The Board organized with Dr. E. W. Burt, Chairman, and Edward L. Macomber, Secretary. Charles R. Wood was appointed Milk Inspector, and John C. Partington, John L. Duffany and Edward S. Francis were appointed Inspectors of Slaughtering.

Mrs. Sybil L. Mercer was engaged as Community Nurse and Mrs. Sarah C. Macomber as substitute nurse.

Thirty-six burial permits were issued during the year.

The number of diseases dangerous to the public health were reported as follows:

Chicken-Pox 20, Anterior Poliomyelitis 7, Lobar Pneumonia 1, Dog Bite 6, Monkey Bite 1, German Measles 10, Measles 18, Pulmonary Tuberculosis 2, Whooping Cough 1, Typhoid Fever 4, Paratyphoid 3.

This year for the first time the Community Nurse has been under the direction of the Board of Health.

A tremendous amount of work has been done as shown by the appended report.

It will be noted that beside the bedside nursing, the nurse acts as a social worker and assists the Public Welfare and Old Age departments, transports patients to clinics and hospitals and assists the School Nurse.

She also transports children to the Dental Clinic and acts as dental assistant.

Beginning with that date the Federal Government pays all labor expense, the Board being obliged to furnish a commissary and expense of transporting all commodities from warehouse in Fall River to Westport.

Report of the Trustees of the Free Public Library

The Trustees of the Free Public Library submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1935.

Library Hours are the same as in previous years:
Saturday 3-5 and 7-9.

The past year has been a most interesting one in our library. During the summer we cleaned and re-arranged the library which has greatly facilitated our work during library hours. We also checked and straightened our files and were very pleased to find that we have better than 4400 books on our shelves.

In August we held a library exhibition at the Community House in Central Village. There were nine tables featuring various displays and articles of historical interest illustrating different types of books. The Point Library joined with us and contributed some of the most interesting things. In the evening we had as speakers: Dr. Robert Wicks of Princeton; Mr. Milton E. Earle, Supt. of Westport Schools; and Miss Myra Gifford of the May School in Boston. Each gave a short talk on Books and their uses. It was very gratifying to see the number of people who came and enjoyed both the exhibits and the speakers.

In October our Librarian, Mrs. Howland resigned. She had served as Librarian for 39 years. It will be of interest to older members of our Town to know that she was appointed Librarian in 1896, shortly after the Westport Library and the Central Village Library Association were combined. At that time two book-cases held the entire library and the Trustees voted to "spend the sum of \$30.00 for books for the year." The Librarian's salary was to be 25 cents each Saturday. Dorothy Smith was appointed as Librarian and the Secretary of the Trustees was voted "to serve as assistant without pay that we may conserve our limited funds." The Trustees presented Mrs. Howland with a gift in great appreciation of her long and faithful years of service.

The circulation of the Library for the past year was 5,862. We still have a branch library at Brownell's Corner in charge of Mrs. Leslie Davis. At the request of Mr. Norman Gifford, principal of the High School, we have installed a branch library at the High School in charge of one of the teachers. The books are used as references, supplementary reading and recreational reading. The books are checked and renewed about every six weeks. It is most pleasing to note how many of the students are availing themselves of this privilege.

As in the past years the State Department of Education has been generous in loaning us books on special topics; in addition they sent us this past year 25 books on current topics. These supplemented our own supply. We have also borrowed books from neighboring libraries when we did not have them ourselves. If desired books are not in the library consult the Librarian, who is always ready to help secure the wanted books.

We have the following magazines on hand for circulation: National Geographic, Good Housekeep-

ing, Christian Herald, Field and Stream, Popular Mechanics, Popular Salesman, Readers' Digest, Pathfinder, Saint Nickolas, Young Crusader, Child Life, Outdoor Girl, American Boy, Dumb Animals.

Also many pamphlets sent by the Agricultural School and numerous catalogues on all sorts of subjects.

We still feel that we are handicapped by lack of funds but hope that the coming year will remedy it as every little helps.

We sincerely hope that our readers will continue to help keep our library awake and growing.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

January 31, 1936.

To the School Committee of the Town of Westport:

Gentlemen:

In accordance with custom, I submit my eighth annual report, the forty-third in the series of annual reports submitted by the school superintendents of this Town.

SCHOOL FINANCES

The total school appropriations, including the Dog Tax, were \$70,789.00. Of this amount, \$5,000.00 was for use in correcting the basement situation at the high school.

The amount expended for school purposes, other than plant expansion, was \$65,267.27, leaving a balance of \$521.73. The total amount of all State reimbursements received by the Town Treasurer on account of school activities was \$7,942.62, making the net cost of all education, in terms of local taxes, \$57,324.65.

Smith-Hughes Funds (Federal Grants) to the amount of \$316.33 were received and expended directly for Vocational Household Arts and Vocational Agricultural salaries as required by law.

