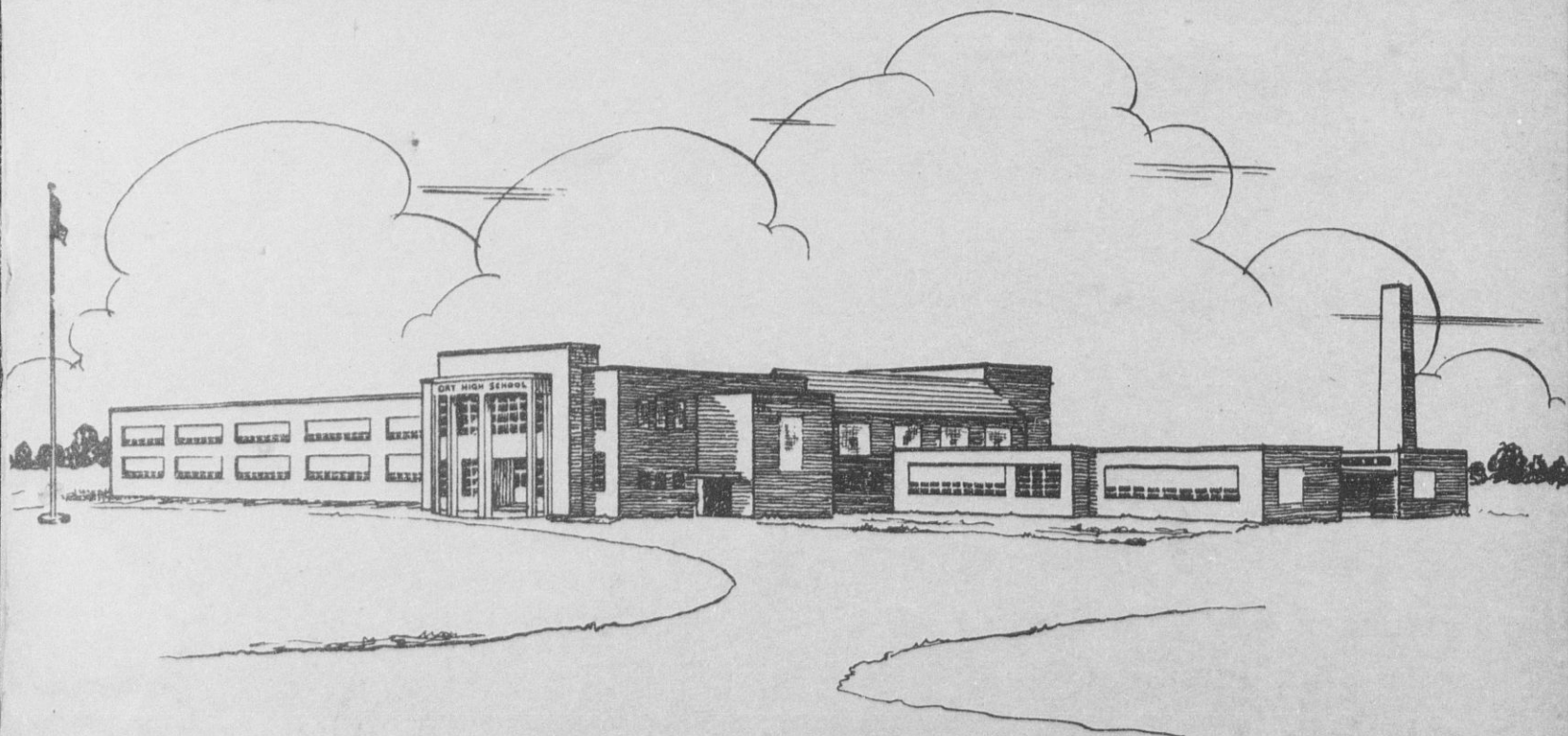

ENGINEER'S REPORT ON LANDINGS AND RIGHT OF WAYS

To Board of Selectmen,
Mr. Philip Manchester, Chairman,
Westport, Mass.
Gentlemen:

The following is a brief report of progress on the work authorized to "survey Town Landings and Rights of Ways to the River and to the Ocean."

