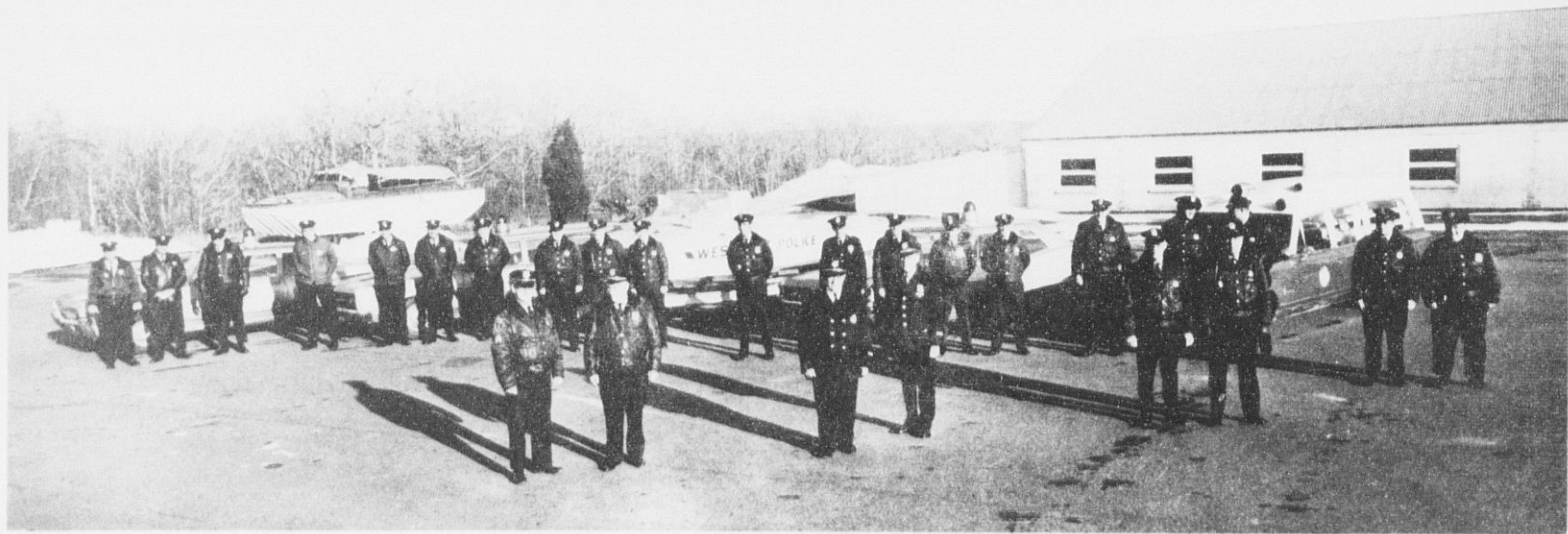

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will appropriate a
sum of money, in addition to the sum voted under Article 2
of the warrant for the special town meeting of January 16,
1968, for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing a
new middle school and to determine whether this appropri-
ation will be raised by borrowing or otherwise.

And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant
by posting five or more attested copies thereof in as many
public places within said town at least seven days before the
time of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make return of the warrant with
your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place
of meeting aforesaid.

Lees, Moderator who appointed Louis Lemontagne and Richard Wordell to serve as tellers and both were duly sworn before the Town Clerk.

The warrant was read by Moderator Carlton A. Lees.

ARTICLE 1. A motion to appropriate the sum of \$1,785,000.00 in addition to the sum voted under Article 2 of the warrant for the special town meeting of January 16, 1968, for constructing, orginally equipping and furnishing a new Middle School and that to raise the appropriation the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to borrow \$1,785,000.00 under Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948 as amended, was carried. Yes 331 No 12

Voted: (Unanimously) that we now adjourn.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT 1969

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Bristol, SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Westport
in said County. Greetings:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts
you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of
the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and Town
affairs, to assemble at their respective polling places,
namely:

Precinct A	Legion Hall
Precinct B	Municipal Office Building
Precinct C	Greenwood Park School

on Monday, the tenth day of March next, it being the second
Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and
there to choose the following officers, viz: one Selectman,
one Town Clerk, one Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one
Assessor, one member of the Board of Health, one member
of the School Committee, one member of the Regional School
Committee, one highway Surveyor, one Fish Commissioner,
two Trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years;
also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: four
Landing Commissioners, one Tree Warden, one member of
the Planning Board for five years; also four members of the
Housing Authority; also to vote on the following question,
viz: "Shall the town in addition to the payment of fifty per
cent of a premium for contributory group life and health in-
surance for employees in the service of the town and thei r
dependents, pay a subsidiary or additional rate?" all to be
voted for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the High
School Auditorium on Tuesday the eighteenth day of March
next, it being the second Tuesday after the second Monday
of said month at 7:30 in the evening, then and there to act
on the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1. To determine the salary and compen-
sation of all elected town officers.

ARTICLE 2. To determine to what department or
departments the money last received from the County Treas-
urer for dog fund shall be appropriated.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be considered necessary to defray the Town's expenses for the year 1969 and appropriate the same to the several departments and take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial years beginning January 1, 1969 and January 1, 1970, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury a sum of money for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from unappropriated funds in the treasury, a sum of money for Chapter 90, Highway Construction, to be used on various Chapter 90 so-called roads in the town and to be used as determined by the Board of Selectmen, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$9,700.11 to be received from the State under provisions of Chapter 616 Acts of 1967 be appropriated for various road projects to be determined by the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the State Department of Public Works, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to amend, change or revise the existing Personnel By-Law, such changes, revisions, or amendments having been prepared by the Personnel Classification and Compensation Board and as posted on the bulletin board of the Town Hall and on file in the Town Clerk's office or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$43,960.23 Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional Vocational School District's operating cost for 1969.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$4,646.98 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional School District's capital cost for 1969.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3,000) dollars for the drainage account to correct drainage as the occasion arises, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the sale of cemetery lots and graves for the purpose of preparing sites for new graves, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to transfer a sum of money from the sale of cemetery lots and graves for the purpose of blacktopping the two main roads in the town cemetery (Beech Grove Cemetery) or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 16A of Chapter 54 of the General Laws expressly designed for the appointment of election officers, in an emergency, on election day, should the occasion arise, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to install one street light on Lakeshore Ave., pole no. 1661, one street light on Faulkner Street, pole no. 72435, street lights on the following pole nos. 3035, 3033, 3031, on Newton Street, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for street lighting to be used during the course of the year as determined by the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to accept the layouts of the following streets: 1. Portion of University Drive that extends westerly from the portion previously accepted to and including permanent turnaround as shown on said layout. 2. Bayberry Drive, from Charlotte White Road Extension north for a distance of 713.53 feet. 3. Adamsville Road, from Cornell Road to Rhode Island line.

