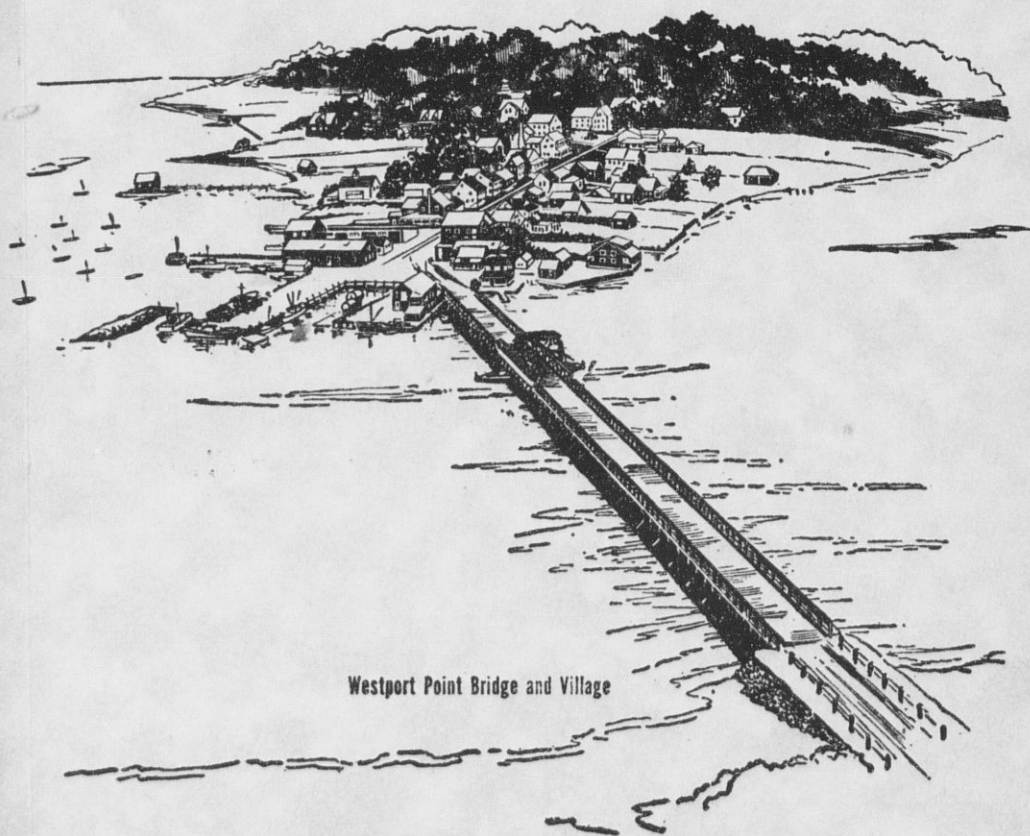

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Westport for a period from December 1, 1952, the date of the previous examination, to September 25, 1954, the following report being submitted thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked with the books of the town accountant and the town treasurer.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined. The receipts, as recorded, were checked with the treasurer's books and with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town, while the payments were checked with the treasury warrants and with the books of the treasurer.

The appropriations as listed from the town clerk's records of town meetings were checked with the town accountant's ledgers, the ledger accounts were analyzed, the necessary adjusting entries were made, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on September 25, 1954.

It is again recommended that prompt action be taken to secure a settlement of the delinquent tax and motor vehicle and trailer excise accounts one of which date back to 1942. The prompt settlement of all the delinquent accounts will improve the financial condition of the town and materially decrease the cost of subsequent audits of these accounts.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book was footed throughout, the recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the disbursements were compared with the town accountant's books and with the treasury warrants. The cash balance on September 25, 1954 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The recorded payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the amounts falling due and checked with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed, the income was proved, and the transfers to the town were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts.

It is recommended that the income be withdrawn from cemetery perpetual care funds and public landing funds before payment is made of bills chargeable to the income of the funds.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and reconciled with the tax collector's books and with the accountant's ledger. The redemptions of tax titles and sales of tax possessions were checked with the treasurer's cash book, the foreclosures and disclaimers were verified, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed and proved.