Field work was started using data which was readily available and considerable surveying done at the East Beach particularly at the Gooseberry Neck Bar end as well as at the Horseneck Road end. The above is incomplete as the location of the four parcels comprising Landings in this area are dependent on the original Highway bounds marking the northerly line of East Beach Road and will have to be reproduced. The Road line from the John Reed Road westerly to Gooseberry Neck Bar has been accurately reproduced and one monument was found to be several feet from its original location and will be reset. Further search for records has been necessary and the data is compiled and platted as it is obtained.

At the Westport Point Landing three monuments, two Town and one private, have been found, from which the east line can be run but further information is needed at this location.

In looking up the information for the above it has seemed wise and probably more economical to gather data for all of the work rather than to concentrate on one location at a time.

This has been done mostly, to date, by examination of deeds, plans and records in the Registry of Deeds at New

Bedford. Much information has been there and has been platted for study as far as the descriptions will permit.

Here might be said that nearly sixty years accumulation of data by this office and its predecessor has been available.

Further search will be made through the Town Meetings records and such other records as may be in the Town offices.

It must be realized that many of these Landings and Ways are very ancient and the descriptions are now vague as to certain markers and starting points and together with changes that may have taken place many of the points have been lost. Therefor in many cases records of adjacent lands must be taken into consideration so far as their records are definite.

Regarding Ways to the River and Ocean preliminary work has been done to locate Bounds marking the lines or discovering such markers from which the Road lines can be determined. Of four, so far known, Ways to the water at Westport Harbor two can now be run out one has been completed and one can now be worked out from private data.

One at Cadman's Neck is definitely known and is marked out by stone bounds.

Some Ways have been layed out and accepted in the past on which no permanent bounds have been set marking them and will therefor have to be reproduced with such data as can be found. This is particularly so on layouts running to the River and Ocean.

Much more detail could be presented here but would be rather lengthy, I feel, however, that you are quite familiar with this work, the accumulated data and plan work, as the same has been presented and explained, at your request, on many occasions.

I have also consulted with Mr. R. K. Hawes, your Attorney, on several occasions regarding some legal questions and on which he advised.

To date there has been expended \$617.61 leaving an unexpended balance of \$1,382.39.

A blood typing program was held in November in connection with Civilian Defense. 1169 people were typed in Westport with the assistance of the Department of Public Health and many local citizens.

Dr. Lepreau, Medical Advisor, has been consulted by the Board and the Board of Health Nurse as necessary.

As a result of a survey made by the State Department of Public Health, regarding pollution of the Westport river and harbor, the local Board of Health has been notified that there are over 25 violators of the law as to raw or partial raw sewage being allowed to run into the tide waters; that this situation must be remedied and if not done, the result will be the closing of the above waters to the taking of any and all shellfish. All violators known as of this date, have been notified by this Board and it is hoped to have this condition cleaned up by June 1, 1953. This date was agreed to by the State Department of Public Health. We, of the Board, are hoping that we may have cooperation of all persons interested in this matter in order that this town will not have its many fishermen deprived of their livelihood during the fall and winter period; also the more than nine hundred family permits for the taking of shellfish.

During the year, this Board has adopted a by-law requiring a permit to be obtained from this Board before a building permit can be issued. This was done to curb the question of sewage from one householder to pollute the property or drinking water of another householder. Sewage regulations were made and all permits for new buildings are given one with their permit. Anyone wishing one of these sewage regulations has only to ask for it.

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Westport for the period from June 9, 1951, the date of the previous examination, to November 30, 1952, and report thereon as follows:

The records of financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and verified by comparison with the reports and the records of the town accountant.

The books and accounts in the office of the town accountant were examined, checked, and compared with the records of the several departments of the town and with the town treasurer's books. The receipts, as recorded, were compared with the town treasurer's record of receipts and checked with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer, while the recorded payments were checked with the treasurer's record of disbursements and with the treasury warrants.

The ledger accounts were analyzed, the appropriations and transfers being checked with the town clerk's records of town meetings and with the records of the finance committee, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on November 30, 1952.

It is again recommended that action be taken to secure settlement of the delinquent tax and motor vehicle and trailer excise accounts of prior years, which on the audit date extend as far back as 1942.

The books and records of the treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and checked with the town accountant's books, with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer, and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the disbursements were checked with the treasury warrants.

