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TOWN OF WESTPORT

In 1787 Westport was divided from Dartmouth and put under the leadership of a Board of Selectmen. The Town has retained this type of government down through the centuries and even today the policies of the Town are decided upon each April by an open town meeting of registered voters.

Westport is a rural and residential community with 310 acres of salt rivers and a State Beach - Horseneck. Farming and fishing are an active part of Westport, along with many boats moored in the harbor, some industry included.

Westport has a full-time police force and a full-time fire department with trained EMT's and ambulance service.

The Westport of today is an ideal spot for either home or industry. Within minutes of two large cities - Fall River and New Bedford - it affords easy access to shipping lanes, inland rail transportation and air transport service.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

While nineteen eighty-four was marked by a number of diverse issues, environmental concerns continued to be a primary focus for local officials. It has become increasingly apparent that effective local government management includes not only the competent day-to-day operation of the Town but also attention to broader issues and sound future planning, especially in environmental matters.

In retrospect, some of the major activities involving the Town and the Board of Selectmen during the year were as follows:

Personnel Issues:

Following he April elections and Richard Desjardins' re-election for another term, Board members remained the same. During reorgnaization George Leach was selected as Chairman, Selectmen Desjardins was elected Clerk and Ann Chandanais rounded out the Board as the third member. Some staff personnel changes did occur during the year. In June Patricia Stetson was hired as Senior Clerk after Paula Gendreau transferred to the Accountant's Office. A major management change was made in December when Detective Sergeant Charles Pierce was selected as the new Police Chief to replace Chief Rene Dupre who retired after twenty-five years of service to the Westport Police Department.

Negotiations and other labor relations matters continued to be a timeconsuming and demanding activity for the Selectmen's Department. Union contracts needed to be renegotiated for the 1984-1985 Fiscal Year; ten grievances were submitted to the Board by the Union; and two prohibited practice charges were filed by the Union. The Board, thus, decided to hire the firm of Murphy, Lamere and Murphy, specialists in the field of labor law, to assist in this area. It might be noted tha the Town has been successful in most of the grievance and prohibited practice cases, winning eight out of nine cases decided during 1984. However, contract negotiations continue to progress slowly as Selectmen attempt to balance fairness and equitability to employees with its fiscal and management responsibilities to the Town.

In other personnel areas, efforts to standardize and improve the hiring, promotion and evaluation process continued as primary emphasis was placed on refining and implementing procedures adopted during the past few years.

Environmental Concerns:

Nineteen eighty-four has been referred to as Westport's "Year of the River". Indeed, growing concerns over adverse environmental impacts on the water and shellfish of the Westport River did result in action being taken by various boards to reverse this trend. Two major studies were funded at the Annual Town Meeting. One, under the Board of Health, was aimed at locating sources of pollution in the East Branch, and the other, under the Shellfish Department, had as its purpose the testing of water in the polluted shellfish areas. During this same period the Westport River Defense Fund received a grant from the Department of Environmental Management to prepare a "Greenway Protection Plan" for the Westport River Watershed. The Westport River De3fense Fund has involved local officials through an Oversight Committee. All these studies are now in progress and results should be forthcoming. Hopefully, their findings will assist town officials in addressing and even reversing the River's increasing pollution problems.

Attention has also been focused on two other crucial areas, which when not properly handled can have several environmental impacts -Solid Waste Disposal and Sewage and Septage Disposal. Separate committees, each including representation from the Board of Selectmen, have been studying these issues and their recommendations will guide the Town's actions in addressing these potentially critical problems. (See Solid Waste Disposal Committee and Sewer Study Committee Reports.)

Public awareness of the harmful effects of hazardous materials has also been evident in Westport. A successful "Hazardous Waste Day", during which residents could bring their hazardous household materials to a central collection point for proper disposal, was funded by Town Meeting, and another is now planned. In addition, Town Government began its compliance with the new state "Right to Know Law" which requires that employees be given information concerning the types of hazardous materials at the workplace and their proper handling.

The Agricultural Preservation Restriction (APR) Program was extremely active in the Town of Westport during 1984. Through this program state and local government funds are used to purchase development rights from participating farmers. Thus, valuable farmland is protected from development resulting in continued agricultural productivity and preservation of the community's rural atmosphere. To date the Town has helped process twenty-one applications. Development Rights have already been purchased for three of these farms, one closure is pending, and ten are undergoing appraisals.

Licenses, Permits:

During the year emphasis continued to be placed on regulation of the Town's numerous motor vehicle and repair facilities. On-site inspections were followed by hearings on those licenses where the Board felt the conditions of the premises could be improved. Positive response by license holders to the Board's recommendations has been widespread and the Board is most appreciative of their cooperation.

By-Law Enforcement:

In September a Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court decision declared the Westport trailer by-law and amendments thereof valid. It further noted that trailers should be removed seventy-two hours after expiration of a six month permit. Since rigid enforcement of this bylaw had been placed "on-hold" until after the Court decision, compliance efforts began again in the Fall. Enforcement of the by-law since that time has been difficult, time-consuming, and controversial, with considerable research being required on such matters as "grandfather rights". Most affected trailer owners have complied, but controversy in some areas continues.

Other Issues:

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A Provisional Cable Television License was finally issued to United Cablevision Funding in October after more than a year's delay. An appeal by the other applicant to the Selectmen's decision to issue the license to United Cablevision was finally dismissed by the Massachusetts Cable Television Commission in August, thus allowing the Town to proceed with the license. The cable company is now in the process of obtaining necessary agreements, locating a head-end site, and conducting initial surveys in the Town. Construction will hopefully begin in 1985 (See Cable Advisory Committee Report). The Town's data processing system expanded in July with the computerization of the Accounting System. Conversion problems persisted but to a lesser degree. Individual department's efforts to cooperate have minimized the difficulty of a decentralized government structure adjusting to a centralized computer system. Faced with a necessity to expand and to determine our future data processing needs, a consultant has been engaged to perform a Systems Study of the Town's Operating System. Results of this study are anticipated in early 1985.

Making all our local government programs and facilities accessible to all citizens, including the handicapped, has been a priority during the year. Of utmost urgency is the need to increase the accessibility of the Town Hall. Alternatives are being reviewed and a plan will be submitted for funding in the near future.

Conclusion:

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This review of 1984 once again reminds us that local government must confront many complex, diverse issues and that we, as Selectmen, must rely on assistance from numerous sources. Thanks to our hardworking, committed appointees and staff we have received that assistance. We are particularly grateful since we recognize the difficult conditions under which they must often function.

The challenge to manage the daily operation of the Town as well as address crutial issues is one which local officials have readily accepted. Now as the 1984 studies are completed we are faced with the even greater challenge of making some difficult and critial choices in these areas of concern. Since public awareness and participation are essential to the decision-making process in our town meeting form of government, we urge you, the Westport citizens, to become informed on the issues and to share this challenge with us.

Each parking space shall have a useable area of at least 180 square feet and be served by two-way access lane at least 26 feet wide, except that if parking stalls are angled at 60 degrees or less, a one-way access lane shall not be required for dwellings of up to four units. In such

cases a 12 foot one-way access is sufficient. Joint use of off-street parking facilities is permitted provided that the area of such facilities shall be not less than the sum of the requirements of the various users computed in accordance with the schedule. The number of spaces required for each use shall be determined by the building inspector based upon the following criteria:

Minimum Required Space 1.5 spaces per unit.
1 space for each home occupation or profession in addition to residen- tial requirements.
1 space for each 200 square feet floor space.
1 space for each 1,000 sq. ft. plus one additional space for each 2 employees actively engaged at any one time.
1 space per room and 1 space for every 3 seats in restaurants and meeting rooms and 1 space for each 2 employees.
1 space for every 3 seats or 50 sq. ft. of gross floor area and 1 space for every 2 employees.
3 spaces for each operator.
4 spaces for each alley or court.
1.5 spaces for each 1,000 sq. ft. of floor space and 1 space for each 2 employss.

- 2. Other uses conducted for profit on premises within or without a building such as flea markets, auction houses, churches and fairs shall provide for off-street parking in accordance with use schedule. The Board of Appeals may grant a special permit to any person or organization to allow for sporadic or intermittent use of a premises without complying with the requirements of this section.
- Industrial and Commercial buildings shall provide adequate parking, maneuvering and loading space on premises for freight and delivery trucks in addition to the minimum requirements for spaces listed in paragraph (I) 1. above.

Section VI. General Regulations

J. TOWERS AND WIND GENERATING SYSTEMS

Towers to support electronic transmitters and receivers, wind generating systems, including windmills, solar and satellite discs, and similar structures shall be permitted in all districts if authorized by a special permit by the Planning Board provided they are not detrimental, dangerous or obnoxious to adjoining areas and provided:

1. SET BACK:

The minimum setback distance for such towers from any abutter's property line shall be (and shall continue to be for the life of the installation) at least equal to the maximum height of the tower from grade plus twenty feet. Setbacks will be measured to the center of the tower base.

