

GROUPTING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assamble at the town hall on Tuesday the 10th day of March next at, 11 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, vis:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said moting.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for macadamising the Sanford road beginning at Macomber's Corner, said sum to be expended with like sums which may be appropriated by the State and also by the County, it being understood, however, that said \$3000.00 if appropriated shall be expended on said read although said State and said County fail to make similar appropriation therefor and take any other necessary action in relation thereto.

Article 3. To see if the term will vote to appropriate and authorize to be used for the payment of 1925 bills and other legitimate expanses incurred by the several departments of the term all reimburgements from the State or from other cities and towns, also all monies received on account of sales made by those in charge of said departments; said amounts so received to be oredited to their proper and respective departments in addition to any and all sums specifically appropriated by the terms.

And you are hareby directed to serve this warrant by posting five of more attested conies thereof in as many public places within said town at least seven days before the time of said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant with your deinge thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

Report of the Trustees of the Library

The Trustees of the Free Public Library respectfully submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1924.

The Trustees met and organized as follows: Chairman, Nason R. Macomber; Secretary, Ada S. Macomber. Mrs. Annie R. Howland was appointed Librarian and Miss Mabel E. Macomber, Assistant.

The shelves in the library have been arranged and new shelves built, making more room for the new books.

We are deeply indebted to the Massachusetts Library Commission for assistance during the year. Without any expense to us, except for board, Miss Carrie Williams was sent down to make a new catalogue, rearrange the books and install a new system of charging the books. The Commission also presented the Library with forty-eight children's books.

The Millicent Library of Fairhaven loaned us one hundred books which have been used in the branch libraries during the year. The New Bedford Library has also loaned us reference books which we could not afford to have on our shelves.

Branch libraries have been maintained at the High School, Greenwood Park School and South Westport School. The Trustees are ready to establish a branch library at any school where a responsible person can be found to take care of the books and keep a record of the circulation. Mr. Baldwin, Superintendent of Schools has kindly offered to carry the books from the library to the schools whenever necessary. The following magazines are available at the library: Boys' Life, Good Housekeeping, National Geographic and Popular Mechanics.

There has been refunded to the town the sum of \$1,929.24 from the "surplus fund collected to provide suitable recognition of the residents of Massachusetts who served in the army and navy of the United States during the war with Germany." The money must be held "as a special fund to be appropriated only for the purpose of paying indebtedness or for such purposes for which the city or town may borrow money as specified in sections 7 and 8 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws," which read in part: "For acquiring land or constructing buildings or other structures including the cost of original equipment, as memorials to soldiers, sailors and marines." The Library Trustees have had placed in the warrant an article calling for this money to be appropriated for a Library Building to be erected as a Memorial to our Soldiers, Sailors and Marines. We feel that no more fitting memorial can be erected than a public library to be used by the people of the town, and we ask your careful and thoughtful consideration of the project.

We are always glad to have lists of books suggested and will endeavor to purchase them whenever practicable. The circulation of books for the year has been approximately 3129.

School Committee Report

PROPOSED ARTICLES FOR THE TOWN WARRANT

To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to maintain the State-Aided Independent Household Arts Department of the Westport High School, in accordance with Chapter 74, Section 3 of the State Laws relating to Education, and take any other necessary action.

To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to pay one half the cost of building a line fence between the property of the Westport Manufacturing Co., and the west boundary of the Factory School lot and take any other necessary action.

To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for other than ordinary repairs to the School property of the Town, and take any other necessary action.

To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to cover the cost of installing electric lights in the High School at Central Village and take any other necessary action.

To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to establish and maintain a State-Aided Independent Agricultural Department at the Westport High School, in accordance with Chapter 74, Section 3 of the Massachusetts State Laws relating to Education, and take any other necessary action.

Report of the Superintendent

To the School Committee of the Town of Westport: Gentlemen:

In accordance with precedent, I am pleased to submit to you my first report, the thirty-second in the series of annual reports submitted by the Superintendents of this Town. It covers the first five months of my service.

