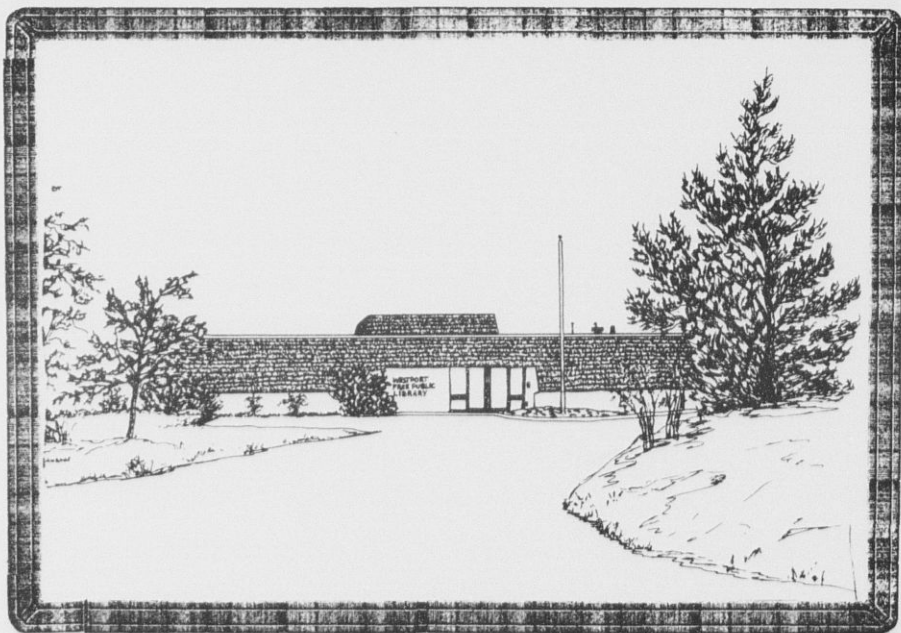

TOWN OF WESTPORT

Westport was settled in 1670 as a locality within the town of Dartmouth. In 1787 this locality was incorporated as a separate town. The name Westport was not an arbitrary choice. The boundary lines of older maps do not correspond exactly with their modern counterparts, so that Massachusetts, New England's largest state at the time, included present day Maine. Many people who lived in Dartmouth township traded furs with the Indians and went fishing all along the Maine coast. Some of the Sailing ships would leave port at Westport Harbor and sail the entire length of the then Massachusetts coastline. When sailors spoke of their voyage, they would tell of sailing from the west port to the east port of Massachusetts. So when it came time to name this part of Dartmouth, the General Court of Boston allowed the town fathers to name it after the harbor and to be called Westport.

The town had cobbler shops, blacksmith shops, forge mills, a grist mill, as well as a cotton mill located where Westport Factory now stands; industries located at the Head and at the Point included shipyards, sail lofts, and tailor shops. The shipyards built whaling vessels that sailed all over the world. This industry grew so rapidly that a fleet of twenty to thirty ships called Westport their home port.

The land surface of Westport is hilly, but the elevations are fairly gradual. The southern sector of the town has two large bay areas formed by the East Branch Westport River and the West Branch River. Westport is almost completely surfaced with good texture, well-watered loams with marshlands bordering most of the town's many streams. The coast is bordered by a strip of sandy soil to a depth varying from $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. The town has a tidal shore line of 47.4 miles.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN ANNUAL REPORT

Nineteen eighty-one marked a year of transition and change for the Town of Westport, both in terms of policy and personnel. It was a year during which local leaders faced the challenges of maintaining governmental stability and at the same time adjusting to new situations and guidelines.

While the March Annual Town election resulted in the re-election of Selectmen Richard P. Desjardins, it also heralded the selection of a new Board member, George T. Leach, Jr. to fill the unexpired term of Damase A. Giguere. With Board reorganization Mr. Leach was chosen Chairman and Selectmen Charles A. Costa became Clerk. A turnover in key staff personnel also occurred during the year. After twenty-one years of service, Shellfish Warden Albert Palmer retired and following twenty-three years as Town Hall custodian, Myron Feenan retired. Further personnel changes ensued from the resignations of Administrative Assistant Roxane Delano and Town Accountant Cynthia Brown.

In the area of policy, the implementation of Proposition 2½, the state-wide property tax limiting legislation, necessitated a new approach to local budgeting and fiscal decision-making. Confronted with the need to sustain essential services and simultaneously heed taxpayers' demands for limited property taxes, local officials and voters had to make some difficult financial choices. In the process, expense budgets were cut, services reduced including the elimination of a number of street lights, and personnel expenditures restricted. To compensate for losses in traditional sources of revenue, new ones were sought. User fees were increased in some areas and initiated in others. The private sector was also tapped as in the case of the Head of Westport Fire Station, the closing of which was averted through contributions from a private trust.

The Town's restricted financial situation was somewhat eased when, after months of debate, the Massachusetts Legislature finally granted additional local aid to cities and towns. However, the fiscal restraints imposed by Proposition 2½ remain and indications are that the impact of limited local revenue will be felt even more in the fiscal year ahead.

Recognizing the importance, especially now, of efficient financial management, the voters at the September Special Town Meeting approved the purchase of a computer system. The installation and operation of the NCR 9020 system is scheduled to commence in early 1982 with payroll, property tax and motor vehicle excise tax applications all becoming operational in the first year. The complete accounting system will be computerized to coincide with the beginning of Fiscal Year 1984 (July 1, 1983).

Throughout the year the Board of Selectmen's efforts focused in the enforcement of local by-laws and regulations under its jurisdiction. Noticeable among these were strides to review, update, improve and require adherence to the automobile dealership licenses and the repair garage and body shop permits. Additionally, the Board sought to enforce the Town's Trailer By-Laws which were reiterated at the Annual Town Meeting. However, the matter is now in litigation and further efforts must await court action.

While 1981 was a year of transition in some ways, it was a year of continuation in others. The establishment of a boatlaunching ramp on Gooseberry Island moved forward and then was temporarily halted when the Conservation Commission's Orders of Condition were appealed to the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering. Hopefully differences of opinion, especially those regarding the ramp design, can be resolved and the long awaited ramp will become a reality. Attempts to update the Master Plan were revived with renewed committee meetings and the initiation of a contract with the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District to provide a comprehensive land use management plan. The problems of traffic congestion associated with the influx of summer visitors

continued to plague local officials. Efforts to secure state assistance in alleviating the situation produced mixed results, but it is hoped that a stricter, locally controlled parking fine system (to become effective in 1982) will have a positive effect on at least one aspect of the traffic problem.

With the aid of the Highway Surveyor, the Board reinitiated the process of acquiring surplus equipment for the Town. A new forklift, road grader, and Ford truck were purchased at considerable savings to the Town. The rapport established with the State Agency for Surplus Property during this period should continue to be of benefit to the community in the coming years.

The proposal for a coal gasification facility in Fall River and discussions concerning a possible hazardous waste plant site in Darmouth made it evident during 1981 that Westport's future can be greatly impacted by developments in neighboring communities. The ramifications of the E G & G coal gasification plan are particularly immense and thus, the environmental aspects of this billion-dollar project are being closely monitored by local officials including the Board of Selectmen.

It is apparent that the complexity of both continuous and emerging issues requires the energies and cooperation of all who are involved in local government. We especially wish to express our appreciation to our appointees and to our staff for their dedicated efforts during 1981. Their contributions have been essential to the effectiveness of Westport's Town Government.

