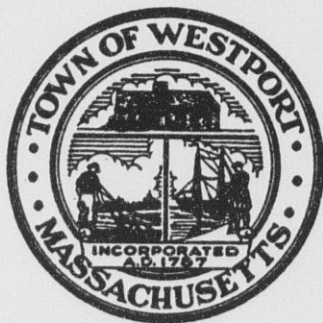

JOHN A. SMITH

Mr. Smith, presently serving as our Town Moderator, is best known for the many years that he has conducted the Annual Town meetings, including special meetings. During the thirty-seven years that he has served as Town Moderator, we commend him for the manner in which he has presented himself in that position; always with the proper knowledge and conduct of the meeting, making it interesting for all who attended. John, as he is popularly called by everyone, served in a dual capacity for thirty-five years as a member of the Board of Selectmen. During this thirty-five year period, he saw Westport grow from short town meetings held in the afternoon to lengthy town meetings held in the evening. He, also, saw Selectmen's meetings held bi-weekly to the present lengthy weekly meetings.

He was born on August 19, 1893. Due to an arrangement at that time between both Towns, he attended school in Dartmouth. Later, he attended high school in Westport then was transferred to the University of Massachusetts which was known as the Massachusetts Agricultural College.

He and two brothers have operated one of the most successful larger potato farms in this vicinity since the turn of the century.

He has been active in many aspects of the community life of Westport in which his wife, the former Ann May Tripp, has also participated. He is a past Master of the Noquochoke Masonic Lodge and the Westport Grange, having been active in these organizations for nearly one-half century. During his lengthy service to our community, he served as Chairman of the Westport Fair Committee, and has appointed many of our good citizens to the Finance Committee, and many other committees that are important to Westport's growth and future.

The Board of Selectmen, in dedicating this Annual Town report to him and his colleague, Oscar H. Palmer, of long-standing public service, wish to express to him the thanks of all the citizens of Westport for his patience, understanding and desire to help the people of Westport.

To him, we say a sincere and heartfelt thank you for his dedication.

Mr. Palmer is an outstanding example of a dedicated public servant. Having served the Town of Westport for sixty-two consecutive years, he was first appointed as a Registrar of Voters in the year 1906 and continued in that capacity until 1943 when he was elected to the office of Assessor and is now completing twenty-five years in that position.

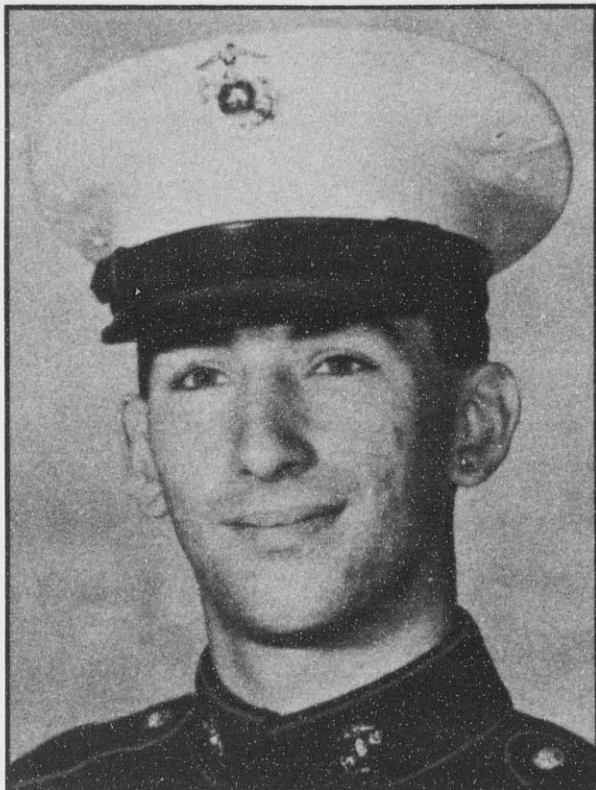
He was born in Westport on October 30, 1882 at 138 Adamsville Road where he now resides. As a youngster, he attended grade school at a school long-gone from Westport's scene on Adamsville Road.

He attended high school at the Head of Westport - a building that is presently called the Alumni Hall. Transportation to school in that time was either by horseback or stagecoach.

During his early youth, he worked as an auto mechanic, then later turned his interest to farming. His quiet and unassuming ways have made many friends during this period of public service.

The Board of Selectmen, in dedicating this Annual Town report to him and his colleague, John A. Smith, also of long public service, do so on behalf of all the citizens of Westport with the knowledge that we will miss the service he has rendered to the community.

We wish him good health and happiness in his retirement from public life.



IN MEMORIAM

P.F.C., Andre R. Latessa, of the United States Marine Corps was born in Fall River, Mass. on March 18, 1948. He attended schools in Fall River and Westport and was a member of Our Lady of Grace Church, Westport.

Entered in the Marine Corps, April 28, 1966, and received his recruit training at Paris Island - advanced training at Camp Lejeune and Camp Pendleton, California.

He received his orders for Vietnam on October 1966 and while serving in Vietnam for 10 months was injured on August 15, 1967, in an operation against hostile forces in the vicinity of Quang Tri, Vietnam.

P.F.C., Latessa, died of wounds on August 18, 1967 in Danang Hospital. He was a member of a mine-sweep team of the Third Marine Division, Engineers C Company, Third Platoon Reconnaissance.

He was an American fighting man and served in the forces which guard our Country and our way-of-life. He was prepared to give his life in their defense.

REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board organized March 20, 1967 with Antonio B. Gracia, Jr. as Chairman and J. Douglas Borden, Clerk.

The year 1967 was a good one for Westport. It saw a continued building boom, acceptance of a number of new streets and roads, the expansion of several businesses, the completion of Route 195 through Westport, a reduction in our tax rate and continued prosperity for the great majority of its residents.

Along with the good, however, there was an increase in the number of problems that face the Town. One of the greatest is the increasing cost of running our Town Government. Moderate wage increases were granted to most Town employees and some elected and appointed officials. Substantial increases were voted for both Police and Fire Department personnel. In addition more services were required to meet the needs of the expanding population and this increased costs. The outlook for 1968 is for the same pattern to be followed.

