Board of Selectmen Town Hall Westport, Massachusetts

Gentlemen

It is with deep regret that I tender my resignation as Highway Surveyor for the Town of Westport effective April 1, 1971.

I do so after considerable thought on my part. I am thankful for the cooperation that all of you have extended to me, however, under the present conditions I find it almost impossible for me, as one single individual, to continue to do this job alone.

Since I have worked for the Highway Department, the job has grown tremendously. Each year new streets are added and drainage problems increase to the extent that this year the budget will be in the vicinity of \$400,000.00.

Under our present system of electing a Highway Surveyor, he is under constant pressure to satisfy the voters and, at the same time, be able to handle the men in the department to get the most for the Town.

I believe that a change must be made where the Selectmen should appoint a Superintendent of Streets who could work along with the Selectmen who eventually receive most of the complaints at present, yet at the same time, have no jurisdiction over the elected official. For your information, there are only at present in the whole State of Massachusetts 14 Towns who elect a Highway Surveyor, 42 Cities and Towns under a Department of Public Works and 285 Cities and Towns who appoint a Superintendent of Streets.

It is my opinion that it would be for the best interest of Westport, and I repeat, to appoint a Superintendent of Streets.

My very best wishes, and again many thanks for your cooperation.

March 16, 1971

Agreeable to the warrant calling said meeting, the voters of the Town of Westport assembled at the High School Auditorium on the above date. The meeting was called to order by Carlton A. Lees, Moderator, who appointed Edmie Bibeau Jr., and Clifford A. Brightman to serve as tellers and both were duly sworn before the Town Clerk. Althea M. Manchester was also sworn by the Town Clerk as timekeeper for the meeting in accordance with a by-law adopted under Article 45 of the Annual Town meeting warrant of 1963.

Voted: (Unanimously) to dispense with the reading of the warrant.

ARTICLE 1. Voted: (Unanimously) that the salaries or compensation of all elected Town Officers be as follows:

ARTICLE 2. Voted: (Unanimously) that the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated as follows:

Westport	Public Library	\$ 175.00
Westport	Free Public Library	\$1562.00

ARTICLE 3. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 3 until the adjourned Town Meeting to be held March 23, 1971, at which time said Article 3 will be the first order of business.

ARTICLE 4. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1971 and January 1, 1972 in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

ARTICLE 5. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$4,000.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and that the additional sum of \$8,000.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

ARTICLE 6. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$12,300.00 be appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Construction on various Chapter 90 Roads, so-called, in the town and to be used where determined by the Board of Selectmen and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$12,300.00 be taken from the Revenue of the current year, and that in addition, the sum of \$36,900.00 be transferred from Free Cash in the treasury to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

ARTICLE 7. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Department of Public Works and the County Commissioners for the construction and maintenance of public highways for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$9,700.00 to be received from the State under provisions of Chapter 768, Acts of 1969, be appropriated for use on Briggs Road and/or Chapter 90 Road projects, to be determined by the Board of Selectmen in conjunction with the State Department of Public Works.

ARTICLE 9. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$29,100.33, received from the State under provisions of Section 5 of Chapter 768, Acts of 1969, be appropriated for reconstruction and/or to resurface the following: Berryman Street, Brayton Point Road, Kirby Road, Gifford Road at Sieminski's Brook, Milk Avenue, and Adirondack Lane, all substantially as proposed in a report to the Finance Committee from the Highway Department, as the sum appropriated will allow. (Not approved by Director of Accounts.)

ARTICLE 10. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate \$38,040.52 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional Vocational School District's operating costs for 1971.

ARTICLE 11. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate \$4,274.39 as Westport's share of the Greater Fall River Regional School District's capital costs for 1971.

ARTICLE 12. Voted: (Unanimously) to transfer the sum of \$3,000.00 from the sale of cemetery lots and graves for the purpose of preparing sites for new graves.

