Works Progress Administration Report of W.P.A. Projects, Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1938

Widening Roads and Cutting Corners Project

Jan. 3rd to Mar. 4th. Employing 25 to 42 men. Total Payroll, \$3,479.07. Cut and burned brush and excavated 2' wide by 8" deep and filled with gravel, both sides of Pine Hill Road for a distance of approximately 1/4 of a mile. Later a project of practically the same type was approved and operated as will be seen further on in this report.

Beech Grove Cemetery Project

Mar. 7th to May 11th. Employing 33 men. Total Payroll, \$3,907.70. Removed rocks and stumps, grubbed, graded and seeded 650' x 80' or 5778 sq. yds. along eastern boundry. Equipment furnished by Cemetery Dept., 1—1½ ton truck 252 hrs. Equipment furnished by Highway Dept. 1—1½ ton truck 84 hrs. and 1 tractor 252 hrs.

Mosquito Control Project

April 11th to June 29th. Employing 16 to 33 men. Total Payroll, \$4,380.53. Cleaned out 30,325 ft. of old trenches 3' wide along both sides of State Highway. Cut brush for a distance of 7,315 ft. x 7' wide, and dug 10,650 ft. of new trenches 3' wide and 3' to 4' deep also along both sides of State Road.

Hurricane Emergency Project No. 17156

Sept. 22nd to Oct. 5th. Employing 98 to 135 men. Total Payroll, \$4,869.38. Men were engaged in cutting and trimming all trees in and along the highways and scouting over all debris looking for hurricane victims.

State Wide Restoration Project No. 19144

Oct. 6th to Nov. 30th. Employing 104 to 133 men. Total Payroll, \$12,168.01. Cleared all sand and debris from East and West Beach Roads at Horseneck, 20' wide by 1 to 3 ft. deep left by the hurricane. Also cleared Beach Avenue at Westport Harbor which was in the same condition.

Dec. 1st to 30th. Employing 29 to 103 men. Total Payroll, \$4,332.78. Rebuilt approximately 1,500 ft. of Atlantic Avenue. Removed all debris and filled in with gravel ready to tar in the spring. Also parts of Howland Road and Acoaxet Avenue at Westport Harbor. These roads were washed away and damaged by the hurricane. Project to resume operations in the spring.

Sidewalk Construction Project (Westport Harbor)

Aug. 18th to Sept. 21st and Nov. 10th to Dec. 30th. Employing 15 to 25 men. Total Payroll, \$3,273.14. Completed concrete sidewalks on Remington Avenue, 597 ft. Prospect St., 568 ft. and Atlantic Avenue from Acoaxet St. to Remington Ave., 570 ft.—all 3 ft. wide. Also put in gravel on Acoaxet St. from Town Ave., south, 405 ft., ready for cement when Project resumes operations in the spring.

Gypsy Moth Project

Jan. 21st to June 29th and Dec. 15th to 30th. Employing 16 to 39 men. Total Payroll, \$6,587.36. Cut out, burned and destroyed Tent Caterpillars. Painted Gypsy Moth Egg Clusters with Creosote in approximately 960 acres of woodland and sprayed along approximately 100 miles of roads throughout the Town. Project still in operation.

Reconstruction, Widening and Resurfacing Roads

May 7th to Sept. 21st and Dec. 22nd to Dec. 30th. Employing 35 to 100 men. Total Payroll, \$18,323.64,

Continuation of same work as reported in first of this report. Cut and burned brush along both sides of Pine Hill Rd. from Old County Rd. to present place of operations. Also grubbed and graded both sides of road back to stone walls and widened and filled with Gravel to an average width of 20 ft. There are 4 groups of men now working on this project which is to continue to Akin's Corner.

When completed this will be a 20' road from Old County Rd. to Akin's Corner. Approximately 7½ miles.

Sewing Project

Jan. 3rd to Dec. 30th. Employing 8 to 11 women. Total Payroll, \$6,962.87. Garments made: 66 bloomers, girls'. 359 dresses, girls'. 31 nightgowns, girls'. 833 nightgowns, women's. 174 pajamas, girls'. 48 slips, girls'. 802 slips, women's. 6 shirts, boys'. 2,561 shirts, men's. Total No. of Garments, 4,880. Project still in operation.

Federal Surplus Commodity Distribution Center

Jan. 1st to Dec. 31st. Employing 2 persons. Total Payroll, \$1,799.59.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1938:

Dr. E. W. Burt was chosen Chairman and Edward L. Macomber, Secretary.

Leslie J. Tripp was appointed Milk Inspector.

John C. Partington, John L. Duffany and Edward S. Francis were appointed Inspectors of Slaughtering.

Mrs. Sybil L. Mercer was engaged as Public Health Nurse and Miss Elizabeth A. Davis as substitute nurse.

