ALEXANDER WALSH

Alexander Walsh was born in Fall River, Massachusetts in 1876, one of six children. His family moved to Westport in 1906, and he has been a North Westport resident ever since

He went to work in the cotton mills at an early age. As he grew older, he attended evening classes at a Fall River business college. When he moved to Westport, he became a farmer and teamster.

Mr. Walsh was elected Town Treasurer in 1936 and has served continuous'y for the past 30 years. In 1962, he was named "Man of the Year" by the Westport Chamber of Commerce. In July 1963 Mr. Walsh was named the "Outstanding Municiple Employee' By the Massachusetts League of Cities and Towns.

Alex Walsh has served our town well, we wish him well in his retirement.

ALBERT C. WOOD

Born in Westport, November 3, 1895. Educated in Westport Schools and attended Rogers & Allen's Business school in Fall River.

Married Priscilla I. Robinson of Fall River in 1917. Lived in Fa'l River 22 years, moving back to Westport, December 20, 1939 at 855 Main Rd

Appointed to the Registrar of Voters in 1942 and announced his candidacy for office of Tax Collector in January of the following year. Elected in March,1943 and held the office of Tax Collector since that time; nearly 25 years of public service.

Mr. Wood is a very active and ardent sportsman, having a life membership in the Fall River Rod & Gun Club.

Report of Board of Selectmen

The Board of Selectmen organized March 15, 1965 with Alford Dyson, Chairman and Antonio B. Gracia, Jr., Clerk.

In the year 1965 Westport saw its biggest building boom since the town was incorporated in 1787.

As a result of the growth and the construction of interstate highway Route 195 through our town, many homes were displaced. We also received requests from many of the businessmen located on Route 6 for an East Bound exit ramp on Route 195 in order that those desiring food and lodging would be able to reach Route 6 with a minimum of effort. In as much as this request has a direct bearing on the future economy of Westport, thirteen meetings have been held to date with local businessmen, town, state, and Federal officers. While we have not been successful to date in this respect, we will continue every effort to obtain this exit ramp which will benefit the whole town.

Three new police officers were appointed in 1965, Joseph A. Levesque, Ernest Nunes, and Alfred F. Candeias. Also for the first time two Policewomen appointed, Mrs. Jessica Pearce and Mrs. Thelma Candeias.

A 1966 Oldsmobile ambulance and a police boat was purchased, with the approval of the annual town meeting, for the protection of the health and safety of our citizens.

Plans for the construction of bathing facilities at the town beach were put out to bid in 1965, however, due to the bid prices exceeding the money appropriated and legal problems involved construction has not begun It is our desire in 1966 to provide these necessary facilities and to continue the service of a life guard for the protection of those using our town

beach. 1965 also saw the Patrolling of the South Watuppa Pond by the Police Department for the protection of its citizens.

During the year 1965 saw the opening of a new shopping center on Route 6 and a notification from the United States Post Office Department that a new Post Office building will be located on Route 6 in 1966.

Regarding many of the Federal programs, our town became part of the war against Poverty, also of a regional program known as the O.E.D.P. committee that would provide planning for the future of our town and for uplifting the region economically. Westport became part of a regional beautification program that is designed to make our town and surrounding areas more attractive and to promote the beautification in these areas.

On June 2, 1965 a report was presented to the Board of Selectmen from the Water Study Committee that was appointed in 1963. At a special town meeting in 1964 authorization was given by the townspeople to have an engineering study made of Westports water needs. In the year 1966 we hope to implement some of the aspects of this report. We wish to commend the Water Study Committee for their untiring efforts to date.

The Board of Selectmen have opposed the annual assessment that our town is required to pay as our share of the Bristol County Hospital District. It is our feeling this assessment is unfair to us and we will continue to oppose it.

Reports of committee departments and Boards appointed by the Selectmen are printed in this report for your examination.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to the many citizens who have given their time by serving on committees or in any way or another lent their hand during the year for the benefit of our town.

Our scallop crop for this year has far surpassed that of previous years. At this time we have a tremendous set of scallop seed and if it survives will produce a far better crop next year. Many bushels of seed scallops have been moved from areas in which they cannot survive, to better areas.

The year 1965 can be described as a year in which greater emphasis has been placed on the quality of services given to supplement financial assistance to needy persons. Local Offices are being supervised more frequently by the state workers and in accordance with federal requirements. Two state audits have covered the periods 7/60 --6/61 and 7/61-6/62.

Increased federal participation in the reimbursment to the communities was small in 1965: inA.F.D.C. it was increased to include children 18 to 21 attending

certain schools of higher education and to include the other adult parent when need was caused by illness or unemployment. Costs increased in many nursing home rates, in an additional hospital charge for new born babies, and in an increased leisure time activity allowance in Old Age Assistance. Deductible resources increased with the larger social security payments. Widows at age 60 and more of the older persons have become eligible for social security payments for the first time.

It should be noted that members of the local Board of Public Welfare are concerned about the liberal allowances and policies now in effect. Every possible resource from earnings, income from boarders, contributions from relatives, as well as potential income from these and any other source must be investigated and made available to the recipient. Detailed information relative to personal property, automobiles, and property holdings continues to be as important as ever. A person must avail himself of every resource, including unemployment compensation and/or social security benefits, when an applicant for or a recipient of public assistance.

In addition to the usual assistance and services there has been information to pass on to the recipients relative to training courses available through theOffice of Employment Security, protection under the Civil Rights Act, hospital care and medical insurance effective 7/1/66 under the Social Security Act, vaccination and immunization programs in co-operation with the Health Department.

