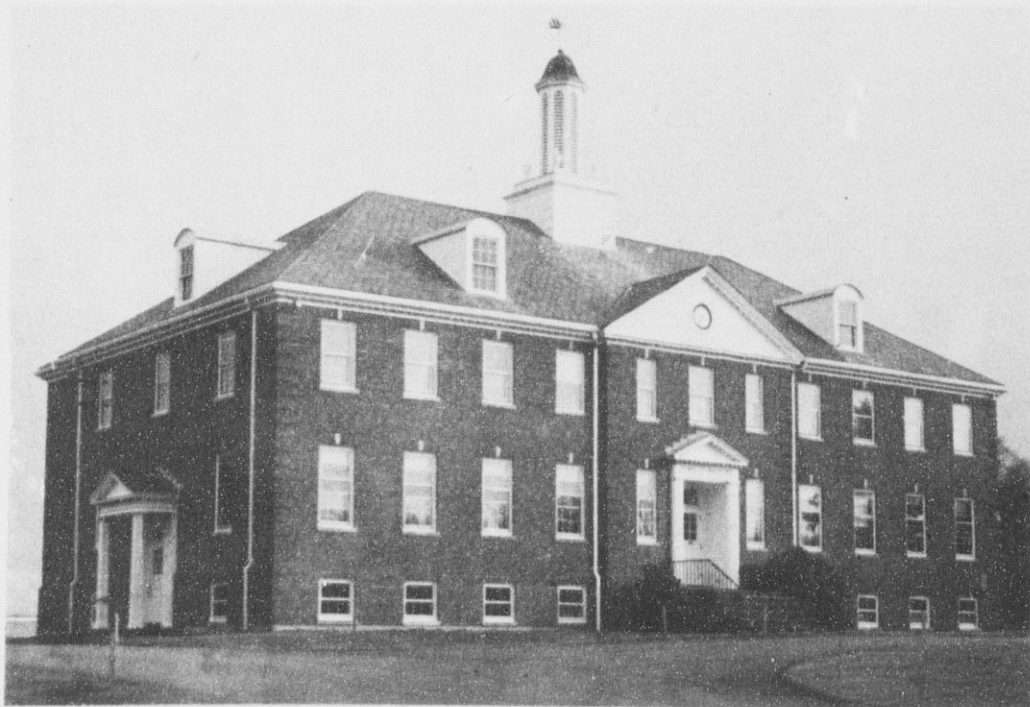

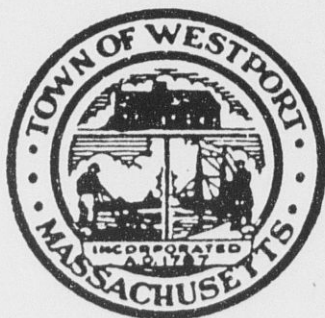

TOWN OF WESTPORT

Westport was settled in 1670 as a locality within the town of Dartmouth. In 1787 this locality was incorporated as a separate town. The name Westport was not an arbitrary choice. The boundary lines of older maps do not correspond exactly with their modern counterparts, so that Massachusetts, New England's largest state at the time, included present day Maine. Many people who lived in Dartmouth township traded furs with the Indians and went fishing all along the Maine coast. Some of the sailing ships would leave port at Westport Harbor and sail the entire length of the then Massachusetts coastline. When sailors spoke of their voyage, they would tell of sailing from the west port to the east port of Massachusetts. So when it came time to name the part of Dartmouth, the General Court of Boston allowed the town fathers to name it after the harbor and to be called Westport.

The town had cobbler shops, blacksmith shops, forge mills, a grist mill, as well as a cotton mill located where Westport Factory now stands; industries located at the Head and at the Point included shipyards, sail lofts and tailor shops. The shipyard built whaling vessels that sailed all over the world. This industry grew so rapidly that a fleet of twenty to thirty ships called Westport their home port.

The 1787 division of Westport from Dartmouth put Westport under the leadership of a Board of Selectmen. The town has retained that type of local government down through the centuries and even today the policies of the Town are decided upon each April by an open town meeting of registered voters.

Westport has a full-time police force and a full-time fire Department with trained EMT's and ambulance service.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

ANNUAL REPORT

For the Town of Westport nineteen eighty-five was a kaleidoscope of accomplishments, events, issues, and concerns, reflective of the diverse and changing nature of municipal government. This report attempts to highlight some of the major activities and their impact on the community.

PERSONNEL ISSUES

Few changes occurred in the area of personnel during 1985. George Leach's re-election in March was followed by a reorganization of the Board in which Ann Chandanais was chosen as Chairman, George Leach as Clerk, and Richard Desjardins continued as the third member of the Board. Most staff personnel remained the same with the notable exception of Plumbing and Gas Inspector E. Paul Vaillancourt who retired after serving the Town for twenty-four years. As the year progressed the need for additional clerical assistance in the Selectmen's and Building Departments became more apparent. The use of temporary clerks somewhat alleviated the problem, and the Board and staff were also extremely grateful to Susan Wood for her voluneer services during the summer.

Labor Relations including collective bargaining continued to consume a considerable amount of time for the Board of Selectmen's Department. However, some improvement can be expected since the number of grievances filed has decreased and union contract serttlements have been negotiated for two years rather than one year as has been the case in the past.

Recognizing that job descriptions were outdated and that a comparable compensation study would be beneficial, a Pay and Classification Study was initiated in 1985 for certain non-union positions and for positions covered by the Town Hall, Library and Cemetery Contract. To faciliate the process, professional personnel consultants from the Massachusetts Municipal Association were retained to prepare a set of position descriptions, a classification plan, a competitive compensation structure, and implementation guidelines. The final report should be available in early 1986. Hopefully, through this project a comprehensive, consistent compensation system will be established.

Another development in the personnel field was the availability of additional employee benefit options such as a Deferred Compensation program, health care insurance coverage with a Health Maintenance Organization and Credit Union

Payroll Deduction Plans. While not increasing municipal costs, these features provided a wider variety of benefit options to the employee.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION

Following the issuance of a provisional cable television license to United Cablevision Funding, L.P. in October 1984, local officials continued to assist United in its efforts to establish cable service in Westport. Since United did not meet all the requirements for a final license in October 1985, the provisional license was extended until January with the understanding that the cable company would be able to submit all the necessary documentation for a final license at the time. It is anticipated that the long, arduous, and complex process of issuing a cable television license will at last be completed in 1986 and service can then be made available to Westport residents.

