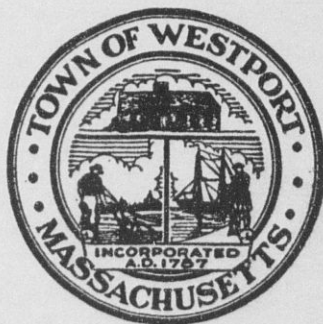

I hereby submit the annual shellfish report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1963.

Our Oyster Program has been continued this year as in the past. I personally think we are getting results. We have an oyster set that is greater than any one we have had in ten or more years. I feel that this results from our interbreeding oyster program, knowing that our river is one of the very few that produced any set at all.

A large amount of small quahogs were taken from limed flats. We can assume at this time that lime is a contributing factor to the production of quahogs.

Again this year we had to remove starfish to keep them in control. About half of the money for this project is taken from the State fund.

The Board of Public Welfare organized for the year ending December 31, 1963, by appointing Norman L. Gifford as chairman.

The year 1963 has been a year of continued emphasis on social services to recipients of public assistance. The Social Worker Seminar, Public Welfare Workshop, and Conference Institutes have all stressed the importance of working with families in need. Department releases have outlined how this should be done. The federal review done recently, with special reference to the Aid to Families with Dependent Children, is being followed up with federal and state reviews under a required Quality Control of Case Actions. The extent of federal participation in O.A.A., A.F.D.C., and D.A. expenses will be dependent upon these reviews.

The only substantial increase in local case load has been in the A.F.D.C. program. Recipients of assistance (with the exception of M.A.A.) having grants based on the State Standard Budget, received an increase on 9/1/63. The cost-of-living increase was 5.1%. The Leisure Time Activity Item in O.A.A. was increased from \$4.00 to \$5.00 a month as of 10/1/63.

Increased costs have been primarily in the per

diem rate for hospital care in both 1963 and again for 1964. The dental fee schedule was also increased under the provisions of the Medical Plan. Salary schedules were increased under the provisions of the Welfare Compensation Plan effective July 1, 1963.

One important change becomes effective on January 1, 1964 as a result of the repeal of the Settlement Law by Chapter 726 of the Acts of 1963. Settlement in General Relief and in Old Age Assistance is no longer required in these or any form of public assistance administered through the welfare department. State reimbursement, at a rate set by law, will now be the basis under which local welfare departments will receive a part of the total cost of aid to persons receiving General Relief and Old Age Assistance.

Problems with relation to the support of parents and/or children, refunds and recoveries, and other matters continue to be referred to the Town Counsel.

The problems resulting from unemployment, broken families, physical disabilities, aging, and from any number of other causes, are community problems. A program is being developed by the State Department, under the provisions of the Social Security Act, to plan for the co-ordination of both public and private social services in all cities and towns.

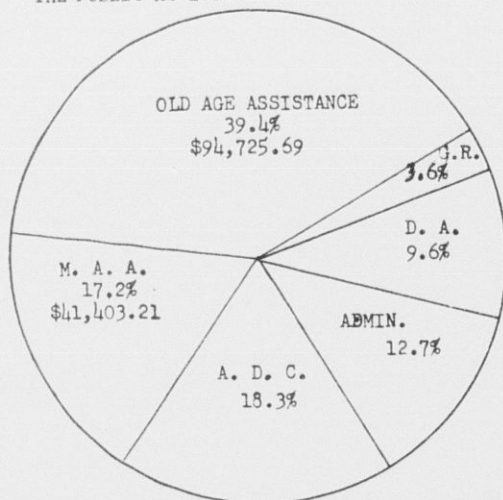

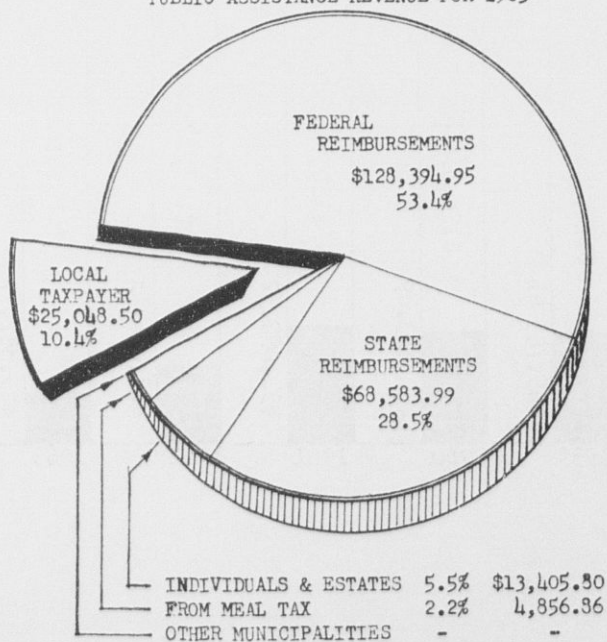

THE PUBLIC ASSISTANCE DOLLAR FOR 1963



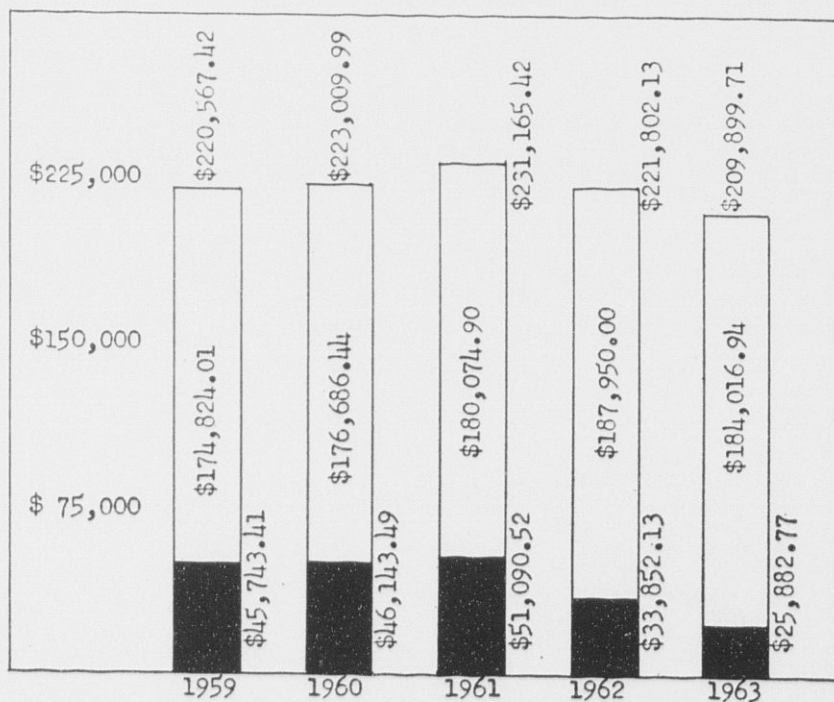

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE REVENUE FOR 1963



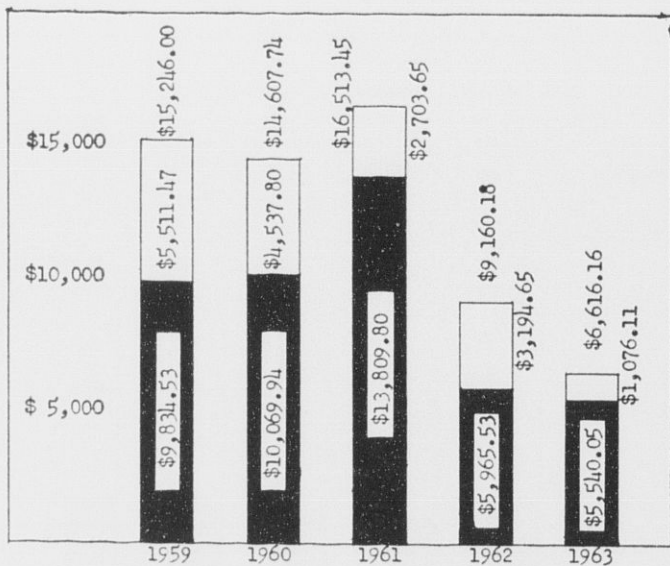
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS (ALL CATEGORIES) GRANTS