As we prepare for 1982 we recognize that the Town's ability to meet the demands and pressures being placed on local government will greatly depend upon the implementation of innovative ideas as well as the continued commitment of elected and appointed officials and you, the Townspeople. It is our joint civic responsibility to ensure that the quality of life existing here in Westport is not adversely affected by current or future events.

Such a side yard shall extend for its required width from the street line or its equivalent to the rear or its equivalent to another street.

16. A "rear yard" is a required open unoccupied space, the full width of the lot lying between the extreme rear wall of the building and the rear line of the lot or the line of public street or private way in case the lot borders on such street or way.

SECTION VI YARD OR SET-BACK REQUIREMENTS

FRONT YARDS: Every building or structure shall be built or placed on a lot so that there shall be a front yard of at least 20 feet clear depth from the street line or lines to the part of such building or structure closest to the street line; provided that no building or structure need be set back more than the average of the set backs of the buildings next thereto within 250 feet on both sides of the lot in question.

SIDE YARDS: At each side of every building or structure there shall be a side yard not less than ten feet in clear width between the side of the building or structure and the side lot lines.

REAR YARDS: Behind every building or structure there shall be provided a back yard between the rear line of the building or structure and the rear lot line not less than six feet in depth.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Law to provide for off-street parking by adopting the following and/or take any other action relative thereto:

SECTION VI OFF-STREET PARKING

Parking facilities off the street right-of-way shall be provided on the same lot as the building for each use within the district. Off-street parking shall be designed to prevent the necessity of any vehicles backing into a public way. No parking area shall be less than 5 feet from a road or property line. Each parking space shall have a usable area of at least 180 square feet and be served by a two-way access lane at least 28 feet wide, except that if parking stalls are angled at 60 degrees or less, a one-way access lane may be used with a minimum of 22 feet. The number of spaces required for each use shall be determined by the Building Inspector based upon the following criteria:

Wholesale showrooms and operations	1 space for each 1,000 square feet

Hotel and Motels	1 space per room and 1 space for every 3 seats in restaurants and/or meeting rooms
Restaurants, clubs, theatres, churches, or the place of public assembly	1 space for every 3 seats or 50 square feet of gross floor area
Barber Shops and Beauty Parlors	3 spaces for each operator
Bowling Alleys and Tennis Courts	4 spaces for each alley or court
For any use not specifically listed	1.5 spaces for each 1,000 square feet of floor space

SECTION VI OFF-STREET PARKING

Other uses conducted for profit on premises within or without a building such as flea markets, auction houses, and fairs shall provide for adequate off-street parking. The Board of Appeals may grant a special permit to any person or organization to allow for sporadic or intermittent use of a premises without complying with the requirements of this section. Nothing herein will be construed to affect or limit churches or other charitable organizations from conducting fund raising events without complying with the requirements of this section.

Industrial and commercial buildings shall provide adequate parking, maneuvering and loading space on premises for freight and delivery trucks.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to amend the GARAGE AND SERVICE STATION LICENSE REGULATIONS to increase the penalty provision by deleting the present penalty section and inserting in place thereof the following:

PENALTY: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of these by-laws or the conditions imposed at the time of issuance of the license shall be subject to a penalty of not less than \$20.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each offense, and subject to mandate action to compel compliance. Each day that a violation continues shall be considered a separate offense. And/or take any other action relative thereto.

HARBORMASTER BY-LAWS OF THE WESTPORT RIVER TOWN OF WESTPORT

I. GENERAL REGULATIONS

A. Speed

1. Speed Limit — 6 M.P.H. and/or no wake within 150 feet of all docks and anchorages as shown on map in Town Clerk's office.

B. Water Skiing

1. No waterskiing will be permitted in posted area or anchorages as shown on chart on file in Town Clerk's Office.

C. Water Pollution

1. No oil shall be dumped or pumped overboard on to any waters of the Town of Westport.
2. No untreated sewage, rubbish, debris, garbage or dead fish or any other pollutants shall be discharged into Westport waters.
3. No derelict boats, motors, etc., shall be allowed in the Westport waters or on the shores.

D. Berthing

1. All draggers while moored at docks shall have their rigging and equipment swung inside rails at all times.

E. Conducts

1. Noise
 - a. Unmuffled noise from engines, outboards, amplifying systems, radios and the like shall be kept at a minimum so as not to create a nuisance when in the proximity of docks, floats or yacht anchorages.

II. MOORING REGULATIONS

A. Applications

1. Existing moorings prior to adoption of this by-law must be registered with Harbormaster.
2. Applications for future moorings must be submitted in writing and approved by Harbormaster.
3. Mooring space is not transferable to a new owner when a boat is sold until registered with Harbormaster.

C. All Areas

a. The use of spars for chain flotation shall be prohibited. Only cans, balls or styrene-type chain flotation shall be used. In all types of chain flotation buoys, other than metal, chain or a metal rod must be passed through the buoy connecting the mooring pennant to the mooring chain.

b. All chain flotation buoys shall be plainly and clearly visible above any tide level at all times.

c. The above described moorings shall be painted white with a Blue Band, owner's or boat name, and length of boat on can or buoy; also owner's name on mooring block or mushroom anchor.

d. All new complete moorings placed or replaced in any location shall conform to these regulations; and will be placed at a locus designated by the Harbormaster.

e. Where winter spars or buoys are used, they shall be clearly visible or marked at all times except during ice conditions.

f. Winter spars or buoys shall not be installed prior to September 15, and must be removed by June 1st.

g. All pennants shall be nylon or equivalent with adequate mooring devices, approved by the Harbormaster, to eliminate the hazard of chafing. These will be checked annually by the Harbormaster. Certificates of inspection for defective moorings will be made by the Harbormaster and a copy held in his files showing conditions at the time of inspection.

h. Owners with defective moorings shall be allowed seven (7) days after receiving notice from the Harbormaster to correct the defective conditions. If the defect is not corrected after this time, the owner will be subject to penalty in conformance with the Code. The Harbormaster, upon finding a defective mooring, shall properly mark said mooring to show danger or obstruction.

- i. The Harbormaster shall keep a detailed description of all moorings, their locus and owner's name, telephone number, home and business address, date of mooring and length and rig of the boat.

III. CODE

A. Penalties

1. A fine not to exceed \$50.00 may be imposed for first offense infractions or disobedience to this Code of Regulations when State or Federal penalties do not apply. All other fines that are applicable are defined in Chapter 40, Section 21 Massachusetts General Laws.
2. Offenders will be prosecuted by the Harbormaster and all other enforcement agents.

Harbormaster

DEFINITIONS

- B. A Fee of \$1.00 for each day of each yard sale shall be charged.

ISSUANCE AND DISPLAY OF PERMIT

- A) A Yard Sale Permit may be issued to anyone person for only three days in any one month or four days in any one year in conformity with the Zoning Regulations.
- B) A yard sale permit shall be issued not more than three days in any month or four days in any year for any one (1) premises located in a residential zone.
- C) Charitable, and religious and civic organizations are exempt from the provisions of this by-law.
- D) Each permit issued under this by-law must be available on the premises throughout this entire period of the sale and must be shown to any police officer or zoning enforcement officer if requested.

CONTENTS OF APPLICATION

The information to be filed with the Building Inspector upon application for a yard sale permit shall be as follows:

- A) Name and address of person to conduct said sale.