As supervisors of the Town Hall building, the Selectmen began in 1985 to address the need for more space and handicapped accessibility at this municipal facility. Preliminary plans for a Town Hall addition were discussed and reviewed and it was agreed that this long term project would be more thoroughly pursued in the future.

Regulation of the Town's numerous vehicle sales and repair facilities was again an area requiring considerable time and effort by the Selectmen's office. On site inspections with subsequent notices to license holders whose properties needed improvement continued to be an annual procedure.

During the year all the Town bylaws, including the Zoning bylaws, were reviewed by the Selectmen's staff and considerable progress was made towards the publication of updated bylaw booklets. It is evident that the bylaw administration process will be substantially enhanced by the availability of these publications.

FISCAL CONCERNS

Westport like many other Massachusetts municipalities has begun to experience the fiscal impact of reduced federal aid, especially in the revenue sharing program, and restrictions in local revenue-raising capacity as imposed by Proposition 2 1/2. During 1985 Westport approached its tax levy limit for the first time since the 1981 imposition of the Proposition 2 1/2 State Law. At the same time the Town was faced with spiraling uncontrollable costs in the areas of retirement pension funding and liability insurance coverage. In the latter area, not only did insurance premiums substantially increase, but also as a condition of obtaining coverage, and expensive asbestos removal and encapsulation project in municipal buildings had to be undertaken.

Because of this fiscal squeeze between limited revenues and certain uncontrollable expenditure increases, it is imperative that the Town set financial priorities and develop a capital budget program. The days of unlimited funding for each Town department's "wish list" are gone. Local government must make choices in order to insure that the most crucial municipal needs are met.

ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

Activities in the field of environmental protection intensified during 1985 as previously funded projects were advanced and in some cases completed.

The Westport River continued to be a major focus of environmental concern. The locally funded study of the East Branch of the Westport River, aimed at locating sources of pollution, was expanded to include the West Branch. An initial report of findings was issued in October by Boston University's Department of Geology which had been contracted by the Board of Health to conduct the study. During this period an additional agent was also hired by the Board of Health to specialize in pollution control matters. In another river-related study, GHR Engineering Company under the supervision of the Shellfish Department investigated and analyzed the contamination problems in the polluted shellfish areas. The final report which should be available in the early 1986 will hopefully result in conditional openings for some areas of the East Branch now under shellfishing closure. To augment local officials' attempts to address problems associated with the river, the Westport River Defense Fund, with the assistance of a Massachusetts Environmental Management grant, issued its Westport River "Greenway Protection Plan" in June 1985. While the plan was conducted by a private non-profit organization, it should be noted that many of its recommendations to protect the Westport River as a valuable resource require local government action in the form of bylaw and regulation enactment.

Another aspect of environmental concern has been the stabilization of Westport's eroding sand dunes. In a cooperative effort sponsored by the Board of Selectmen, Conservation Commission and Bristol Conservation District, the "Horseneck Point Critical Area Treatment Project" was completed by the end of July. This endeavor addressed the protection of the fragile dunes in the Horseneck Point recreation and conservation beach area through the installation of 300' of sand fence, planting of 7 acres of beach grass, and installation of boulder barriers, protective gates and informational signs. Operation and maintenance of these protective measures is now totally under local jurisdiction and it is hoped that with public cooperation the project's purpose will be realized.

The need to start planning for the water supply needs in the northern portion of Westport motivated the Town to work with White's Restaurant and the City of

Fall River to extend a twelve inch water main from the Fall River line to the restaurant site. Learning that Whites Restaurant wished to tie into Fall River's municipal water system, the Town through special legislation and with Town Meeting approval, provided funding to ensure that the water main would be large enough for future expansion.

Solid Waste disposal remained a critical concern in 1985 as the Town's options became increasingly limited. First, attempts to contract with Fall River for solid waste disposal at its municipal incinerator reached a deadend. Then Selectmen were notified by SEMASS that its proposed resource recovery facility had secured the required amount of municipal waste and that any additional communities such as Westport would have to contract on a short term basis at a much higher rate. The imminent solid waste crisis will obviously require more and more effort by local officials who will be faced with limited alternatives and escalating disposal costs.

STATE, FEDERAL LEGISLATION AND COURT DECISIONS

The impact of federal and state laws and court decisions were once again felt as municipal officials grappled with the implication of adherence to the Fair Labor Standards Act, the Right to Know Law, Education Reform Legislation and Handicapped Accessibility Regulations. It became apparent that not only would time and effort be involved in the enforcement of most of these programs but also additional municipal costs.

In regard to another national program, Federal Flood Plain Insurance, the Town was notified that following passage of several local Zoning bylaw amendments, including acceptance of revised Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Westport was fully compliant with National Flood Insurance regulations.

OTHER ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS

Several other activities should be mentioned because of their significance to the Westport community.

Preparation for truly historical occurrence progressed as the Westport Historical Commission began coordinating the efforts for the Town's Bicentennial celebration in 1987. The focal point of activities will be July 1987 when the Town recognizes the two hundredth anniversary of its incorporation. Plans to make this a most memorable occasion will continue throughout the next few years. Along this vein, it should also be mentioned that Westport participated in the opening ceremonies and "Spirit Days" during the Bristol County Tricentennial. This celebration began with the opening ceremonies in Taunton with Sheila Martines as Mistress of Ceremonies, Bob Hope as honored guest, and

"Marvelous" Marvin Hagler as a surprise guest. This day ended with a successful evening with "Bob Hope in Person" held at Durfee High School. Various other events took place, highlighted by the "Spirit Days" held in the four cities of Bristol County - Attleboro, Taunton, Fall River and New Bedford. It might be interesting to note that the Bristol County Tricentennial logo (flag) was representative of the sixteen towns (stars) and four cities (stripes) in Bristol County. Let's hope that the spirit generated from this celebration continues through Westport's Bicentennial in 1987.

In a broader perspective, representatives of Westport, Massachusetts, joined with delegates from other "Westports" throughout the world in June 1985, to attend the first "World Convention of Westports" held in Westport, County Mayo, Ireland. Those in attendance described the occasion as an exciting sharing of information which fostered greater understanding of, and communication with, other Westports. So successful was the event that a second "World Convention of Westports" is already being planned for the fall of 1986 in Westport, N.Y.

