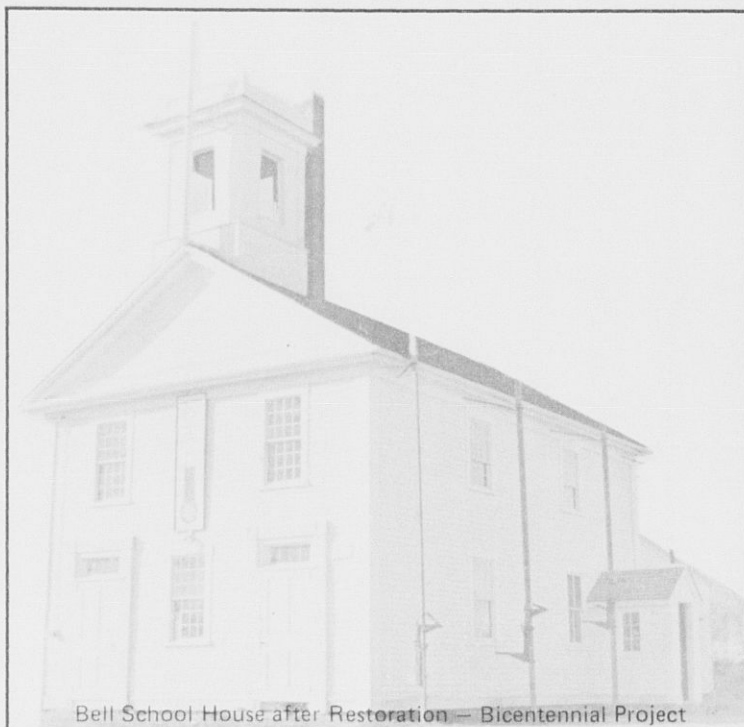
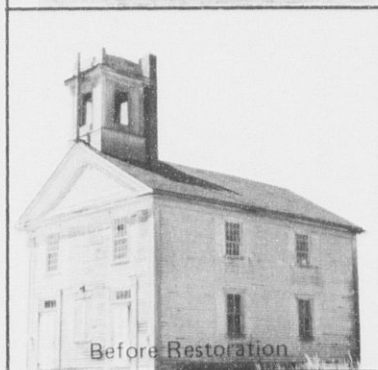

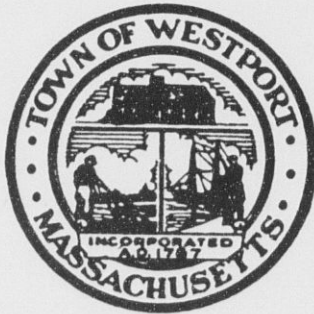

On Monday, the fifth day of April next, it being the first Monday of said month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to choose the following officers, viz: one Selectmen, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Health, two members of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, two Trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years; four members of the Landing Commissioners, one Tree Warden, all for the term of one year; one member of the Housing Authority and one member of the Planning Board, for five years. One member of the Board of Commissioners of Trust Funds, one year; one member of the Board of Commissioners of Trust Funds, two years; one member of the Board of Commissioners of Trust Funds, three years. Also one Fish Commissioner, for two years to fill a vacancy. And to assemble at the High School Auditorium on Tuesday, April 13, 1976, it being the second Tuesday of said month at 7:30 P.M. then and there to act on the following articles, viz;

Whenever it shall be affirmed in writing by three or more persons having separate residences, or regularly employed in the neighborhood that any animal is a habitual nuisance by reason of trespassing, howling, barking or other noise, or damage to property, being vicious or by its actions potentially vicious or in any other manner causing undue annoyance, the dog officer, if he finds such nuisance to exist, shall serve notice upon the owner or custodian that such nuisance must be abated.

No dogs shall be allowed on Beach or Recreation Areas, owned or under the control of the Town of Westport or any Boards or Commissions thereof, during the six months of May through October inclusive, whether at large or under restraint. C. If such dog is found, upon investigation by the Dog Officer or Board of Selectmen, to have bitten or harassed a person or persons or killed, bitten or harassed livestock or other domestic animals or fowl on at least three occasions, the owner or custodian shall forthwith dispose of the dog. In the event the owner or custodian refuses to dispose of such dog, the Dog Officer may seize and dispose of such dog. Such order shall be issued by the Board of Selectmen. To this order, the owner or custodian shall have the right to appeal as set forth in Chapter 140, Section 157 of the Mass. General Laws.

These provisions will not apply to a dog who has bitten or harassed a person if such person was committing trespass or other tort, or was teasing, tormenting or abusing such dog.

Three million eight hundred fifty thousand dollars was the amount secured under the bond issue authorized at the special town meeting on Sept. 12, 1972. To this amount \$50,000.00 was authorized from taxation and \$12,500.00 from available funds giving a total budget of \$3,912,500.00. The bond issue was underwritten by Salomon Bros. through Harbor National Bank of Boston. The interest rate obtained was 4.5%. Westport was one of the first towns to be accepted for 65% reimbursement by the state for school construction including both new construction and renovation and for both principle and interest.

In addition to the expected construction work on a project of this type and size there are usually a number of unexpected items that have to be added to the budget. We were fortunate to include the following within the original budget without requesting additional funds from the town.

Although we signed the certificate of substantial completion on May 1, 1974, the High School Building Committee is still functioning. At the present time there are still a few items that require our attention. The budget balance is now \$75,529.96 and we have obligations of \$731.44 leaving a true balance of \$74,798.52. Of this amount we expect to need approximately \$40,000.00 leaving an unexpended balance of just under \$35,000.00

In addition to the financial statement just completed there is another financial comment that should be added to the report. A sizeable amount of money has been earned as interest on the funds that were obtained through the bond issue. We were fortunate to obtain a favorable rate of interest on our bond issue and almost immediately thereafter, interest rates began to climb to near record levels. Mrs. Martin, our Town Treasurer, invested these funds that were not immediately needed by the Building Committee at these high rates of interest. This amount of income is not reflected in the Building Committee budget but has accrued to the town treasury in the amount of \$160,966.00.

TOWN LAND REGULATIONS

SECTION I — DEFINITIONS

Town Land — Shall mean all land owned or under the control of the Town of Westport or any Boards or Commissions thereof, but shall specifically not include any public way.

Public Way — Any public highway, private way laid out under authority of Statute, way dedicated to public use or way under the control of park commissioners or body having like powers.

Motor Vehicle — as defined by Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 90, Section I.

