Born in Little Compton, R.I. on October 6, 1876 he lived most of his life on the present Boan farm on Hix Bridge Road, having a major part in developing it from forest to one of the largest potato farms in the area. As a farm machinery agent for twenty-three years he assisted many farmers in improving their production. His interest in boats led him to ship building during World War I and to serve for fourteen years as a Landing Commissioner for Westport. For over fifty years he was a highly respected member of the Board of Public Welfare, an office he held at the time of his passing.

He realized fully the importance of work and of doing the best one could in any undertaking. His kindness and helpfulness (often anonymous) will be warmly remembered. A man of the highest integrity and character, he served Westport long and faithfully, and all who knew him felt they enjoyed a rare privilege. As a crowning tribute to him the Chamber of Commerce honored him in 1963 as "Man of the Year." He maintained an active interest in his farm and in town affairs until his death on December 14, 1964.

Report of Board of Selectmen

The Board organized March 16, 1964 with Antonio B. Gracia, Jr., Chairman and Carlton A. Lees, Clerk.

In the year 1964 your Board of Selectmen met every Monday evening at the Town Hall. Many hours were spent and many special meetings were held with members of various committees and other Boards to receive first hand information on problems confronting our town.

Detailed reports of the departments, Boards, and committees appointed by the Selectmen are printed in this report for your examination.

Lynwood Potter was appointed as Westport's first full time Fire Chief. Elmer G. Brevik, Jr. was appointed as a regular officer to the Police Department. Clifford H. Mosher, Jr. was promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

During the year two of Westport's landmarks, the Westport Point Bridge and North Westport School, were removed to make way for progress.

On May 16, 1964 the State Department of Natural Resources and the Board of Selectmen officially opened the first boat ramp to be built with State funds in the entire State.

Several new businesses located in Westport during 1964, amongst them a freight terminal, a new drug store, a furniture store, and for the first time in Westport's history, a modern up-to-date bank.

As a result of a recommendation by your Selectmen, a committee was appointed to study Westport's water needs for the future. We are happy to report that the study is now being made with the assistance of a Federal loan of \$24,500.

We were successful with the help of many of our citizens in discouraging the City of Fall River from opening a dump site close to Westport. This was done in the best interest of Westport.

We would like to congratulate our town treasurer, Alexander Walsh, for being chosen as the Outstanding Municipal Employee of the year by the Massachusetts League of Cities and Towns. Also our congratulations to the Little League all stars, it's managers and officials, on their becoming the Massachusetts State champions, and to the committee appointed to construct a float representing Westport in the Dartmouth Tercentenary parade for their outstanding job in winning first prize in the Congratulatory category.

Your Board of Selectmen would like to extend their sincere thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Albert G. Pierce and Mr. Oliver M. Cherry for their generous gift of fifty acres of land on the westerly end of Horseneck Beach.

Legislation has been initiated through our State Representative to see if the Commonwealth will dredge our harbor to relieve the present bad condition that now exists.

Much time and effort has been spent discussing harbor needs and the opening of the "Let" during the past year with representatives of town and state government.

There are many problems confronting Westport now and in the future. We want to express our thanks to the many civic minded citizens who have served the town on various committees throughout the year.

Without their help, guidance, and cooperation, you can be assured that our efforts and desires to serve you would be much more difficult.

It is with real regret that we record the passing of Samuel A. Boan. His death, December 14, 1964, ended the longest term of service as a member of the Westport Board of Public Welfare and the Bureau of Old Age Assistance in the history of the Town. He served Westport long and well in public assistance as he did in other public and private interests to which he gave his wholehearted support.

Westport is a fast growing community and the total cost of meeting all community needs, including public assistance, will be higher. Costs have risen in almost every service provided including salary rates and equipment costs.

In 1963 and again in 1964, there were State required salary rate increases in both the minimum and maximum to be paid administration workers in public assistance. These increases were in various amounts dependent upon step-rates in each salary level and amounted to a two step-rate increase to the professional workers in July, 1963 and again as of September

28, 1964. There were one-step increases for the clerical staff at the same time. Operating costs were considerably increased.

Members of the Board of Public Welfare requests increased compensation from \$500 to \$600 per year. Previous requests for such an increase have not received a favorable recommendation of the Finance Committee nor been brought before the Town Meetings. It is felt such an increase is warranted at this time.

It is noticed from the report of the Westport Master Plan Committee that the need for expanded office facilities has been recognized. It is essential that such space be made available as soon as possible because there is a complete lack of privacy for interviewing or working with clients or with representatives of public assistance or other agencies.

Hospital rates increase every year. New rates are based on hospital costs submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Hospital Costs and Finances. The average rate per day ranged from \$24.02 to \$40.79. Chronic hospital care is now available for area residents at the Earle Hussey Hospital in Fall River.

Nursing home rates are now subject to the same procedure: \$6.85 per day basic with such increases as are approved by the above-named Commissioner. The per diem rates in the nursing homes currently caring for local Medical Assistance for the Aged and Disability Assistance cases range from a low at Bristol County Home for the Aged @ \$4.25 to one @ \$6.96, four @ \$7.16, and one at \$9.00. Every effort is made to provide the most suitable nursing and/or rest home care to meet the patient's need. Medical reports from the patient's own physician must be submitted every six months with recommendations for the type of continued care needed.

It is difficult for any total annual expenditure for hospital or nursing care to reflect a true per diem rate: the actual amount paid from the appropriation remains dependent upon such resources as Blue Cross, other hospital insurances, social security, veterans compensation, other pension plans and contributions from legally liable children.

It should be noted that every item of medical care must be provided in accordance with the State and Federal approved Medical Care Plan, on the order of a physician, dentist, or other licensed practitioner, and at a rate set forth in one of fourteen fee schedules. The types of medical care needed cannot be accurately forecast: only at the end of a year can it be noted that in 1964 hospital days increased from 1089 to 1447, that more persons required nursing home care, that actual medical services would increase 29%.

Case load figures have changed. There is a lower Old Age Assistance count and a rising Medical Assistance for the Aged count. In the Aid to Families with Dependent Children group, a total of 54 cases representing 110 children were serviced during the year: an increase of 11 cases over 1963. The time it takes to obtain and enforce support orders on absent parents continues to cause concern and adds to the cost of caring for the children. Disability Assistance cases increased and General Relief cases decreased.

A case load figure in itself is not an accurate measure with which to compare the social service need. It is the problems within each case that govern the services which must be provided.

The requests for information about public assistance have increased since the widespread publicity given the programs for which federal and state funds are appropriated. Administration of these programs and the first costs are usually on the local level with

reimbursement following and dependent upon local compliance with rules and regulations. Many had not realized that the Kerr-Mills Bill had been in operation in Massachusetts as Medical Assistance for the Aged.

It is hoped that the opportunities for work, study and training being considered under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 can be made available to Westport residents.

The Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission and Public Welfare have a statement of policy under which the responsibilities of each department are defined relative to training and/or support. The length of time it takes before an applicant learns what can be done for him can be very discouraging. In general, the cost of maintenance and medical treatment is the responsibility of Public Welfare. Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission shall provide vocational counselling, guidance and supervision while a person is undergoing vocational rehabilitation.

During 1964, Massachusetts legislation and public assistance policy changes have been favorable to the elderly: a revised fuel allowance payment plan, an increased leisure time activity allowance of \$1.00 per month, continued use of pharmacy of choice in nursing and/or rest homes, substantial abatements from real estate taxes to certain homeowners age 70 and over, and a more liberal Medical Assistance for the Aged allowance from resources to the spouse remaining in the home when the other has to be in a hospital or nursing home.

The year 1964 ends with renewed emphasis on the provision of social services for the Aged and Disabled as a basis for Federal and State financial participation. It is required as a part of the application process, that each new case be studied and the potential

noted for reducing or eliminating dependency at the earliest possible opportunity.

Every case approved for assistance after January 1, 1965, or now receiving assistance must have a social study, an evaluation, and a plan of treatment completed within 90 days following the date of application for new or reopened cases and as soon as possible but not later than 12/31/65 for all others. Such social studies have been required for some time in Aid to Families of Dependent Children.