An increase in the Household Arts budget is necessary as a larger proportion of the instructor's time is now chargeable to this account and the pupil enrollment of said course tends to grow.

E. R. A. AND W. P. A.

During the year 1935 Federal Relief Funds have been used:

1. At the Greenwood Park building, to cover the labor charges in completing the excavation and cementing of the entire basement, including proper retainer walls, building supports, exits, painting and lights. The labor costs of revamping the drainage system and installing a modern septic tank were also provided as an E. R. A. project. We now have a dry, comfortable basement, an enlarged, improved play area to the north of the building, and a sewerage system completely hidden from view and no longer objectionable to our neighbors. The cost of this in direct taxation was \$1,860.26.
2. At the North Westport, Factory, Booth's Corner, and Point Schools, desk tops have been refinished to the number of about 370 (this includes 40 tablet arm chairs). All iron water-storage tanks have been painted. Outside painting has been done at the North Westport School and the Greenwood Portable. This has been at a cost in direct taxation of \$93.73. An additional expenditure of perhaps \$50.00 will be made prior to the completion of this project.

PUPIL ACCOMMODATIONS AND TRANSPORTATION OUR BIGGEST PROBLEM?

For several years it has seemed wise to present the trends in our school population and call to the attention of the citizens the ever-growing need for larger and more suitable high school accommodations.

Last year when it became evident that the problem could no longer be postponed, the School Department devoted the major portion of the Annual School Report to this question. The findings of two separate Special Investigating Committees were presented at town meetings. The attempt was made to show not only a need for better and larger high school accommodations, but also for improved elementary quarters and transportation. Opportunities to vote on several propositions were offered as possible solutions.

As a result of all our efforts we as a town have decided to construct an addition to the present high school building that will double the legal capacity of the building and provide an auditorium-gymnasium of reasonable size.

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TEACHER PERSONNEL

Faculty changes have taken place in unusually large numbers

At the High School, four of the seven teachers did not return. They were replaced by Mr. Paul Cieurzo, a graduate of Rhode Island State College, and resident of Fairhaven; Mr. John Dolan, a graduate of Brown University, who was transferred from the Junior High School; Miss Lillian Cahoon, a graduate of the State Teachers College at Framingham, and a resident of Westport; Miss Lillian Lussier, State Teachers College at Bridgewater, a resident of Fall

River. Increased enrollment and the 1935-1936 program made it advisable to add another teacher. Miss Catherine Doyle, a graduate of State Teachers College at Bridgewater and a resident of Fall River, completed the year at the Factory School following the resignation of Mrs. Kirby. It was deemed advisable to grant her a contract and transfer her to the High School.

Mr. Gifford, in his report as High School Principal, states: "The plan to bring Mr. Dolan and Miss Doyle from the Factory Junior High has proven most helpful. They not only understand their subject matter well, but are especially fitted by their previous experience (**with younger pupils**) to help bridge the gap for the incoming class. Under their guidance, the Freshmen this year have entered most commendably into the school activities—both curricular and extra-curricular".

"Miss Cahoon's work is highly successful; she is not only well-versed in her work, but her instruction, her discipline, her tirelessness are all worthy of mention".

"The work of Mr. Cieurzo is also I believe of a sincere, persevering type His work as coach shows much understanding of boys as well as athletics"

"Miss Lussier has done much good work in English; her work in French is certainly as good as I have ever seen".

"I should now like to commend Miss Gagnon and Mr. Erickson for their continued, serious, hard, and high-grade work".

In my opinion, the spirit and atmosphere at the High School is the best that it has been in years. I also look for much teaching progress to be developed by the present faculty.

At the Junior High School, Miss Audrey Tripp and Mr. Harold Wood, natives of Westport, replaced Miss Doyle and Mr. Dolan. Miss Tripp is a graduate of State Teachers' College at Bridgewater and Mr. Wood is a graduate of Massachusetts State College. Mr. Everett Slocum of Fairhaven, a graduate of Colby College, Maine, was engaged as an additional teacher to cover the new high in enrollment—168 pupils. Miss Catherine O'Neil has continued to act as Principal since it became necessary for Mrs. Gladys Kirby, because of ill health, to retire from the profession.

Miss Catherine O'Neil in her report covering the Junior High School has this to say of the present faculty. "Miss Anna Sullivan, who was the only experienced teacher remaining with me, has continued her very fine work. Miss Audrey Tripp, and Messrs. Harold Wood and Everett Slocum were assigned to the Factory School in September. These three people, who started their first year of active teaching, have shown unusual ability and have made very capable assistants".