Solid Portion: Cost to Town



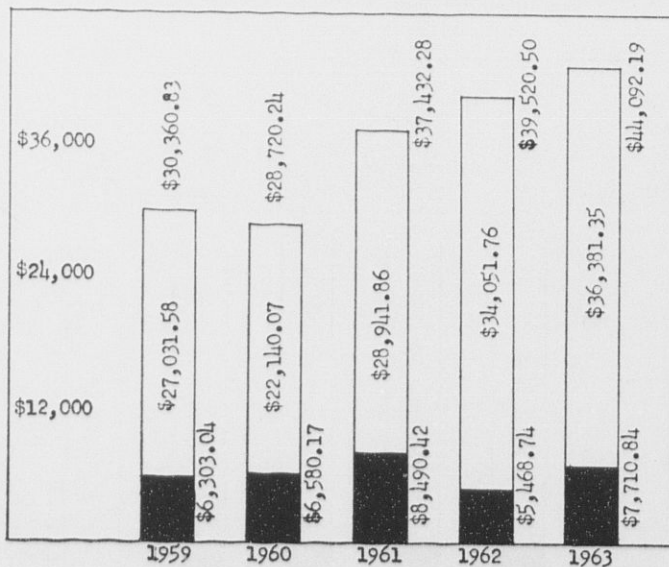
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR GENERAL RELIEF

Solid Bar: Total Cost to Town



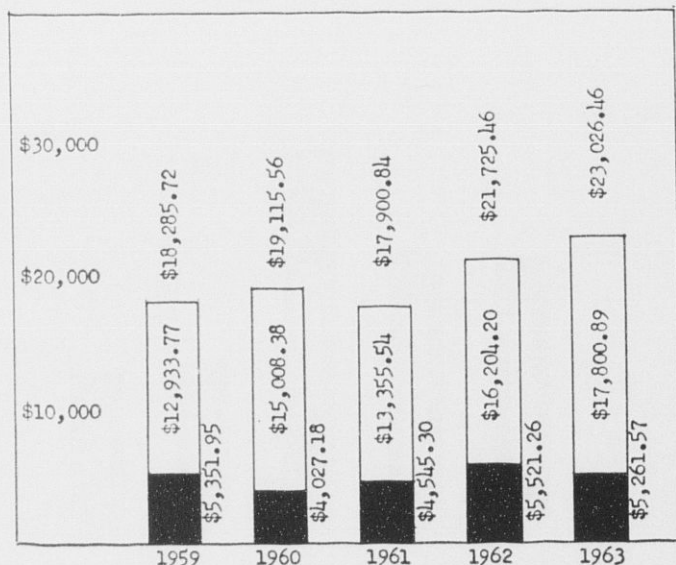
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN GRANTS

Solid Portion: Cost to Town



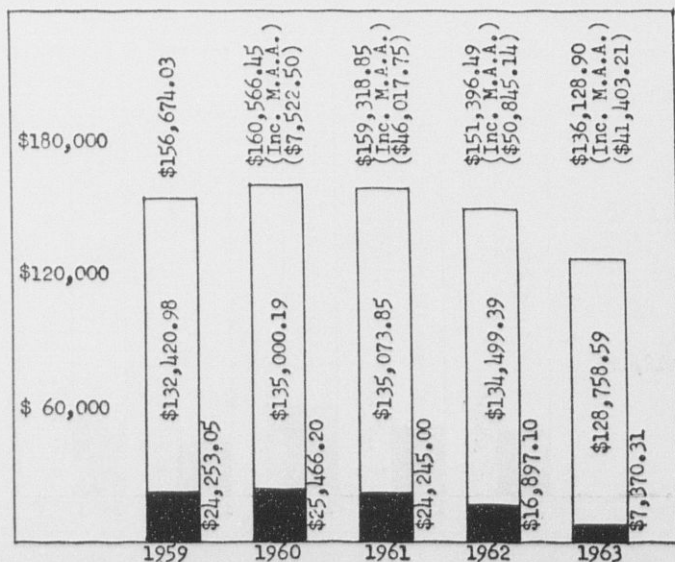
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS

Due to unforeseen circumstances, Helen J. Tripp, Librarian, found it necessary to tender her resignation to the Trustees in June. We very regretfully accepted this resignation as Miss Tripp had done much toward library progress. We had found her dedicated to her work.

Her place was filled in July by Mrs. Glenda K. Broadbent, who is proving adequate in her interests and service to the library.

Attempting a resume of library service, in 1957 our library was giving 9 hours weekly to the public and was expending about .31 per capita. In 1958 we called for a State survey of the Westport library, and from this, State recommendations stated we should be

spending \$3.00 per capita for library services. We have not reached that figure. However, we have increased hours of service to twenty in winter and twenty-five during the summer. The per capita figure for 1963 was approximately .90.

For a town of our size in comparison with others in the State of approximate size we should have a working budget of about \$23,000. Actually, your library department spent less than \$7,000! And—this includes, salaries, book and periodical purchases, equipment, dues and office supplies and expense. Also, an interesting note is that of the above \$7,000, the amount of 1,660.25 was returned to the town by the State by a Grant-in Aid!

You have heard us review our needs of a proper library building with expanded services, for some time.

The reason for not going "all-out" for this building in 1963, is our patience in waiting for recommendations from the Economic Development Associates, Inc., in other words—the Master Plan study of the entire town.

They have now given facts and agree with our needs, namely, a new building and proper expansion of services. We are now using a square foot area of about 800 feet, when requirements place a figure of at least 7,000 square feet! As population increases, and it is doing so very rapidly, the necessary space will run higher. Adequate planning today, demands looking ahead to expansion in the future. Plans for at least 10 years hence would be proper.

It has been said of the library department, (by some folks) that we have made little or no progress in working toward this necessary goal. From year to year, we have gone patiently forward step by step, advancing the quality of the library's offerings, thereby increasing the circulation, and aiming ever at having a

congenial, workable staff. There are many facets to a library trustee's worries and each trustee tries to worry in the right direction. We hope we have done so.

We have tried to request each year very fair increases for our annual budget. Each and every dollar spent for library services, has been a hard-working dollar.

Students and teachers are finding us more adequate in what we have to offer. Pleasure-readers seem happy in our selections. However, space is at a premium, and a second-floor location is not conducive to expansion, and this can reflect in circulation.

We hope when we do go "all-out" for a building, the realization that we have tried to plan well to this point, shall be exemplified, and through a town-meeting vote our efforts might be rewarded.

We have felt, and continue to feel that by establishing a congenial working staff, supplying requested needs of the public, keeping our house in order through filing and cataloging, is the first requisite of proper library service. From this strong central foundation we need and desire to expand, and we feel we are prepared.

The librarian sent an invitation to the school department to have groups come in for an introduction to the library, "with especial help offered to Junior High groups in the use of the card catalog."

The library was visited by Brownie Troop 1004 for a tour and presented us with their new Brownie Handbook.

Again, thanking all who have helped us along the way in 1963, and with spirited hopes for 1964.

Westport Youth Activity Board

The Youth Activity Board hereby submit their second annual report.

The report by the director of our swimming program is as follows:

Swimming Report

The response to the first town sponsored swimming program was most gratifying and overwhelming. During the registration period instructors received and processed 478 applications. After completion of the seven week course 343 certificates were awarded. The seemingly large discrepancy between registration and completion may be attributed mainly to two factors:

1. The dropping of all pre school children from the program.
2. Discouragement on the part of some pupils who had to wait for a period of time before receiving instruction.

This latter difficulty was remedied by the second week when pupils were assured instruction within 30 minutes. In future years class organization will proceed quickly as the pupils will present his certificate showing his swimming achievement. Lack of transportation, vacations, and poor areas were minor factors in drop outs.