Recreational Vehicle — a motor vehicle designed to travel over unimproved terrain and which has been determined by the registrar of motor vehicles as unsuitable for operation on the public way and not eligible for registration under Chapter 90.

Snow Vehicle — a motor vehicle designed to travel over ice or snow supported in whole or in part by skis, belts, cleats, or low pressure tires.

Operate — to ride in or on and control the operation of a snow vehicle or a recreation vehicle.

Owner — a person, other than a lien holder, having the property or title to a snow vehicle or to a recreation vehicle entitled to the use or possession thereof.

Beach and Recreation Areas — Those areas of Town Land owned or under the control of the Town of Westport or the Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission or Recreation Committee, that are dedicated by the Town or the respective Board or Commission as a Beach or Recreation Area.

Conservation Area — Those areas of Town Land owned by the Town and placed under the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission under the Provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 40, Section 8C.

SECTION II — OPERATION ON TOWN LANDS

Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall operate a motor vehicle, motorcycle, recreational vehicle or snow vehicle upon any Beach, Recreation or Conservation Area.

Persons with a permit issued under Section 3, Police, Fire and other departments with Town owned vehicles and emergency vehicles may operate motor vehicles in or upon any Beach, Recreation or Conservation Area.

In the event of a determination by the Board of Selectmen that emergency conditions exists, such Board may grant permits to volunteers as may be necessary to ensure the health and safety of the public.

SECTION III — PERMITS

Permits may be issued by the Board of Selectmen to any person on an "indefinite basis" for the purpose of operating, maintaining, or policing the Beach, Recreation or Conservation Area. Temporary permits may be issued for fifteen (15) consecutive days for a fee of Two (\$2.00) Dollars, to any person.

Temporary permits may be issued without fee to volunteers under emergency conditions as provided in Section 2, such permits shall be rescinded upon the abatement of such emergency conditions. A Determination by the Board of Selectmen that such emergency conditions are terminated will automatically rescind all such temporary emergency permits.

SECTION IV — DANGEROUS AND PROHIBITED OPERATION

No one shall operate a snow vehicle, recreation vehicle or motor vehicle so as to endanger any person or property.

No one shall operate a snow vehicle, recreation vehicle or motor vehicle in a reforested or planted area in a manner to cause damage to growing stock.

No one under fourteen years of age shall operate a snow vehicle or a recreation vehicle unless directly supervised by an adult.

Every person operating or riding in or on a recreation vehicle or a snow vehicle or on a sled attached thereto, shall wear protective headgear conforming with such minimum standards for construction and performance as the registrar of motor vehicles may prescribe under the provisions of Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 90B. No one shall operate a snow vehicle or recreation vehicle in a manner to harass deer or other wildlife.

No one shall operate a snow vehicle or recreation vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs.

No one shall carry a firearm, rifle or shotgun in or on a snow vehicle or a recreational vehicle or on a trailer or sled attached thereto, unless such firearm, rifle or shotgun is unloaded and in an enclosed case, unless he is a law enforcement officer of other person authorized to carry arms or a paraplegic as provided in section sixty-five of chapter one hundred and thirty-one.

SECTION V — PENALTY

Whoever violates any provision of this By-Law shall be punished by a fine not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars nor more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars. Each separate violation shall constitute a separate offense.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION 1—9 inclusive

QUESTION NO. 1

Summary

The proposed amendment would provide that equality under the law may not be denied or abridged on the basis of sex, race, color, creed or nation origin. This amendment adds one sentence to Article 1 of Part the First of the Constitution which now contains a general statement of individual rights, including the right to enjoy and defend life and liberty and the right to acquire and protect property. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 2

Summary

The proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature to substitute for the present system of flat or uniform personal income tax rates a system of rates graduated according to the total amount of income received. The legislature would also be authorized to provide for reasonable exemptions, deductions, credits and abatements and could base Massachusetts income tax provisions on provisions of Federal income tax law. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 3

Summary

The proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature to provide for absentee voting by persons who hold religious beliefs in conflict with the act of voting on the day on which any election is to be held. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 4

Summary

SECTION 1 of the act inserts a new chapter 164B into the General Laws and establishes a Massachusetts Power Authority, a body corporate and politic with seven members appointed by the Governor to staggered six year terms. The Authority is to establish and operate a bulk power supply system to supply wholesale electric power to utilities throughout the Commonwealth. The primary purpose of the Authority is to supply the Commonwealth with power with the minimum adverse impact on the environment. The Authority is also authorized to engage in research and development of new sources of power, new siting techniques, and methods of environmental protection.

In carrying out its responsibilities, the Authority is authorized to adopt by-laws; adopt an official seal; maintain offices; sue and be sued; construct or acquire facilities either within or without the Commonwealth; issue revenue bonds and borrow money in anticipation of issuance of revenue bonds; acquire real and personal property; employ professional, managerial and other employees deemed necessary and fix their compensation to be paid solely out of revenues of the Authority; appear before other government agencies; apply for and receive federal or other grants of funds; and enter into contracts and agreements.

The Authority will build and operate all new generating and transmission facilities in the Commonwealth and has the option to purchase existing facilities through negotiation, condemnation or eminent domain. After an initial two-year period, no other utility may construct a new facility unless the Authority certifies that it lacks the capability to finance the facility and the facility would further the purposes of the act.

QUESTION NO. 5

Summary

The proposed legislation would prohibit the possession, ownership, or sale of any weapon from which a shot or bullet can be discharged and which has a barrel length of less than sixteen inches. The prohibition would not apply to military personnel, law enforcement officers, federally licensed handgun manufacturers and wholesalers, common carriers in the ordinary course of transport, or to historical societies and museums. The act would not affect the possession of rifles, shotguns, and certain antiques and replicas. The proposal also does not change the existing statutory penalties for unlawful possession, ownership or sale of handguns, including provision imposing mandatory jail sentences.

The proposal would permit owners of handguns to surrender their weapons to any law enforcement agency in the Commonwealth within six months of the effective date of the act without incurring criminal liability. Those surrendering handguns within that six months will be compensated at a rate to be determined by the Commissioner of Public Safety. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 6

Summary

The proposed act would require every beverage container sold or offered for sale in the Commonwealth to have a refund value of at least five (5) cents, and would prohibit the sale of metal beverage containers with flip-tops. It would apply to containers for beer and other malt beverages and to soft drinks. It would not apply to containers for dairy products or natural fruit juices, nor to containers which are biodegradable.