CONTENTS OF APPLICATION

The information to be filed with the Building Inspector upon application for a yard sale permit shall be as follows:

- A) Name and address of person to conduct said sale.
- B) Name of the owner of the property on which sale is to be conducted and the written consent of the owner if applicant is other than the owner.
- C) Location at which the sale is to be conducted.
- D) Hours during which the sale will be held.
- E) Date and nature of any past sale held within one year.
- F) Whether or not the applicant has been issued another vendors permit by any local or state agency.

VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

Any person who shall violate any provision of this by-law shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$20.00 nor more than \$100.00 for each violation. Each day shall constitute a separate offense. And/or take any action relative thereto.

All mobile homes to be placed within the Flood Zone but not into a mobile home park or mobile subdivision shall have stands or lots that are elevated on compacted fill or on pilings so that the lowest floor of the mobile home will be at or above the base flood level, (ii) adequate surface drainage and access for a hauler are provided, and (iii) in the instance of elevation on pilings, lots are large enough to permit steps, piling foundations are placed in stable soil no more than 10 feet apart, and reinforcement is provided for piers more than six feet above ground level. And/or take any other action relative thereto.

Thomas Porter, Norman Sasseville and Anne Barnes were reappointed to the Commission. Thomas McGarr and Donald Bernier continue as Commission members.

The Commission and Board accepted with regret the resignation of Conservation Agent David Roach. The best of luck goes out to Dave as Westport's new Shellfish Warden. Jon Kerr filled the position as agent and Barbara Hickey continues her exceptional job as part-time clerk.

In administering and enforcing the Wetlands Protection Act, the Commission processed 35 new Orders of Conditions, 2 emergency Order of Conditions, 21 extensions on existing Order of Conditions, 9 Certificates of Compliance and 2 Wetlands Determinations along with the agent's routine and complaint investigations.

In accordance with Town Soil Conservation by-laws, the Board processed 0 new Soil Permits, issued 9 renewals for existing permits and released 2 from their bonds.

Phase II of the CETA-funded Wetlands Evaluation Program has been completed. Copies of Phase I (Wetlands Mapping Program) and Phase II (Watershed and Basin Analysis) are available at the Town Library. The second phase supervised by James Walsh and Edmie Bibeau, utilizes the initial Wetlands Mapping Phase I as a tool in evaluating the various water sheds and wetlands for their role in flood control, pollution abatement, wildlife habitat and water supply protection. The results of these projects provide the Commission and the public with a good definition of Westport's wetland areas and incorporates data showing trends in water quality in almost all streams and waterways in town.

The second Coastal Zone Management grant that would fund a project for study of siltation in the Westport River estuary is making progress with hope of full approval in 1982.

The members of the Commission wish to thank all those town Boards and Commissions, Departments and citizens who have helped and supported our efforts throughout the year.

Information and Referral:

Phone calls handled by office (April-December, 1981) and people coming to office (April-December 1981) were primarily for information about the following: I.D. cards, podiatry clinic, fuel assistance, weatherization, newsletter, employment exchange, medical insurance, legal aid, Friendly Visitor, Meals-on-Wheels, Vial of Life program, Widow(er)'s Support Group, Needs Assessment Survey, Social Security, S.S.I., Food Stamps, etc. Transportation to medical appointments was provided by: volunteers when possible, beginning in July by the Friends of Senior Citizens of Westport mini-van. The Council office

acted as scheduler/dispatcher for the mini-van until November 30th when these duties were assumed by a scheduler/dispatcher hired by the Friends of Senior Citizens of Westport.

Numerous emergency situations of diverse nature were handled by the office or referred to other appropriate agencies.

Nutrition Programs:

During the year approximately 8,980 meals were provided for the senior citizens of Westport at the two meal sites: Greenwood Terrace, daily, Monday through Friday; Howland Hall, Westport Point on Mondays and Fridays.

Approximately 665 meals were delivered to the home-bound in January (1st-12th) and (July-December) when the program was continued with the aid of the mini-van.

Annual Picnic and Christmas Party:

The Annual Picnic and Christmas Party were eliminated this year because of budgetary restrictions. The Council regretted that it was necessary to inform many elders who did not belong to the Senior Clubs of this decision but other services sponsored by the C.O.A. took precedence.

Arts and Crafts Program:

The Arts and Crafts Program ran from January through March under the direction of the Westport Artists in Residence. They taught approximately 15 older residents and crafts including water color and batik.

Westport Widow(er)'s Support Group:

Mrs. Beatrice Potter, Parliamentarian of the Council on Aging continues to act as the leader of this important program. The meetings take place once a month in the Westport Library where the group (32 members) hear guest speakers on various relevant topics and are offered refreshments. The Westport program is one of the first of its kind in the state and is being emulated by other C.O.A.'s.

The Department of Elder Affairs has extended its grant of \$358.96 through June '82'.

Friendly Visitor:

Mrs. Violette Morse is our Friendly Visitor, Senior Aide, who visits the elderly home-bound, lonely and ill residents of Westport bringing them books, magazines, friendship and good cheer. There are many older people in difficult physical and financial conditions who will not ask for help and will not confide in strangers. Vi acts as the office outreach worker and brings many serious cases to our attention that would otherwise be neglected. The town voted an additional \$300 for transportation as a mark of its desire to retain Vi's services in Westport.

A second Friendly Visitor has been approved and funded by D.E.A. and B.C.H.C.E. The Council hopes to have this 2nd outreach worker in place by early January. At present Vi has a case load of 74 clients and there are many other frail elderly in the community of 1404 residents over 60 who need attention and friendship.

Newsletter "Evergreen"

The first issue of the newsletter, **Evergreen**, published by Senior Citizens Publishing Inc., appeared in August 1981. The new title was suggested by Beverly Cordery, clerk, and the masthead was designed by Christopher Gillespie. The paper comes out once a month. 800 copies are distributed, free of charge, to the meal sites, senior clubs and to the advertisers whose support defrays the cost, and to post offices and other public places of easy access to elders. Jean Lozinski writes and edits the paper. Beverly Cordery types it for printing.

Needs Assessment Survey:

The Needs Assessment Grant, funded by Title III of the Older Americans Act (\$7,500 federal), was completed in April 1981. It is a survey of the needs, interests and problems of

Westport citizens 59 and older (about 2,000). The documentation is of great value to the Council in planning its future course as the concerns of the elderly are clearly delineated by this report: part-time employment, real-estate taxes, transportation, weatherization/heating costs, referral services (legal, health insurance) clinics, political issues.

Podiatry Clinic:

A grant of \$2,027 was awarded the C.O.A. under Title III of the Older Americans Assistance Act, for a podiatry clinic to be offered at three sites in Westport: Greenwood Terrace, Howland Hall and the Town Hall. The clinics were held once a month from Sept. 1981 and will continue through August 1982. Two podiatrists, Dr. Kenneth Brum and Dr. Marshall Taitz have offered minor foot care to Westport residents age 60 and over. All clinics to date have been filled to capacity. Several serious problems were discovered and referred to other physicians. Clients served were extremely pleased to be able to have their feet cared for without cost. A large number are at poverty level, although the service is open to all older Westport residents.

In Summary:

The year began with only five members on the Board of the Council and without a coordinator. By year end the Board positions were filled and a coordinator and clerk had been appointed. The office is functioning efficiently along lines that are approved by the Board, offering a wide range of services to the town's older population, which now numbers between 1,500 and 2,000.

We have helped a great many people during this year with many types of problems: financial, legal, taxes, insurance, social security, S.S.I., food stamps, weatherization, fuel assistance, meals-on-wheels, podiatry clinic, Widow(er)'s Support group, social services, psychiatric help and numerous referrals to other agencies when problems were beyond our mandate.