Instructors

The quality of instruction was equal to that of any neighboring area, and superior to most. Instructors demonstrated a spirit of co-operation, patience, and enthusiasm which earned the quick respect of their students. This was attained largely because no

child was requested to attempt any skill which had not previously been thoroughly demonstrated by the instructor. Without the co-operation between staff members, and their quick willingness to help each other the program may well have been non-existent by the second week.

Areas

The negative aspect of the program was found in the areas designated for instruction. A tidal problem exists at both Westport Point and the Head of Westport. It is impossible to attempt any lifesaving course at the Head. The algae problem required the closing of Watuppa for a period of one week. All areas contain serious water hazards, foreign material, and restricted space. Instructors often were forced to interrupt classes to administer first aid. One such case requiring stitching was referred to Dr. Kirkaldy.

Recommendations

1. The use of new areas, or the improvement of current areas to more suitable and less dangerous waterfronts.
2. The consideration of a salary increase for any instructor returning to the program — excluding the directing instructor.

This year we plan to organize a six team basketball league. This requires assistance from adults who are interested in the sport and who are willing to serve as team managers.

Some consideration has been given activities for girls. The most logical seem to be volleyball and a charm and poise class. The high school girls are particularly interested in the latter.

A long range plan for tennis courts that could be converted to skating rinks during the winter months has been discussed at several of our meetings. Although nothing has been decided the need is apparent. Because of the cost involved we have hesitated in recommending this for the coming year.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Selectmen for their patience, and the adults who have given their time in making our limited program a success. We also wish to thank Edward Souza for the use of his facilities, and particularly thank John Kelly and William Albanese for their efforts.

Report of the Master Plan Committee

Gentlemen:

During the past year, work has progressed towards completion of consultant studies on The Master Plan for Westport, authorized by town meeting action in March, 1962.

These studies were scheduled to run from late in November, 1962 to late in May, 1964. At the end of 1963, both time and work progress on this project were about 3/4ths completed.

During 1963, nine meetings of the full Committee and several meetings of the subcommittees were held to discuss the various preliminary reports submitted by the consultants. Eighteen preliminary reports have been submitted covering seventeen of the twenty sections to be included in the final report. Numerous display maps have been prepared to illustrate the reports.

Adoption of zoning revisions at the March, 1963 town meeting was the first concrete result of these studies. In part as a result of Master Plan Committee deliberation, action at the 1964 town meeting is expected on further zoning revisions covering sign regulations, on establishment of a Junior High School Study committee, and on establishment of a general purpose Stabilization fund.

Final reports are expected to be available in early summer. The Master Plan will not be acted on as such by the town meeting, but rather the various recommendations made in it will be acted on separately, over a period of years. Completion of consultant studies will not mark completion of work on the Master Plan, but only completion of the initial study phase. Revision, updating, and implementation will be a continuing responsibility for Westport authorities.

I am attaching to this report a list of the preliminary reports already prepared and presented by the consultant to the Committee.

Report of the Westport Planning Board

Dear Sirs:

Herewith is the report of the Planning Board's many and varied activities during the year 1963, the seventh (7th) year of the Board's existence.

The Planning Board was organized as follows:

Planning Board members attended a total of forty-six (46) meetings and hearings during the course of its work in relation to Planning and Zoning. This total is broken down as follows: 20 regular scheduled bi-monthly; 18 special; and 8 zoning. Members of the Planning Board have attended conferences, lectures and demonstrations relative to Planning and Zoning. These meetings and lectures are not reflected in the above totals nor are they reported in the total number of hours generously contributed by Board members in their quest for knowledge of Planning and Zoning administration.

The members of the Planning Board spent a total of six hundred sixty-eight (668) hours in the conducting of Town Planning Board business.

During the year 1963, the Board reviewed, studied, and discussed a total of forty plans. This total is broken down as follows: Plans not requiring approval under Chapter 41, but determination by study (sometimes to on site inspection) to see if they conform to other provisions of law and zoning (20); preliminary plans and sketches (14); definitive plans (6); (5 of the grand total were rejected). The Planning Board was subpoenaed into Superior Court during the year as defendant in its action of refusal to stamp "Approval Not Required" of a plan. The Court upheld the Planning Board in its refusal to so approve the plaintiff's plan. Attorney John J. Harrington (then Town Counselor) represented the Planning Board in this court case.

The members of the Planning Board have attended conferences, lectures and demonstrations relative to Planning and Zoning. These assemblies were held in Boston, Taunton, Chatham, Boylston, Framingham, Andover under the sponsorship of the Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards, Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District, Massachusetts Department of Public Works, Massachusetts State Planning Division and Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

During the course of the year, a few very elaborate preliminary plans have been submitted to the Board for consideration. This is an expensive procedure. The Board recommends to all who consider the development of land into house lots meet with the Board and present a rough pencil sketch of the outline of the whole property and the idea of the sub-division of said property. This is recommended as a saving to the land owner, as preliminary plans are many times changed from the original drawings and in two instances this year rejected entirely as unacceptable.

The Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards, a non-profit, educational in scope and work for planning, appeals, zoning and conservation in the State will observe its fiftieth (50th) year of existence. This organization was chartered by the Commonwealth to aid in the education and training of members of cities and town planning, zoning, appeals and conservation boards. The conferences, lectures, demonstrations, and publications of this organization are of unestimated value to the non-professional planner. However, the full value of town membership is not received unless board members do attend the conferences and lectures. Colonel Frank J. Cassidy was elected by the Westport Planning Board to be its delegate to this worthwhile organization. A signal honor was bestowed on him by being elected as a Director of Region 6, which comprises twenty-six towns and cities in Southeastern Massachusetts.

Westport Planning Board membership in the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District continues to be most helpful to the Town. Regional planning has become a more dominant factor in planning in the eyes of the Federal and State Governments as well as planning professionals. The so-called core city generates the activity that affects the suburbs and rural areas. Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District has taken a very active part in proposing, opposing and supporting that which is deemed as sound worthwhile legislature in the fields of planning, zoning, appeals, and conservation. Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District was very active in Governor Peabody's Planning Conferences held this year in Fall River and New Bedford. It has been following up certain recommendations made during these conferences. Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District has for the past two and one-half (2½) year proposed a connector road to the end of

Route 195 in New Bedford to Wareham. Studies show that present Route 6 cannot accomodate summer traffic and with the development of Cape Cod National Park and other Cape Cod Resort activities it is feared that the visitor will be discouraged from traveling to the general area and thus a potential loss will be suffered by the whole area. Resort recreation is one of this Regional Planning District's main industries.

The Planning District Commission is in favor of two-year community colleges located in Fall River and New Bedford areas. Taunton has need for a two-year higher educational institution as well.

During the year, Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District has established a full time professional planning staff consisting of a planning director, senior planner, economist, and a junior planner and a secretary. A contract was negotiated with the Federal Government under Title 701 funds to do a twenty-four month study of up-dating the area land use. Much more work must be done to assist Southeastern Massachusetts out of its unemployment problems and increase the industrial potential of the area. Higher education, retaining of high school and college dropouts and conversion of the labor force by training will contribute to bring more industry to the area. The area has the natural resources, harbors, rivers, road nets, climate and open space to offer as inducements.

The Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District is at present negotiating a continuing comprehensive study plan covering some sixty-four (64) subjects with the Massachusetts Department of Public Works, Federal Bureau of Public Roads, and Federal Home and Housing Administration. This continuing study will do much to assist the general area and local planning boards.

Colonel Cassidy was elected for 1963 as Westport's Delegate to this body. He has been re-elected by the elected delegates to this body as their Chairman for the second term.

Sydney Baldwin was elected as delegate to the Greater Fall River Redevelopment Committee. To date this Committee has had only one meeting during 1963.

The Appeals Board continues to be a very valuable asset to town government. Its fair and impartial decisions governing zoning and sub-division regulations are not easy to come by. The State Laws governing these two subjects are numerous and constantly changing, so is much of the original philosophy governing these subjects. The Appeals Board is to be congratulated for its service to the Town of Westport.