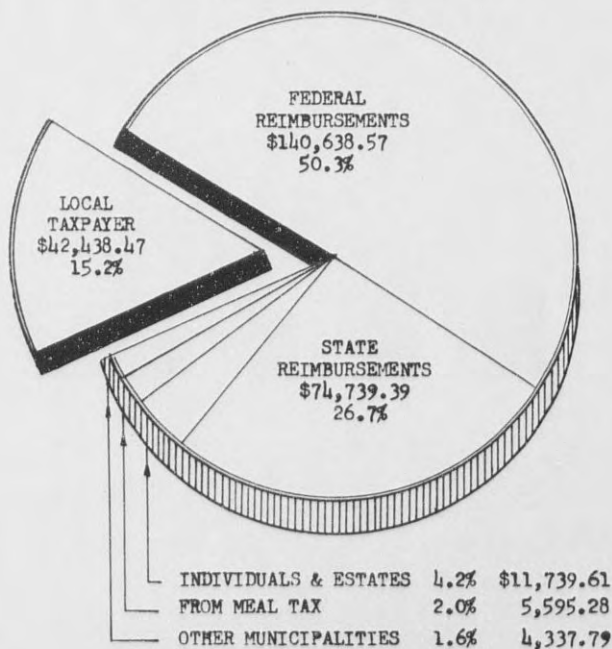
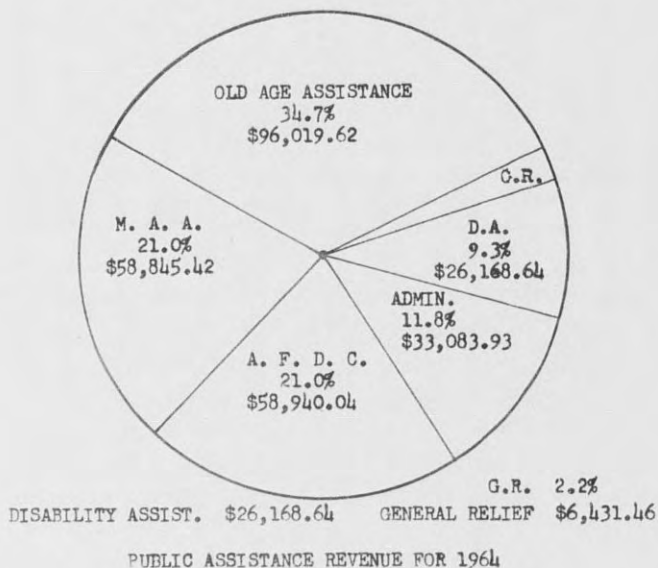

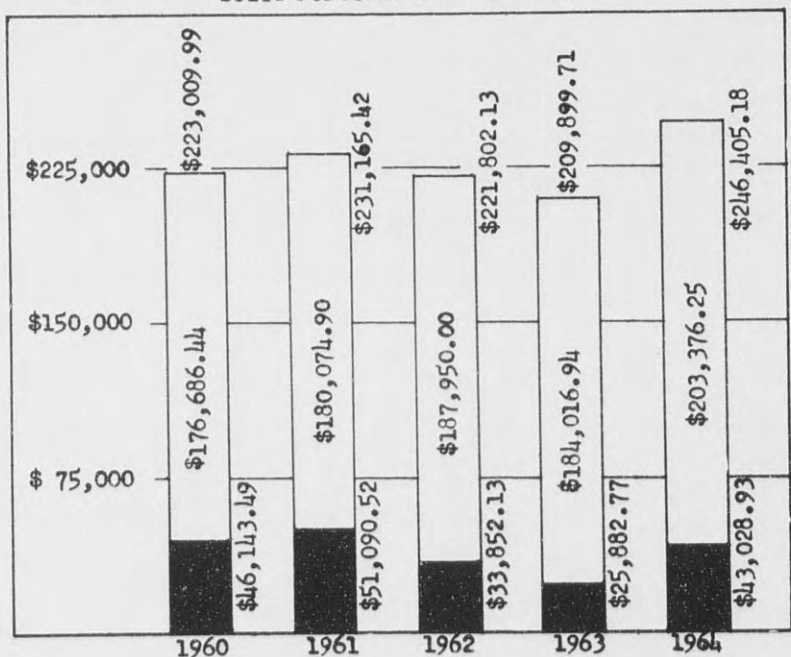

THE PUBLIC ASSISTANCE DOLLAR FOR 1964



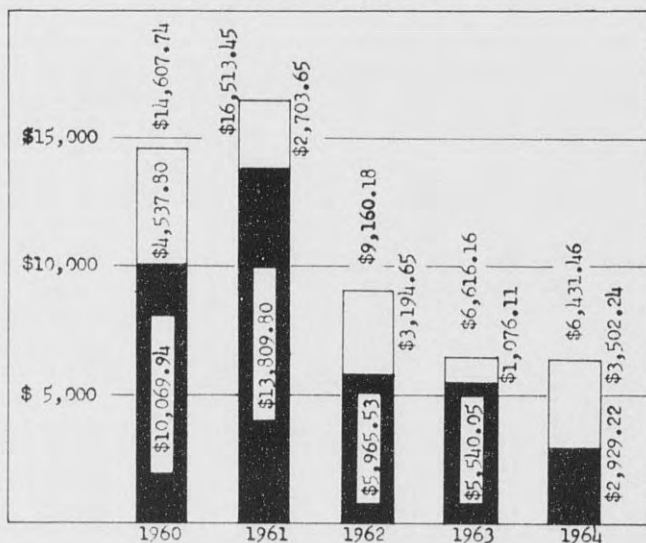
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS (ALL CATEGORIES) GRANTS

Solid Portion: Cost to Town



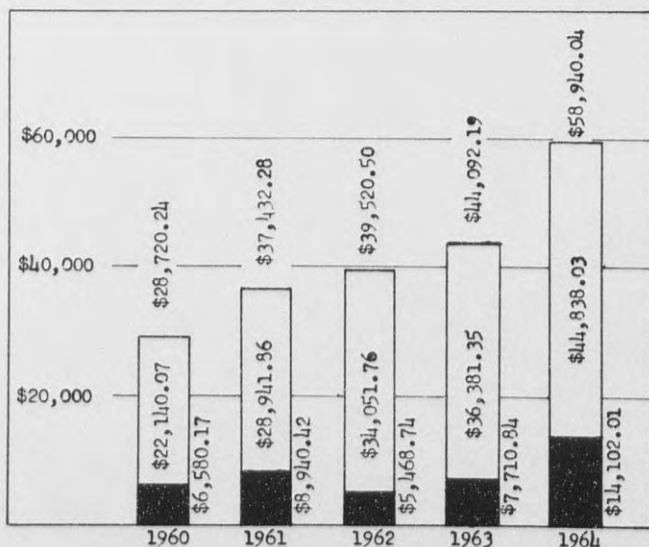
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR GENERAL RELIEF

Solid Bar: Total Cost to Town



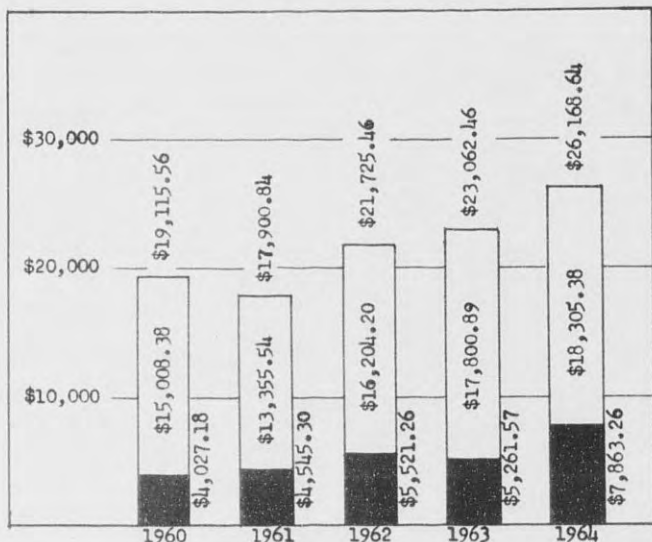
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN GRANTS

Solid Portion: Cost to Town



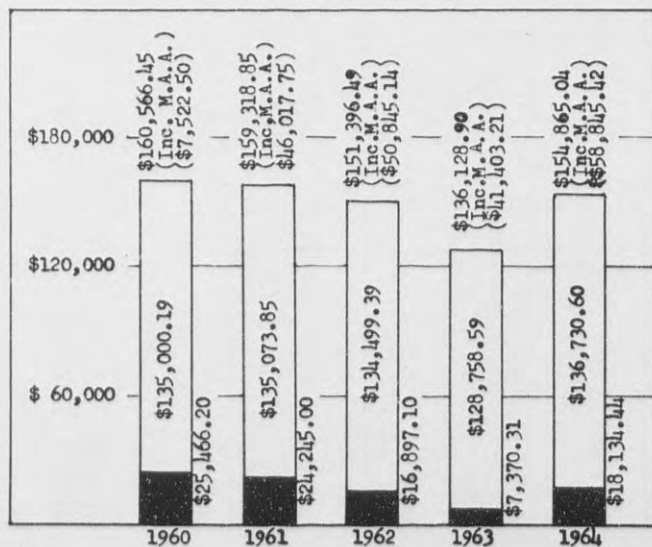
COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS

The following is a brief resume of some of the library activities for 1964:

Many non-fiction books were purchased to meet demand, among such is a set of Collier's Encyclopedia. World Book Encyclopedia was ordered for family and all-grade use, and was provided through the Imogene Weeks Trust Fund.