ARTICLE 13. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the drainage account to correct drainage as the occassion arises.

ARTICLE 14. A motion to accept the provisions of Chapter 249, Acts of 1962 as relates to the filing of nomination papers for Town Elections and providing a limit to the number of such papers obtainable, was carried.

ARTICLE 15. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to continue the work of updating the town's Master Plan, extend the life of the Committee until the Annual Town Meeting of 1972, accept our partial report, and endorse the position taken by the Updating Master Plan Committee as expressed in the second paragraph of its

1970 Annual Town Report, and to transfer \$500.00 to the Master Plan Updating Committee from funds recently held in escrow by the Town Accountant. Such sums of money originally voted in March of 1966 at the Annual Town Meeting as the town's share of participating in the Southeastern Massachusetts Economic Planning and Development Corporation and which sum was never used.

ARTICLE 16. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 in accordance with the recommendations of the Department of Public Health of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the control of algae in the South Watuppa Pond, said funds to be used only in the event a like amount is appropriated and used for the same purpose by the City of Fall River.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of money for the establishment of Sanitary Landfill in accordance with Section 150A of Chapter 111 of the General Laws, or take any other action rélative thereto.

ARTICLE 17. A motion to accept the provisions of Article 17 was lost.

ARTICLE 18. Voted: (Unanimously) to ratity the action of the 1970 Annual Town Meeting that voted to amend the wage and salary scale on each schedule of the Personnel By-Law and that increased each said schedule 5% beginning April 1, 1970 until April 1, 1971, on the recommendation of the Personnel Committee.

ARTICLE 19. Voted: (Unanimously) that the wage and salary schedules of the Personnel By-Law be and hereby are amended by the addition to each step of each said schedule, a sum equal to 6% thereof, effective for the period of 1 year, beginning April 1, 1971.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the town will vote to amend the Personnel By-Law by striking out Section 3 Paragraph (a) and substitution therefore the following: There shall be a Personnel Board consisting of five members who shall be residents of the Town and who shall be responsible for the administration of the classification and compensation plans, to receive a salary of \$300.00 per member. The Board, except as otherwise provided, shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen and shall not include an employee or elected official of the Town. One member of the Board shall be a member of the Finance Committee who shall be designated by the Finance Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 20. A motion to pass over Article 20 was carried. Yes 184 No 92

ARTICLE 21. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 21.

ARTICLE 22. A motion to adopt Chapter 41 of the General Laws, Section 108L establishing a career incentive pay program offering base salary increases to regular full-time members of the Police Department as a reward for furthering their education in the field of police work, was carried. At this time, Mr. Shaw, chairman of the Finance Committee, filed intentions to reconsider this article at next week's meeting.

ARTICLE 23. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$15,750.00 to resurface Old Harbor Road.

ARTICLE 24. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$720.00 to resurface Sunset Avenue (West).

ARTICLE 25. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$3,465.00 to repair and resurface Osborn Street.

ARTICLE 26. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$1,140.00 to repair and resurface Arlington Avenue.

ARTICLE 27. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the layout of the extension of Beaulieu Street, on file in office of Town Clerk and to acquire the same by donation only.

ARTICLE 28. A motion to accept the layout of D Drive from the present layout of J Drive approximately 1260 feet, on file in the office of Town Clerk, and appropriate the sum of \$3,280.00\$ therefore, was carried. Yes 132 No 80.

Voted: (Unanimously) that we now adjourn until next Tuesday, March 23, 1971 at 7:30 P. M.

March 23, 1971

The adjourned Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator Carlton A. Lees, at $7:30\ P.\ M.$

At this time the following resolution was read: Chief Lynwood F. Potter has served the Town of Westport well, and in accepting his retirement, we look back over his lifetime, which was one dedicated to the people of Westport.

Born in Central Village on May 27, 1912, and completing his education in the Westport school system, he joined the Fire Department at the early age of 16 in the year 1938, the Westport Call Fire Department having been founded in 1927.