Another major problem is the increased responsibility and work required of all major Town Boards due again to the expanding population but also due to the significant law and regulations passed or set up by State and Federal legislators and agencies. This is true in all Towns and its effect is that more and more of our capable part time experienced officials are unable to continue to devote the necessary time to meet their elected responsibilities and are giving up their official positions. Locally Selectmen Carlton A. Lees did not run for Office in 1967 and the Chairman Selectman Antonio B. Gracia, Jr. is not seeking reelection in 1968. Our veteran Assessor Oscar Palmer, Town Moderator John Smith, also are declining to run for reelection in 1968 after having served over thirty years in these respective positions. In addition, more and more resignations are being received from appointed positions and it is difficult to replace these people with capable replacements that are willing and can devote the time to properly fulfill the responsibilities.

Some of the significant highlights in this past year are:

- 1) Route 195 was completed through Westport to New Bedford and this effected a reduction in traffic on Route 6. Hopefully, the Route 195, 88, and 6 interchange area will attract new commercial activity such as motels and/or restaurants on the scale of several of the well known national chains. Our lack of Town water and sewerage is one disadvantage in trying to set up this type of business.

2) Plans and specifications for the exit ramp off Route 195 to Sanford Road has been completed and it is expected by April 1968 work will start on the construction of the ramp and widening of Sanford Road to Route 6. This will be an asset to business along Route 6 and should encourage additional business development in that area between Sanford Road and Route 88.

3) With the passing of the junk car by-law at our last Town meeting, there already has been a significant reduction in the number of junk cars around Town. The Selectmen intend to strictly enforce this law and it is hoped that everyone will cooperate and eliminate the necessity for court cases.

4) The Town also received two additional parcels of land from Mr. and Mrs. Burton Bryan and the Campanelli Construction Company. The Bryan land covered approximately seven acres of marshland in Westport Harbor and was turned over to the Conservation Commission. The Campanelli land was approximately twenty-three acres in North Westport off Rock Street. This land is also proposed to be turned over to the Conservation Commission for recreation and conservation purposes subject to Town Meeting approval.

5) Thanks to the Beautification Committee and the residents of the area, a lovely square was developed on Tickle Road. This type of civic pride and achievement is what we need more of and the Beautification Committee stands ready to help any neighborhood improve itself.

6) Meetings with the State Division of Waterways on the Gooseberry Neck and East Beach problems promised a possible solution. With the inevitable advent of S.M.T.I. acquiring a portion of Gooseberry Neck for a Marine Biological Laboratory and the State's desire to provide camping facilities on the island, there will be a significant capital investment by the State in this area. This will require additional road improvements to these sites and some additional acquisition of land along East Beach.

7) The significant extension of gas lines in Westport, although not good news to oil men, is none the less an indication of the progress expected in Town by big business. Another example of this was the request and approval for a bus line to be run summers from Zulmiro Plaza on State Road to Horseneck Beach and Westport Point. There are many additional highlights but space does not permit listing them all. There are also a number of pressing problems which will continue to require considerable attention and possibly moneys. Some of them are:

1) Engineering involving road layouts, land takings, road construction, and drainage requires a large percentage of the Boards time. It is inevitable that this problem will require a permanent solution in the near future by a revision to the Highway Department management set up or the hiring of a full time engineering staff.

2) There has been an indication that some of the Town Departments will seek union representation. This will require considerable additional time and effort in negotiating contracts in order to reach mutually acceptable agreements for presentation to the Town Meeting for their acceptance.

3) The problem of zoning and subdivisions with relation to building permits is a serious one with the Selectmen and Planning Board taking opposite positions. It will take compromise on both sides and some rewriting of these By-Laws to provide for orderly development of land without stifling growth or creating undue expenses to the Town by unscrupulous developers.

4) The problem of approving Cable TV in Westport in a manner that will provide for proper taxing, proper protection of the consumer and control of a possible monopoly must be solved in 1968. If it doesn't locally soon it will be one more responsibility taken over by the State.

These are only some of the problems that face the Selectmen. There will also be many new ones in 1968. The Board of Selectmen need all the help they can get in solving them and for that help and cooperation they received in 1967 from the various official boards, town employees and citizens, they are grateful. For a progressive and prosperous Westport in 1968, it is also necessary we receive the same cooperation and assistance.

CIVIL SERVICE

In view of the continued need throughout the year for social workers and clerical workers, a significant change was made in the Civil Service laws in 1967. Examinations for workers in those classifications are now held on a continuing basis rather than once or twice a year. Examinations are scheduled by Civil Service as job opportunities are available. Applicants wishing to take these examinations make application to Civil Service in writing at any time and are notified as soon as the next examination is scheduled.

Cash grants to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, and Disability Assistance received a 3.4% cost-of-living increase effective 9/1/67. Vendor payments for medical assistance continued to increase during the year: many such increases were made effective retroactive to January 1, 1967. Some increases were minor and had little effect on expenditures in 1967: others were of major importance.

Licensed Rest Home rates were based on Group I and Group II classifications. Recipients in the Dea Rest Home receive this higher, Group I, per diem grant.

Licensed Nursing Home rates were based on Groups I through V classifications. Nearly all of our nursing home recipients are in homes classified in the upper three groups.

Hospitals are no longer paid a per diem all inclusive rate. Hospital payments are on a per hospital percentage of the total cost basis: percentages for 1967 were from 74.59 to 100.00%.

Physicians and surgeons fees are an additional public assistance charge for hospitalized patients. Medicare has helped decrease local payments for hospital and medical care for the elderly. However, the medical assistance case load for persons age 65 and older is increasing.

Medical Fee Schedules increased for x-rays, laboratory tests, dental services, eye examinations and glasses, nursing service, and many others. Changes that were made late in the year will effect expenditures to 6/30/68.

There has been increased co-ordination in programs at all levels of government. We have had specific information on the following:

- Medical Services to Crippled Children
- Home Health Aide Services.