The Planning Board desires to thank the members of the Board of Health for their continued cooperation and help during 1963. It is the hope of the Board to endeavor to improve the cooperation between the Highway Department and the Board during 1964 through closer contact.

Water continues to be a very serious subject for many people in Town. The lack of it causes fire insurance rates to remain high, prevents potential industry from locating in Town. During the year several wells have become contaminated which indicates the lack of public water is a health problem also. The Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, Health Board and Finance Committee with members of Chamber of Commerce met on three occasions. At one of these meetings, a State Department of Health Sanitary Engineer for Southeastern Massachusetts discussed the procedures necessary to establish a Town Water System. The Town may establish a District Water Commission or a Town Water Commission. The Board of Selectmen

have appointed a Water Committee to report on the needs, costs, etc., for water for Westport.

During the visit of the Massachusetts State Department of Health Sanitary Engineer, he was conducted by members of the Planning Board to several sites now proposed for development into house lots. Members of the Planning Board are of the opinion that a potential exists on several of these proposed projects to establish private water companies. Water with gas and electric energy should contribute much to increase the overall value of the raw land value. Private water companies are permitted by the State Health Department under certain regulations.

Members of the Planning Board attended the meetings of the Master Plan Committee and in several instances have declared their objections to some of the preliminary reports covering some of the subjects under study by the consultants. However, the Planning Board realizes that the consultant under contract to do the necessary studies are not compelled to render reports in the vein desired by a committee, but rather to report the situations based on facts as they the consultant see them. During the forth coming year the consultants will of a necessity hold public hearings on the many subjects studied to comprise a Master Plan report for the Town. A final report on each subject will be published by the Master Plan consultants and distributed to the Master Plan Committee. The Master Plan Committee then should make such recommendations to the Town Meeting members for adoption. A Master Plan of a Town resulting in a final report will not achieve anything for the Town unless the Town adopts a plan of its own to implement the suggested necessary action to guide the Town Government.

It is unfortunate that the Town Meeting members did not heed the advice and recommendations of the Planning Board as outlined in the Board's annual 1960-1961 reports. The action to remove the old wood Westport Point Bridge resulted in the loss potential of \$250,000.00 motel considered for construction if portion of the bridge was retained and converted into a marina with D.P.W. funds. This proposal was confided to a member of the Planning Board who of necessity could not divulge these facts and honor the confidence. Westport's shoreline is its greatest natural resource and offers the best tax base improvement factor. Consideration must be given by Town Government to the development of the Town's natural resources in the absence of the necessary industrial potential. Should the industrial potential improve in Town, added to the judicious development of other natural resources will of a necessity be a main factor in the tax base stabilization.

The Planning Board has continued its policy to the sub-division rules and regulations, adopted by the Board and approved by the States Attorney General, in the administration of the sub-division control of the development of land into house lots. The administration of the sub-division of land rules and regulations in Westport is fair and impartial. The application of these rules and regulations are not considered too stringent.

The Planning Board does not require any unnecessary installations, but rather do demand of a developer to provide the necessary installation of catch basins

and drain pipe considered necessary for the protection of the Town from civil suit resulting from surface water damage to private property as a result of the development. When it is considered that the developer is dealing in a commodity the same as any other manufacturer, the raw land being the basic material of the finished product, the road portion is a part of the finished product. When the developer (whether he be a resident of town or from elsewhere) completes his development and has passed on his costs to the purchaser, he will move on to other pastures seeking to develop same. The town because of the development, will inherit the necessary government expenses in the performance of the services to the increased community population.

Despite the fact that the developer and contractor, and in some instances the developer is the construction contractor, makes a profit by his efforts, is no earthly reason why a town should underwrite a portion of the costs of a development since facts prove no profits accrue to a town government as a result of increase in the number of dwellings and citizens. The Town Meeting members should not be misled by the statement that it is unnecessary for the Planning Board to require the installation of road monuments, catch basins, drain pipes as the Town will not immediately accept newly developed roads, this is a fallacy. Eventually Town Governments must accept all unaccepted streets and the longer the Town delays to do so the more it will cost. When the developer has sold off his house lots and moves on no single individual can be held responsible for errors in the street development. For this

reason the Westport Planning Board has on several occasions during 1963 and it is presumed will in the future, hire competent professional road engineering services to advise the Board as to the value of performance bonds necessary to cover the cost of road development, to interpret the engineering layout and profile drawings of the developer.

During 1963 the subject of the cost of development of roads in sub-divisions submitted to the Planning Board for approval was discussed and a study of all such plans filed with the Board from 1959 through 1963 was undertaken. The result of that study follows:

A comparison of Westport estimated costs per lineal ft. for the development of roads was found to be approximately half the cost of private contractor estimates. At the present time the Board does not require the installation of curbing and sidewalks, however, if and when the Town meeting members adopt a Town Betterment Act, it then will be necessary to include curbing and sidewalks. If the Town Meeting adopts a public water system, it will be necessary under present

statutes to deliver water to the new developments within the water district. The developer of house lots will be required to install the public water facilities within the development. The situation regarding the development of land will, as time passes, become more costly and present to the Planning Board more complex problems.

on Monday the eleventh day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to choose the following officers, viz: one Selectman, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Health, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, Highway Surveyor, one Fish Commissioner and two Trustees of the Free Public Library each for three years; also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: four Landing Commissioners, Tree Warden and Drawtender of Westport Point Bridge; also the following officer, viz: one member of the Planning Board for five years; also to fill a vacancy, one member of the Planning Board for one year; also to vote on the following question, viz: "Shall certain provisions of Chapter thirty-two B of the General Laws, authorizing any county, city, town or district to provide a plan of contributory group life insurance, group accidental death and dismemberment insurance, and group general or blanket hospital, surgical and medical insurance for certain persons in the service of such county, city, town or district and their dependents, be accepted by this town?" all to be voted for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the High School Auditorium on Tuesday the nineteenth day of March next, it being the second Tuesday after the second Monday of said month at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To determine the salary and compensation of all elected Town Officers.

Article 4. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1963 and until the annual Town Meeting in 1964, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$4,000. be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance and that in addition the sum of \$8,000.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the re-imbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Article 6. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$12,000.00 be appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Construction, Main Road, Old County Road and Horseneck Road and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$12,000.00 be taken from Revenue of the current year; and that in addition, the sum of \$36,000. be transferred from "Free Cash" in the Treasury to meet

the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt to the excess and deficiency account in the treasury.

Article 7. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of Public Highways for the ensuing year.

Article 8. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1000. to repair and resurface Gadoury St., including the stretch of road from Lakeshore Ave. to the So. Watuppa Pond.

Article 9. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2000. to resurface and tar Lassonde St. from Sanford Road, west, to Lakeshore Ave. thence Lakeshore Ave. to Gadoury St.

Article 10. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1700. to tar and gravel Pinewood Ave.

Article 11. Voted: (Unanimously) to tar Faulkner St. and that the necessary funds be taken from Highways & Bridges Account.

Article 12. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$400. to complete the tar and gravel of E Drive provided the conditions as specified in Article 16 of the 1961 Annual Town Warrant are met.

Article 13. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1800. to tar and gravel Fisherville Lane.

Article 14. Voted: (Unanimously) that Article 14 be laid on the table for a future Special Town Meeting.

Article 15. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$400. to make a layout of Munroe St.

Article 16. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$200. to make a layout of Cleveland St.

Article 17. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 17.

Article 18. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 18.

Article 19. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the layout of Old County Road as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and to appropriate \$250. therefor.

Article 20. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the layout of Main Road as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and appropriate \$62.50 therefor.

Article 21. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the layout of Horse-neck Road as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and appropriate \$1687.50 therefor.

Article 22. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 22.

Article 23. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 23.

Article 24. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over article 24.

Article 25. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$18,000.00 for the purchase of a Dozer-Loader, with bulldozer and front end loader as trade-ins, for the Highway Department and that the purchasing committee be made up of one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Finance Committee, one member of the Taxpayers Committee, Highway Surveyor and one member at large to be appointed by the Moderator.