Our library staff is now able to supply a large percentage of source material for students, from selective lists. This is gratifying to all.

The library joined the newly-formed regional public library program, which covers the entire state.

The intent of this system is to bring about an improvement in public library service.

Cataloging of our entire book stacks has been finished by the staff. This has been a long, tedious endeavor. However, it is one of the many efforts we have hoped to realize, and we consider it one of the major accomplishments.

The crisp, fresh look of the library is also due to the efforts of the staff, as they attended to cleaning and polishing all but the floor and that was done by our janitor.

A group from the Milton E. Earle School visited for the purpose of library instruction. They were conducted by our librarian and were given many helpful suggestions.

It should be noted here of the volunteer service given by Miss Barbara Gonet, Westport High Junior. Miss Gonet gave 65 hours as an unpaid library aid during the summer. We are very appreciative of her interest. This service was given as result of an invitation to the High School students for volunteers, by the librarian.

Our librarian and a member of the staff has and is continuing taking library courses.

The Art Group continues to supply art material for our shelves and to display their creative works on the display board.

In addition to the above, several most important steps were taken to solidify library interest in the town, the goal for which we have been long-working—**an adequate public library building for the Town of Westport.**

The members of the Town Library Committee have made further study and recommendations for

1964, and these are to be as information and report to the 1965 Annual Town Meeting.

As your chairman was a member of both groups, I endeavored to have both groups including the librarian, informed as to progress of this committee at trustees' meetings, with invitations to all concerned to participate in explorations of consultants.

The Town Library Study Committee first hired the services of Miss Arlene Hope, Library Consultant, for the purpose of making site studies. This study was completed in August. Francis P. Keough, Library Building Consultant, and Director of Springfield Library was engaged as a building consultant and his report was finished in December.

The Study Committee planned for an open meeting with Mr. Keough, with invitations to all townspeople, urging especially Trustees, Town Finance Committee, Board of Selectmen, and the heads of other town boards and organizations to attend.

Upon suggestion by the Site Consultant and others, an application was filed with the Department of Library Extension, to show "intent of purpose" for Federal funds toward the construction of a library building. Instructions were to include the report of the Site Consultant.

It was not expected that funds would be forthcoming in this first allotment to towns, as we understood the fact we did not have a site, architect's plans or the town's vote for such a building. Naturally, when word was received of those towns to receive this Federal Grant Westport's name was not among them. When plans are completed and the townspeople give assent we can re-apply for this Federal Aid.

Important steps have been taken. The goal is

just that much nearer. It is close to the point of bringing decision before a town meeting.

It has been attempted to realistically study Westport's serious library needs. And it has been thought the wisest procedure to hire professional people to make an un-biased study of library problems, and then to present results of the study before the townspeople. Our aim is and has been to consider the town as a whole, and to serve fairly with a united effort. A public library serves the needs of all the people, and to these needs we have tried to dedicate ourselves.

During our October meeting the trustees were informed of the resignation of three of its members, namely: Helen E. Ellis, Rosamond F. Peirce, Secretary and Evelyn G. L. Tripp, Chairman. These resignations were accepted with regret by the Selectmen.

The places were filled in December by the following: Harriet A. Barker, Henry J. Sampson and James J. Walsh.

It is with sincere hope that major steps be accomplished in 1965. A public library is every man's golden entrance to opportunity, pleasure and understanding. Let's build that entrance with the symbol of welcome atop its central portal.

Report of the Town Library Study Committee

The Westport Library Study Committee was established according to Article 47 on the warrant of 1963 and passed at the Annual Town Meeting. This authorized the moderator to appoint a committee to continue the study and exploration of Town library needs.

The study shows the present library facilities are very inadequate and fall far below the standard requirements as set forth by the State.

Two definite steps were taken by the Committee:

1. The problem of selecting a library site was given professional consideration. Miss Arlene Hope a professional Library Consultant, was secured. Her complete report and suggestions were made to this committee.
2. Mr. Francis P. Keough, Director of the Springfield City Library, a library consultant, was secured to make a building report for Westport.

A new site was added to this report. This was not included in the previous consultant's report because the committee felt it did not want to disturb a working farm. However, it was later learned that this site was available.

Each report can be obtained at the Westport Free Public Library.

The Youth Activity Board hereby submit their third annual report:

The report by John Kelly, director of the swimming program, is as follows:

Swimming Report

The response to our second annual swimming program, although as enthusiastic as the previous year, drew a smaller number of children. During registration week instructors received and processed 326 applications. After completion of the seven week course 257 certificates were awarded.

Our smaller turnout may be attributed to the following:

1. The loss of our swimming area at Watuppa Pond thus creating a transportation problem for the heavily populated North Westport area.
2. The limited space at the Head where Watuppa lessons were scheduled; these lessons naturally coincided with swimming hours at the Head.
3. Minor factors such as vacations and one of our coolest summers in recent years.

Areas

Our existing areas again serve as our limiting factor. The loss of Watuppa Pond is doubly significant since our largest classes are located there, and it was our one area not dependent on tides. The tidal problem still exists at the Head of Westport and West-

port Point. Any pupil taking Lifesaving lessons must find transportation to Westport Point.

It is hoped that the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, parents interested in posting swimming areas, and the Highway Department in clearing these areas will encourage responsibility in keeping them clean.

Recommendations

1. The development of an area which would service North Westport.

1. The Westport Recreation Board for their work in making this program possible.
2. The Board of Selectmen and the Highway Department for their interest and effort in improving swimming areas.
3. Instructors Denise Toohey, Wilma Bor, and Daniel M. Kelly for their able assistance.
4. The parents and children for their cooperation.
5. The American Red Cross for their free rental of water safety equipment.

Approximately 100 boys participated in the soccer and basketball program, conducted at the high school by William Albanese, director.

The basketball team was entered in the Dartmouth Tournament, and although eliminated in the first game, the Tournament gave the boys an opportunity to compete with teams from other towns.

Four Charm and Poise Classes were conducted by Ruth Wallace during the year. Approximately 80 high school girls enrolled in these classes. We have long recognized that the girls of the community were

not receiving as much attention as the boys and this is an attempt to meet the need.

A request was made to the school department for land at the Alice Macomber School. Permission has not yet been granted because the school committee is waiting for a report from the building committee. However, if the use of this land is granted, playground facilities may be made available to the children of that area.

The committee approved the formation of a junior baseball league, using the facilities at the high school. For a number of years there has been a demand for a league. Little League participation ends at age 12, leaving boys between 12 and 15 without an organized program. Adult assistance in running this program will be necessary and anyone willing to offer their services should contact members of the Youth Activity Board.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Selectmen for their cooperation and all people who have assisted us in an attempt to serve the youth of the community. Special thanks to Mr. Fogg and the School Committee for their generous use of facilities at the High School and the possible use of the land at the Alice Macomber School.

Report of the Westport Planning Board

Herewith is the report of the Planning Board's many and varied activities during the year 1964, the eight (8th) year of the Board's existence.

The Planning Board was organized as follows:

The Planning Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. Thomas R. Burrell, III, as of September 16, 1964. It was unfortunate that business reasons forced Mr. Burrell to take this step. He has contributed much to the wisdom needed in the just operations of such a Board. During the past eight years, the Board has suffered through the loss of the services of Mr. William Holden, Mr. James Pilkington, and Mr. Joseph Cadime. These separations represent a loss in Planning experience. Mr. Joseph Cadime accepted the appointment to fill Mr. Burrell's vacancy from September 28, 1964 to the March election, 1965.

Members of the Board attended a total of thirty-five meetings, hearings, and field inspection trips during the year in relation to the tasks before the Board. This total is broken down as follows: 20 regular scheduled bi-monthly meetings, 8 special meetings, 1 zoning hearing, and 6 field inspection trips. Members of the Planning Board have attended conferences, lec-

tures, and demonstrations relative to Planning and Zoning. These attendances are not reflected in this report.

The members of the Planning Board contributed a total of six hundred sixty-five (665) hours in conducting Town Planning Board business.

During the year 1964, the Board reviewed, studied, and discussed a total of 28 plans presented. This total breaks down as follows: 2 definitive, 2 preliminary, 20 approval not required, but need study to determine if they conform to other provisions of planning and zoning, 4 requests relative to zoning variances or conflict of present regulations, these latter four petitions were rejected.

Once again the Board requests those who desire to develop land into house lots to meet with the Planning Board and present a rough sketch of the proposal. This procedure can save the petitioner much time and money. The rough sketch can be a pencil drawing by the land owner. In the past several elaborate preliminary plans have been rejected as unacceptable and new plans required to be drawn.

The members of the Planning Board are elected to serve on other Boards and groups interested in planning, zoning, conservation, and recreation.

At the reorganization of the Board for the year, Mr. Sydney Baldwin was elected to represent the Town of Westport on the Greater Fall River Redevelopment Committee. Unfortunately, this committee has been inactive during the year.