Charles R. Wood was appointed as agent in charge of garbage and rubbish.

Dr. E. W. Burt was appointed as supervisor of the Public Health Nurse and Dental Clinic.

Sixty-seven burial permits were issued during the year.

The following diseases dangerous to the public health were reported:

Chicken Pox 4, Dog Bite 4, Lobar Pneumonia 3, Measles 3, Mumps 4, Scarlet Fever 2, Pulmonary Tuberculosis 1, Whooping Cough 6, Septic Sore Throat 1.

Attention is again called to the provision of the law which requires that all cases of diseases dangerous to the public health shall be reported to the Board of Health by the person in whose family the disease occurs where a doctor is not called. Failure to do this is punishable by a fine.

Report of the Public Health Nurse for 1938

The following is submitted as the report of the Public Health Nurse:

The past year has been an interesting and busy one in this department. A new method of keeping the records was adopted. This method is the standard method which has been adopted throughout the country and while it involved a considerable amount of work it made the information contained more easily available and enabled us to compare our records with those of other towns and cities more intelligently than before.

The Well Child Conference was well attended and much interest was displayed by the parents. Many unsuspected conditions were discovered and this enabled treatment to be applied before the child entered school. There is a demand from parents that this clinic be made a permanent affair.

Three children were sent to the summer camps. The number of children sent to this camp depends on the number of T. B. Christmas Seals which are sold in the Town. This year the sales were so small that we were able to send only three children. It is to be hoped that there will be a more generous purchase of Christmas Seals so that more tuberculous and undernourished children can be sent next year.

The dental clinic is now carried on in two sessions, one in the fall and the other in the spring.

It is discontinued during the winter months because all the children have to be transported and it was felt that it was wise to avoid transporting the children to and from the clinic during the cold weather.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance of Miss Christine Higgins of the State Department of Health who has rendered invaluable assistance in the institution of the new record system and whose frequent consultations with Dr. Burt and me have added to the efficiency of the nursing service.

In May I built a truck that is stationed at Greenwood Park, at a cost to the Town of \$450. I feel it would be worth \$2,000 if bought of a fire apparatus manufacturer.

It is equipped with a 200 gallon pump, booster tank with a capacity of 500 gallons, 400 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, 350 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose, 300 feet of booster hose, ladders, extinguishers, pump tanks for forest fire use.

The latter part of July we had to have a complete new set of Gears and Bearings for the Maxim pumper. These gears cost us \$282.09. This truck will have been in service eleven years in March 1939.

After the storm of September twenty first I moved the Maxim pumper from Central Village to South Westport. It is located at Macomber's Garage, for the protection of the property owners in that section until Hix Bridge has been built. This truck has been used on two alarms, that saved us the running time of about ten minutes on each call. I had to spend \$125 to keep the truck from freezing this winter. I think the tax payers will agree with me this was money well worth spent.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The Board of Public Welfare respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1938:

The Board organized for the current year on March 15, 1938, and re-elected Samuel A. Boan as Chairman, and Truman C. Emery as Certifying Officer for Federal Surplus Commodities. During the year, 187 cases received General Public Assistance, the case load has shown a gradual decrease since July, this undoubtedly has been due to increased W.P.A. employment, and better employment conditions in Private Industry during the latter part of the year. Expenditures were less than the previous year, largely due to cases being aided over shorter periods, and the Aid to Dependent Children cases being provided for under a separate appropriation, also the Federal Surplus Commodity expense was paid from the W.P.A. account.

Enrollments in the Civilian Conservation Corp were open quarterly during the year.

Report of the Trustees of the Free Public Library

The Trustees of the Westport Free Public Library submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1938.

The Library hours were voted to be the same as the previous year, Saturday 3-5 and 7-9. These were the hours until September when the hurricane swept out Hix Bridge. After this disaster the hours were changed to 3-7 to facilitate the duties of the Librarian. This change of hours pleased most of our patrons although it did inconvenience a few. In case a holiday falls on a Library day, a notice of when the Library will be open is posted in the Library three weeks previous to the change.

This year we have kept a separate list of the adult and juvenile circulations believing that these would be quite interesting to those reading this report. The adult circulation was 4458; the juvenile, 1517; the circulation of our school deposits was 954 and that of non-fiction books and magazines totaled 561, giving us a total circulation of 8490 which shows an increased circulation of 1674 over last year.

We are including here, for the benefit of those interested, a short statement of how the Library appropriation of \$400 was spent:

With the last written amount the buying committee purchased about 275 books, of which a little less than half were juveniles and replacements of old favorites that were completely worn out.