The books and records relative to the public landing accounts in custody of the town treasurer, as treasurer of the Town Landing Commission, were examined and checked in detail. The charges representing the leases of the several properties were examined and the payments to the treasurer were checked. The cash book was footed, and the cash balance on September 25, 1954 was verified by examination of the savings bank book.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked in detail. The tax and motor vehicle and trailer excise accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitment lists, were audited and checked with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The recorded receipts were checked with the payments to the treasurer and with the accountant's books, the abatements as recorded were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective ledger accounts.

The outstanding tax, excise, and departmental accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of dog, sporting, and town licenses issued were examined, the payments to the State being verified by comparison with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The surety bonds furnished by the town officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, the building inspector, and by the police and health departments were examined and checked, the recorded collections being compared with the payments to the treasurer.

The records of the sealer of weights and measurer, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked in detail.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing reconciliations of the several cash accounts, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, departmental, and public landing accounts, together with schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

For the cooperation extended by all town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

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her family. This situation seems likely to be due in part to improvements in salary scales made during the year. As of January first 1954 our staff members were placed on their proper steps of the scale that was in effect at the time, and in September we went onto an improved scale that brought us into line with some of the surrounding communities. It should be realized, however, that this gain does not secure our position. At this moment efforts are under way in other towns and in the legislature to secure further improvements in the face of increasing demands for school personnel. In this past year candidates for our vacancies were not plentiful, particularly in specialized fields, and to secure additions and replacements, as well as recognize faithful service, Westport must plan to keep pace.

By way of accounting for the personnel changes that took place during the year I quote from the reports of Audrey L. Tripp, Principal of the Milton E. Earle School, and Harold S. Wood, Principal of the Westport High School. Miss Tripp states: "Mrs. Isabelle Sandberg was granted a leave of absence from February through June and Mr. John F. Robinson of New Bedford was employed as a substitute to teach this group of fourth and fifth graders during that period.

Mrs. Ann Smith resigned in June, in order to devote full time to her family. We appreciated Mrs. Smith's work with and for our pupils and wish her well, always.

We were very thankful to have Mrs. Sandberg return to us in September. We were also pleased that Mr. Robinson had done so well in carrying on for Mrs. Sandberg during her absence that he was given a contract to serve as a regular teacher for the school year 1954-1955."

Mr. Wood reports:

"Three new teachers joined our faculty at the beginning of the school year. Mr. Charley Buess, a graduate

of Kansas State Teachers College, replaced Mr. Thomas Slowe. Mr. Buess teaches industrial arts and mechanical drawing.

Mr. Arthur Jolin, a graduate of Bryant College, replaced Mr. Joseph Papandrea. Mr. Jolin teaches commercial subjects.

Miss Barbara Andrade, a graduate of Bridgewater State Teachers College, replaced Miss Helen Noonan. Miss Andrade is our girls' Physical Education Supervisor.

We are happy to have Mr. Francis Martineau return to us after a year's leave of absence. Mr. Martineau teaches French, physics and mathematics."

In addition to these changes two new elementary teachers were hired during 1954. In January Mrs. Mary Logan was assigned to Miss Irene Boodry's class at the Factory School, relieving Miss Boodry for work with small groups. In September Mrs. Virginia Kay was assigned to the Greenwood Park School, enabling Mrs. Mary Wilkin-son to devote her time to daily work with groups from each room at that school.

These two arrangements were made in an attempt to afford some relief to crowded classrooms and to provide a little more attention for individual pupil needs. While they are held in inadequate facilities, no child spends more than a part of each day there, and I am confident that the effort is worthwhile.

We are constantly reminded of the importance of reading ability to the achievement of our pupils in nearly all phases of school work. While the results of one set of tests cannot be considered significant, the testing program carried out in our elementary schools in the spring indicated that our intermediate grades lagged slightly below national averages. That the problems continues on

through the grades is evidenced in Mr. Wood's report, where he cites a five-grade reading ability range in a single class.

The sources of the problem are many, and we cannot hope to develop a high degree of reading skill in all pupils, but with good materials and an able staff, both of which we have, I firmly believe that a significant gain can be made by reducing the size of classes to a point where no teacher has more than 30 pupils and first grade classes number no more than 25 pupils. This is particularly important in the present-day school where broadened curricular and extracurricular demands take such a toll on the time in the school day.

The presence in our classrooms of some children who are in greater need of individual attention than the group situation provides points up the need for facilities and specially trained personnel to help them. Recent legislation strengthens requirements for serving the needs of these children and it appears absolutely necessary to take steps in this direction in the coming year.