The year 1966 will see even more changes as the provisions of the Social Security Act become effective. Increased federal reimbursement on a recipient count basis increases from \$54.00 to \$57.50 each per month in O.A.A., from\$46.50 to \$50.00 in D.A., and from \$20.50 to \$22.00 in A.F.D.C. Federal reimbursement

in administration expense is expected to remain about the same.

There will still be the hospital costs not covered by social security as the "insured" person's initial obligations under the Medicare program to be considered in planning.

Public Welfare will continue to be represented in the Community Action Committee planning. Norman Gifford and Elzear Chabot have been attending the local meetings.

There is still need for more office space: privacy is needed for interviews, space is needed for reference material and for filing Reports and registers become a regular part of every new service provided and must be available for review and audit. Every member of the staff has found it necessary to assume more responsibilities and is certainly quite aware of the importance of that certain detail that can make a difference between a full cost to the town or a lesser cost when federal and state monies have contributed a part.





THE PUBLIC ASSISTANCE DOLLAR FOR 1965





THE PUBLIC ASSISTANCE REVENUE FOR 1965





Solid Bar: Cost to Town





Solid Portion: Cost to Town




COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR DISABILITY ASSISTANCE GRANTS

COMPARISON OF EXPENDITURES BY YEARS FOR GENERAL RELIEF GRANTS


Top of Bar: Expenditures --- Open Bar: Reimbursements Solid Bar: Total Cost to Town

During 1965 the hours of the library services were increased to 35 hours per week enabling us to remain open the same time every day. 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon 2:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Monday thru Saturday. Also 6:30 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. Monday and Thursday evening. This regular schedule has received much favorable comment and has resulted in an increase in circulation of over 16%.

The Youth Activities Board hereby submits its annual report for 1965:

The report of Mr. John Kelley, director of the Swimming Program is as follows:

At the completion of our third annual swimming program, 304 pupils had each received fifteen lessons at their own particular level. It was noted that over one-third of these pupils enrolled at the beginner and advanced beginner classes. While the initial steps of learning to swim are certainly to be encouraged, we would hope that even more children would take advantage of the developmental swimming skills presented in the Intermediate and Swimmer classes. Since swimming skills are beneficial both for survival and recreational purposes, not limited to boys or girls, and may be enjoyed throughout life, we urge all to take advantage of this program.

AREAS

Once again our lessons for the Watuppa Area were held at the Head of Westport. This is far from an ideal situation since it creates transportation problems for the children in the Watuppa Area. It is the opinion of the instructors that at least 100 more pupils would enroll in classes if an area were available at the Watuppa Pond.

The Head of Westport has vastly improved since the beginning of our program. The sand along the river bottom has contributed much to the safety in the area, although some debris still finds its way into the river. Our chief limiting factor at the Head still concerns the tidal problem, as our lessons naturally coincide with the swimming hours for children not enrolled in classes.

Westport Point is somewhat limited by tide and current. It is currently the only area available where lifesaving classes may be taught.

INSTRUCTORS

The resignation of Miss Denise Toohey and Miss Wilma Bor were accepted with regret. They were replaced by Miss Louise Woltman and Mr. Jeffrey Kelley, who performed their duties capably.

We wish to convey our thanks to director Bob St. Amour and all men serving as managers, coaches and umpires, for a job well done. We also wish to acknowledge the efforts of the ladies auxiliary for providing extra activities for the Junior League.

The soccer and basketball programs, under director Bill Albanese, again received good response with about 120 participating. In addition to the recreaational aspect of these programs, they serve to prepare boys for participation at high school level.

To meet the needs of the girls, it has been difficult to find activities that will appeal to a large number. However, the charm and poise classes, which received good response last year, were continued again this year. We think that the enthusiasm shown surely justifies the continuation of this program.

As was reported last year, a request was made to the School Department for land adjacent to the Alice A. Macomber School for use as a playground. However, it is apparent that due to the anticipated expansion of school construction, the School Department undestandably has not been able to release this land at this time. It is therefore recommended that a site at some other location be obtained if a play-

ground is to be developed in the near future. Because of its large area, Westport, of necessity, should eventually develop more than one playground. However, we recommend that this first site be located in the area of greatest population density.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Selectmen for their cooperation, and all people who have assisted us in an attempt to serve the youth of the community. Special thanks to Mr. Fogg and the School Committee for their generous use of facilities at the High School.

Report of the Wesport Planning Board

Mr. Alford Dyson, Chairman Board of Selectmen Westport, Massachusetts

Gentlemen:

The Planning Board begins its Annual Report for 1965 by urging anyone who desires to develop land into house lots to meet with the Planning Board before having formal plans made. The owner should come to this meeting with a rough sketch showing what he proposes to do, but this sketch may be in pencil and may be made by the owner himself. The reason for urging is that in the past some owners have appeared before the Board for the first time with expensive formal plans which have had to be completely redone.

At the organization meeting in March, Borden C. Tripp was elected Chairman, and Arthur V. Tripp was elected Secretary.

On April 21st the Board accepted with regret the resignation of Sydney Baldwin as a member of the Planning Board. His doctor's orders forced Mr. Baldwin to take this step, which was a loss to the Planning Board.

During 1965 the Planning Board stamped 8 plans "Approved", 20 plans "Approval not required", and 2 plans "Approval not Required for for Registry Purposes only." It is noted that "Approval not required for Registry Purposes Only" was devised by Colonell Cassiddy and appoved by the Planning Board to meet situations where no subdivision is involved, where the

owner wants to have his plan recorded and where the owner cannot meet with the statutory requirements for "Approval not Required."