Finally, an event which will long be remembered occurred on September 27, 1985, when Hurricane "Gloria" arrived with devastating force. Although the severity of damage was somewhat diminished by the low tides during the height of the storm, extensive tree damage, some flooding, property damage, and lengthy power outages did occur. While the hurricane was a sharp reminder that the Town can be subject to powerful natural forces, it also proved that careful emergency preparation can effect the impact. Employees in all Westport's emergency departments - Civil Defense, Police, Fire, Nursing - responded with dedication and skill. For their untiring efforts, the Town can be extremely grateful.

CONCLUSION

In retrospect, nineteen eighty-five can be viewed as a period of considerable progress. While all the community's problems are far from being resolved, we may note with satisfaction that the important issues are being conscientiously addressed through the cooperative efforts of local officials and townspeople.

We, as Selectmen, once again acknowledge that these accomplishments would not be possible without the dedication and cooperation of our volunteer appointees and our staff. We continue to be most grateful for their assistance.

ARTS COUNCIL

The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits this report for the year ending December 31, 1985.

The Westport Arts Council now consists of ten members: Sarah Desjardins, Chairman; Mary Natalizia, Treasurer; Geraldine Millham, Corresponding Secretary; Carol Long, Recording Secretary; Susan Stoops; Kurt Wisneski; Charlotte Fitch; Cecile Adler; Sarah Jansen and Sarah Weeks.

Twice yearly we distribute funds generated by the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council's MEGABUCKS game. Each town's allotment is determined on a per capita basis.

In our January '85 funding period we were allotted \$2,804.00 to distribute. Two grants were awarded to individual artists, one to an arts organization and six to other cultural organizations. Included among these were grants to the Westport High School Art Club, the John E. Boyd Center, the High School Drama Club, the Westport Council on Aging and the Macomber School. It was during this funding period that we partially funded the new sign for the Town Hall.

In our July '85 funding period we distributed \$2,051.00 to two artists, the Westport Grange, the Westport Historical Society and the Middle, Macomber and Elementary Schools.

In our January '86 funding period we had \$3,692.00 to distribute. The larger amount was due to some funds being held over from the previous funding period and also included funds previously awarded to an applicant who did not meet the year's deadline for the fulfillment of the grant. Two grants were awarded to individual artists, one to the Historical Society for the continuation of their Alumni Hall musical series, one to a private nursery school for a puppet show and the remainder to the public educational institutions in the town for various cultural programs.

The Westport Arts Council tries to spread its allotted funds as far as possible. We have encouraged individuals and organizations in town to take advantage of this new money in such a way that the people of Westport benefit from new arts and cultural experiences. It is felt that not only the quantity of people served by the quality of artists encouraged is one of the major purposes. We try to encourage the individual artist, award the excellent artist and urge organizations and schools to sponsor events that touch people of all ages with the arts.

Commissioner Stafford Sheehan has recieved additional inquiries about contributions of funds in trust for specific purposes to the Town of Westport.(i.e. Library Books, School Books, Police Department, etc.).

Commissioner Lori Szelag has been available to the Library Department to review and take whatever action was needed on requests for expenditures from certain Trust Funds for books to be purchased by the Library Board of Trustees.

BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

DECEMBER 31, 1985

On June 30, 1986 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project will complete twenty-seven years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jepordized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

In sensitive areas such as where bees are kept, no spraying will take place provided we are made aware of these areas. All spray trucks have a list of beekeepers which is continually updated but with more people keeping bees, it would be very helpful if those people would notify our office. Also, any person that has a sensitivity to pesticides and does not want their property sprayed should contact either our office or notify the town or city clerk before April 1st and we shall honor their request.

The 1985 mosquito season got underway a little late this year due to many swamp areas being dry most of the winter and early spring. It was late spring before enough rain fell to cause the dry areas to flood and become breeding sites for mosquitos. During a normal season we are spraying in early May. This year our adult mosquito spraying did not start until mid-June.

Our light trap mosquito surveillance program was set up the first week in June. Light trap data keeps us abreast of areas of high mosquito infestation and the types of mosquitos present. This data is supplied to the virus lab and our spray crews on a daily basis to keep them informed of mosquito activity.

With the end of the spraying season our work turned to water management projects. At this time crews cut brush and clean debris from existing ditches and streams in order to insure a better flow of water from normally wet areas. A total of 1,496 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 10,267 feet of existing drainage ditch cleaned of debris. Our crawler tractor also dug 2,886 feet of drainage ditch.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

CABLE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

ANNUAL REPORT

Most of 1985 was considered by the Cable Advisory Committee to be another year of "waiting."

Although a 12 month provisional license to operate a cable television system had been issued to United Cablevision Funding, L.P. in October of 1984, local involvement was limited during the provisional period since the purpose of this stage of the licensing process was to allow the cable company time to make all the necessary preparations for construction. The Advisory Committee did meet periodically during the year to monitor the United Cablevision's progress.

In October, representatives of United Cablevision informed Westport officials that the Company would not be able to meet all the requirements for a final license by the 12 month deadline, the most important unresolved matter being the acquisition of a headend station site. Thus, a 90 day provisional license extension until January 1986 was requested and granted with the understanding that United would be prepared for the final license at that time.

As 1985 concluded the Selectmen and Advisory Committee were advised by representatives of United Cablevision Funding that a headend site had been located and the Company would meet the final license requirements by the January deadline. Therefore, Westport residents can be optimistic that cable television service will finally be available in 1986.

WESTPORT CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1985, the Westport Conservation Commission continued to administer and enforce the Wetlands Protection Act, which provides jurisdiction over certain specified coastal-and-freshwater natural resource areas and within 100 feet thereof. While considering certain given performance standards, the Commission issued conditions on activities within its jurisdiction to promote the public interests of

- (1) the protection of public or private water supply;
- (2) the protection of groundwater supply;
- (3) the enhancement of flood control;
- (4) the enhancement of storm damage prevention;
- (5) the prevention of pollution;
- (6) the protection of fisheries; and
- (7) the protection of land containing shellfish.

The Wetlands Protection Act, supplemented by the Wetlands Restriction Act covering Westport's salt marshes, has become increasingly more important to the protection of Westport's estuary, rivers, and their tributaries. Furthermore, the function of the wetlands as a treatment system to improve water quality is vital to life in Westport--balancing on-site sewage disposal and on-site potable water supplies.