In 1938, he was appointed Chief of that department and held that position until 1941, when he left to enter a war industry. He returned in 1942 as a permanent fire fighter and remained with the department until 1961, when he was elevated to the permanent position of Fire Chief.

The last 10 years have been spent in making the Westport Fire Department one of the finest in this part of the State. The people of Westport express thanks to this man, who is an outstanding example of a dedicated public servant.

ARTICLE 3. A motion to fix and establish the additional sum of \$11,601.50 to supplement the recommendation of the Finance Committee to pay for the cost of implementing the four (4) contracts negotiated by the Personnel Board acting as negotiators for the Board of Selectmen, and said contracts having been approved by the Union representing the town employees and the Board of Selectmen as listed below:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board organized on March 15, 1971 with Alford Dyson as Chairman, Charles A. Costa as Clerk, and other member J. Douglas Borden.

The continued rapid growth of our town has brought one of the busiest years for the Board of Selectmen. It has also brought with it the need for possible changes in our Town Government structure.

We wish to point out some of the problems that have grown and will continue to grow as our population increases.

- 1. The immediate need for adopting zoning for the whole town to protect those of us who came here to live because of the pleasant atmosphere and the quiet country life, and to protect our newer citizens who have spent considerable money for new homes only to find at a later date that without adequate zoning protection, their investment could be lost or at least depreciated in value.
- 2. The need for a full-time building inspector to be sure that homes are built in accordance with our building codes and to protect those who purchase these homes. No longer can a part-time inspector issue building permits on a Monday evening and inspect the many new homes on a part-time basis. In the year 1970, 323 permits were issued. However, in the year 1971, 424 permits were issued, an increase of over 33%. We are sure this trend will continue.
- 3. Also with the increase in crime in every community, it points up the need for an increased police force to adequately protect our citizens. Our present police facilities are too small and very inadequate for the problems we are encountering today. The increase in the number of streets built in the last several years add to the many miles of roads that must be patrolled by the members of our Police Department.
- 4. The need for given considerable thought to the many problems caused by dogs running loose in our community. While we realize that the subject of a dog leash law is unpopular, we have had many calls and many hearings where friends and neighbors have become hostile to each other because of barking dogs and the destruction of other animals and fowl by dogs running loose.
- 5. The ever increasing drainage problems that become more acute as new homes and streets are developed.

These and many other problems confront our town and will continue as we grow. The opening of a new library this year will be an asset to all of our citizens. We ask that every one take an interest in the proposed by-law changes in order that adequate regulations can be adopted to protect you and the town before the problems occur.

We would like to pay tribute to the Updating Master Plan Committee, the River Improvement Commission, the newly formed town government committee, and all of the other committees who spend considerable time and effort to make Westport a better place for all of us.

In conclusion, we wish to extend our thanks to all of the men and women who serve in appointed positions who provide the necessary services for our town, and to our able secretary, Mrs. Sophie Kokoszka, who runs our office most efficiently between meetings.

The library continued its operation in the Town Hall during the first half of 1971. The construction of the new building was completed in May and the equipment and furnishings were installed. The library collection was moved from its quarters on the second floor of the Town Hall in July and the new building was open to the Public, August 4, 1971.

The total funds for the project were \$272,773.68 of which a grant of \$70,000 was received from the federal government.

The public has responded enthusiastically to the new building. There are 2,289 card holders and the circulation increased 12 per cent. The citizens of Westport were invited to an Open House on Sunday, the twenty-first of November. Many groups and organizations within the town have made use of the project room.

Mrs. Hervey MacVicar and a staff of volunteers have organized a series of story hours for children four to seven years old with an average attendance of 35. This program will be enlarged to include third and fourth graders in the near future.

Through the Eastern Regional Library System, patrons are able to borrow books and audio visual materials from other libraries in the region which includes New Bedford and Boston. There now is audio-visual equipment in the library which is available to the public. The collection of books and records is augmented through visits from the regional bookmobile.