It is noted that three of the plans stamped in 1965 were substantial duplicates of plans stamped in previous years and lost by their owners. The Planning Board notes that people with stamped plans can save themselves from unnecessary trouble and expense by having them recorded promptly.

The Planning Board wishes to express its thanks to Joseph R. Cadime for accepting appointment to the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. Burrell in 1964. At the end of 1964, when two members of the Planning Board were ill, Mr. Cadime by his faithful attendance and sound judgement kept the Planning Board operative.

The Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee and its Superintendent-Director devoted the entire year to: land acquisition, firming areas of instruction to be offered, writing and approving educational specifications, and reviewing and approving preliminary and final plans for the new 1,200 student Diman Regional Vocational-Technical High School.

On February 28, 1965, a formal contract for the planning of the school was signed by the committee with the architectural firm of Korslund, LeNormand & Quann, Inc., of Norwood, Massachusetts.

As a result of considerable research, consultations with industry and the State Department of Vocational Education, two areas of training were added to the post of secondary program; namely Beauty Culture 'səuiyəzM ssəuisəng pur

Receipt of checks totaling \$152,512.75, an interest-free loan from the Housing and Home Finance Agency to cover costs of archtectural and engineering services for preliminary and final planning, eliminated the necessity of appropriating money for this purpose by the member communities.

A six-man Advisory Building Committee, experienced in the construction field, was appointed by the committee to assist in the planning of the school. The committee wishes to express their appreciation to the Advisory Committee members for their valuable assistance and guidance during the planning period.

A check in the amount of \$17,418.00 was received by the District from the State Department of Vocational Education as its 1965 share of the state allotment from the Vocational Act of 1963. This money is to be used solely for capital cost purposes. It is estimated that the Greater Fall River Vocational School District will receive \$116,000 in fiscal 1966 and \$116,000 in fiscal 1967 from this source.

The original target date for breaking ground for the school had been established for late January or early February, 1966. However, on August 26, 1965. Public Law 89-136, "Public Works and Economic Del velopment Act of 1965," was passed by the United States Congress. This Act provides, under Title I, grants for Public Works and Development Facilities. Upon investigation, it has been ascertained that vocational schools do comply with the provisions of this Act and that the District could be eligible for 50% of the total construction and equipment costs.

On October 22, 1965, at a meeting attended by District School Committee members, city and town officials, and representatives from Bond Counsel, it was unanimously agreed that any further steps relative to advertising of bids, awarding of contracts, and authorizing bond issues be postponed until the federal grant situation was clarified.

The Superintendent-Director is presently engaged in filing the necessary application for a Public Works Grant, which, if approved, could mean a savings to the member communities of \$2,500.000. It is hoped

that favorable action will be taken on the application in the near future, and that construction of this muchneeded vocational-technical high school can begin in late spring.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Perini Construction Company, Montaup Sand and Gravel, and Kay-Locke Construction Company for their assistance in supplying an estimated 100,000 yards of fill for the school site, at relatively no cost to the District.

To the many Federal, State, City, and Town officials, upon whom we have called for assistance and guidance, our sincere thanks for their support and cooperation.

On behalf of the entire committee, we wish to express our sincere appreciation to the Superintendent-Director for his boundless energies and untiring efforts, his valuable guidance, and his devotion to vocational education.

In closing, I would like to commend my fellow school committee members for giving so unselfishly of their time, for their cooperation and their dedication to the ultimate goal in order that we might provide the finest vocational-technical education for the youth of this area.

During the past year Civil Defense of Westport acquired, at no cost, a 200 bed emergency hospital unit that cost the federal government \$125,000. This Hospital unit consists of medicine, operating equipment, X-Ray and emergency lighting equipment. A refrigerator was also purchased for \$400. that cost the federal government \$900.00.

A Fork Lift that cost the federal government \$7,000. was acquired by the town for \$100.00.

Also two $2\frac{1}{2}$ ton amphibious trucks or ducks, originally costing the federal government \$20,258. were acquired by the town for \$250.00 for both.

I have other equipment ordered, but am waiting for federal release, so as yet it is not in my inventory list.

In order to make my department more effective in time of need, I have sent men to school for courses in radiological instruction, rescue procedures and medical self-help.

I hereby submit my annual report for the year 1965.

The Board of Selectmen voted that the installation of gas services (bottled or natural) and gas appliances in the Town of Westport be in accordance with the State regulations and that all such installations require a permit and an inspecion by the town gas inspectors.

There have been a total of 280 permits issued during the year 1965.

The fee established for each permit is \$3.50 with the Gas Inspector receiving \$2.50 of this amount for his services and expenses. With this system of fees and payments to the inspector or assistant inspector, Mr. Albert H. Field, this program is self supporting and administered at no cost to the taxpayer. In addition the sum of \$280.00 was turned over to the Town Treasury..

Applications for permits for gas installations can be obtained from either gas inspector, the Police Department at the Town Hall and the North Westport Fire Station. Every effort will be made to provide prompt inspections. However, as the inspectors work only part time, it also requires the cooperation of the person taking out the permit.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING - 1965

To either of the Constbles of the Town of Westport, in said County.