2. TOWER HEIGHT:

Tower height, in all cases, shall be determined by the Planning Board and specified in the special permit.

3. TOWER ACCESS:

Access shall be constructed in such a manner as not to become an attractive nuisance. In no case shall the climbing access to the tower be lower than ten feet from the ground.

4. STRUCTURAL REQUIREMENTS:

Prior to issuance of a special permit, a certificate shall be required from a registered professional engineer certifying the safety and structural stability of the entire tower system.

5. SPECIAL PERMIT:

Prior to issuing a Special Permit, the Planning Board shall hold a public hearing in accordance with Chapter 40A, Section 9 M.G.L. Such Special Permit shall contain restrictions and/or safeguards with regard to noise control and height, assure that there will be no electronic emissions that will interfere with electrical reception of neighboring property, and requirements for fencing.

6. MAINTENANCE:

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If a tower is designated a safety hazard by a registered professional engineer, the owner of said tower shall be required to dismantle the installation immediately. Any interference caused by the tower or equipment on the tower to local radio and/or other electronic equipment and any noise creating a nuisance to abutters shall be corrected within five days at the applicant's expense. After such period, the owner shall be subject to a fine of not more than twenty dollars for each day the violation continues. All tower mounted equipment shall be operated in a safe and responsible manner

TIRE STORAGE REGULATIONS

Any person, owner, business or corporation that shall establish, maintain or allow to exist on any property within the Town of Westport the storage of fifty (50) or more new or used rubber tires, tire casings, tire tubes, rubber scraps, and/or other by-product of rubber tires shall meet the following requirements:

General Operating Regulations:

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The storage site shall be reasonably level, solid ground, perferably surfaced with fine gravel. Refuse or filled-land, swampy ground, or areas where the hazard of underground fire is present shall not be used.

All-weather roadways, alley-ways, and fire lanes capable of supporting fire department apparatus shall be provided to the plant and throughout the storage yard from the town way.

All sides of storage piles shall be accessible by means of the alley-ways and fire lanes. An alley-way width of 1½ times the pile-height, but not less than twenty feet is required, with fire lanes between alternate rows of two pile groups, providing a clear space of at least 100 feet. The length of each pile shall not exceed 125 feet in length, 25 feet in width, or 15 feet in height. Fire lanes for access across each end providing a clear space of at least 100 feet to adjacent pile rows, or other exposed property shall be provided. Where practical, greater widths are desirable to minimize the effects of radiated heat, particularly in high-piled yards. Fire lanes shall be kept unobstructed at all times to permit maneuvering of fire suppression equipment. For basic fire protection, a water supply shall be provided where practical.

The supply should be large enough to provide 1,000 G.P.M. for a period of two hours, and shall be accessible to fire apparatus as directed by fire department personnel.

Weeds, grass, and similar vegetation shall be prevented throughout the yards, and should be sprayed as often as needed with a satisfactory herbicide or ground sterilizer or grubbed out. Dead vegetation shall be removed after destruction. Weed burners shall not be used.

Good housekeeping should be maintained at all times, including regular and frequent cleaning of materials handling equipments.

Smoking shall be prohibited in tire storage yards. No Smoking signs shall be posted in the storage yard.

Access into yard areas by unauthorized persons shall be prohibited. Where needed, storage areas should be enclosed with a suitable fence equipped with proper gates located as necessary, to permit entry of fire department apparatus.

Miscellaneous occupancy hazards such as vehicle storage and repair shops, cutting and welding operations, flammable liquid storage, liquified petroleum gas storage and similar operations shall be safe-guarded in accordance with recognized good practice. Refer to various N.F.P.A. standards applicable to specific occupancy hazards.

Vehicles and other power devices should be of an approved type, safely maintained and operated. Vehicle fueling operations should be conducted in specified safe locations, isolated from storage areas and principal operating buildings (Refer to standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, N.F.P.A., 505).

All electrical equipment and installations shall conform to the provisions of the National Electrical Code, N.F.P.A., 70.

No cutting, welding, or other use of open flames or spark - producing equipment shall be permitted in the storage area.

The owner of the storage yard shall be responsible for the hiring of any heavy equipment to aid in the extinguishing of fire, should it be deemed necessary.

Established Tire Storage Yards:

For the purpose of this by-law, any tire storage yards already established shall have one hundred twenty (120) days from the date of mailing of notice to them of the provisions of this by-law to comply with said provisions.

Penalty:

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Any person who violates the provisions of this by-law shall be subject to a fine of not less than twenty dollars nor more than fifty dollars for each such offense. Each day the violation continues or is allowed to remain shall be considered a separate offense.

"Enforcing Persons", as used in this by-law, shall mean any Selectmen, Police Officer, Reserve Police Officer, Shellfish Constable or any Shellfish Deputy Warden and such other officials as the Board of Selectmen may from time to time designate, each with respect to violation of Shellfish Rules and Regulations within their respective jurisdictions. If more than one official has jurisdiction in a given case, any such official may be an enforcing person with respect thereto.

This year has seen a major change in the status of patients being sent home from hospitals. Due to the shortened hospital stays the patients are needing much more complete skilled nursing care. There is much more need for daily visits as patients are experiencing a different need than in prior years. We are fortunate to have a staff of professional registered nurses who are cognizant of these needs and skills.

This Agency as well as others have been affected by the increased cut backs in Medicare and it is inevitable that there will be many more cut backs. Our paper work load has increased by 50% due to the more stringent regulations handed down from the Federal and State governments. We were surveyed by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health in August. We have compiled with their rules and regulations and therefore continue to be a certified Home Health Agency. Without their certification we would not be able to care for Medicare and Medicaid patients. The positive side is that we still continue to serve the Town of Westport with the highest caliber of care.

Again my thanks to the nursing, clerical, contractual personnel, committee members and Board of Health for their continued support.

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The Conservation Commission/Soil Conservation Board respectfully submits its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1984.

The Conservation Commission held its annual election of officers in May choosing Norman Sasseville, Chairman; Alan Manchester, Vice-Chairman; Thomas Porter, Secretary-Treasurer. Anne Barnes, Urbain Pariseau and Calvin Hopkinson continue as members. James Tripp resigned for reasons of personal commitments after 5½ years of service to the Town. We thank Jay for his dedication and contributions to the Commission and wish him well in the future. Michael Sullivan was appointed to fill the position.

Our staff, Louise Lawrence, Conservation Agent and Barbara Hickey, Secretary continue to review and monitor wetland activities and manage the office.

In administering the Wetlands Protection Act, the Conservation Commission processed 25 Notices of Intent, issued 23 Orders of Conditions, approved 13 Extensions, issued 7 Certificates of Compliance, processed 36 Formal Determinations and reviewed 83 Informal Determinations. Over 500 inspections were conducted by the Agent. In its role as Soil Conservation Board 9 renewals on existing permits were issued. Additionally, the Commission reviewed and commented on 3 applications submitted to the Agricultural Preservation Restriction Program with the intent of restricting development and preserving 584 acres of farmland.

The Conservation Commission received town meeting approval for the cost-share of the RC&D Critical Area Treatment Plan to stabilize and reduce dune movement on town properties at Horseneck Point. Work is expected to begin in the spring of 1985 and the main components include 7 acres of beach grass plantings, gate, boulder barrier and snowfence.

The members of the Conservation Commission wish to thank all those town boards, departments and citizens who have helped and supported our efforts throughout the year.

(Job Opportunity Bank for Seniors), Knitting and Crochet Classes, Meals-on-Wheels, Medi-Mate, Mini-Van (Info.), Newsletter, Office Volunteer Program, Phone Pal Program, Picnic, Podiatry Clinics, Referrals to B.C.H.C.E. (Homemaker & Companion), Referrals to Sr. Citizen Law Project, Vegetable Give-a-Way, V.I.T.A. (Volunteer Income Tax Program), Walk-In Clinics, Xmas Party (S.M.U.), Xmas Dinners (B.C.H.C.E., American Legion and Lion's Club).

Nutrition Program:

During the year 6,526 meals were provided for senior citizens at two meal sites: Greenwood Terrace, daily Monday through Friday; Howland Hall, Westport Point on Mondays and Fridays.

6,270 meals were delivered to the homebound by the Fall River Nutrition Program under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, and paid for in part by the Town of Westport.

Arts and Crafts:

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Knitting and crochet were taught by Ana Isabel. A wreath making class was conducted by Gay Gillespie.

Vegetable Give-a-Way Program, Cheese and Butter:

With the help of the American legion Post #145 and the Lions Club federal surplus foods were distributed bi-monthly to all low-income Westport residents. With the cooperation of local gardeners, vegetables were given away daily during the summer. Over 600 people benefitted from these programs.