The library has been the recipient of a trust fund established by Mr. and Mrs. Norris Tripp in memory of their sons Ronald A. Tripp and Randall A. Tripp to be used to purchase books and periodicals in specified areas of interest.

Mrs. Alice D. Tripp tendered her resignation as of December 31, 1971. For many years she served as trustee and since August 1, 1967, as librarian. The success of the new building is due substantially to her untiring efforts to promote library interest in the town. She gave generously of her time and mind in planning the new library. The Westport Free Public Library on Old County Road is indeed a tribute to her devotion and service.

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LANDING COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

The Board organized in March 1971 with Joseph Bothelo as Chairman.

The Treasurer's Report will show the receipts and payments during the past year.

This past summer the triangle around the Powder House on the Head Landing was moved and kept very attractive through the efforts of Mr. Roger Sherman.

The Department has had 16 men successfully complete a CPR (Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation) course at Truesdale Hospital sponsored by the Massachusetts Heart Association, Inc.

The Department also had 3 men attend the Civil Defense Bomb School in East Bridgewater, 4 men attend a Propane Gas Seminar at a North Dartmouth bulk plant, and 2 men are attending Fire Science courses at Bristol Community College.

The Department investigated 141 complaints during the year, and had an increase of 20% in the number of alarms, and also had regular drills during the winter months.

The Carryall has been equipped with 3500 watt C. D. generator, and other lighting and rescue equipment. We were fortunate to obtain a 63 Plymouth from Civil Defense, which is being used by the Chief for investigations, complaints, and responding to fires.

A Fire Alarm Board has been donated by the B. M. C. Durfee Bank and has been installed in the Fire Station #2 on Briggs Road, to which Town owned buildings and other businesses could be connected.

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We hereby submit the following as the report of the Youth Activity Board for the year 1971.

A basketball league for boys was set up and directed by John DeFusco. The schedule ran four nights per week for ten weeks. Approximately sixty boys participated.

Miss Joan Chase, asssisted by Marilyn Ritz, conducted programs for girls in basketball, trampoline, gymnastics, volleyball, and softball. An average of forty girls participated in each program.

The Pirates, managed by Steve DeCosta, were the winners of the Junior Baseball League. William Mello directed the league, with Marcey Victoria managing the Giants, Joe DiSanti the Cardinals, Philip Pariseau the Tigers, and Henry Barrett the Cubs. Our thanks to Joe DiSanti for his donation of a permanent three foot trophy.

Our 1st Annual Cross-Town Foot Race was held on July 25th. The eight mile race, which was open to all town residents, regardless of age or sex, had 37 participants. Finishing 1st was Bill Cardoza, 2nd was George Azevedo Jr., and 3rd was Skip Truesdale. A real great day.

Children between the ages of 5 and 16 had a great time this summer when they attended our programs at Macomber playground. The programs of athletics, and Arts & Crafts were conducted by Arlene Martel and Ann Medeiros. Highlighting these successful programs were special events and contests held weekly.

Mrs. Joel Flathers again directed our swimming program. Due to a great increase in enrollment, an additional instructor was added to our staff. The entire program was conducted at the town beach this year.

The board considered the development of a mini-bike trail in town, but the lack of parental backing was cause for not pursuing the matter.

Hundreds of people gathered along a portion of Old County Road on August 22nd to witness the running of our 1st annual soapbox derby. Twenty boys and girls competed for trophies on this exciting day in two age groups. Winners in the 8 to 11 age group were: Tom Roberts 1st, Steve Arruda 2nd, Mike Smusz 3rd. In the 12 to 14 group: Calvin Tripp 1st, Kenny Perry 2nd, Fred Wilson 3rd.

A rock concert and dance for all town teenagers was held at Jason's with limited success. Another attempt at this type of event may be tried in 1972

Our year was concluded by a very successful co-ed volleyball program directed by Joan Chase and Arlene Martel.