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to assemble at their respective polling places, namely:

PRECINCT A—LEGION HALL
PRECINCT B—MUNICIPAL OFFICE BUILDING
PRECINCT C—GREENWOOD PARK SCHOOL

on Monday the eighth day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to choose the following officers, viz, one Selectman, one Moderator, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Health, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, two members of the School Committee, two Constables, one Fish Commissioner and two Trustees of the Free Public Library for two years to fill vacancy; also the following officers for the vear ensuing, viz: four Landing Commissioners, Tree Warden, one Fish Commissioner to fill vacancy, two Trustees of the Free Pubic lLibrary to fill vacancies, one member of the Planning Board to fill vacancy, also one member of the Planning Board for five years; also to vote on the following question, viz: "Shall the town extend contributory group hospital surgical and medical insurance to elderly persons retired from the service of the Town and to their dependents with fifty per cent of the premium cost, a portion of the admistrative expense and the payment of a surcharge or subsidiary rate to be paid by the Town?" all to be voted for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the High School auditorium on Tuesday, the sixteenth day of March next, it being the second Tuesday after the second Monday of said month at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act on the following articles viz:

Article 1. To determine the salary and compensation of all elected town officers.

Article 2. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as to be considered necessary to defray the Town's expenses for the year 1965 and appropriate the same to the several departments and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Tresurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1965 and until the annual town meeting in 1966 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General laws.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action relative thereto-

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90, Highway Construction, to be used on the Main Road, Old County Road and Horseneck Road or take any action in relation theretc.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the town will accept the report of the School Needs Study Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to establish a School Building Committee to consist of the School Committee and three members appointed by the Moderator-

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (15,000.) to be used by the School Building Committee for obtaining preliminary building plans and specifications, educational specifications and making of site studies, in connection with developing a definite recommendation for new school housing in Westport; said recommendations to be made to the town at the next regular, or a special town meeting, at the discretion of the school building committee.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to defray expenses of janitorial service, property protection, electricity and heat, that may be incurred by the School Committee in connection with public use of school buildings, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars \$(5,000) to be expended by the school committee for the purpose of developing additional playground space at the Milton E. Earle School or take any action relative thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$2,457.77 as Westport's share of the cost of purchasing land from the City of Fall River to be used as the site of a new vocational-technical high school.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to pay the Greater Fall River Vocational School District the sum of five thousand three hundred dollars (\$5,300) from the Stabilization Fund.

Article 15 To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$1,731.44 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional Vocational School District's operating budget for 1965.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to ratify the action of the Board of Selectmen in signing releases of the North Westport School to the Department of Public Works under date of August 26, 1964, and take any other action relative thereto-

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used by the School Committee, for the purpose of completing the fence, repairing the backstop, building dugouts and doing such other work as may be necessary to put the high school grounds Little League Field in good condition.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to accept the report and recommendations of the Library Study Committee.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for obtaining land for a Westport Free Public Library and acquire by purchase, donation or eminent domain and take any action relative thereto-

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to adopt an amendment to the Town By-Laws as posted on the bulletin board in the Town Hall providing for the establishment of a Department of Public Works and take any action relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to set a fee for permits for the use of the Town Beach, and to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to acquire by donation, purchase or eminent domain land located on East Beach Road, to make the Town Beach contiguous and take any action relative thereto

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be used to construct Bathing Facilities on the Town Beach and to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to amend Section 1, as amended, Article 15, of the By-Laws, regulating the installation, maintenance and use of house trailers by the addition of the following:

Section 1E Notwithstanding the six month limitation in Section 1, a yearly permit may be issued for living purposes only, to those persons who have attained the age of sixty-five (65). No permit issued under this section shall be renewed or transferred unless the recipient has attained the age of sixty-five (65), except that a permit may be transferred to a surviving husbano or wife of person without regard to age.

Any trailer maintained under a permit granted under this section shall be removed from the land when such permit expires or is revoked or terminated by the licensing Board.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to amend the Trailer Regulations, Article XV, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding thereto the following:

Section 1F Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1a, 1b, 1c and amendments thereto, any person licensed under Chapter 140, Section 32B of the Massachusetts General Laws by the Board of Health to have an overnight camp, may also be granted a special permit by the Board of Selectmen allowing trailers, not to exceed at any one time, to occupy space in such camp.

Such special permit issued under this section, unless previously suspended or revoked, shall expire on December thirty-first in the year of issue, but may be renewed annually without hearing.

The Board of Selectmen may establish a fee for permits issued under this section.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to add an additional paragraph Section 12; of the Soil Conservation By-Law to read as follows:

"The Soil Conservation Board and their officers or agents may, as far as they deem it necessary in carrying out the Soil Conservtion By-Laws, enter upon any lands in the town of Westport to make examinations and surveys and to place and maintain markers." and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to strike out the second sentence of section 1, Article XI the Soil Conservation by-law which reads as follows: "The members of the board shall consist of the Selectmen, two members of the Board of Health, one member of the Planning Board, the Building Inspector and the chairman of the Finance Committee who shall from time to time hold office in said town," and to substitute therefor the following: "The members of the board shall consist of one member of the Board of Health and the Finance Committee. Each of the members shall be appointed by their respective organizations and an alternate shall be designated in the same manner to serve in the absence." and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,071.00 in accordance with the recommendations of the Department of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the control of algae in the South Watuppa Pond, said funds to be used only in the event a like amount is appropriated and used for the same purpose by the City of Fall River and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will authorize Wilfred C. Driscoll, Representative of the 12th Bristol District to file legislation granting tenure of office to Pub'ic Health Nurses of the Westport Board of Health.

Tenure to be granted to all present permanent Public. Health Nurses of the Westport Board of Health who will satisfactorily complete three (3) years of service.