This year brought the publication of the second volume of the Newsletter which had been discontinued. The meals at the two meal sites were continued. This not only provides nutrition but enables people living alone to meet with others. A line dancing group was formed with the assistance of the Recreation Department. We hope to continue the exercise/dance group next year and add several arts and crafts courses.

A major event was the coming of the mini-van, thanks to the efforts of the volunteers of the Friends of Westport's Senior Citizens. The van has enabled many elders to get to the doctors, clinics and shopping. The Council urges Westport citizens to inform older people of this valuable bus service now available at no charge. Donations are appreciated. The van has also delivered the very much needed meals-on-wheels to the homebound. Our Friendly Visitor brought library books and sometimes groceries and medicine to our 64 elderly homebound residents monthly who were, on the whole, without other companions or friends. These services are invaluable to the morale of many frail elders. We hope to continue these programs next year despite the severe budget shortages and curtailment of federal funds.

Two part-time Library Aide positions remained unfilled at the end of 1981. In addition to cutbacks in personnel, Proposition 2½ resulted in a reduction of weekly hours from 48 to 42 and a decrease in the annual book and periodical budget from \$13,000 to \$11,000. Because of increases in postages, the mailing of overdue notices on a regular basis was discontinued. Patrons have been asked to co-operate by returning materials on time. Changes were also made in the circulation policy. Families are now limited to two books on a subject.

Children's programing has also been cut back because of Proposition 2½. Starting in the fall of 1981 the pre-school programs were reduced to two half hour sessions per week for eight weeks. Arts and crafts programs were no longer offered to the older children, and because of difficulty in obtaining films from the Boston Public Library, the Children's Film Festival monthly movies were cancelled.

The Library was grateful to receive \$2,000 trust fund established during 1981 in memory of Arline A. Gifford. The income from this fund will be used to purchase large print books, periodicals, newspapers, and other materials and services that benefit the visually handicapped. This brings the number of library trust funds to five. For the past ten years, interest from the Ronald A. and Randall A. Tripp Fund has been expended on materials in the fields of agriculture and industrial and automotive arts. Earnings from the Alice Dennett Tripp Memorial Fund are used for materials and services of interest to senior citizens and children. Adult non-fiction books are purchased with the income from the Williams B. Hicks Memorial Fund and the Imogene Weeks Fund.

A week-long celebration marked the Library's tenth anniversary in its present location. The festivities started on August 1 with the launching of 100 balloons by Westport children. After aeronaut David Gifford displayed his balloon for all, children participated in field day activities. Events during the week included movies, a concert, a pet show, and a chalk-in. The week ended on Saturday with a craft exhibit and a plant swap. Winners of the birthday card contest were announced on that day.

The free film program had another successful year, especially with record-breaking attendance at the eight week summer program. During the spring we had a fine display in the project room by the Cranberry Country Weavers who also participated in our tenth anniversary celebration. The Library ran two needlepoint classes which were enjoyed by all who participated.

In September the year-long Westport Community/Library Analysis came to an end. This study was federally funded through the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners under Title I of the Library Services and Construction Act. The results have been published in a report titled **Westport Community/Library Analysis** which is available for circulation at the Library. The Board of Trustees would like to thank the many individuals and organizations who cooperated in this effort.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

During 1981 the Town of Westport continued its membership for the twelfth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in Southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Westport's Commission representatives for the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board, respectively are, Charles A. Costa and George M. Hall, who also serves on the Executive Committee and the Community/Public Relations Committee for the SRPEDD Commission.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Westport this past year included:

- Assisting the Master Plan Update Committee prepare a new plan for the town;
- Preparing a Water Supply Protection Program including the definition of aquifer recharge areas and development of a by-law for groundwater protection; and
- Participating in establishing the Energy Park Advisory Committee to evaluate the proposed New England Energy Park — the EG&G coal gasification facility — and working with a consultant to prepare a funding proposal.

As a coastal community, Westport was the benefactor of several programs conducted by SRPEDD last year:

- An oil spill program which identified vulnerable areas and organized response teams and will be continuing in 1982; and
- A **Marine Waste Pump-Out Feasibility Study** which proposed solutions for the pump-out and treatment of boat wastes.

Regional plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities include:

- The **Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP)** which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The **Transportation Improvements Program (TIP)** which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.
- A Housing Conversion and Rehabilitation Program funded with bonus money provided to SRPEDD by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The program will provide grants to establish approximately 25 new housing units in existing structures throughout the region.
- The **Transportation Energy Contingency Plan** which recommends a number of local and regional actions in case of a gasoline emergency.
- Several conferences: SRPEDD co-sponsored a Water Symposium in Bridgewater, Hazardous Waste Workshops in Fall River and New Bedford, and an Economic Development Conference in Brockton; and conducted Energy Conservation and Waste Heat Utilization Workshops.
- SRPEDD also conducts "A-95" and environmental assessment reviews of state and federally funded projects; reviews of industrial revenue bonds; and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

The Westport Historical Commission hereby submits its annual report for the year 1981.

The Commission heard a number of cases involving the alteration or renovation of property in the Westport Point Historical District.

Members of the Historical Commission have been working for the last two years to renovate the Westport Town Farm into an income producing piece of town property. The two apartments will be bringing in approximately \$7200.00 this year. The \$30,000 from the town went into extensive renovations including all new wiring, two new heating systems and upgrading and repair of plumbing. This money will be paid back to the town through rents in four to five years. Members of the Commission raised \$6105 to supplement the money from the town. We also received over \$10,000 worth of donated goods and services. The value of the property has been greatly increased.

REPORT OF THE BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1982 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-three years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

During this time our men have been continuously schooled in the latest methods of control, the proper application of pesticides, and use of equipment in order to insure the safety of both the people and the environment while conducting our never ending fight to control mosquitos throughout the county. Each man who operates our ultra low volume fogging machines or any other equipment used in the application of pesticides is state certified.

Through years of experience it is evident that water management is the most effective and longlasting method of control, as mosquitos pass from eggs to adults in water. The Bristol County Mosquito Control Project has four crawler tractors with backhoes that are available for water management work whether it is for the elimination of a wet area or constructing a system of ditches that will regulate water depth and/or flow in a swamp area. It is often not necessary to drain an area completely but rather construct a series of ditches by which we are able to regulate the flow of water. Should a city or town official or people therein feel they have an area where such work might be advantageous, please contact this office and we shall survey the area. Upon completion of our survey, if worthwhile work can be done, it shall be scheduled.

During the spring larviciding season 37 acres of small swamp and woodland pool areas were treated with fuel oil. The mosquito larvae are killed by suffocation when they stick

their air tubes through the thin film of oil that has been applied to the surface of the water. Only areas that contain larvae are treated and this is why the amount of acreage is low. Many areas that might normally contain larvae were dry due to the dry fall, winter, and spring of this year.

The spring brood of mosquitos emerged around the end of April and our spray program got underway the first part of May. We received approximately 688 calls from the townspeople requesting that their area be sprayed. During the summer season all recreational areas and camps were sprayed weekly as well as all other areas of the town where mosquitos were a problem. We also treated 210 breeding catch basins during this time.

During the summer months we also monitored the mosquito population and types collected by our mosquito light traps. This helps to keep the Project informed of any buildup in eastern equine encephalitis virus, should it exist. The 1981 season saw little, if any, virus present and no cases were reported.