There were policies put into effect in 1967 in which the local Board of Public Welfare was in disagreement: namely; increased income exemptions to children 18 to 21, the broad coverage and liberal eligibility factors in the Medical Assistance program, the simplified investigation procedures, as well as the content of the Declaration of Need application form.

The Validation Process provided under the Medical Assistance program is now in operation. A percentage of the Declaration of Need forms filed since June 1967 will be investigated and validated for continued medical assistance and other necessary services.

It will be noted that administration payments for 1967 have been made under a simplified payment procedure. This has reduced much of the multiple posting on warrants and the books of the town accountant, the treasurer, and this office. Federal and State reimbursements have not been affected because both are based on the approved percentages on the quarterly expenditure claims.

Claims may now be made for a proportionate part of Town Counsel and Workmen's Compensation expense.

Mr. Walter Sullivan succeeded Mr. James Donnelly, retired, as State Department District Director on March 20, 1967. Mr. Sullivan continues to bring it to the attention of local personnel that the responsibilities, the obligations, the professional standards of performance are all as legal as are the rights of the individual to receive services and assistance.

The lack of privacy for interviews and the inadequate space allotted to Public Assistance are always brought to our attention.

REORGANIZATION

The year ended with the passage of Chapter 658 of the Acts of 1967: AN ACT Reorganizing the Department of Public Welfare and providing for the Direct Administration of the Public Welfare System of the Commonwealth by said Department.

The twenty-five page Act becomes effective July 1, 1968 except for certain sections effective January 2, 1968 and others which may be effective between January 2, 1968 and July 1, 1968. The provisions of the Act provide for the administration of the public assistance programs by the Commonwealth. It abolishes Boards of Public Welfare and Welfare Districts, it protects the rights of employees of such Boards who hold positions classified under Chapter 31 of the General Laws. It provides for the establishment of a system of community service centers, including branches, which shall be readily available to families, children, the aging, the disabled and all others in the area who are in need of public welfare services. The cost of the program after federal reimbursement will be borne by the Commonwealth. Plans are already being developed to provide for the transition from local to state administration without interruption in service.

During 1967 the Trustees regretfully accepted the resignation of two of its staff. Mrs. Glenda Broadbent, who had so constructively served as librarian for five years, resigned as of July 31, 1967. Thru her efforts and those of her faithful assistants, Mrs. Dorothy Cabral, Mrs. Gladys Plante and Mrs. Florence Meader, the Library now offers the best service possible under its restricted circumstances. Mrs. Meader also resigned. She had faithfully and competently served as an assistant for three years.

Mrs. Alice D. Tripp resigned as Trustee to become librarian August 1, 1967. The state has raised its minimum standards and the qualifications for new librarians has become highly demanding. Mrs. Tripp met these qualifications. The Town of Westport is most fortunate that she accepted the position. Because she was immediately available, the library was able to continue its operations effectively fully staffed.

Mrs. Richard W. Pratt was appointed to replace Mrs. Tripp as trustee.

The library is endeavoring to reach out into the community thru new programs. A story hour for young children has been initiated and the librarian visits the Senior Citizens meetings with book selections. Hopefully this year will see further progress in community library activities.

Several generous gifts were received by our library. Miss Helen E. Ellis designed and presented to the library a beautiful bookplate which will be displayed in gift volumes. The South Westport Ladies Aid Society presented a sum of money which is being used to purchase a new edition of Shakespeare and to replace and add to our classic collection.

As the statistics indicate, there is an ever increasing demand for good library services. The need for expansion becomes more and more pressing. The librarian daily faces decisions of curtailing many needed programs due to lack of space. Because of one addition of new stacks, the art display area has been sacrificed. It is impossible to provide adequate working space for the staff as well as study and reading areas. This year the library faces the possibility of placing in storage less used books in order to make necessary space for new additions.

The need for an adequate library building in the immediate future is of the utmost importance.

WESTPORT YOUTH ACTIVITY BOARD

The Westport Youth Activity Board hereby submits its annual report for 1967:

The report of Mr. John Kelly, director of the swimming program, is as follows:

The fifth annual swimming program sponsored by the Westport Youth Activity Board began on Wednesday July 12th and continued through August 30th.

During registration week instructors accepted 297 applications. At the close of the program 213 certificates were awarded in the following categories.

Beginners	79
Advanced Beginners	51
Intermediates	46
Swimmers	24
Junior Lifesaving	8
Senior Lifesaving	5

The same problems as previously reported continue to plague the swimming program. The board I am sure is well aware of the tidal problems, and the lack of available areas conducive to teaching various stages of swimming skills. The instructors are grateful to the members of the board for the many improvements in existing areas and their interest in investigating possibilities for better instruction.

Our large dropout rate occurred at the Head of Westport where many children did not return to class following the pollution threat midway through the summer.

The most serious problem confronting the program is the lack of qualified instructors in the Bristol County Area. Red Cross chapters report that they have been unable to fill the numbers of vacancies in this field and the situation for the forthcoming season is not promising. A suggestion might be for the Youth Activity Board to sponsor some candidate or candidates to the annual Aquatic School provided these people agree to teach in the program.

In closing may I thank the parents and children who took part in the program and assure them that the instructors appreciated their most cooperative attitude.

It is with regret that we accept John Kelly's resignation as director of the swimming program. We would like to thank him for the excellent work he has done for the youth of the community during the last five years.

Approximately 60 boys participated in our Junior Baseball League under the able directorship of Robert St. Amour. More adults are needed to assist in this program. We believe it is important to provide baseball beyond Little League and before High School. We feel this program has served this purpose.

There seems to be a lack of interest in our soccer program however, we have decided to continue it for another year. By starting during the first of August when the daylight is longer more boys might be induced to enroll.

Our Junior Basketball program, directed by Mr. William Albanese, is as successful as it has been in past years.

The area south of the Macomber school has been black-topped and a playground developed that can be used for basketball and possibly tennis courts in the summer and could also be used as a skating rink in the winter. A slide and a swing has been ordered for the playground. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Frederick Cambra, highway surveyor, for his help in making this playground possible.