We have at the present time four school deposits. These school deposits contain from 20 to 50 books each. and may be kept from 6 to 10 weeks. They are made up from books on the State list of prescribed books. books to be used as references for current studies, and books of light fiction. They are managed by a teacher at the schools where they are, and a list of all pupils using the books is kept. These deposits are located at the following schools: High School under Miss Doyle; Booth's corner under Mrs. Macomber: Head School under Miss O'Donnell and Miss Newman; and the Factory School under Miss Audrey Tripp. At the time this is being written we are getting another deposit ready for the North Westport School. We believe that the children do appreciate the privilege of having these books and it gives more children the opportunity of using their Town Library no matter where they live. We would indeed be sorry to have to stop giving this school service because of decreased appropriation and we are hoping that in view of our greater book service. we may be given a larger appropriation in the coming vear.

Due to the hurricane, which did so much serious damage to our town, we suffered some loss. About 25 books were destroyed but we are glad to state that various patrons have helped us to replace those books. Mr. James Kay of Fall River gave us ten books and we take this opportunity to extend to him our sincere thanks; and also our thanks to those others who each donated one or two books. We also take this opportunity to extend our thanks to those young people who have given cheerfully of their services in fixing books and typing book cards.

As in past years we have been privileged to receive many non-fiction books every three months from the State Library, but we are sorry to say that their selection has not proved as interesting to our patrons as in past years. We hope that the books which are sent to us this coming year will be more interesting. Many people have availed themselves of the privilege extended in securing special books from the State or nearby Libraries.

It may be of interest to our readers to know that our small Library has been complimented many times by Summer and Out-of-Town people for its service and its large collection of current popular fiction and nonfiction books. We try to keep up-to-date by following the reading list that is published weekly by the Tribune Book Review of New York. This list tells what books are most popular the country over.

The following magazines are available for our patrons at the Library. Some are subscribed to by the Library and some are donated.

There are also various pamphlets and leaflets from the State College and the Department of Agriculture in Washington; catalogues of different colleges, summer courses, night courses and plays.

We wish to thank all our many patrons who have helped make this past year a good one, and wish them many more hours of enjoyable reading. We hope to be able to greet them in our new Library before many months.



Report of the Superintendent of Schools

January 24, 1939.

To the School Committee of the Town of Westport: Gentlemen:

In accordance with custom I submit my eleventh annual report, the forty-sixth in the series of annual reports submitted by the school superintendents of this town.

In determining a budget to submit for your consideration I have been governed by two premises. First, I consider it unreasonable, in view of the loss of taxable property resulting from the hurricane, to advocate any changes or educational improvements that involve an increase in the total budget. Second, I conceive it the function of the Finance Committee (they presumably have the entire picture available)

to determine if cuts in the School Department budget due to our present financial condition are necessary.

The following budget is presented as the amounts necessary to maintain School Department activities as now established.

Out-of-Town Vocational Schools Estimate is based on the continued attendance of five day pupils at \$800, and allows \$100 for evening school pupils. During 1938, \$109.50 was required to cover the cost of evening school attendance. These expenditures are required by law.

The General Court in 1938 made it mandatory to provide Adult Alien Education when 20 or more eligible residents request a class. We have over 40 residents now enrolled.

A \$200 increase in Agriculture is needed to cover the additional transportation costs of an increased enrollment. If not covered in Agriculture it will of necessity be added to General Education.

Following the policy set forth in the report of 1937, some measures have been taken to improve conditions at the smaller buildings. Deep wells were driven at the Brownell's Corner and Booth's Corner buildings and electric lights were installed at Beulah.

More artificial lighting is desirable on dark days. Of 782 pupils examined this fall only 45 were referred for eye examinations and possible treatment. 153 pupils, however, had less than perfect vision scores.

Recalling the splendid efforts obtained at Greenwood Park I suggest that an effort be made to write W. P. A. Projects for the excavation and construction of basements at the Brownell's Corner and Booth's Corner Schools.

Considerable outside painting, the rebuilding of the front steps at North Westport, and the shingling of the roofs at the Booth's and Brownell's Corner buildings should be seriously considered as projects for the next summer vacation.

Schools opened last September with the same transportation routes as were explained in the 1937 report. After eleven school days the Hurricane carried out Hix Bridge and made it necessary to change transportation—three of the six buses crossed this bridge as a part of their regular runs. Pupils in Grade 1 - 4 living in the South Westport area were transferred from the Point to the Head. Buses for Booth's Corner and the High School now travel from Horseneck via the Head. I appreciate the fine spirit of co-operation with which these changes were received by pupils and parents involved. An additional teacher at the Head seemed necessary and the final adjustment between teaching and transportation costs shows a net increase of \$3.30 per school day.