ARTICLE 18 Continued. 4. Road leading into Masquesatch Meadows, 3/10 of one mile. 5. Portion of Robert Street extending southerwesterly, westerly and southerly from that portion of Robert Street accepted in 1968 to a distance of 1246.48 feet. 6. A portion of Robert Street southerly and westerly a distance of approximately 518 feet from roadway station 31-76.71 to station 36-79.65, all of these layouts being on file in the office of the Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase, or eminent domain, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the town will vote to accept the layouts of the following streets: 1. Adirondack Lane, from Old Bedford Road southerly. 2. Green Street, from Old County Road north of approximately 400 feet. 3. "O" Drive, from Sanford Road easterly approximately 750 feet. 4. Beaulieu Street, from William Street to Pauline Street, approximately 320 feet. 5. Portion of Newton and Chabot Streets and not previously submitted for acceptance, a distance of 460 feet so as to provide a continuous throughway. 6. "J" Drive. 7. A portion of Robert Street, southerly, westerly and easterly a distance of approximately 1,182 feet from roadway station 36-79.65, all of these layouts being on file in the office of the Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation, purchase or eminent domain, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to resurface and/or widen the following streets: 1. Drift Road, from Charlotte White Road to Hix Bridge Road. 2. Tripp Drive. 3. Union Avenue. 4. Jiggs Street. 5. Charlotte White Road, from Main Road to Sodom Road. 6. Sodom Road, from Route 177 southerly. 7. Newton and Chabot Streets, 1,050 feet or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to make the following layouts: 1. Van Buren Street, approximately 250 feet. 2. Extend layout of Hobart Street approximately 150 feet. 3. Extend layout of "D" Drive approximately 190 feet. 4. Extend Arlington Avenue 280 feet from where it presently ends. 5. Briggs Road, from Sanford Road to Watuppa Road, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase one station wagon for the Police Department, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a dump truck, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a snow plow and attachments, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Dozer Loader and attachments, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Catch Basin Cleaner and attachments, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the procurement of preliminary engineering plans, specifications and cost estimates for a library building or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the town will authorize the School Committee, in accordance with General Laws Chapter 149, Section 178-I as amended by Chapter 633 of the Acts of 1968, to designate an attorney as a representative of the School Committee for the purpose of bargaining with employee organizations for school employees, or will take any other action relating to the same.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as a Town Way the turnaround at the westerly end of Cherry and Webb Lane as shown on the 1967 layout accepted by the town on March 26, 1968, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the town will vote to transfer to the Conservation Commission for conservation and recreational purposes the portion of the turnaround at the westerly end of Cherry and Webb Lane lying south of the westerly extension of the north line of said Lane, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to exchange with F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., the portion of the turnaround at the westerly end of Cherry and Webb Lane lying north of the westerly extension of the northline of said Lane for the land of F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., lying south of the south line of said Lane and extending southerly in a strip one hundred feet wide to land now or formerly of W. Norman Davis et al, such land to be under the control of the Conservation Commission for conservation and recreational purposes, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the town will vote to acquire by gift, purchase or eminent domain the land on the Horseneck south of Cherry and Webb Lane belonging to W. Norman Davis et al bounded on the east and west by land of the Town of Westport, on the south by the Atlantic Ocean one hundred twenty-five feet, and on the north by land of F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., one hundred feet, such land to be under the control of the Conservation Commission for conservation and recreational purposes, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to release to F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., whatever rights of way the town may have over land of F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., in the old location of Cherry and Webb Lane along the river in exchange for a right of way twenty feet wide along the southerly line of land of F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., extending westerly from the turnaround at the westerly end of Cherry and Webb Lane to the westerly end of the land of F. L. Tripp and Sons, Inc., or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the revised 1963 layout of Horseneck Road, on file in the office of the Town Clerk, and return to the previous owners the land not contained in the revised layout, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the construction of a new fire station building, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the installation of a sprinkler system required by demand of the Public Safety Department of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, in the building at 830 Drift Road, Westport, Massachusetts, owned by the Town of Westport and leased to Mrs. Dorothy Munroe, presently being operated as the Dea Rest Home, for care of the elderly welfare residents of Westport, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws by inserting at the end of Paragraph 1 of Section III-B of Article XIV, Zoning By Laws, the following paragraph:

And also beginning at a point in the easterly line of Route 88 six hundred (600) feet south of the southerly line of American Legion Highway, thence southerly in the easterly line of Route 88 to the former southerly line of Kirby Road, thence easterly in the northerly line of land zoned Residential by the paragraph above to the East Branch of the Westport River and into said river as far as private rights extend, thence northerly by the East Branch of said river to the southerly line of the Head of Westport Town Landing, thence westerly in the southerly line of said Town Landing to the southwesterly corner thereof, thence northerly in the westerly line of said Town Landing to the northwesterly corner thereof, thence easterly in the northerly line of said Town Landing to the East Branch of the Westport River and into said river as far as private rights extend, thence northerly by the East Branch of said river to Bread and Cheese Brook, thence northerly by Bread and Cheese Brook to a point six hundred (600) feet south of the southerly line of American Legion Highway, thence in a line parallel to the southerly line of American Legion Highway easterly to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the town will vote to amend the Building-By-Laws as posted on the bulletin board of the Town Hall, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding Section 4A to Article VII:

Article VII, Section 4A. No person shall stand with, or near to, two or more persons upon any sidewalk or public place so as to obstruct or inconvenience travel therein.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding the following section: No person owning or having the control of a building shall suffer any water from the sump pumps, roof, gutters, conductors or water spouts or such building to be discharged, or to flow over or upon any street.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the town will vote to amend the By-Laws of the Town of Westport by adding the following section: The provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 90, Section 20C and amendments thereto, are hereby adopted authorizing police officers to take cognizance and to give notice of violations of any provisions of any rule, regulation, order or By-Law regulating the use of motor vehicles and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a schedule of fines for offenses subject to said statute.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 40, Section 6B of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts which reads as follows: "A city or town which accepts or has accepted this section may appropriate money for the purchase of uniforms for members of its police and fire departments, which may include the purchase of rubber boots, shoes and other outer clothing necessary for the use of members of the police and fire departments when traveling to or from or during the course of their employment".