We have not been too successful in organizing activities for the girls of the community. We hope this can be accomplished in the near future.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank the Selectmen and the townspeople in making our program a success.

The Planning Board begins its Annual Report for 1967 by urging anyone who desires to develop land into house lots to meet with the Planning Board before having formal plans made. The owner should come to this meeting with a rough sketch that he is willing to leave with the Planning Board and that shows what he proposes to do. But this sketch may be in pencil and may be made by the owner himself. The reason for urging this is that in the past some owners have appeared before the Board for the first time with expensive formal plans, which have had to be completely redone.

William Ferreira was elected Chairman, and Warren M. Messier was elected Secretary.

Of the new plans received by the Planning Board in 1967 two (2) were stamped "Approval Granted", thirteen (13) were stamped "Approval Not Required" and one (1) was stamped "Approval Not Required For Registry Purposes Only".

During the year the Planning Board held eight public hearings. One was on the proposal to rezone as Commercial five Residential areas, and the other seven were on Sub-division Plans submitted to the Board.

During 1967 three developers completed to the satisfaction of the Highway Surveyor parts of three streets. Wilfred Beaulieu completed a little over 1,800 feet of the north end of Robert Street, which runs south from American Legion Highway. John M. Porter completed over 700 feet of the south end of Bayberry Drive, which runs north from Charlotte White Road Extension. Frank J. Ciosek completed over 500 feet of Grand Pine Way, which runs north from American Legion Highway.

During the year one piece of litigation in which the Planning Board was involved was terminated by a consent decree. This suit was brought by the Planning Board against Wilfred Beaulieu and the Building Inspector to prevent further development of the south end of Robert Street until after a subdivision plan had been approved.

The decree granted the relief requested.

It is the opinion of the Planning Board that additional areas of the Town should be zoned as Residential. This statement is made principally for the record, since the Board is well aware that two popularly held concepts will prevent anything from being done about it. The first of these concepts is that no one has a right to tell anyone what he is or isn't going to do with his land. About all that can be said about this concept is that the man who holds it is likely to be the one who screams the loudest when someone proposes to put a used car lot next door to him. The other concept is that as business is good for a Town, nothing should be done to interfere with a business no matter how much residential property is depreciated.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

January 11, 1968

The Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee is extremely pleased at the progress being made in constructing the new regional vocational-technical high school. As of December 31, 1967, it was estimated that the building is 65% complete.

All units are completely closed in; the boilers are in operation; and construction can no longer be held up or delayed by the weather. Most classrooms have been wire lathed and plastering has been started in the cafeteria, kitchen and food trades areas.

The football field has been seeded and the soccer fields and baseball field have been loamed and graded. All other grounds work will be completed in the spring and we anticipate no delay in our scheduled opening of September 4, 1968.

The Regional School District Committee has awarded equipment contracts totaling \$424,404.02 up to the present time. This equipment is scheduled for delivery starting in June, 1968.

On February 8, 1967, we received \$9,750.00 in George Barden funds to be applied to the cost of the superintendent-director's salary.

On March 24, 1967, we received \$30,000.00 under the Vocational Education Act of 1963 (P.L. 88-210) to be used for construction and equipment. (Capital Costs)

On August 21, 1967, we received \$98,075.00 under the Vocational Education Act of 1963 (P.L. 88-210) to be used for construction and equipment. (Capital Costs)

On September 5, 1967, the Regional District School Committee appointed Francis J. Ferrance as Guidance Director of the new school.

On September 27, 1967, the District received \$159,769.00 under the Vocational Education Act of 1963 (P.L. 88-210) to be used for construction and equipment. (Capital Costs)

On October 25, 1967, the District received \$4,500.00 in George Barden funds to be applied to the cost of the guidance director's salary.

On October 25, 1967, the District received \$1,160,265.00 from the Economic Development Administration. This sum represented the first payment on the \$3,053,000.00 grant which has been awarded to the school for construction and equipment.

On November 6, 1967, a meeting of guidance personnel from the Fall River, Somerset, Swansea and Westport school systems was held to acquaint them with the programs which will be offered in the new school.

On December 12, 1967, the Governor officially signed Bill 1412, an act providing for 15 percent additional state aid to certain cities and towns which are members of a regional school and regional vocational school district. This Bill is now classified as Chapter 779 of the Acts of One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven.

On December 18, 1967, the Governor officially signed House Bill 1410, an act reimbursing cities, towns and districts for half the expenses involved in maintaining approved vocational schools. This Bill is now classified as Chapter 791 of the Acts of One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven.

Passage of these bills will help immeasurably to defray the cost of vocational-technical education in our regional school district.

During the calendar year 1967, the District received a total of \$1,448,109.00 in federal funds to aid in constructing and equipping this new school. In the same period, the District received a total of \$14,250.00 in federal funds towards salaries. (Operating Costs) This sum has been deducted from the 1968 budget Operating Costs.

The Committee is extremely grateful for the very fine cooperation they have received from the communities, the contractor and the architect and eagerly await the opening of this new school on September 4, 1968.

The Committee itself is to be commended for the many many hours they have unselfishly given to insure that this new school will open on schedule.

REPORT OF CIVILIAN DEFENSE

Gentlemen:

During the past year we have had three men attend school at Segregansett, Bridgewater, and Topsfield to be trained in light and heavy rescue and medical self help.

The Civil Defense Radio Club has acquired, from the Federal Communication Commission, approval for a 50 unit license.

The emergency warning system installed last year has been changed to a larger frequency with no cost to the town. The warning system is now being tested at 11:15 A. M. on Wednesday Mornings rather than Monday mornings at 11:15 A.M.

The two Civil Defense amphibian ducks were used in the rescue at Horseneck Beach and were instrumental in saving several lives. The ducks were manned by Highway Department Personnel.

