near Booth's Corner would be within walking distance of 32 scholars would be nearer than the Head for 11 on the Charlotte White and Central Village Roads, and could be used for as many children on the Drift Road as conditions require. I recommend as a means of relieving the Head School and the transportation going to it, and also to remedy a condition in Central Village that can be justified only as a temporary emergency expedient, a two-room building at or near Booth Corner.

Brownells Corner and Sanford Road.

I consider the two schools together because events have made them a unit.

Last year it became evident that the Head School could not possibly hold the pupils this year unless relief was afforded from some quarter. Since 25 children who would be

in grades four, five and six lived within walking distance of Brownell's Corner. It was evident that this was the direction from which relief should come. It was planned to have an addition put upon the Brownell's Corner building to accommodate these children but this did not occur. Circumstances also required that 13 children in these same grades living on Sodom Road, and who previously went to Central Village, be assigned to this school. As a matter of fact this is for most of these pupils as convenient if not more so than Central Village. There are also within walking distance of the school 23 pupils in grades one to three. This gives to Brownell Corner a school population of 61 pupils, of which 48 absolutely belong there, because within walking distance and 13 are well off or better there than elsewhere. As matters stood last June the school could not accommodate more than 25 pupils. The building was enlarged as much as possible without an extra room, and 44 seats placed in it, which is actually three or four more than the room should contain. When school opened in the Fall the 38 pupils of Grades 4 and 6 were placed in this building and of the 23 small children 21 were sent to the Sanford Road School and two to the Head School because this was all that could be done.

The Sanford Road School has within walking distance of it in grades one to three 20 pupils and is the logical school for the rapidly increasing population at the Lakeside City development. The result of placing in this school the 21 pupils from Brownell's Corner was to greatly overload the teacher, although, on account of the type of furniture it was possible to hold the pupils. Next year after the Sanford Road School has cared for the local population there will be no room for the Brownell Corner children, who should not be there and would not be there had the town provided more room for them at home. We have here the most unfortunate condition in town because it concerns the largest number of very young children. Conditions demand next

year another room on the Brownell Corner School and since this is the logical center of a large district embracing Sanford and Sodom Roads and the Old County Road from the State line to G. H. Gifford Corner and a district in which there is rapidly increasing population, the addition should be so constructed as to allow room to be added to it in the more or less immediate future.

Macomber's Corner.

This school now has an enrollment of 39 pupils. There are 42 seats in the building which is now more than should be there. As has been pointed out, 11 of these pupils belong in a school at or near Booth Corner. Next year, according to present indications, Macomber's Corner will be overcrowded if it must serve the present area. The necessary relief will be best afforded by the school north of the High School already urged and some such relief seems essential.

Acoaxet.

This school is ample for the local school population. This year it is full almost to overflowing because pupils who should be in a new school at or near Booth Corner are attending there so far as weather conditions and their health permit. The proper relief here is the same as at Macomber's Corner.

The Point.

In this school there is ample room and no housing problem. There are now attending it four children who ought to go to Booth Corner and nine more who could attend at Booth Corner more conveniently than at the Point.

South Westport and Horseneck.

These schools are well filled but present now serious housing problems.

Buildings Needed.

As may be seen from the foregoing, something must be done this year in the way of providing schools. One room at Brownell Corner, and at least two rooms and probably three rooms will be required at Greenwood Park. Two rooms at Booth's Corner should be provided by next September, and will be absolutely necessary by a year from then.

I shall not undertake to state exactly what sort of building should be built; nevertheless, in all cases, in my opinion, a unit type of construction should be used since in nearly every case the building provided now will soon be outgrown and the present form of construction should allow for additions to be made readily and with minimum expense. So far as possible, I recommend the small wooden unit, 20 by 35 feet, without cellar, and warmed by a type of heater now used with superb success and great economy, at Beulah and Sanford Road Schools.

Dear Sir:—I herewith submit my report as Principal of the Westport High School.

First, as to the condition of the physical property. The building is in very good shape with few exceptions. New downcomers and drains for carrying off rain water are needed. A permanent walk should be constructed from the street to the front steps. The dilapidated plank walk and muddy approach which we have now detract seriously from the appearance and utility of the school plant.

It is evident from the most cursory study of attendance figures that the building will be inadequate for the number of pupils expected next Fall, if the present arrangement of grades is continued. It has been a pleasure to have the seventh and eighth grades with us and I believe a distinct benefit to the pupils themselves. Applying, as we have endeavored, some degree of the Junior High School idea, it cannot help but be a better preparation for their High School work than would otherwise be the case.

This being the first year of the full four year High School course, there has been some confusion in curricula arrangement, which we have, however, succeeded in reducing to its smallest dimensions.

Within possible limits we have followed the recommendations included in the Outline for Secondary Schools prepared at the instance of the State Board of Education, which represents the matured conclusions of the best minds working in Secondary School problems in the State.

Under this plan the students are allowed a very full freedom in election of work. If this freedom of choice is to be granted, however, there must be close co-operation of the

parents in order that the students may make their choice wisely. I would recommend that in the future, the entering class should be a little more restricted in choice than at present.

Appreciating your whole-hearted aid and invaluable supervision and, through you, thanking the School Committee for their sincere support in my work, I respectfully submit this report.

A health entertainment was given for instruction at the old school at Westport Factory by the "Jolly Jester," and "Astra" the Health Fairy gave an entertainment in the Town Hall and nearly all the children of the Town attended.

In November a Dental Clinic was started in the North Westport School, running two afternoons a week, Wednesday and Friday. Fees are: extractions 25c, fillings 50c and cleaning 50c. Children unable to pay are taken care of free, and a great deal has been accomplished in the short time the clinic has been open.