The Commission processed 90 Informal Determinations, 37 Requests for Determination, 37 Formal Determinations, 40 Notices of Intent, 30 Orders of Conditions, 9 Extensions, 4 Certificates of Compliance, and 4 Forestry Plans. In its mandated role, the Commission processed at least 4 new Agricultural Preservation Restriction Applications. By the close of 1985, a total of 25 farms had applied for the A.R.P. and only 3 closed on agreements.

The Soil Conservation Board, of same membership, administered, regulated and enforced the Town Soil Conservation By-Law. The soil permitting process received rigorous scrutiny in 1985 and the conditions describing the removal of earth minerals from Westport land became detailed. The Board worked on 5 new Soil Permits, 9 Renewed Soil Permits, and 1 Closed Soil Permit.

Basic to all of the activities enumerated above is a competent staff. Louise Lawrence shared her organizational and technical abilities with us as Conservation Agent until 12/85 when she assumed a full-time position with her expertise in the State of Maryland. We truly appreciated Louise's dedication in her service since 1982.

Sarah Porter became our Conservation Agent in mid-December. She is wading through our cases and fully involved in resource identification and reports on field work and impact analysis. While the Agent makes over 500 inspections a year, timely processing of all the activities is responsibly handled by Barbara Hickey, the part-time Conservation Clerk, who has been with the Commission since 1979. We acknowledge that the Agent and Clerk are part-time employees with full-time jobs as the case load increases.

In 1985, the Horseneck Point Critical Area Treatment Plan was implemented and the stabilization and reduction of dune movement on Town properties was begun, even withstanding Hurricane Gloria. The Town is responsible for the maintenance of the components of this Plan for a 15-year period. The Bristol Conservation District recognized the Commission for outstanding services to the conservation effort for this project.

The members of the Commission (Anne Barnes, Chairman; Cal Hopkinson, Vice Chairman; Tom Porter, Secretary-Treasurer; Alan Manchester; Urbain Pariseau; Norman Sasseville; and Michael Sullivan) wish to thank all the Town boards and Commission, departments and citizens who have helped and supported our efforts throughout the year.

Cards, J.O.B.S. (Job Opportunity Bank for Seniors), Knitting and Crochet Classes, Mass. Seed Program, Meals-on-Wheels, Medi-Mate, Mini-Van(info), Newsletter, Office Volunteer Program, Phone Pal Program, Picnic, Podiatry Clinics, Referrals to B.C.H.C.E. (Homemaker & Companion), Referrals to Sr. Citizen Law Project, V.I.T.A. (Volunteer Income Tax Program), Walk-In-Clinics, Xmas party (S.M.U.), Xmas Dinners (B.C.H.C.E., A.B.C.D.E., American Legion and Lion's Club, Newcomers Club).

Nutrition Program:

During the year 6,400 meals were provided for senior citizens at two meal sites: Greenwood Terrace, daily Monday through Friday: Howland Hall, Westport Point on Mondays and Fridays.

8,307 meals were delivered to the homebound by the Fall River Nutrition Program under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, and paid for in part by the Town of Westport.

Arts & Crafts:

Knitting and crochet classes were offered as well as crewel, embroidery and needlepoint. These classes were taught by Ana Isabel.

Federal Food and Surplus Give Away & Seed Program:

With the help of the American Legion Post #145 and the Lions Club, 4,934 donations of food products were made to low-income Westport residents. 98 persons requested and recieved kits containing seed for a complete vegetable garden.

Friendly Visitors and Companion:

Made approximately 200 visits to the homebound a month bringing support and friendship as well as book and magazines.

Newsletter, Evergreen:

1,000 copies distributed free of charge each month. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication.

Clinics:

A podiatry clinic was held every other month, funded by client contributions and by a formula grant from the Mass. Dept. of Elder affairs. An Arthritis exercise class was held weekly at the Library, Dr. M. A. Berard examined each patient before he/she entered the group. The class was conducted by a therapist. The program was funded by a Discretionary grant from the D.E.A. A clinic fund now enables us to continue some of these clinics with minimum state support. Memorial contributions to this fund will be accepted and acknowledged.

Medi-Mate:

Four Medi-Mate units, purchased by the Council with a grant from the Romero Trust, are being connected to St. Anne's hospital emergency system. These "instant-alert" units are given to low-income Westport residents living alone and in precarious health. They will be kept by the town to be used where needed.

Friends of the Westport Council on Aging:

As the year came to a close a new non-profit organization, the "Friends of Westport Council on Aging" was formed. It is hoped that through this non-profit group, additional funds will be available to provide extra assistance for Westport's older citizens through the Council on Aging.

Grants:

The Council received \$3,471 from the D.E.A. in a formula to be used to hire an outreach worker to ride the bus with frail elders to their doctors' appointments, to cover the mileage of two of our Friendly Visitor/Companions, to hire an elder office worker in the summertime to relieve the volunteers and to provide additional money for crafts for low-income residents. The Council received a \$6,239 discretionary grant from the D.E.A. for the organization and operation of a craft-coop, the "Evergreen Artisans, Inc." to help low-income and homebound crafters.

The shop opened in August in a hall generously donated for our use by St. John the Baptist Church, 924 Main Road, Westport. The grant pays heat, light,

janitorial services and the operating expenses. The Westport Mass. Arts Lottery Council awarded \$300 to the program for the development of original designs and material costs. The Auxiliary of the American Legion Post #145 generously donated \$50 of their prize award money to help with incidental expenses. The Evergreen Artisans sign was donated by Mrs. Evelyn Samson from funds given to the Friends for the Council on Aging in memory of her husband. Other donations have been gratefully received that have helped make the shop possible. The Council is grateful to the many volunteers on the Board of Directors, President Douglas Baer, the Screening Committee and shop assistants as well as many others who have helped make the program possible.

In Summary:

The growing need for assistance on the part of more and more of Westport's older residents is putting greater demands on the Council on Aging, and the problems continue to grow in number, severity and complexity. The Council on Aging is striving to find solution for as many of these problems as possible. As people are living longer lives, and as hospitals are sending patients home sooner, requiring more care at the local level, the pressures on our office and on the nursing department (with whom we try to work closely) are many. Looking ahead, we can anticipate that the need for Council on Aging assistance is going to continue to escalate at a rather appalling rate.