ARTICLE 43. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year, the mosquito control works as estimated and certified to by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 in accordance with Section 11, Chapter 660 Acts of 1948 for Gypsy moth work, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 in accordance with Section 13, Chapter 761 Acts of 1949 for Dutch Elm work, or take any other action relative thereto.

REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board organized on March 17, 1969 with J. Douglas Borden as Chairman, Alford Dyson as Clerk, and other member Russell T. Hart.

The many problems facing the Board of Selectmen have continued to grow during the past year 1969. As we pointed out in our report of 1968 the drainage problems continue to grow and become more evident during December of 1969 when heavy rains caused considerable damage and the resulting effect was that of many complaints being received due to icy conditions on the streets, primarily caused by water being pumped from cellars.

1969 also saw the opening of the Sanford Road exit ramp that has long been awaited by businessmen and residents in the Sanford Road area.

The rapid growth of our town brings about many problems that are of concern to the Board of Selectmen, listed below are some that you as taxpayers should give considerable thought to:

1. Under our present system all monies spent are appropriated at our annual or special town meetings. The maximum number of voters who attend are in the vicinity of 600 voters who in turn represent more than 4800 registered voters. The question is, should we consider changing to a representative town meeting, where you elect persons to represent you at the town meeting.

2. A water study was made in 1965 at a cost of \$21,318.57. We believe that the land should be purchased now for a standpipe as recommended by the study, and also that legislation should be filed now to permit us to put in a water system, when and if we want to do so. This matter should be given considerable thought due to more and more pollution of wells caused by our every increasing population and building.

3. Another important aspect of town government which is antiquated is our present method of electing a Highway Surveyor. Under our present system any registered voter can seek the office, whether or not he has the qualifications to fulfill the duties as a builder of roads, plowing of snow, and many duties that are considerable and varied. We believe that the appointment of a Superintendent of Streets, by and under the jurisdiction of the Board of Selectmen, would result in better coordination between both departments.

Many voters are of the opinion today that the Board of Selectmen control all activities of the Highway Department, this is a false impression except in the case where Chapter 90 funds or special acts are voted allocating money for streets. Other than that, the highway surveyor has complete authority over the problems and monies in his department. We believe the method of a Superintendent of Streets, appointed by the Selectmen, as is in effect in two-thirds of the towns in Massachusetts, is much more practical and works out for the best interest of all concerned. This opinion is shared by our present Highway Surveyor.

We, as members of the Board of Selectmen, must spend considerable time appointing committees, taking part in their activities, and in general, try to solve many of the problems facing the town now and in the future. As a result, we have been encouraged by the sincerity of the many committees we have appointed to help in this respect. We, therefore, wish to acknowledge the work being done by all of the men and women on the various committees and say thanks for their interest in our community.

In conclusion, may we urge all of our eligible residents to exercise your God given right by registering to vote and to take part in your Town Government. We also wish to express our thanks and appreciation for the help and guidance of many of our citizens.

The Westport Free Public Library is a part of the Eastern Regional Library system which enables its users to borrow books, films and audio-visual materials from the New Bedford and Boston Public Libraries. Many library users are taking advantage of these services.

This year has seen a remarkable increase in library use as shown by the 16% increase in the circulation. We are most fortunate that Mrs. Tripp and her assistants, Mrs. Cabral and Mrs. Plante continue their excellent work under conditions that are becoming more and more difficult due to our inadequate facilities. It has been necessary to put more books in storage because of lack of space. Mr. Harold Wood and the high school students have been most generous in helping to move and store volumes in the High School.

We have continued the service of distributing books to the shut-ins and to the Senior Citizens. Story-hours have been presented for the children.

The possibility of renting space for an interim library were explored by the librarian and trustees. However, after seeking the advice of the Selectmen and the Finance Board, it was indicated that all efforts should be directed towards a new building.

The building committee has completed work on preliminary plans for a new building which will be presented to the town at the annual town meeting in March. The trustees received notification that the Massachusetts Library Commissioners had selected Westport as the recipient of a tentative \$70,000 Federal grant under Title II of the Library Services and Construction Act. If the town votes to build a new library at the meeting on March 17, 1970, we will receive this money.

If the town wishes to offer full library services to its citizens, a building must be provided. Given the proper up to date facility, all areas of library activity could be expanded for the benefit of every citizen of Westport.

LANDING COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

For many years the Landing Commissioners have been attempting to locate records and survey the Town's Landing places to preserve the public access to the water.

Following is a list of Landings and Public Ways that have been identified to date. More may be listed as the records are searched. The map will help the citizen to locate the Landings. The numbers on the map will correspond with the numbers on the list with the letter 'P' or 'T' preceding the number to designate Public or Town Landing.

Access to Rivers and Ocean in Westport

A. Public Landings - Layed out by Proprietors of Dartmouth about 1717. See Proprietors Records and Benjamin Crane's Notes. These Landings were relayed out between 1848 and 1851 by Towns of Westport pursuant to Chapter 171 of Acts of 1848. Descriptions of these landings as redefined are on record with the Town Clerk. These landings are under the control of the landing commissioners and are subject to the by-laws of the Town of Westport for the Government of Public and Town Landings approved June 1848 and June 28, 1889. The general public is entitled to use these landings on the same basis as the inhabitants of Westport.

- P 1. Head of Westport (both sides)
See deed of April 4, 1851 in Bristol County (S.D.) Registry of Deeds, Book 21, Page 373.
- P 2. Hix Bridge (west side)
- P 3. Near Adamsville on west side of Acoaxet River
For adjoining land see deed recorded in said Registry Book 237, Page 390.
- P 4. East Beach near Dartmouth Line
- P 5. Westport Point (east side of road)
The usefulness of this landing was impaired by the construction of wharf and bridge. For attempts to preserve public rights see vote at Town Meeting April 1, 1805 and Act of Legislature 1830 ch. 102 authorizing construction of wharf. For layout of approach to bridge see Act of Legislature of March 25, 1893 and County Commissioner layout on June 15, 1893.

B. Town Landings - Acquired in various ways by Town of Westport. Control and regulation same as public landing, but inhabitants of Westport may be given preference over general public.

T 1. Hix Bridge (east side)

See deed of Alden W. Brightman to Town of Westport dated August 2, 1879 recorded in Bristol County (S.D.) Registry of Deeds, Book 92, Page 48. Query whether acceptance by the Town was authorized.