It is recommended that the law shall so be worded that the Public Nurses on tenure can be discharged only in compliance with General Laws, Chapter 31, Section 43.

The law when enacted shall be placed on the ballot as a referendum for the consideration of the voters."

Article 30. To see if the town will adopt a resolution thanking Mr. and Mrs. Albert G. Pierce and Mr. Oliver M. Cherry, donors of the gift of land at Westport Point to the Town of Westport and take any action relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following resolution: Whereas—the general court sitting as a Constitutional Convention, did on July 16, 1963, give initial approval to a Home Rule amendment to the State Constitution, and—Whereas—this bill of rights for local governments requires a second approval by the members of the General Court during this legislative session, and—Whereas—we, as members of this Town Meeting, feel competent to handle the affairs of our town without strict supervision by the Commonwealth of our every act and deed. Now therfore be it resolved that this town meeting hereby instructs its representatives to the General Court to vote in favor of the Home Rule proposal (H 1384 of 1963 as revised) when it comes before them, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a truck for the Highway Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Snow Plow and attachments and to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 3%. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a combination shoval and backhoe and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase an ambulance for the town and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 36 To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of cruiser car for the Police Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a Police boat for the Police Department and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be used for the safety of the citizens of Westport to patrol the South Watuppa Pond, similar to what is presently being done on the Westport River, and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 39. To see if the town will ovte to appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purchase of a Carry-All for the Fire Departmennt and to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a well at the Central Village Fire Station and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be used for obtaining land for a fire Station and/or other future town departments, and to acquire same by donation, purchase or eminent domain and to take any other action relative thereto.

To see if the town will vote to mend Section III of the Zoning By-Law (Article XIV of By-Laws of the Town of Westport as set forth on page 6 of the pamphlet, entitled Proposed By-Law Revision, and prepared by Economic Development Associates, Inc., with the Westport Master Plan Committee, and take any other action relative thereto.

Articl 44. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be used for dredging the harbor, said sum, of money will be Westport's share of the overall cost and to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 45. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install and maintain additional buoys in the West Branch of the Westport River and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 46. To see if the town will assume liabilities in the manner provided by Section 29 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by Chapter 5, of Acts of 1955, for all damages that may be incurred by work to be performed by the Department of Public Works of Massachusetts for the improvement, development, maintenance and protection of tidal and non-tidal rivers and streams, harbors, tidewater, foreshores and shores along a public beach, including the Merrimack and Connecticut Rivers, in accordance with Section 11 of Chapter 91 of the General Laws, and authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a bond of indemnity therefor the Commonwealth.

It is recommended that the law shall so be worded that the Public Health Nurses on tenure can be discharged only in compliance with General Laws, Chapter 31, Section 43.

The law when enacted shall be placed on the ballot as a referendum for the consideration of the voters. This vote was not unanimous.

Superintendent's Report to the School Committee

December, 1965

I herewith submit my seventh annual report as Westport's superintendent of schools, it being the seventy-seventhsuch report submitted in the history of the Westport Superintendency.

In common with my previous custom,, I list the major educational and material gains that our school system has made during the past year, our major needs as we see them, general statement relating to past and present educational practice and philosophy in our country.

Educational and Material Gains During 1965

- An extension of the new mathematics into the middle and lower grades, as well as into the field of geometry in the High School.
- 2. Obtaining of a reading specialist to make a study of the needs annu expedite remedial measures in the field of reading.
- 3. Adding substantially to the school libraries of the Earle and Macomber Schools.
- 4. A full-time helping teacher has been placed in the Greenwood Park School where we have the town's greatest concentration of first-graders.
- 5. A continued improvement in the testing services' that we are able to offer to the children of Westport.
- 6. A complete redecoration of the interior of the High School was carried out by our custodial force during the summer.

- 7. The long-awaited extension of the Earle School playgrounds has been accomplished during the past year. The auditorium has been painted.
- 8. The head of the High School English Department is giving an in-service training course in the field of English to our Junior and Senior High English teachers.
- 9. A complete rebuilt Grand Piano has been obtained for the High School auditorium.
- 10. An additionall calculator has been obtained for the commercial department at the high school.
- 11. Additions have been made to our audio-visual equipiment.
- 12. We now have our own psychologist and psychometrist, Capt. Ellsworth Smith.

Major Needs For 1965 (And After)

- 1. Additional school housing is the emperative need of our school system at this time
- 2. The provision of the kind of additional school housing which will lead toward the solution of other needs, such as kindergartens, an additional special class room, and the revision of the high school curriculum toward providing a more beneficial program for about one-seventh of our student body. (Most high schools have this need.)
- 3. We have need of additional space at the elementary, the junior high and the high school levels. While the elementary needs are immediately the most acute, the needs of the junior high and high school will soon be scarcely less so. All our housing needs are on the heels of each other. We can well become involved in three school building programs simultaneously.

- 4. Westport is really beginning to grow and as yet we have seen only the beginning. We are in the unusually fortunate position of being able to solve all our building needs by erecting one new building; namely a new senior high school for grades 9-10-11-12. This would enable us to use the present high school building for grades 5-6-7-8, and reduce the pressure on the Earle and Macomber Schools by making them responsable for housing Kindergarten through Grade four. We could still use the newest of the present wooden structures for elementary housing growth.
- 5. Such a procedure would allow for curriculum improvement in grades 5-6-7-8-9 10 11 and 12. The cost of a new senior high school should not be prohibitive for Westport when we take into consideration present state aid and probable federal aid to come. Because of this aid, we can afford to do that which we ought to do in any event; namely put the caues of improved education first in our thinking.