In early September the need for adult mosquito spraying no longer existed. With the end of the spraying season our work turned to water management projects. At this time our crews cut brush and clean debris from existing ditches and streams in order to insure a better flow of water from normally wet areas. A total of 1,614 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 6,272 feet of existing drainage ditch cleaned of debris.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, please feel free to call.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1981 — December 31, 1981

Our annual report reflects another successful year for the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee in their continuing efforts to provide quality vocational education for youth and adults in the regional school district.

As of October 1, 1981, a total of 997 students, 884 boys and 113 girls, were enrolled in 13 high school shop programs; 53 students were enrolled in three Technical Institute programs; 66 students were enrolled in the Practical Nursing Program; 10 students were enrolled in the Nurse Assistant Program; and 194 students were enrolled in 8 Evening School Programs for a total of 1,320 students in the day and evening programs.

In addition, 338 adults completed an eight-hour food handlers course sponsored in conjunction with the Fall River Board of Health which is compulsory for all people working in food dispensing establishments; 32 students completed a 12 week training program in the nurse assistant program; and 33 adults completed a 60 hour training program for homemaker-home health aides.

In 1981, 213 graduates were awarded diplomas from the high school programs. Of this number 149 were placed in jobs directly related to the trade they studied at Diman; 9 went into the armed services; and 24 went on to higher education. A follow-up study indicated that only four of the graduates were unemployed. This is a commendable record realizing that the unemployment rate of youth between the ages of 16 and 25 is at an all-time high.

The placement record of our graduates is a tribute to the quality of training our students receive, and we commend the faculty and administration for their efforts and ask for their continued support.

The cooperative work program was very successful with 146 seniors working in industry during their two-week shop cycle. This program serves as a check to see if the shop programs are realistically meeting the needs of local industry, as well as helping in the permanent placement of seniors upon graduation in these same job settings. In addition, the program also places juniors in summer employment prior to their senior year. The placement of students in work-related trades is being coordinated by a full time employee of the Department of Employment Security who has been assigned office space at the school.

The Guidance Department staff visited the 25 feeder schools to show interested eighth grade students an audio slide presentation. In addition, a two part career education program was presented to eighth graders in the parochial schools.

This extra recruiting effort has increased the overall number of applicants to 600 in addition to increasing the number of female and special needs applicants. A total of 304 freshmen were accepted into the Class of 1985. Despite this recruiting effort, the number of limited English proficient applicants increased only slightly. Under a federal grant, an admissions aide has been hired to work two days a week, assisting in verbal and written communication with Portuguese speaking parents.

Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School utilized Federal funds allocated by Public Law 94-142 and Public Law 94-482 in the amount of \$58,433.00 as follows: salaries of a resource room teacher, limited English-speaking proficiency teacher, and a part-time admissions aide; purchase of CPR training equipment, graphic arts photo typesetting equipment, and updated allied health program instructional materials; and the three-month rental of a terminal connected to the New England Career Information System on job opportunities and college placement.

The annual Open House and Trade Fair was held on March 14 and 15 with more than, 3,200 people attending. More than 600 shop projects, planned, designed, and constructed by students in the 13 shops in the school, were judged by 45 members of the school's advisory committee. The judges based their selections in the awarding of ribbons for all first, second, and third place projects on the quality of workmanship, accuracy as to measurements that were specified in specific plans or drawings, and the scope of the project.

A number of scholarship awards were given to members of the Class of 1981 as follows: William McHenry was awarded the \$500 Alro Oxygen Scholarship and is attending BCC majoring in Electrical Engineering Technology; Rene Lafleur was awarded one of two \$500 scholarships made available by the Coil Tube Forming Co. and is attending SMU majoring in Electrical Engineering; Joseph Moniz was awarded the second \$500 scholarship and is attending Roger Williams College majoring in Architectural Engineering Technology; Edward Woytaszk was awarded a \$100 scholarship made available by the Head of the Westport Volunteer Firefighters Association and is studying Electrical Engineering at SMU; and Robert Novacek was awarded a \$250 scholarship made available through the efforts of the Somerset-Swansea Rotary Club to further his education in Culinary Arts at Johnson and Wales College.

The Outstanding Vocational Student Award for the Class of 1981 was presented to Edward Woytaszk of the Basic Electronics Department at a dinner meeting prepared and served by students of the Culinary Arts Department. The first runner-up was William McHenry of the Electrical Department and the second runner-up was Michael Neronha of the House and Mill Carpentry Department. Also selected as the outstanding student in their respective shop areas were Robert J. Goulet, Auto Body; Robert L. Wilkey, Culinary Arts; James M.

Julius, Drafting; Paul R. Lavoie, Graphic Arts; Jonathan M. Ferreira, Machine Shop; Scott D. Clarke, Metal Fabrication & Welding; Gerald V. Ferreira, Painting & Decorating; and Barry J. Barboza, Plumbing.

Diman students continue to gain recognition by their participation in extra curricular activities. Two members of the soccer squad were selected for the all-star team in Division Two of the Southeastern Massachusetts League. The school's Key Club received recognition from the New England District of Key Clubs for having the most active membership in the District. The school newspaper received a fourth place certificate from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association for its participation in this national contest, as well as a Superior Achievement Certificate from the New England Scholastic Press Association.

Students in the House and Mill Carpentry, Plumbing, Painting & Decorating, and Electrical shops are constructing the eleventh house in the home building program for Mr. and Mrs. Richard Levesque on Bark Street in Swansea.

In addition to the housebuilding project, the carpentry students helped to renovate areas in the YMCA building and to improve some of the facilities at Camp Welch. Diman Regional has also provided vocational services for the Fall River Police Department, Fire Department, School Department, Public Works Department, Water Department, Jobs for Fall River and the Chamber of Commerce.

The passage of Proposition 2½ has eliminated fiscal autonomy of the school committee. The school's budget has always been prepared so that the cost per pupil would be minimal. Over the years the school has had the lowest or next to the lowest per pupil cost in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The school's enrollment has been very stable over the years and in most programs not affected by declining enrollment. The Superintendent-Director recommended that supportive staff positions be eliminated if the budget must be reduced. A total of six and a half supportive positions were eliminated and one post secondary teaching position.

The assessments to the communities were drastically reduced because the Regional School Aid was figured as an anticipated receipt of State Revenue. The assessments to the communities cannot be maintained at this low level because the anticipated revenue will be declining yearly.

The School Committee has approved three studies of the physical plant including the following: roof rehabilitation, technical energy management, and handicapped facilities. As a result a contract has been signed to restore sections of the roof. The energy conservation recommendations have been studied, and the handicapped report is underway.

Several items of new equipment have been approved for purchase in an attempt to keep the instruction current to the technical demand of the trades. The equipment includes: a numerical control lathe, offset press, flip top platemaker, infra-red engine analyzer, computerized photo typesetter, and an induction cranking-charging analyzer.

The continued growth and development of this school will be possible as long as the people in the communities realize their funds are being efficiently and effectively used to support strong programs which are a product of the united efforts of the staff, administration, members of the Advisory Committee, parents, students, and the School Committee.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SURVEYOR

To the People of Westport:

I would like to give a general report of the condition and accomplishments of the Highway Department for the past year.

The Department consists of 16 full-time employees and the Highway Surveyor. Their classifications are as follows: Highway Surveyor, one Foreman, one Clerk, five Equipment Operators, nine Truckdriver-Laborers. This staff has been decreased by two persons in the interest of Proposition 2½ and is now two less than it has been since 1971. We have had no C.E.T.A. workers in the fiscal year 1982.

