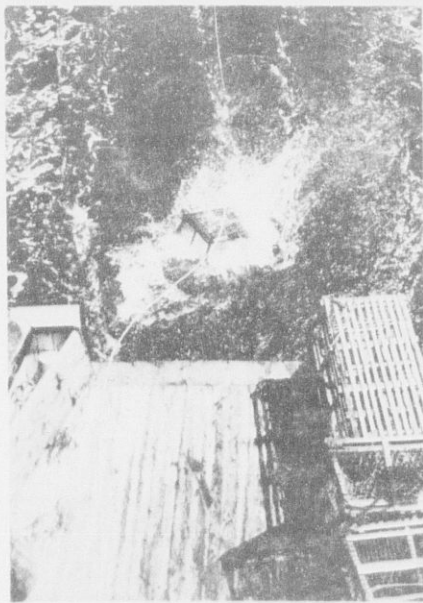
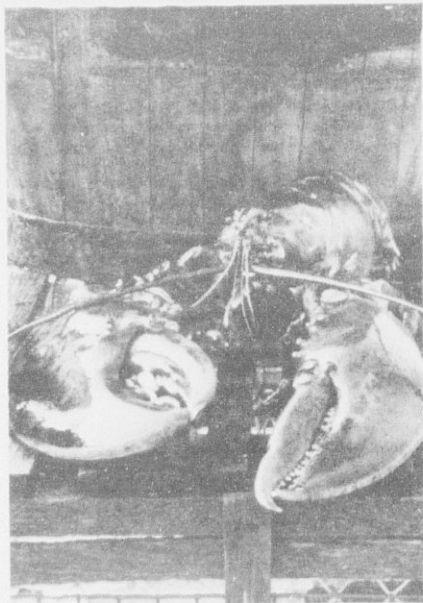

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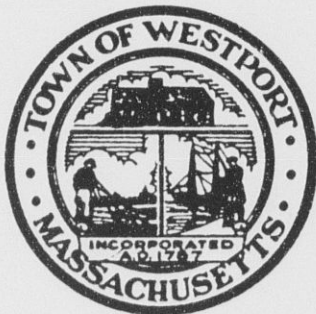

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING 1974

April 2, 1974

Agreeable to the warrant calling said meeting, the voters of the Town of Westport assembled at the High School Auditoriam in the above date. The meeting was called to order by Bradford W. Sherman, Moderator, who appointed Damase Giguere, Clifford A. Brightman, John McDermott and Judith A. Porter to act as tellers, who were duly sworn before the Town Clerk. Althea M. Manchester, Assistant Town Clerk, acted as timekeeper for the meeting in accordance with a by-law adopted inder Article 45 of the Annual Town Meeting warrant of 1963.

Voted: (Unanimously) to dispense with the reading of the warrant.

Article 1. A motion to set the salaries or compensation of all elected Town Officers be as follows, was passed:

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$21,912.10 for Tax Collector.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropraite \$8,079.89 for Accountant.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$31,180.00 for Equipment and Hose and to meet said appropriation the foregoing sum be taken from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for Forest Fires.

Voted: (Unanimously) to adjourn this meeting until Tuesday, April 9, 1974 at 7:30 P.M..

April 9, 1974.

The adjourned Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator Bradford W. Sherman on the above date at 7:30 P.M.

A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$329,742.11 for the Police Department was passed.

A motion to appropriate the sum of \$10,777.89 for the Police Department and take the above mentioned sum from Revenue Sharing Funds interest was passed

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2205.00 for Civil Defence

At this time a motion to consider Line Items #133 & 134 (Regional School) was passed.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$61,821.87 for Operation and Maintenance of Regional School

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,600.00 for Tree Warden.

Voted: (Unanimously) to adjourn until next Tuesday, April 16, 1974 at 7:30 P.M.

April 16, 1974.

The adjourned meeting was called to order by Moderator Bradford W. Sherman at 7:30 P.M. on the above date.

The Building Inspector's account was considered item by item and approved. The total budget will be voted on at the next meeting.

At 8:00 P.M. the adjourned special town meeting was called to order.

Article 1. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the report of the Elementary School Site Committee established by vote under Article 20 of the 1973 Annual Town Meeting.

Article 2. A motion to acquire by purchase or eminent domain for school and other public purposes, approximately 30 acres of land, being a portion of property presently owned by Helen Antonelli, bounded and described as follows; Northerly by land of Bates in part, Santos in part, and owners unknown in part; Easterly by land of the Town of Westport in part, and Steve Partington in part; Southerly by land of Helen Antonelli, Westerly by land of Santos in part and owners inknown in part; and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$30,000. for purchase of land and the sum of \$2,000. for surveying land be taken from Overlay Surplus, was approved. Yes 211. No 66.

Article 3. A motion to acquire by purchase or eminent domain, for school and other public purposes approximately 1 acre of land being a portion of land owned by Bernard T. Kelly and Mary E. Kelly, bounded as follows: Northerly by land of Bates; Easterly by land of the Town of Westport; Southerly by other land of Kelly; Westerly by land of Partington; and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$1,000. for purchase of land and the sum of \$500. for surveying land be taken from Overlay Surplus, was approved.
Yes 200. No 23.

Article 4. A motion to establish an Elementary School Building Committee consisting of eleven members as follows: Two members to be named by the Finance Committee, five members from the School Committee, two members to be appointed by the Selectmen and two members by the Moderator, one of whom shall have experience in engineering, and two of whom shall have experience in the field of building construction, and to appropriate the sum of \$20,000. for expenses of such committee and to meet the appropriation the foregoing sum be taken from available in the treasury, was carried.

Article 5. A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$69,547.77 to supplement the current School Committee budget and to meet said amount the same be taken from available funds in the treasury, was carried.

Article 6. A motion to adopt the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 90, Section 7L which prohibits "standees" in school buses, was carried.

Article 7. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a committee to investigate solid waste disposal for the Town, the committee to consist of the Board of Health, one member from each of the following committees or boards, Selectmen, Planning Board, Conservation Commission, River Improvement Commission, Finance Committee and two members at large to be appointed by the Selectmen, and to take the above sum from available funds.