The administration of the Westport Schools was not in my charge during the first eight months of the year nineteen hundred twenty-four. However, I have carefully read the reports of the Secretary of the School Committee from January to September, and I have here recorded what have appeared to me to be the outstanding events:

1. In the month of February, two new two-room buildings were opened, one at Booth's Corner and one at Brownell's Corner.

2. On March eleventh, the Committee organized for the year with Mr. Loren W. Park as Chairman and Mr. Charles R. Tallman as Secretary. Mr. Amasa E. Remington assumed his duties as the new member of the Committee.

3. On March twenty-ninth, an Advisory Committee of five ladies was appointed in connection with the Day Household Arts Department at the High School: Mrs. Charles T. Gifford, Chairman; Miss Katherine Hall, Secretary; Mrs. William H. Gifford, Mrs. Edward L. Macomber, and Mrs. Loren W. Park. 4. On April third, the School Committees of Freetown, Gosnold, and Westport met in the School Committee Rooms at New Bedford. There the Westport Committee notified the committees representing Freetown and Gosnold that Westport declined to enter into further negotiations with the Towns of Freetown and Gosnold in a continuation of a Superintendency Union.

5. On May fourteenth, it was unanimously voted: "It shall be a requirement of the Westport School Committee, that teachers applying for a position to teach in our schools, excepting those now employed as teachers and those who have previously been employed as such, shall have a normal school or a college diploma, before being eligible for a position as teacher in Westport."

6. On May fifteenth, notice was received from Mr. Robert O. Small, Director of the Division of Vocational Education, that the Commissioner of Education had approved the establishment of a Day Household Arts Department in the Westport High School, reimbursement to date from March 1, 1924.

7. On August eighth, notice was received from the State Department of Education that the Committee would be warranted in taking steps at once to elect a Superintend of Schools.

8. On August 15, notice was received from the State Department of Education that the Union of Schools of Gosnold, Freetown, and Westport was dissolved, becoming effective September 1, 1924.

9. On August 29, Fred H. Baldwin was unanimously elected Superintendent of the Westport Schools.

Agreeably to your friendly, official advice at the time you gave the schools into my charge, I have endeavored, with the whole-hearted co-operation of the personnel of the School Department to make the best schools possible in light of our combined training and experience.

In September, many more pupils applied for admission to school than had been expected. Whereas plans had been made to open but three rooms in the new Greenwood Park School, it became necessary to open four rooms and, in addition, to make use of the Sanford Road School, the closing of which had been planned for this year.

OBJECTIVES

Shortly after the schools were organized, the teachers were called together at the Factory School for the purpose of establishing objectives toward which we are to head during the present administration.

The future of American Democracy depends upon the character of its citizenship. It depends upon what our young men and our young women are, not altogether upon what they know. It depends in a large measure upon the way they think and feel and act—not entirely upon the facts that they have required to memorize. No body of facts, however well fixed in the minds of the pupils, will make American citizens, for American citizens are not made of facts alone. They are made of ideas, characteristic ways of thinking, feeling, and acting that have been developed in our democracy and are now shaping its destiny. It makes a difference, of course, what facts our pupils acquire, but it makes a vastly greater difference how they think and how they feel while they are learning and what they can do with the facts after they have obtained them.

Thus, being assured that good citizenship should be the goal of public school education, our aim is to foster the growth of miniature democracies in the classrooms, the bringing about of a state of society in which each individual shall have the best opportunity that the town can afford and all possible encouragement to make the most of himself and shall feel under obligation to make his greatest contribution to the welfare of those with whom he lives.

The citizenship that we are working for is citizenship that is ability to think straight; citizenship that is power to co-operate, to control oneself, and to respect the rights of others; citizenship that accepts responsibility and sees it through; citizenship that respects law and order because it understands the origin and the necessity of each.

Our classrooms have been dedicated to the Public Service to the end that all who may enter them may live a more abundant life. We are encouraging the pupils to work together with common purposes that they may acquire (1) useful information, (2) skills, (3) habits, (4) attitudes, (5) methods of work, ever bearing in mind the needs of society as we know them, and the needs of the pupils as growing citizens, both as producers and as consumers.