The act would authorize the Secretary of Environmental Affairs to certify containers as reusable or recyclable. It contains both enforcement and penalty provisions and would take effect on February 1, 1977. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 7

Summary

The proposed act would impose a general requirement that every electric utility company charge a uniform rate per kilowatt hour of electricity. The proposed tax would except from this general rule rates charged to other electric companies and to residential customers who heat their principle place of residence by electricity. The Act would also permit a different rate to be charged residential customers for the first three hundred (300) kilowatt hours they consume each month, and would authorize "peak load" pricing whereby a higher rate than the uniform rate per kilowatt hour may be charged during the periods of the day or seasons of the year when consumption of electricity is the greatest. The Act would authorize the Department of Public Utilities to issue implementing rules and regulations and provides for enforcement. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 8

Summary

The Legislature has placed this question on the ballot in order to determine whether the people favor or oppose the construction of an oil refinery and deep water port in Massachusetts. The vote on this question is not binding on the Legislature. The question deals with the general advisability of such construction and is not a specific proposal for a facility. If a specific proposal is made, it would

be subject to approval by the communities directly affected and subject to any restrictions imposed by the Legislature. Yes—No.

QUESTION NO. 9

Summary

The legislature has placed this question on the ballot in order to determine whether the people favor or oppose the Sunday opening of certain retail stores, including package liquor stores. As the law now stands, most retail and all package liquor stores must be closed on Sundays. The vote on this question is not binding on the Legislature. Yes—No.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT ANNUAL REPORT — WESTPORT, MASS.

December 31, 1976

On June 30, 1977 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete eighteen years of service to the Town of Westport and nineteen other communities in the county.

The first part of the season was fairly normal but rains toward the end of June created numerous breeding areas that caused a heavy influx of mosquitos in the county.

Although there was an additional nuisance, we were fortunate that there were no cases of encephalitis reported in Bristol County.

In March our larviciding program got underway and 28 acres were treated before our sprayers were mounted on May 10th.

The spraying season terminated on September 16th and our brook and ditch maintenance program got underway. This resulted in the reclamation of 5,030 feet of existing waterways and the removal of 4,200 feet of brush.

We thank the residents of Westport for their continued cooperation.

In May the Commission held its annual meeting and elected officers for the year. Normand Sasseville was elected Chairman; Sat Khanna, Vice-Chairman; and Howard Burbank, Secretary. The other commissioners are Virginia Guptill, Thomas Porter, Jr., Donald Bernier and John Dolan. During the year the term of Octave Pelletier expired and the Commission will miss his zeal and interest.

The Commission meets every first and third Monday of the month.

During the year, the Board implemented revised requirements (higher performance bonds and more detailed plans) for soil permits and renewals. These requirements were needed to protect the interest of the Town.

The loss of two assistant conservation officers funded by CETA has increased the work load of the part-time conservation officer to an impossible point.

The Commission processed ten notices of intent under the Wetlands Act in addition to monitoring orders of conditions issued in past years. The adoption by the Town Meeting of the Flood Plain Zone will increase the Commission's work load. Seven new soil permits were issued and twelve were renewed for a year's period.

Continued efforts were made to control erosion and deterioration of the Cherry and Webb and Town Beach Conservation areas by installation of snow fencing and plantings.

Commissioner Virginia Guptill continues to ably represent the Commission on the Coastal Zone Management Program.

The members of the Commission are appreciative of the cooperation we have received from other town boards, town employees and the citizens of the town.

Herewith is the report of the Planning Board for the year 1976. This is the twentieth year since the Board was established under Chapter 41, Section 81 of the Massachusetts General Laws.

Mr. Cloutier was re-appointed delegate to the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District.

During the year the Board held public hearings on seven subdivision proposals and subsequently approved six and disapproved one. The number of approved subdivision lots (27) was the lowest in many years. In addition, 12 plans containing 42 lots on town roads and 15 miscellaneous plans not creating new lots were reviewed and acted upon. Subdivision development and building activity in general continues to remain at a low level due mainly to economic conditions in the area; and the gradually decreasing availability and high prices of suitable building lots.

In addition to the regular meetings of the Board on the first, third and fifth Wednesdays of the month, a special meeting, a public hearing on zoning and numerous site inspection visits to subdivisions in progress were conducted. Members of the Board have attended meetings of the Selectmen, Conservation Commission, Board of Appeals, Finance Board and Board of Health throughout the year. We are also active in all SRPEDD meetings, the Coastal Zone Management program, Local Growth Policy, and Westport's Sewerage Study.

New maps have been received which now agree with the enacted Flood Plain zoning requirements, and the updated State Zoning Law is being reviewed for necessary revisions to our local by-laws. We are continuing review of our Subdivision Regulations attempting to include recent planning innovations in a complete updating revision.

BOARD OF TRUST FUNDS REPORT

The initial organization of this Board was delayed by a cliff-hanging election which was finally resolved by one vote — in court ! Following the election of officers, we reviewed the status of the four trusts which, after considerable research, we were able to locate.

One focused on the Ambulance Fund and was clearly within the purview of the Board. In the past year, we met with Fire Chief George Dean about this trust which as of December 31 contained over \$1,000.00. Chief Dean told us that new equipment will be needed soon for the town ambulances and that some of these monies will be used. As the funds are donated usually by persons using the free ambulance service, the Board voted to draft a letter to such donors stating how the money is collected and for what purposes it can be used. The fire department will, in turn, insure that these letters are mailed. Clerk Ronald Costa was selected to serve a liaison between the Board and the fire department in the future.

The remaining three trusts centered on the library. Because of a misunderstanding as to what the role of the Commissioners of Trust Funds is with regards to the Board of Trustees of the Public Library's duties to these trusts, a letter was sent to the Library Board to clarify this situation. The Board of Trust Funds was elected to insure that any monies donated or bequeathed to the town, or any of its agencies, are used exactly as the donor intended. We, therefor, cannot tell anyone how to spend certain funds, but only refuse to sign the town treasurer's voucher if we feel the trust's specific terms are not being complied with. Vice-Chairman Charles Sanderson was selected as liason between these two boards.

In other actions, we wrote to the Secretary of State to find out if any other Boards of Trust Funds are elected similarly in Massachusetts. We also voted to prepare and distribute some small pamphlets describing our function to the people of Westport.

The Board is very appreciative of Charles Sanderson's kind hospitality in hosting our meetings at his house. As our meetings are all posted in accordance with the open meeting law, he could be suprised some day to find a crowd at his front door!

The Library also subscribes to the Standard Times, Fall River Herald and the New York Times.