The cash balance on November 30, 1952 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer were listed, the income was proved, and the transfers to the town were verified.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts transferred to the tax title account were compared with the collector's books, the amounts received from the redemption of tax titles and the sale of tax possessions were checked to the treasurer's recorded receipts, the foreclosures were verified, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, reconciled with the accountant's ledger, and compared with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The public landing accounts in the custody of the town treasurer, as treasurer of the Town Landing Commission, were examined and checked in detail. The receipts from leases of the several properties were examined and compared with the treasurer's cash book, the cash book was footed, and the cash balance on November 30, 1952 was verified by examination of the savings bank book.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The tax and excise accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination and all subsequent commitments were audited and proved to the warrants issued for their collection. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer and with the town accountant's books, the abatements as recorded were compared with the assessor's records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger.

The commitments of departmental accounts receivable were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer and with the town accountant's books, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

Verification of the outstanding tax, excise, and departmental accounts was obtained by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, the town clerk, the building inspector, and the health department were examined and checked, and the payments to the State and to the town were verified.

The surety bonds of the several town officials required by law to furnish them for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of the sealer of weights and measures, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked in detail.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing reconciliations of the treasurer's and the collector's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and public landing accounts, together with tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit cooperation was received from the officials of the town, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

First, it should be recorded that Mr. Earle, after 24 years of successful school administration, retired as superintendent August 1, 1952. He has been succeeded by the undersigned. During Mr. Earle's term of office, many improvements took place in personnel, transportation and housing, the most noteworthy being the construction of the new high school. Mr. Earle's close association with this enterprise no doubt accounts in many ways for the excellence of the building. It is also my desire at this time to acknowledge the frequent help, advice, and guidance which Mr. Earle has given me during the twenty-five years in which I have been associated with him in educational work.

In his report last year, Mr. Earle discussed rather fully the need for school housing in its various phases. Conditions today make this situation of still more immediate interest. Further considerations are therefore presented below.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENTS

The size of an organization is often determined by one important factor; in schools it is the pupil enrollment. As

in neighboring towns, Westport seems to face an ever increasing school population. Nor is it easy to foretell accurately the rate of increase. Modern houses rise rapidly and families move in without delay. While this movement has been going on for years, it has now become greatly accelerated.

The following table shows enrollment increases from 1948 through 1952.

The increase for the fall of 1953, according to past prediction methods, could be estimated at not over 100. Under present conditions it seems entirely possible this estimate of 100 pupils may be too low. However, by opening the Point School we shall probably avoid double platoons this coming academic year (September 1953 to June 1954). For school housing needs in the years to follow it would seem appropriate to start at once upon a careful survey. For such a study it is suggested that a special committee be formed to assist the School Committee.

The Town, through its foresight, has already taken the first step by securing land for building while it is still available. The Strachman property on the Gifford Road seems suitable from the standpoint of size, location, and drainage. With the land question settled, it should be possible to conduct a thorough survey of school needs and profit from the savings that come from careful planning.

From the foregoing it is no doubt obvious that we have been required to enlarge our teaching staff. Although

three more teachers were added in September, 1952, several classes are still overloaded.

The teachers have met this overload with all the skill one could possibly expect. However, the pupils are frequently unable to receive the attention and help due them because the teachers' efforts are necessarily distributed among too large a group. Twenty-five is considered by many as proper class size; thirty is rather large and thirty-five is generally considered too large. In the future it would be desirable, as funds permit, to add new teachers so that we can eventually reduce all class enrollments to thirty.

PERSONNEL CHANGES

Several additions and replacements have occurred in our ranks.

Mr. Sydney G. Pierce, who had been supervising in several of the elementary schools, was named Assistant Superintendent, with one-half his time to be devoted to teaching at the High School. Numerous administrative duties are assigned to Mr. Pierce from time to time, but especially the supervision of all bus transportation and of the milk and free food commodities program in the elementary schools. In the absence of the superintendent, Mr. Pierce acts in his stead.

Mrs. Edna K. Leuvelink, who has just completed a most successful 5-year assignment at Shady Hill School, Cambridge, Massachusetts, has come to Westport as our first Supervisor of Art. Mrs. Leuvelink's sympathetic understanding of pupils and her enthusiasm for her work have already established art as one of the most interesting subjects in our schools.

Mrs. Natalie Hemingway of New Bedford succeeded Mrs. Dorothy Wordell, now music supervisor for the dis-

trict of South Kingstown, Rhode Island. Mrs. Hemingway is a graduate of Fairhaven High School and of Boston University School of Music, and comes to Westport with an excellent record of attainment. Her work shows much promise; her interest in the pupils and in her music is constantly making her more friends and supporters.