T 2. Gooseberry Neck Bar

See deed of Charles A. Cornell et al to Town of Westport dated 1916 recorded in said Registry, Book 440, Page 217 and deed of William H. Jollie to Town of Westport dated August 10, 1916, recorded in said Registry, Book 440, Page 216. See also layout by Town of Westport recorded in said Registry Book of Public Improvements 2, Page 267, pursuant to votes at town meeting on March 13, 1915 and March 18, 1916. See plan recorded in said Registry in Plan Book 15, Page 55. If the layout was under G. L. Ch 88 S 14 and was valid, this landing may be a public rather than a town landing. The description in the layout appears insufficient to include the rights in the beach. If the layout is invalid, the town's rights depend on the deeds which are upon express conditions, but give the town the right in common with others to use the beach for bathing, boating, driving, fishing, and walking. The town in this event would not own below highwater, but its rights as aforesaid would extend not only to the adjoining beach, but also to the entire beach in which Cornell et al had such rights at the time of the deed. Query whether acceptance of deeds by the Town was authorized.

T 3. East Beach at the Let

See deed of Emma J. Tripp to Town of Westport dated September 17, 1919 (to be used as a public landing place and maintained as such by the grantee subject to right of way of one Farley). Query whether acceptance of this deed by the Town was authorized and whether this is a public rather than a town landing.

T 4. Central Wharf at Westport Point

See deed of William Almy to Town of Westport dated March 16, 1934 recorded in said Registry Book 746, Page 458. Query whether acceptance by Town authorized.

Also included in bait house wharf to west of Central Wharf. The "wharf" does not include the wharf at north end of the mud dock which is technically the end of Main Road and part of a way.

C. Town Ways - Many town ways have been layed out and accepted by the town to the ocean, river, beach or shore. Regardless of the language employed these layouts do not extend below highwater mark and do not give the town or public the right to use the adjoining portion of beach, i. e. between high and low water, for a landing or a way. If a landing is intended, the town should lay one out at the end of the way under G. L. C 88 S. 14. Only in rare instances is there a public right to use the beach as a way or for any purpose other than fishing, fowling, and navigation.

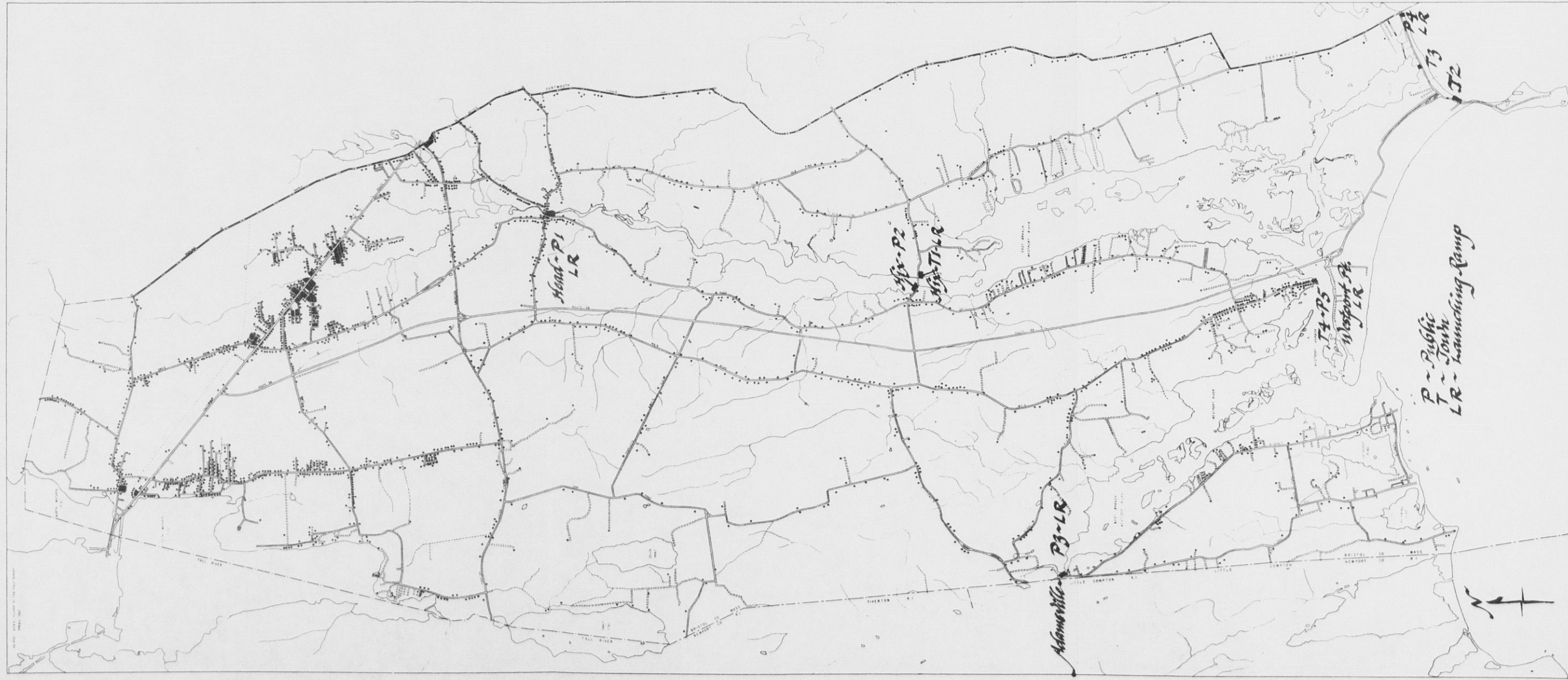

HARBOR DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Westport Harbor Development Commission was established on April 15, 1969, by the Board of Selectmen in response to a request from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for the Town of Westport to prepare a proposal for improvements in the Westport River. Members of the Commission were:

This Commission prepared an extensive proposal (a 76 page report) which included maps, charts, aerial photographs, history, statistics, recreation, industry, commerce, navigational and ecological information, and recommendations. Its purpose was to provide the Corps of Engineers with the information it needed to initiate a study of the Westport River to determine the advisability, cost and economic justification for constructing navigational and allied improvements. One hundred copies of the book were printed and distributed to town, state and federal officials.

The Harbor Development Commission held a preliminary public hearing at the Westport High School on June 19, 1969 at which it provided the people of the town with advance information on its planned presentation to the Corps of Engineers. The following week, on June 25, 1969, the Commission made a formal presentation to the Corps of Engineers at a public hearing at the High School. As a result of the Commission's presentation, the Corps of Engineers is in the process of an extensive tidal, ecological, and navigational study of the river which they expect to complete within three years.