Mr. Arthur V. Tripp was elected to represent the Board on the Westport Soil Conservation Committee, of which he was elected Chairman. Mr. Southard was elected alternate to Mr. Tripp.

Mr. George H. Southard, III was elected to represent the Westport Planning Board on the Joint Westport-Dartmouth Rural Area Development Committee.

Colonel Cassidy was elected to represent Westport in the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Planning District. Mr. Arthur V. Tripp was elected as his alternate. Colonel Cassidy was elected by the Regional Planning Commission as Chairman for the third year. Colonel Cassidy was also elected by the Board to serve as its delegate to the Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards with Arthur V. Tripp as alternate. The Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards elected Colonel Cassidy as Vice-President, responsible for the promotion of Regional Planning in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

During the year, the Master Plan Committee meetings and review of the preliminary reports submitted by the consultants consumed much time of the Board. The Planning Board met three different times to review the completed report, which the members of the Board had studied individually, and at the last meeting considered every objection to the report that was presented to the Planning Board and voted on each objection to determine whether the objection was serious enough to render a part of the report unacceptable.

All the above objections in the report were brought to the attention of the Economic Development Associates Inc., the consultants developing the Master Plan and to the Planning Division of the Department of Commerce, Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The Consultants agreed to make the necessary corrections for insertion in the report after a special meeting of the Master Plan Committee and the Consultants.

All the material covering these corrections has been received and has been accepted by the Planning Board.

During the past year, the Planning Board dis-

cussed the philosophy of the present rules and regulations governing the sub-division land in Westport. It was deemed essential to have this review in view of the revisions of these regulations proposed by the Master Plan Consultants.

It was suggested the Town Planning Board had 3 different philosophies it may pursue.

1. To continue to administer the present and future revised rules and regulations so that the developer of the land would incur the costs attendant to developing the road net, drainage, road monuments installed, etc. as at present.

2. To adopt a less stringent set of rules and regulations and let the burden of the development of the road nets, drainage systems, etc. be borne by the Taxpayer.

3. To adopt a less stringent set of regulations after the Town Meeting had adopted a betterment law.

Much discussion was held by the board on this subject; same was presented to the members of the Master Plan Committee. It was practically the unanimous opinion that the Planning Board should continue with its present philosophy that the developer who reaps the profit from the sub-division of land into houselots should absorb the costs entailed. The developer passes along any costs to the purchaser of the lot. The Planning Board has not and will not require of land developers any unnecessary installations. The philosophy of the Town Government should in the layout of roads develop the new roads so as to install the necessary drainage, road monuments to tie the road to earth, and other safety and health factors now required by the Planning Board.

A total of 2 new preliminary plans with a total

of 13,300 feet of road nets were presented to the Planning Board for consideration. The Board in company with a road design engineer inspected both sites and made note of several costly factors to both the developers and the Town. The Planning Board must not only look to the necessary installations for the development of the land encompassed in the plan, but must also take into consideration the land on either side of the plan and the land in the rear of it.

A third petition presented to the board for the development of a section of a partially developed plan encompassed a cross connector street; to construct this street as present regulations apply would in the opinion of the road design Engineer hired by the Planning Board, cost in the neighborhood of \$7,000.00. This added to the approximate cost of developing the 2 preliminary plans submitted, if roads and drainage were developed in accordance with present Planning Board requirements, would approach the staggering total of about \$240,000.00. These are costs that must be paid for by someone. The town, when a development is completed and sold, will inherit increases in town government expenditures as a result of the increase in population.

During the course of the year, 2 road layouts were presented to the Planning Board for consideration and recommendation.

1. Faulkner Street—This plan requested consideration of reducing the width of the road from 40 ft. to a lesser size to avoid a cesspool in the middle of the accepted public way. The Board in this matter determined that to reduce the size of a road from the town regulated width of 40 ft. to a lesser width was unsafe. The Board also felt that it or any other town government agency did not have authority to reduce the width of an accepted road, unless Town Meeting

so voted. Other factors were considered relative to this situation; it was felt that in this case that 3 town government agencies were lax in the performance of their functions. The Board desires to point out that none of the present town government agencies members are involved in the cited laxity. Further thought was that to bring this situation into court would in all probability cost the Town about \$350.00 to \$400.00. So it was verbally suggested the town purchase the necessary materials to rebuild this cesspool on the land of the present owner and use town labor, thus avoiding the necessity to reduce the width of the road from the 40 ft. width voted by town meeting.

2. Cherry & Webb Lane—This road layout presented for consideration and recommendation was studied and it was decided that the Planning Board could not recommend approval as the planned layout cut across 3 lots of a plan studied in 1960 and as a result of the proposed new road layout, 3 sub-standard size lots (less than 20,000 sq. ft.) were established. Here again the Planning Board felt that the article voted and passed by Town Meeting did not grant any town government agency the authority to establish sub-standard size lots. Secondly, the plan presented did not tie this road to the earth by indicating road monuments; this is considered very necessary to avoid duplication of engineering costs and for legal protection of the town. Other considerations were that the layout as presented showed from the plan presented in 1960 that this road layout would be below high water mark, thus making the construction of a sea wall necessary for the protection of the road once constructed.

Report of the Town Conservation Committee

Westport Board of Selectmen

Gentlemen:

During 1964, the Conservation Commission initiated a survey of the natural resources of the Town. An inventory of the salt marshes in the Westport River is nearing completion. Inventories of other natural resources of value of the Town in terms of economic, esthetic and recreation will be completed in order of urgency.

Evaluation of that portion of the Town Forest bounded on the East by Route 88 and on the West by Beech Grove Cemetery was completed by State forester Alden Cousins. Forester Cousins rated the quality of the Town Forest as poor, and drew up a long-range plan for improved conservation management of the Forest. First step of this management plan will be initiated as soon as the necessary funds are made available to the Commission. A plan for recreational use of the Town Forest will be included in the overall management blueprint.

An investigation was conducted in 1964 of Town land in North Westport which might be acquired for public recreation. Presently this site is also being tested as a possible source for the Town water supply.

On December 14, a deed was conveyed to the Selectmen for a tract of 50 acres known as Cherry Beach. The gift to the Town, of this valuable beach, marsh

and woodland property by Albert G. Pierce and Oliver M. Cherry, was made possible solely through the efforts of the Conservation Commission.

The Westport Conservation Commission will accelerate its efforts to advocate wise use of the Town's natural resources and provide areas for public recreation in 1965.

Annual Report of the Greater Fall River Vocational School District

This is the first annual report of the Greater Fall River Vocational School District and the first year in which we have had an operating budget. Through the efforts of a hard-working and dedicated school committee, we can look back with pride and satisfaction upon a year of accomplishment.

On July 1, 1964, the District hired a superintendent-director for the new school. His salary was prorated on a 50-50 basis with the City of Fall River.

With the superintendents of schools of Fall River, Somerset, Swansea, and Westport serving as educational consultants, it is proposed to offer eleven areas of training at the high school level and six areas of training at the post secondary level. Educational specifications are now being drawn up for all these courses of study. The facilities in this school will also be used for the training and retraining of adults in afternoon and evening courses, for trade extension programs and for short unit courses.

On September 26, 1964, the District filed an application with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for an advance interest-free planning loan for the new regional vocational-technical high school. We are happy to report that this request was granted on January 29, 1965 and we have been awarded a \$161,000 planning loan for architect's fees. This award will

save thousands of dollars in interest to the District and postponed our incurring debt by at least eight months.

The committee devoted many hours and days in their search to obtain the best possible architect for the new school. They interviewed many firms, visited many schools and talked with superintendents and school committees. On December 28, 1964, the firm of Korslund, LeNormand and Quann was selected to do the architectural work for the new school.

In closing this report, may I commend the school committee for their cooperation and their devotion and dedication to the principle of providing the finest vocational-technical education for the people of this area.

Report of Civilian Defense

Gentlemen:

Civil Defense equipment has been placed in several town departments. There are radiac meters in each of the Fire Dept. and the Police Dept. The Highway Dept. has generators and portable lighting equipment for night rescue work. Our office has communications system, water testing equipment and sound projector for training purposes.

Westport has 2 Federally stocked shelters, one at the High School and the Town Hall. We have a mobile radio unit and a rescue truck. Our Department has received \$5,200. worth of surplus equipment at a cost to the town of \$433.55.

We are updating our warning system with 2 outdoor sirens that will be installed shortly.

Our project for 1965 is to train people to man the shelters that we have. We cannot expect, in a time of emergency whether it be a hurricane, flood, tornado or any disaster man-made or natural, to place over 300 people in these shelters without some supervision and training. We hope to be able to train at least one person in each family in Medical Self-Help.

Time after time in the aftermath of natural or man-made disasters throughout the country, the work of Civilian Defense comes into the news. The main objective of Civil Defense is to train people to re-act promptly to pre-arranged plans and training. This training begins in the home and on up through the Town Departments.

The following is my report for the year 1964.