PROFESSIONAL GROWTH

Once a month the schools run on a double session plan, closing at one o'clock, to the end that our entire teaching force may gather at the Factory School for a conference. Thus far, the meetings have been addressed by Mr. Frank W. Wright, Deputy Commissioner of Education; Mr. Burr F. Jones, Agent in charge of Elementary Education; and Dr. Carl Schrader, Agent in charge of Physical Education; and, on two occasions, your Superintendent has taken full charge of the meeting. Looking ahead, we are anticipating visits from Miss Mabel A. Mathews, Assistant to the late Dr. Fernald, of Waverly and Professor Ekstrom of Brown University. Such meetings prove to be of great benefit to the pupils because of their effect upon the professional attitude and the growth of the teachers. Several of our teachers are taking correspondence courses with North Adams Normal School and Saturday or afternoon courses at Boston University and Brown University. Practically everyone is planning a summer course at Hyannis Normal School or at a University.

From time to time, the teachers of the Elementary Schools of the Town and several of the teachers at the High School are meeting on Friday evenings at the Factory School to take a Massachusetts University Extension Course in School Methods. This year the teachers are bearing the expense of this course from their own incomes.

The teachers are certainly to be congratulated upon their fine professional spirit. It would be hard, indeed, to find practically all of the teachers in any town voluntarily giving so freely of their strength and energy at the close of a hard week's work in an endeavor to become more efficient teachers. The Town should be proud of such a corps of men and women!

I recommend that all possible encouragement be given to our teachers in their eagerness to make professional advancement.

SPECIAL SCHOOL

The crowded conditions in some of the schools was relieved to a certain extent by the establishment of a Special School in the old Factory Building. This school was organized in compliance to Chapter 71, Section 46 of the State Laws relating to Education, which reads as follows: "The school committee shall annually ascertain, under regulations prescribed by the department (of Education) and the Commissioner of mental diseases, the number of children three years or more retarded in mental development in attendance upon its public schools, or of school age resident therein. At the beginning of each

school year, the committee in every town where there are ten or more such children shall establish classes for their instruction according to their mental attainments, under regulations prescribed by the department."

In accordance with custom, these children had been pushed on from one room to another whenever it appeared that they had "absorbed" all that was possible for them to get by sitting in a room, whenever physical age or size made such procedure seem wise, or whenever a seat was needed by an incoming pupil. Unable to do the regular school work, they got less than we might have the right to expect them to get by attendance at school, and, at the same time, they cost much more in the way of futile effort on the part of the teachers and by impairing the progress of the class in the room in which they sat than was justified by what they received.

Mrs. Charles R. Tallman and Miss Mildred Howland, teachers of the Special School, are rendering a splendid service. It will do your head and heart good to visit them at the old Factory School and observe the children at their work.

I recommend (1) that certain other pupils in town, who have been, or, subsequent to group testing, shall be designated by the State Officials, when the Mental Clinic is held in May, be placed in the Special School and (2) that the boys and the girls be taught in separate rooms, commencing September 9, 1925.

HEALTH

The health of the pupils is conserved by means of several projects. Our veteran School Physician Dr. John D. Tupper, assisted by the able School Nurse, Miss Agnes E. Vickery, conducted a physical examination of each pupil shortly after the opening of school in the Fall. Eyes and ears were tested by the teachers. When necessity required it, recommendations for proper treatment were made to parents. In many instances, the nurse has transported pupils for the purpose of clinical treatment.

At the Special School a hot lunch is provided at the cost of twenty-five cents a week. In most of the Elementary Schools hot soup or cocoa is prepared at noon. At the High School the recently organized lunchroom, as conducted by Miss Margaret Templeton, is so co-ordinated with the work of the Day Household Arts Department, that, without additional cost to the Town, both hot and cold lunches are served at cost to all who desire them. A large majority of the pupils and teachers avail themselves of the opportunities that this plan affords.