Miss Anna Tripp and Miss Marion Reed resigned at the end of the school year in June. They have been replaced by Miss Moira Kispert and Miss Margaret Deane, graduates of State Teachers College at Bridgewater, class of 1938. No other faculty changes have occurred. Through the use of Federal Funds made available by the State Department of Education, Mr. Harold Wood, of the High School Faculty, is now giving half-time to the Vocational Agricultural Department. More than thirty boys are now enrolled and Mr. Wood handles the freshman group.

Now that changes in our faculty are infrequent, new ideas and improved methods must be inspired from within. To assist our teachers in making professional improvement that will reflect in our curriculum I recommend that at least \$200 be made available from the General School Fund—this fund to be used in making visitation, demonstration, investigation and teacher study groups possible.

This year we are emphasizing the improvement of reading, English, and handwriting. I refer you to the reports of the Junior and Senior High School Principals for an understanding of their share in this work. New handwriting material, including individual instruction and copy books, was introduced in Grades 1-6 at the opening of this school year. The new reading system was extended to cover the second grade. Individual text books in language (English) have been purchased and will be introduced in Grade 3 at the half-year mark. During the next few months we of the faculty hope to discuss our experiences with the new material and to re-evaluate our old materials and methods so far as they pertain to reading, writing, and arithmetic.

A study of the High School Principal's report will show that the facilities of both the Commercial and Household Arts Departments are not used by numbers sufficient to make for economy. Probably no more pupils should take a straight commercial course but opportunities for typewriting, handwriting, and functional arithmetic might be provided if and when teacher schedules permit. More girls regardless of their future plans could and should take part or all of the Household Arts offerings. I deem it our business to make the opportunities of this department better known both to pupils and parents.

Those of us who have had the opportunity and responsibility of working with first grade pupils have

long known that a definite chronological age was no index of reading readiness or ability. Some children who are able to meet the entrance age requirement of six years prior to January 1st of the school year in question are not ready to learn to read and would be far better placed at home (kindergarten training is not available). Conversely some children who cannot meet the entrance age requirements are ready to read and could profit by being permitted to enter the first grade.

In October all members of the first grade were examined by that State Clinic which is headed by Dr. Steinecke and we were advised as to their mental ages and the probability of their doing first grade work. First grade teachers have now had these pupils a half year. Where their opinion and the Clinic opinion agrees that a child is not ready to do the work of the first grade, it would seem to be a waste of energy for him to remain in school the balance of the year. If seven years of age, of course his attendance is compulsory.

For your consideration I suggest a plan whereby a younger group of pupils can be tentatively admitted to the 1st grade in September, with the understanding that those pupils who after 8 weeks of trial are found by both teachers and clinic to be not ready for first grade work, must withdraw until the next year. Children unable to do the work of the first grade lose interest in school life and frequently become the problem children of the later grades. If withdrawn until ready for the grade their entire attitude toward school life may change for the better.

If no change in the plan of admission is to be attempted, the following alternative is recommended. As soon as possible after the year opens, those who show that they cannot do first grade work should be placed on a curriculum definitely planned on a pre-

primary basis. Of course we attempt this in theory at the present time. Teachers are more likely to match practice with theory, however, if parents are notified of the placement as made, and such pupils are not to be recorded as failing and therefore repeating a grade of work which they have never attempted.

Adult Alien Classes, Instrumental and Vocal Music, health work as practiced by teachers, nurse, and school physician, have all continued to hold their own and much progress can be noted. The Red Cross and Board of Public Welfare continue to co-operate and aid us along lines explained in previous annual reports.

The local libraries are helpful in providing our schools with supplementary reading material. Those principals, teachers, and all librarians who assist in making these books available are to be complimented.

Dr. Burt, as School Physician, has voluntarily and without pay vaccinated pre-school children. In his annual report he offers to do diphtheria prophylaxis. I still consider this to be a legitimate function of the Board of Health which should be available to pre-school children at an early age. As such service is not available, it is to be hoped that the School Committee will permit Dr. Burt to proceed and that all school children not previously immunized will take advantage of this offer.

Due to co-operation received on every hand I have been very happy in my school work during this past year. No small part of this happiness I owe to you, the School Committee.

Report of School Physician

January 12, 1938.

School Committee, Town of Westport, Central Village, Mass.

Gentlemen:

The following is the report of the School Physician for 1938.

The annual examination of the school children was made and only a small proportion of defects noticed. These defects were called to the attention of the parents for reference to the family physician. The examination of the school buildings was made and the physical condition was considered satisfactory. The usual number of examinations for school cards was made and it is to be regretted that economic conditions forced so many children to leave school and thus miss the benefits of further education. In the spring I intend to offer to the school children an opportunity to receive diphtheria prophylaxis. This procedure is so simple and painless that it is hoped that all those who have not received it will avail themselves of the opportunity. This disease is so terrible and its prevention so simple and harmless that its application is being used in every city or town in Massachusetts with the result that there has been a tremendous decrease of diptheria cases.