RIVER IMPROVEMENT COMMISSION

Having completed its special mission of preparing a presentation for the Corps of Engineers, the Harbor Development Commission was disestablished on September 15, 1969. In its place the Board of Selectmen appointed the River Improvement Commission to provide for an organization which could cope with the many problems of the entire river, not just the harbor.

The River Improvement Commission has reviewed the many river problems, assigned priorities, and initiated corrective action on nineteen river improvement items, including pollution, ecology, shellfish and finfish management, navigation, river hazards, and sport fishing. In addition, this commission is continually taking every opportunity to urge the Corps of Engineers to expedite their study of the river. The Commission's aim is to get the Corps of Engineers to complete their study within one year. Actions to improve the Westport River by the Commission in 1969 were inhibited only by the lack of funds which it is continuing to seek from state and/or federal sources. Much more work with the river must be accomplished if it is to be saved, and with the help and support of the people of Westport and state and federal officials, the dying trend of the river could be reversed in 1970.

REPORT OF THE TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

The Westport Conservation Commission organized with Jones B. Shannon, Chairman, Mrs. Stephen Delano, Vice-Chairman and Andre Latessa, Secretary. Other members of the Commission are William G. Heath, George R. Medeiros, Octave D. Pelletier and Norman H. Sasseville. Regular monthly meetings were held throughout the year in addition to several special meetings. A quorum was present at all meetings, often with full attendance of commissioners.

The past year was one in which some of the Commission's plans, both short and longer range, were realized or came nearer to realization.

Steps were taken to implement the Resource Plan for the use of the natural resources on the Horseneck Point Recreation and Conservation area. This plan was submitted in February, 1969 by the Bristol Conservation District, Charles A. Costa, Chairman, Board of District Supervisors. Participating technicians were Henry J. Ritzer, U. S. D. A. Soil Conservation service; Thaddeus J. Kuczewski, Southeast Massachusetts Extension Service; Russell C. Weeks, Massachusetts Division of Forests and Parks; and Charles Stiles, Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Game. We express our gratitude to them for their extensive help and cooperation.

Specifically, an access path to the ocean beach was constructed from the turn around and parking lot near the river. A fence was erected separating the area from the property of the Coopers who have been most cooperative with the Commission. The river beach adjacent to the Westport Yacht Club, whose officers were very generous in making facilities available, was used for swimming classes by the Youth Activity Board and by citizens of the Town. We anticipate that the ocean beach will have continually greater usage and are pleased with willingness of the Board of Selectmen to consider arrangements for maintenance and life guard protection.

Plans for continued implementation of the recommendations in the Natural Resources Study of the Rock Street Conservation Area are under way to the point where use of the area this summer for recreation on a limited basis should be possible.

We joined, in late 1969, with the Planning Board and Board of Health in sponsoring an article on the 1970 Warrant for the Town Meeting called for a comprehensive soil study of Westport to be conducted by the Massachusetts Department of Commerce, Division of Planning and the U. S. Department of Agriculture - Soil Conservation Service. We believe that such a study is vital for the well being of the Town.

The Commission wishes to go on record expressing appreciation to town and commonwealth officials heretofore mentioned in this report as well as the many interested citizens for their cooperation and assistance. We are especially grateful to the members of the Board of Selectmen, Representative John Long, Mr. Peter Wood, and Commissioner Arthur Brownell for their help.

During the past year we have had eighteen members of Civil Defense complete the Rescue and Radiological monitoring courses.

We have also: six firemen, four policemen, five members of the rationing board, and six Civil Defense personnel who have taken the "Staff College Home Study Course Civil Defense U. S. A." This is a "self-teaching programmed instruction".

Classes in Radiological, shelter management, medical self help, First Aid, and Civil Defense nursing care, can be taken by groups and organizations simply by contacting Mr. Charles M. Arruda, Director of Civil Defense at 636-8822, and make the necessary arrangements.

The emergency warning system is still tested at 11:15 A. M. on Wednesdays.

During the year 1969 Civil Defense has acquired for the Town such equipment as; a 5 ton GMC Trucktractor, a Jeep, 2 chain saws, a generator set, a welding machine, paving breaker, water tank trailer, besides many small items. Actual Federal Government figures show that, the town has acquired \$21,384.54 (Federal cost) and the cost to the Town was \$573.26, up to June 30, 1969.

The Board of Selectmen voted that the installation of gas services (bottled or natural) and gas appliances in the Town of Westport be in accordance with the State regulations and that all such installations require a permit and an inspection by the town Gas Inspector.

There have been a total of 188 permits issued during the year 1969.

The fee established for each permit is \$3.50 with the Gas Inspector receiving \$2.50 of this amount for his services and expenses. With this system of fees and payments to the Inspector or Assistant Inspector, Mr. Norman Michaud, this program is self-supporting and administered at no cost to the taxpayer.

Applications for permits for gas installations can be obtained from either Gas Inspector, the Police Department at the Town Hall and the North Westport Fire Station. Every effort will be made to provide prompt inspections. However, as the Inspectors work only part-time, it also requires the cooperation of the person taking out the permit.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Greater Fall River Vocational School District witnessed in 1969 another year of forward progress in the positive growth and development of Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School. The enrollment has increased from 644 day time students in 1968 to 839 day time students in 1969.

Broken down by communities Fall River has 573 students in Grades 9 through 12; Somerset has 44 students in Grades 9 through 12; Swansea has 51 students in Grades 9 through 12; and Westport has 33 students in Grades 9 through 12.

The evening school enrollment has increased from 253 students in 1968 to 361 students in 1969. In the evening program the school now offers 16 programs in trade extension, 4 programs in apprenticeship training and 2 programs in practical arts education.

In addition to the foregoing programs, the school has conducted programs under the Manpower Development and Training Act in six different areas. These programs have trained 187 unemployed and under-employed men and women for gainful employment. The cost of these programs has been subsidized 100% by the federal government.

To conduct all of these educational and training programs the school is in operation from 8:00 A. M. to 10:00 P. M. five days per week, Saturday mornings and during the summer months.

During 1969, the District received \$233,985.00 from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under Public Law 88-210 to pay for the salaries of vocational teachers. The district had deducted \$200,000.00 of this amount from the 1969 budget as anticipated income and has deducted \$33,985.00 from the 1970 budget to reduce operating costs.