In the High School Mr. Thomas McGarr, previously Agricultural Instructor at Templeton, Massachusetts, followed Mr. James G. Shaw as Agricultural Instructor here. Mr. McGarr is a practical farm man as well as a successful instructor; his help is highly valued by both our school boys and our adult farmers.

Mr. Edmie Bibeau, Jr. of Westport and a graduate of Providence College also joined the High School Faculty in September. His interest and energy have been well applied; his knowledge of sports is also proving a real help to Mr. Cariglia in his coaching work.

The appointment of a full time Domestic Science teacher for the 7th and 8th grades is a distinct contribution to the Junior High division. Miss Barbara Lees of Westport and a graduate of Framingham State Teachers College was appointed for this work and she is fulfilling her duties most acceptably.

Until June, Mrs. Grace E. Jeffrey conducted these classes in addition to her assignment as Cafeteria Manager. However, the pupil patronage of the cafeteria has increased to such an extent as to claim all of her time. Mrs. Jeffrey has managed this enterprise so skillfully that it shows a profit even after paying the wages of two adult workers. This is unusual for a school cafeteria.

Mrs. Hilda Perry, also of Westport, joined the teaching staff as an instructor in Grade 1, Milton E. Earle School. Mrs. Perry had taught on a previous occasion in Westport and is now continuing the same excellent work.

ART

Since the appointment this year of Mrs. Leuvelink as Art Supervisor, classes are being held in all schools. The pupils like this new work, and it is believed the townspeople will be interested to know its nature and scope. To show this, excerpts from Mrs. Leuvelink's report are presented below.

"My first aim, as an art teacher, has been to create an atmosphere in the classroom which will stimulate creative thinking and doing among all the children. This has been easy to fulfill because teachers and children are interested, cooperative and anxious to make full use of the art period.

The three aspects of art teaching are:

Self expression
Observation
Appreciation

These three aspects are closely related to and dependent upon each other. Most class problems include these three aspects". . . .

"Problems for the first, second and third grades have included Design and Composition as follows:

Art Folders
Classroom borders — September, October, November,
and December
Modes of transportation
Cut paper masks
Black and white cut paper designs for calendars
Pencil and Crayon Drawings and Compositions
Family Portrait
Trees and leaves
Monthly calendars
Fairy flowers
Figure sketching

Painting with Poster Colors

Discussion of primary colors, how to make secondary colors, how to lighten and darken colors and painting with limited colors.

The fourth, fifth and sixth grades show much more interest in perfecting technical skills, a greater awareness of the world in which they live, and a tendency to work very realistically. More emphasis is placed on drawing, careful observations and techniques. Children in this group need particular encouragement to be imaginative and spontaneous.

Problems include Design and Composition in the following activities:

- Lettering and Poster work with cut paper, crayon, paint and india ink.

- Mural decorations for Thanksgiving and Christmas

- Border designs for each month in the classroom

- Abstract design using shapes with emphasis on color and texture.

- Drawing and Composition

 - Outdoor sketching, figure drawing, self-portraits and still life.

- Three dimensional work with paper mache.

 - Masks and pig banks

- Painting

 - Classroom borders, compositions, masks and pig banks.

The seventh grade and elective High School groups have had a wide variety of problems using many materials in order to acquaint them with some of the possible media available and with the hope that every individual may find success in at least one.

Problems in Design and Composition:

Lettering with cut paper, poster color, speedball pens and india ink, art and mathematics folders, linoleum block cut and printed Christmas cards, round plates.

Drawing and Composition

Outdoor sketching, figure and portrait sketching from life, drawing large mural for Christmas program, illustrating stories and poetry."

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Both Mr. Cariglia and Miss Smith are now assigned to full time work in this field. Mr. Cariglia in addition to his coaching duties conducts all the boys' physical education classes at the High School and in 5th and 6th grades in the elementary schools.

Miss Smith handles girls' classes in all grades and the boys in the first four grades. This plan regarding the younger boys follows accepted procedure. Pupils are given a series of progressive games, sports, and exercises arranged in order of difficulty from the first grade up. Supervisors meet the classes weekly or bi-weekly as schedules permit, with regular teachers carrying on in accordance with supervisors' assignments between their visits.