The Board of Selectmen voted that the Installation of Gas Services (Bottled or Natural) and Gas Appliances in the Town of Westport be in accordance with the State Regulations and that all such installations require a permit and an inspection by the Town Gas Inspectors. Mr. Roland Imbeau was appointed Gas Inspector and Mr. Albert H. Field, Asst. Gas Inspector.

There have been a total of 95 permits taken out in the six month period in 1964 this has been in effect.

The fee established for each permit is \$3.50 with the inspector receiving \$2.50 of this amount for his services and expenses. With this system of fees and payments to the inspector, the program will be self supporting and will be administered at no cost to the taxpayer.

Applications for permits for gas installations can be obtained from either gas inspector, the Police Department at the Town Hall, and the North Westport Fire Station. Every effort will be made to provide prompt inspections, however, as the inspectors work only part time, it also requires the cooperation of the person taking out the permit.

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NEW RATES AND PROVISIONS FOR ESTIMATING TAX UNDER THE REVENUE ACT OF 1964

1964

THESE CHANGES ARE NOT APPLICABLE TO YOUR 1963 CALENDAR YEAR RETURN

This publication is designed to assist taxpayers in estimating income tax for 1964 in accordance with the reduced rates and other changes made by the Revenue Act of 1964. Form 1040-ES, previously distributed, should be completed by using the reduced rates and the changes of the new Revenue Act.

SUMMARY OF PRINCIPAL CHANGES

1. Dividends credit and exclusion.—The 4 percent dividends received credit is reduced to 2 percent for dividends received in 1964, and is repealed for subsequent years. The \$50 dividend exclusion is increased to \$100 for 1964 and subsequent years.

2. Investment credit.—You are no longer required to reduce the basis of property which qualifies for the investment credit by the amount of the credit. The basis of any such property which was reduced in a prior year should be increased as of the first day of the year beginning in 1964 by the amount of the reduction required in a prior year.

3. Sick pay exclusion.—To figure your sick pay exclusion you must first determine whether your "sick pay" is: (1) more than 75 percent of your weekly rate of pay; or (2) 75 percent or less of your weekly rate of pay.

(1) Over 75 percent—

If you receive more than 75 percent of your weekly rate of wages for periods of absence from work because of illness or injury, there is now a 30-calendar day waiting period before you qualify for the exclusion. The amount to be excluded is limited to a rate not to exceed \$100 a week.

(2) 75 percent or less—

If you receive 75 percent or less of your weekly rate of wages, the waiting period is 7 calendar days, but the exclusion is limited to a rate not to exceed \$75 a week. The waiting period does not apply if you were hospitalized at least one day during your absence. After 30 calendar days the weekly rate of exclusion is increased to an amount not to exceed \$100.

The exclusion for periods of absence which began before January 1, 1964, is to be computed under the 1963 rules.

4. Sale of residence by taxpayers 65 years of age or over.—If you sold property for \$20,000 or less on or after your 65th birthday which was owned and used by you as your principal residence for at least 5 of the last 8 years any gain on the sale need not be included in income. If the property was sold for more than \$20,000 part of the gain must be taken into income.

5. Deduction of certain State and local taxes.—No deduction is allowed for automobile tags, drivers licenses, or for alcoholic beverage, tobacco and selective sales or excise taxes (such as those on admissions, room occupancy, etc.) even if they are separately stated or imposed on the purchaser.

6. Casualty loss deduction.—The deduction for personal casualty and theft losses is limited to the amount in excess of \$100 for each loss.

7. Charitable contribution deduction.—An additional allowance of up to 10 percent may now be taken for contributions made to or for the use of one of the following types of organizations:

(a) Federal or local governmental organizations where the gift is made exclusively for public purposes, and

(b) A corporation, trust, or community chest, fund, or foundation organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, if such organization normally receives a substantial part of its support (other than from its own efforts) from the general public or an organization referred to in (a) above.

8. Medical expense deduction.—The 1 percent limitation on medicine and drugs no longer applies to the taxpayer and his wife (husband) if either is age 65 or over; or to the father or mother of the taxpayer or his wife (husband) if the parent is 65 or over and is a dependent of the taxpayer.

9. Expense for care of children and other dependents.—The deduction for these expenses is now also available if incurred while your wife is institutionalized or incapacitated for 90 consecutive days, or a shorter period if terminated by death and for the care of children up to age 13 (formerly 12). If you have two or more dependents, the limitation for deductions has been raised from \$600 to \$900.

The \$4,500 limitation on income in the case of working wives has been raised to \$6,000 and extended to include husbands whose wives are incapacitated. This limitation, however, does not apply to any period the wife is institutionalized for 90 consecutive days or a shorter period if terminated by her death.

10. Moving expense deduction.—Generally, employees, including new employees, can deduct, in arriving at income on line 1 of the Tax Computation Schedule on page 2 of Form 1040-ES, unreimbursed moving expenses (transportation of your household goods, and members of the household, and their meals and lodging while in transit). The deduction is allowed only if the taxpayer's new place of work (a) is at least 20 miles farther from his former residence than was his former place of work, or (b), if he had no former principal place of work, is at least 20 miles from his former residence.

11. Interest on loans on certain insurance and annuity contracts.—Generally, if you pay interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to pay premiums on life insurance contracts, endowment contracts, or an annuity and you are following a plan of systematically borrowing amounts equal to the increase in the cash value of the insurance contract to pay part or all of the premiums, then that interest is not deductible.

12. Interest on certain deferred payments.—Generally, if you sell property for an amount in excess of \$3,000 on the installment basis and part or all of the payments are due more than 1 year after the date of the sale or exchange—if no interest payments are specified or if "too low" interest payments are specified then part of each payment due after 6 months is to be treated as interest rather than as part of the sales price.

13. Retirement income credit.—

(a) Change in rate: The rate to be used in computing the credit has been reduced from 20 to 17 percent for 1964.

(b) Special rule: The maximum amount of retirement income to be used in figuring the credit for retirement income has been increased from \$1,524 to \$2,286 for taxpayers who file joint returns (both 65 years of age or over) but are presently limited to \$1,524 because either the husband or wife did not have earned income in excess of \$600 in each of any 10 prior calendar years.

In such cases the retirement income credit may be estimated by substituting \$2,286 for \$1,524 on line 2, Part VIII, Schedule B, Form 1040, and by making the joint computation in either column A or B of the schedule.

14. Standard deduction.—You may now elect to use the 10-percent standard deduction, as before, or the new minimum standard deduction. However, if your wife or husband elects the minimum standard deduction then you also must use it. The minimum standard deduction is computed as follows: \$200 (\$100 if married and filing separate returns) plus \$100 for each exemption claimed on Schedule A of your return, including exemptions for age and blindness. The deduction is limited to \$1,000 (\$500 if married and filing a separate return). Consideration should be given to this provision in determining the amount to be entered on line 2 of the Tax Computation Schedule on page 2 of Form 1040-ES.

NOTE: Some of these changes are not applicable in the case of fiscal year taxpayers. Consult your District Director for full details.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To either of the Constables of the Town of Westport, in said
County. Greetings:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to assemble at their respective polling places, namely:

PRECINCT A—LEGION HALL

PRECINCT B—MUNICIPAL OFFICE BUILDING

PRECINCT C—GREENWOOD PARK SCHOOL

on Monday the ninth day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to choose the following officers, viz: one Selectman, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Health one member of the Board of Public Welfare, two members of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner and two Trustees of the Free Public Library each for three years; also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: four Landing Commissioners, Tree Warden, also the following officer, one member of the Planning Board for five years; also one member of the Regional District School Committee for two years; also to vote on the following question, viz: Number 1 "Shall an act passed by the General Court in the year nineteen hundred and sixty-four, entitled, 'An act providing life tenure for certain members of the Highway Department of the Town of Westport' be accepted," all to be voted for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the High School Auditorium on Tuesday the seventeenth day of March next, it being the second Tuesday after the second Monday of said month at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To determine the salary and compensation of all elected town officers.