Friendly Visitors and Companion:

Made approximately 200 visits to the homebound a month bringing support and friendship as well as books and magazines.

Newsletter, Evergreen:

1,000 copies distributed free of charge each month. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication.

Clinics:

A podiatry clinic was held every other month, funded by client contributions and by a formula grant from the Mass. Dept. of Elder Affairs. An arthritis exercise class is held weekly at the library. Dr. M. A. Berard examines each patient before he/she enters the group. The class is conducted by a therapist. The program is funded by a Discretionary grant from the D.E.A. A clinic fund now enables us to continue some of these clinics with minimum state support. Memorial contributions to this fund will be accepted and acknowledged.

Medi-Mate:

4 Medi-Mate units were purchased by the Council with a grant from the Romero Trust. These units were given to 4 homebound elders, living alone and in precarious health. The units are an instant alert system in case of emergency. They will be kept by the town.

Grants:

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The Council received \$2,961 from the D.E.A. in a formula grant to be used to help continue the podiatry clinics, fund a Friendly Visitor for the homebound and hire a Nurse Practitioner to examine low-income clients who do not have a doctor.

The Council received a \$4,050 discretionary grant from the D.E.A. to conduct an arthritis clinic and exercise group once a week.

In Summary

With people living longer, but not always in good health, and the cost of living increase raising havoc with "fixed incomes", the needs of many of the older people of Westport are often great and severe. The C.O.A. office tries to meet these needs to the best of its ability. With increased longevity, we can foresee nothing but need for further services.

Our increased staff, supplied by the R.S.V.P. program, has enabled us to expand our outreach and respite services. We will continue to help Westport's elders with all the resources available.

ARTS COUNCIL

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The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits this report for the year ending December 31, 1984.

The Westport Arts Council consists of eight members. Twice a year we distribute funds generated by the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council's MEGABUCKS game. Each town's allotment is determined on a per capita basis.

In our January '84 funding period we had \$2,792.00 to distribute. Five grants were awarded to individual artists and three were granted to arts and cultural organizations including the library, the Historical Society and a nursery school.

In our July '84 funding period we had over \$2,790.00 to distribute. Five grants were awarded to individual artists and four were awarded to local cultural organizations including the library, the River Defense Fund, the Historical Society and a school.

In our January '85 funding period we had over \$2,804.00 to distribute. Two grants were awarded to individual artists, one to an arts organization and six to other cultural organizations. Included among these were grants to the Westport High School Art Club, the John E. Boyd Center, the High School Drama Club, the Westport Council on Aging and the Macomber School.

The Westport Arts Council tries to spread our allotted funds as far as possible. We have encouraged individuals and organizations in town to take advantage of this money in such a way that the people of Westport benefit from new arts and cultural experiences. We feel that not only the quantity of people served but the quality of artists encouraged is one of our major purposes. We try to encourage the individual artist, award the excellent artist and urge organizations to sponsor events that touch many people with the arts.

SEWER STUDY COMMISSION

Honorable Board of Selectmen Town Hall Westport, Massachusetts

Gentlemen and Lady:

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The Sewer Study Commission consisting of representatives and alternates from the Board of Health, Conservation Committee Soil Board, Finance Committee, Planning Board, and the Selectmen, with an appointed chairman, met for the first time May 17, 1984. It appointed a vice-chairman, a secretary, and made alternates full members of the commission. The chairman resigned before the next meeting and could not be replaced since all following meetings failed to have a quorum, now of eleven members. This has not stopped the primary function of the commission, which is to study, but unless the selectmen and Board of Health reshape the commission or a quorum is reached in 1985 no formal report or recommendations can be made to the Town.

The following is the vice-chairman's informal report of what was studied by the eight to ten members who have met at monthly intervals in 1984.

The Faye Spofford Thorndike Phase I Wastewater study updated in 1980 recommended a sewer system for North Westport along portions of Route 6 and Sanford Road to discharge into Fall River's treatment plant at a cost upwards of 15 million dollars and a septic system maintenance plan for the rest of the town. We studied this report and alternatives for several meetings. Stephen Smith of SRPEDD described details of septic system maintenance plans which are feasible but can be unpopular to townspeople. Manuel Branco, public works commissioner of Dartmouth, described sewer experience there. Gerald Blais of Fall River's Water discussed the water situation. Ronald Michalski of Tighe Bond told how Mattapoisett reduced its sewer system costs, and how Granby MA used community leaching fields and got a town wide one-shot rehabilitation of septic systems, 94% financed by state and federal government, for those volunteering for it. Dr. Caldwell of Boston University gave a very preliminary report on pollution sources affecting the Westport River. There are some, which BU is tracing for BOH action. Some commission members show concern for more solid information about septic system conditions and the state of ground water pollution in town.

Once again it is my privilege to submit the report of the year's activities of the Westport Free Public Library.

The trustees names are listed at the beginning and the careful reader will note the absence this year of Audrey Tripp. Audrey has served as a library trustee on and off for many years, first assuming office in 1938. Her knowledge of the town and her common sense have made her a valuable member of our group and we miss her, although we can appreciate her need for a little more time for herself and for other services to the town. In her place we were pleased to welcome Rhoda Sheehan who was elected in April of this year.

Our custodian, Wayne Farias, who has been with us since September of 1980 resigned to accept a position in the field of law enforcement for which he had been studying. He was replaced by Albert Audette who transferred to the library from the cemetery department. Since coming to us in July, Mr. Audette has quickly learned the routine and become an asset to the library.

During the summer months it has been the custom to run movies on Monday evenings. This summer the series "Roots" was offered. This was an excellent series which was enormously popular when it ran on television. Unfortunately attendance was disappointing at the library. However, another series of films is planned for the summer of 1985 which we hope will prove more popular. In the fall a series of three programs was offered for parents and grandparents. The first, on nutrition, was presented by one of our trustees Edwina Cronin. The second titled "Books are for Sharing" was led by Dolores Tansey and the third, "Working Parents", by the librarian, Anita Baron, and Phyllis Currier.

Also in the fall we sponsored a very well attended crocheting class. This was made possible by a grant from the Westport Arts Council for which we are very grateful.

I am glad to report that our juvenile services and programs are extremely successful. A creative writing contest attracted 58 budding young authors, and two other contests accompanying the summer reading program each had over 100 children vying for the prizes.

From September to December story hours were held for pre-school children; arts and crafts workshops were held for boys and girls ages 6 and up, and several movies especially for the young were shown. All of these were very well received.

The library - especially the juvenile department and our childrens librarian, Dolores Tansey - has had a great deal of very favorable publicity this year. There have been excellent articles in the *Dartmouth Chronicle*, the *Fall River Herald News*, and the *Providence Journal*. These have all helped to bring an awareness of the services and programs offered by the library to the attention of many of the area families.

The Friends of the Library are gaining in membership and continuing their activities on our behalf. These included an attractive float in the Fourth of July parade, a sale of used books, and three excellent programs with distinguished guest speakers. This year the Friends' generosity enriched the library with additional books, envelopes for the library cards, bookmarks, and the new sign at the end of the Middle School drive on Old County Road.

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We were also the recipient of the already mentioned grant from the Westport Arts Council, large print and children's books from the Westport Newcomers Club, an American flag from the Disabled American Veterans, a Massachusetts flag from Representative Charles E. Silvia, and money for large print books from the Westport Monthly Meeting of Friends. As usual, the interest from the money in the various memorial trust funds was used to purchase books for the library as specified by the trusts.

The trustees conducted the second annual inspection of the grounds and buildings of the library, noting such things as repairs that were needed on the building and no longer used equipment to be returned to the town for auction.

Energy saving measures which were started in 1983 were completed in 1984 as planned.

Volunteers and members of the staff are continuing work on indexing the Westport History Collection. This is a long and tedious job and we wish to thank the volunteers who are so willingly donating their time and expertise to this worthy project.

SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

During 1984 the Town of Westport continued its membership for the fifteenth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Westport's representatives for the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board respective, are Julia S. Enroth, who serves on the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee and SEED Corporation, and Edmund Medeiros.

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SRPEDD assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for federal and state dollars.

Services to Westport this past year included:

- Zoning Regulations for Unrestricted Areas
- Exploration of Cooperative Water Resource Efforts with Fall River, Dartmouth and Freetown (Watuppa Compact)
- Westport River Pollution Problem
- Assistance to the Solid Waste Committee

Regional Plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities included:

• Approval of over \$60 million in regional grant applications to federal and state agencies and of over \$196 million in Industrial Revenue Bonds which will create approximately 1,700 new jobs in the region.

