# Works Progress Administration

Report of W.P.A. Projects Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1936

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## Beech Grove Cemetery, Dry Wall Project

Jan. 24 to March 14. Employing 6 men. Total Payroll \$490.58. Razed and rebuilt 565' of stone wall along Western Boundry (Main Rd.) Height 3'. Straightened, Tightened and Leveled as follows, (Height 3') Balance of Western wall (Main Rd.) 260'. Northern wall 200', and Southern wall 200' (Hix Bridge Rd.).

## Beech Grove Cemetery Project

Jan. 28 to May 26. Employing 15 to 55 men. Total Payroll \$6,782.96. Built 125' of dry stone wall, completed 414' of walks 4' wide. Cleared, graded and seeded 414' x 40' plots for burial lots, excavated 3' deep and filled in with gravel 746' x 20' of Avenues, Set 5 stone gate posts, hung one gate 10' long, erected one turnstile, removed accumulated rocks and stumps left from clearing two sections, cut wood along eastern boundry 664' long and 80' wide to prevent shading of lots.

## West Beach Road Project

March 18 to October 29. Employing 25 to 46 men. Total Payroll \$15,314.63. Built road bed through sand dunes from Plant's Pavilion to Midway by cutting off sand dunes and filling in hollows. Also spread 10" to 12" of gravel on top to hold sand and make road passable. Gravel delivered by Town trucks. Road bed 3,000' x 50' now open to traffic.



### **Veterans' Cemetery Project**

May 28 to June 30. Employing 5 men. Total Payroll \$337.72. Grubbed, graded, seeded and rolled 28,600 sq. ft. of surface in five cemeteries which contained interred War Veterans. Also painted gates and posts, cleaned and re-set several grave stones.

### **Chimney Project (Town Hall)**

June 4 to July 8. Employing one Mason and two laborers. Total Payroll \$431.18. Razed and rebuilt 2 chimneys at Town Hall, one North side and one South side of building, each 24' high and 2' x 18" wide. Included are flue linings in both chimneys. Repaired top of inside chimney on West side. Also painted same with Venetian Red.

### **Sign Painting Project**

Jan. 1 to June 22 and Sept. 4 to Dec. 9. Employing 1 to 3 men. Total Payroll \$890.56. Painted and Lettered 135 directional markers and warning signs 3' x 5½", and 52 signs 4' x 5½". Repainted and lettered approximately 40 old single signs and 34 panel signs, some having one to six directions to a sign. Painted and erected approximately 40 cedar posts and erected 149 new signs. Also erected approximately 15 old single signs that were repainted. Balance to be erected pending release of requisition for men.

### **Farm to Market Roads Project**

Jan. 1 to Dec. 31. Employing 15 to 25 men. Total Payroll \$12,554.98. Hired 4 Trucks and drivers most of the time. Total Payroll \$6,888.75. Widened and graveled Mouse Mill Rd., Briggs Rd., White Oak Run Rd., Old Pine Hill Rd. and Narrow Ave. Spread 7,192 Cu. Yds. of gravel. Project still in operation.

### **Gypsy Moth Project**

Jan. 1 to July 2 and Dec. 9 to 31. Employing 12 to 20 men. Total Payroll \$5,312.59. Cut out, burned and destroyed Tent Caterpillars. Painted Gypsy Moth egg clusters with creosote in approximately 950 acres of woodland. Sprayed along approximately 115 miles of roads in Town. Project still in operation.

### **Sewing Project**

Jan. 1 to Dec. 31. Employing 20 to 35 women. Total Payroll \$16,467.54. Garments made: 1,999 girls dresses, 102 girls panties, 1,155 girls slips, 24 girls bloomers, 72 girls waist and panties, 1,060 girls bloomer dresses, 15 girls pajamas, 58 girls nightgowns, 472 ladies slips, 5 ladies smocks, 1,353 ladies nightgowns, 4 infants jackets, 30 childrens play suits, 6 childrens sun suits, 31 boys shirts, 955 mens shirts, 2,777 birdseye diapers, 26 pillow slips, 282 sheets, 290 towels. Total No. of Garments: 10,852. Project still in operation.

### **Federal Housing Project**

## Report of the Trustees of the Free Public Library

---

The Trustees of the Free Public Library submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1936:

Library hours are the same as in previous years, Saturdays 3-5 and 7-9 excepting when a holiday occurs on Saturday in which case the Library is open the day before its regular day, viz. Friday 3-5 and 7-9.