Article 8. Voted: (Unanimously) to transfer the sum of \$6,000. from the Police Department salaries & wages account to the Police Department Expense account.

Voted: (Unanimously) to adjourn this Special Meeting.

The adjourned Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator Bradford W. Sherman.

Voted: (Unanimously) to adjourn this meeting at 10:40 P.M. until next Tuesday, April 23, 1974 at 7:30 P.M.

April 23, 1974.

The adjourned meeting was called to order by Bradford W. Sherman, Moderator at 7:30 P.M. There was a delay until 7:50 P.M. until a quorum was obtained.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,900.00 for Building Inspector.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$765.00 for Sealer of Weights and Measures.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,900.00 for Dog Officer.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3,954.30 for Shellfish Constable salary.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$842.10 for River Patrol.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$950.00 for Shellfish Constable Expenses.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1,020.00 Shellfish Equipment.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2,700.00 for Propagation of Shellfish.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2974.00 for Wire Inspector.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1,600.00 for Gas Inspector.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$98,209.00 for Health and Sanitation.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$867.00 for Harbor Master.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2,446.00 for Wharfinger.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$257,050.00 for Highways and Bridges and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$21,500 to be taken from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and \$94,176. from State Fund, Chapter 1140, Section 22, and the balance of \$141,374.00 be taken from taxation.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$1,830.00 for Street Signs and that \$630.00 of this amount be used for installation and maintenance of Bicycle Way signs on designated Bicycle routes

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$65,000.00 for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Streets.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$7,800.00 for Street Lights.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3000.00 for Engineering.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for Drainage.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$43,485.00 for Veterans Services.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$868.50 for Soldiers and Sailors Graves & Lots.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$24,611.00 for Town Cemeteries.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$4000.00 for Perpetual Care of Cemetery Lots.

A motion to raise and appropriate \$3,054,660.48 for School Department and that the sum of \$110,000.00 be encumbered for 1975 summer salaries, was carried. Yes 144. No 67.

Voted: (Unanimously) that we adjourn at 10:30 P.M. until next Tuesday, April 30, 1974.

April 30, 1974.

The voters of Westport met at the High School Auditorium to resume the adjourned Annual Meeting which was held on April 23, 1974. At 8:10 P.M. There being no quorum Moderator Bradford W. Sherman entertained a motion to carry this meeting over until Tuesday, May 7, 1974 at which time a Special Town Meeting will be held, one of the articles being to do away with the quorum. This motion was carried unanimously.

May 7, 1974.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

Agreeable to the warrant calling said meeting the voters of the Town of Westport assembled at the High School Auditorium on the above date. The meeting was called to order by Bradford W. Sherman, Moderator. At this time the Chairman of the Registrars of Voters, Joseph Campbell announced that a quorum was present.

Article 1. A motion to abolish, in its entirety, the By-Law establishing by the quorum for the Annual and Special Town Meetings in the Town of Westport, as voted under Article 30 of the Annual Town Meeting of 1973 was carried. Yes. 101. No 55.

Article 2. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over article 2.

Voted: (Unanimously) to adjourn the Special Meeting.

May 7, 1974.

The voters of the Town of Westport met at the High School to resume the adjourned Annual Town Meeting which was held on April 30, 1974. Moderator Bradford W. Sherman, presided.

Voted: (unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,201.00 for Westport Free Public Library, and to meet said appropriation the amount of \$2,440.12 be taken from Dog Fund, \$7,343.26 from State Aid to Libraries and the balance of \$35,417.62 from taxation.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Gravel Bank.

Voted: (nanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for Unclassified Bills.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$600.00 for Memorial Day.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$600.00 for Legion Hall.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for D.A.V. Headquarters.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for V.F.W. Headquarters.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$840.00 for Pensions-Town

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$74,469.00 for Pension-County.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$53,000.00 for Insurance-Property

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$62,400.00 for Insurance-Chapter 32B-Personnel.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Personnel Board.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$6,256.00 for Conservation Commission.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$3,500.00 for Town Beach.

Voted: (nanimously) to raise and appropriate \$7,540.00 for Youth Activities.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$5,200.00 for Council of Aging.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Street Lighting Committee Expenses.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$30,000.00 for Reserve Fund.

Voted (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$530,000.00 for Maturing

Dept and to meet said appropriation the sum of \$250,000.00 be taken from Federal Revenus Sharing Funds, \$10,000.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Interest and the balance of \$270,000.00 from taxatioq.

Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$271,770.00 for Interest Account.

Article 4. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1974, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

Article 5. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$4,000.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance, and that the additional sum of \$8,000.00 be transferred from un-appropriated available funds in the treasury, to meet the State's and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available in the treasury.

Article 6. Voted: (Unanimously) that the sum of \$12,000.00 be appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Construction on Old Bedford Road, Sanford Road and/or various other Chapter 90 roads, as determined by the Board of Selectmen and to meet said appropriation the sum os \$12,000.00 be taken from the Revenue of the current year, and that in addition, the sum of \$36,000.00 be transferred from Free Cash in the treasury to meet the State's and County' share of the cost of the word, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon receipt to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Article 7. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept and enter into contract for the expenditure of any funds allotted or to be allotted by the Commonwealth and/or County for the construction, reconstruction and improvement of Town roads.

Article 8. Voted: (Unanimously) to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into contracts for funds received under the provisions of Chapter 1140 of the Acts of 1973, Section 20 and to appropriate \$56,506.00 to be taken from the aforesaid Chapter 1140, for Sanford Road and/or such other roads as determined by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 9. A motion to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 to repair and widen the Milton Wood corner on Sodom Road, as shown on the 1960 layout, provided that the land required is donated, was carried. Yes 223 No 1.

Article 10. Voted (Unanimously) to postpone Article 10 until the May 14, 1974 meeting.