- Environmental assessment reviews of state and federally funded projects, and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.
- The annual update of the *Overall Economic Development Program* (OEDP) which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.
- The annual update of the *Transportation Improvements Program* (TIP) which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included on the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.
- Conducting a community education effort on the safe handling of industrial hazardous wastes under a contract with Southeastern Massachusetts University.
- SEED, South Eastern Economic Development Corporation, established and staffed by SRPEDD, provides low-interest, long-term financing to small businesses in southeastern Massachusetts through the U.S. Small Business Administration's "503" Program and a newly established \$1 million revolving loan fund. In 1984 SEED assisted three businesses which resulted in total investments of over \$1.7 million and created 96 jobs.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to local boards, encourage cooperation among communities, and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1985 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-six years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergency of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rainfilled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in low land swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

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All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis. In sensitive areas such as where bees are kept, no spraying will take place provided we are made aware of these areas. All spray trucks have a list of beekeepers which is continually updated but with more people keeping bees, it would be very helpful if those people would notify our office. Also, any person that has a sensitivity to pesticides and does not want their property sprayed should contact either our office or notify the town or city clerk before April 1st and we shall honor their request.

The 1984 mosquito season got under way in mid-May with large populations of spring brood type mosquitos appearing in many areas of Bristol County.

During the time span between March 6th and June 7th, a total of 26.09 inches of rain fell throughout most of Bristol County. This excessive amount of rain caused swamp and lowland flooding which in turn became prime mosquito breeding sites.

With most indicators pointing to a more serious encephalitis outbreak during the 1984 season than in 1983, all project equipment and personnel were pressed into service in May to get a handle on the situation as soon as possible. Spray crews began working six days a week, concentrating their efforts in those areas of high virus activity during the 1983 mosquito season.

Our light trap mosquito surveillance program was set up and collecting data nearly one month earlier than usual. Light trap data keeps us abreast of areas of high mosquito infestation and the types of mosquitos present. This data is supplied to the virus lab and our spray crews on a daily basis to keep them informed of mosquito activity. As the mosquito season progressed, virus levels began to rise at an alarming rate but with our extended control measures, we were able to reduce mosquito populations greatly and no human cases of encephalitis appeared in Bristol County during the 1984 mosquito season.

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With the end of the spraying season our work turned to water management projects. At this time crews cut brush and clean debris from existing ditches and streams in order to insure a better flow of water from normally wet areas. A total of 7,269 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 7,721 feet of existing drainage ditch cleaned of debris. Our crawler tractor also dug 565 feet of drainage ditch. I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

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GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT January 1, 1984 - December 31, 1984

Our annual report reflects another successful year for the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee in their continuing efforts to provide quality vocational education.

As of October 1, 1984, a total of 1,045 students, 898 boys and 147 girls, were enrolled in 13 high school shop programs; 56 students were enrolled in three (3) Technical Institute programs; 60 students were enrolled in the Practical Nursing Program; 8 students were enrolled in the Nurse Assistant Program; and 251 students were enrolled in 13 Evening School Programs for a total of 1,420 students in the day and evening programs.

In addition, 22 students completed a 12 week training program in the Nurse Assistant Program and 52 adults completed a 60 hour training program for homemaker-home health aides.

In 1984, 218 graduates were awarded diplomas from the high school programs. Of this number 123 were placed in jobs directly related to their trade; 18 were placed in jobs in other trades; 27 went into the armed services; and, 45 went on to higher education. A follow-up study indicated that 9 of the graduates were not working because of family commitments.

The cooperative work experience program allowed 94 seniors to work in the trade during their two week shop cycle.

The Guidance Staff visited the 25 feeder schools to show interested eighth grade students an audio slide presentation which resulted in approximately 500 processed applications.

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The amount of grant money allocated to the Regional School District totalled \$84,474. Approximately \$50,000 was used to purchase equipment; namely, computerized automotive analyzer, a three gas analyzer with tester, four computerized assisted drafting microcomputers, two microcomputers and printers plus a hard disk drive. Funds have been allotted for a summer exploratory program for special needs seventh grade students. The Annual Open House and Trade Fair was held on Saturday, March 17 and Sunday, March 18, 1984 with over 3,000 people attending. More than 700 shop projects planned, designed, and constructed by students in the thriteen shops in the school were judged by 33 members of the school's Advisory Board.

The Fall River Exchange Club awarded a \$500 scholarship to Joao Resendes of the Basic Electronics Shop who is attending Southeastern Massachusetts University majoring in Electrical Engineering. In addition, the Fall River Portuguese-American Businessmen's Association awarded Joao Resendes a \$1,000 scholarship.

The Fall River Lodge of Elks awarded a \$500 scholarship to Alan Bolger of the Graphic Arts Department who is attending Southeastern Massachusetts University.

Todd Rego, a student in the Electrical Department, was recognized by Junior Achievement as the Outstanding Young Businessman. He was awarded a one week scholarship to attend the National Junior Achievement Conference at Indiana State University and participated in the national contest. Angela Texeira of the Drafting Department was recognized as the Outstanding Business Secretary.

John Arruda and Patrick Smith participated in the Massachusetts Plymouth Trouble Shooting Contest and received a third place team ranking in addition to a first place for the written part of this contest.

Christine Martins of the Culinary Arts Department was awarded first place in an essay contest sponored by the Boston Herald American and the John F. Kennedy Library. She was selected from several thousand high school entries from throughout New England.

Kevin Goncalo of Basic Electronics won a statewide award from the Eastern Edison Company for the best energy conservation commercial.

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Christine Langlois of the Drafting Department placed first in the local and third in the regional Voice of Democracy contest. This is the ninth consevutive year that a Diman senior has won first place in the local competition.

The Outstanding Vocational Student Award for the Class of 1984 was presented to Todd Rego of the Electrical Department. The first runner-up was Joao Resendes of Basic Electronics and second runnerup was Manuel Furtado of Auto Body. This year in the development of the local Vocational Industrial Clubs of America chapter, contests were held in three shop areas with the following winners: Culinary Arts - First Place, Christopher Phillips; Second Place - Robert Lima; Alternate - Emile Chagnon. House and Mill Carpentry: First Place, Erik Briand; Second Plance - Nelson Brum; Alternate - Marc Dupuis. Metal Fabrication & Welding: First Place - Russell Ferreira; Second Place - Marc Messier; Alternate -Scott Deschenes.

Our students continue to gain recognition by their participation in extra-curricular activities. The Track Team coached by John Cantwell and the Tennis Team coached by Raymond Pita won the Division III Southeastern Massachusetts titles.

The outstanding athletes by sports were: Soccer - Manuel Pimental; Cross-Country - Thomas Butler; Winter Track - Joseph Dias; Basketball - David Connell; Tennis - Lawrence Ferreira; Baseball - Jeffrey Lopes; Spring Track - Joseph Dias. The Athlete of the Year was Joseph Dias.

The Explorer Post is in its second year of operation. The Advisor, Joseph Martins, and club members have participated in the following activities: Touring Fort Adams, Hiking Camp Cacholot, Skiing, Horseback Riding, Durfee Observatory, Rocky Point Park, Edaville Railroad.

The school's newspaper, The Tradesman, received a superior achievement award from the New England Scholastic Press Associaiton.

The school yearbook, The Artisan, received a highest achievement award form the New England Scholastic Press Association in school editing and publishing for 1984.

Eleanor Fastano, Laura Moore, Joanne Quartochi, and Karen Seiler received awards from the Ninth Annual New England Yankee Dental Conference.

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Andrew Lake of the Culinary Arts Department was elected Lt. Governor of the Key Club District. He attended the International Convention in Dallas as the District's representative.

Members of the Key Club attended the 35th Annual District Key Club Convention in Hyannis, Massachusetts on April 8, 9, and 10, 1984. The Club also sponsored a Christmas basket project for 15 needy Diman families and donated \$400 to Unicef for Ethopian Relief. The Open House for the house built in Westport was held on June 24th with approximately 350 people touring the building.

The School Committee decided to perform renovation projects for the municipalities and service clubs during the 1984-85 school year. The two renovation projects included the reroofing of the caretaker's home for the Fall River Water Department and the reinforcement of the roof for the Bluffs building in Swansea.

Several items of new equipment have been purchased including 10" engine lathes, vertical millers, hand-feed surface grinder, paint spray booth, MacPherson strut compressor, offset duplicating press, pasteup table, reach-in freezer, power hacksaw, range bank, sandblasting unit, metal cutting bandsaw, air compressor, disc grinder, a flow tester and radiator lift, automotive two post life, reach-in refrigerator, and arc welders.

The following pieces of computerized control equipment were purchased: turning machine, automotive tuneup unit, and drafting equipment. A total of seven (7) new microcomputers have been purchased in the development of our second microcomputer laboratory.

The Main Office has been renovated. A new office complex has been developed for the Assistant Director and Coordinators. A new telephone system has been approved and is currently being installed. The master school clock has been replaced and updated.