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WESTPORT HOUSING AUTHORITY

Westport Board of Selectmen Mr. Alford Dyson, Chairman

Gentlemen:

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At the beginning of 1971, the Westport Housing Authority had the sum of \$816,000 for the construction of forty-eight, one bedroom apartments and a community building for our senior citizens. In addition the site on Route 6 had been selected and the selling price had been agreed to with the owner and approved by the State. An architect had been selected and preliminary plans drawn up.

The first step in obtaining the necessary permits to build on this site was the taking of a perk test and getting approval of the State Department of Public Health. After numerous delays and meetings with the State Department of Public Health representatives, the Westport Board of Health and Board of Selectmen, an acceptable perk test and sewage system was approved.

The next step was drilling for water. Here again problems cropped up as a well of over two hundred feet was drilled and it yielded an insufficient quantity of water. A second well was drilled and this well produced a sufficient yield to satisfy the needs of the project.

Final plans were then drawn and approved by the Authority. Again delays were encountered as the architect did not complete the plans in the expected time frame. Bids were opened in January 1972 and Guaranty Construction Company, Inc., of Tiverton, Rhode Island was the low bidder with a bid of \$816,844.

They requested to withdraw their bid as they indicated they made a gross mistake in their estimate. After carefully considering the request the Authority voted to reject this request and at the time of writing of this report have voted to award the contract to Guaranty Construction Company, Inc. It is still necessary for the State Department of Community Affairs to approve our action. It is hoped that at the time this report is printed construction will have started and by this time next year our senior citizens will have a new home.

During the year several changes of personnel occurred. Our first Executive Director, Mr. Joseph DiSanti resigned and Mr. Gerald S. Coutinho was appointed in his place. Mr. Coutinho is a college graduate and is a member of the S. M. U. administrative staff. Mr. Kenneth Walker, one of the original members of the Authority, chose not to run for re-election in March and Miss Mary L. Medeiros was elected in his place.

REPORT OF THE TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Gentlemen:

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During this year, the Commission has continued its program of improvement for the Horseneck Conservation Area. The improvements accomplished include fertilizing, planting and the erection of snow fencing in order to stop erosion and to build up the dunes.

A recreation plan was developed for the Rock Street Conservation area. However, the plan was not accepted by the Town Meeting.

Continued cooperation and support was given to the Watuppa Environmental Control Committee in its work to control pollution in South Watuppa Pond. A member of the Commission, Octave Pelletier, is active with this group.

The Commission has delegated a member, Normand Sasseville, to membership on the Updating Master Plan Committee.

A public presentation by Allen Morgan of the Audubon Society was sponsored by the Commission and other Town boards in July. Mr. Morgan presented, by means of slides, his views on planning and conservation. As a result of interest generated by Mr. Morgan's talk, an open meeting dealing with waste disposal was held in July to promote recycling of paper and glass.

Plans were made to have Mr. Les Campbell present a multi-slide presentation entitled "Our Privileged Planet" in the spring of 1972.

As a result of House Bill 3240, the Conservation Commission will be beginning in 1972 responsible for holding hearings in cases of intent to remove, dredge, fill any marsh, meadow, swamp or any situation covered by the Hatch Act.

A charter member of the Town's Commission passed away during this year. William G. Heath, who was the Commission's first Chairman and an active member during the entire existence of the Commission, will be sorely missed and the Town has lost a dedicated conservationist.

CIVIL DEFENSE

During the past year we have trained 24 Civil Defense volunteers for Medical Self Help and First Aid course.

Once a month, the Civil Defense Director and my secretary, Mrs. Gertrude M. Madura, attend a meeting at Segregansett. At this meeting, the latest news of the month and problems of each community are discussed.

We attend four meetings a year at Bridgewater, where surplus property is the topic. I also attend four directors meetings in Framingham.