The Library is continuing to make rapid growth. The Monday night movies shown in the Project Room during the summer, spring and fall months continue to be very popular, especially with our summer visitors. During the summer months we try to show films suitable for the entire family.

As a member of the Eastern Massachusetts Regional Library system, patrons are able to borrow books, including large print books, and records, and groups are able to borrow films.

The Project Room has been used by many groups this past year; however, we would like to see more use made of this room and urge any non-profit group to inquire at the maindesk about this service.

The installation of reference desk service has relieved some of the work load from the main desk. It is a service we anticipate will prove most helpful.

We did not renew our membership to the Rhode Island School of Design Museum of Art in Providence due to the fact that only three people took advantage of this service and as we budget our money very carefully we had no alternative. It was most disappointing to the Trustees that our patrons did not take advantage of this privilege.

If our hours for the Library have at times seemed confusing, please bear with us as we are experimenting to determine the hours which will most benefit the patrons.

We were fortunate to receive a grant of \$4,165.00 from the project funded through the Massachusetts Bureau of Library Extension with Title I funds of Library Services and Construction Act, a federal source of library funding. Books and periodicals, audio-visual materials, recordings (including processing), electric typewriter, posture chair, phonograph record rack, record displayer-browser and paperback displayer were purchased from this fund. We also from this fund hired Nancy Cottrill, a Children's Librarian, for a summer reading program. I quote from her report:

Although I feel the program was a considerable success in many aspects, I was frustrated by the nature of the program in that it did not allow me to get to know individual children — their interests, skills, needs and reading habits. The program lacked the kind of physical continuity necessary to observe, evaluate and act in terms of an individual child — to employ methods of directly introducing and encouraging good reading habits. There are a wide variety of formats for reading programs but all require the constant presence of an individual who has the time and knowledge to organize a meaningful program. He/she must be available for the children to come to on a casual, informal basis when they are at the library. A program such as the one conducted this summer would be ideal if it supplemented this informal relationship between librarian and child.

This certainly points out, as the Trustees have known for some time but have not had the financial resource, the great need of having a Children's Librarian added to our staff. The Town of Westport need give this deep thought for a near future budget.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. MacVicar and her staff for the Saturday morning story hours conducted during the spring months, the Art Group for the gift of several books, the Westport Land Conservation Trust Inc. for the pictures loaned to us which have brought much joy to many of us, John P. Slade and Son for the Bookmarks, the Lafayette Co-Operative Bank for the borrowers' card envelopes and the plastic bags for the patrons to use on a rainy day, and to thank everyone who has contributed their efforts and time to help our Library grow.

Our deep concern is to better meet the needs of our community and we urge the people of Westport who are not acquainted with our Library to visit us and to take advantage of our many services. The efficient staff is always courteous and welcomes the opportunity to serve the public. We are indeed fortunate in having such a Library — it is beautiful, and it is theirs to use and enjoy.

During the year, the following programs were provided:

1. Nutrition Program. Up to 55 hot lunches were served daily from 11:30 A.M. to 12:15 P.M. at several locations; on Monday and Friday at Howland Hall, Westport Point Methodist Church, and Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday at the Community Hall, Greenwood Terrace Elderly Housing Units on Route 6. Two Senior Aides, Bill Reach and Mary Emery, provided by the Citizens for Citizens program in Fall River took care of our lunch project assisted by volunteers from the community. This service has been quite successful in bringing hot, nutritious meals to some of our elderly residents. In addition, meals were provided to some shut-ins who had difficulty cooking for themselves. It is hoped that this "meals on wheels" aspect of the program can be expanded next year.
2. Bus Trips. On June 8, 1976, about 200 seniors took a scenic, late-Spring ride to Rockport and Gloucester. Then on October 14, 1976, approximately the same number took a Fall Foliage tour of Central Massachusetts and Southern New Hampshire, passing through Leominster, Gardner, Fitchburg, and many quaint towns and colorful county-side enroute to the Cathedral in the Pines in Ringe, New Hampshire where all were treated to a guided tour of that famous memorial. Four busses were taken on each trip, and judging from the many thoughtful thank-you letters received by the Council, all who went had an enjoyable and relaxing time.
3. Annual Picnic. The yearly cook-out was held on September 16, 1976 at the St. Vincent de Paul Camp grounds on Adamsville Road, Westport. About 150 persons enjoyed the hot dogs, hamburgs, salads, chips, watermelon, and punch. The punch was also very well received by a small army of neighborhood yellow jackets, who, toward the end of the meal became quite possessive about their 'Lunch'. We are happy to report that only one minor casualty, a stung ear lobe, was sustained by the amazingly nimble punch servers.
4. Christmas Party. The season was made much jollier by the festivities at the annual party held in the High School Cafeteria on December 12, 1976. 250 persons ate a catered meal, sang the traditional songs and then attended a High School concert in the auditorium. The band was under the direction of Mr. Francesco Montesanti and the chorus led by Miss Nancy DeFaria. Attorney George Young served as honorary toastmaster. The Council sent many thank-you letters to the individuals and the committees that donated so much time, energy and materials to this worthy project.

5. I.D. Cards. Photo I.D. cards were made available through the Fall River Council on Aging for a second year. These cards, good for free passage on S.R.T.A. busses among other things, cost the recipient and the Westport Council fifty cents each. Around 100 additional Westport I.D. cards were also issued last year.
6. Flu Shot Clinics. Council Vice-Chairman Mary Hart, who is also the Board of Health's Head Nurse, gave swine flu shots, held health screening clinics, and provided other vital care to many of Westport's senior residents. She reports that over the year she answered a seemingly endless series of inquiries about the swine flu vaccination program; Due to her department's efforts many elderly persons were vaccinated in the Fall, 1976, against the feared flu epidemic.
7. Transportation. In December, Ed Shaeffer, Administrative Assistant to the Board of Selectmen, and Mary Hart met with Ben Baker, Director of the Southeastern Massachusetts Regional Transit Authority to discuss transportation services for Westport's Elderly. Mr. Baker reported that S.R.T.A. had received a \$ 60,000.00 federal grant to provide 'curb to curb' service for elderly in this region to go to doctors' offices and other similar places. Mr. Baker is scheduled to attend the regular February Council meeting, show a film, and discuss the transportation needs of Westport's elderly.

It has also been learned by Chairman Stafford Sheehan that federal monies are available to help local Councils on Aging to purchase a mini-bus, equipped to transport handicapped persons, under the Urban Mass Transit Act, 16b2, funds. As Mr. Baker is one of the many persons who would have to approve such a request, this will be discussed with him. With Westport being the second largest and one of the most remote towns in this state, the Council has recognized a need to transport elderly around town and to nearby destinations, like shopping malls, health clinics and recreational programs.