We have adopted a course of study in Health Education. The object of which is to establish habits of healthful living and to create an interest in, and a feeling of responsibility for, the health of the community as a whole. Although Health Education is not a subject apart, but should permeate every subject in the curriculum, we are giving one lesson in specific health instruction each week.

Organized games and calesthenics have been continued and extended in accordance with the State Law, and the pupils are encouraged to exercise in the open air, under the supervision of the teachers, whenever the weather is suitable.

Through the helpful co-operation of the Westport Chapter of the American Red Cross, the conscientious effort of the teachers, the untiring effort of our School Nurse Miss Agnes E. Vickery, and the willingness of Dr. Tupper to give a large service for a very small remuneration, the children of Westport are getting as much, if not more, consideration from the health standpoint as are the children in most communities of this size.

As it would be difficult for a carpenter to build a house without a hammer and a saw, so is it difficult for our teachers to comply with the State Law concerning Physical Education without the proper tools with which to work. I recommend (1) that a sum of money be put in this year's budget to cover the purchase of some play materials for the use of the pupils on the playground at recess, (2) that at least, one playday be held on the Westport Agricultural Fair Grounds, providing permission can be secured to use the grounds for such a purpose, where, under the supervision of a Physical Director and the teachers, the pupils shall engage in a play festival. Attendance upon such an occasion would count as a regular school day. Such procedure has the hearty approval of the State Director of Physical Education, Dr. Carl Schrader. I can think of no move that could be made by the School Department that would tend more to foster the real community spirit in Westport.

ENGLISH

A special drive is being made in connection with the teaching of English both in the grades and at the High School. For many reasons, it is the subject that is most difficult to teach especially since the teaching of English is, to a certain extent, in some instances, no longer the teaching of the mother tongue, but almost the teaching of a foreign language. We have adopted a course of study for use in the Elementary Schools. Our aim would seem to be a reasonable and a workable one:

1. "To turn out pupils able to stand before the class and talk for a minute or two upon a subject within the range of their knowledge or experience, speaking plainly in clearcut sentences, and without common grammatical mistakes, 2. To turn out pupils able to write with fair facility an original paragraph upon a subject within the range of their experience or their interests.

Such a paragraph should show:

1. An absolute mastery of the sentence idea;

2. Freedom from glaring grammatical mistakes;

3. Correct spelling of all ordinary words;

4. Unfailing evidence of attention to matters of sentence structure and to the choice of words."

In our English work at the High School several important changes have been made. The chief aim has been to help the pupil to strengthen himself in his ability to speak and write his mother tongue, in other words, to help him to master the "tools" of English. The better to accomplish this end, literature and composition have been put into separate courses. In the place of teaching composition, grammar, rhetoric, and literature on the consecutive days of each week, we plan a ten-week course in composition and a ten-week course in literature for each half year. The composition work does not result in monotony, for the pupil does not write a theme each day. The assignments are varied by the study of selections to help the pupil appreciate how prominent authors have succeeded, by exercises to correct faulty speech, by grammar work, by spelling, by letter-writing, and by oral composition. As ability to use good everyday speech is considered fundamental, our plan provides abundant opportunity for the practice of oral composition based, in a large measure, on Current Events. It is felt that the new organization necessitates a concentration that is impossible under the usual plan of changing one's aim every day. This plan of differentiation of composition and literature has the endorsement of the National Council of English Teachers.

BUILDING PROGRAM

There is considerable likelihood of a crowded condition in our schools by next Fall. I believe that, in consideration of the liberal advance that has recently been made in providing schoolhouses, it would be wise for us to endeavor to house our pupils in the present school buildings during the next school year. We can do this by making use of one of the following plans, (1) constructing a temporary classroom in the basement of the High School building at Central Village; (2) opening the Beulah School; or, (3) making use of the double shift plan. If the school population at the northern end of the Town continues to increase, it may be necessary to make use of the double shift plan at the Greenwood Park School.

I recommend that a housing survey be made as soon as possible and that serious consideration be given to a Building Program during the ensuing year.

TRANSPORTATION

In some instances, the school trucks are crowded beyond reasonable physical and moral safety to the pupils.