Educational Patterns - Past and Present

No one can be altogether sure that he is reading the signs persceptively enough to predict what is coming. Yet many responsible people are speaking out because they see signs—signs that an essential part of the American heritage is being eroded away.

The foundation of our nation is its great commitment to the individual human being. Its first great document declares that he has certain unalienable rights and that he is the source of all government. The young nation fashioned its government to cherish those rights and to do his bidding. It shaped its economy to give free play to his ideas, his energy, and his drives. Very soon it began building a universal school system dedicated to the full development of his unique personal powers.

Now this foundadtion is threatened, not because the American people have consciously changed their mind, but because increasing massiveness and comcultural shift. Individuality tends to be submereged in plexity have led in many subtle ways towards a great gigantic organizations, in chain-belt production, and in the complex cultural interdependencies of our society.

Caught in this cultural drift, the schools too are veering toward impersonal solutions to vital educational problems. Mass groupings, standard curriculums, texts, and examinations, and standardized institutions are squeezing individuals into a common mold. With an eye to masses rather than indidviduals, the schools are departing from their unique character by manipulating pupils and teachers into organizational patterns, and by leaning on administrative and mechanical devices that tend to destroy the very quality which has made them great.

Westport has not been affected as much by these things because of its size, location and economy, but will be affected greatly as time passes.

It is no use to yearn for a time gone by, or try, to return to it. We cannot. Increasing numbers and massivenuess are facts, as are growing interdependence and increasing interrelatedness. A just emphasis on group values and the ability to live well in groups—is a necessity. Education itself must go on largely within the context of the group.

Yet none of this makes individuality less essential. We must find a modern way of nuturing the special character and unique strengths of each individual in a world in which that individual will be highly involved in groups. We must find ways of handling group situations so that even they contribute to the individuality of each member. We need unity, yes, even a

certain conformity; but we need diversity too. We must learn to combine both, in a new harmony.

In Conclusion

We are, and must be concerned, with teaching subject matter and skills, to our children. We are doing this fairly well as can be seen by the abilities, aptitudes and skills possessed by our citizenry which were so necessary in the production and growth of our magnificent country.

Living in an era of exploding new knowledge, the teaching of skills and subject matter are ever more difficult to keep up with. However, we must find ways to do so, and also be concerned with the following question, "In his years of schooling, how much is each youngster helped to reach out beyond himself, to perceive some ideal, and to throw himself into working for it?"

We must make sure that we do both in America's school systems if our country is to continue along the path of greatness envisioned by our forefathers, and fulfill the destiny that can be ours if our vision is clear and our efforts great.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL

December 1965

Dear Dr. Fogg:

As Principal of the Westport High School I hereby submit my annual reoprt.

Changes in Personnel

The following people resigned or were given leave of absence:

John Carli resigned to teach at Seekonk High School; Mrs. Barbara Bures moved to Connecticut and is teaching in that system; Mr. Andrew Raposa left to teach at Westfield State College; and Mrs. Barbara Wordell was granted a year's leave of absence.

Miss Jeannette Cummings was appointed physical education teacher and girls athletic coach. James Wills was transferred from the Earle School to teach social studies, English, and driver education. Mrs. Irene Mickelson, who has substituted at the high school, was assigned to the English department, and Mr. Richard Zoino, a graduate of SMTI, was assigned to teach chemistry and physics.

Curriculum

Our enrollment in the Homemaking Department has increased this year. This has always been one of our strong departments under the guidance of Missi Lillian cahoon. There may be a need for another enable more girls at the junior and senior class levei home-making teacher in the near future. This would to receive training in homemaking.

Our Business Education Department continues to place graduates in responsible positions in industry. This is a credit to our fine business education teachers, Mrs. Wanda Francis and Mrs. Patricia Marujo.

Our Mathematics Department is now teaching the modern approach to Algebra I and Geometry. Next year we will continue the new method in our Algebra II classes. More mathematics should be included in our general curriculum. We are now previewing text books to find those most adequate for our purpose.

English Department Report-Paul Larrivee, Head

The in-service course initiated in November for junior and senior high school teachers focuses on the structural linguistics approach to English. Both the scope of linguistics and the inductive methodology used in linguistic description suggest a new insight into the teaching of all phases of English—language, composition, reading, literature (as distinguished from reading). speaking, and listening. Though these phases all involve verbal activity falling under the umbrella term "English," the teacher with linguistic orientation recognizes that each phase draws upon somewhat different skills not spontaneously transferable to all other linguistic skills. He has a knowledge of phonetics, phonemics, suprasegmental phonemics, morphemics, morphology, dialectology, semantics, and syntax to assist him in all types of language problems.

To promote linguistics in this way is not to suggest that the teacher engage all his students in structural linguistic. But only with a knowledge of language functions far superior to what he can reasonably expect of his students can the teacher effectively vary his approaches to teaching and also learn significant facts about language problems of individual students.

Beyond the basic skills and developmental reading courses in progress and the introduction of new teaching approaches suggested by modern linguistics, little more can be done for the high school student needing remediation without the assistance of a teacher whoose training includes familiarity with both psychological and physical problems relating dyslexia. Instead of this type of assistance, I urge that the high school at least receive the services of a teacher professionally trained in remedial reading, even if only on a part-time basis.