On April 8, 1969 the District received \$417,500.00 from the Economic Development Administration. This sum brought the total amount received from the Economic Development Administration to \$2,747,071.00 of the total \$3,053,000.00 federal grant. In 1970 a federal audit will be made of the total cost of equipping and constructing the school and the final payment will be made.

On April 16, 1968 the District received \$23,958.00 in federal funds under the Vocational Education Act to be applied to equipment for the new school.

On July 10, 1969 the District received \$4,008.89 from the Commonwealth as its share of the 50% reimbursement for vocational education for 1967-1968 school year. Our school was not in operation at that time and the law did not go into effect until March 1968; hence the small reimbursement.

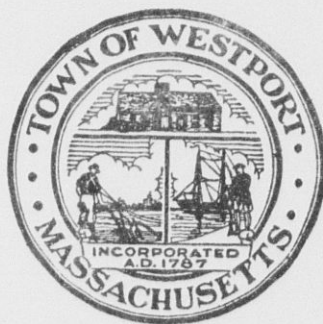
However, we anticipate \$337,000.00 from the source in 1970 and you will note that this amount has been deducted from the 1970 budget as anticipated income.

On November 13, 1969 the District received \$200,841.20 from the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission and this money is applied annually to reduce the principal on the school construction loan.

While our high school programs, post high school programs, evening programs and training programs will continue to grow in 1970, as the superintendent-director of Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School, I feel that in 1970 we should give serious thought to developing on a regional basis programs in special education. At the present time too little is being done in this area by any community and, as students in special education can best be served through occupational education, it is only natural that vocational educators join with special education educators in developing such a program. Working on a regional basis we can develop more and varied programs which no single community can afford individually. Under the Vocational Education Act of 1968 (P. L. 90-576) financial assistance is available to inaugurate such programs.

In closing this report may I take this opportunity to extend my sincere thanks and deep appreciation to the members of the regional school committee. It would be difficult if not impossible to measure the value of the time, the work, the experience, and the devotion these members contribute to their work. The area is fortunate to have men of their caliber serving on the Committee and I am extremely grateful for their help and support.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

It is with pleasure that I submit, to you and the taxpayers of Westport, my third report as Superintendent of the Westport Public Schools.

Included in the reports of various administrators, which follow, as well as the statistical reports is a great deal of information which should be of vital interest and concern to the citizens of the Town of Westport.

Your perusal and study of these reports is urgently solicited, as an interest citizenry is one of the essential elements in the creation and maintenance of good schools in a democracy.

The progress made in our school system during 1969, is in larger measure due to the team effort and cooperation of the School Committee and all the personnel of the school system.

The school system continues to grow, and with the opening of the Middle School in September, I'm certain that our enrollment figures will increase at an accelerated pace. We have accomplished some things during the past year, but merely scratched the surface of what can and ought to be done. We have:

1. Lowered the pupil-teacher ratio in some of the elementary grades.
2. Extended semi-departmentalization to Grade 5 as well as Grade 6 at the Alice A. Macomber School.
3. Expanded our "levels" reading program to include more grades.
4. Substantially increased our library books and circulation in all schools.

5. Conducted our second Faculty Professional Growth Day. The theme this year focused on "A Continuous Progress Curriculum" for our teachers. The feedback received indicated that this one was more favorably received than the previous one. Also, as a result of this program, a "pilot program" in mathematics is being tried with the fourth grade teachers at the Alice A. Macomber School.
6. Set up a schedule of curriculum meetings throughout the school year, for the purpose of involving the Faculty of the Westport Schools, in a Curriculum Study, that will update and improve our program of studies.

With our improved physical plant, breathing space, and proper attitudes, much can be accomplished. I believe it is the responsibility of the Superintendent to provide direction in determining the needs of our students; I further believe that the Middle School with its innovations will serve as a catalyst in revitalizing both the elementary and secondary school curriculum.

However, without the agreement, understanding, conviction and cooperation of the administrators and faculty alike, very little will result. More and more educational leaders throughout the nation are standing on the philosophy that "new methods and devices are being used to help students learn and progress at their own rate while receiving more individual attention". It is my belief that this is the direction that Westport will take.

NEEDS FOR 1970

The opening of the Middle School means that additional faculty members (many of these are in the specialized areas of Physical Education, Home Economics, Music, Art, etc.,) will be needed, as well as added clerical and custodial help.

Moreover, in order to reduce our pupil-teacher ratio at the Alice A. Macomber School to 25-27 to 1, additional teachers will be needed for that building.

The scheduled opening of Kindergartens for the Fall will mean the hiring of more teachers there. Anticipated enrollment of children of this age is 150-200.

I must say that I am truly excited over the construction of the Middle School with its optimum potential, and over the fact that our children in these grade levels will have a much more diversified educational program for which to look forward. It is my deep conviction, that I, as the educational leader have a definite moral commitment to you, the taxpayer who will be paying for the price of this building and its operation in the years to come. I would be most remiss in the discharge of my duty if I, along with my administrators and teachers, did not do our utmost to aim toward the goal of educational excellence not only in this building but in all others.

While I am optimistically looking forward to the opening of our Middle School, and with it the progress that it will bring-- I must remind the citizens of the community that this merely represents Phase I of our building program. It is not too soon to approve the article in the warrant that will allow the High School Needs Study Committee to move forward towards the preparation of preliminary plans for the adding, renovating, and eliminating of the inadequacies of our present High School. Certainly, if our present programs are saturating our available space and if we want to implement programs that should be offered, but which are precluded by either a lack of space or a lack of the right type of space, then it is incumbent upon us to see to it that Phase #2 of our building program, that is the High School addition, is completed as soon as possible.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Committee for their fine spirit of cooperation, also my thanks are extended to members of the Middle School Building Committee, who have so unselfishly given of themselves in order that the Westport Middle School will be one that truly meets the needs of our community.

May I express my sincere thanks to the professional staff for their fine spirit of assistance and cooperation. Also, thanks go out to our secretarial, custodial, and cafeteria staffs for the rendering of their excellent services.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL

CHANGES IN PERSONNEL

After many years of faithful service Mr. Clayton Sisson retired and was replaced by Mr. Peter Keene.

Miss Rosemarie Choquette replaced Mr. William Hayter.

Mr. John Kubiski replaced Mr. William Campbell as High and Junior High Guidance Counselor.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT - MR. PAUL LARRIVEE

English teachers have been meeting to discuss the English program in grades 5-12, with a view to finding better ways to individualize instruction and to select materials that are geared to the students' different needs, abilities, and interest. While no definite proposals have yet been made by the group; English teachers, particularly those on the high school level, have been looking rather long at the phase-elective English curriculum as an organizational way of meeting student differences. How to further individualize among students within a group will depend on how each course is constructed--its materials, instructional approaches, methods of evaluating students, etc.