The Math Department has spearheaded the use of computers and the development of a computer literacy course for all freshmen.

The second microcomputer laboratory has been set up to be used with word processing software as well as computer assisted instruction software and to teach keyboarding skills. Word Processing instruction has been added to both the Medical and Dental Assistant Office Management courses.

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The school staff continues to arrange for students to develop socially. Forty-five students attended the Durfee High School production of "You're A Good Man Charlie Brown". Two hundred and sixty students visited the Science Museum in Boston assisted by thirtythree volunteer parent chaperones. The annual Red Cross Blood Drive was held on December 19th. Eighty-one donors signed up, 70 units of blood were collected. Of these donors, 40 were classified as first-time donors. Twenty-four students volunteered to help.

The Administration has been working on the recommendations identified by the Visiting Committee representing the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. A two year followup report will be prepared in June.

Preliminary plans have been prepared to renovate the Culinary Arts kitchen and Tea Room so that these facilities can be reorganized more efficiently.

The 1984-85 school budget was approved by the School Committee in the amount of \$3,714,332. This budget reflects a five percent salary increase for all staff. The assessments to the communities are as follows:

This school as the second lowest per pupil cost of all the regional vocational technical schools in the Commonwealth.

The appropriation accounts have been computerized using the MASBO software programs and support services connected with a dedicated telephone line to the Old Colony Regional Vocational Technical School's mainframe computer in Rochester. As a result of this hookup the accounts are being managed on an encumbrance accounting system.

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The teaching assignments for the English Department were changed with the result being English and Literature classes are now taught by different instructors.

The new Admissions Policy approved by the Department of Education and School Committee has been implemented. 475 eighth grade students submitted applications which were scored using the approved point system. Each application was rank ordered and the student selected based on the quoto system. Sixty-two percent of the students received their first choice of shop, 18% received their second choice of shop, and 11% received their third choice of shop. In addition, the admissions into each shop were based on the same quota system. A total of 47 Special Needs students were admitted using the quota system.

A Bay State Skills Grant was prepared working with the Office of Economic Development and representatives of Taco Inc. to develop welders to meet the needs of this company. The company must supply matching amounts of funds through in-kind services as part of the grant proposal. A class of twenty students were enrolled.

Two (2) Commonwealth In-Service Institute grants were prepared and funded allowing an adjunct professor from the University of Massachusetts to teach courses leading to certification in Special Education for 17 of our shop instructors.

A Summer Remedial Math Program was offered to 75 incoming freshmen students. Forty-five (45) students started the four week program and 37 completed the program.

For the fourth consecutive year all of the graduates from the Dental Assistant Program were hired to work in dental offices in the area.

The foundation has been laid for the development of a National Honor Society. A charter has been purchased and a chapter should be developed to include members of this year's senior class.

The building's closed circuit education television has been interconnected with the Fall River Cable Television Company.

As a result of the testing done under the Basic Skills Improvement Program the following percentages indicate the minimum competency level achieved by our ninth grade students: Reading - 94%, Writing -95%, Math - 92%, and Listening - 98%. Provisions have been made to help all students who have not passed the minimum competency in Math, Writing, and Reading. Our standard for measuring students in Math is 7% higher than the median cutting score for the state.

Major work has been done for the Fall River Fire Department in renovating an ambulance into a fire inspection van. This project included body work and a complete paint job. The Fall River School Department has had two police cruisers refurbished for security purposes at the Durfee High School facilities. The Painting and Decorating Department has made 300 signs for the Public Works Department. A new 2½" gas supply line has been installed by the Plumbing students to the new paint spray booth in Auto Body. A new storage cabinet has been built for the Guidance Department. The Salvation Army Van has been made operational by the Auto Mechanics Department. The Culinary Arts Department has assumed the responsibility of cooking food for the cafeteria hot lunch program. The Graphic Arts Department has been involved in the printing of a cookbook. The Electrical students have been involved in maintenance projects around the building and the installation of the vandal alarm.

The Commissioner of Education has gone on record as commending regional vocational schools for the strong academic curriculum required of our students. The recognition given by the Commissioner is most appropriate because the curriculum at this school requires students to pass four (4) years of English, four (4) years of Shop Tech, four (4) years of shop they have selected, and they must take four (4) years of Math. We currently have the longest school day of any high school in this area.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our faculty, support staff, School Committee, and Advisory Committees for all of their efforts in support of the goals and objectives of this school.

The Insurance Service Office has reevaluated our capability of supplying water with Tankers. It appears at this time that we are capable of supplying a sufficient quantity of water with our Tankers to be able to reduce our Fire Rating and subsequently lower the insurance rates for both commercial and residential property owners in most areas of the Town.

At the present time a formal Firefighter Training Program is being devised for both Full-Time and Call Firefighters. This is being done with Training Manuals obtained by this Department as well as Training Aids that are available through the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy.

I am in hopes of being able to send various members of this Department to the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland, this year to receive special training in various aspects of the Fire Service. The cost to the Town will be minimal due to the fact that the Federal Government reimburses the students for travel expenses and the cost for room and board is extremely reasonable.

Because of the growing problem of water becoming polluted from underground gasoline storage tanks leaking, I strongly urge the people of Westport to support future by-laws which will be submitted at a future Town Meeting. As these underground tanks get older, they naturally deteriorate and product within seeps into the surrounding soil and in several cases has found its way into water sources which feed area wells. No area of Westport is safe from this problem, because there are underground tanks throughout the entire Town.

RE: Annual Shellfish Department Report to the Town for the year ending December 31st 1984.

Dear Board:

Nearly three decades ago harvests of the Westport shellfisheries mainstay, the quahaug, began declining. The general downward trend continued until last year's record catch of 12,723 bushels worth 573,676 dollars. When the 1983 quahaug harvest level was recorded it was not entirely clear whether the statistics were witness to a true reversal of declining quahaug stocks or a reflection of transient events. The current quahaug harvest of 12,663 bushels not only revalled the '83 record catch but with a value of 725,194 dollars was actually worth more due to enhanced market values for quahaugs as well as all other shellfish species. Aside from the economic benefits our citizens derived from the '84 quahaug harvest it also represents a significant indicator of a rebounding quahaug population. In fact if it were not for shellfishing closures due to contamination, inclement weather and a brief period of dramatically depressed market prices, which tended to deter quahauging, the '84 harvest may have well surpassed that of 1983. Burgeoning quahaug stocks seem to be further substaniated by means of shellfish surveys through which several juvenile year classes (i.e. individuals in progressively older age brackets) of quahaugs have been observed in dense concentrations of between 0.5 and 15.75 individuals per square foot which when recruited into the fishery (i.e. become of legal harvestable size) will afford Westport residents some very satisfactory quahauging over the next three to five years.

Shellfish surveys are also revealing some very exciting information about the propagation program; the quahaugs being reared for grow out and introduction into the river are not only reproducing more successfully than native stock but are also interbreeding with the native quahaug. This observation fulfills the final experimental aspect of a tripartite program goal. In the 1982 and 1983 Annual Town Reports I reported on our ability to successfully raise very tiny quahaugs to the size where they would most likely survive the wild and then on the actual ability of these quahaugs to survive in and adapt to the river, both aspects of which have in part been ascribed to the factors

contributing to revitalization of the quahaug fishery. Now, in achieving the third goal we are engaged in what might be termed quahaug husbandry. The hatchery produced quahaugs employed in the program are specially breed for fast growth and great fecundity among other characteristics. Cross breeding between hatchery quahaugs and the already hearty native quahaug is a genetic shot in the arm for succeeding generations imparting not only what is known as hybrid vigor (i.e. a larger assortment of genes for survival and proliferation) but also the expression of certain characteristics amenable to improvement of a fishery such as faster growth and greater fecundity. It is clear these subtle results of quahaug propagation are having a much more profound beneficial impact on the resource and its fishery compared to the more obvious results from the put and take of seed rearing. However, there is one note of caution. As of late nature has been benevolent in providing the correct environmental conditions at just the proper times for successful quahaug spawning and concomitant seed sets. Yet these conditions do not always occur when needed and set failures ensue. For this reason the Department is ever endeavoring to expand the seed rearing program in anticipation of compensating for the aftermath of a set failure. Of course, program expansion during natural periods of quahaug prosperity will serve to heighten the already present fishery benefits.