Article 11. Voted (Unanimously) to ratify and affirm the eminent domain takings on Old Bedford Road, made by the Board of Selectmen on April 23, 1973, pursuant to a vote of the 1973 Annual Town Meeting under Article 13, not with-standing the fact that all parcels cannot be acquired at no cost to the town and to further authorize the Board of Selectmen to make a confirmatory or additional eminent domain takings of all land lying within the layout of Old Bedford Road, as shown on plan entitled "Town of Westport 1972 Layout, Old Bedford Road" recorded in Bristol County (S.D.) Registry of Deeds, Plan Book 90, Page 78, and to raise and appropriate the sum of

\$1,000.00 for thetakings

Article 12. Voted: (Unanimously) to accept the layout of Jiggs Street extension and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for construction of said street.

Article 13. A motion to raise and appropriate \$18,000.00 to correct the drainage problems in the Greenwood Park area was passed.

Article 14. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 14.

Article 15. A motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen in the name and behalf of the Town of Westport to remit and release to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through its Department of Public Works, all right, title, claim and demand whatsoever as said Town has, or ought to have in and to a certain vehicular bridge being Bridge W-30-7 and being identified as Railroad Bridge No. 7.85 and said bridge being a continuation and extension of a public way known as Westport Factory Road and/or Highland Avenue in the Towns of Westport and Dartmouth, providing vehicular passage for the public over the tracks of the Penn Central Railroad Company was carried. Yes 153. No 32.

Article 16. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,919.00 to purchase a backhoe for the Highway Department and to meet said appropriation the aforementioned sum be taken from Stabilization Fund.

Article 17. A motion to remain in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District was passed.

A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$203,00.00 for constructing a new police station; That the present five member Police Station Building Committee appointed by the Selectmen be continued as the Police Station Building Committee with and vacancies to be filled by the Board of Selectmen; That the Police Station Building Committee be authorized to take all action necessary to construct such building including contracting with architects, contractors, engineers, etc; That the sum of money shall be raised and appropriated in the following manner; The sum of \$40,190.00 shall be taken from the Stabilization Fund; The sum of \$60,000.00 shall be taken from Revenue Sharing Funds; The sum of \$11,810.00 remaining from unexpended funds appropriated for the Building Committee shall be transferred to this account; The treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, as authorized to borrow \$88,000.00 under General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7, (3) as amended, for a period up to 10 years, was carried.

Article 20. A motion to acquire five acres of land, more or less, lying between the Town Hall property and Route 88 and bounded on the east 370 feet by route 88, on the north 610 feet by land of Albert Lees, Jr., on the west 371 feet by Westport Town Hall, and on the south 570 feet by land of formerly Frederick H. Kirby, et al, in part; and to transfer to Albert Lees, JR., in payment therefor approximately one (1) acre of land on Drift Road, bounded on the north 210 feet by land of Alston Potter, on the west 150 feet by land of Albert Lees, Jr., on the south 260 feet by other land of Town of Westport, on the east 150 feet by Drift Road, was carried.

May 14, 1974.

The adjourned town meeting was called to order by Moderator Bradford W. Sherman at 7:30 P.M. No quorum was necessary at this meeting as the vote taken at the special town meeting held on May 7, 1974 was approved by the Attorney General's office and posted in the five (5) precincts by the Constable.

Article 10 was taken up at this time, it having been postponed until this meeting.

Article 10. Article 25. A motion to revise Article XI on soil Conservation of the Town's General By-Laws as follows was carried. Yes 137. No 17.

A. Delete Section 1 which reads as follows:

Section 1. a soil Conservation Board is hereby established in the Town of Westport for the purpose of regulating the removal of soil, loam, sand, gravel and granite from land within the Town and enforcing the provisions of this by-law. The members of the Board shall consist of one member of the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board, the Conservation Commission, the Board of Health, and the Finance Committee. Each of the members shall be appointed by their respective organizations, and an alternate shall be designated in the same manner to serve in the absence. No person engaged in the bussiness of removing soil, loam, sand, gravel of granite from land in said Town shall serve on such Board and in the event that a vacancy or vacancies shall occur for this reason, a substitute or substitutes shall be elected by a majority of the remaining members who shall hold office until such time as the disqualification of the person or persons in whose place they are appointed shall be removed, but in no event for more than two years. The Boars shall elect a Chairman and Secretary. The Secretary need not be A member of the Board and shall keep a true record of the proceedings, of the Board which shall be public records.

B. Add New Section 1 as follows:

Section 1. A soil Conservation Board is hereby established in the Town of Westport for the purpose of regulating the removal of soil, loam, sand, gravel, and granite from the land within the Town and enforcing the provisions of this By-Law. The Town Conservation Committee shall also serve as the Soil Conservation Board and administer the regulations of this board.

At this time it was voted (Unanimously) to pass over Line item 89 of article 3.

Article 26. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over article 26.

Article 27. A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 from taxation for the purpose of having fireworks displayed on the Fourth of July at the Head of Westport and to have the Board of Selectmen appoint a committee to administer the fund was carried.

Article 28. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 28.

Article 29. Voted: (Unanimously) to have the Department of Natural Resources pay to the Town of Westport 25% of the daily receipts from Horse-neck Beach State Reservation which is located in Westport to compensate for the use of our Police and Fire Departments to help in maintaining the Town dump, plowing and sanding of Star Route, (or John Reed Road) in winter; and all other aggravation, pain and suffering imposed upon the taxpayers of Westport during the summer season.

Article 30. A motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into along-term agreement with the City of Fall River, by granting the Town of Westport this right to use the land, 45 acres, more or less, located on Assessors plan #33, lot #96, to restore the old Mill Pond off Gifford Road, Fall River to retain water rights. In exchange Fall River would be relieved of the obligation of paying property taxes on said property, was carried.

Article 31. A motion to accept the provisions of Article 31 was lost.

Article 32. A motion to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the Army Corps of Engineers to complete the surveys of the Westport River, was carried.

Article 33. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for the Bicentennial Celebration.

Article 34. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over article 34.

Article 35. Voted: (Unanimously) to appropriate, for the support of schools only, the sum of \$2,616.00 which sum has already been received, and is presently available, in the account Title I, Federal Funds, PL 874, PL88-210 Federal Funds.

Article 36. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 36.

Article 37. A motion to petition the General Court pursuant to the provisions of Section 8 of LXXXIX of the Amendments to the State Constitution for a Special Law substantially in the following form; For the purposes of the Fifth sentence of Section 7 of Chapter 150E as inserted by Chapter 1078 of the Acts of 1973, the provisions of Section 34 of Chapter 71 shall be deemed to be not operative in the Town of Westport.