Other items of interest include:

On February 13, 1976, the Council sadly noted the passing of John Dyer. John was one of the founders of the Westport Council, served for two years as its Chairman, and was the Council's representative on most area agencies and boards. He was also a founder of the Westport Senior Citizens Club and served on the Greater Fall River Senior Senate. He fought hard for the rights of all seniors. His unique contribution was his tenacity and tireless dedication to each project he undertook. He is very much missed by his many friends.

In December, the Council was privileged to be visited by the Secretary for Elder Affairs for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Rose Claffey. She informed our Council what steps we needed to take to fulfill our hopes of providing a wide range of needed services to Westport's elderly. As we are only one out of 251 Councils on Aging in the state, her continuing interest is both gratifying and appreciated.

In 1977, the Council will be looking for both a temporary and a permanent new home. A temporary location is being sought so that many programs, including a referral service, a 'hot line', recreation projects, and shut-in services, can begin soon. The permanent multi-center, preferably in an elementary school building that will be vacated when the new school is completed, will either be renovated by funds obtained under Title 5, Older Americans Act of 1973, or from local sources through a Council fund-raising drive. We would like to especially thank the Selectmen, their Administrative Assistant, and the School Committee for their generous help so far toward this goal.

The Council's programs and activities have picked up to the point that we are now hiring a coordinator with money provided at the last town meeting. Additionally, the necessary record keeping for these activities will hopefully be done by either a C.E.T.A. clerk or by one funded at the 1977 town meeting. As there are now 1651 persons over 59 years old in Westport, there are a great many services needed which we will soon provide.

Last November, Miss Doris Simpkin, Coordinator/Chairman of the Dartmouth Council on Aging attended our meeting. Her presentation on available resources and possible programs was enthusiastically received. We learned that her Council has secured funding to build a new multi-center, costing over \$ 100,000.00.

On September 14, 1976 we held a joint meeting with the Westport Housing Authority. It is with their permission that we use the Community Hall three days a week for the nutrition program. Many useful suggestions were discussed at that meeting about how our two agencies can better serve the elderly, particularly those living in the elderly housing units.

In 1976, we established a working relationship with S.M.U. We learned about the Institute on Health and Long Life and the courses it offers. Also, through Dr. Ed Ryan of the Sociology Department, a scientific survey of Westports' elderly needs, relating to health, income, transportation and recreation, will be done by both a S.M.U. class and members of the Council. At a very low cost, we will determine where our efforts can best be spent.

As the Council turns hopefully to the new year, we wish to extend our sincere appreciation to all the organizations and volunteers who have unselfishly assisted us with the many programs of 1976.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES BOARD

Members of the Board:

I hereby submit the following report of the Westport Youth Activities Board for the past year.

Our summer programs included maintaining two playground areas in operation. Arts and crafts and general playground activities were offered. Daily attendance at the playgrounds varied. We also conducted our WYA Swimming Program (enrollment 520) at the Town Beach area. At the close of the summer our Tennis Clinic (enrollment 40) ended with a tournament which was held simultaneously with our Annual Family Field Day and Picnic. The Field Day featured the traditional Soap Box Derby along with Track and Field Events.

During the months of late summer and early fall, much time was devoted to organizational matters and thought was given as to how we could improve our programs thereby being better able to serve the Town's youth. During this period we were able to secure a much needed storage area for our equipment which up until this time has been stored in various homes and schools. Guidelines for various programs were established and channels of communication with various Town Departments were widened.

The late fall and early winter programs which were later set up were very effective and well attended. They included Instructional Basketball for 8-10 year olds (enrollment 38), Cheerleading Clinic for 8 year olds and up (enrollment 58), Babysitting Clinic for those above the age of 12 (enrollment 21), WYA Basketball League for 10-13 year olds (enrollment 80), Instructional Chess for those aged 8 and up (enrollment 36). Already scheduled for mid-winter are a Westport-wide Chess Tournament, School Vacation Afternoon Movie and a 12 hour long Gymnastics Clinic. We hope to be able to schedule these events again next year, to expand some of them and to schedule new events and programs that are of current interest.

Most of the programs conducted by our Youth Activities Board are made possible largely because of a great deal of work by volunteer coaches and program directors. These men and women have been enthusiastic and supportive and we owe much to them. Various Town Departments have also willingly provided much needed services and assistance. Their cooperation has been very productive.

It is our wish that we will be able to engage an ever increasing number of resident youth in a greater number of activities which will help to improve their quality of life by improving upon their various skills. We can accomplish this goal by continuing to provide our youth with our support as Westport residents have so generously done in the past.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit the following as the report of the Office of Civil Defense for the year 1976.

Mr. Arthur Marshall of 60 Meadow Road was appointed Director of Civil Defense replacing Russell T. Hart who resigned during the month of November.

The Town's emergency warning siren system is tested each Wednesday at 11:15 A.M. throughout the year to ensure operational readiness.

The State radio (R.A.C.E.S.) drill is conducted on the first Monday of each month to ensure continuing radio network operation and contact throughout Massachusetts and Sector 2A.

We also receive the Statewide Checkerboard tests every other month to ensure the readiness and effectiveness of State and local systems.

The department has purchased a new two meter FM transceiver, amplifier and power supply unit which is being used for emergency two-way radio communications between the Emergency Operations Center and Civil Defense Headquarters at Bridgewater, Massachusetts.

As we are all aware, during the past year our area was severely threatened by a hurricane for the first time in several years. Once alerted, the Westport Civil Defense Agency went into action. With the aid of the Police and Fire Departments as well as the Highway Department, we alerted and helped to evacuate townspeople from low-lying areas. Many of those evacuated stayed with friends and relatives throughout the town until the emergency had passed. With the cooperation of the Westport School Department, the High School was opened as a shelter to receive those displaced persons without accommodations elsewhere.

With the kind cooperation of Town Hall custodians we were also able to set up an emergency shelter in the basement of the Town Hall. Cots, blankets and plenty of hot coffee were provided from our emergency Civil Defense Hospital unit. During the course of that evening, we admitted approximately twenty-five persons into both shelters. Among those who sought shelter were a couple from Canada, two couples boating through the area on their way home to New Jersey, a young couple from the Mid-West who were vacationing in our area, and of course, some of our own fine residents.