During 1984 approximately 200,000 quahaugs were reared and then broadcast into the river. This figure represents a twenty-five percent increase in the number of seed processed over the preiouvs year. In 1985 the program will once again expand to accommodate 297,400 quahaugs. A major factor enabling the forthcoming enlargement involves some recently concluded experiments with novel aquacultural devices. The economy of construction, maintenance and logistics achieved by utilizing off-bottom trays relative to more costly and traditional rafting techniques allows the savings to be rechanneled into the purchase of greater seed amounts. Ancillary research into the quahaug burrowing medium, that is sediments, used in the trays has shown a mixture of sand with grain sizes ranging from between 0.25 and 1.0 millimeters not only provides for seed survival equal to that obtained with rafting methods (For raft culture reviews see 1981-1982 Annual Reports) but also yields enhanced growth rates. Faster growth rates means that less effort has to be expended towards protecting in onbottom pens and for an additional year seed which has not reached the size of probable survival in the wild.

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Plans are in effect to relay from Mount Hope Bay to the West Branch some 1,100 bushels of quahaugs. Normally these shellfish would go to the Town of Swansea at no cost to the Town under a contract with a local power company. Unfortunately the total of Swansea's waters have come under a contaminated shellfishing band and the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries has awarded the remainder of the contract to be fulfilled with Westport. This windfall means a savings to Westport of 11,000 dollars in relay costs and will augment the fisheries' value by 45,000 dollars.

Another plus for the Westport shellfisheries is the current and large scallop set. Should the very delicate seed scallops survive the trials and tribulations of natural environmental fluctuations, in any appreciable numbers, until recruitment into the fishery, then the 1985-1986 scallop season may be among better in recent memory. In order to bolster scallop recruitment 1,043 bushels of seed scallops have been relocated from areas where the known probability of scallop survival is between 0 and 10 percent to areas where they have a known 90 to 100 percent survival rate. Based on scallop growth data recently collected in conjunction with the Woods Hole Marine Biological Laboratory, it is estimated the relocated seed scallops will add 5,000 to 7,000 bushels of adult scallops, worth approximately 226,800 dollars, to next year's crop.

As just noted, we have been working with the Woods Hole Marine Biological Laboratory in the collection of data on basic scallop biology such as growth rates and reproductive cycles. It is not clear, just yet, as to how the data might be used to develop a scallop propagation program analogous to the quahaug program, however a portion of the information already may be used in and have significant bearing on the process which determines the scallop fishing season opening date. Research into scallop biology will be an ongoing and permanent part of our efforts until such time sufficient data emerges to establish more effective scallop management.

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The contract between the Towns of Dartmouth and Westport whereby a portion of Westport's contaminated oyster reseource is relayed into the Slocum River, for natural depuration, in exchange for the privilege of Westport citizens to oyster in Dartmouth on Westport shellfish licenses and permits will be consumated this spring first annual relay of upwards of 1,500 bushels per year. The contract is critical if Westport residents are to continue enjoying the fruits of oystering. Ongoing studies of our contamination problem are showing the waters overlying Westport's principal oyster beds are not flushing clean as previously noted hence we may witness resumption of the oyster fishery only with pollution mitigation. Moreover, a recently conducted water quality survey by the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Quality Engineering found most if not all other likely areas within the river suitable to establishing new oyster beds are contaminated. Therefore, the creation of new oyster beds in Town is unlikely. The relay will have the added advantage of permitting cultivation of the oyster beds so that when we finally do clean up our waters oystermen will find thriving beds rather than a dead bottom, so-called which is indicative of a neglected oyster resource.

Foremost in everyone's mind, I am sure, is the contaminated shellfish closure within the East Branch and efforts to reopen shellfish beds north of Gunning Island. The Board of Health sponsored Boston University study group with assistance of the Shellfish Constable began in August to collect bacterial, hydrographic and other types of data pertinent to tracing pollution sources. Although it is still early to draw definite conclusions from the data given the study will not be complete for some 8 months a trend is emerging: During the dry portions of the year heavy concentrations of bacteria apparently contributing significantly to the river pollution are emanating from intertidal and tributary sites located between Hixbridge and Reed Road.

The Shellfish Advisory Committee/Shellfish Department sponsored GHR Analytical Laboratory study of the waters overlying closed shellfish beds for the purposes of establishing a case with the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Quality Engineer for conditional shellfishing openings while awaiting pollution abatement also began in August with the Shellfish Constable as an integral part of the sample gathering process. To date results for the waters west and north of Cadman Neck, the location of the principal oyster beds, are not encouraging as bacterial levels even during periods of little or no rain remain well above exceptable harvest levels. For the water east and south of Cadmen Neck recently closed to shellfishing, which encompasses areas of extensive clam and quahaug populations, test results seem very favorable toward establishing conditions under which shellfishing will be periodically reopened.

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The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Quality Engineering (D.E.Q.E.) has rearranged the shellfishing closure line from a southeast/northwest orientation running from Petty's Heights to Great Island View Road to a east/west orientation running from Petty's Heights to Julia's Way. The change in closure line location has resulted in the loss of approximately 6 more acres of moderately productive shellfish beds within the East Branch. More dramatic, the D.E.Q.E. changed on August 15, 1984 the shellfishing closure status in the area between the above line and Cadman Neck from an emergency closure which must be updated every thirty days to a permanent closure which need be re-examined only every two years or upon petition by the Board of Selectmen. It is indeed sad the D.E.Q.E. had not been just a little more patient in its decision for a permanent closure because had they waited and re-examined the above waters at the end of August or beginning of September the emergency losure could have been lifted based on the G.H.R. study results. The reopening process will now be more involved and difficult. None-the-less the D.E.Q.E. has agreed, in writing, to review the results of our studies as a basis for shellfishing openings, giving us a substantial hope for the shellfisheries.

The Shellfish Constable/Harbor Master field office located on the Town Wharf will be operational this spring. Progress on the office has been pains takingly due the waiting periods on construction materials specially required under flood plain zoning. Interior work will continue through the winter. Currently we have built a structure with an estimated .10,000 dollar value for under 4,000 dollars. Once occupied the new office should provide a mmuch more strategic staging area for Harbor Master and shellfish related activities from which we may better serve the Town.

The process of non-criminal citations for shellfishing violations will also be operational this spring. This new law enforcement approach will not only allow a more expedient method of dealing with violations but at the same time generate revenues perhaps upwards of 5,000 dollars per year for the Town.

The Shellfish Advisory Committee which of late has been acting as the forum for pollution related matters and been responsible for initiating many of the programs gear toward inevitable clean up of our shellfish producing waters is also actively engaged in efforts to establish a salt water passage between The Let and Buzzards. Marine fisheries experts have confirmed our beliefs that the controled ingress and egress of water through East Beach will help restore shellfish productivity in The Let and to a lesser degree the Horseneck and Speaking Rock Channel area. To this end the Committee has been working along with engineers to develop the strategy required to obtain this opening. However, the task ahead is difficult because the permit process requires the Town demonstrate the Let was in the recent past opened to the sea inorder to allow reestablishment of that opening. Your help is needed. If you have any information documenting an open Let please contact the Shellfish Advisory Committee in care of the Selectmen's Office.

With the issuance of a Provisional License the committee can now resume its task of monitoring the cable television system's installation and operation.

Hopefully the 1985 Annual Report will contain the long awaited news that cable television is indeed a reality in Westport.

REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

In 1984 the Solid Waste Disposal Committee met on many occasions to study the alternatives for the disposal of Westport's refuge. The life span of the existing Town landfill off Hix Bridge Road is down to five or six years. Spurred on by the need for disposal alternatives, we met with representatives of SEMass/Energy Answers Corporation (proposing a resource-recovery, waste-to-energy facility in Rochester, Ma., for 1987-88) and the Fall River Department of Public Works (discussing the existing incinerator in Fall River).

In an attempt to analyze the matter thoroughly we accepted technical assistance from SRPEDD in the form of a study, "General Cost Comparison -- Solid Waste Disposal Options" prepared in November 1984 for the Town of Westport. During 1984, we also researched any guidelines and plans on solid waste disposal available from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. We consulted with Town Counsel and we decided to meet with the local waste haulers.

Planning ahead in the long range, an article was placed on the December 1984 Special Town Meeting Warrant with respect to the SEMass alternative. It was tabled until the next Annual Town Meeting.

Planning in the short range, the Committee voted to eliminate from the Town landfill site all burnables by July 1985. Furthermore, all commercial refuse (collected in a container such as a dumpster or a roll-off) would no longer be accepted at the landfill. The possibilities of a contract with Fall River for residential trash disposal at its incinerator facility for a period of up to three years was discussed. Whether the transport to Fall River would be within the existing framework of services as they are (residents to landfill or private trash collectors) or would be from a new framework of town-wide collection and disposal of residential trash became a dilemma of the Committee. More research and articles on the short-term alternatives will continue in 1985.

Recycling continued at the landfill site in an effort to save space, conserve resources, and provide some revenue to the Town of Westport. Scrap metals, white goods, newspapers and magazines, and glass were sold at market conditions. Hazardous substances which in the past have been part of the landfill waste input were spotlighted in the may Household Hazardous Waste Day, collected from conscientious residents, and removed from the Town by a licensed hazardous waste hauler. The environmental impact of our waste stream and the landfill will continue to be a concern in 1985.