Article 26. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$7,000.00 for the purchase of a truck for the Highway Department and that the purchasing committee be made up of one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Finance Committee, one member of the Taxpayers Committee, Highway Surveyor and one member at large to be appointed by the Moderator.

Article 27. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1400. for the purchase of a snow plow and all attachments for the new truck.

Article 28. Voted: (Unanimously) to dispose of at auction, all junk that has accumulated at the Highway Department.

Article 29. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$28.80 to install one street light on McKinley St. pole No. 70216.

Article 30. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 30.

Article 31. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$18.00 to install one street light on E Drive, pole No. 2771.

Article 32. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$28.80 to install one street light at the intersection of Route 6 and Forge Road, pole No. 70009.

Article 33. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3,215.00 for the purchase of a cruiser car for the Police Dept.

Article 35. A Motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the feasibility of establishing a Public Works Department in the Town of Westport to encompass the duties and responsibilities of the Highway Surveyor, Tree Warden, Moth Superintendent and Dutch Elm Superintendent was carried.

Article 36. A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500. for the installation and annual service of an American District Telegraph Company Fire Alarm System, or equal, at the Milton E. Earle School was lost. This vote was not unanimous.

Article 37. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate \$600. to be used to purchase and equip a better truck for the Tree Dept. provided the old truck is auctioned or traded.

Article 38. A motion to adopt Zoning Regulation amendments recommended to the Selectmen for their consideration in accordance with the General Laws, Chapter 40A, Section 6 and amendments thereto, such amendments as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall was carried, 115 voting Yes and 35 No as follows:

Section 1. Purpose

In order to promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of its inhabitants, to lessen the danger from fire and congestion, and to improve the town under the provisions of General Law, Chapter 40A, the use, construction, repair, alteration and height of buildings and structures and the use of premises in the Town are hereby regulated as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Definitions.

In this By-Law the following terms, unless a contrary meaning is required by the context or is specifically prescribed, shall have the following meanings: Words used in the present tense include the future, and the plural includes the singular; the word "lot" includes the word "Plot"; the word "building" includes the word "structure"; the word "shall" is intended to be mandatory; "occupied" or "used" shall be considered as though followed by the words "or intended, arranged or designed to be used or occupied". The word "person" includes a corporation as well as an individual.

1. **Accessory Use.** A use or building customarily incidental and subordinate to the principal use or building and located on the same lot with such principal use or building. In buildings res-

stricted to residence use, the office of a professional man, customary family occupations and workshops not conducted for compensation, shall be deemed accessory uses.

2. **Dwellings:** A building designated or used as the living quarters for one or more families as the principal use.

3. **Dwelling, One-Family:** A detached building containing one dwelling unit only and having two side yards.

4. **Family:** One or more persons occupying a dwelling unit and living, sleeping, cooking and eating on the same premises as a single housekeeping unit.

5. **Frontage:** That portion of a lot fronting upon a street or way, said frontage to be measured continuously along one street line between its side lot lines and their intersection with the street line.

6. **Lot:** A parcel of land having not less than the frontage, area, and width required under the provisions of this by-law and the Building Regulations and having its principal frontage on a street or other means of access as may be determined in accordance with the provisions of the law to be adequate as a condition of the issuance of a building permit.

7. **Nonconforming Use:** A building or land lawfully occupied by a use that does not conform to the regulations of the district in which it is situated.

8. **Street Line:** The dividing line between the street right of way and the lot.

Section III. Establishment of Districts.

III-A. **Types of district.** For purposes of this By-Law, the Town of Westport is hereby divided into the following types of use district.

Residence
Business
Unrestricted

III-B. **Location of Districts.** Said districts are located and bounded as shown on a map entitled "Zoning Map of Westport, Massachusetts", dated June 6, 1957 and on file in the office of the Town Clerk. The Zoning Map, with all explanatory matter thereon is hereby made a part of this By-Law. The map is described as follows:

Add 3. As Unrestricted: All remaining portions of the Town.
Section IV. Use Regulations.

Except as provided in Section VI-A-1 hereof, no building or structure shall be constructed, and no building, structure or land, or part thereof shall be used for any purpose or in any manner other than for one or more of the uses hereinafter set forth as permitted in the district in which such building, structure or land is located, or set forth as permissible by special permit in said district and so authorized.

IV-B. Business District.

1. Permitted Uses.

- a. Any use permitted in a Residence District.
- b. Office, bank, newspaper, job printing establishments and standardized out-door advertising under permit.
- c. Hotel, motel or restaurant.
- d. Any wholesale or retail business, research laboratory, service, or public utility not involving manufacture on the premises except of products the major portion of which is sold on the premises by the producer to the consumer.
- e. Automobile service station, repair shop, storage garage, or salesroom (class 1 and 2 licenses only).

2. Uses which may be permitted by the Board of Appeals in accordance with the regulations appearing in Section VII-B-2 of this by-law.

- a. Place of amusement or assembly, club conducted for profit.

IV-C. Unrestricted District.

1. Any lawful use shall be permitted, provided that it does not impair the use of adjacent properties by reason of dirt, odor, fumes, smoke, gas, sewage, refuse, noise, excessive vibration or danger of explosion or fire.

Section V. Intensity Regulations.

V-A Amend by changing the word "Industrial" to read "Unrestricted".

Section VI. General Regulations.

VI-A. Non-conforming Uses.

1. The lawful use of any structure or land existing at the time of the enactment or subsequent amendment of this By-Law may be continued although such structure or use does not conform with provisions of the By-Law.

2. **Abandonment.** A non-conforming use which has been abandoned 2 years shall not be re-established and any future use shall conform with this By-Law.

3. **Changes.** Once changed to a conforming use, no structure or land shall be permitted to revert to a non conforming use.

Section VII. Administration.

VII-A. Enforcement.

This By-Law shall be enforced by the Selectmen through the Building Inspector appointed by them. No building shall be built or altered and no use of land or a building shall be begun or changed without a permit having been issued by the Building Inspector. No building shall be occupied until a certificate of occupancy has been issued by the Building Inspector. Any person violating any of the provisions of this By-Law may be fined not more than twenty dollars for each offense. Each day that such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

BII-B. Board of Appeals.

There is hereby established a Board of Appeals of (3) members and (2) associate members to be appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 40A of the General Laws, which shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this By-Law in the manner prescribed in Chapter 40A of the General Laws. The Board of Appeals shall have the following powers:

1. **Appeals.** To hear and decide an appeal taken by any persons aggrieved by reason of his inability to obtain a permit from any administrative official under the provisions of Chapter 40A of the General Laws or by any officer or board of the town, or by any person aggrieved by any order or decision of the Inspector of Buildings, or other administrative official in violation of any provisions of Chapter 40A of the General Laws, or of this By-Law.

A. **Special Permits.** To grant a special permit for an exception as provided by sections of this By-Law when it shall have found that the use involved will not be detrimental to the established or future character of the neighborhood and town and subject to appropriate conditions or safeguards if deemed necessary.

3. **Variances.** To authorize upon appeal, or upon petition in cases where a particular use is sought for which no permit is required, with respect to a particular parcel of land or to an existing building thereon a variance from the terms of this By-Law where, owing to conditions especially affecting such parcel or such building but not affecting generally the zoning district in which it is located, a literal enforcement of the provisions of this By-Law would involve substantial hardship to the appellant, and where desirable relief may be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without nullifying or substantially derogating from the intent or purpose of this By-Law, but not otherwise.

VII-C. Amendment. This By-Law may be amended from time to time at the annual or special town meeting in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of Chapter 40-A.

VII-D. Validity. The invalidity or any section or provision of this By-Law shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

VII-E. Effective Date. These By-Laws and any amendments thereto shall become effective upon vote of the Town Meeting, subject to approval by the Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Article 39. A motion to adopt Trailer Regulation amendments as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall was carried 104 voting Yes and 8 voting No as follows:

Approved May 16, 1963 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke.