I recommend (1) that consideration be given to (a) the advisability of using larger trucks on some of the routes and (b) to the advantages of the Wayne Body to the end that the pupils may be more safe and comfortable on the long hauls and, (2) that the whole matter of the transportation of school pupils be given serious study during this year.

OTHER SCHOOL DEPARTMENT REPORTS

I wish to call your attention to the reports of the Principal of the High School, the School Physician, the School Nurse, and the Attendance Officer. I feel that we may well be proud of the attitude and of the accomplishments

I recommend that the drive on English be continued during the year to come.

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION

There appears to be a demand on the part of some of the people of Westport for the establishment of an Agricultural Department at the High School. This demand has apparently been growing quietly for some time. Many of the boys who are now housed in the High School building are interested to enroll in the classes should such a Department be organized. At your request Mr. Rufus Stimson, Director of Agricultural Education of the Division of Vocational Education has been invited to come to Westport to explain things fully to the boys, their parents, and interested Town Officials. If you should decide to authorize the establishment of an Agricultural Department, I understand that the State will reimburse the Town an amount equal to two-thirds of the salary that you pay to the instructor.

l recommend that an article appear in the Town Warrant this year for the purpose of bringing this issue to a head.

CONDITION OF SCHOOL PROPERTY

The school property is, in some instances, in a deteriorating condition. It would appear to be sound business policy for the Town to appropriate a sum of money to take care of other than ordinary repairs.

I recommend that an article appear in the Town Warrant for the purpose of bringing this problem to the people. of these officials and, in fact, of the conscientious and untiring efforts of the entire School Department Personnel.

Let us pause for a moment, before I close, out of respect to the memory of one who endeared herself to this community as a mother, as a wife, as a teacher, and as a member of the Westport School Committee, one whose actions were always governed by a firm and a steadfast purpose to be of service to her fellowmen, more particularly to the rising generation of young Americans.

Report of the High School Principal

Feb. 1, 1925.

Mr. Fred H. Baldwin, Supt. of Schools, Westport, Mass.

Dear Sir;

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I submit this, my second annual report, as principal of the Westport High School.

This year with the establishment of a six year high school we opened with 125 students nearly one half of whom were with us for the first time. Thanks to the lockers and additional class room provided by the special appropriation of \$1,200 and maintained from Vocational Funds we are able to accommodate the newcomers. I must correct, however, my statement of last year that we could handle 150 students. Experience this year shows that with the present curriculum any increase over 125 would be unwise.

Twenty weeks with the entering classes proves conclusively that in many cases the preparation or progress necessary to successful work in the Junior High School has not been made. Such a condition handicaps those who are prepared to go on and is bound to make a big cut in the efficiency of our school. In providing an outlet at the Factory Junior High for a number who need special attention you have relieved the situation to a considerable degree. I know, however, that you feel with me a need for some form of standard examination that will set a minimum requirement of preparation for entrance to the Junior High 7th year and prevent the recurrence of the situation that existed last September. The Vocational Day Household Arts Course is continuing to grow and the good work of last year is being ably carried on by Miss Templeton. I feel sure that we are on firm ground and the course is here to stay. This year the department has supervised the running of a Lunch Association which has paid its own way and has been well patronized by students and faculty.

The Commercial Department is doing more work than ever before. More attention is being given to the younger students. In this way we hope to let them learn something of the requirements and nature of a commercial vocation. On the other hand it will be possible to eliminate those who cannot succeed before it is too late to start them in a course of study better suited to their needs. This should eventually mean fewer but more efficient commercial graduates.

The balance of the curriculum is arranged to provide a general training and background for the two mentioned departments, meet the entrance requirements of the State Normal Schools, and allow for the election of as many subjects as our equipment and teacher personnel permit. A canvas of the boys in the school shows that more than one-half live on farms and the majority of these boys signfy a desire to take agricultural subjects as they expect to gain their livings on Westport farms. I know that you are investigating the advisability of such a course and that the State is ready to establish a state-aided department. I trust that such a movement will not be tabled before an exhaustive study has been made of the possibilities of its adoption.