This past year we have been working to raise our circulation and we have succeeded beyond our own hopes. Our circulation for this past year is 8,060; for the year 1935 it was 5,826, this represents a gain for this year of 2,198.

In November we held a Library Book night in the Community House at Central Village which was well attended in spite of the night, which was very wet and cool. As speakers we had Rev. Oliver Loring, Pastor of Grace Church, New Bedford. He gave a very interesting talk on "Libraries That He Had Seen and Used." Mr. Norman Gifford, Principal of the High

School, also gave a short talk. Miss Catherine Hall, Librarian of the Westport Point Library was also scheduled to talk but was prevented by an accident she received the morning of the Library Book Night.

We still maintain a Branch Library at Brownell's Corner with Mrs. Leslie Davis in charge. She reports that there has been an increase in the interest and circulation up there. After the opening of the addition to the High School some of the Junior High teachers availed themselves of the privilege of having a deposite of books sent up for reference and for recreational reading. These books may be kept for six weeks if they so desire and are then changed for new ones. We also sent books to the High School. This year we have put some books in the little school at South Westport; Anne Gifford in charge of them; and the children use them a great deal.

As in the past years the State has been very generous in lending us books which were specifically asked for, and in addition we have been receiving every three months an additional 25 books of non-fiction which we could keep for three months. This gave our patrons a chance to read many excellent books that would have been too expensive for us, on our limited appropriation, to buy. I am glad to say that these books were taken out a great deal. We were also very fortunate during the past year to have quite a number of gift books presented to us; also a number of persons gave the librarian small sums of money which they stated they wished to be used to buy books. This seems to indicate that people are interested and appreciate the fact that good books cost a great deal of money. I wonder how many persons realize that even a current fiction book when in its first printing costs about two dollars and a quarter.

We have the following magazines available for

our readers; some are subscribed for and some are donated:

National Geographic, Good Housekeeping, Cosmopolitan, Reader's Digest, Child Life, Dumb Animals, Young Crusader, Popular Mechanics.

The State Agricultural Schools send us various pamphlets from time to time on a great variety of topics which should be of great interest to this rural section. There are also catalogues and leaflets on other subjects of current interest.

We would like to draw attention to our Junior Literary Guild books which are for juvenile readers from five to ten years of age. These books are all "hand-selected" so to speak, and are extremely interesting. The pictures in them are really fascinating and intriguing.

The adult books which went out the most number of times the past year are:

Fiction—The Rolling Years by Turnbull; Will Rogers by O'Brien. Non-Fiction—North to the Orient by Anne Lindbergh; Arctic Adventure by Freuchen.

We wish to thank all our readers for helping us to complete a very successful year and hope that your interest will continue. We also hope that we will be given more funds that we may keep our shelves full of interesting books.

# CEMETERY REPORT

## BEECH GROVE CEMETERY

To the Board of Selectmen,  
Mr. John A. Smith, Chairman,  
Westport, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit a report of the W.P.A. work accomplished during the year 1936 and the number of cemetery lots sold.

There were 2 plots completed 150 x 40 feet each. Also 670 feet of stone and gravel drives and 415 feet of walk 4 feet wide were constructed at a cost of \$6800. of Federal funds in addition to \$590. of Town money spent for team and truck hire and equipment.

There are at present 40-6 grave lots, 64-4 grave lots, 2-12 grave lots and 34 single graves for sale and enough additional land developed for 100-6 grave lots and 112-4 grave lots which has not been charted. With the labor furnished by the Welfare Board a stone and gravel drive was made 245 feet long by 10 feet wide and a plot 150 x 40 feet was raised and graded by Welfare men.

There were 4-6 grave lots and 1-4 grave lot sold during the year.

In accordance with your instructions I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Westport for the period from April 10, 1934, the date of the previous audit, to February 1, 1936, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the Town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and verified by a comparison with the books of the Town Accountant and the Treasurer.

The books and accounts of the Town Accountant were examined and checked with the Treasurer's books and with the records of the several departments collecting money for the Town.

The appropriations and transfers as entered in the ledger were checked with the Town Clerk's record of appropriations and transfers voted by the Town. The necessary ledger adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the Town as of February 1, 1936.

The books and accounts of the Town Treasurer were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the departments collecting money for the Town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the Town Treasury.