In the elementary grades, Miss Margaret Murphy and Miss Mary Partington resigned to be married. Miss Mary Allen resigned to accept a position in Westport, Mass. The Misses Marion Reed, Anna Tripp, and Ila Gifford, natives of Westport, have been elected to fill the vacancies caused by these resignations. Miss Marion Reed is a graduate of the three-year course at State Teachers' College at Framingham; Miss Ila Gifford is a graduate of The Wheelock School in Boston, having taken a three-year course in kindergarten and primary teaching. Miss Anna Tripp is a graduate of State Teachers' College at Bridgewater.

Our elementary teachers are too many and the allotted space in this report too limited to permit me to make individual mention of those who have been with

us before. As a group I commend them for their continued efforts and progress. Miss Marion Reed has been of real assistance, first at Greenwood Park and now at the Head School, where enrollment numbers really warrant four teachers. Now that Miss Orpen is at the South Westport School, she is making good use of her experience as assistant in the elementary grades at Greenwood. I consider that she is carrying on the tradition and high standards established by Miss Mason. Miss Ila Gifford and Miss Anna Tripp each have full responsibility for two grades and are accepting these challenges with much spirit. I feel confident of their success.

Last fall I looked forward with considerable trepidation to the results of the many necessary changes in our faculty and the re-assignment of several teachers. Thirty percent of our teaching force is new to Westport. Thus far I have found my fears unwarranted and honestly believe that we can hope for achievement at least on a par with previous years.

PUPIL HEALTH

Dr. Burt, our School Physician, in his report notes that, of 346 defects (pupil-physical) noted, only 13 were corrected. He does state, " the condition of the children seems to me to be tremendously improved over what it was years ago."

These are hard times and parents find it difficult to arrange for all the medical and physical care they wish for their children. I do believe that it is worth while to make all possible sacrifices in order that the frequent defects of the eyes, ears, nose, and throat may be removed at an early age. It is then that the expense is lightest and the results more far reaching in permanent values.

The T. A. T. treatments for the prevention of diphtheria are being continued and I commend their worth to all parents. The absence of this dreadful disease in our area has been noteworthy.

The need for a Dental Clinic is as great as ever and I congratulate those citizens whose interest in child welfare has made the continued support of this activity possible.

IN THE CLASS ROOMS

Our elementary program has undergone no major changes in its general plan. Effort is being made to encourage the creative interests of children and provide opportunities for more hand work, especially for the younger groups. I have noted some good examples this fall at the South Westport and Point Schools.

In grades 7 and 8 several curriculum changes were made at the opening of school last fall. Mrs. Kirby and I had for a long time desired to introduce elementary science and nature study and I feel that she will be pleased to know that these studies are now in the curriculum.

At the High School, Mr. Gifford has arranged an eight period program and staggered the physical education and activities period over the entire school day. This provides an additional class period—made necessary by increased enrollment—and relieves building congestion by having smaller groups of pupils in class rooms and study hall during any one period.

He reports that it may be advisable to require review mathematics in the Senior year. For some time we have been considering ways and means of assisting high school pupils to retain their earlier abilities in problem solving, provide for further improvement

if possible, and increase their speed in handling the fundamental operations of arithmetic. One rather common criticism made of high school pupils is their apparent inability to handle simple arithmetic as it pertains to the many occupations in which we find them following graduation. A required course such as Mr. Gifford mentions would include work in arithmetic such as I here indicate. I believe that a place for this course should be provided.

This year there are 56 pupils studying instrumental music under Mr. Brabant. Fifteen of these are studying for the third year. They pay for their instruction but meet the teacher at the schools. We consider this an integral part of education and worthy of all the aid and encouragement we can provide for it.

In addition to the regular graded studies in vocal music that are conducted by the class room teachers, grades 1-8, Mrs. Edlund is assisting Miss O'Neil with the Glee Club at the Factory. These youngsters are now rehearsing for an operetta, "Chonita". The elementary grades, for Music Week, will present a "Pageant of the Holidays". At the High School, Mrs. Edlund has two classes of girls in the study of harmony and a Girls' Glee Club of 40 members.

The big need, as I see it, is an opportunity for high school boys to continue the vocal music they enjoy so much at the Junior High.

SPECIAL MENTION

Our Agricultural Department has been very successful in its study of Dairy Cattle and Milk Judging. In dairy cattle judging (for school boys) Russell Davis placed first and Arthur Tripp third in the State of Massachusetts. These boys were members of the State

Milk Judging Team which won the Northeastern United States championship. At the Interscholastic Judging Contest at Amherst, November last, Howard Tripp was the highest scoring dairy cattle judge in the State.

I congratulate each of you, the group of boys who make up the department, and your instructor, Mr. Erickson.

CONCLUSION

The new year finds us just recovering from the numerous activities involved in our High School housing problem. We must now take time to evaluate the school situation which will result from our recent action. Recommendations for future development and progress must await more careful studies. In these I feel confident of your full co-operation and close my report with thanks for the guidance and assistance you have provided for me during the year just closed.