Though we have long felt dissatisfaction for the program offered to the general student, there is a need to evaluate the entire program. Even among college preparatory students we find a wide range of differences. Not all students will attend the same college, and not all will attend for the same reasons. A week's unit on John Milton might have been fine for the prospective English teacher, but the senior girl in the same class dreaming of her R. N.'s uniform might have more profitably spent her time. Our program in English has too often been subject-matter oriented, and unfortunately, not often enough student-oriented.

We need to take a critical look at the lock-step method of grade advancement with its built in sameness for large groups of students, and begin to experiment courageously with variable groupings. Some instruction might more efficiently take place in large groups, while at other times very small groups can permit greater individualization of instruction. These changes need not be made at great expense in manpower, for flexible staffing patterns utilizing teacher aides, interns, and clerks have been effectively adopted in many school systems. To reduce class size by simply employing more teachers while at the same time maintaining traditional approaches and perpetuating the same organizational set-up would, it seems, be a waste of manpower.

The age-old practice of grouping approximately 30 or so students in a box-like classroom and staffing this organizational unit with one teacher is gradually being dropped in modern school systems everywhere. The lecture method in which the teacher is the speaker and the students the listeners is not usually an efficient use of the teacher's and the students' time. Many lectures can be prepared on audio tape, video tape, etc., to release the teacher to deal with students on a more individual basis. Though there is as yet no ideal organizational pattern or instructional approach, we in the Westport School System ought to keep a watchful eye on what is emerging elsewhere and begin to create the conditions that are conducive to change.

Though this report seems to be long on recommendations and short on progress reporting, I do believe that without significant organizational changes we can continue to make all kinds of minor teaching adjustments in the classroom and to introduce more modern teaching materials (Faulker instead of Silas Marner, for example) without ever really getting at the problem of individualizing instruction geared to each student's abilities, needs, and interests.

I reported here last year, pointing hopefully to progress, that we were considering the purchase of 35 cassette recorder units. A composition program utilizing the recorders was described in a request for funds from Title III NDEA. Thus far, we have no firm commitment from the Federal agency to allocate funds for Westport for this project. As a result, we have lost a school year during which time the project could have been underway. I have mentioned, also in a previous annual report, the introduction of a developmental reading course and a basic language skills course to the English program, but it might be useful to explain these courses more fully because I find they are misunderstood by many people.

The developmental reading course is intended primarily for students of average or better-than-average reading ability; it is not a solution for students having remedial reading problems, which can be handled only by a specialist in remedial reading. Even with the part-time service of the Readmobile, we have not been able to provide for the majority of students in need of reading remediation.

The basic language skills course is a course intended to supplement the regular English Course for students who are generally deficient in the language skills. Students are instructed in small groups in all phases of language learning by having them perform all kinds of linguistic tasks, while eschewing for the most part the traditional nomenclature and definitions of what is commonly called grammar.

Actaually, for many of our students, this course should replace rather than supplement the traditional English course. Its objectives come closer to satisfying the needs of these students than does the regular program. But to offer it to all who truly need it, we would need more space and more manpower (not necessarily all professional).

The presently convened curriculum committees, I believe, are now providing us the atmosphere that we need in order to effect change, so that the primary condition of change is already present. It is now up to members of the school system at all levels to seek the most meaningful change possible.

REPORT FROM VO-AG DEPARTMENT - MR. JOSEPH SZALA

The agricultural department is continuing its vocational educational program rather successfully. The course of study consists of Dairy Science Production and Landscape Gardening. Students may select either vocations in preparation for employment after graduation.

The adult evening agricultural program is continuing as in the past. For twenty weeks, on Thursdays, our individuals are learning more about new farm management techniques. Presently there are 24 farmers enrolled in this program.

In conjunction with the adult young farmers group, the Westport Fair had a most successful year this past summer. Although not large, the overall quality of our Fair is excellent and is one of the very few fairs in Massachusetts that is not commercialized.

It is interesting to note that Westport Fair paid our Youthful exhibitors over \$1,300.00, in premium money this year.

Westport again entered judging teams in State FFA sponsored judging contests at Amherst, and again a few of our students placed at the top.

Marshall Ronco placed first in the State in public speaking and represented the State of Massachusetts in the Tri-State elimination contest at Connecticut.

John P. Sousa placed first in the State in Tractor Operation and represented the State of Massachusetts in the North Atlantic Regional Contest at the Eastern States Exposition.

Stephen Pettey received an efficient milk production award. This award is based upon production of animals owned by an FFA student.

The general purpose of FFA contests is to provide competitive activities which reflect certain abilities and areas of emphasis needed in training boys for proficiency in agriculture.

GUIDANCE - MRS. ETHEL LIEBMANN

In this time of change, the role of counselor must expand beyond the one-to-one counseling relationship. What is needed are techniques which can affect the whole school. One such technique is the Group Counseling session, a human relations process that can assist the counselor in more effectively meeting the current challenges of the large number of students in the high school classes.

These groups are made up of six to ten students meeting together with a counselor as a "catalyst", to mutually explore problems and feelings. The group is seen as a technique that enhances normal personal growth and emotional responsiveness. Each person in the group must assume responsibility for making it work. It is a more effective way for peers to help peers. This year the group counseling session was initiated beginning with the junior class to be followed by the sophomore class. The counselor must work effectively with groups without allowing the one-to-one counseling relationship to suffer a demise. Hence, each senior student was given the opportunity to have individual counseling sessions to meet his educational, vocational, and personal needs.

Forty-five per cent of last year's graduating class was accepted to institutions of higher learning, and thirteen per cent to other post secondary schools which include nursing schools, business schools, and technical institutes; three per cent entered the military, and thirty-nine per cent stopped formal education upon graduation.

This year, letters of Commendation honoring them for their high performance on the 1969 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test have been awarded to Paul A. Guilmette and Lucy Bettencourt. Their significant academic attainment gives promise of continued success in college. We congratulate them for the honor they have bestowed upon themselves, their school, and their community.

I would like to commend, also, members of the National Honor Society who, because they were extended certain privileges in the school, decided to initiate and completely plan a tutoring program; they believed that with certain privileges, they should have responsibilities as well.

Subjects: English, Math, History, French, Latin, Typing and Home Economics.