Classes in Radiological, shelter management, medical self help, First Aid, and Civil Defense nursing care, can be taken by groups and organizations simply by contacting Mr. Charles M. Arruda, Director of Civil Defense at 636-8822, and make the necessary arrangements.

The emergency warning systems is still tested at 11:15 A. M. on Wednesdays.

State Radio Drill is conducted on the first Monday of the month.

The equipment owned by Divil Defense is housed at the following locations: 1 Jeep at the Fire Department, an automobile at the Fire Department, an automobile at the Police Department, 2 generators; 1 at the Fire Department on the Assistant Chief's truck and 1 at the Highway Department on an Amphibious Duck.

During the year 1971, Civil Defense has acquired for the town such equipment as; 3 2 1/2 ton trucks, 2 1/2 ton GMC motors, flood light, compressors, radio phone, step ladder, desk and chair, filing cabinet, helmets, and other various miscellaneous items. Actual Federal Government figures show that, the town has acquired \$20,188.00 with a cost to the town of \$667.00.

Herewith is the report of the Westport Planning Board for the year 1971. This being the 15th year of the Planning Board's establishment under Chapter 41, Section 81A to 81NN of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Other Activities:

A reduced copy of the new Westport base map was made available for sale at the Town Clerk's Office. This was a joint undertaking of the Planning Board and the Master Plan Committee. Some Board members took part in the Master Plan Committee activities, especially in zoning provisions. Approximately 30 meetings were attended and much extra work was done. Maps were prepared and various backgroud studies were performed. This Board recognizes the diligence and dedication of the Master Plan Committee members who have labored with little recognition. We wish to extend our thanks to the Master Plan Committee for the work done and for the gumption which they have shown in tackling controversial issues.

New Subdivision Rules and Regulations were prepared and accepted.

Mr. Theodore J. Moore was the Board's delegate to the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District.

Consideration for the Future:

There are approximately 1750 house lots of the 20,000 sq. ft. size; these lots were approved in accordance with the State Subdivision Laws and will not be affected by subsequent zoning changes. They are being developed at an alarming rate which will cause grave economic problems in the near future.

It is becoming painfully obvious that the lack of adequate planning in the past is causing problems which will continue to grow in magnitude during the remainder of the 1970's.

While there is no one perfect answer to the problems that confront us, it is obvious that the first step in establishing proper planning for the future is to enact the zoning recommendations of the Master Plan Committee. This Board strongly endorses this zoning ordinance and recommends its adoption.

Other steps will have to be taken from time to time to refine and update these zoning ordinances, but no action would be possible without the establishment of a comprehensive plan.

We must keep in mind that every year that slips by without future planning will cause many years of grief.

REPORT OF THE UPDATING MASTER PLAN COMMITTEE

The Updating Master Plan Committee, originally scheduled to complete its task of updating the Master Plan in time for the Annual Town Meeting of 1971, was granted a one year extension by the 1971 Annual Town Meeting, This was essential because the task was too great to complete in one year particularly since the results of the 1970 census would not be available until 1971 or 1972. Additionally, adequate funds for compiling and publishing the Updating Master Plan had not been provided by the 1970 Annual Town Meeting.

The 1971 Annual Town Meeting appropriated a sum of \$4,500 to continue the work of the Updating Master Plan Committee and endorsed the following position of the Committee on the Town's planning goals:

"The goals for the future growth of the Town should be the continual maintenance and development of the community as a rural, agricultural, recreational and open space area. Since our beautiful river and Horseneck Beach area are two of the finest natural resources in New England, our goals encompass protective ordinances which would inhibit medium and high density housing, at least until such time as the Town has public water and sewage, and trailer parks and narrow lot sizes. This Committee is, therefore, dedicated to preserving Westport's natural resources and attractiveness as a rural, agricultural and recreational community by opposing urbanization pressures."