The Emergency Operations Center was manned for sixteen straight hours by our fine team of volunteers. We also maintained two-way radio contact with the Westport Highway and Fire Departments and internal contact within the Town Hall with the Westport Police Department. Our R.A.C.E.S. radio system kept us in constant contact with Civil Defense Area 2 Headquarters in Bridgewater as well as with the Red Cross Emergency Radio Network and other Civil Defense Agencies throughout our area.

Our Citizens Radio Service volunteers were activated and put on stand-by in the event that additional radio communications were needed.

I would like to thank the Westport Board of Selectmen, the Westport Police Department, the Westport Fire Department, the Westport Highway Department the Westport School Department, the school and Town Hall custodians, the Citizens Radio Service, the Ham Radio Operators, the Red Cross, and all of the other volunteers who pooled their services and efforts.

It is a pleasure to report another successful year at Greenwood Terrace. With the cooperation of many local organizations and individuals, we are striving to improve services and programs not only for our residents, but for all the elderly citizens of this area.

A major safety improvement made recently was the installation of a street light at the very dark area of the project entrance. The assistance of the Board of Selectmen in this need is gratefully appreciated by all of our residents.

The tenants have been recipients of a stereo set donated by the Westport Lions Club. Local school children and scouts have donated their talents in providing interesting programs and hand-crafted mementos to the residents, especially during the holiday season. The Elderly Nutrition Lunch Program continues to be popular here and provides an important social function as well as nutritious meals for elderly Town residents.

In cooperation with the Town Nurse, authorization has been granted to establish regularly scheduled health clinics at our community building for area persons 59 years of age and older.

In August of 1976, Mr. A. Newell Robb completed many years of service as the State-appointed Authority member. Mr. Donald R. Bernier has been appointed to the current five year term as the State-appointed member.

The Chairman, Mr. Stanley L. Reed, was appointed to represent the Authority on the local "Growth and Development Policy Committee" which compiled and completed a detailed statement of Westport's growth problems and priorities.

We are currently studying various proposals for the possible construction of additional units of housing for the elderly. By doing so we hope to more effectively serve the Town.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

During 1976, Westport continued to participate, along with twenty-nine other southeastern Massachusetts cities and towns as a member of the Southeastern Regional planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is one of thirteen regional planning agencies in Massachusetts and was organized in 1956.

The District is governed by a commission consisting of an appointee of the Board of Selectmen and a member of the Planning Board for each member community, and six minority and low-income representatives.

Westport's commission members are George M. Hall representing the Board of Selectmen and Edward Cloutier representing the Planning Board.

SRPEDD staff, under the guidance of the commission and committees, prepares advisory regional plans on such subjects as land use, transportation, solid waste, water supply, wastewater treatment, etc., as required and funded by State and Federal Government. Each community can also receive municipal assistance at no cost beyond its per capita assessment. This can include such areas as zoning, planning, flood insurance, Community Development Grant applications, etc.

During 1976 SRPEDD provided the town with information on septage alternatives and federal funding assistance. SRPEDD also assisted the Local Growth Policy Committee.

As the responsibilities and problems of communities become increasingly complex, it is essential to have a mechanism like SRPEDD to provide assistance in meeting new regional demands and to help in locating new opportunities for cooperation among area communities.

The Board of Selectmen organized April 6, 1976 with Charles A. Costa, Chairman Phyllis G. Bernier, Clerk of the Board and John A. Taylor, Jr., as a regular member.

The Board will remember the year 1976 not only as the Historical Bicentennial Year, but also a year of innumerable challenges. Noteworthy among those resolved, or in the process of being resolved, are recorded below.

1. The necessary imposition of a seventy-two hour curfew on a sizable area of Westport.
2. The many hours invested on a possible non-conforming business complaint that is presently pending court action.
3. The very costly and time consuming labor grievances, six in all, that involved arbitration and Labor Board action; all were settled in the Town's favor.
4. The up-dating of Town By-Laws.
5. The appointment of a full time Administrative Assistant to the office of the Board of Selectmen, effective October 1, 1976.
6. Our involvement in the launching of a Phase 1 study for alleviating town septage and sewage problems.
7. Westport's participation in the CETA Program which provided substantial services to the Town at 'zero' manpower cost.
8. The appointments to many boards that aided substantially in more efficient function of various departments and services to our Town.

The Board concludes its report by commending our secretary, Mrs. Hilda M. Martel and the Administrative Assistant, Edward F. Shaffer for their excellent work on behalf of the Town and the Selectmens' office. We wish also to offer a sincere expression of appreciation to all the elected and appointed officials for their splendid effort and cooperation over the past year.

Surveys will be done during the month of February with Dr. Jusseume doing the surveys in the elementary grades, Dr. Driscoll will take care of Grade IX at the High School and Dr. Cairns will take care of Grade V at the Middle School.

SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM (PAROCHIAL)

During the year 1975-76, a Health Program was carried out at St. George's School. A Dental Health Program, vision and hearing tests, health records were caught up. During the month of December, the nurses moved into their new nursing office which was formerly the detectives office. The nurses are very pleased with their new office. Our thanks and appreciation has been extended to the Board of Selectmen for providing space which was sorely needed. My thanks and appreciation to the C.E.T.A. men who worked so diligently painting the room and tiling the floor, making our office a cheerful place and one to be proud of.

The Nursing Department wishes to extend their thanks and appreciation to all organizations and all volunteer assistants who assisted with the nursing programs during the year.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1976 — December 31, 1976

The Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee, the administration, the faculty and the staff can look back with pride, with satisfaction and with a sense of accomplishment on what has happened in vocational education during the past year. However, at the same time they must be concerned with the growing number of students who are denied admission to vocational education and this, I see, as a challenge we must face in the immediate future.

There is a continuing and constantly increasing emphasis on Vocational Education as is evident by the growing number of applications received by our Guidance Department. For admission to our high school programs for the current school year, we received 600 applications and were only able to accept 275 students.

As of October 1, 1976 we had an enrollment of 989 students in the high school program; 89 students were in the technical institute program; 65 students were in the practical nursing program; 10 students were in the nurse assistant program and 583 students were in the adult evening program for a grand total of 1,746 students in our day and evening programs.

In addition 575 adults completed an eight-hour Food Handlers course sponsored in conjunction with the Fall River Board of Health; 21 additional students completed a 12-week training program as nurse assistants. 42 adults completed a 51-hour training program as Homemaker-Home Health Aides who provide a most important service to the Greater Fall River area; 13 adults completed a 280-hour program for short order cooks; and 14 adults completed a 280-hour program for turret lathe operators.