In examining the accounts of the Treasurer it was found that the receipts for two tax titles redeemed in 1934 and 1935, amounting to \$22.03 and \$223.24, respectively, had not been entered on the cash book. It was also noted that during the period from April 9, 1934, the date of the previous audit, to February 1, 1936, the Treasurer had charged persons redeeming tax titles not only the amounts due the Town, plus the legal fees for releasing and recording deeds at the time of redemption, but also additional charges amounting to approximately \$246.00 for the collection of which there is no statutory authority. These additional



amounts collected, as well as the fees for releases, were retained by the Treasurer.

It was further found that fines received from district courts in 1933, 1934, and 1935, in the amounts of \$15, \$190, and \$30, respectively, were not entered on the Treasurer's cash book. Offsetting this discrepancy, in part, was a duplicate entry of a receipt of \$150 made in June, 1935, which has been credited to the Treasurer's account, while the tax titles redeemed and not accounted for, as well as the court fines, have been entered on his cash book as of February 1, 1936, the final reconciliation of the Treasurer's cash showing the sum of \$338.05 due the Town from him on the above date.

The payments by the Treasurer were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of Town funds. The bank balances were reconciled with statements furnished by the banks of deposit.

The payments of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due.

The savings bank books representing trust fund investments in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the withdrawals were checked with the receipts entered in the treasurer's cash book.

It was noted that payments to the treasurer for travel expenses in 1934 and 1935 were charged in various instances against the appropriations for selectmen and treasurer on vouchers that were not properly itemized.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all

subsequent commitments were reconciled with the assessors' warrants. The payments to the treasurer for the several levies were compared with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accounts as shown in the accountant's ledger.

Verification notices were mailed to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of tax titles taken by the town since the previous audit were checked with the deeds on file.

The town clerk's records of sporting, dog, and town licenses were examined, the payments to the State being verified with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The accounts of the public welfare, old age assistance, and school departments, as well as all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and reconciled with the treasurer's and the accountant's books.

The surety bonds furnished by the several officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet mentioned above, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and tax collector's cash, summaries of the tax, assessment, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the co-operation rendered by the several officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

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January 20, 1937.

To the School Committee of the Town of Westport:

Gentlemen:

In accordance with custom, I submit my ninth annual report, the forty-fourth in the series of annual reports submitted by the school superintendents of this Town.

## SCHOOL FINANCES

The total school appropriations, including the Dog Tax, were \$68,146.04. The amount expended for school purposes was \$68,079.96, leaving a balance of \$66.08. The total amount of all State reimbursements received by the Town Treasurer on account of school activities was \$7,959.96, making the net cost of all education, in terms of local taxes, \$60,120.00.

Smith-Hughes Funds (Federal Grants) to the amount of \$269.99 were received and expended directly for salaries in the Household Arts and Vocational Agricultural Departments of our High School.

### THE SCHOOL PLANT

Last year I stated that time must be taken to evaluate the school situation resulting from the solution accepted for meeting our high school housing requirements, and that recommendations for future development and progress must await more careful studies. As yet I am not prepared to propose any long range plan for your consideration.

### TRANSPORTATION

Six buses the size and style of the one now operated by Mr. Perry would care for our transportation for the next three years, I believe. This assumes no heavy influx of new families in Westport. Our school population in total numbers has remained fairly constant for several years.

Our buses, with the exception of Mr. Perry's, are now quite old and the bodies are neither adequate or in such condition as to make their further use advisable. I recommend that new buses on three year contracts be provided for the next school year.

It might help in determining the school budget at our March Town Meeting if bids (for August delivery) were called for at once. Orders thus early might also provide savings in cost both to the contractors and the Town.

I recommend that all bus contractors be required to have telephones in their homes.

## THE FACULTY

Mr. Paul F. Cieurzo, Jr., left the High School Faculty in the late summer to accept a position at Rhode Island State College. Mr. Harold Wood was transferred from the Factory School to the High School. He was replaced by Mr. Henry Plausse.

Mr. Gifford reports that Mr. Wood "has worked into our midst most acceptably. Mr. Wood is serious in his work, understands pupils well, and shows much promise. I think all will agree that the football team he coached this fall was in many ways the best we have ever had. I believe his relation with and influence on the boys of the squad were most commendable".

Mr. Plausse is a graduate of Boston College with a record of all-round athletic ability. He does not aim to be just a coach, however, and followed his college course with a year at the State Teachers' College at Bridgewater. His practice teaching record in Junior High School was a good one. Miss O'Neil, his principal, reports that he "has shown unusual ability".