The Council on Aging views the opening of Evergreen Artisans, a crafts cooperative, as one of its achievements during this year, and as a demonstration that people in a community working together can achieve much that is worthwhile. We are very grateful to all those who have helped make the crafts cooperative possible; we give great thanks as well to all the very kind and thoughtful people from the American Legion who help us in so many ways, and to all our other loyal and excellent volunteers.

REPORT OF THE FISH COMMISSIONERS

The 1985 activities of the Commissioners were directed towards the following areas;

1. At the request of the Fish Commissioners a relocation project has been completed by the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries. This project included removing spawning herring from Cape Cod waters and relocating them at the recently established Albert Rosinha Sr. Herring Run at Adamsville Pond. When the spawning process is completed, these newly hatched herring will return to the open ocean and in three (3) years return to their place of birth, thus enhancing the fishery.
2. Plans are currently underway to provide better passage to spawning herring at the Westport Harbor Herring Run. This work would include removing obstructions such as boulders, rocks, etc., to provide better access to the pond for spawning herring.
3. Fish Commissioner John Doherty has been appointed to represent this commission as a member of the management Study Committee who are formulating plans to begin the Buzzard's Bay Pollution Study. The intent is to gain the cooperation and input of coastal towns to work jointly on this project. Mr. Doherty also serves on the recently formed Pollution Advisory Board, representing this Commission.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

ANNUAL REPORT

January 1, 1985 - December 31, 1985

Our annual report reflects another successful year for the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee in their continuing efforts to provide quality vocational education.

As of October 1, 1985, a total of 1,021 students, 865 boys and 156 girls, were enrolled in 13 high school shop programs; 53 students were enrolled in three (3) Technical Institute Programs; 52 students were enrolled in the Practical Nursing Program; 7 students were enrolled in the Nurse Assistant Program; and 216 students were enrolled in 13 Evening School Programs for a total of 1,384 students in the day and evening programs. In addition, 14 students completed a 12 week training program in the Nurse Assistant Program.

The Guidance Staff visited the 25 feeder schools to show interested eighth grade students an audio visual slide presentation which resulted in 424 applications being submitted and processed for the freshman class. The number of applications received for students desiring to enter Diman as sophomores and juniors showed a marked decrease this year and will receive more attention in next year's recruiting plans.

A Summer Remedial Math Program was offered to 73 incoming freshmen students. Forty-seven (47) students started the four week program and 43 completed the program.

A total of 49 students completed a new four week summer exploratory program offered to seventh grade special needs students to help orient them to Diman's offerings in four shop area: Culinary Arts, Metal Fabrication, Auto Body, and Machine Shop. This program allowed the students to become familiar with a number of shop activities so that they could make a more realistic assessment of their interest and aptitudes in these areas and become motivated to achieve their goal of being successful at this school.

The School Committee approved a change in our Math program by offering a new course entitled "Math for Small Business Operations" as an elective for

seniors. The graduation requirements have been increased in that all incoming freshmen must satisfactorily complete four years of Math. A summer program is being planned for those students who do not pass Math during the regular school year. Students who do not receive a final grade of 65 or better in shop tech will not be readmitted the following school year. A summer school program is being planned for students who do not successfully complete the related program.

Diplomas were awarded to 214 graduates from the high school programs. Of this number, 134 were placed in jobs related to their trade; 15 were placed in jobs in other trades; 20 went into the armed forces; and 38 went on to higher education. Only four graduates were known to be unemployed. We were unable to determine the employment status of three at the time our survey was conducted.

The following students received scholarships, awards, and recognition: Commonwealth Scholarships of \$1,000 - Octave Costa, Drafting; Manuel Resendes, Basic Electronics; and Richard Galant, Machine shop. Massachusetts Vocational Association Presidential Award - Christina Hayes, Graphic Arts and John Janeiro, Drafting. Presidential Academic Fitness Award - Octave Costa and John Janeiro, Drafting; Russell Costa, Steven Fata, and David Vieira, Basic Electronics. The Rhode Island Printers Association awarded a \$600 scholarship to Lee Stout.

The School Committee approved a new attendance policy which limits students to ten unexcused absences per year and will not allow students to participate in the graduation exercises if they have not met the attendance requirement. The students will be allowed to make up the number of days in excess of the ten allowable absences by one of two avenues: full time military service or returning to school the following September to participate in the normal school day activities for the number of days in excess of the ten unexcused absences.

Ten students participated in the statewide Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) Skill Olympics. This is the first time Diman students have participated in a state wide skill competition in the areas of Culinary Arts, Sheet Metal, and House & Mill Carpentry. Awards were received by Christopher Phillips, Silver Medal in Commercial Food Trades; Robert Young, Bronze Medal in Baking; Russell Ferreira, Silver Medal in Sheet Metal. The students were accompanied by Robert J. Perfetto, Occupational Coordinator, Robert Ciosek, Ralph Greenwood, John Miranda, and David Viveiros, Instructors.

A VICA job skill demonstration contest was held in December with ten students participating. This contest afforded students an opportunity to

demonstrate their knowledge and skill in the presence of six judges. Eric Darling, House & Mill Carpentry Department - First Place; Catherine Richard - Painting & Decorating - Second Place; Arthur Brisebois, Basic Electronics, and Emile Chagnon, Culinary Arts - tied for Third Place.

Our athletic programs had the following accomplishments: Southeastern Massachusetts Conference Division III Baseball Championship, eliminated in the second round of state champion - Coach John Pacheco. Mayflower League Division I Soccer Championship - Coach Youngie Martin. Cross Country had a record of 11 wins and 1 loss and took second place Mayflower League honors - Coach Roger Ramos.

The following student athletes were named as outstanding athletes for their respective sport: Soccer - Joseph Torres; Cross Country - Thomas Butler; Winter Track - Paul Reis; Basketball - David Connell; Tennis - Steven Fata; Golf - Brian Kelly; Spring Track - David Connell; Baseball - Mark Marcoux. David Connell was named Athlete of the Year.

The Key Club sponsored a Christmas Basket Drive and prepared baskets for 13 Diman families. In addition, they donated two (2) \$300 checks to the Salvation Army and to the Fall River Community Soup Kitchen.