Also in need of assistance are the several children with speech handicaps. Help formerly obtained through the Fall River School Department is no longer available to us, due to the press of work with their own pupils, so we need to provide for our own.

The number of classrooms accommodating two grades has been reduced to four this year, but it is difficult to see how this condition can be completely eliminated in the future. Reducing class size will at least reduce the disadvantages of this arrangement.

For several years these and other reports have indicated the need for additional classrooms in the form of a new elementary school in the north-central section of the town. The work of the School Committee and the Joint

Planning Committee over the past year and a half has not only substantiated previous findings but has also made clear the need for additional facilities for grades 7-12 at the High School.

The need for elementary classrooms, plus the demand for special class facilities, has prompted enough study of the situation to indicate that consideration should be given to the possibility of running a two-platoon arrangement in some classrooms next fall. Of our present 23 elementary classrooms 8 have more than 35 pupils, 9 more have more than 30 pupils, and the remaining 6 have less than 30 pupils. It will require two more classrooms to prevent the situation from worsening in September, and a double session, if otherwise feasible, would make it possible to provide these rooms as well as relieve a regular classroom for special class purposes.

The large numbers of children who have been crowding our elementary classrooms are beginning to reach the upper-grade levels, reinforced by a continuing influx of new residents.

In spite of the conversion of storage space to classroom purposes at the High School 4 classes have more than 35 pupils, and a seventh-grade class of approximately 120 pupils is expected to enter in September, to be followed by a class of 140-150 pupils in 1956.

A statement from Mr. Wood's report explains that the educational need is not for classrooms alone:

" . . . I am greatly concerned with our curtailed industrial arts program. The shop addition, to my mind, is a must. Unless this addition becomes a reality it will be necessary to drop industrial arts as a seventh and eighth grade subject or make the course academic. The value of an understanding and use of tools is so important that this should not be allowed to happen. Every boy

could benefit from a sound industrial arts course; just as every girl could benefit from a well-rounded household arts course."

Last January Lloyd A. Brightman assumed the duties of Director of Guidance. Of this department Mr. Wood reports:

"The results of our Guidance Department are beginning to show in that we are having fewer changes in courses during the year. This is probably due to more thought on the part of parents and the school in course selection."

Mr. Brightman reports further:

"In a survey made by this department it was found that over the last ten years the percentage of graduates pursuing further education has risen from 17.3% to 33.3% in 1953. Last year's class topped that with an impressive 51.2%."

"... nineteen from a total of forty-five students elected to enter jobs after graduation. The others chose either some form of higher education or the armed forces. Sixteen percent of the remainder were placed through the high school in full time jobs."

The work of our art and music supervisors progresses well. Our increasing enrollments and the extra-curricular aspects of their respective fields give Edna Leuvelink, Natalie Hemingway and Antone Braga schedules that can scarcely be contained in the time allotted.

In spite of the comparatively large sum of money that was expended for the maintenance and repair of our school buildings in 1954, many needs went unattended. With higher costs of materials and labor, an expanded total plant, and normal aging of facilities, the repair item must be expected to be an increasing one.

Former locker, shower and storage spaces at the Milton E. Earle School have been converted to cafeteria facilities and as the year ended a hot lunch program was virtually ready to go into operation. Food is to be prepared at the High School kitchen and transported by auto.

Due to the press of the usual duties of the superintendency, plus the school planning problem, the supervision of instruction has rested almost entirely with the principals of the several schools. In the five schools having teaching principals, this is an unfair and virtually impossible responsibility (although it is felt that all principals can take pride in the jobs their respective schools are doing). In order to divide some of the responsibilities of this office a part-time maintenance supervisorship was set up on an experimental basis. John Barboza assumed the duties of this position in May, and before the end of the year it became clear to him that he could not afford the time from business to continue with this work. The experiment indicated that if the position was to accomplish its purpose it required a man who could be on call at all times, yet it did not justify full-time employment. By the end of the year arrangements were made for Howard Church to divide his time between these new duties and his usual work at the High School, and John Spencer was employed on a half-time basis at the High School. At this time the arrangement seems very satisfactory.

In conclusion I wish to honor the efforts of the entire staff and you gentlemen in the service of the children of Westport.