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REPORT OF THE HARBOR MASTER

Dear Members:

With the purchase, this year, of VHF marine radios, the Harbor Master has been able to monitor and respond more directly and successfully to vessel distress calls and is one reason for increased numbers of search and rescue missions. The radios also provide for direct communications with the Coast Guard.

Larger number of boating mishaps is also the result of not only increasing boating interest but also a greater boat traffic from vessels which are leaving highly regulated ports and seeking ports such as Westport which have yet to come under the full extent of local control. Some of these vessels have sought refuge in Westport to avoid fees and taxation. Unfortunatley, a part time department has little time to deal with this matter.

Moorings is another problem area due to increased numbers, some of which are totally inadequate for the attached vessel, are continuing to encroach on our navigable waters and shellfish beds. In the past, the Harbor Master has submitted mooring rules and regulations for consideration unsuccessfully. Eventually the Town will have to accept some sort of mooring program and associated fee structure or face an unsafe harbor for boaters.

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At the April, 1984 town election Mr. James L. Sharples was re-elected to fill a 5-year term and Mr. William Rogers was elected to fill an unexpired term left by Mr. Antonio B. Gracia, Jr. and subsequently Mr. Leo St. Onge who was appointed in November, 1983 pending the town election.

In April, 1984 Mr. Thomas Berdick was removed from his position as executive director by the Board of Commissioners. The former executive director, Gerald S. Coutinho, was hired as acting director until June, 1984 when Mr. James W. Coyne, Jr. was hired to fill the position.

The Authority celebrated the 10th anniversary of the occupancy of Greenwood Terrace in August. It was attended by local and state officials as well as Town residents and guests.

The Authority was granted \$2,400 to conduct energy conservation improvements within the next year. A grant was also received in the amount of \$36,680 to conduct modernization projects which includes funds to correct a water corrosion problem that has been plaguing the project for some time.

We were fortunate in 1984 to continue our involvement with the Bristol County Home Care for Elderly, Inc. with the employment of two senior maintenance aides. We also utilized the services of two youngsters as maintenance aides through the Bristol County Training Consortium.

The Westport Community Nurses conducted a flu clinic in October and held blood pressure clinics once a month in the community hall. The Nutrition Program for the elderly carried on their work to serve hot meals every weekday to persons 59 years of age and over. Bingo games were organized on a weekly basis by the senior citizens group and the Council on Aging conducted several podiatry clinics in the community hall at Greenwood Terrace. The Authority is grateful to the scouting groups in Westport who enrich the lives of residents at Greenwood Terrace during the holidays by singing Christmas carols and giving gifts to the elderly and handicapped.

The Board meets in the Planning Board room at the Town Hall on the first, third and fifth Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m.

During the past year, the Board held 27 meetings, among which were three public hearings as follows: one held for proposed zoning amendments to the zoning by-law; one held to update the Board's Rules and Regulations governing the subdivision of land; and one held for a revision to a subdivision which was subsequently approved. The Board received two applications for preliminary subdivisions; one of 11 lots which was disapproved; and one of two lots which was approved. The Board received 24 plans for division of land where subdivision approval is not required, which plans created a total of 48 new lots. 20 of these plans were endorsed as "Approval Not Required" by the Planning Board. The remaining 4 plans were disapproved, of which 2 were subsequently endorsed after the Board of Appeals granted a variance. In addition, three other plans were endorsed by the Planning Board after having received approval from the Board of Appeals.

John D. Assad was appointed to the Sewer Study Committee, with Edmund Medeiros appointed as alternate. Edmund Medeiros was also appointed to the Solid Waste Committee, as well as to the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) for the year. Richard W. Pratt was appointed to the Historical Commission. There were minor changes made in the Board's Rules and Regulations governing the Subdivision of Land during the year 1984.

FISH COMMISSIONERS

Board of Selectmen Town Hall 812 Main Rd. Westport, Massachusetts

Dear. Mr. Chairman:

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The 1984 activities of the Fish Commissioners were directed towards the following areas:

- 1. The number one priority of the Fish Commissioners continues to be a high bacterial count in the East Branch of the Westport River forcing more of that area to be closed to both Commercial and Recreational Fishermen. Through the efforts of the Board of Health, Shellfish Advisory Commission and Shellfish Warden, articles were presented and passed at the annual Town Meeting to appropriate monies to determine exact sources of this pollution. The Fish Commissioners will monitor the results of this program and when completed press for swift action by the Board of Health and Town Counsel to have those responsible take immediate corrective measures.
- 2. The Fish Commissioners are currently engaged with Government and State Officials regarding dredging projects along the Southern New England Coast. These projects will result in approximately ten (10) million yards of Dredge Material and these agencies are seeking a suitable disposal site for these materials. The Fish Commissioners have notified involved agencies both verbally and in written form that we strongly oppose any dumping of Dredge Material at sea. It is requested that shore-side facilities be established for the proper disposal of the Dredge Material.

Although these dredging projects can be considered vital to the fishing industry along the Southern New England Coast, the dumping of Dredge Material would be **extremely** harmful to marine life if disposed of at sea. Although certain areas are more productive than others, there is **no** area that does not produce or spawn some marine life. Negotiations with these agencies will continue into 1985.

3. The Fish Commissioners are currently investigating the feasibility of installing a Herring Run in the vicinity of Hoyt Manufacturing at the Dam. This study is in progress with the Mass. Div. of Marine Fisheries. If this site proves feasible, monies will be solicited from the Saltonstall-Kennedy Fund which reviews these types of programs for Government Assistance for the Fishing Industry.

4. During the 1984 year, the fishermen and concerned residents formed "The Westport Fishermens Association". The purpose of this association is to "preserve and protect" the waters of Westport and surrounding areas. The Fish Commissioners support this new and growing organization and look forward to working with them to completely eliminate the pollution in this river.

The Fish Commissioners announce that the Westport Fishermens Association has established a 24 hour pollution Hot Line. By telephoning 636-8104 witnesses can report overflowing septic systems, dumping of oil, etc. All complaints, acording to WFA, will be filed in the name of WFA with the Board of Health and results will be monitored by the Fishermen's Assoc.

RE: Annual Wharfinger's Report to the Town for the year ending December, 1984

Dear Board:

The Town Wharfs are currently accomodating some 30 commercial fishing vessels ranging in size from 18 to 72 feet and 9 vessels ranging in size from 20 to 50 feet in length are enrolled on the Wharfinger's waiting list. The overall beam and length of new or replacement vessels continues to increase thereby placing further burdens on existing over crowding and congestion on the Wharfs.

The permit process for the dredging of the mud dock, so-called, is nearly complete with the submission of a laboratory analysis of the sediments involved. Dredging should commence and be complete sometime this coming March or April. The wharfinger has received a preliminary engineers draft report on the condition of the Wharfs and plans for repair and expansion. The report is now under review for local comment before issuance of the final report. Briefly, the report indicates the Wharfs are in dire need of major repairs and to alleviate overcrowding some minor expansion and rearrangement of the berthing areas is required. Project costs have not yet been fixed but will at least be in range of between 300,000 and 500,000 dollars. During 1985 the above report will be used to obtain the necessary permits for Wharf construciton which in turn will be the basis to obtain federal and state grants. The remainder of the monies or the local cost share will be sought at the 1986 Annual Town Meeting with pay back to the Town to be requested through Wharf Fees and the Municipal Waterways Fund.

Revenues generated through Wharf Fees amount to 8,352 dollars this year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

In 1984, the Westport School Committee and Administration devoted much attention to (a) the K-12 curriculum study of English/Language, Arts, Mathematics, and Science conducted by the New England School Development Council (NESDEC) (b) the reorganization of the system's administration of curriculum and instruction and the business operation (c) the Special Needs Compliance Review follow up (d) the upgrading of the Westport Public Schools testing program and (e) transportation concerns.

I. The New England School Development Council Study

The main thrust of the NESDEC study was to evaluate the student learning process in several major curriculum areas and to encourage direct program improvement efforts. More specifically, the efforts spent were (1) to provide citizens, students, parents, and school personnel with accurate and useful information about the quality of Westport public education and (2) to provide citizens, school committee and school personnel with accurate and useful curriculum information to determine our process and make program improvements.

One of the most important excerpt of this study was:

That persons or a person be identified and charged with the responsibility of bringing together those who must implement the program based on established goals and objectives. Some focus needs to be provided in the curriculum and someone needs to be charged with that singular responsibility.