We have approximately 135 miles of roads to maintain, plow, etc. as well as work for other departments, such as snow plowing of school yards, maintaining parking lots for beach areas, digging graves for the cemetery department, hauling and supplying fill for the land fill site, occasional repairs on town landings and the town wharf, change oil and grease cruiser cars for the Police Department. Maintaining emergency road for Conservation Commission at their beach property. Install drainage for emergency problems as they arise and as of March 1982 roadside tree and brush control.

Our supply of sand and gravel for road maintenance, sanding and reconstruction will be depleted by the end of 1983 fiscal year. We are working on material we processed and stockpiled from the Smith Farm pit. The contract on this pit is terminated and it has been refurbished. We are asking no appropriation for 1983 but negotiations for a new supply should be underway.

Below is a list of work done during the first half of fiscal year 1982 and more to be done before July 1.

Resurfaced Main Road from the High School south 4000'.

Sealed coated River Road from Rhode Island line south to Bessett's corner, and from Cross Road south to the end of Acoaxet Road.

Sealed Pine Hill Road from Horseneck Road to Ben White's Corner or Old Pine Hill Road.

The reconstruction and straightening of Old Bedford Road from Davis Road to Highland Avenue is about one half completed which has kept the whole department busy. A mile of drainage is installed, trees removed from the corners and the base in the swamp areas has been installed. This is a major reconstruction job 4300' of road to be built to state Chapter 90 standards with state funds.

Before July, 1982 we plan to overlay the following roads with available money:

Horseneck Road from Hix Bridge Road south 1.4 miles x 26' x 2''.

Drift Road from Old County Road south 1 mile x 26' x 2''.

The Tax Cap ceilings and Proposition 2½ have limited our road repair program. Liquid asphalt in 1977 was 0.57 per gallon and Type I in place was \$15.10 per ton. Currently liquid asphalt is 1.07 and Type I is \$24.40.

The effectiveness of this Department depends on the quality and condition of the equipment it has to work with. The Taxpayers of Westport have been very cooperative in this area in the past but for the past several years with Tax Caps and 2½ propositions no major equipment has been replaced. This is of major concern. The equipment is old to start with and repairs are very high. I would recommend a major replacement program of capital equipment in the very near future.

Our major project for the coming year is to complete reconstruction of the portion of Old Bedford Road between Davis Road and Highland Avenue.

I hope this report will enlighten you somewhat on our activities and I would like to take this opportunity to say that my fellow employees and I enjoy working for the people of Westport.

RE: Annual Shellfish Department report to the Town.

Gentlemen:

During 1981, the Shellfish Department reared one hundred thousand (100,000) quahaugs. Survivorship and growth rates of the seed quahaugs were the best yet on record, being ninety-nine per cent (99%) and nine sixteenth of one inch (9/16") respectively. As aquacultural techniques are better adapted to the Westport River, quahaug survivorship and growth rates will be brought to their maximum limits.

Some ten thousand (10,000) scallops were relayed into Westport this year and from all indications it seems these scallops were, in part, responsible for a very large seed set. Resultingly, nine hundred (900) bushels of seed scallops had to be transferred from areas where the chance of surviving were poor to areas which will optimize survival.

The spring of 1982 will see oyster and soft-shelled clam beds being newly established or renewed by means of spat collections.

Overall, the effects of our propagation program are only just beginning to be realized as shellfish populations are reversing their downward trend and are becoming more abundant.

In the area of law enforcement, four (4) shellfish permits were suspended or revoked and five (5) persons were successfully prosecuted for violations of our shellfish regulations.

REPORT OF THE MASTER PLAN UPDATE COMMITTEE

Gentlemen:

In the Fall of 1981, the Westport Update Master Plan Committee reorganized with Richard P. Desjardins as Chairman and began reviving efforts to update the 1972 Master Plan.

At the Committee's request the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) submitted a Comprehensive Land Use Plan Proposal outlining ways in which the Agency could provide technical assistance and professional services on the project. Subsequently a contract with SRPEDD was signed and its staff commenced preparing drafts for Master Plan Committee comment, revision, and approval. Focus will be on the issue of land use and techniques to manage development so that Westport may take steps necessary to preserve its beauty, unique natural resources, agriculture, open space, scarce groundwater and rural character while accomodating the growth pressures the Town will face.

It is hoped that the process will be completed in 1982 to be followed by implementation of Master Plan recommendations.

REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

The Solid Waste Disposal Committee continued to endorse the recycling center located at the south side of the Town Landfill. Townspeople voluntarily contributed the following saleable wastes: 83 tons of newspapers and magazines; 37 tons of glass, clear, green, and brown; and 375 pounds of aluminum cans and small aluminum household items. All revenue from the sale of these items to local markets was deposited in the Town Treasury. From January through May a C.E.T.A. — funded recycling center monitor assisted with the program. From May through December volunteers and then the landfill supervisor continued the processing.

In November 1981, the Massachusetts Legislature passed the "Bottle Bill," Chapter 571 — an act providing for economic incentives for consumers to return used beverage containers and to encourage the conservation of materials and energy through the recycling and reuse of such containers. The impact of this legislation upon further reducing Westport's waste stream will not be known until after the act takes effect on January 17, 1983.

Again, we thank all Town residents who participate in recycling, thusly saving tax dollars, landfill space, natural resources, energy, and the beauty of Westport's roadways and beaches.

ANNUAL TOWN REPORT WATER QUALITY COMMISSION

The Town of Westport Water Quality Commission was established on August 29, 1977, by the Board of Selectmen to broaden the functions of the River Improvement Commission to encompass town-wide water problems. The Commission is responsible for investigating, evaluating, and formulating solutions and recommendations under the Board of Selectmen.

During 1981, the Water Quality Commission devoted considerable time and effort to the elimination of hazards in the Westport river including maintenance of channel bouys, marking of very hazardous rocks, and the marking of a navigatable channel at the mouth of the West Branch. The Selectmen have ordered these corrections.

Of major concern to the Commission has been the contamination of the East Branch due, according to a state study by DEQE, to "excessive bacterial counts of bovine origin." Such pollution has resulted in the state closing large shellfishing area of the River. This Commission has taken every opportunity to foster programs to improve this condition. River pollution has been a major concern of this Commission for the last fifteen years.

Commission members have attended a number of meetings concerned with the proposed EG&G Synfuels project. Every attempt is being made to alert officials to the tremendous air and water quality threat such a project has to Westport.

A project originated by this Commission in 1971, the construction of a boat ramp at Gooseberry Neck, has received considerable attention by the state, the Selectmen, and other persons in the Town this year. It appears that it is just a matter of time that the ramp will be constructed, thereby reducing the number of boats entering the Westport River.

The Commission continues in its attempt to have the Town acquire a standpipe and well site for future use. It is felt that it is only a matter of time before the Town will have to establish a public water system, particularly in the north part of Town.

For the past ten years the Commission has been highly concerned over the problem of shifting sands and filling of our harbor entrance channel. Many attempts have been made to arrive at an economically feasible system of dredging and stabilizing this channel. However, to date no practical solution which the federal or state authorities are willing to perform or the Town can afford have been found. The Commission will continue in its efforts in this direction.

Of primary concern to the Commission, from an overall, point of view, is the protection and improvement of the Westport River, and the protection of Westport's ground water.

WESTPORT HOUSING AUTHORITY

Dear Members:

At the beginning of 1981 the Housing Authority members and staff worked with the Board of Selectmen in an attempt to find suitable sites for the development of the HUD Turnkey project for which the Authority received a \$2,044,775 fund reservation from the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This development for low — and moderate-income persons was to consist of forty (40) units for the elderly, twelve (12) one-bedroom family units, and four (4) two-bedroom family units. Some of these units were to be designed specifically for handicapped persons.