Civil Defense obtained during the past year a bulldozer DT 18 for \$125.00 to be used for training purposes for the Town Highway Department, a 1963 Chevrolet 2 ton stake body truck in perfect condition for \$150.00 also to be used for training purposes by Civil Defense and the Highway Department.

Two high pressure compressors were purchased. One is in use at the Head Fire Station for the filling of air tanks and the other is to be used for parts. The compressors were acquired at a cost of \$50.00 and the other for \$25.00. We also obtained other miscellaneous tools and equipment used in the Highway Department for repairs and 2 new winches with steel cables being used by the Highway Department, acquired at a cost of \$10.00 each.

The Board of Selectmen voted that the installation of gas services (bottled or natural) and gas appliances in the Town of Westport be in accordance with the State regulations and that all such installations require a permit and an inspection by the town gas inspector.

There have been a total of 197 permits issued during the year 1967.

The fee established for each permit is \$3.50 with the Gas Inspector receiving \$2.50 of this amount for his services and expenses. With this system of fees and payments to the inspector or assistant inspector, Mr. Normand Michaud, this program is self supporting and administered at no cost to the taxpayer.

Applications for permits for gas installations can be obtained from either gas inspector, the Police Department at the Town Hall and the North Westport Fire Station. Every effort will be made to provide prompt inspections. However, as the inspectors work only part time, it also requires the cooperation of the person taking out the permit.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you
are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of
the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and
town affairs, to assemble at their respective polling
places, namely:

Precinct A	Legion Hall
Precinct B	Municipal Office Building
Precinct C	Greenwood Park School

On Monday the thirteenth day of March next, it being
the second Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the fore-
noon then and there to choose the following officers, viz:
one Selectman, one Assessor, one member of the Board of
Health, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, two mem-
bers of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, two
Trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years;
also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: four
Landing Commissioners, Tree Warden, also the following of-
ficer, one member of the Planning Board for five years;
also the following vacancies, Town Clerk for two years, one
member of the School Committee for one year, all to be voted
for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the High
School Auditorium on Tuesday the twenty-first day of March
next, it being the second Tuesday after the second Monday
of said month at 7:30 in the evening, then and there to act
on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To determine the salary and compensation
of all elected town officers.

Article 2. To determine to what department or depart-
ments the money last received from the County Treasurer for
Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be considered necessary to defray the Town's expenses for the year 1967 and appropriate the same to the several departments and take any other action relative thereto.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1967 and January 1, 1968 in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90, Highway Construction, to be used on Old County Road and Old Bedford Road, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the ensuing year.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$9,700.00 to be received from the State under provisions of Chapter 679 Acts of 1965, be appropriated to provide funds for the continuation of the Tickle Road project and Old Bedford Road project which has been approved by the State Department of Public Works, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$1,883.02 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional Vocational School District's operating costs for 1967.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$5,547.18 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional Vocational School District's capital costs for 1967.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 in accordance with the recommendations of the Department of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the control of Algae in the South Watuppa Pond, said funds to be used only in the event a like amount is appropriated and used for the same purpose by the City of Fall River, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the Head of Westport School and/or other available school buildings to the Trustees of the Free Public Library, to be used as a Public Library or Library Branches as such time these buildings are no longer used for school for school purposes, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding the following section. Unregistered Vehicles. It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of any premises to have or permit thereon more than one unregistered motor vehicle unless the same is kept in a fully enclosed structure. This shall not apply to premises where there is a valid license under General Laws, Chapter 140, Section 58 nor to vehicles used on the premises in agriculture or any work where registration is not required. Violation of the foregoing shall be punishable by a fine of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00). Each day of non-compliance shall constitute a separate offense.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to change the name of Highland Avenue to Highland Road, said change to take effect July 1, 1967, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding the following paragraphs: Board of Appeals. There is hereby established a Board of Appeals of three (3) members and two associate members to be appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Chapter 41 of the General Laws, which shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this By-Law in the manner prescribed in Chapter 41 of the General Laws. The Board of Appeals shall have the following powers: 1. Appeals. To hear and decide an appeal taken by any persons aggrieved by reason of his inability to obtain a permit from any administrative official under the provisions of Chapter 41 of the General Laws or by any officer or board of the town, or by any person aggrieved by any order or decision of the inspector of buildings or other administrative official in violation of any provisions of Chapter 41 of the General Laws, or of this By-Law.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of five persons to study the need for Public Housing for the elderly, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 17. To see if the town will convey a parcel of tax title property listed on the Assessors' records as Lot 6 Plan 29 (2 acres plus) and a separate parcel of property listed on the Assessors' records as Lot 4A Plan 6 consisting of approximately five acres, to the Westport Conservation Commission, providing the second parcel is to be developed as a recreational area, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to amend the Shellfish Regulations of the Town of Westport by adding the following section: "No person shall introduce, plant or transplant shellfish in any waters or onto shellfish areas within the Town of Westport without first obtaining a special permit therefor from the Selectmen or Licensing authority."