Article 38. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the purpose of maintaining during the ensuing year the mosquito control works as estimated and certified by the State Reclamation Board in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 112, Acts of 1931.

Article 39. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,753.50 in accordance with Section 11, Chapter 660, Acts of 1948 for insect control.

Article 40. A motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 in accordance with Section 13, Chapter 761 Acts of 1949 for Dutch Elm Work was passed.

Article 41. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise and appropriate \$50,000.00 for the Stabilization Fund.

Article 42. Voted: (Unanimously) to pass over Article 42.

Article 43. Voted (Unanimously) to pass over Article 43.

Article 44. Voted: (Unanimously) to raise the appropriations to defray the Town's charges by taxation during the fiscal year for which appropriated, unless some other specific source has been named in the appropriation.

Voted: (Unanimously) that we adjourn at 9:59 P.M.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board organized March 11, 1974 with Claude A. Ledoux, Chairman, Harold S. Wood, Clerk and Charles A. Costa as regular member.

Our Town has expanded quite rapidly over the past eight years and many new people have come to live here. One of the problems which new citizens encounter is a lack of knowledge of the workings of our Town government. This year we have asked the various reporting agencies to provide a brief description of their function in order to promote a better understanding of the workings of our government. We have also asked the departments give a brief outline of their goals so that you might be informed where we are going.

The function of our Board is to oversee the operation of the Police and Fire Departments, the Cemetery departments, the Registrars and Accountants officers, the Building departments, Conservation Commission, Veterans Agent and others. Proper administration of those departments can only be accomplished through Chiefs and Department Heads which we appoint. We have been very fortunate in finding able and conscientious persons to fill these positions. We do not have jurisdiction over and department which has an elected official heading it. WE try not to meddle in the affairs of such departments and we feel that we should not do so, unless there are wrong doings which are important enough to affect the welfare of the Town. We leave the judgement of those departments to the voters. We co-operate with all departments to achieve the best results in the operation of the Town. We appoint numerous committees to represent us and the Town in many activities, regional and local, a listing of those committees is enclosed with this Report. We set up Town Meeting, administer State and Town By-Laws and try to insure that adequate Town services are provided.

Some of our goals for the future are: to implement the new Police Station which was approved at the last annual Town Meeting, to promote the type of business and industry that does not demand an extensive amount of Town services, to provide more adequate services for our fishing industry, to start more meaningful management of our river estuaries and make them more biologically productive, to increase citizen participation at all levels of government thereby providing a continuous flow of common sense, new ideas and knowledge. We will continue to co-operate with our Board of Health in solving the problems of cleaning up South Watuppa Pond and in the difficult task which they have of administering the health laws pertaining to Percolation Tests.

One of our major headaches continues to be the deluge of new State and Federal laws which are continuously being enacted and put severe constraints on our need to provide timely solutions to problems. Holding down costs of Town operations is our severest challenge. Expenditures which are not absolutely mandatory should not be implemented even at the expense of providing for services which may be desirable. Voters at this coming Town Meeting will have tough choices to make in deciding between the necessary and the desirable.

Our Board realizes that our task would be impossible without the help and hard work of other elected officials, appointed heads of departments, committees and commission members and the understanding and co-operation of townspeople. We thank each and everyone for their administration of the thousands of little details which are only noticed when left undone. We thank our secretary, Mrs. Bernier, for her help in the administration of our office and in making our job easier.

ELDERLY HEALTH COUNSELLING CLINIC

During the latter part of the year, policies were drawn up for the Elderly Health Counselling Clinics to be held in the Town Hall Basement and at the Community Room at the Community Room at the Elderly Housing Unit. It was originally planned to start the clinics in October, but due to many factors this was not feasible. Hopefully, clinics will begin in January. It was necessary to obtain scales for each area and through another department these were provided for the clinics.

Clinic sessions provide Health Counselling services stressing prevention of disease, teaching good health habits, and being available to answer questions regarding their problems. In addition, the patients temperature, pulse, respiration, and blood pressure will be taken on first visit and on subsequent visits if the Doctor wishes. The Program also includes on a small scale a few tests, such as stick tests for blood sugar albumen, acetone and P.H. This provides a screening service plus psychological help to our Senior Citizens.

STUDENT PROGRAM

Senior Students from Southeastern Massachusetts University attended our Programs and went out into the field with the Community Health Nurses during the months of September and February. They attended and assisted at the Well Child Conferences and with the Agency. This provides the Student with her first introduction to a Community Health Agency. The Community Health Nurses attended the Seminars in May.

During the past few years, the Junior students have been attending our Well Child Conferences, but this was discontinued due to a change of clinic days. Clinics were held on Thursdays and were changed to Tuesdays. Junior students attended programs in other areas on Tuesdays and were not able to come in on that day. We hope that the Junior students will be able to make arrangements to attend our clinics next year.

IN-SERVICE PROGRAM

During the past year, the nurses attended In-Service Programs on Mental Health, Home Health Aide Programs, Therapy Programs, Stroke Spinal Injury Programs, Lead Poisoning, Cancer, Arthritis, Courses on Family Planning, and courses on Maternal and Child Health.

The Administrator attended meeting held once a month at Lakeville for Directors and Administrators.

Staff conferences were held periodically during the year for patient discussion and other procedures to assist nurses in areas required.

Case studies were held once a month with Miss Elizabeth Hanley, R.N., Consultant from Mental Health Center.

The Nursing Department wishes to extend their thanks and appreciation to all volunteers, assistants, and organizations, who assisted with nursing programs during the past year.

FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT

I am sure that the townspeople must realize that it is difficult to compile an actual list of the functions and duties of the Police Department, as many are done routinely without actual consideration as to whether they are part of a Police Officer's obligatory service. All Police Officers are responsible for the protection of persons and property, and all Officers are responsible for the observance and the enforcement of all laws, ordinances, by-laws and regulations which the Department or its Officers have the authority to execute. It is also each Police Officer's individual responsibility to familiarize himself with the principles of these laws and regulations in order that he may carry them out thoroughly. It is the function of the Department as a whole to assist the general public, detect and prevent crime and make arrest for violations of the law...endeavoring to make the townspeople feel safe in their homes and on the streets of Westport.