In making the changes following our loss of Mr. Cieurzo, it was agreed to attempt to place the emphasis in teacher selection upon classroom ability and make athletic coaching a secondary requisite. We believe much good can result by assigning different teachers to the various varsity sports and giving practically every teacher an opportunity to meet pupils on the playgrounds. Not only is the danger of over-emphasis on athletics restricted in this manner, but pupils get a chance to realize that all of their teachers are human and can play as well as work—when it is the proper time to play. No teacher needs to feel that his position depends upon successful athletic teams.

I sincerely hope that this plan may be continued until its true value is unquestionably established.



Our group of teachers has continued to work earnestly and with much patience. Except at the High School, where our conditions are now much improved, much is lacking in teaching materials and facilities. It is my hope that something can be done to improve the tools of our teachers as well as their salaries.

All teachers from the Superintendent to the most recent appointee can give unstintingly of their time and effort, but this will be no guarantee that successful and progressive teaching will result. We all need the **urge** and the **opportunity** to improve ourselves in service. A portion of a summer vacation period devoted to professional study should benefit any teacher who has not contacted the training institutions during the past three years. The request or suggestion that some such action be taken should accompany any salary adjustments that it may be possible for you to make.

### THE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

There is appended to this report the usual statistics and departmental reports covering the actual educational work which we are attempting in the schools of Westport.

Dr. Edward Burt, our School Physician, has made a report in which he comments upon the statistical report of the School Nurse. You are advised to consider his comments before drawing any conclusions from these statistics. While the record of cases of impaired vision and hearing are relatively few, our study of past examinations is enlightening. It appears that many of these cases have been known for several years but nothing has been done to correct them. One of our objectives should be to push for corrections. We are now in a position, thanks to our local Red Cross Unit, to provide some financial assistance to those who

are definitely unable to purchase glasses. A scientific test of hearing—the audiometer test—is something we have never had. Such a test might detect other cases of impaired hearing than the twelve already discovered. Our crude form of a whispering test can only expose the worst cases. Actually we need to discover the impairment early, and arrange for prompt treatment. Otherwise the need for lip-reading classes is accentuated. At the present time, we have one or two pupils who very definitely need training in lip reading.

Our teachers continue to co-operate with our health authorities, in attempting to teach good health habits and a recognition of those factors essential to rural sanitation. Needless to say, much can be done to improve the community outlook in this field. Good examples of proper sanitation should be provided in our school plants—they would serve more effectively than books as teachers of sound health habits.

I recommend that the School Nurse be employed on a three day per school week basis, rather than two, and that the compensation be restored to the earlier depression level of \$7.50 per day including transportation. Mrs. Macomber enters whole-heartedly into her work and has the personality and tact that produces results with little or no friction.

In the fields of music, both vocal and instrumental, I feel that real progress is being made. Mrs. Edlund, supervisor of Vocal Music, averages twenty minute periods twice each month in each of the elementary rooms. The Junior and Senior High School groups average about twice as much time as do the elementary groups. This is necessary if the training is to be progressive. Operettas similar to "Chonita" and Glee Club Work call for more of a supervisor's time than does the teaching of elementary music. Then, too, our grade teachers are trained to teach elementary vocal music.

Both Mrs. Edlund and Mr. Brabant recommend the trial of toy symphony orchestras in our first grade rooms. I suggest that a beginning in this field be made at once—the expense is practically negligible.

I recommend that Mrs. Edlund's compensation be, as at present, the same as that voted the School Nurse.

Mr. Brabant, Instrumental Instructor of Music and Orchestra Director, reports a High School Orchestra of seventeen members—"all of whom show seriousness and sincerity in the study of music. The progress and ability of this unit has made it possible for us to present the interpretations of the finest grade of music—such as is generally played in other high schools".

As an introduction to instrumental music training, the Harloway System is still in use but is being supplemented for advanced pupils by private instruction provided by Mr. Brabant. Each pupil pays Mr. Brabant directly for his instruction and the growth in enrollment each year indicates that pupils and parents appreciate the opportunity provided. Mr. Brabant finds it necessary to spend an additional half day in Westport this year.

The contributions received at the last two "Music Hours" have been used to purchase a complete drummer's outfit, a clarinet, and a fairly good trumpet.

In my opinion the musical program as now set up is, with one exception, fairly comprehensive for our particular situation. Mr. Brabant states "There is no doubt in my mind about the meaning of this orchestra (meaning the High School orchestra) to the young student, in the instrumental classes. He looks forward to the day when he can become a member". The High School Orchestra (and may I add the "Community Orchestra") provide suitable outlets for the pleasant use of their previous training.