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to correct the heating system at the Town Hall, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a sign making machine for the town of Westport, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a copying machine for the Town Hall, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a cruiser car for the Police Department or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a cab and chassis or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to hold a Firemen's Muster in the Town of Westport or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Dump truck or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a snow plow and attachments or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a rubber tired Loader (front end) or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for a building to house a fire department and/or police department and/or civil defense or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Oak Street or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Middle Street, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Reed Road, beginning at the intersection of Forge and Reed Roads and continuing to the Dartmouth town line or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to extend the present layout of Arlington Ave. from where it presently ends at or around Osborn Street some 280 feet more or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Cherry and Webb Lane from the present blacktop to the property of the Westport Yacht Club or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make a layout of Hemlock St. from Rock St. to Pine St. or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of a portion of Old Bedford Road made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of William St. as made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase, or eminent domain or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of Tyler St. made by the Selectmen and on file in the office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of that portion of Tripp Drive that extends from Davis Road to a point 670 feet east of Davis Road, on file in office of the Town Clerk or take any other action thereto.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of that portion of University Drive that extends from Sanford Road to a point 570 Feet south of Tickle Road, on file in the office of the Town Clerk or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of that portion of Chabot St. that extends 300 feet from Tickle Road, on file in the office of the Town Clerk or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the layout of that portion of Newton St. that extends from Tickle Road to a point 770 feet south of Tickle Road, on file in the office of the Town Clerk or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to widen and resurface Drift Road from the Head of Westport southerly approximately one mile, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 43. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to widen and resurface Cornell Road, southerly from Adamsville Road for approximately one half mile to completed section, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 44. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to widen Union St. or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 45. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to resurface Watuppa Road or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 46. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a sidewalk from East Briggs Road some 745 feet to the location of the New Post Office or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 47. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to remove the crest of the hill adjacent to No. 59 Pine Hill Road or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 48. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to pave and widen Davis Road or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 49. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to resurface Narrow Ave. or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 50. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a pipe at the Forge Road bridge, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 51. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to resurface and repair the parking area in the rear of the Town Hall, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 52. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for the drainage account to correct drainage as the occasion arises, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 53. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install one street light on Tickle Road, pole No. 2400, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 54. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install one street light on the corner of Route 177, Tickle Road and Robert St. pole No. 1684 or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 55. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install one street light on Pinewood Ave. pole No. 72421 or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 56. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install a street light on pole No. 82 in front of the Alumni Hall, Head of Westport or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 57. To see if the town will vote to amend the Building By-Laws by deleting Section 28 in its entirety and inserting in place thereof the following: Section 28. No dwelling shall be hereafter built, erected or placed on lots less than 100 foot frontage on an accepted street or road and having less than 20,000 square feet in area except as provided in Section 29, Section 28A. A building permit

for a dwelling on a 20,000 square foot area lot with a minimum of 100 foot frontage shall be limited to a two family dwelling. For each additional 10,000 square feet of area in the lot, the size of the dwelling may be increased to accomodate one additional family unit.

Article 58. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for obtaining land for a standpipe site located south of Briggs Road between Route 88 and Sanford Road and to acquire same by purchase, donation, or eminent domain, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 59. To see if the town will vote to accept a donation of approximately six acres of land from Joseph and Florence Cadime, listed in the Assessors' records as Lot 1 Plan 30, for a standpipe site and appropriate a sum of money to make a layout and construct a way to the donated parcel of land, or take any other action relative thereto.

Article 60. To see if the town will vote to rezone the five areas from residential to business as posted on the bulletin board in the Town Hall and advertised in the newspaper or take any other action relative thereto.

Smith, Moderator who appointed Clifford A. Brightman and Louis Lamontagne to serve as tellers and both were duly sworn before the Town Clerk. Althea M. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT
TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

December, 1967

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Superintendent of the Westport Public Schools. Since coming to Westport, I am pleased to report that I find the professional and non-professional staff and the members of the School Committee cooperative, able, understanding, open-minded, and dedicated to the welfare and future of our children.

Dr. Laurence A. Fogg, my predecessor, prepared well the foundations of education in our community. It is my hope, purpose, and promise to build on them, to nurture the programs already established, and to develop and promote at all levels within the system practices of promise which will prepare our children for today and for their adult lives tomorrow. These past few months "on the job" has been a period of: familiarizing myself with the position in its many aspects and with all of its ramifications, acquainting myself with the staff, assessing and evaluating in terms of where we are and in which direction we want to go. Needless to say, that before we can move in any direction, we must replace our antiquated and inadequate buildings with modern physical facilities in order to better facilitate and increase the efficiency level of the teacher, and even more basic than this, to merely house all of our anticipated students. The sooner this is accomplished the better it will be for all of the children of Westport.

With the cooperation and understanding of the community, its citizens, and all those directly involved in the operation of the Westport Schools, I pledge to work for a continuously improving educational program for all our children and for the fullest development of their God-given abilities and particular talents.

Since I have been in the position for only a few months my statements have been very general. However, as I become more conversant with our problems and our needs, more specific advisory recommendations will be made to the School Committee at its regular meetings.

For a more detailed understanding of our present educational posture, I recommend the following reports submitted by members of the department.

REPORT FROM VO-AG DEPARTMENT--MR. JOSEPH SZALA

The agricultural department had a very successful year
with individual accomplishments that the Westport citizens
can be very proud of.

Richard Thibodeau was a member of the Mass. State Dairy
Products Judging Team at Waterloo, Iowa.

Ronald Potter was selected to participate in the Na-
tional FFA Band at Kansas City, Missouri in October. James
Wood and Alan Wordell were also delegates at this Conven-
tion, which includes 10,000 FFA students from 50 states.

Russell Thibault was a member of the Mass. State Poul-
try Judging at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Victor L. Perry, a recent graduate of our Agricultural Dept. was awarded the American Farmer Degree at the National FFA Convention at Kansas City. This is the highest degree offered by the FFA Organization and is limited to one boy per thousand. Based on accomplishments in agriculture, this is definitely an award to be proud of.

Westport again entered judging teams in the State FFA contests at Amherst and this year our Beef Team placed second, Poultry placed third and Dairy Products fifth in the State.

Our course of study was changed slightly to include an elective course in General Agriculture. This course explores all careers of the agricultural field and emphasizes landscape gardening. This is being accepted by our students readily and it is our desire to expand this course of study into a full time vocational program in the near future. There is a definite need for this vocation and we believe we can help fill this need.

Our Evening Adult Agricultural program is as strong as ever. By request from interested adults in the town, we are running a basic welding class. This program utilizes the agricultural equipment and facilities. This course was well accepted and is serving its purpose.

The Agricultural Department received over \$600 in government funds for new equipment. We purchased a Kleerflo Cleanmaster and a McCulloch Chain Saw. Both were welcome additions to our department.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT---MR. PAUL LARRIVEE

Teachers' schedules have been planned this year so that all teachers in the English department are full-time members of the department. Although this arrangement has not always been possible, I believe it is the best one for both teacher and pupil.

We are continuing to introduce the formal research paper on a modified team-teaching approach to try to arrive at some standardization of procedure. With all teachers of juniors present and as many as possible of the junior groups involved participating, there is the greater likelihood of achieving consensus on the objectives and procedures of research.