It is believed the benefits of this work will be recognized more and more as time goes on. Eventually it may be considered as important as some of the book work that now enjoys a daily schedule. In California a regular class in physical education is held each day for all pupils; this may help to explain the almost universal enthusiasm California children have for their school. Nor is it difficult to understand why, after twelve years of daily systematic training in sports and games, Californians are well developed physically and usually enjoy sound health.

HIGH SCHOOL

There are other sources of pupil enthusiasm, however, and here in Westport the construction of the new High School is an excellent contribution in this respect; in fact, the new building seems to be a real inspiration to the students. Under the able leadership of Mr. Wood and his capable faculty the advantages of the building have been fully and skilfully utilized.

First, the regular studies are given full priority; for many years Westport High School has enjoyed an "A" rating from the Massachusetts Department of Education. Pupils are eligible to enter college if they can pass the entrance requirements. The necessary studies are offered here to meet these requirements. The Agricultural and Household Arts classes are both entirely useful. The Industrial Arts program fills a long recognized need. The student participation in the many extra-curricular fields has been well guided and has achieved the good citizenship results sought that are so desirable.

It has been my privilege to visit most of the high schools in Massachusetts and many elsewhere, while they were in operation, and it is my measured opinion that the townspeople of Westport are justified in feeling their high school compares very favorably with the others.

Space does not permit the printing of all Principals' and Supervisors' reports. However, certain excerpts from Mr. Wood's report are submitted below.

"Our Agricultural Program has undergone several changes. Our in-school groups are scheduled for the first five periods. During this time Mr. McGarr meets the twelve boys enrolled in Vocational Agriculture. He teaches the project work, survey work and also the agricultural shop. In addition to his school-time duties, we have organized an adult group. At the present time, there are fourteen

young farmers who have signed up for this course. We plan a minimum of twenty-four hours for individual instruction on the farm, and at least ten hours of group instruction at the school. Several group meetings have been held, which I believe have been beneficial to the farmers who have attended. Starting in January, Mr. McGarr has planned shop work for his out-of-school group. The Department of Education has furnished us with an acetylene torch and an arc welder. These should enable us to offer a better shop program."

"The fine facilities that we have to teach Household Arts have encouraged more girls to take this course. In addition to the thirty-eight enrolled in our state-aided program, many of the girls taking the College and Civic courses are receiving some homemaking training. I think that the value of this work is self-evident."

"Our Industrial Arts Course, under the able guidance of Mr. Medeiros and Mr. Sisson, has proved very popular with the non-college students. Many worthwhile projects in woodwork, metalwork and automotive work have been completed. In connection with the Industrial Arts work, we are now able to offer Mechanical Drawing. This is essential for boys who intend to enter industrial schools of various kinds. For boys who intend to enter engineering schools, and who are taking the College Course, we have arranged classes in Mechanical Drawing. Several boys, who were graduated during the past few years, have found that the lack of this course was detrimental. We believe that we have remedied this condition."

"The Student Council has been very helpful in assisting me to organize and supervise a well-rounded school program. The success of our annual magazine campaign is a tribute to their hard work and enthusiasm."

"Our guidance program, while still far from being satisfactory, has shown a definite improvement. All seniors

took the employment security tests, and these indicated certain individual aptitudes and abilities. More testing should be done in order to better assign pupils to courses for which they are best fitted. Your guidance, Mr. Gifford, is deeply appreciated, and I feel sure that under your direction we shall go forward in this department."

AUDIO-VISUAL EDUCATION

Miss Audrey L. Tripp is both supervising principal at the Milton E. Earle School and supervisor of audio-visual work. Miss Tripp's long and successful experience as elementary supervisor qualifies her eminently to select the films and other aids that are most important. Miss Tripp has accomplished much in assembling suitable equipment for this work.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

Miss Audrey Tripp's duties as supervising principal, along with extra class work, are a full assignment and have been performed with the finish we have come to expect from her.

As the Milton E. Earle School is the only elementary unit with a supervising principal, it will perhaps be appropriate to offer a few glimpses of this school. Excerpts from Miss Tripp's report are therefore presented below.

"Supervision in art and physical education was added to the curriculum in September. We have long recommended such supervision and welcome it."

"Our school enrollment is now 250 pupils — more pupils than we can accommodate for optimum educational results in some cases. (Forty four pupils are enrolled in grade 6)."