To see if the town will vote to amend the by-laws regarding trailers by striking out the last sentence of paragraph 1 which says:

"No such permit shall be issued for a period of more than one year from the date of such hearing." and substitute the following:

"No such permit shall be issued for a period of more than two months in any single year."

Article 40. A motion to adopt Soil Conservation amendments as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall was carried, 134 voting Yes and 16 voting No, as follows:

Approved May 16, 1963 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke.

In Section 2 change "at least 7 days" to "at least 4 days".

Add section 2.a. to read "The applicant for the permit shall submit a plan to the Board showing the location and size as recorded in the Town Assessor's Office of the land from which the soil, loam, sand, gravel or granite is to be removed. This plan shall also indicate approximately the specific area on this land where the removal will take place and shall list the names of all abutters to the property."

Add Section 2.b. to read "The applicant for the permit shall notify the abutter or abutters of the property on which the permit is applied for by registered mail at least 3 days prior to the hearing on the permit."

In Section 3 add at end of second sentence "except where this removal or transfer of soil, loam, sand, gravel or granite exceeds 100 cubic yards and then a permit will be required in accordance with Section 2".

In Section 4 at the end of the second sentence add "and specifically that the finished grade and contour of the land after the material has been removed shall be such as not to direct the flow of drainage water onto an abutter's property or private or public way."

In Section 6 add the following sentence: A permit shall not be issued for the removal of soil, loam, sand, gravel or granite below the grade of a Public or Private way or where the land to be excavated is more than 300 feet from a public or private way the permit shall not allow any excavation below the predominated lowest grade of the surrounding land.

In Section 7 add after "without a hearing" the following: "provided an application for renewal is made within 30 days of the expiration date of the permit".

Article 41. A motion to amend Article VIII of the Town By-Laws was carried 142 voting Yes and 12 voting No, as follows: "Section 1-A. "Antique dealers are excluded from Section 1".

Approved May 16, 1963 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke.

Article 42. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$900, in accordance with the recommendations of the Department of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the control of algae in the South Watuppa Pond, said funds to be used only in the event a like amount is appropriated and used for the same purpose by the City of Fall River.

Article 43. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept Chapter 139 Section 15 of the General Laws relative to the appointment of Inspectors of Animals.

Article 44. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 44.

Article 45. A motion to amend Article II of its By-Laws (Procedure at Town Meetings) by the addition of the following was carried, 114 voting Yes and 39 voting No, as follows: Section 9. No motion to reconsider a vote shall be in order unless the intention to more for reconsideration is given within twenty minutes of defeat or passage of the Article and before adjournment of the session.

Approved May 16, 1963 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke.

Article 46. A motion to amend Article VIII of its By-Laws (Junk Dealers) by the addition of the following was carried, 138 voting Yes and 8 voting No. "Section 2. No additional class 3 motor vehicle junk license as defined in General Laws Chapter 140 Section 58 shall hereafter be granted for premises situated within 500 feet of a public Highway or 1000 feet of a dwelling.

Approved May 16, 1963 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke.

Article 47. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee to serve as a library committee, for the continuance of the study and exploration of Town Library Needs; said committee to make its recommendations to the Town, at a special or regular town meeting, at the discretion of the committee.

Article 48. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. as Westport's share of a regional appropriation of twenty-five hundred dollars, to be used by the Regional District Vocational School Study Committee, to develop specific plans and recommendations for the development of a Vocational Regional School, which will be presented at a future town meeting.

Article 49. Under Article 49 the following resolution was presented: "It is the sense of this meeting that the posting of any political signs within the Town of Westport should be prohibited, and this meeting requests the Westport Planning Board to draft a proposed zoning by-law banning the posting of any such political signs or posters in the town at any time, and process such proposal for our consideration at the next annual town meeting."

Article 50. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$200. to repair the Legion Hall roof.

Article 51. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the provisions of General Laws Chapter 40 Section 8C and establish a conservation commission thereunder, for the promotion and development of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of the town and appropriate \$200. therefor.

Article 52. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2,500. for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 122 Acts of 1931.

It is the policy of the school department to issue no-school bulletins or announcements through Stations WSAR—Fall River, WNBH and WBSM—New Bedford, and WPRO—Providence, whenever driving conditions are, or promise to be, **dangerous**. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be tuned in from 6:30 A.M. to 7:30 A.M. for no-school decisions.

Weather conditions in a given area at a given time are still largely unpredictable. Therefore, there will be days when, with the best of intention, buses will be sent when they should not, and not sent when they should be.

Parents will have to use their own judgment in determining whether their children should attend school under adverse weather conditions. When attendance is poor because of weather conditions, no new work will be presented by the teachers.

Superintendent's Report to the School Committee

Westport, Mass.

December, 1963

I submit herewith my fifth annual report as Westport's superintendent of schools, it being the seventy-fifth such report submitted in the history of the Westport superintendency. I am also including pertinent extracts of our principals' and supervisors' reports as a part of my general report to you.

In my previous reports I have listed the educational and material gains that we have made during each year. I shall continue the custom in the present report listing advances made during 1963.

The second part of the report will be concerned with present educational needs and trends.

The third part might be called, A Look at The Future of Education in Westport.

Educational and Material Gains During 1963

1. Our guidance department has been substantially strengthened by obtaining the services of Captain Ellsworth Smith, recently retired from the United States Navy.
2. Guidance has now been extended down through the Junior High School, and a definite program and policy adopted as a basis of operation in this field.
3. The need of a planned physical education program for the grades was accepted by the school committee and a competent teacher secured for this work.

However, the granting of a year's leave of absence to the High School girls' physical education teacher mitigated this potential gain, as we had to transfer the new teacher to the High School program. We were not able to fill the girls' physical education position at the high school because of the late date of the request for a leave of absence, the scarcity of teachers in this field, and the fact that the opening was presumably temporary, being based on a leave of absence of an incumbent teacher. Therefore, our gain this year has been only a gain in intent in the field of physical education.

4. The separation of the Junior High pupils from the Senior High School continues to show increasing evidence of the sociological and educational benefits that are derived from this change. There are naturally a few minor inconveniences and inadequacies because of building locations and facilities, but the overall best interest of the children is being served by the separation.
5. Our reading strengths and weaknesses have been studied and the school committee has authorized the superintendent to employ a trained person who has the competency to work with both teachers and pupils in this vital field. If we can bring all children up to the highest point of their potential reading ability many other problems will take care of themselves. Ability in most fields of subject matter is based upon reading skills.
6. Our school buildings have been brought to a point where they are in the best physical condition that they have been for the past five years. During the past year a lot of work has been done at the high school building. The long existing and numerous leaks around the windows have been reme-

died; damaged plaster has been removed, interior painting done, outside painting completed, exterior flood lights installed, double-doors made tight, and roof repairs partially completed. The stained, unsightly window shades have been replaced. Age and constant staining because of the leaks had made this change necessary.

7. Our teachers are now studying the so-called new mathematics. Out of this survey we expect to decide how much of it we ought to use, at what level to begin using it, when to begin, and what materials to use.
8. Our schools are now provided with television sets. While our present use of these sets is not extensive, they are being used to some extent, and will be used with increasing frequency as educational programs develop.
9. During this past year Westport has taken an outstanding step in joining with Fall River, Somerset and Swansea in the formation of a Regional Vocational-Technical High School. We believe that this school will develop into one of the best vocational-technical high schools in New England, and that Westport is particularly fortunate in being an integral part of this new regional district. It will give our youth a wonderful opportunity to attend a fine school, well located, offering up to date vocational and technical courses, at a very reasonable cost to local taxpayers. Westport citizens and officials are to be congratulated for providing the opportunity for Westport's children to go to a school of such potential.
10. Our High School English Department, our Mathematics Department, the work in Developmental Reading, have all shown steady improvement. This does not mean that other high school subject

matter fields are not equally competent; it simply means that those named have made improvement by virtue of need, new concentration, new equipment, some new personnel, and, in the case of English, a department head.