The first Junior Prom was held this Spring at the school. This event was a huge success due to the cooperation of the students under the supervision of Brian Bentley. The Culinary Arts students and staff prepared and served an excellent buffet for this occasion.

Eight students participated in the Project Spotlight program which is conducted at Southeastern Massachusetts University. Mr. Brosnan and Mr. Brodeur participated in this program which encourages students to interact with students from other school systems in addressing topics which challenge students to think about their future. The program is structured to motivate students to aspire for a college education and more specifically to attend SMU.

Paul Reis, a sophomore in the Machine Shop program was selected to be a representative to the Hugh O'Brien Youth Foundation Seminar.

Paul Gelinas, a junior in the Basic Electronics Program and William Soares, a junior in the Electricity Program were selected to be representatives to American Legion's Boy's State.

Six Senior boys and six senior girls received special recognition as Teenagers of the Month through a program sponsored by the Fall River Elks.

Students in the House and Mill Carpentry Department finished the construction of a major loadbearing roof truss for the Bluffs Senior Citizen Center in Swansea and have completed the installations of the necessary roof reinforcement and have insulated the ceiling in the main part of this building.

The School Committee has contracted with Mr. and Mrs. Emile Monsour to construct a three bedroom home on North Ogden Street during the 1985-86 school year. This project has involved the students from the House & Mill Carpentry Department, Electricity, and Plumbing departments. Efforts are underway to work with a non-profit organization to build a house in Swansea during the 1986-87 school year.

The New England Association of Schools and Colleges has reviewed and accepted the two year followup report addressing the recommendations made during the evaluation of this school by this organization. The Association has discontinued the practice of determining terms of membership with the principle now established that once a school is accredited it will have a continuous relationship with the Association subject to periodic review. Seventy-four (74%) percent of the recommendations made have been completed or are in the progress stage of completion. The staff and administration are to be commended for the comprehensiveness of the Two-Year Progress Report and the many steps taken to ensure that Diman will continue to offer vocational technical progress based on student needs.

Two courses funded by the Commonwealth In-Service Institute were offered at the school for teachers interested in becoming certified in the field of special education. The courses were approved by the University of Massachusetts Boston Campus and credits can be transferred into a masters degree program.

The School Committee voted to establish a "Teacher of the Year Award" as a means of recognizing outstanding service by a staff member.

The school's staff and administration surpassed the goal established by the United Way for the year due to the combined efforts of Ernest Hargreaves and Ralph Greenwood. This accomplishment is tangible evidence of the staff's interest in allowing people to better help themselves.

Several items of new equipment have been purchased: Culinary Arts - reach-in refrigerator and freezer; Machine Shop - hand-feed surface grinder, (2) 10" engine lathes, one vertical miller; Metal Fabrication & Welding - metal cutting band saw and syncrowave arc welder; Graphic Arts - Offset press; House & Mill Carpentry Department - Air Compressor and smokeaters; Dental Assistant - X-ray machine; Academic areas - 12 Epson printers; Superintendent-Director's Office - Apple IIE with word processing capabilities, letter quality printer, and appropriate software; Guidance: Apple IIE computer and letter quality printer.

The School Committee voted to purchase a new Digital Computer Model PDP 11-73 and printer and CRTs to be used for the students records and financial information system. The software support has been purchased under contract from MASBO. As a result, student attendance report cards and information is being kept up to date and disseminated in a very timely and efficient manner.

The school has been able to profit by the interest of local businesses who have made available equipment and educational supplies. The following items of Machine Shop equipment were acquired by the school when the Varian Associates manufacturing facility was closed. The items are as follows: vertical miller with Heidenhain CNC controls, Hitachi horizontal miller, drill and tool sharpener, two (2) 14" lathes, and radial drill.

The following companies have made available equipment or supplies during the year: New Bedford Gear, Raytheon Company, Auto Dec, Taco, Harvey Probber, Leeming Brothers, Globe Mfg., Fram Corp., Flint TV, and Dr. Clayton King. Through the efforts of the above listed business firms, students at this school are able to profit in greater depth in their total growth and development.

The School Committee approved funds for the hiring of an architect and the renovation of the Tea Room and Cafeteria areas of the building. A section of the cafeteria will be renovated to accommodate patrons to the Tea Room in a more pleasant atmosphere. The existing Tea Room will be converted into a food preparation area. The existing food preparation area will include an expansion of the girls locker room and improved storage facilities. \$125,000 has been allocated for this project. The renovations to the cafeteria will be undertaken by students in the House & Mill Carpentry Department, Plumbing, Metal Fabrication & Welding, Electrical, and Painting & Decorating Departments.

New, more efficient floodlights have been installed around the exterior of the building.

The 1985-86 school budget was approved by the School Committee in the amount of \$3,884,640. This budget reflects a five (5%) percent salary increase for all staff. The assessments to the communities are as follows:

This school has the lowest per pupil cost of all the regional vocational technical schools in the Commonwealth.

Grants for federal and state funds were prepared so that the school could receive \$115,758. Of this amount, approximately \$80,000 was used to purchase new equipment. The remaining balance was used for the development of a new special needs teaching position, a part time clerk/typist, and a teenage parent support program.

The Governor signed a new Educational Reform Act, Chapter 188, the latter part of July. This legislation will have far reaching effects on all schools in this Commonwealth. This Regional School District has been allocated \$103,359 to be committed before June 30, 1986 to improve student services. The intent of this legislation is to insure quality public education for all students in this Commonwealth. \$45,202 has been allocated under the Professional Development Grant to supplement teacher compensation. The School Committee is negotiating with members of the teacher's association an equitable distribution of these funds.

The basic skills testing program requires communities to use the state test and administer the test to all ninth grade students. The only exception to this regulation will be special needs students whose individual educational plan addresses this subject. All students who fail the test in reading, writing, or

mathematics must be given additional help and be retested annually while in school.

This Regional School District should receive additional state aid under the provisions of the legislation because of our current low per pupil cost and limited financial resources available in the city due to the constraints of Proposition 2-1/2.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our faculty, support staff, School Committee, and Advisory Committees for all of their efforts in support of the goals and objectives of this school.

WESTPORT HOUSING AUTHORITY

Dear Members:

The following is being submitted for the Annual Report of the Westport Housing Authority for 1985.