Through contractural arrangements with the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District, a base map, a land use map, a zoning map and a proposed zoning by-law were prepared. Several informational briefings were held for residents and Town officials and zoning proposals were finalized. The Master Plan Text was thoroughly reviewed, analyzed and revised. The Town By-Laws were extensively corrected, brought up to date and printed.

All of these activities were tedious, time consuming and very difficult for a small group of this Committee's members to accomplish. However, through an unsurpassed dedication and considerable personal effort, the task was completed in a highly professional manner and in a way in which the Town can take pride, and we are sure will prove extremely valuable to the future of the Town.

Although the major task of future planning has been completed, two most important programs require further action by the people of Westport, the implementation of the Master Plan recommendations and the continuation of updating the Master Plan on an annual basis.

The major difficulty in updating the Master Plan stemmed from the fact that the Plan had gone too long without such updating, the original Master Plan having been completed in 1964. This was a period of very rapid growth for the Town and many changes had occurred. Unfortunately, not enough attention had been paid to the Master Plan during these years of growth and change by persons who could influence the Town's progress.

It is the hope of this Committee that this Updated Master Plan will be taken into full consideration by every person, committee, board and official of the Town when making any decisions on the future of the Town and that the recommendations will be fully and systematically implemented.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Greater Fall River Vocational School District continues to grow in enrollment and in programs offered—both in our day school program and our evening school program. As of October 1, 1971 there were 874 students enrolled in Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School; 72 students enrolled in Diman Regional Technical Institute; and 81 students enrolled in Diman Regional School of Practical Nursing. This makes a total of 1027 students enrolled in our day program.

In addition, we have 465 adults enrolled in our evening program and 125 adults enrolled in programs offered by the Fall River Power Squadron.

The school continues to conduct programs for unemployed and under-employed adults under the Manpower Development and Training Act.

The school is in operation from 8:00 A. M. to 10:00 P. M., Monday through Friday; 8:00 A. M. to 1:00 P. M., Saturday; and from 8:00 A. M. to 3:00 P. M., Monday through Friday during the summer months.

We are extremely proud of the fact that our facilities are used by industrial concerns, civic organizations and health organizations in furthering the education of adults in the area. We encourage this.

Automotive concerns have conducted three workshops during the year with an average attendance of 85 adults. These workshops have enabled automotive servicemen to keep abreast of newer trends in the automotive field.

Two seminars on health education with an average attendance of 140 adults have been conducted by the Southeastern Chapter of the American Cancer Society. Diman Regional received a citation from the Cancer Society for their contribution in making these seminars an outstanding success.

The League of Women Voters, the Department of Education, the Family Service Association, Adult Physical Education and Little Theater of Fall River, among many others have made use of our facilities during 1971. The school is rapidly becoming a center for community activities.

In our 1970 Annual Report to the communities we said that every effort would be made to initiate a program in House Building in September of 1971. We are happy to report that this new program did start in September of 1971 and in June of 1972 we will have built our first house. Besides giving our students actual construction experience, this new program will enable us to increase our enrollment in the carpentry program. In addition to the construction of a new home the students will also do carpentry work for the Boys Club, Y. M. C. A. and the Boy Scouts so that the entire community benefits from this new program.

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Our computer center at Diman Regional has started to show increase usage by all of the communities. Currently Swansea and Diman are using it for school report cards; Somerset is using it for the math department; Bristol Community College is using it for administrative functions; Fall River Model Cities uses it continually for statistical reporting; and

the Fall River Planning Department uses it periodically.

Somerset and Westport are currently working with our data processing instructors in developing a program to use the computer to print school report cards.

However, we encourage even greater usage of our computer facilities by all communities. We have a highly qualified staff whose services are available and we have a student body who profit from the experience they gain in programming the computer for various systems.

The facilities of our graphic arts department have also been used by the schools in our regional school district and we are happy to have been able to meet their requests for printed materials.

Our request to the Division of Occupational Education to inaugurate a pilot program in Special Education has been granted and we will start such a program in 1972.