In reviewing past reports I find that in 1961 the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools suggested plans for expanding the guidance office. An expansion of our physical facility is of utmost importance to allow for confidentiality in counseling and to give students use of the printed and audio-visual material in the guidance office.

The teamwork and mutual respect which exists in the guidance department staffed by Mr. Stephen Almeida, Mr. John Kubiski, and Mrs. Ethel Liebmann, in cooperation with the principals, Mrs. Catherine Wood, Miss Irene Boodry, Miss Audrey Tripp, Mrs. Lois Kelley and Mr. Harold S. Wood has allowed for a climate of professional proficiency. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have helped in this concern.

Diman Regional Technical High School accepted a number of Westport students. This facility has certainly been a great benefit to Westport and surrounding areas. It has taken care of some of our post graduates who do not wish to continue their education at the college level. Some of our people have been enrolled in evening classes also.

The most noteworthy project started during the year is the curriculum study. Coordinators have been appointed to head up this program. Some of the teachers have visited other schools to observe what and how subjects are being taught. I believe they have brought back useful information that will be helpful in improving our curriculum.

Several new courses should be added, particularly for students who are not preparing for college. Strengthening our general curriculum has been of concern to us for a number of years. Our business curriculum has been highly efficient, but it has not been reaching as many students as it should. Probably spreading the business courses over a three year period rather than presenting them in a concentrated two year program would encourage more students to prepare for a career in business.

Most high schools offer at least three foreign languages. Out students have been limited to French or Latin. Possibly the addition of Portuguese or Spanish would involve more of our students in the study of a foreign language.

There are other areas where improvements and additions can and should be made. The curriculum study groups will have a full report by June, 1970.

Westport High School is to be re-evaluated in 1971, and much attention should be given to preparing for this. We have observed that the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools is not granting membership to schools that do not comply with their standards; loss of accreditation could be serious to any community. Therefore, all work done on curriculum takes on more importance.

Our lack of facilities in the music department and the fact that we do not offer any vocal music will not be looked upon favorably by a visiting committee.

Our athletic program suffered a serious setback when all of our coaches were replaced and personnel outside of the staff were hired. I cannot imagine an athletic program functioning properly under the present set-up.

For many years I have reported the inadequacies of our facilities, and now that a new middle school is about to open, I believe that these shortcomings will be more noticeable. It is important for the town to take the proper steps to insure that students leaving a modern middle school are able to continue their education in a modern high school. If the appropriation requested by the High School Needs Committee is not forthcoming, then the youngsters of the town are in serious trouble.

I would like to commend the high school staff for showing dedication and making progress despite the severe limitations of our plant. I would also like to thank Mr. Cariglia and the members of the school committee for their assistance during the year.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF WESTPORT JUNIOR
HIGH SCHOOL

Dear Mr. Cariglia:

As principal of the Westport Junior High School, I hereby submit my annual report.

For the first time since the Junior High grades were taken out of the High School, we have had no changes in personnel.

Due to the overcrowded conditions at the High School our seventh grade girls were not able to go there for sewing classes. Knitting classes, under the direction of Mrs. Gertrude Maduro, were set up at the Factory School and have proven most successful. In the same program we hope to have the girls learn the basic sewing stitches both in handwork and with the possible use of one or two sewing machines; thus we feel the girls are receiving a good basic sewing program.

All boys still attend shop and the eighth grade girls have cooking at the High School.

Our seventh grade classes are larger this year so we are still using a basement room.

Two eighth grade groups were placed in the High School; with the other three groups at the Head School under the very able direction of Mrs. Dorothy Smith.

We are most grateful to have a full time custodian for our two buildings. This is the first year all rooms at the Factory School have been comfortable, and the both buildings present a much cleaner appearance.

Our guidance services are greatly improved, Mr. Kubiski provides individual counseling the greater part of one day for each building. During this period, he interviews each child relating to his abilities and aptitudes toward educational and vocational choices

We still have been able to continue our membership in the Massasoit Junior High School League and our seventh grade boys are particularly enthusiastic. Again we thank Miss Boodry for her kindness in allowing our boys to use the Macomber School facilities for their practice periods and home games.

In gym our boys are developing an excellent wrestling program during the winter months, with soccer, softball or baseball practiced in outdoor weather.

Mrs. Andruskiewicz, our new nurse, has two scheduled days at each building. Our seventh grade and athletic physicals have all been completed. Once a week during the boys gym periods, the girls are receiving a Red Cross program taught by our nurse with a certificate to be awarded upon the completion of the course.

Our dedicated staff is working toward continued improvement of our instructional program by attending courses in various colleges in this area and participating in our bi-monthly meetings to improve our curriculum in all fields.

Our Readmobile continues to give extra help to the children with special reading problems.

Although our school library received no additions this year, the State Regional Bookmobile has allowed me an extra supply of new library books for the classes to read every six weeks.

I wish to thank the Junior High staff for their excellent work during the past year; also to Mr. Paul Wilber, our new Middle School Principal, a sincere thank you for his "courtesies" and the best of luck in his new position.

Dear Mr. Cariglia:

I hereby submit my report on Federal Aid Project in the Westport Public Schools.

During the 1969 school year we have continued to provide remedial reading services for children in all our public schools on a daily basis.

A grant approved by the Massachusetts State Department of Education under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 enabled us to continue the remedial program at both the Macomber and Greenwood Park Schools. This program was supplemented by general education funds necessary to carry out the entire program.

It is anticipated that our Title I program will continue through the present school year, again being supplemented by local funds.

Our summer program under Title I again received enthusiastic response and many children took advantage of this session to strengthen skill areas and improve their overall reading abilities.

In addition to our remedial reading programs, Westport received \$1,215.00 under Title II to provide for the improvement of our library resources. These funds have been used to purchase enrichment materials at proper levels in order to stimulate interest in reading.

We are currently investigating many federal programs, particularly N. D. E. A. and Title programs, to procure whatever equipment and monetary assistance that is available to enhance our Middle School program.

A program to assist in the English curriculum, particularly at the upper levels, has received preliminary approval by the State Department. This program would use cassette tapes to provide for more individual instruction.

It has been my pleasure during the school year to exchange information and attend meetings with public school officials in other systems. These discussions lead to a mutual understanding of problems and progress relating to federal and state aid.

Finally, I would like to thank the members of the remedial staff for their excellent work during the past school year, and express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Committee, the administration, and the teachers for their cooperation. A special thanks also to the parents who volunteered the transportation needed in making our summer programs successful.