There are on the senior high level two developmental reading groups and two basic language skill groups. There should be an extension of these electives to include remedial reading groups as well.

Our greatest need in Westport, however, is the articulation of the English program from grade to grade on the elementary level, and from the elementary school to the junior high, and from the junior high to the senior high school. Our four-year program on the senior high level has crystallized over the past few years into an established program; it is kept viable by alteration and modification whenever necessary. But almost all language skills depend on spiral development, and many of these skills cannot be accelerated. If we are going to have an orderly, not rigid, process of skill development, then we must begin coordinating our program at the earliest, not the latest, level. "Probably the greatest single weakness," reports the National Council of Teachers of English, "is the lack of articulation in the teaching of English from the elementary school through the college."

GUIDANCE--MRS. ETHEL LIEBMANN

The successful operation of the guidance program could not be realized without the support of the faculty, the administration of the school and the assistance of the able secretaries. We continue to receive this and we realize its importance.

Percentage-wise, we continue to compare favorably with the national norms in the number of nursing and teaching candidates graduating from our school. Much of our counseling is devoted to educational placement of this sort.

Forty-one of last year's graduates were accepted to institutions of higher learning, and scholarships amounting to \$3000 were awarded to thirty-one of our graduates. The students and faculty appreciate the interest and generosity of the various organizations that have made this possible, for scholarships are indeed an inspiration to the recipient and help create in them a desire to succeed.

The National Merit Scholarship Program awarded a Letter of Commendation for outstanding performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in 1967 to Patricia Donnelly and Robert P. Bussiere. We congratulate them for the honor they have bestowed upon themselves, their school and their community and we urge them to continue their educational development through higher education.

A significant increase in our counseling program has dealt with adults in the community who have become aware of change in the American society and wish to further their academic education. Our records show that several of these have experienced a change in attitude through counseling and have registered in schools to continue their education.

Mr. Stephen Almeida, Mr. William Campbell, and I attended the New England Personnel and Guidance Conference. It was a rich and thought-provoking experience.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who helped make it possible for the entire guidance staff to attend this conference.

* * * * *

In reviewing past reports the following quotation came to my attention. I find that in 1965 I made the following recommendation which I consider appropriate at this time.

"As Principal of the Westport High School, I wish to urge the School Building Needs Committee to seriously consider the construction of a new high school building.

The present enrollment is 460 and every indication is that the high school population will grow. New construction in the town and transfers from parochial schools increased this year's enrollment by approximately 70 students. I feel this is an indication of things to come.

I feel strongly that our present junior high school situation, providing inadequate facilities, handicaps our incoming 9th graders. This could be remedied by the use of the present high school for a middle school, which would include grades 5, 6, 7, and 8.

As the curriculum expands the need for more rooms and special facilities becomes greater. Presently the scope of our offerings is not adequate in instrumental and vocal music, in foreign languages and in laboratory science courses. The combination of auditorium-gymnasium presents many problems. To have an assembly, we must cancel our gym classes and set up approximately 500 chairs. This requires the labor of custodians for an hour.

I also wish to point out that our present guidance suite is made up of the nurse's office and a small conference room; that our nurse's office is a dressing room; and that our cafeteria manager must use another dressing room as her headquarters. Our instrumental music program director occupies a men's room in the custodians' area. The

machine room for our commercial course leaves much to be desired. The cafeteria should accomodate two serving lines but under the present conditions this is not possible."

The only change I would make in my 1965 recommendation would be to house the eighth grade in the new high school building and use the present building for grades 5, 6, and 7. As the enrollment increases the 8th grade could be removed from the new high school and our present high school would serve adequately for grades 6, 7, and 8. I firmly believe that if this recommendation had been accepted in 1965 that our present problem would not exist.

Looking to the future, I believe that the start of the construction of the new building should be no later than the summer of 1968.

Our five year progress report to the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools was accepted. Westport High School is scheduled to be re-evaluated within five years. At that time it will be decided whether continued membership will be granted. Failure to be recommended for membership will make it difficult for students to gain entrance to institutions of higher learning.

The great majority of our teachers are conscientious and hard working--individuals who have the interest of the students at heart. Because many teachers have not been mentioned in this report, it does not mean that their efforts have not been appreciated and noted.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you, Dr. Fogg, Mr. Cariglia, and the committee for your assistance during the past year.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF WESTPORT JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Dear Mr. Cariglia:

We have had several changes in the Junior High School this year, not only in school personnel but also in class arrangement.

Two eighth grade classes were placed in the High School under Mr. Wood's direction. Mrs. Szaro and Mr. Owen were also sent to the faculty at the High School although Mrs. Szaro has graciously taken the music classes at the Head School this year.

I am most grateful to Mrs. Dorothy Smith, our vice-principal, for her tremendous help in the administrative work at the Head School and at times at both Junior High buildings along with her math classes.

Due to a continually increasing enrollment it became necessary to make a classroom in the basement at the Factory School.

However, because our classes change each period, I have tried to arrange classes in such a manner that each division spends only one period a day in the basement classroom.

During lunch time by using folding chairs and tables all children eat lunch upstairs in the four main rooms. I have tried to follow the same procedure for study periods also, as it gives each child a more convenient access to our library and reference book area.

However, when supervisors arrive, we occasionally have to use the basement room for an extra period on that day for one or two classes.

We have been most fortunate in obtaining a part-time teacher of art and also in music for the seventh grade. Both teachers are most competent in their particular subject matter fields and in teaching techniques. I hope we will be able to have them for more time next year.

Although our classes in most cases are still large, students have been assigned to classes so that they meet with others who have similar potential and achievement.

In this way each student is encouraged to progress at his own best rate, and we still feel he is challenged to a certain extent even though our curriculum is inadequate in several areas due to lack of space, materials and other handicaps.