11. Basketball, Softball and Soccer are being developed on the Junior High level. This will result in better muscular development and emotional stability for our junior high people. It will also result in their coming into high school with some ability in these fields which will accrue to the benefit of our high school teams.

Present Educational Needs and Trends

1. Most of our educational needs could be met with money. We are a relatively small town with a small industrial tax base. Yet our children are as precious to us as are those of richer taxpayers. We are providing a reasonably good educational diet for our children. The cost per pupil is relatively high but that cannot be helped until our volume is greater. If we were considerably smaller our per pupil cost would be less. Were we considerably larger our per pupil cost would be less. Until Westport has a substantial change in population (and I can only see it growing larger) per pupil costs will be high.
2. Things to be learned are multiplying at a great rate while things that have been learned are turn-out to be false or incomplete at only a lesser rate. To keep up with developments in any specialty calls for regular and career-long study.
3. In a society that is changing at a rate inconceivable, earlier, and even now hard to grasp fully, there is continuous change in what knowledge and skill are most relevant to present and future.

4. At the center of the school is a learning child with his teacher. A school system is measured by what happens here, at its heart. There are new forces and factors that affect teaching and learning. In sum, and the sum is growing they inescapably require new services and resources.

Tools for teaching and learning are growing in number and complexity. Among them are recording and playing machines, projectors, films and film strips, laboratory equipment, models, textbooks, manuals, reference and library books, information storage systems, teaching machines, radio, television, and more to come. These things require storage, maintenance, transportation, and even special operation and direction.

As with material resources, so with human resources. There is a growing body of specialists whose function it is to support and stimulate teaching and learning. They work at curriculum development, instructional improvement, professional growth, evaluation and research.

There is no formula for the right number and kinds of resources or resource people in a school system. Each community and each school system has its own needs and priorities. But if education is to meet the new challenges ahead, most of the resource functions must be performed somewhere in any system. They call for highly specialized competences and continuous study which simply cannot be found nor maintained in teachers, principals and superintendents who have their own expertness to achieve and maintain. **No one person can keep abreast of all the specialties.**

Classroom teachers and all staff members in a school system need support and stimulation, their growth and competency and vision need nourishment, and their awareness of responsibility for change needs sharpening. To us this points up a necessary role for

resource people **not identified as administrators**. These people are assistant superintendents for instruction or for curriculum, curriculum workers, supervisors, researchers, instructional material workers, and others who provide services designed to support and enrich the learning experiences of children.

In an age of changing and expanding demands on our schools this assumption implies no criticism of the high and still-rising quality of our teachers or administrators. On the contrary it reflects that very improvement which has led to an awareness of the need and even to a demand for support in the constantly more challenging task of giving our children the kind of educational opportunity adequate for our times.

In closing this part of my report I should specifically call your attention to the foregoing paragraphs as they apply to Westport. If you wish our school system to fully respond to the educational challenges of our time you must begin to provide in the annual budgets for resource people. No unassisted superintendent of schools can keep abreast, nor find time to carry out, all that can and should be done in all the new avenues that are being opened. I congratulate the school committee in having made a good beginning in voting to obtain a reading resource person for our town.

5. We definitely need an additional teacher in the Junior High School. The Principal, Miss Anna Paoli, should not be teaching more than one class per day, if any. The last minute division of Grades 7 into four units instead of the planned three, while good in many ways has imposed too great a teaching burden upon the principal.

6. We should also provide a helping teacher in the Milton E. Earle School. We have three oversize grades there and will continue to have for two or three years.

Additional days of clerical help are needed in the Earle School, Macomber School and the Junior High School.

The Future of Education in Westport

It appears that our vocational educational needs will be well taken care of by virtue of the town's participation in the Vocational Regional School. This field of education is becoming increasingly important. All education is becoming more and more utilitarian and pragmatic. Automation seems likely to drastically cut the need for unskilled labor. It is becoming increasingly necessary for non-college youth to come out of our secondary school system with some marketable skill. Our Regional Vocational School will help meet this need.

Westport's next step in local public school expansion should be a new Junior High School building. This would not mean the abandonment of the present Head and Factory school buildings which we are presently using as a Junior High. These buildings could well be used for elementary school expansion which we are going to do something about in the not distant future. The new Junior High School could provide for the education of grades seven, eight and nine, rather than grades seven and eight as we are doing at the present time. A three-grade Junior High School would enable our present High School to carry on without a building addition until around 1980.

Such a new Junior High School plant could well be built on the present High School grounds, and could include an auditorium that could be used by the community, by the high school and by the junior high school, and eliminate the present necessity of constantly setting up and removing chairs from the present high school gymnasium. The high school gym could be used exclusively as a gym and the junior high audi-

torium could be used exclusively as an auditorium. Present high school shops and gym could be utilized by the junior high school. Some of the new facilities of the junior high school could be used by the high school. This would be a good economy as well as an educational move. As I see it, the new building must be ready for September of 1967. If Westport's growth jumps faster than expected the target date should be September, 1966.

I recommend that an article be put in the annual town warrant in March asking that a Junior High School Study Committee be appointed.

In Conclusion

In bringing this report to an end I cannot refrain from speaking about the recent tragic loss to our country and to the cause of education. In President Kennedy America lost a man of great intellectual gifts, a President of strong courage and of great political imagination, a man committed to the improvement of all levels of education. As long as America can continue to produce such men we can be confident that the American Dream of freedom, education, justice and a fuller life for all peoples will some time become a reality. Our late President did not lack humility, nor did he lack courage. He took the attitude that it is not humility when honest men say they will not dirty their hands with practical politics. All they do is leave it to men with dirtier hands still. Evil thrives when good men do nothing. Let us make this truism a part of the education of our children.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT TO SUPERINTENDENT

As Principal of the Westport High School, I hereby submit my annual report:

Changes in Personnel

Mrs. Eleanor Lindquist, vocal music director, left to teach in a parochial school.

Mrs. Barbara Wordell was granted a year's leave of absence.

Mr. Bruce Hilyard, a teacher in our English department, left to teach at Northbridge.

The following teachers were appointed: Mr. Ellsworth Smith, guidance counselor; Miss Gloria McGillick to replace Mrs. Wordell in girls' physical education and as athletic coach; Mrs. Mary Swidey, English department, to replace Mr. Hilyard; Miss Jocelyne Cyr to replace Mrs. Lindquist in the vocal music department.

Mrs. Margaret Kelliher and the special class returned to the High School and apparently are happy and progressing satisfactorily.

Changes in Curriculum

Under Mr. Paul Larrivee's able leadership our English program shows definite improvement. More time is being given to developmental reading as we find there is a definite need for improving the reading

skills of our college preparatory students. With five reading groups organized to meet different periods, reading is now available to nearly all students wishing to elect it.

Our modern foreign language program is limited to the study of French. It is now possible to elect three years of the language, as we now have a French III class organized. Mr. Martineau and Mr. Marchand are to be commended for the excellent work they are doing in this department.

Our vocational homemaking classes show a definite increase in enrollment as 26 ninth-grade girls have elected this course. This increased enrollment has been a burden to Miss Cahoon and the number is greater than the State Department recommends. However, Miss Cahoon is handling the overload with her usual efficiency.

Our vocational agricultural program, headed by Mr. Joseph Szala, is showing satisfactory progress. The judging team at the University of Massachusetts competing with other departments in the county schools finished high in the standing. The Young Farmers Program needs to be strengthened and every effort is being made in that direction. Our annual fair was again a success, despite adverse weather conditions and other factors over which we had no control.

Our math department is in the process of studying new approaches and different phases of modern math. At the present time we are teaching traditional algebra, geometry and trigonometry with less emphasis on solid geometry.

Although Mr. Francisco Souza's interest is more in the field of mathematics, he has had the advantage of summer and academic year institutes in chemistry

We have been very successful in our college placement. To date five early acceptances have been received. Much credit should be given to Mrs. Ethel Liebmann who in our guidance department is responsible for placement.