Article 2. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be considered necessary to defray the Town's expenses for the year 1964 and appropriate the same to the several departments and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1964 and until the annual town meeting in 1965 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90, Highway Construction, to be used on the Main Road, Old County Road and Horseneck Rad or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to tar and gravel Tyler Street and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to pave Faulkner Street, and take any action relative thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of Monroe Street as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of Cleveland Street as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of Cornell Road as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to resurface and complete Johnson Street in accordance with layout accepted by the Town in 1934 and 1952, and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Hillside Street, and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of D Drive and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Rock Street from President Avenue to Hemlock Street and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout 350 feet of Cherry & Webb Lane from Bridge St. and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a street light on Main Road, pole No. 70874 and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a street light on Faulkner Street and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for one street light on corner of Drift Road and Charlotte White Road Extension and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for one street light on corner of Main Road and Charlotte White Road Extension, pole No. 72698 and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for one street light to be installed on pole No. 72914, American Legion Highway, Route 177 and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install one street light on Bridge Street and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to correct drainage conditions on Blossom Road, Drift Road and other roads as the occasion arises and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will establish a Dartmouth Tercentenary Celebration Float Committee and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to rescind Article 2 of the Special Town Meeting of May 31, 1962 which authorized expenditure of a maximum of \$300.00 per year for the outside repairs of the Town Infirmary Building and vote to allow the expenditure of all funds accumulated in a special fund realized from the payment by the tenant for the maintenance of the property normally considered the responsibility of the landlord and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to repair the outside of the Town Infirmary and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to sell to the Noquochoke Hall Association Inc., for consideration a portion of the Town owned land lying on the south side of Hix Bridge Road and immediately adjoining the Noquochoke Hall Association Inc. on the west. The portion to be conveyed to contain at least two hundred (200) feet frontage measured from the Noquochoke Hall Association Inc. property westerly along the south line of Hix Bridge Road and going back the entire depth of the Town owned property.

Article 29. To see if the town will convey three (3) parcels of Tax Title Property listed on Assessors records as: Lot No. 13 Plan 45 (4 acres), Pt. of Exter wood lot, former owner T. Lundy (2 acres), Pt. of Exter wood Lot, former owner Clara Thompkins (2 acres) and a separate parcel known as the Town Forest, to the Westport Conservation Commission and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 30. To see if the town will sell to Henry Arruda land in the Assessors records as Lot #31 Plan 52 and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the town will accept the report of the Town Library Study Committee and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the library study committee appointed by the moderator for 1963 to continue and serve as an interim committee; said committee to make its further recommendations to the town at a special or regular town meeting, at the discretion of the committee, and that the town appropriate the sum of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars for expenses of said committee.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$900.00 in accordance with the recommendation of the Department of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the control of algae in the South Watuppa Pond, said funds to be used only in the event a like amount is appropriated and used for the same purpose by the City of Fall River and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 34. To see if the Town of Westport would authorize the Moderator and the chairman of the Board of Health to appoint a committee to study the possibility of instituting the collection of rubbish and garbage by the town or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 35. To see if the town will adopt the following resolution: Resolved that it is the will of the people of the Town of Westport, that the Selectmen and/or Board of Health deny any and all licenses (renewals included) for the establishment or maintaining of a piggery within 500 feet of the property of another unless written permission is obtained from said property owner.

Article 36. To see if the town will accept the report of the Department of Public Works Study Committee and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to adopt an amendment to the Town By-Laws, as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall providing for the establishment of a Department of Public Works and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 38. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Body Sander for the Highway Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a truck for the Highway Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Pick-up truck for the Highway Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Snow Plow and all attachments for new truck for the Highway Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a cruiser car for the Police Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 43. To see if the town will include under the terms laborers, workmen and mechanics, as those terms are used in the General Laws, Chapter 152, Sections 68-75 inclusive, as amended, all employees of the Town regardless of the nature of classification of their work except teachers, supervisors, superintendents, principals and other professional employees in the school department; members of the Police and Fire forces; and elected officials and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the Board of Selectmen to appoint a full-time Fire Chief and rescind the adoption of the provisions of Section 42, Chapter 48 of the General Laws and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 45. To see if the town will vote to purchase the property on Route 6 belonging to Rene and Alice Routhier for Fire and other departments use and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 46. To see if the town will vote to adopt an amendment to the Town By-Laws, as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall providing for the appointment of an inspector for gas piping and gas appliances in buildings and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 47. To see if the town will vote to authorize the establishment of a Junior High School Study Committee for the Town of Westport, said Committee to consist of the School Committee plus three Westport citizens to be appointed by Town Moderator, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 48. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray expenses of janitorial service, property protection, electricity and heat that may be incurred by the school committee in connection with the Committee's contemplated liberalized policy in connection with the public use of school buildings, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 49. To see if the town will accept provisions of Section 8a of Chapter 130 of General Laws; which will allow police officers employed on a full-time basis, to have the authority granted to coastal wardens in regards to lobsters and crabs.

Article 50. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to construct and maintain a suitable boat ramp and parking area in the Westport Point area, so that trailered boats may be launched in safety, and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 51. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install and maintain additional buoys in the Westport River and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 52. To see if the town will vote to amend the Soil Conservation By-Laws as follows: In Section 1. Eliminate sentence which reads "The members of the Board shall consist of the Selectmen, two members of the Board of Health, the Building Inspector and the chairman of the Finance Committee, who shall from time to time hold office in said Town." and substitute the following sentences, "The members of the Board shall consist of one member of the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Health and Finance Committee, Each of these members shall be appointed by their respective Boards and an alternate should be designated in the same manner to serve in their absence.

Article 53. To see if the Town will adopt Trailer Regulation amendments as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 54. To see if the Town will adopt Zoning Regulations amendments recommended to the Selectmen for their consideration in accordance with the General Laws, Chapter 40A, Section 6 and amendments thereto, such amendments as published in newspapers and posted on bulletin board of Town Hall and explained at a Public Hearing, or take any other action deemed proper under circumstances.

Article 55. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

Article 56. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400. in accordance with Section 11, Chapter 660 Acts of 1948 for Gypsy Moth work and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 57. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. in accordance with Section 13, Chapter 761 Acts of 1949 for Dutch Elm Work and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 58. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,374.00 for Pension Fund and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 59. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000. for Insurance on Town Employees under Chapter 32B of the General Laws and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 60. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the Stabilization Fund and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 61. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,000. from free cash for the reduction of the Tax Rate.

Article 62. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the Reserve Fund and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 63. To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the town's charges for the year ensuing.

The polls will be open for the balloting for the officers and questions contained on the official ballot at ten o'clock and shall be closed at 8:00 P.M.

And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting five or more attested copies thereof in as many public places within said town at least seven days before the time of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

Article 53. A motion to amend Section 1, as amended, Article 15, of the By-Laws regulating the installation, maintenance and use of house trailers by striking out Section 1, excluding Sections 1A, 1B, 1C and 1D, and substituting therefor the following: was carried. Yes 135. No 7.

Section 1. No trailer, located upon any land in the Town of Westport, shall be occupied for living, business or any other purpose; and no trailer shall be placed upon land for storage purposes except when authorized by a written permit from the Board of Selectmen.

Such permit shall be issued only —

1. After written application had been filed with the Board of Selectmen.
2. After a notice shall be published by the Board of Selectmen once in a local newspaper at least three (3) days prior to the public hearing.
3. After the applicant for the permit shall give written notice to the abutter or abutters of the property on which the permit is applied for by Registered Mail, Return Receipt requested, at least three (3) days prior to the hearing on said permit, and
4. After the Board of Selectmen hold a public hearing, they shall then act upon the application.

No permit for business or other purposes shall be issued for a period of more than one year from and after the date of such hearing. No permit for living purposes shall be issued for a period of more than 6 months in any single year except:

1. A permit may be issued to an applicant for a period not to exceed 18 months (with no extensions or renewals) while the applicant is in the process of constructing a house.
2. A permit may be issued without a public hearing for any reason for a period not to exceed 30 days.
Each trailer shall be removed from the land after expiration of any permit issued under this By-Law.
Permits granted for the storage of trailers need not comply with Section 1B, 1C, and 3 of Article 15.

Article 54. A motion to adopt Zoning Regulation amendments recommended to the Selectmen for their consideration in accordance with the General Laws was carried: Yes 102. No 13.

Section II. Definitions.

Amend by inserting the following definitions:

9. "Sign—Any structure or part thereof attached thereto or painted or represented thereon, which shall display or include any letter, word, model banner, flag, pennant, insignia, device or representation used as, or which is in the nature of an announcement, direction or advertisement: The word sign does not include the flag, pennant or insignia of any nation, state, or other political unit, or of any educational, charitable, philanthropic, civic, professional, religious or like campaign, drive movement or event."
10. "Sign, Area of—The area of a free-standing sign includes all lettering, wording, and accompanying designs and symbols,

together with the background, whether open or enclosed, on which they are displayed. The supporting framework, open or enclosed, may be part of the design, but for purposes of this By-Law shall not be considered part of the sign area unless used for lettering, wording or symbols. When the sign consists of individual letters or symbols attached to or painted on a surface, building wall or window the area shall be considered to be that of the smallest rectangular or other regular shape which encompasses all of the letters and symbols."

Section VI. General Regulations.

Amend by inserting a new section VI-B as follows:

VI-B Signs

1. The provisions of Section 29-33, Chapter 93 G. L., (relating to outdoor advertising,) and the Rules and Regulations adopted thereunder by the Outdoor Advertising Division of the Department of Public Works, are hereby made a part of this By-Law.
2. Nothing in this By-Law shall be construed as to abrogate
 - a. the town's control under Ch. 87, Section 9, governing signs placed on shade trees, enforceable by the Tree Warden;
 - b. the town's control under Ch. 85, Section 8, over signs placed within a public way, enforceable by the Selectmen;
 - c. the town's control under Ch. 111, Section 123 to 125, governing Board of Health action against nuisances.