The short order cook program was fully funded by CETA, and in addition, the students as part of their training provided hot lunches daily to 60 senior citizens who were transported to school by the Council on Aging.

The turret lathe operator program was initiated at the request of an area machine tool industry due to a shortage of turret lathe operators in the area. Thirteen of the fourteen students completing the program were placed in jobs at a rate of more than \$4.00 per hour. The program was funded with federal money and is another example of the school district meeting the needs of industry and finding jobs for the unemployed and under-employed.

The school administrators met in January 1976 with representatives of the needle trades industry relative to the need for initiating a sewing machine mechanics course at Diman. As a result of this meeting, a survey was made of the needle trades industry in Fall River and New Bedford to find out how many and what kind of jobs were available.

The survey showed a tremendous need for sewing machine operators—436 in Fall River and 202 in New Bedford—and a total of 28 Power sewing machine mechanics in both cities.

When the findings of the survey were reported to the industry, the manufacturers decided that first priority should be given to training operators, and if that program was successful, we could then work on training sewing machine mechanics. They agreed to loan equipment and to provide material, and the school would provide the instruction and wire the equipment. Brochures were developed for recruitment purposes and the first training program began November 15, 1976. Twenty-five students completed the first program and fourteen were hired immediately.

Currently there are forty students in training, and it is the intent of the regional school district to continue this training as long as the graduates are hired by the needle trades industry. In the meanwhile we will continue to investigate the feasibility of starting a sewing machine mechanic program.

Adults enrolled in the above programs add up to 665 students and bring to 2,411 the Total number of people receiving vocational education in day and evening programs during 1976 at Diman Regional.

To accomplish this the school is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. and Saturday mornings. This year during July and August two training programs were conducted. In addition degree credit courses are offered by Fitchburg State College to vocational instructors on Tuesday evenings and Saturday mornings to meet professional improvement requirements and to enable vocational educators to work towards a degree.

Our facilities continue to be used by the community. The Power Squadron and the Coast Guard Auxiliary conduct safe boating classes which are offered free to the public. At least 150 people take advantage of this program. The Fall River Symphony practices weekly in our auditorium and conduct three concerts annually. The Little Theater puts on three performances a year. The Cancer and Heart Societies hold annual seminars in the auditorium. Automotive suppliers hold workshops for area mechanics to introduce new equipment to upgrade the skills of the mechanics. The Licensed Practical Nurses' Association meets monthly in the cafeteria.

Our computer facilities are used by Somerset, Swansea, Model Cities and Bristol Community College. We are very happy to provide these services and would welcome greater participation by the city of Fall River in using our computer. We do have ample time on the computer to provide more services.

The House and Mill Carpentry students completed their fifth house since the program started in 1971. This house was built at 350 Sharps Lot Road in Swansea for Mr. & Mrs. David A. Lynch.

The house was a two-story colonial garrison with a two-stall attached garage and was the largest and most elaborate home built by the students. It was agreed that in the future the administration would limit the size of the house to be constructed to allow more time for planning by the instructor and the students at the end of a school year for the house to be built the next school year. Open House was held on July 11, 1976 when 1200 people visited the home.

Due to the nature of vocational education and its emphasis on practical work as the best method for training our students, we have been able to provide services to many agencies such as the Fall River Government Center, Police Department, YMCA, Citizens for Citizens, Community Development Recreation Department, Somerset Lions Club, Fall River Park Department with a Christmas display, Fall River School Department and the Boys' Club.

The Guidance Department continues to play an important role in providing services to the student body. They assist students in finding part-time jobs; help with full-time placement of graduates; conduct follow-up surveys of our graduates; alert the juniors to the requirements for participating in the cooperative job program as seniors; hold an assembly for seniors when representatives of the armed services talk to the seniors about opportunities in the armed services; acquaint seniors with available scholarships for higher education; administer the free and reduced price lunch program; conduct an orientation program for all new students; give entrance tests to all new students; worked with the superintendent-director in developing and submitting a Chapter IX and Chapter 622 plan which has been accepted; and held a Red Cross Blood program on February 12, 1976 at which time 60 pints of blood were collected from the staff and students. Needless to say, all of this is in addition to day-to-day counselling services.

Our Special Needs/Area Coordinator is working closely with the sending schools in developing meaningful programs for students with special needs; assists the superintendent-director in submitting applications for federal grants; meets periodically with the Needle Trades manufacturers; supervises the power sewing machine operators' program; and works closely with the teachers in explaining the problems and/or limitations of students with special needs.

A speech therapist was hired on a part-time basis this year and a remedial math instructor was hired full time in September. We now have two full-time remedial English teachers, one full-time remedial math teacher and a part-time speech therapist, all of whom are fully certified to instruct students with special needs.

During 1976 Diman Regional was successful in obtaining machine tools and electronic equipment amounting to \$75,314.40 from the New England Regional Commission. The only cost to the school was transportation charges, and the acquisition of this equipment enabled us to replace obsolete equipment and update existing equipment.

Under Public Law 90-576 Diman Regional received \$12,580 for a Power Sewing program; \$26,897 for a Custodial Services & Plant Maintenance Program; \$20,703 for expanding Metal Fabrication & Welding; \$21,039 for expanding the Foods program; and \$3,895 for a Turret Lathe Operator program. In addition from CETA we received \$9,640.64 for a Short Order Cook program.

In 1976 we had a total of 67 students in post high school programs participating in the Basic Education Opportunity Grant program. These students received a total of \$28,136 from the federal government under this program.

In the Massachusetts Region III Science Fair, Paul Letourneau of Basic Electronics won a first place prize and Bruce Cantin of the Electrical Department won a second prize. Cantin also won a third place prize at the Massachusetts State Science Fair.

In a statewide Plymouth Trouble Shooting Contest open to all schools in Massachusetts who offer automotive training and sponsored by Chrysler Plymouth, Anthony Raposa and Michael Menard won first prize and represented Massachusetts in the nationwide contest held in Chicago. In the national contest they finished 12th among 52 participants. Their instructors were Thomas J. Martindale and Benedict J. Harrison.

Our Annual Open House and Trade Exhibit was held on March 14, 1976 and was attended by 2,500 people. The Trade Exhibit was judged by members of the Advisory Board and prizes were awarded to the top three contestants in each shop area. The size and the quality of the projects made by the students continue to grow every year and draws many favorable comments from the visitors.