In sports we are members of the Massasoit Junior High League which started last year. At present it includes area competition with schools of similar size in basketball and baseball. Our practice sessions, of course, are available to us through the kindness of Mr. Wood and Miss Boodry and the few games that we have to schedule are worked in when the High School or Macomber gymnasium or fields are not in use. Our boys provide excellent examples of good sportsmanship and do not lack in enthusiasm.

Some work is also being done in intramural sports in soccer and softball, depending upon weather conditions.

We are extremely pleased to have a nurse available to us at all times. Mrs. Sykes is also giving our girls a Red Cross Course in Mothers' Aid. This course is given to all junior high schools in the area and each girl will receive a Red Cross certificate upon completion of her work.

We are most fortunate in the quality of our teachers who do an excellent job within their classrooms.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you, Mr. Cariglia, and the School Committee, for your assistance and cooperation.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF ALICE A. MACOMBER SCHOOL

My dear Mr. Cariglia:

In compliance with your request I submit herewith my report for 1967.

There were three changes in the teaching staff at the Alice A. Macomber School this year.

Miss Hazel Tripp, our vice-principal, does not have a regular classroom this year. She is spending half her day teaching Joplin Reading, Mathematics, and Music in the various classrooms where she is needed. She is supervising teachers, lunchroom duty, and helping with the general building routine. This change was made because of the four additional classrooms added to our school.

Our faculty now consists of 15 classroom teachers and two remedial reading teachers. One of our remedial reading teachers works part-time at the Greenwood Park School.

The remedial reading program is made possible under Elementary and Secondary Education Act - Title I. This program is under the supervision of Mr. John B. Kelly. I cannot say enough for the excellent work being done in remedial reading for our children at Macomber.

We were very fortunate to receive over \$650.00 in library books for our main library from this government program.

Miss Linda Brown was assigned to teach one of our third grades.

Mr. Gerald Boucher was assigned to teach one of our sixth grades.

Our total enrollment is now 418 pupils.

While there have been no definite changes in the curriculum all grades now have the new World Book in Arithmetic which has the new modern approach to mathematics incorporated in the text.

We are most grateful for:

New duplicating machine

This year we are participating in the United States Savings Program. Thursday is stamp day and children are buying stamps in denominations of 10, 25, and 50 cents. Stamp books are filled and then taken to the bank to be exchanged for United States Savings Bonds. Many of our children are participating in this program.

Since great stress is being put on physical fitness, I hope that in the near future a girls' Physical Education Instructor will be found to carry out an adequate program for the older girls.

We are most fortunate to attract and retain an exceptionally fine group of teachers and school personnel, so vitally interested in the education and welfare of our Westport Children.

I would like to thank you, Mr. Cariglia, and the School Committee for your assistance and guidance.

REPORT OF FEDERAL PROJECTS DIRECTOR
AND READING CONSULTANT

I hereby submit my report on Federal aid projects in the Westport Schools.

During the school year, 1967, Federal funds continued to provide remedial reading services for children in all our public schools on a five day per week basis.

A grant to continue our remedial reading program at both the Macomber and Greenwood Park schools was approved by the Massachusetts State Department of Education under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965. Federal funds under this grant also provided for a six week summer remedial program at both schools.

In September, Mr. Robert Jefferies, Senior Supervisor from the State Department of Education, visited Westport and was favorably impressed by the fine work of our two teachers, Mrs. Stone and Mrs. Hedlund.

Our Title I grant will continue through the current school year. The amount approved is \$20,154.00, which will provide 80% of the necessary funds for teachers' salaries and consultant services.

The United States Office of Education in Washington again approved a grant of \$24,600.00 under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This grant provides the services of our three Readmobiles and three remedial teachers. A six week summer session is also included in this program. No local funds are required for this project.

We were privileged in September to employ the services of Mrs. Nan McDonald as an instructor of remedial reading under Title III. Mrs. McDonald teaches at the High School and the Head School. The work of our other two instructors, Mrs. Gladys Cronan and Miss Mary Lou Horne, has received praise from both classroom teachers and parents. Mrs. Cronan teaches at the Point and Earle Schools. Miss Horne conducts classes at the Factory School and St. George's Parochial School, which is included under the Title III program.

During the past year we have received requests and exchanged information with many other school districts throughout the United States who are interested in beginning a program parallel to that now operational in Westport. Our Title III project was also invited to participate in the Regional Conference sponsored by the International Reading Association in Sharon, Massachusetts. Following participation in a panel discussion one of our "Readmobile" units was demonstrated to approximately 120 school officials and project directors.

In addition to our remedial reading services, Westport also received \$2,300.00 under Title II for the sole purpose of improving our library resources. The library books purchased with these funds insure that books at the proper grade levels are available to students in all our schools.

A survey conducted in October qualified Westport for participation in a Federal assistance program under "Aid to Federally Impacted Areas." A follow-up survey must be completed in May, however, we have every assurance from the State Department of Education of our eligibility.

Finally, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the School Committee, to the administrators and teachers, and to the parents, particularly those who provided transportation during the summer, for their assistance in making our program successful.

REPORT OF ELEMENTARY GUIDANCE COUNSELOR

Dear Mr. Cariglia:

In January 1967, a new department was formed in the elementary schools. This department was an extension of guidance services to the elementary grades. The elementary guidance counselor's office is located at the Alice A. Macomber School.

In the past year, the counselor's duties consisted of individual testing for the Readmobile program, individual testing from teacher referral, achievement and group intelligence testing for the elementary grades, and counseling of students referred by teachers, parents and the students themselves. Individual interviews are held with all sixth grade students at least once a year.

This past September a new program was instituted at the Macomber School for the sixth grade students. A career study program consisting of a series of motion pictures, group study, and mimeographed information was offered as an introduction to the potential careers available to each child. It is not the intention of the program to have the student decide on his future career, rather to make the student aware of the vast opportunities which await his choosing.

The elementary guidance counselor also prepared a guidance statement, approved by the State Department of Education, and presented it to the Superintendent and the members of the teaching staff. This statement defined the role of the counselor.

It is hoped that more parents will take advantage of this service and contact the department if they feel their child has any problems with the classroom situation.