GOALS FOR THE FUTURE

We are presently in the planning stages of the construction of a long-overdue Police Station and are hoping for the building to be better equipped and laid out in a more logical manner than our present housing. It is hoped that the Police Station will reach completion in the Spring of 1975.

Many of our Officers have furthered themselves with college educations, and several have associate degrees, with others who will be receiving them in the future. Many of our Officers have also had specialized training in various aspects of law enforcement and are an asset to the Department and the town by performing these particular functions. It is hoped that more Police Officers can receive the opportunity for furthered training and education in different fields relating to Police matters..

By furnishing the Police Department with a Police Station and newer, more efficient equipment and also having Police Officers who are better trained in handling situations, it makes it easier for them to carry through the above duties and functions. It also makes their execution more successful which is advantageous to Westport's residents.

Due to the increase of work load and spread of crime throughout the entire country, it is quite obvious that Westport also has a great need for more personnel and equipment for the Police Department's future.

During 1974 two men attended classed at Bristol Community College in the Fire Science program. Also several fire related seminars were attended during the year.

Four more men have taken the 81 hour Emergency Medical Technician-Ambulance course at Union Hospital and have successfully passed the National Registry exam, bringing the total up to eight men. At the present time, six more men are attending EMT-A classes at St. Anne's Hospital.

One man has been certified to instruct the EMT-A course and is presently teaching the lay section of the course at St Annes Hospital.

The fire apparatus that was approved at the Annual Town Meeting in 1973 should be in service by the time you are reading this report. Fire apparatus builders are approximately two years behind in deliveries, consequently I will be requesting another apparatus next year to replace a truck that will be 26 years old by the time the new one is delivered.

On July 1, 1974, the Fire Department assumed the responsibility for the ambulance service, which is the reason for the sharp increase in our calls. Projecting these figures for a full year, the productivity of the Fire Department will probably increase by three-fold.

During the year, the following services were provided:

1. A Nutrition Program which began on Monday, July 22, 1974. Hot Lunches were served from 11:30 a.m.-12:15 noon at the Methodist Church, Westport Point on Monday and Friday and at the Westport High School on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. In August, the lunch program was moved from the High School to the Pacific Union Congregational Church at the Head and on September 3, 1974, it was transferred to the Community Room at the Elderly Housing Unit. Two Senior Aides were provided on loan from the Citizens for Citizens Program, Fall River, to work on our Lunch Program. Volunteers were obtained from the Westport Community and have been most helpful in assisting us with this Program. We have had many problems with the Program during the interim, but hopefully, we now have the situation well in hand.
2. Bus trips were provided both in the Spring and in the Fall. The Spring trip was a Mystery Ride to Cape Cod on June 18, 1974, with a total of 188 retired and older people transported by four buses. A hearty meal was enjoyed at Mildred's Chowder House. The Fall foliage trip on October 15, 1974, was enjoyed by 193 Elderly persons transported by four buses. Coffee and doughnuts were served. Each person brought a box lunch and on the way home a stop was made for ice cream. Both trips were a huge success and were attended by people from all sections of Town.
3. A cook out was held at Tony Almeida's Blue Acres Camp-grounds, Horseneck Road, on July 8, 1974, from 1:00-3:00 p.m. About one hundred people attended and was enjoyed by one and all.

4. The Annual Christmas Party was held on December 8, 1974, at the Fireside on Drift Road, with about 300 people attending. Luncheon, entertainment and gifts were provided. It was a great success and was enjoyed by one and all. Our sincere thanks and appreciation to all volunteers and organizations who assisted our Council with this Program.

5. I.D. cards were issued during the year at the Town Hall and at the Lunch Program.

6. Flu shots were provided by the Westport Community Health Nurses.

7. During the latter part of the year, various programs were provided following the Lunch Programs.

Mrs. Mary Hart and Rev. Robert Macfarlane were appointed to the Board of Directors of the Fall River Home Care for the Elderly, Inc during the month of October.

During the latter part of November, the Council appointed Miss Audrey L. Tripp as Temporary part time Co-ordinator to assist the Council with setting up programs and supervising the Lunch Program. Miss Tripp began her duties on December 2, 1974. This has been most helpful to the Council.

Miss Tripp attended the Dartmouth Nutrition Program with Mrs. Mary Hart, Chairman, and also the Nutrition Program at Highland Heights in Fall River with Mrs. Eunice Healey, Committee Member, which was of benefit to the Council with our Program.

A decision was made at the Council's December 4th meeting to open our Drop-in Center following the Lunch Program and develop additional programs for our Elderly.

Our goals for the coming year include:

1. Provide our Elderly with I.D. cards for free bus transportation.
2. Locate a place for another Drop-in Center.
3. Develop a variety of Programs which will benefit our Elderly Resident both physically and mentally. Many are interested in Group discussions, speakers on various topics that will keep them abreast of news in general concerning Senior Citizens, book reviews, movies, slides, etc.
4. Transportation to and from the Drop-in Center and Lunch Programs. This is needed for some, while others do have their own cars. Hopefully, we may realize this goal during the year of 1975.
5. Arts & Crafts--at the Drop-in Center. There is a great need for Volunteers for these services and hopefully a few of our Westport Residents with these talents may donate these services occasionally during the year.
6. Friendly Visitor Program--is badly needed in our Town. Plans to develop this Program will be instituted this year.

The Council plans to provide two bus trips during 1975 and also a couple of cook-outs during the summer months.

The Soil Conservation Board was organized in June under the change voted by Town Meeting in the Soil Conservation by-laws. CIVILIAN DEFENSE REPORT

Gentlemen:

December 12, 1974 was a sad day for Westport residents and the Office of Civil Defense due to the untimely death of Mr. Charles M. Arrida, the Director of Civil Defense for over a decade. His service to the town is beyond evaluation as are his efforts to ensure the safety of its citizens through the many CD plans he initiated. Although Mr. Arrida is no longer with us, his programs and spirit of progress are firmly imbedded in the consciousness of the town and its leaders and will continue to light our way in times of need. In that vein then, we say not "good-bye" but "thank you."