At the 1985 town election Mr. William Rogers was re-elected to fill a 5-year term as member of the Board of Commissioners of the Westport Housing Authority. In June, 1985 staff personnel positions were reaffirmed. Executive Director James W. Coyne, Jr. was granted a two-year contract through June, 1987, the maintenance mechanic and clerical secretary/bookeeper were reaffirmed for another year.

Several important actions were taken by the Westport Housing Authority during the year. A U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Preliminary Loan was settled with action of the annual town meeting. The Westport Housing Authority affiliated with the Corrigan Mental Health Center for the proposed development of Chapter 689 housing. Official Action Status was granted to a developer for construction of housing units under the Tax Exempt Local Loans to Encourage Rental Housing (TELLER) Program. To comply with State regulations the Authority set aside marked spaces for handicapped parking.

We were fortunate in 1985 to continue our involvement with the Bristol County Home Care for Elderly, Inc. with the employment of a senior maintenance aide. We also utilized the services of two youngsters as maintenance aides during the summer months through the Bristol County Training Consortium.

The Westport Community Nurses conducted a flu clinic and held blood pressure clinics in the community hall at Greenwood Terrace. The Nutrition Program of Fall River carried on their work to serve hot meals every weekday to persons 59 years of age and over. Social activities were organized on a weekly basis by the senior citizens' group and the Council on Aging conducted several podiatry clinics in the community hall.

Thanksgiving skits and Christmas carolling were among the activities in which the residents of Greenwood Terrace participated with the various scouting groups from Westport. The Authority is grateful to them for helping to enrich the lives of our residents.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT

Legal activity regarding cases and administrative board hearings continues at a rapid pace as more and more people become litigation conscious.

The failure of some of the Town officers to comply with or enforce the very laws that they are sworn to enforce has had a deleterious effect upon the Town and is probably the most important single factor in an anticipated increase in litigation and legal expenses in the coming year.

There are presently four trailer cases pending and two or three more that will be commenced none of which should be necessary in view of the fact the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court has ruled our by-laws valid and constitutional.

There are presently cases pending to enforce the sanitary code, the zoning by-law, the wetlands act, the building code and the electric code and more cases are about to be commenced due to the failure of people to abide by or respect our state and local laws.

At the present time there are 17 cases pending against the Town and 5 cases pending by the Town against other persons that are being handled by this department.

REPORT OF THE HEAD LIFEGUARD

The 1985 summer season went well at the Westport Town Beaches. There were several incidents that could have had serious outcomes if we had not been there. Fortunately, overall it was a safe year.

Cherry and Webb Town Beach was patrolled seven days a week with usually two lifeguards and three lifeguards on weekends. Two guards should be on duty in case of a serious emergency. Cherry and Webb Beach is the more dangerous of the two beaches because of the roughness of the water, the length of the beach and location near the harbour of the river.

East Beach was patrolled only on weekends due to the number of lifeguards employed by the town. Some townspeople expressed a need for a lifeguard on duty seven days a week at East Beach.

Again we made an effort to keep Cherry and Webb Beach and the East Beach area clean from litter. Ironically, East Beach proved to be much cleaner with the elimination of the barrels on the beach. These barrels in the past were constantly abused or used by the wrong people and only attracted more filth.

The addition of the boardwalk by the Beach Committee at Cherry and Webb Beach was greatly appreciated by the public. Several people approached me to express their appreciation, some hoped it could be extended.

I have contacted Diman Regional Vocational High School in an effort to restore the Civil Defense truck over the winter.

I would like to thank the Highway Department and Police Department for their cooperation. I would also like to thank Mr. Michael McCarthy for the use of the Civil Defense truck. In addition, I would like to express my appreciation to Mrs. Julia Enroth for her assistance and you, the Selectmen, for giving me the opportunity to serve the town.

The home care field is in a period of rapid and diverse change. Public perceptions of home care are shifting and public awareness and professional familiarity with

the industry are increasing. To further intensify matters home health care has become sharply competitive with larger and more aggressive organizations entering into the picture. Traditional home care providers can no longer depend entirely on past reputation and last years referral base to survive. We can not afford to rely on one program, but must provide a full scope of services.

This year we have expanded our services to the community and will continue to explore the need for added community services. There has been an increase in our maternal/child referrals, thus increasing those visits. Enteric and communicable disease has been on the increase, which has opened the door to community educations.

A Lead Testing program has been added to our Well Child Clinic and this department will co-sponsor a lead testing day for the children of Westport, ages six months to six years. We carried out a successful respite program in conjunction with the Council on Aging and will be involded in a pilot program in caring for the elderly relating to early hospital discharge. Basically the mission of this department is to meet the home health care need of the community, this remains unchanged from past years. It is the home health care needs of the community that have changed.

Again my thanks to the fine nursing and clerical staff. Also to the contracted people, volunteers, committee members and the Board of Health for their loyal support.

At this time, I would like to take the opportunity to comment on several significant events which have occurred within the Police Department within the past year.

In July, Officers Randall Enos, Pauline Quinn, and John Eckersley graduated from the New Bedford Police Academy after completing a thirteen week training session. It should be noted that our Officers have done very well at the Academy, with Officer Quinn receiving the highest award for academic excellence.

During Hurricane Gloria in September, I was pleased to see that our Police Officers responded well in the emergency and performed a necessary, and often times difficult, job to the best of their ability.

In November, Jeffrey Rego was appointed Sergeant under the established criteria for advancement to that rank. This included a written examination, oral

interview and consideration of experience, the individual's service record and leadership potential. Sgt. Rego will be attending a Command Training Program in February, and several other Sergeants will do so later in the year. It is my belief that special emphasis should be placed on enhancing the leadership and administrative abilities of those persons promoted to higher rank.

For many years, Reserve Officers have augmented this department and provided needed personnel while offering supplemental strength and supporting special enforcement efforts. Being a Reserve is a stepping stone to a Police career and gives both the candidate and department the opportunity to "test the waters" working making a full commitment. This department gives preference in hiring full-time to those who have performed satisfactorily.

For some, emotional satisfaction is gained, as they are committed to other more lucrative occupations and unwilling to change jobs. None the less, they enjoy Police work and serving as Reserves gives them the opportunity to serve even if only part-time. While impossible to categorize their motives in intangibles, most are clear and include community spirit, a willingness to support law and order, a desire to help people and a need to be "where the action is."

For whatever reasons, our Reserve Officers play a very important part in this department, and we all thank them for their hard work and loyal service to the town.