Our two big efforts this year have been to broaden the extra-curriculum activities and to improve the facilities and course of study in the Department of English.

Educators are giving more and more attention to the

physical needs of our school population. The law of Massachusetts requires physical training and we are attempting to meet three regular periods of setting-up drills and supervised play. The lack of an indoor gymnasium somewhat handicaps our efforts. Mr. Murphy has been of great assistance in this work with the boys and has also provided the way for team competition with neighboring schools. Such competition is reflected in better class room work, since those who would play must get their studies.

Clubs, entertainments, parties, and dances make up the balance of our extra-curriculum work. It is here that we have been the weakest but we are locating a lot of latent talent and can see promise of considerable opportunity for individual purposing.

English has been one of the weakest although the most essential links in our school chain. Here at the high school we are now requiring five periods per week of each of the six classes. New text-books emphasizing the practical side of English rather than formal grammar have been adopted, and we are giving much attention to the organization of a definite course of study. We all feel indebted to you for the help you have furnished in this work and for the useful tools which your past experience as an English teacher has provided. I sincerely hope that you will get the co-operation of all in your efforts to improve the language work of the elementary schools. I believe that most of the failures are due to the lack in ability to understand others and to express clearly one's own thoughts. This condition is evident in our beginner's classes.

Considerable effort has also been put into the Department of History and we have the foundations for a number of good courses. At present the great need is for an increased amount of reference material.

Report of the School Physician

Feb. 1, 1925.

Mr. Fred H. Baldwin, Superintendent of Schools. Dear Sir:

In examining the School children of the Town I find a gradual improvement in every way each year.

I have not found any cases of infectious or contagious disease, during my examination. All children needing care and treatment regarding tonsils, teeth, etc., have been looked after by School Nurse, after getting permission from parent or guardians.

Children found to be underweight have been carefully instructed as to food, hygiene, etc., for building up their bodies and improving their health.

I would like to urge upon the School Committee the necessity of having children vaccinated before entering school, as the law requires. If this is not done it makes a lot of unnecessary disturbance in the schools after opening. The State Board of Health claims that Small Pox is increasing in some sections with many deaths, on account of not being protected by vaccination. During the Summer vacation is a good time to have this done.

For full particulars regarding the number of children found defective in any way Miss Vickery, the efficient nurse of the Schools, has made a tabulated report.

I wish to thank teachers for their hearty co-operation and children for their courtesy.

I wish to thank you and the School Committee for the helpful co-operation that has never been lacking since I came to your school.

Report of the School Nurse

Dear Sir;

My report includes almost six months of my predecessor's work to the middle of June from when I endeavored to carry on her programme, till medical inspection commenced in September the findings of which are as follows: Cases of

defective teeth	504
defective throats	147
defective posture	7
enlarged glands	27
10% underweight	216

55 cases of defective vision and 7 of defective hearing were reported by teachers.

The corrective treatments to end of year comprises:— 210 dental treatments at school clinic;

226 visits to Union Hospital;

26 tonsil and adenoid operations at hospital clinic.

These latter cases have double advantage of being thoroughly examined by Children's Specialist in addition to attention of School Specialist.

18 children have been accompanied to Optician and glasses provided by Red Cross funds in necessitous cases. This corrective work has involved 211 school visits and 722 visits to homes, for my aim has been to secure cooperation of parents wherever possible. Special clinics for 10% underweight children were held in May and June under auspices of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association the examining Physicians at which were Drs. Williker and Richard McKnight. Parents were invited to attend and consult with special nutrition worker.

The clinic for children of sub-mentality also involved much labor in preparation.

In addition to this work an endeavor has been made to stimulate scholars interest in "Health" campaign by teaching Hygiene and instructing methods of "Home nursing in High School." Appreciation and thanks are due to staff of Union Hospital for their kindly and hearty co-operation at all times and for great amount of work done free of cost. I thank the teachers for emphasizing health programme in their work and the Library Committee for loaning room as temporary office during summer months.