I hereby submit the following as the report of the office of Civil Defense for the year 1974.

Mr. Russell T. Hart was appointed Civil Defense Director for the Town of Westport to fill the unexpired term of Charles M. Arrida. This appointment expires on June 30, 1975. Mr. Arthur Marshall was appointed as Deputy Director by the Selectmen at that same hearing.

During the past year numerous high school students completed the Medical Self-Help and First-Aid courses administered by this department. These courses were also offered to Civil Defense volunteers as part of a continuing program of emergency preparedness.

The Civil Defense Director and various CD personnel attended monthly meetings through-out the sector where area directors acted as hosts for discussions of state and area emergency preparedness and community problems. Westport hosted several of these meetings at the Town Hall. As an example of this statewide interest in community readiness, a specially coordinated drill, code-named "Beaufort '74" was held in October. In mock-up fashion, the towns and cities throughout the state were informed that a hurricane had swept through causing water, wind, or other damage. Together with local police, fire and other town officials, the CD Director was left the task of assessing his town's operational readiness in the event of a real disaster. Sector 2A Director, Mr. Frank Belitsky congratulated the Westport CD Office for its efforts during this drill.

Classes in radiological training, shelter management, medical self-help, first-aid and Civil Defense nursing care were once again offered to individuals, groups and organizations. For further information contact Director Russell T. Hart.

The town's emergency warning systems, for use in the event of any natural or other disaster, are tested each Wednesday at 11:15 A.M. throughout the year to ensure their operational readiness.

The state radio drill is conducted on the first Monday of each month to ensure continuing radio network operations and contact throughout

Massachusetts Sector 2A. A special thanks to those volunteer radio operators who so faithfully manned the radio equipment during these drills to keep the lines of communication open.

Civil Defense equipment is stored and maintained at the following locations: one jeep and one automobile at the fire department; one generator at the fire department; one automobile as needed by the fish warden; one generator at the highway department which also houses and maintains the second jeep and amphibious duck used in rescue operations as well as other CD equipment. The highway department is currently in the process of constructing additional storage space at the shed so that eventually most CD equipment will be under cover.

The Office of Civil Defense has acquired through Federal Surplus and excess property during the course of the year equipment amounting to some \$3,725. Through Public Law 85-606, which provides for federal reimbursement to municipalities for CD expenditures, some \$800 was returned to the town as a result of Civil Defense actions. Two mobile homes were obtained for the town through surplus property and are currently being readied for use by the school department as temporary classrooms.

In accordance with Federal policy, the Westport CD Office is in the process of converting to a two-meter FM Communicator System with half the cost to be assumed by Federal.

The Office of Civil Defense is reopening considerations of a proposed Emergency Operations Center to be constructed in the basement of proposed new Police Station. A primary EOC is a protected facility from which local Government officials can function under all emergency disaster conditions. This protected facility will be utilized on a day to day basis for pre-disaster planning, personnel training and maintenance of CD radio equipment.

In cooperation with Louis F. Saba, Director of Massachusetts Civil Defense Agency in Framingham, the Selectmen invited the University of Massachusetts to conduct a Plans and Operations Course in Westport. Participants in the course will be department heads and key community service personnel. The Plans and Operations Course was one of the programs initiated by Mr. Arruda shortly before his death.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD 1974

Herewith is report of the Planning Board for the year 1974. This is the eighteenth year since the Board was established under Chapter 41, Section 81 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

The board organized during the year as follows:

Mr. Sanford continued as delegate to the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District, Mr. Gracia was appointed delegate to the Conservation Commission and Mr. Grondin was appointed delegate to the Solid Waste Study Committee.

During the year the Board held 21 public hearings on sub-divisions and subsequently approved a total of 204 lots in 19 subdivisions. In addition 32 plans containing 48 lots on existing roads were endorsed Approval Not Required; 18 plans of miscellaneous surveys not creating building lots were endorsed and 5 plans were approved after also being approved by the Board of Appeals.

Twenty-six regular and one special meeting were held to conduct business of the board and the Chairman and various members met with the Selectmen and other town officers many times throughout the year. The board also conducted several site inspections of subdivisions prior to and during construction.

The new zoning regulations went into effect on March 28, 1974, with the larger lot area and frontage requirements causing some decrease in subdivision activity but the overall work of the Planning Board continued at a high level. In 1975 the board anticipates presenting Flood Plain Zoning regulations for consideration by the voters at Town Meeting, and also intends to substantially revise and update its Subdivision Regulations.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL REPORT

ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1974-December 31, 1974

Enrollment continues to grow in the Greater Fall River Vocational School District. As of October 1, 1974, there were 928 students in the high school program; 88 students in the technical institute program; 95 in the practical nursing program; and 9 students in the nursing assistant program for a grand total of 1120 students in our day programs. In addition, there was an enrollment of 594 adults in the evening programs.

From July 1, 1974, through August 23, 1974, the school conducted an eight week training program for machine tool operators. Eight of the nine students who completed the program were placed in the trade upon completion of the program. During 1974, 184 students graduated from our high school program; 43 from the technical institute; and 77 from the school of practical nursing. In addition, 30 students received certificates from our nurse assistant program and 34 students from our homemaker-home aide program.

The Guidance Department received over 500 applications from the communities for admission to our high school programs. The number of applications continues to increase each year as parents and students recognize the importance of vocational education particularly in providing students with skills which will help them to find employment.

Starting in 1974, most admissions testing for our high school program was done at the applicants' schools. Guidance personnel from Diman visited all of the sending schools explaining the course offerings to the students. Students from parochial schools were tested at Diman on a Saturday morning. A new brochure for prospective students was developed. It gives an outline of each vocational program, lists career opportunities in the field and local employers who hire our graduates.

A program of taking in seniors from area high schools on a half-day basis was started in January, 1974, with the cooperation of the guidance counselors in the high schools. Seniors from Case and Somerset enrolled in machine shop, welding, electronics and auto mechanics. This enabled them to have some occupational skills when they graduated. In September of 1974, juniors were accepted as full time Diman Students from Durfee, Case and Westport in the areas of machine shop, auto body; and drafting.