Article 55. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

Article 56. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1400.00 in accordance with Section 11 Chapter 660 Acts of 1948 for Gypsy Moth work.

Article 57. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1400.00 in accordance with Section 13 Chapter 761 Acts of 1949 for Dutch Elm Work.

Article 58. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$23,374.00 for Pension Fund.

Article 59. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$16,000.00 for Insurance on Town Employees under Chapter 32B of the General Laws.

Article 60. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$25,000.00 for the Stabilization Fund.

Article 61. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 from free cash for the reduction of the Tax Rate.

Article 62. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 for the Reserve Fund and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$3,251.82 to be transferred from Overlay Surplus and the balance of \$6,748.18 to be taken from Revenue of the current year.

Article 63. Voted: (Unanimously) that all the town's charges for the year ensuing be raised from taxation and available funds.

Voted: (Unanimously) that we now adjourn.

It is the policy of the School Department to issue no-school bulletins or announcements through Stations WSAR—Fall River, WNBH and WBSM—New Bedford, and WPRO—Providence, whenever driving conditions are, or promise to be, **dangerous**. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be tuned in from 6:30 A.M. to 7:30 A.M. for no-school decisions.

Weather conditions in a given area at a given time are still largely unpredictable. Therefore, there will be days when, with the best of intention, buses will be sent when they should not, and not sent when they should be.

Parents will have to use their own judgment in determining whether their children should attend school under adverse weather conditions. When attendance is poor because of weather conditions, no new work will be presented by the teachers.

The following reports as submitted by the Superintendent were approved by the School Committee.

Superintendent's Report to the School Committee

December, 1964

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as Westport's superintendent of schools, it being the seventy-sixth such report submitted in the history of the Westport superintendency. This seventy-sixth report seems especially important as there are strong indications that Westport is on the edge of substantial growth which will be reflected in its educational needs, and in the general characteristics of the town.

In my previous reports I have listed the major educational and material gains that we have made during each year without reviewing those of previous years. I shall continue this custom in the present report, listing the advances made during 1964.

Educational and Material Gains During 1964

1. Adoption of aural method of teaching French in the Junior High and High Schools which concentrates on speaking the language as the first objective, with reading and writing becoming later objectives.
2. We are now able to offer five years of sequential French and at least three of Latin.
3. A comprehensive testing program involving achievement and mental ability is in full operation.
4. Ability grouping is now being practiced wherever practicable throughout the school system. This grouping is not static. Pupils can go from one group to another as accomplishment dictates.
5. Formal physical education has been introduced in the grades.

6. A needed additional teacher has been added to the Junior High and to the Earle School faculties.
7. The so-called new mathematics has been introduced in the high school and in the fast divisions of grades six, seven, and eight. We are in the process of working down through the grades in this field.
8. New equipment has been obtained in the audio-visual field for the Junior High and High Schools; a new calculator for the commercial department; science and physics equipment has been added to and updated under the National Education Defense Act; school library offerings have been improved; household arts equipment has been updated and provided with needed items of additional equipment; filing cabinets have been provided for the Junior High School; Worn-out office machines have been replaced in the central office, and the long-existing need of improving the loud-speaker system in the high school auditorium has been met.
9. During the past summer the Head of Westport School and the Milton Earle School have been re-decorated. Modern, adjustable seating has been provided for the Earle School Grade Six. (The sixth-graders had outgrown the old furniture.)
10. New fluorescent lighting has been provided in the playroom of the Point School. This was done in cooperation with the Westport Art Group.
11. An extra part-time teacher has been obtained to care for the increased enrollment in manual training at the High School.

Major Needs For 1965 (And After)

1. Substantial redecoration of the interior of the High School.

2. Development of the newly acquired land at the Earle School.
3. Arrival at a definite conclusion in regard to the direction that school housing needs should take in providing for future education in Westport.
4. Taking the first steps in providing this new school housing need.
5. Obtaining a reading specialist for the grades, as provided for in the 1964 budget, but whom we have not as yet been able to obtain.
6. Providing a summer school program in the field of reading and English for those pupils at the secondary level who really need and want it. This could lead to a needed revision of our high school curriculum to provide a more beneficial program for about one-seventh of our student body. This is a need that high schools everywhere are finding.
7. I repeat an item that I spoke about last year, and which as the years go on, will become vitally necessary in all school systems. "If you wish our school system to fully respond to the educational needs and challenges of our time, you must begin to provide in the annual budgets for "resource" people. No unassisted superintendent of schools can keep abreast, nor find time to carry out, all that can and should be done in all the new avenues that are being opened." I congratulate the Westport School Committee upon their awareness of this fact, and upon their response to such recommendations as I have made in connection with this need.

School Building Possibilities To Consider

1. Building a new Junior High School to house grades 7-8-9, leaving grades 10-11-12 in the present high school building. This would allow room for anti-

cipated high school growth, and would allow the use of the present Factory and Head Schools for elementary growth. If this were adopted the town's school system would be on the so-called 6-3-3 plan (six elementary grades, three junior high grades and three senior high grades).

2. Building a new senior high school and taking the present high school for a Junior High building. (Grades 7-8-9 going in to the present high school building; grades 10-11-12 going into the new building). This would allow for the updating of the present high school program as well as providing much more adequate quarters for the junior high program. In the case of either #1 or #2 above, common facilities could be shared in connection with the gymnasium and auditorium — possibly some shop facilities.
3. Using the present high school plant as a so-called "Middle School" which would house grades 6-7-8, with grade 5 a possibility for inclusion at a later date as the town grows. If this were adopted new elementary schools or additions would not have to be considered in the foreseeable future. This would involve building a new senior high school for grades 9-10-11-12. Our schools would then be on a 5-3-4 system, and eventually a 4-4-4 system (4 grades elementary; 4 grades—middle school; 4 grades senior high school.)

I suspect that in the long-run #3 would be the best educationally and financially for the town. The greatest immediate capital outlay would probably be represented by #3.

About Teaching and Teachers

What makes teaching difficult is the emotional exhaustion brought about by constantly paying atten-

tion to the job at hand for periods beyond the natural limitations of the human temperament. For example, the attention span of the average college-trained adult is about twenty minutes. At the end of twenty minutes, the average adult has to sharpen his pencil, go to the next fellow's office, light a cigarette, or make a telephone call -- he has to do something.

The attention span of children ranges, as we might expect, from one or two minutes to ten minutes, or perhaps fifteen minutes. But the teacher must concentrate his attention on his class (and all that is happening in it) for continuous stretches of thirty to fifty minutes, sometimes even sixty minutes. The teacher can't let his attention wander or shift to another subject every fifteen or twenty minutes.

The experienced teacher knows that his students soon will break their attention to his words, however glorious they may be; and so that teacher deliberately breaks class attention one or several times during a class period. The effective teacher will shift the pupil's attention from paper work to board work, from reading to reciting, from discussion to quiz. But the teacher stretches his own emotional reserves beyond their normal resiliency every working hour. That is why he is tired at the end of a seemingly short working day; that is why he is tired when the summer vacation period arrives, unless he has learned to pace himself much as a trained swimmer or athlete has learned to do.

While on the subject of teaching and teachers, it might be well to remind ourselves that although we are living in the age of teacher emancipation, teaching is still somewhat akin to the ministry and priesthood, and that self-restraint is expected of us, and rightly so. Example is still more important than precept,

and what might be acceptable as conduct in other groups, is not necessarily acceptable for teachers.

In Conclusion

Our nation and state are on the edge of great educational change as well as economic and social change. Westport, in addition, is on the edge of a great increase in growth. This growth will be precipitated by Westport's favorable location on the coast between two cities, by the increasing shortage of available land in our area, by the establishment of the Southeastern Massachusetts Technological Institute, and by the population explosion across the country.

I wish to congratulate the Westport School Committee for its awareness of present educational needs and its concern for the shape of things to come in Westport's plans for the future. To those Westport teachers who think first of their obligations as teachers, and only secondly of themselves, I say may your example be an inspiration to all of us.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT TO SUPERINTENDENT

December 23, 1964

Dr. Laurence A. Fogg

Dear Dr. Fogg:

As Principal of the Westport High School, I hereby submit my annual report:

Changes in Personnel

Mrs. Barbara Wordell returned to the physical education department, and Miss Gloria McGillick was assigned to the elementary schools. Miss McGillick continued as basketball coach.

Because of the increased enrollment in our industrial arts department, it was necessary to add an additional teacher on a half-time basis. We were fortunate in obtaining the services of Mr. Clayton Emery, who has a background in this field.

It is encouraging to note that this is the only change in personnel at the high school. A stable faculty is necessary for the improvement and development of the curriculum.