The Outstanding Vocational Student Award was presented to Ronald Bernier of the House and Mill Carpentry Department on May 13, 1976 at an Advisory Board meeting. The first runner-up was Anselmo Arruda of the Foods Department and second runner-up was William Pelletier of the Electrical Department.

Two floats were entered in the Bicentennial Parade held in Fall River on June 13, 1976. These floats were constructed by the students and staff at Diman and drew many favorable comments along the parade route. We are very grateful to the staff and students who developed these floats and also to those individuals who loaned us the trailers and materials used on the floats.

On September 22, 1976 we held a Parents' Night for parents of all new students. This event was very well attended. The parents were acquainted with the policies, the philosophy and the procedures at Diman, what the school could do for its students and what the school expected from its students.

Perhaps the most significant date in 1976 from the standpoint of the school committee was November 7, 1976 when mortgage burning exercises were held in the school auditorium. In constructing a new school a school committee is faced with many difficult decisions. One such decision in building Diman Regional was the length of the bond issue. Should it be ten years or twenty years? When the Committee took into consideration the \$500,000 they could save in interest plus the fact that they had received \$3,053,000 as a construction grant from the federal government, they elected to float a ten-year bond issue. This is the first time any community in this area has had such a short-term bond issue and the Committee is to be commended for their foresight.

On November 22, 1976 the Regional School District received \$285,376.37 from the School Buildings Assistance Bureau as its final payment on the ten-year bond issue.

The Advisory Board continues to make a significant contribution to the school. From participating in the Trade Exhibit as judges, in the selection of the Outstanding Vocational Student, in keeping the staff abreast of changes taking place in industry, in recommending new equipment, in helping with placement, they make themselves readily available. The Regional School Committee and the Administration deeply appreciate the time they give and the recommendations they make which contribute to the success we enjoy in vocational education.

For the future it is important that we continue to work closely with industry; that we look ahead to new programs; and that we consider alternative methods of providing more vocational education. To do this will require the combined efforts and best thinking of many individuals. We cannot continue to ignore the great many students we are unable to accept in vocational education.

In submitting this report I would be remiss if I did not recognize the support and cooperation I have received from the administrative staff, department heads, faculty, the cafeteria, clerical and custodial staffs, and the student body. Their continued dedication to the goals of vocational education have made this report possible.

Finally, to the Regional School Committee whose sole interest is to insure that Diman Regional provides the highest type of vocational education to the Greater Fall River area goes my deep appreciation and sincere thanks for their understanding their time and effort and their support. It would be extremely difficult to find a more dedicated group of individuals. The Greater Fall River area is indeed fortunate.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

I hereby submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Westport Public Schools.

For the purpose of economy, reports from the various school principals are not included herein, but will be on file in the school department office as public information. In addition, personnel changes will be included in the teachers listing and will not be duplicated here.

SERVICES FOR SPECIAL NEEDS STUDENTS

Services for special needs students continue to undergo evaluation and refinement.

With the cooperation of classroom teachers and principals, a closer relationship between special needs personnel and teachers has been effected. This has enabled special needs staff to focus on students problems to a greater extent.

This past year a school adjustment counselor was added to the staff and this enabled school personnel to gain more insight into student problems which develop in the home.

The special needs program is governed by state statutes which have undergone moderate revision in the past year and we have adjusted to the procedural changes called for in the program guidelines.

FEDERAL FUNDING PROGRAMS

During the past year, with the receipt of additional funds under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, we have expanded remedial reading services to the Greenwood Park, Head and Saint George Schools.

Three teachers were added to the Title I Staff and principals report that they are pleased with the expansion of services.

In addition, to service in the area of remedial reading, kindergarten students have received assistance in the area of readiness to prepare them for the first grade.

It should be noted that since September, 1974, and the commencement of my tenure as superintendent, Title I services to children in Westport tripped in that over three times as many students are now involved in varied Title I programs.

THE BUSINESS AREA

The School Department returned to the Town of Westport, the sum of \$204,640.60, of this amount \$119,987.89 was received in support of Special Needs Programs from the State of Massachusetts. We would like to thank the Administration and staff of the schools and central office for their efforts in controlling the budget.

In school transportation, we are striving to design routes that are safe for all pupils and will conserve our much needed fuel supplies.

A meals survey has recently been completed involving most of our student population, the purpose of this survey is to have more student input into cafeteria menu preparation.

The business section is involved with the Westport High School Building Committee in making the final modifications to the Building. We are also involved with the Westport Elementary Building Committee in the purchasing of furniture and equipment for the new school.

PLANNING FOR THE NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

With the present pace of construction of the new elementary school, we will hopefully open its doors for instruction in September, 1977.

Presently, much planning is underway in preparation for this opening. Principals and their staffs have assisted in completing a demographic survey as the first step in redrawing school boundary lines.

In addition, class size and numbers permitting, we intend to include as many fifth grade students in the school as possible. This would assist in alleviating the large enrollment at the Middle School.

Mr. Chester B. Adams Jr., school business manager, and Mrs. Susan Sobel, part-time instructional media coordinator have completed the writing of specifications for equipment and furniture for the new school. It is expected that these will go out to bid in the near future.

Once classes and grade levels for the new school have been determined on the basis of geographical residence of students, we will be working on the teaching staff for the school. It is expected that this phase of preparation will be completed by spring of 1977.

COORDINATION OF SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Once again, the need to coordinate curriculum offerings between all grade levels in the system is emphasized.

While school administrators should be commended for their efforts in this area, they cannot be expected to devote large amounts of time to curriculum development since they must continue with the everyday operation and administration of the schools. This latter task has become more difficult in recent years with the many state statutes and legal restrictions governing the operation of public schools.

We have been fortunate in that, faculty, parent and student involvement in committees to study various aspects of the high school curriculum has resulted in several recommendations. These are presently under study by the High School administration and faculty at large.

Indeed the services of a curriculum specialist would be invaluable in implementing some of these recommendations.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

This past year, the legislature of the Commonwealth has enacted a law designed to promote school bus safety. Under this statute, school systems must conduct school bus evacuation drills for all students transported to school.

Besides conducting safety programs in our classrooms, Safety Officer Ralph Matori, of the Westport Police has conducted drills in compliance with this law. In this regard, I would like to commend him for his work in the interest of the safety of students in Westport Schools.

CONCLUSION

The operation of a school district involves the efforts of many people. Not only school department personnel, but also parents, students and other Town Departments have assisted in contributing in some capacity to the education of Westport's youth.

I would like to thank everyone who assisted, especially the members of the School Committee who devoted many hours of their time in the interest of educating Westport's school population.