The Guidance Department conducted a follow-up survey of the graduates from the class of 1974, 1972, and 1970. A newsletter describing the major changes that have happened at Diman in the last several years namely co-op program, reading program, electives, evaluation, accreditation and field house was sent to the 1970 and 1972 graduates.

The Guidance Department conducted a statewide guidance workshop for guidance personnel on June 24 and 25, in Framingham under the auspices of the Massachusetts Association of Vocational Administrators. Topics discussed were curriculum development, co-op programs, Chapter 766 and armed services opportunities. Our guidance counselors have held meetings with those seniors planning on post-secondary education to enlighten them on procedures for filing applications and the availability of money at the local, state and federal levels in the form of scholarships, grants and

loans and also arranged to have representatives of the armed services come to the school at a specific time to speak to those seniors interested in joining the armed services. Letters have been mailed in the fall to approximately thirty area employers asking them to call the guidance office if they have any part-time jobs available.

In September of 1974, the School inaugurated a program in architectural drafting which will enable us to accept more students at the high school level. This program is incorporated with the machine drafting program and will enable the students to acquire skills in both areas which should broaden their job opportunities.

In 1974, the school initiated the Outstanding Vocational Student Award as an annual award to be presented in April to that student who demonstrated the greatest potential in vocational skills and excellence in academic education. This award has been established by the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee as a means of focusing the spotlight on vocational education and its place in the education of today's youth. Candidates for this award were nominated by the shop instructors and the winner was selected by a team of judges comprising the faculty, advisory board and school committee. Michael Quirk a senior in the electrical department was the first winner.

In September of 1974, the school initiated an elective program for seniors in the areas of math and English.

In the Massachusetts Region III Science Fair conducted in Taunton, our students won first, second and third prize in the Engineering Division and third prize in the Physics Division. Kenneth Perreira who won first place in the Engineering Division received the "Texas Instrument's Outstanding Achievement Award" for excellence in the field of engineering and also won third place in the engineering competition of the 1974 "JET'S" exposition held at Northeastern University. Our school is also represented on the Energy Conservation Corps of the Environmental Program sponsored by the United States Government. Our students are presently developing bilingual posters which will be made available to all elementary schools in the region.

We take extreme pride in the fact that Daniel Pouliot a senior in our Electronics Department has been named a commended student by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Commended students are in the upper 2% nationally of those students who will graduate from high school in June of 1975.

Kenneth Agrello, Rodney Bell and Anthony Silva received a sixth place prize in national competition from the Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation for a spiral staircase project they built.

In conjunction with National Children's Dental Health Week held February 7, 8 and 9, dental assistant students from Diman Regional Technical Institute manned a booth and tables at the Dartmouth Mall to demonstrate plaque prevention and oral hygiene. In October, students in the dental assisting program initiated a plaque prevention program at Diman. Fifty-six Freshmen are participating in the program whose purpose is to educate high school students in plaque prevention and oral hygiene. The program also helps to prepare the dental assistant students of Diman Regional Technical Institute to teach plaque prevention to patients when they are employed by area dentists.

The Diman Key Club continuing to demonstrate one of its goals-service to the community-provided fourteen Christmas baskets to needy families in the area. This was possible because of the cooperation and support of the students, faculty, cafeteria, custodial and administrative staff at the school.

During the year, the Diman students constructed their third house since the program started. This house was built on Forestdale Drive in Somerset for Mr. and Mrs. Roland Bond. Open House for this new home was held July 7, 1974. In addition to this home, the students in conjunction with the bricklaying apprentices in our evening school program constructed a field house on the school athletic grounds. This field house provides rest room facilities for the public during athletic events, a snack bar and a storage area for athletic equipment. We are very grateful to Robert Hebert and George Ripley, Jr. of Local 39 of the Bricklayers', Masons' and Plasterers' Union for their help and cooperation.

In recognition of the contribution of Truesdale and Union Hospitals in Fall River, St. Luke's Hospital in New Bedford and Lakeville Hospital in Lakeville to the practical nursing program; Mr. Antonio B. Gracia, Chairman of the regional school committee, presented plaques to these hospitals at graduation exercises on February 12, 1974.

The facilities of our Computer Department continue to be used by the communities. It is used by Diman Regional for payroll and report cards; by Somerset for report cards, scheduling and water bills; by Case for report cards and we are working toward placing the attendance on the computer; by Swansea for voter registration and census reports; and by Fall River Model Cities for manpower statistics. We encourage use of the computer by all the communities and offer our services to explain how the computer can help you.

An additional remedial reading teacher has been hired for the current school year and our closed circuit equipment was received the latter part of December. We intend to have this equipment fully operational by this school year.

Our facilities continue to be used by the Little Theater, Fall River Symphony Orchestra, Fall River Power Squadron, Coast Guard Auxiliary, Boy Scouts, Bugle and Drum Corps, Cub Scouts and the Licensed Practical Nurse's Association to mention a few.

Due to the nature of vocational education and its need for actual jobs to provide meaningful education, many agencies have benefited from our training. Some of these agencies for whom we have done work of performed a service are the Fall River Police Academy, Public Works Department, Marine Museum, Somerset Lion's Club, Boys' Club, Dominican Sisters, Stang High School, Fall River Youth Hockey League, School Department, Bishop Gerrard High School, the Greater Fall River Recreation Committee and the Westport United Congregational Church.

In submitting an Annual Report, it is extremely important that it not only be a record of what has been accomplished during the year but that it also spell out goals of objectives for the coming year. Our goals for 1975 are:

1. Develop closed circuit TV as a tool for better teaching in all areas of the curriculum.

2. Work towards increasing enrollment to allow more students to participate in vocational education.
3. Work with the communities in the district to develop more career education in the high schools.
4. Continue the joint meetings with the school committees of Fall River, Somerset, Swansea and Westport.

In closing this report, I would be remiss if I did not thank the administrative staff, the Guidance Department, department heads, the faculty, the cafeteria, clerical and custodial staff and the students. Their cooperation and dedication to vocational education have made this report possible.