In this Annual Report it is most important to point out that all communities in the regional school district benefit financially because they are members of a regional school district. In 1971 Fall River received \$535,890.11; Somerset received \$58,136.87; Swansea received \$66,732.71; and Westport received \$35,666.26.

It is important to note that these monies are sent directly to the communities not to the regional school district and that these monies are an additional 15% state aid given only to communities who are a part of a regional school district. This money can be applied to each community's share of operating the regional school district. However, there is no restriction as to its use by a community.

The inauguration of holding joint meetings with the school committees of Fall River, Somerset, Swansea and Westport to exchange ideas and discuss mutual problems was a forward step for the Regional School District Committee. It should be continued in 1972 for it has a lot to offer all committees and communities.

We do not want to forget to mention the increased use of our athletic facilities by the public. The soccer and baseball fields are used in season by various teams; our track is used considerably at all hours of the day by individuals interested in physical fitness and by other schools; and our gymnasium facilities are used two nights per week by adults.

Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School is fortunate in having a dedicated faculty and a sincere and hard-working school committee and in closing this report I would like to extend to them my sincere thanks and deep appreciation for their efforts and their contribution in making Diman Regional not only an outstanding vocational-technical school but also a school deeply committed to serving all of the people in the area.

It is the policy of the School Department to issue no-school bulletins or announcements through Radio Stations WALE and WSAR, FALL RIVER; WNBH and WBSM, NEW BEDFORD; WPRO, PROVIDENCE, whenever driving conditions are, or seem likely to be, DANGEROUS. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be tuned to one of the above stations for the no-school announcements. Please depend upon your radio rather than your phone for obtaining this information as telephone lines have to be kept open.

Parents must use their own judgment, in regard to whether it is suitable for their children to attend schools in stormy weather.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

It is with a note of sadness that I submit the following report as the Acting Superintendent of Schools.

The unfortunate circumstances due to the death of $\,$ Superintendent Cariglia require that someone act in this capacity.

Nicholas Cariglia has been my friend and co-worker for many years and I feel a deep personal loss with his passing. However, life must go on.

In this brief report I will try to point out some of my thinking with regard to the future of the Westport School System.

In the interest of economy the reports from various Principals will be omitted from the Annual Report. These are on file in the school office and anyone interested could review them there. Changes in personnel will be reflected in the listing of the teachers and will not be repeated here.

The most pressing need is to make provisions to house youngsters during the next two or three years. Our enrollment in grades one through four have increased at the rate of approximately 100 per year. Our Middle School will be at almost capacity enrollment in September 1972. Our High School enrollment counting only youngsters presently enrolled in our school system will exceed 600 in September 1972.

The population of the town is increasing rapidly. This is apparent to anyone who rides around and observes the many housing projects now being undertaken.

It is imperative that the first project should be to complete the planned addition to the High School.

The second major project should be the addition of some classrooms at the Macomber School. However, for September 1972, three open-plan classrooms could be established in the auditorium at the Earle School. This should be a temporary arrangement until better housing could be established.

Consideration must be given to the formation of an Elementary Building Committee whose first responsibility would be to acquire land for building purposes.

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It is important to point out that our enrollment is much higher than projected by Dr. Castaldi. Any projection is no more than a scientific guess, but it is apparent that Westport will continue to grow in population.

Besides our building needs I suggest that we need to expand our Guidance Program; that we do more remedial work in reading and mathematics; that we recognize the need for special help for the emotionally disturbed; and that we offer more challenge to the gifted student.

During the past year we have made some progress in the area of curriculum. We have had summer workshops in Mathematics and Science, and we have implemented some of the ideas in Social Studies and English that were advocated in the 1970 program.

We should continue to look for new approaches, but the change should be gradual and the good things in the traditional should not be cast aside.

Without the help and devotion of the clerks in the School Department Office my task would have been more difficult. I wish to thank the School Committee for the understanding that they have shown throughout this difficult time.