Changes in Curriculum

A course in basic reading and writing skills was developed. Mr. Larrivee reports that the students are made to learn a list of function words which signal the presence of certain types of grammatical structures. The student learns that when the grammatical structures are expanded, there result five basic patterns which all sentences follow. He can determine

to which of the form classes any form word belongs by applying it to four different test frames—standard pattern sentences in which a key word has been left out. It is believed that if a student can distinguish between the form classes and the structure groups, and can identify each of the five basic sentence patterns, he will learn to avoid sentence fragments and run-on-sentences, as well as other errors, and will improve his punctuation. Moreover, with a knowledge of sentence patterns, he should more readily understand what he reads.

A debating club has been added to the list of student activities. Many schools are members of a debating league and schedule contests with each other; we hope to enter this competition soon.

The English department reports some of the highest PSAT scores, a median percentile of 86, since the inception of an organized department. This is encouraging and future PSAT and CEEB scores will be carefully noted.

A new approach has been made in the teaching of French. Mr. Martineau and Mr. Marchand attended a workshop to better understand the method used in teaching *Voix et Images De France*. Since September 1962, 2,500 schools have introduced this method, which is an aural-audio-visual approach.

The traditional French has stressed reading and writing. The new French course is aimed at conversation development, which would seem more important for the majority of students.

All the elementary algebra classes are using the modern mathematics. After reviewing many text books we finally selected Houghton Mifflin's, *Modern Algebra, Structure and Method*. We believe that this book will help the student understand the basic structure of algebra.

The math department, and Mrs. Barbara Belden in particular, devoted a great deal of time and thought in the development of this program.

Work on a course of study for geometry, using the modern concepts, will be undertaken. This will require a new text book, which we hope to select early in the year.

Progress

Our vocational homemaking classes continue to attract many 9th and 10th grade girls. In addition we had twenty-five 11th and 12th grade girls elect a special homemaking course. I believe that the value of such a course cannot be over estimated and I am pleased with the increased enrollment.

Our annual FFA fair was bigger than ever. This is a credit to Mr. Joseph Szala and the young farmers who devote many hours on this project.

The judging teams, in competition with the county schools and other high school departments, have shown to advantage.

More equipment has been added to our physics department. This was purchased through the National Education Defense Act, Title III, which is a matching appropriation with the town paying half the cost. Mr. Francisco Souza and Mr. Frank Martineau worked many hours on this project. The course will be more effective with the use of this equipment.

Mrs. Liebmann reports on the annual survey of graduates that of the class of 1964, 35% are attending four-year colleges or universities, 7% are attending junior colleges and 23% other post-secondary schools, which include nursing, business schools, or technical institutes.

Our soccer team finished second in the Bi-State League. At the end of the regular schedule, we were

tied with New Bedford High School for first place, but were defeated in the play off by a 1-0 score. Credit to Mr. Souza and the boys on the squad is certainly in order.

Our special education class, under the able guidance of Mrs. Kelliher, seems to be progressing satisfactorily.

The great majority of our teachers are dedicated to their work, and have the interest of the children at heart. Because many teachers have not been mentioned in this report, it does not mean that their efforts have not been appreciated and noted.

The two-year progress report submitted to the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools was approved. The committee stated that it was well pleased with the progress that has been made and hopes that in the next three years, before the five-year report is due, progress can be continued.

New Equipment

In addition to the physics equipment, mentioned previously, the following was added:

- 1 tape recorder for the English department
- 1 pitching machine
- 1 Dryfax Copying Machine

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you, Dr. Fogg, and the committee for your assistance and guidance in making whatever progress has been accomplished possible. I feel that this has been one of our most successful years.

Dear Dr. Fogg:

In compliance with your request, I herewith submit my report for 1964.

Our teaching staff has remained the same except for the addition of another Mathematics teacher, Mrs. Dorothy Smith, who was transferred from the Macomber School to the Factory School, is teaching eighth grade mathematics.

This year there has been a change in the location of the seventh and eighth grades. The Head School houses grade seven, while the Factory School houses grade eight. This shift was necessary because of the size of the present eighth grade.

We have added the teaching of the new mathematics to our curriculum, with only our fastest-working groups in grade seven and grade eight attempting it. Both Mrs. Kelley and Mrs. Smith inform me that the pupils have met the new mathematics with much enthusiasm, and the results have been quite good.

French, which was taught only in grade seven, is now being given to the eighth grade in the hope of developing more continuity in the teaching of a foreign language. The Clinton Method of teaching French (which we are trying for the first time this year) is showing remarkable results, and makes one audibly aware of the wisdom of this new approach.

Despite the fact that our pupils carry an unusually weighty academic load, they work hard and strive to achieve our highest goal, the Honor Roll. Consequently, our Honor Roll continues to be long and impressive,—a fact which is especially gratifying to the entire Junior High Faculty.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to you and the School Committee for all the school equipment and supplies which have been so generously provided for us, for without the use of such media we could not perform satisfactorily. I would also like to express my gratitude for Mrs. Lekom's clerical help, which, though it be one day a week, is invaluable.

I close with the prayer that God may give us the wisdom and understanding to always do that which is spiritually, morally and educationally right for the children of Westport.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF MILTON E. EARLE SCHOOL

In compliance with your request, I submit, herewith, my report for 1964.

In 1964, a number of faculty changes took place.

Mrs. Dorothy H. F. Wescott, who had served the Westport Schools for eleven years, and the Milton E. Earle School for nine of them, retired in June. Mrs. Wescott's work was characterized by her conscientious effort to do "her duty as she understood it." We wish for Mrs. Wescott, now residing in West Brooksville, Maine, good health and deep contentment in her retirement years.

Mr. James Wills, a 1964 graduate of the Bridgewater State College and a resident of Fall River, was assigned to teach a fifth grade class here, effective September 1, 1964.

In September, also, Mrs. Voyzie Costa, who taught previously at the Alice A. Macomber School, was named building assistant. Her duties include assistance in all routine matters and work with children in grades 1-6 where the classroom teacher feels that "extra help" will be of value to them.

In August, Mr. Arthur E. Reynolds, our former janitor, passed away. Mr. Reynolds served from 1958 until his retirement in 1962 because of ill health. He served the pupils and teachers of the Town of Westport over a long period of years. Mr. Reynolds was a quiet, wholesome gentleman who took pride in maintaining "the cleanest school in Westport." In spite of meager recompense, he showed a devotion to his duties which we all could well emulate.

We acknowledge, with thanks, improvements to the school plant in 1964, and those anticipated in the near future which include painting the auditorium and extension of playground area by the development of the land acquired several years ago.

Our chief problem, and one which becomes increasingly serious each year, is the lack of proper discipline on some school buses. Our children are too frequently subjected to situations which are not only detrimental to their safety, but to their morals as well. Once again, I repeat my request that matrons (with the authority and responsibility to maintain proper conduct) be employed to ride on our school buses.

"Every good and excellent thing stands moment by moment on the razor edge of danger and must be fought for."

In education, this profound statement takes on new and alarming significance. All around us and among us are those, who are constantly attempting to destroy the basic foundations of our educational systems and those who are unwittingly a party to their schemes. Their plans include such significant matters as the rejection of the spiritual and moral in education, the encouragement of mediocrity, and the introduction of violent and sudden changes in our methods and materials of instruction.

To you, to the Westport School Committee, and to the citizens of Westport, we pledge our continuing efforts, to absorb new theories and habits only after long and careful experience and to work for and defend those sacred and sound educational philosophies, policies, and procedures, which have been tried and proven over the years, to be "good and excellent" for our pupils.

In compliance with your request, I submit herewith my report for 1964.

Changes in Personnel

Mrs. Cecilia Gamache resigned to accept a teaching position in Michigan, her home state. We were sorry to have Westport lose a very capable and conscientious teacher, but we do hope that Mrs. Gamache might be able to return to Westport in the near future.

Mrs. Dorothy Smith was transferred to the Factory Junior High School to teach Mathematics.

Mrs. Mary Kelly, who taught in Warren, Rhode Island, was assigned to teach Grade 2.

Miss Sally Billington, a graduate of the University of Massachusetts, was assigned to teach Grade 3.

Mr. John DeFusco, a graduate of Fitchburg Teachers College was assigned to Grade 6.

Our total enrolment is now 353 pupils — an increase of over 50 pupils from last year.

Several of our grades this year have 35 or over pupils per classroom. Many new homes are being built in this area and I am sure that additional classroom space will be necessary in the near future.

At the sixth grade level, in addition to the regular mathematics program, the children are in the process

of studying new approaches and different phases of modern mathematics. We hope to introduce it in Grades 4 and 5 during this academic year.

This year all elementary grades are having a regular Physical Education Program.

Miss Gloria McGillick is in charge of all groups except the sixth grade boys. Mr. Clayton Emery, a high school teacher, is taking two groups of sixth grade boys.

The children are very enthusiastic with the program and we feel physical fitness is being developed by this adequate Physical Education Program.