II. Reorganization of System's Administration

The Westport School Committee and Administration concurring with the NESDEC study and with the Superintendent's Plan for Excellence serving as a catalyst, the School Committee established an Ad Hoc Committee. This Committee consisted of Mr. James Cronin, Mrs. Deborah Kubik, Mrs. Constance MacDonald, Dr. Alan Powers, Mr. Stanford A. Moss, Mr. James Howard, Jr., Mr. David Allen, Mr. Brett Beaulieu, Mrs. Mariette Paine, Mr. Charles Menard, and Mr. John Mello.

The Ad Hoc Committee addressed the concerns identified in the Superintendent's charge to them. After several months of hearing testimony from all personnel and studying the facts, the Committee recommended the establishing of the positions of Business Manager and the Director of Curriculum and Instruction.

Subsequently, the School Committee voted to restore these two positions to the School Department's staffing. A few months later Mr. Leon J. Lakin of Gorham, New Hampshire was appointed to the position of Business Manager. Mr. Lakin reported in July and in the short time that he has been with us, he has demonstrated that he possesses all the managerial skills necessary to provide the School Department with sound financial decisions.

The Committee and Administration agreed to delay the appointment of a Director of Curriculum and Instruction until the second half of the 1984-1985 school year. This would allow us to thoroughly prepare for the 1985-1986 school year.

III. Special Needs Compliance Review Follow Up

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In last years' annual report, the Town was made aware of a Special Needs Compliance Review conducted by the State Department of Education. Simply stated, the review was to see how well the Westport School's Special Education programs, services, and procedures adheres to the rules and regulations of Chapter 766.

As a result of that Review, we were found in partial or complete noncompliance in sixty seven (67) out of one hundred fifty-three (153) items. In April of 1984, we submitted an Action Plan which detailed now we would address each item, and the timeline in which the items would be resolved. On Wednesday, December 12, 1984, four representatives from the State Department of Education returned to Westport to follow-up on our progress. The results of the visit were very encouraging. As overwhelmed as the Department of Education was with the magnitude of the noncompliance cited last November, they were equally overwhelmed with the progress we have made in addressing the issues. We are close to full compliance with approximately fifty-five (55) of sixty-seven (67) items.

We now have a Kindergarten Screening, and preschool screening program that meets the requirements of the law. Our forms and procedures have been corrected to reflect the regulations. Our High School has been given credit for developing vocational, and other options in addressing special needs situations. Every school building was cited for significant program improvement. Another impressive factor was the fact that the State Department has not received a complaint in over a year and a half which reflects quite an improvement over a school ysstem that was number one in parental complaints two years ago.

The success achieved was built on a foundation bonded with a spirit of dedication on the part of the entire staff, and particularly to the leadership demonstrated by Mr. Stephen Levine, the Director of Pupil Personnel Services.

IV. Testing Program

In order to make our systemwide testing program more effective, the School Committee authorized the Administration to:

- a. Administer the IOWA Test of Basic Skills to Grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 9.
- b. Add the subtest on cognitive abilities to the testing program.
- c. Include individual and group item analysis.

By implementing these changes we will be in a better position to truly assess any strengths, weaknesses, or trends.

V. Transportation Concerns

Last year we transported 2,305 students to and from school. This figure represents the number of Westport children who attended Westport Public Schools, St. George Parochial School as well as those Special Needs students in out of district placement. In performing this service, the School Department expended \$378,812 in FY'84. Of this amount we should expect approximately 48% reimbursement from the State.

This year, the Committee, with the Administration addressed the concerns of the parents of Westport children attending St. George. Through the effort of Mr. Leon J. Lakin, and the assistance of others, we were able to provide the transportation for the St. George's School children in compliance with their school schedule.

Other noteworthy accomplishments were: (a) the analysis and selection of basal readers (K-8), (b) the development of the elmentary Social Studies and Science Compendia, (c) the adoption of a Social Studies textbook (K-5), (d) the establishment of a computer program in the elementary schools in grades 3-5, as well as in the Mathematics department of the High School and the Westport Middle School.

At the same time, the following took place:

I. Major Maintenance

Major maintenance work throughout the Westport Public School buildings were continued with the initiation of an Energy Savings System for the buildings; the reroofing of the Alice A. Macomber School, as well as critical areas of the Westport High School; the partitioning of the Westport High School English and Science areas.

A great deal of thanks is extended to the Town for its support in these matters.

II. Energy Savings Grant

In conjunction with the School Department's Energy Savings Program, the Westport School Department was successful in obtaining a State School Improvement Grant totaling \$86,767.15 for the Energy Savings Program at the Westport Middle School (\$41,125.10), and the Alice A. Macomber School (\$45,642.05). Mr. Leon Lakin, our Business Manager has submitted a proposal for additional grant money. We will keep you informed of our success in this matter.

III. Negotiations

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Labor contract negotiations continued through most of 1984. It should be noted that although multi-year contracts were negotiated, and ratified in prior years, the School Department expended considerable time and effort in negotiating succeeding salary adjustments.

IV. Personnel

This past year the Westport School Department accepted the retirement of three of its staff. They were Mrs. Albertina Medeiros, Grade 5 teacher at Westport Elementary School after 16 years, Mr. Francisco Souza, Science Teacher, Westport High School, after 30 years, and Mr. John Perry, Head Custodian, Westport High School after 25 years. To all three we extend our gratitude for everything they did on behalf of the students of Westport.

We were all saddened by the death of Mrs. Myrtle Stone this past summer. In 18½ years of commitment to the students of Westport Mrs. Stone served as Coordinator of Curriculum, and classroom teacher. She will be long remembered by many.

This past year Mr. George Rodrigues submitted his resignation as member of the Westport School Committee after thirteen years of service. We are grateful for his contribution and we wish him good fortune.

V. High School Accreditation

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Accreditation of Westport High School was awarded by the New England Commission on Public Schools at its March meeting. The approval was based on the report submitted by the Visiting Committee composed of twelve educators from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.

As we enter into preparation of our Fiscal Year 1986 budget, we once again feel the fiscal crunch upon us. With the wonderful team work of our administrators, staff, (both professional and non-professional) and parents we optimistically look toward renewed success for the Westport Public Schools.

In conclusion, I appreciate the many contributions of the entire staff, students, and parents to make our good school system better.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

This report reflects the July-December 1984 period.

Our school lunch program is functioning very well and is selfsupporting financially. During the above period the following number of lunches were served:

Students 71,591 (Average per day 994)

Due to a dangerous deteriating condition at the Middle School, the outside brick bus ports have been removed. We plan to reset the terrace bricks and plant shrubbery in that area this spring.

The Elementary School will need to have its playground area reloamed and seeded. This action will help to reduce dust and dirt entering the building and will remove a safety hazzard on the playground.

Replaced roofs have been completed for parts of the High School and Macomber School. Inspection during the work activity indicated that the roofs were in poor condition. Proposals for partial cost recovery have been written and submitted to the appropriate agency. The new partitions for the English and Science areas at the High School have resulted in an improved functional use of existing space. We do have a contract dispute and are in the process of a resolution that will be satisfactory to the town.

Transportation specifications for the 1985-88 period are in the process of being drafted for School Committee approval or revision. Seventeen buses and one station wagon presently serve our regular school pupils. The Sanford Road area continues to be a problem to serve due to a substantial number of pupils living in that area of town.

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1984 PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

The Pupil Personnel Services Annual Report for 1984 would have to be highlighted by the Special Education Compliance Review. In an investigation of our Special Education program, procedures, and services conducted by the State Department of Education at the end of 1983 and reported in early 1984, the Westport School Department was found to have degrees of noncompliance in 67 out of 153 issues. The major task became one of designing an Action Plan that would bring Westport Schools into compliance within a reasonable time period. The initial Action Plan filed with the State Department of Education indicated that it would be possible to resolve all the issues by September 1986. I am pleased to report to you at this time that we will be able to resolve all 67 issues by the end of the 1984/85 school year. This tremendous accomplishment would not have been possible without the cooperation of the School Committee, Supterintendent, administrators, and all faculty members. A special debt of gratitude is due Mrs. Kathryn Rallis, the School Psychologist and Early Education Team Leader, who was responsible for developing the procedures, forms, and programs in early elementary education which resolved over 30 of the 67 issues.

Outside of Special Education, I would like to highlight the area of testing. Two significant changes occurred in our testing program during 1984. The first was the Basic Skills program. Through the work of the Basic Skills Task Force, changes were made in our local Basic Skills plan that made the local plan more consistent with the state regulations. The changes also increased the elementary pasing standard and made the administration of the test more efficient and cost effective.

Another significant change is occurring in the area of standardized testing. The School Committee has authorized an expansion of our testing program that will allow us now, not only to look at the youngster's overall scores, but to look at the individual concepts and indicate strengths and weaknesses within each area. These results will be very beneficial in helping us identify correct and appropriate programs for the students from year to year as they progress through the school system.

Overall, 1984 has been a very positive year in the area of Pupil Personnel Services. We look forward to continue success in 1985 and the years after.