In closing I would like to bring to your attention the success this season of our soccer and field hockey teams. Both Miss McGillick and Mr. Souza should be commended.

and physics making him a valuable teacher in our science department.

We are fortunate to have able teachers in our social studies department and I am highly pleased with their work. However, we believe some thought should be given to expanding our social studies to include more modern world history and geography and to revise the present civics classes. College Entrance Examinations Board results indicate that we are not offering enough variety in this particular field.

The credit requirements for graduation have been increased from eighty to ninety credits with music, art, physical education and club activities receiving credits. It has been two years since our school was visited by the evaluation committee of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and we are now required to submit a progress report. At present we are working on this and I find that many of the recommendations have been carried out.

Elective art seems to be a popular subject, and Mr. Robert Rayno has exhibited some excellent work that has been done in the classes.

Due to heavy scheduling of academic subjects, the number electing music appreciation is limited. The annual Christmas concert produced by our vocal and instrumental music groups was well received by people who attended.

The graduates of our commercial department are in demand in industry and those girls who continue their education in institutes of higher learning meet with outstanding success. We are fortunate in having exceptionally good teachers in Mrs. Wanda Francis and Mrs. Patricia Marujo.

I hereby submit my second report as Principal of the Westport Junior High School.

This year we have undergone several changes. In September, Mr. Mello was added to our staff. This was actually a "home-coming" for Mr. Mello, as he had formerly begun his work in our junior high department. Therefore, his return has been a pleasant one, and his readjustments and reorientation have been remarkably smooth.

The transposition of the Special Class to the High School and correlatively, the formation of a fourth division in the seventh grade also evolved this year. These unexpected changes added extra teaching duties to many of the teachers' schedules that were already sufficiently full. However, thanks to the versatility and cooperation of our teaching staff, we managed to get on with the task at hand, namely that of educating our Junior High population.

Our new guidance counselor, Mr. Smith, has been devoting much of his time and energy to our seventh and eighth graders, and his wholesome influence is far-reaching. In fact, I feel that the entire Junior High School has profited by his visitations and consultations.

Also, this year eighth grade music and art are handled by the high school supervisors, Miss Cyr and Mr. Rayno, respectively, while seventh grade music and art are directed by the elementary supervisors,

Mrs. Griffin and Mrs. Underwood. This seems to be a fair plan and works out well for all concerned.

A basketball team has been formed under the able direction of Mr. Mello. It consists of seventh and eighth graders who qualify scholastically and athletically. Since our school colors are blue and white, the team has been named The Blue Raiders. May their highest goal be that of good sportsmanship, and may they always be Champs, whether they win or lose.

Last year saw the rebirth and edition of a Junior High School newspaper. Mrs. Szaro, our capable and energetic English teacher, organized and supervised the project. It proved to be so successful and worthwhile that we decided to continue the publication of the "Head Lines". Although it is edited only three times a year, we feel its value is immeasurable. It helps to unify the seventh and eighth grade; it develops school spirit; it promotes interest in creative writing, and develops qualities of leadership and dependability - - - to mention a few of the rewards.

Each day I can see a well-knit faculty doing an admirable job of teaching; each day I can see a happy group of dedicated teachers and a delightful group of healthy youngsters continuing to seek out the marvelous goals and ideals of Horace Mann; each day I can see bus drivers and janitors alike, carrying out their duties with a particular zest that is typically Westport; and, each day I thank God for these rare blessings. For—where in the world could we see all these blessings of Liberty but in America. May God always bless our beloved America!

**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF

Dear Dr. Fogg:

In compliance with your request, I submit, herewith, my report for 1963.

In 1963, for the fourth consecutive year, there were no changes in our faculty or their teaching assignments, and there was little difference in total pupil enrolment throughout the year.

In September, however, pupil distribution, necessitated by grade placements, resulted in overcrowded conditions in three classrooms.

Among improvements made in our school buildings, we especially appreciate the painting in the cafeteria.

Replacement of school furniture for our pupils is now a matter of urgency.

School books and supplies have been received as requested. We note, especially, the addition of library reading units for grades one, two and three, the Lincoln Library, and the Encyclopedia International, a new and excellent reference.

The assignment of Mrs. Florence Lekom to clerical duties in this school one day a week has been of great help to us. Not only has Mrs. Lekom shown efficiency in carrying out the details involved in her work, but she has also indicated a high degree of adaptability, good common sense and a deep understanding of children and their needs.

A 1963 ruling of the Westport School Committee that excludes from the first grade all pupils who are not six years of age by September 1st is a most welcome decision, as it will aid in getting our first graders "off to school" with a better start.

The following recommendations which have been made previously are repeated in this report, as they still apply:

1. Supervision in the field of Physical Education.
2. Elimination of "special services" which are not essential to the school program and are a direct responsibility of the home and Community Agencies. (Valuable time could be saved here which is urgently needed to meet the requirements of our academic work.)
3. Employment of matrons (with authority and responsibility to maintain discipline) to ride our school buses.

In the area of curriculum, we are endeavoring to continue to emphasize fundamentals in our basic subjects, despite the unusual number of pressures by the proponents of "new instructional practices." Careful consideration should, of course, be given to some innovations. However, the one thing that always has improved American Education is a "concerted investment" in the individual — not in a "proliferation" of programs and projects!

In the final analysis, high quality instruction is dependent upon the competency of the teacher.

The decision of the United States Supreme Court to ban prayers in the Public Schools has left an indescribable void in the life of our school.

"To live in harmony with the truth of God, and in obedience to His laws" is the first objective of our

school and, as far as can be determined, is still one of the cardinal principles of public education.

It is my fervent prayer that we have among us "people" in sufficient numbers, who have that high quality of courage and who care enough for our children to use it, to work for the restoration of prayers in our public schools.

In Westport, as elsewhere, "people" — not "projects" will improve education!

Changes in Personnel

The summer of 1963 brought sorrow and tragedy
to the Alice A. Macomber School.

In July we learned of the tragic death of Mrs.
Grace Connor. Mrs. Connor's many years of faithful
service were characterized by her patience and under-
standing of all the children that she came in contact
with. We will always remember Mrs. Connor as a
dedicated teacher loved by all her pupils and fellow
teachers.

Mr. John Mello was transferred from the Macom-
ber School to the Factory Junior High School. Mr.
Mello did excellent work at the elementary level and I
am sure he will continue to do so at the Junior High
School.

Miss Regina Damm, a graduate of Bridgewater
Teachers College, was assigned to teach a fourth grade.

We were indeed fortunate to have Mrs. Hattie
Earle return to the school system in September as a

substitute teacher to replace Mrs. Connor. Mrs. Earle was able to teach for us until early November and we were most grateful for her services. Mrs. Voyzie Costa has been engaged as a substitute teacher for that position.

Our total enrollment is now 302 pupils, a decrease of 1 pupil over last year's enrollment.

While there have been no basic changes in the curriculum, we continue to work with all of our children to strengthen our reading program. I congratulate you, Dr. Fogg, and the School Committee on voting to hire a trained teacher in the field of Reading. It is our aim to bring each child up to his highest point of potential reading ability.

We are looking into the new mathematics program for next year. I am sure we will decide how much of it we ought to use and the level to begin such a program.

Again this year one of our sixth grades is profiting from a course in conservation and natural science presented by the Massachusetts Audubon Society. Miss Emily Goode continues to do excellent work with the class. Our children are eager and anxious for her class every two weeks and I do hope in the near future that all fifth and sixth graders may have such an opportunity.

We are most grateful for:

1. Our Portable Television Set (Some of our classes have been participating in the educational programs in Phonics and Science on Channel 2).
2. Audio Visual Aids.
Film Strips (Mathematics and Science).
Educational Films (rented).

3. Library Books.

(Main library and classrooms).

We are indeed fortunate in having such a loyal group of teachers, cafeteria workers and custodians so vitally interested in the welfare and education of our Westport children.

I would like to thank you, Dr. Fogg, and the School Committee for your help and guidance.