The problem of the "remedial" student in high school is especially vexing because his language habit and skills appear to be rather firmly fixed when he has reached adolesence. Because of this I recomend that the structural linguistics approach be applied at least partially to the language arts program in the elementary schools. This recommendation carries no suggestion of culpability on the part of elementary schools, for it can be asserted on strong evidence that reading and writing failures often occur before the child starts his school experience; and the linguistics approach to verbal problems is too recent an innovation for anyone to expect language arts teachers to have had strong formal training in it.

Although it might appear unfeasible to suggest that Westport now hire especially trained teachers to function exclusively in the elementary school language arts program and that the system establish a Montessori program (perhaps with federal assistance), inescapable evidence remains that national literacy rates and literacy levels are disgracefully low. The traditional approach to the language arts might have served a century ago to acculturate linguistically and socially divergent groups of people, but traditionalism founded on normative values of "correctness" has failed dismally at developing hign-level verbal processes. What remains for the child with only average verbal apti-

tude, which is actually low aptitude, is a frustratingly limited set of choices in employment possibilities in today's world.

REPORT OF DR. MARTINEAU

Our new approach to French appears to be popular because enrollment in French classes has doubled since the inception of the program. We now have three French I classes, two French II classes, and one French III class. The aural-oral method is a slow but effective learning process in which one must not be afraid to sacrifice speed for thoroughness. Class size is too large in some cases to enable us to reach every child effectively. We can foresee that another trained teacher and more funds will be required to settle this program. The present situation at the eighth grade level is not conducive to obtaining effective results. Class size and frequency of meetings are the main obstacles to true progress. In spite of the inconveniences mentioned above it is felt that the program is rather functional.

REPORT OF MRS. GEORGE SALVADOR, AMERICAN FIELD SERVICE

Through the efforts of the newly formed American Field Service Club in the high school and the coordinating AFS Adult Chapter in the town, sufficient funds were raised during a most successful Talent Show in January 1965 to enable the Chapter to apply to the AFS New York office for a foreign student during the 65-66 school year. Harald Klaeboe from Norway entered the senior class in September 1965 at Westport High School. He has been most warmly received in Westport, participating in soccer and the Key Club, and becoming an honorary member of the Honor Society as well as taking a full acedemic schedule.

The adult chapter screened five candidates for the Americans Abroad 66 Summer Program of the AFS and selected two candidates, Elizabeth Souza and Janet Meader. The New York office will make the final decision.

One of the most rewarding parts of this program has been the enrichment that the high school students have gained by having Harald in their classes and being able to understand and appreciate another part of the world. The purpose of the AFS program has been to create greater understanding between peoples of the world by bringing students from abroad to study in U. S. secondary schools and live with families for a year as well as giving young Americans a similar opportunity to understand another country.

REPORT OF MR. SZALA, VO.AG DEPARTMENT

Two graduates went onto the Stockbridge School of Agriculture..

James Pierce was top boy both in the state in Milk Products Judging at Amherst and at Eastern States Exposition in competition with boys from twelve North Atlantic States.

Michael Perry was the top judge of Dairy Cattle last year at Amherst. He went to the Eastern States Exposition where he placed first in Holsteins. He was also a member of the Massachusetts Dairy Cattle Judg. ing Team at Waterloo, Iowa.

Charles Keith, former Westport student, was a member of the State Dairy Products Team this fall and received the Silver Emblem Award judging at Waterloo, Iowa, this fall.

I was State-Coach-in-Charge of the Massachusetts Dairy Cattle and Dairy Products Judging Teams at Waterleo, Iowa.

In the Livestock Judging Contest this fall Westport High School placed first in the state at Amherst with Thomas Carreira and Henry Sylvia placing first and second respectively. The school will receive an engraved rotating trophy for the boys' accomplishment.

Michael Perry and Henry Sylvia represented Westport at the National Convention held at Kansas City, Mo., in October. The Convention was attended by approximately 15,000 FFA members from every state in the nation.

Interest in the Adult Young Farmer Program is about the same as it has been. An agricultural program is offering evenings to interested residents. This is an important phase of education, for Westport has more farms and more cows, and produces more milk than any other town in Massachusetts.

Interest in our Eleventh Annual Westport Fair is increasing. It is organized and run by the Young Farmer Group and FFA students. It provides both groups with business education and co-operative efforts of undertaking such a large project.

GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT MRS. ETHEL LIEBMANN and MR. ELLSWORTH SMITH

Some important developments have occurred in the Guidance Department over the last year. In the course of this year's work, I found it noteworthy that the graduating class of 1966 has received a number of letters of early acceptance to schools of further learning The December survey shows that of the one-hundred students in the senior class, forty-one students have completed applications for admission to thirty-two schools including degree granting colleges, non-degree, business schools, hospital schools for nursing, and various other schools of further education.

Five students have been honored with letters of commendation for their high performance on the Na-

tional Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test given last spring. They are Arthur J. Deneault, Barbara I. Gonet, Amy Horan, Carol Pettey, and Doris M. Sasseville. They are among 38,000 students across the nation recognized for scoring in the top two percent of students, who will complete high school in 1966. The test performance is evidence of unusual academic promise.

Capt. Ellsworth N. Smith has been working closely with Mrs. Margaret Kelliher, teacher of special education, and with the junior high school faculty in a testing program designed to determine special instructional needs of students. Mrs. Kelliher's special education class is making satisfactory progress.

The athletic teams met with varied success. Being the smallest school in the league is not conducive to champion teams; however, the boys and their coaches do very well considering the opposition we face. The soccer team was particularly successful in finishing second in the BLC at Escore League.