Following joint review and consideration of numerous sites, the Housing Authority and Board of Selectmen agreed to recommend certain sites to a Special Town Meeting held on March 3rd. In spite of a unanimous vote by 354 people at an October 15, 1980 Special Town Meeting to support further development of the proposed HUD project, a large majority of the 556 voters at the March 3rd Special Town Meeting heavily defeated by a ratio of 2 to 1 all motions concerning the proposed HUD development. This action resulted in the loss to the Town of Westport of much needed affordable and safe housing for the elderly and the handicapped, as well as other benefits to the residents of this Town of the \$2,044,775 development and construction program.

In March Mary L. Medeiros was re-elected to a 5-year term on the Authority. In May Mr. Albert Theriault, a Board member for six years, passed away. In July Mr. Antonio B. Gracia, Jr., was selected to fill the resulting vacancy until the next Town election in March 1982. In August the 5-year term of Mr. Donald Bernier, the State-appointed member, expired. He was succeeded on the Board in October by Mr. John H. Marques, who was appointed by State officials.

During this past year the Authority continued to improve the safety for our elderly and handicapped residents, as well as our energy conservation efforts. Smoke alarms were installed in every apartment and in all common areas at Greenwood Terrace. Energy saving showerheads were installed in all apartments.

On December 31, 1981 Mr. Albert Cardoza retired as the maintenance employee of the Housing Authority. He has provided exceptional service in this position since the opening of Greenwood Terrace in 1974. Mr. Myron Costa of Westport was hired to replace Mr. Cardoza as the maintenance employee effective January 4, 1982.

The following is a statistical summary as of December 31, 1981:

During 1981 vacancies occurred in the housing units at Greenwood Terrace while we received 21 applicants during this period.

We were fortunate in 1981 to continue our involvement with the Bristol County Home Care for Elderly, Inc., with the employment of two senior maintenance aides. We also utilized the services of two youngsters through the C.E.T.A. Summer Youth Program.

The Housing Authority continued to sponsor various programs of benefit to elderly Town residents, as well as to cooperate with several other organizations providing such

benefits. The Council on Aging (COA) continues its sponsorship of the Elderly Nutrition Program and various recreational activities at Greenwood Terrace. Citizens for Citizens (CFC) was allowed to utilize the community hall to administer their Fuel Assistance and Energy Conservation programs for last year and the current winter.

Greenwood Terrace was also the site of various activities such as a crime prevention program, activities related to the mini-bus for elderly, election of the Silver-Haired Legislature, arts programs, recreational programs such as line dancing, musical presentations and a holiday concert.

Various health services were also offered at Greenwood Terrace. These included flu clinics, health promotion clinics and podiatry clinics.

The Authority again wishes to thank all of the many individuals who have given their time and consideration for the elderly residents of Westport.

Herewith is the annual report of the Planning Board for the year 1981. The Board organized during the year as follows:

When the Planning Board was reorganized after the 1981 Annual Town Meeting, Mr. George M. Hall was elected to serve as Clerk to the Board, and also, elected to represent the Planning Board on the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District Commission.

Mr. Edward H. Cloutier was elected to represent the Board on the Conservation Commission for the study and preparation of a wetlands map of the Town of Westport.

The Board conducted business at twenty-eight of its scheduled meetings, two of which the Board was not able to vote on matters before it due to a lack of quorum. The Board conducted four public hearings on new subdivisions, five public hearings on revisions, and two public hearings pertaining to amendments to the zoning by-laws and amendments to the subdivision rules and regulations. Six of the subdivisions were approved, three of which created six new lots, and the remaining three plans were revisions not creating new lots. In addition, eight plans creating twenty-four new lots on existing streets were endorsed and six miscellaneous plans not creating new lots were endorsed. Three plans creating six new lots were endorsed after approval was granted by the Board of Appeals. Seven plans which did not comply with the present zoning requirements were disapproved.

The number of subdivisions submitted for "Approval Granted" increased 60% from the number submitted in 1980, whereas the number of plans submitted for "Approval Not Required" experienced a 21% decrease in activity from 1980, and miscellaneous plans endorsed decreased 33% from the number endorsed in 1980.

The Board participated and/or furnished assistance to other various Boards of the Town of Westport during the course of the year.

The Planning Board participated with Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District in an area Water Supply Protection Study and contributed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as the Town's share in return for the study and a proposed Water Supply Protection By-Law and a Wetland By-Law, each of which were completed in 1981.

After extensive review and careful consideration, the Town's Rules and Regulations Governing the Subdivision of Land was updated and revised. New regulations have been published and were in effect this year.

Planning Board members have attended two meetings concerning the proposed EG & G Synfuels project and will continue to monitor this project very carefully.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE AND THE CITIZENS OF WESTPORT

I appreciate the opportunity to serve as Superintendent of Schools in Westport. The Committee and I have agreed upon specific educational objectives for our schools. These should be shared with the community and an appraisal made of how they are being implemented. These are:

1. TO DEVELOP A COMPETENCY BASIC SKILLS MASTER PLAN IN LISTENING AND SPEAKING SKILLS FOR THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AS WELL AS ASSIST THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE IN THEIR CONTINUING EFFORTS TO EMPHASIZE COMMUNICATION AND COMPUTATIONAL SKILLS.

The Secondary Level Advisory Group is in the process of reviewing the Massachusetts Listening Test of Basic Skills. Prior to the end of the 1981-82 school year, recommendations pertaining to the Basic Skills Improvement Plan in Listening will be forwarded to the School Committee for their approval and acceptance.

Progress continues to be made in coordinating the content areas of reading, language and mathematics. It is with pleasure that I report the success of the first complete year of our Basic Skills Improvement Program. Students at the secondary level, not meeting minimum standards after their initial evaluation, received remediation within the framework of their regular programs and within small group Basic Skills Workshops. The combined efforts of students and teachers make it possible for the vast majority of the students not meeting minimum standards, initially, to improve substantially in the area of reading, mathematics and writing during the year.

2. TO STRENGTHEN THE CHAIN OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR ALL SCHOOL ACTIVITY.

Accountability is the by-word in education today and rightly so. Westport is fortunate in having the professional staff necessary to do the job. There are some missing links in the chain of responsibility. The School Committee has authorized the restoration of the position of Business Manager and he will be responsible for all non-professional personnel. Meanwhile, Administration has developed a new staff evaluation manual which includes the philosophy, criteria and procedures of evaluation. At the same time, as Superintendent, I will strive to improve the quality of written staff evaluations prepared by building level administrators and supervisory personnel.

3. TO DEVELOP A PLANNED MAINTENANCE AND ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAM.

Westport is fortunate in having, in most instances, modern facilities. For this reason, it has been possible in the past, to operate with a lower maintenance budget than is usual in school systems. Regretfully the time for repairs is upon us and more resources will have to be allocated for maintenance. To defer maintenance can be the most costly decision a community can make. This past summer the School Committee utilized the services of Sellw, Doherty and Sheskey Inc. Architects and Engineers to inspect every space in each building and identify work to be done in the following areas:

- a. Building elements which are worn or broken and need replacing.
- b. Modification to mechanical and electrical systems to save energy.
- c. Corrective work needed in some buildings.
- d. Roofs

Subsequently in October the School Committee received the engineering report on the roofs and the maintenance survey. The School Committee subsequently met with the Finance Committee after making copies of the reports available to the Finance Committee. We are now looking at sources of funding for this long needed project.