To the regional school committee for their time and effort, their support and their contributions to develop an outstanding program in vocational-technical education; I shall ever be grateful. The communities are fortunate to have people of their caliber.

To the voters of Westport,

I would, first of all, like to take this opportunity to welcome you to our annual town meeting. It was at meetings such as this that our nation first established what would later become the purist form of government ever known on this earth.

During the past year I have has many requests from you to print in a brief form, some of the basic rules of order used at town meeting. I hope that this page will help you to better understand a few procedures used. If you have any further questions, I will be glad to answer them, to the best of my ability, at any time.

1. Point of order: Can be asked for at any time to question the method or procedure being used by the moderator in running the meeting. It can be used for this purpose only.

2. Point of Information: Can be called for at any time to give the voters a chance to obtain a better understanding of something which has already been discussed on the floor. It cannot be called for to obtain new information, or to introduce new information.

3. Call for the Question: Can be called by anyone, at any time, in order to stop debate. It does require a 2/3 vote of those present to be enforced; however. On occasion, your moderator may allow a person to say a few things after the call has been voted. This only is true when he has, prior to the question being called, acknowledged a hand in the audience, and has stated that the person he has acknowledged, prior to the call, may speak.

4. The motion to Table: It is votable only, and not debateable.

5. The motion to adjourn: Is always in order; but, unless it is at the last session of the meeting, should include within it, the time and date of reconvening.

These five points have been questioned by many of you, and I hope that this clears it up for you.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

ANNUAL REPORT--WESTPORT, MASS.

DECEMBER 31, 1974

On June 30, 1975, The Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete sixteen years of service to the Town of Westport and eighteen other communities in the county.

The Town of Dartmouth has recently rejoined and the Project now services the entire county.

The Project experienced one of the driest seasons ever and the calls for service were light enough to allow for the larviciding of areas that contained water throughout the summer.

A human case of equine encephalitis was confirmed in the city of Taunton. This was the only incident in the county.

This was reason enough for the Department of Public Health to aerial spray a few communities in the northeastern section of the county.

In March our larvicide program got underway and 62 3/4 acres were treated before our mist blowers were mounted on the first of May. The spraying season terminated on September 13, 1974.

With the spraying season over, the mist blowers were removed and all crews turned to our brook and ditch maintenance program. This resulted in the removal of 5,280 feet of debris and obstructions from existing brooks and ditches. 3,500 feet of brush was also removed to allow proper drainage and to aid in preventing unnecessary flooding.

All personnel are licensed for the application of pesticides by the Commonwealth and in 1975 will be licensed by the Federal government.

This Project uses only pesticides approved by the State Pesticide Board.

We want to thank the residents of Westport for their continued co-operation

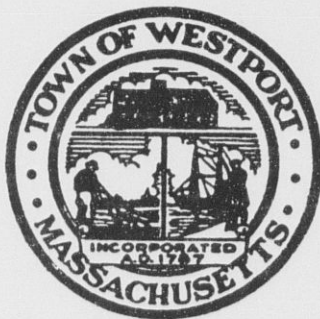

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Mrs. Kirby and Gentlemen:

It is with a keen sense of dedication and pride that I submit my first report as Superintendent of Schools in my native Town.

For the purpose of economy, the reports from the various school principals are not included in this annual report but will be on file in the school department office as public information for those wishing to review them. Also, personnel changes will be included in the teacher listing and will not be duplicated here.

SERVICES FOR SPECIAL NEEDS STUDENTS

The provision of services for special needs students as defined under Chapter 766 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth has been one of the major activities during the past school year. The establishment of such services at the High School and the Earle School and the expansion of services at the Macomber School have been effected so far.

With the assistance of the Westport Civil Defense, two mobile homes were acquired and located at the Macomber and Earle Schools to house classes for children in the areas of speech therapy and learning disabilities. Expansion is also expected at the Greenwood Park and the Head Schools with the future arrival of two more mobile units.

STAFF IN-SERVICE TRAINING

In-service training for the staff has been conducted in accordance with the guidelines of the special education law.

Plans for future in-service training will include grade level and subject area meetings of our staff to define curriculum, curriculum materials, future direction and goals in an effort to coordinate curriculum offerings from grades K-12.

SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

During the past year we have witnessed two significant events in the various stages of school building. Dedication ceremonies were held to commemorate the completion of the addition and alterations to Westport High School.

Meanwhile, the Town has made progress in planning the construction of a much needed elementary school. The School Committee and Elementary School Building Committee have proceeded with plans to construct a 700 student school which would involve the phasing out of the Greenwood, Head and Point Schools.

In addition, an architect has been selected, the school site has been approved by the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Bureau, and the educational specifications have been written and submitted to the same Bureau.

TRENDS IN THE BUSINESS AREA

Personnel in the business area of the school department have been involved with the establishment of safer bus routes without increasing the total number of buses under contract. Changes in inventory control and bulk purchasing have allowed the department to lower the expenditure per pupil in the general supply area. In addition, the amount of town funding for proper operation of cafeterias has been reduced.

PARENT-STUDENT VOLUNTEERS

We have been very fortunate in having the services of the Parent-Teacher Organization volunteers who assist in classrooms, lunchrooms and playground activities. Student volunteers from Westport High School have also been assisting in various capacities in the schools.

We are grateful to these volunteers, not only for their services, but also for their strengthening of school-community ties.

THE CRITICAL NEED

The most urgent need in the Westport School System is the need for housing of elementary school children. Presently children are located in basement areas of two schools and four classes are conducted in the auditorium of another school. In addition, classes for students with special needs are held in two house trailers.

Shortly, we will be asking the citizens of Westport to pledge their financial support for the construction of a new elementary school. It is our sincere hope that we will all follow through and provide for an elementary school which will fulfill the educational needs of Westport's growing school population.

CONCLUSION

No one administrates a school district alone. I have been fortunate to have the cooperation of the staff at each school, the cooperation and understanding of the clerks at the central office, and the commendable

services of a capable business manager. Finally, I am grateful to the School Committee for their support and their interest in providing the best possible education for Westport's school children.