Our girls can use their earlier training in vocal music as members of the Junior and Senior High School Girls' Glee Clubs. At present, our boys have nothing beyond the Junior High School. Not all boys are athletes, or can they play in school orchestras. If they have shown interest in vocal music and some ability thru the eighth grade, it seems almost obligatory that we provide opportunity for them to continue to participate in such a harmless, healthy activity as Glee Club work while they remain in our school system. I recommend that Mr. Brabant be employed to direct a Boys' Glee Club at the High School and that this activity be started at once.

For many years Westport has had no art supervisor. Art has its place in the school and in life. Much of our teaching in the early grades is correlated with and motivated by so-called art work. At the high school end of the system an ability to do free hand sketching is an unusual asset. This ability, plus an understanding of color and its blending in good taste is of value to anyone and at any time in adult life.

No fundamental changes have been made in the curriculum of our primary grades. Each teacher is being urged to make the work as interesting as possible, to provide more and more opportunity for individual tastes and initiative; to permit and promote a "creative" type of hand work; and to continue to bear in mind that a real foundation in reading skills must be laid in these first three or four years of the pupil's school life.

In the middle elementary grades, we are attempting to continue the development of reading skills, develop formal arithmetic, and provide a background for an intelligent understanding of the world in which we live. We are experimenting to broaden the reading opportunities of our pupils in the fields of nature,



science, and society. By getting away from the single text book idea and providing reading material of a more interesting make-up with a vocabulary within the range of most of the class, we believe we are going to send along to our Junior High School a less mechanical and more vitalized group of children.

At the Factory Junior High School, no curriculum changes have been made or are contemplated. We are always seeking for better methods of presenting our work. I believe our program as now arranged is the best we can hope for with our present school plant and school budget. With proper laboratory facilities our present faculty could do a better piece of work than is now possible.

More handwork, especially for boys, is desirable in both our Junior and Senior High School organizations. As this would involve more space, new and rather expensive equipment, and additional teachers, it seems sufficient, at this time, that I simply indicate that I recognize this need.

Mr. Norman L. Gifford in his report as High School Principal emphasizes the building addition, what it has meant to the school thus far, and what he believes it will mean eventually.

He reports that the pupils are taking a real pride in and very good care of the new equipment. In this I am greatly interested, as I believe a real sense of civic pride and responsibility should be one of the major aims of any public high school program.

Facilities for study—with a study hall for 70 pupils—are much improved. This change should reflect throughout the entire academic program.

The re-organized Household Arts Room brings the entire program into one room. Miss Cahoon finds

this arrangement very advantageous. At present, there is need for a real refrigerator, a kitchen gas stove, and more cabinet and locker space in this department.

The Agricultural Class enrollment jumped from 14 to 25 this year.

Mr. Erickson in his report to Mr. Gifford states that "In competition with the whole State of Massachusetts, the Westport boys won the Interscholastic Milk Judging Contest, the Interscholastic Poultry Contest, and made a creditable showing in the Interscholastic Livestock Judging Contest". Making up these championship teams were Arthur Tripp, Ralph Pettey, Ernest Boulds, Manuel Azevedo, Howard Tripp and Alexander Tripp.

All Departments of the High School are better established than ever before. Mr. Gifford speaks in praise and appreciation of the work of every teacher. We have had during the years that are past many excellent teachers on our High School Faculty. Never, in my opinion, has Mr. Gifford had a more co-operative and satisfactory group of teachers than the one now serving our High School.

### CONCLUSION

The co-operation and pleasant associations that I have enjoyed with those who work under my direction, and you, my employers, have made an otherwise difficult year most enjoyable.

## Report of School Physician

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School Committee,  
Westport, Massachusetts.

Sirs:

The following is my report as School Physician for 1936.

The usual inspection of the school children was made and the results were very gratifying. The examination was unusually complete due to the fact that there were fewer absentees. There were fewer children requiring medical attention this year.

The large number of enlarged tonsils reported do not mean that there were so many requiring operation. In fact there were very few, but if they were at all enlarged a record was made of it. The large number of postural cases does not include many which need treatment but were noted for the purpose of the record. The T. A. T. treatments for the prevention are given in the spring and it is still possible to say that no child who has been so protected has, in this Town at least, developed diphtheria.

I have earlier called your attention to the condition of certain wells and toilets and I understand that these conditions are being remedied.

May I thank your Committee, the teachers and the school nurse for their cooperation.