4. TO REVISE THE WESTPORT PUBLIC SCHOOL'S POLICY MANUAL.

The Policy Manual of the Westport Public School is presently being reviewed and revised in its entirety. The manual will contain all the policies of the Westport School Committee; all agreements reached through staff negotiations; administrative regulations intended to implement policy; job descriptions for all staff; and certain exhibit documents and forms which relate to policies and/or regulations.

Policy development is a dynamic ongoing process in a modern, forward looking school system. New issues, problems and needs continually require a school system to develop new policies or revise existing ones.

The Westport Public Schools operate according to policies established by the School Committee. The School Committee, which represents both state and local community, develops the policies after careful deliberation, and the school administration implements them through specific rules and regulations. The School Committee then appraises the effects of its policies and makes appropriate revisions.

The Policy Manual is organized, utilizing a classification system developed by the Educational Policies Service of the National School Board Association. The system provides an efficient means for coding, filing, and locating School Committee policies, administrative rules or other documents.

Once the Policy Manual has been completely revised, copies will be made available at each school, the Town Library and the Town Hall.

5. TO DEVELOP A PRELIMINARY REPORT ON THE CLOSING OF AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.

The School Committee and the Town of Westport will have to face up to the hard decisions which will be made to react to the declining pupil population. The continuing decline in School enrollment which has enabled classes to fit fairly comfortably into existing buildings this year, however, portends more changes in the future. Present enrollment projections for the next five years indicates that the town will probably need only two of its three elementary schools for grades K-5 by the Fall of 1983 or 1984.

I bring this likelihood to the attention of the School Committee and the town so that we can all begin to think now about how best to make use of this space when the time comes that we will no longer need the space for elementary classrooms. Certainly there will be staff reductions and further reorganizations. We will attend to arrive at solutions that are fair and equitable to all.

REVIEW OF THE PAST YEAR

This past school year has been unusual and on behalf of the Westport School Committee and myself, I will take this opportunity to express our appreciation to the entire school community and the people of Westport for their understanding and support. We have struggled through some rough, white waters. We would not have managed without the full cooperation of everyone. I would like to single out the following individuals or groups of people for special thanks.

Miss Audrey Tripp who stepped into the breach and assumed the role of Acting Superintendent of Schools.

The entire staff, who in the face of this onslaught of Proposition 2½, continued to provide the services to the children of Westport — A most difficult task especially for those who were being Riffed.

The Finance Committee and the Town of Westport for supporting our supplementary budget.

As in the past, the reports submitted by all Administrators will be available for your review. However, I would like to depart from the format of former reports. Rather, I would like to identify some atypical events of the past year, report academic progress, give an overview of our fiscal situation and make recommendations that cover the entire school system.

This year was the year of Proposition 2½. The Westport School Department Fiscal Year 1982 budget reflected a reduction of \$405,000 from the Fiscal 1981 budget. To do this we had to drastically reduce staff and curtail programs. In making these cuts our highest priority was direct educational services to children, however, we still had to eliminate 31.5 positions from our staff inventory. Later this figure was reduced to 27.5 when the Town voted additional funds at the Special Town Meeting in August.

This year was the first of a two year process which takes place for the Westport High School's accreditation. The initial internal evaluation is, to us, the most valuable part and we will give much attention to the recommendations of the Westport High School's staff and the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

Financially, we should say that maintaining a balanced fiscal responsibility to the dual constituency of the communities, those who pay the taxes and those who receive the services, is becoming increasingly difficult. The compromise made over the past three years to hold budgetary increases down, level fund, and this past year to reduce, is now catching up with us. We are especially concerned with the maintenance of our building — to a point where we have identified it as one of our objectives for Fiscal 1982. Over the years, when the dollar dictates forced a decision, School Committees have historically cut the maintenance rather than the instructional portions of the budget. With problems like that which we encountered with the water situation at the High School and the roofs of three of our schools we can no longer follow this policy. The Fiscal 1983 budget, now in preparation will include a percentage increase that would be unacceptable in other years but given the situation as they are we must go ahead expeditiously. We feel that the people of Westport now realize that it is penny-wise and pound foolish to continue to the practice of deleting long needed maintenance in order to hold to a percentage increase in budget.

At the elementary school level, a major effort is being undertaken to identify a sequential order of learning skills in mathematics and language arts, and to develop a logical recording system. This record of achievement will follow each student as he/she proceeds through school, enabling the staff to know immediately the areas and skills which need to be taught, and indicating those skills that have been mastered.

This year the Westport Public School lost the services of two excellent educators — Mrs. Catherine Williams, teaching assistant principal at the Milton E. Earle School and Mr. Paul Wilber, Principal of the Westport Middle School — The former after 14 years of service in the Westport School System and the later after 12 years. We wish them well in their retirement and thank them for all they have done for the children of Westport.

THE PLACE OF THE WESTPORT PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE LARGER SOCIAL CONTEXT

There are few, if any, major social problems for which explanations and solutions do not in some way involve the public schools — involvement that may be direct or indirect, relevant or irrelevant, small or large. After all, the school is a reflection of our society as well as

the principal vehicle by which its young are socialized or prepared for life in adult society. Therefore, it is not surprising that any major social problem — be its violence, drug addiction, sex, malnutrition, smoking or racial discrimination — quickly centers on what the schools are or what they should be. This is the crux of the problem — what should the schools be or do? We recognize that American education has a tradition, a structure, and is organized for attainment of societal objectives. Following this, however, agreement ceases. Those who suggest priorities or recommend change forget that they themselves are part of a complicated social system that determines their view of themselves and the schools. Moreover, how they observe the schools will largely be influenced by their conception of their own setting or place in it. Lastly, many want their children educated to conform to their individually held values. If the children mirror their parents, we can not disregard the basic law of human nature that every child is custom made. Each has particular strengths and weaknesses. It follows that every child requires the kind of learning situation that will benefit him as a distinct individual. That is why I accept the premise that there is no best way to educate children as a truism.

What our schools can do is provide a common frame of reference to accomodate the often conflicting values of our families. This is an academic curriculum that will provide the opportunity to achieve mastery of the basic communication skills, to understand our heritage, to grow in a social setting with other children, and to be in special programs with other children who have special needs. The curriculum is the common denominator. Its worth, however, depends to a great degree upon the families conception of its purpose. The schools cannot and should not attempt to match the vividness or the resources of media, which does not claim to teach, yet fills the minds of our children. Parental attitudes towards schools and an understanding of its purpose influence children's reactions to it. If the parents feel that education is important, the children will feel the same. If the parents find joy in reading and discussion, so will the children. Part of the crises facing schools today is that in many ways we are at the mercy of our blessings which diminish the importance of families and upgrade institutions.

My appeal thus, to the parents of our school children, is to accept the honest efforts of our teachers to do what they do best. That is, to provide the skills and understandings needed for a productive life, and for parents to assume responsibility for the inculcation of those values that the family most cherishes.

Many of the forementioned priorities will involve a commitment of time and energies that will go beyond the 1981-82 school year. In some cases we are developing long-range plans that will make provisions for successful implementation of these priorities over time. I am well aware of the problems associated with affecting change. Change is never easy, especially when change asks us to take on whole sets of new behavior. I believe that part of my responsibility is to see that we develop in our school system the capability to adapt to change and renewal. The success of our educational system rests with our ability to work with individuals within our system. When we identify needs, it becomes our responsibility to address these needs in a meaningly way.

In closing, I should like to extend my appreciation to each of the School Committee members, to the parents, the students and the members of our school staff who have made my first eight months so pleasant.