"We appreciate the physical improvements which have been made in the building so far. We hope that funds

may be made available to improve the inadequate heating system. . . ."

"Playground space is inadequate to accommodate our pupils, and it is now necessary to operate on two shifts at recess time. We recommend that future planning include provision for the extension of the play area for our children."

"I feel that we are indeed fortunate in having at the Milton E. Earle School a group of teachers who are especially interested in the welfare of the children whom they teach and who work conscientiously for them. Their cheerfulness, promptness, enthusiasm, dependability and cooperativeness are indications of the part they play in trying to develop a good school spirit."

It is fair to state that the excellent team-work of the Faculty and the many extra activities of the pupils which are just as valuable as if they came from books — perhaps more — are due in considerable measure to the skilful efforts of Miss Tripp. This is one of the advantages a supervising principal who is not totally encumbered with classroom assignments can bring to a school.

Some extra activities are being carried on by other elementary principals but they cannot be expected to conduct such extensive extra programs as they have full-time teaching loads. Miss Hazel Tripp, Miss Irene Boodry, Miss Kathryn Dailey, and Mrs. Hattie Norton are all fulfilling their assignments efficiently.

Our elementary teachers are entitled to great credit for their tireless efforts. Only those who have performed classroom work know what it entails. It is hoped the load of those most heavily burdened may be lightened somewhat. A more even distribution of enrollments among classes must be attempted. Equally important is the grouping into single classes those with about the same learning

ability, insofar as transportation permits. A necessary testing program is already underway to help in this undertaking.

PUPIL TRANSPORTATION

This rather complicated problem was assigned to Mr. Pierce and I feel that he has made commendable progress. As the bus schedule was tried out in September it was found that there was a span of 30 to 40 minutes between the arrival of the first and last busses at some of the schools. Mr. Pierce gave many hours to this study and has remedied much of this waiting.

Another project Mr. Pierce successfully completed, in collaboration with Mr. Wood, was that of late transportation for high school students. It has always been a problem for students who were staying after the regular session to get home. Sports practice, play and music rehearsals, and making up of studies due to absences or other causes have been seriously curtailed in the past for lack of transportation. Through arrangements between Mr. Pierce and the bus drivers, late trips from the high school are available to pupils on certain afternoons. This was arranged within the regular contract cost of transportation.

GUIDANCE

Mr. Wood, in his report, refers to progress in guidance at the high school. As indicated by him, the senior class is receiving, it is believed, adequate attention. It is my expectation, in view of Mr. Wood's invitation, to assist in the establishment of a guidance system that will extend from the twelfth grade down through the seventh. This should result in a more ready adjustment of the seventh grade pupils to Junior High School, a better understanding of how, as eighth graders, to choose their high school program, a generally more enlightened viewpoint on the part

of the pupil as he moves along through high school, and a clearer and more appropriate plan for advanced schooling, or for choosing a job and earning a living upon graduation. This will require the usual guidance techniques of class discussions, appropriate testing, and individual conferences.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

In closing, it is my desire, in behalf of the various schools, to thank their many friends for gifts and other kindnesses during the last year. The North Westport Parent-Teacher Association defrayed expenses of a Christmas party and donated money for eyeglasses and for playground equipment. Mr. Oscar Bastille of North Westport also donated an ice-chest which is of daily use to the North Westport School in storing milk and orange juice.

At the Head School, the Head Parent-Teacher Association has furnished refreshments for Hallowe'en, Christmas and "Last Day of School" parties. They have also given a pole-goal for the playground, and film strips each month for the room with the best attendance.

At the Milton E. Earle School, the Parent-Teacher Association has furnished parties for many occasions and donated playground material, and has been constantly interested in school matters.

At the High School, the Woman's Community Club of Central Village has donated a scholarship to a 1952 graduate; an excellent cello; books and considerable money for books and magazines from time to time. The school is also indebted to Mrs. Francis S. Borden of Westport Point for nearly 250 volumes of the National Geographic Magazine covering the period from 1927 to 1947.

Other gifts and courtesies may have been overlooked or unreported. In such cases it is desired to register our appreciation.

Finally, I wish to thank all members of the School Organization for their help. This will include principals, supervisors, teachers, janitors, bus drivers and others within the force.

Especially I wish to thank the members of the School Committee for their confidence and for help given during the many meetings they have held — often extending into late hours — for the dispatch of school business.