Under the capable leadership of Mrs. Eleanor Padelford,, our cafeteria manager, the lunch program continues to be a success. Space is increasingly becoming a problem in the preparation and serving of the lunches. Only the competent co-operation of the staff enables this to operate so efficiently. I think the public should be aware that food for both the Head School and the Earle School is prepared at the high school.

The great majority of our teachers are dedicated to their work, and have the interest of the children at heart. Because many teachers have not been mentioned in this report, it does not mean that their efforts have not been appreciated and noted.

As Principal of the Westport High School, I wish to urge the School Building Committee to seriously consider the construction of a new high school building.

The present enrollment is 460 and every indication is that the high school population will grow. New construction in the town and transfers from porochial schools increased this year's enrollment by approximately 70 students. I feel this is an indication of things to come.

I feel strongly that our present junior high school situation providing inadequate facilities, handicaps our incoming 9th graders. This could be remedied by the use of the present high school for a middle school, which would include grades 5, 6, 7, and 8.

As the curriculum expands the need for more rooms and special facilities becomes greater. Presently the scope of our offerings is not adequate in instrumental and vocal music, in foreign languages and in laboratory science courses. The combination of auditorium—gymnasium presents many problems. To have an assembly, we must cancel our gym classes and set up approximately 500 chairs. This requires the labor of custodians for an hour.

I also wish to point out that our present guidance suite is made up of the nurse's office and a small conference room; that our nurse's office is a dressing room; and that our cafeteria manager must use another dressing room as her headquarters. Our instrumental music program director occupies a men's room in the custodians' area. The machine room for our commercial course leaves much to be desired. The cafeteria should accommodate two serving lines but under the present conditions this is not possible.

In compliance with your request, I herewith submit my annual report as Principal of the Junior High School.

This year there were several changes and additions to the faculty of the Factory School. They are as follows:

Mr. Frederick R. Lawton replaced Mrs. Edith who accepted a position in Somerset.

Mrs. Janet Underwood is teaching Art at both the Factory and Head Schools, thereby releiving Mr. Rayno of his eight grade art classes.

Miss Gloria McGillick is teaching Physical Education to the girls at the Factory School as well as at the Head School.

Mr. Louis Finucci is teaching the Self-contained sixth grade class, which was placed in the Factory School this September, because of the great overflow at the Macomber School.

At present our enrollment stands the the rather awsome figure of 242 pupils.

The Factory School — Grade 6— 38 pupils (4 rooms) Grade 7— 110 pupils

The Head School — (3 rooms) Grade 8— 94 pupils

In spite of the the crowded conditions, our dedicated teachers continue to do an excellent job in in their individual classrooms, (as my supervisory reports will bear out), and I am indeed grateful every day for their loyal cooperation. In short, all those teachers, pupils, and coworkers who, though unsung, faithfully and successfully execute their many daily tasks.

My dear Dr. Fogg:

In 1965 we had but one change in the faculty at the Macomber School.

Miss Helen Tomkiewicz, a graduate of the Bridgewater State College was assigned to teach grade two.

Our present enrollment is 355 pupils.

This year it was necessary for us to place one sixth grade class at the Factory School to take care of our enrollment.

Several of our grades this year have 35 or over pupils per classroom. Our present sixth grade at Macomber has 43 pupils. One of our fifth grades has 41 pupils. This is due to the many new families moving into Westport and also several transfers from St. George's School. We know that large numbers such as these are extremely difficult for teachers to instruct at the elementary level.

Our need is great for additional classroom space. I feel that by next September at least two additional classrooms will be vitally necessary.

I would like to see in the near future two ungraded groups set up to benefit children that are having difficulty with an all academic school day. One for children that are not ready to go on after grade 3 and one for

children not ready to enter grade 7. Classes such as these should include woodworking, sewing, and arts and crafts.

We have added the teaching of the new mathematics to most of our fast working Groups. The children seem quite enthusiastic and the results have been good.

In compliance with your request, I submit, herewith, my report for 1965.

An unusual number of changes in our teaching personnel took place in September. These included the following transfers: Mrs. Irene Caswell from grade 4 to grade 2, Mrs. Barbara Tripp from grades 3 and 4 to grade 4, Mrs. Elizabeth Moran from grade 5 to grades 4 and 5, Mr. James Wills from grade 5 to Westport High School faculty, and Mrs. Voyzie Costa from building assistant at the Earle to helping teacher at Greenwood Park School.

Two teachers, new to Westport, were assigned to the Earle School in September, as follows: Mr. Stephen Almeida, with three years of teaching experience to grade 5, and Mr. Paul Leite, who had taught for two years in Fall River, to grade 6.

We are so grateful that Mrs. Hilda Perry was able to return to us in the fall, after an absence of nearly a year, because of illness. At the present time, Mrs. Perry serves us 3 days a week as helping teacher.

Curriculum innovations include the adoption of an English Composition text in grades 4, 5, and 6 which we anticipate will help to improve some of our weaknesses in written English.

The need for "matrons" on our school buses is a persistent request, yet one which becomes increasingly significant with each succeeding year, because of the increase in incidents involving the safety and morals

of our pupils. Once again, I respectfully request your consideration of this important problem.

I acknowledge, with thanks, the following:

- 1. Progress in extending the playground area.
- 2. Acquisition of over 400 volumes for classroom libraries.
- 3. Bookcases for classroom libraries and office.
- 4. Screen for auditorium.

One of the main concerns in elementary education today is the "speedup" and resultant academic pressures on our children, starting with grade one. Until there is sufficient evidence of the lasting benefits of the means and methods of this acceleration, we hope that we may be allowed to "proceed with caution."