As a final note to our citizens, it is my intention to continue to emphasize throughout the Police Department that no goal has a higher priority than the conduct of business in a responsible and ethical manner.

REPORT OF THE POLLUTION CONTROL ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Town voters at the Annual Town Meeting authorized the Westport Board of Health to hire an additional Board of Health agent and to appoint a five person Pollution Control Advisory Committee with a goal to reduce pollution within the town and particularly water pollution.

The following individuals were appointed to the Advisory Committee and sworn into office by the Town Clerk June 10, 1985: James S. Robeson, Chairman; Arnold Tripp, Secretary & Agent Liason; John Doherty, Kendal Turner; and Dale Thomas

The job opening was posted to town employees and after the prescribed time, James Walsh was hired as the new agent. He started the job approximately August 19, 1985.

Since August 19, 1985, Agent Jim Walsh, with the assistance of the Advisory Committee and under the direction of the Board of Health, have implemented the following programs:

1. A dye testing program designed to detect leaking septic systems in the proximity of the Westport River. A total of sixty-two (62) systems have been tested.
2. A contact has been established between Jim Walsh and the Pesticide Bureau. The agent reviews the test results and reports to the Board of Health.
3. A water testing program for pollution is in effect. Two studies on water quality on the East Branch of the Westport River have been completed, to be presented to the town sometime in January, one by G.H.R., and independent research laboratory and the other by Hydrogeology Research Group, Department of Geology, Boston University.
4. Numerous other programs are being implemented including: a list to monitor tight tanks in Westport, attendance at conferences relevant to river pollution, attendance at all state and town meetings relevant to pollution and contact with Dartmouth and other neighboring townships.

SEWER AND WATER STUDY COMMITTEE ANNUAL TOWN REPORT

During 1985 the Sewer Study Committee became aware of the need to study water problems along with sewer study. This became urgent because of the opportunity to bring Fall River water to the Westport town line as an add-on to the 6" line White's Restaurant was putting in. We changed our name to Westport Sewer and Water Study Committee and took part along with the Selectmen to recommend at the annual town meeting that the town pay the extra costs of making the water line 12 inches in diameter since this size would provide for future needs of the town for city water.

Similarly the Committee supported the Board of Health's successful proposal at town meeting for a Pollution Advisory Committee and a pollution control agent. We have already had the benefit of their input at our meetings.

We have functioned mainly as a study and advisory group giving the Selectmen, Board of Health, Planning Board, Conservation Department, and Finance Board, along with citizens from the five voting districts, a forum in which to exchange ideas and information about some suprisingly broad and difficult long range problems facing the town. We solved our quorum difficulties of last year by going back to the original set-up of 5 town and 5 citizen members, not counting alternates and members at large, and have set our quorum for doing business at 6. At 5 of our 6 meetings in 1985 we have had 7 or more members present.

Facing us in 1986 is getting Fall River water from the town line to Sanford Road at least. We need information as to the amount of ground water pollution and remedial action to take to preserve our wells and aquifers. We studied and will continue to study alternatives to sewerage along Route 6 and Sanford Road. In particular we are considering upgrading septic systems, using community leaching fields where necessary, and package waste water treatment facilities for isolated areas, new housing developments and getting industry into Westport short of expensive sewers and city water mains.

SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

Veteran shellfishermen remember and reminisce of a Westport River which, until only a quarter century ago, teemed with a multitude of shellfish species and where the day's catch, of any one of those species, could load a skiff gunnel high. Rich shellfish harvests of the 'good old days' were thought to be forevermore gone due to current problems of increasing fishing pressure and its resultant overfishing, and pollution which are joining to leave, per capita, fewer available shellfish. None-the-less, fishermen reexperienced a shellfish bounty which according to local annals is unprecedented. The 1985 shellfisheries harvest was led by an overwhelmingly large bay scallop crop. (See end of report for scallop catch statistics.)

Approximately every seven years, for reasons yet to be ascertained by marine biologists, scallop abundance reaches a cyclic apex in between which marginal to mediocre crops occur. In 1984 some mechanism of physical parameters and biological need meshed to produce an extraordinarily large scallop set. A number of other factors also present in 1984 and through 1985 permitted the seed set to survive and mature. The unification of a successful set and high survivorship culminated not only in a typical seventh year plenty but, by all accounts, the largest scallop crop of the preceeding 33 years.

Aside from the prosperity and epicurean delights the bay scallop harvest brought to our citizens it also gained Westport a widely recognized notoriety. Westport was the only Massachusetts coastal community to be blessed with an exceptional scallop crop thereby making Westport the largest Massachusetts scallop producer. Moreover the rich scallop beds of Long Island Sound were decimated by a novel type of brown algae which further bolstered Westport's status from that of the Commonwealth's number one scallop producing area to that of the Nation's.

In the 1984 Annual Town Report I related the high probability of a large scallop crop for the 1985 fishing season and at that time, to help ensure scallop survival and enhance the fishery, various management strategies were instituted.

Researchers have found under crowded conditions, food competition may cause stunting and increase scallop mortality. Therefore, some 2,100 bushels of scallop seed were relayed from densely populated beds in upstream and shoal areas of the West Branch and Harbor. The movements served to thin crowded areas, buildup typically productive beds lacking a significant seed set, prevent mortalities due to

overcrowding and increase meat yields. Scallop transplanting further served to reduce mortality by removing scallops from shoal areas where they are subject to intense seagull predation. Typically, scallops are also removed from the upper East Branch to reduce the killing effects of combined fresh water run-off and cold water winter conditions which peculiar to this area will 9 times out of 10 result in 100% mortality. However a mild and dry winter permitted high survivorship; one major factor leading to the current bumper crop.

In addition to scallop movements, a management closure was enacted. During 1984 few if any harvestable adult scallops were to be found in the East Branch whereas seed scallops abound. Therefore the entire East Branch was closed to scalloping to ensure unnecessary fishing activities did not weaken or kill seed scallops and remove the protective eel grass cover. The afore-described management practices are credited with heightening the 1985 scallop harvest by many thousands of bushels.

The voluminous body of scientific knowledge concerning the bay scallop contains precious little information relevant to resource management. In order to generate the kind of useful information to aid facilitation of our scallop resource and its fishery I have been endeavoring with the Woods Hole Marine Biological Laboratory on local scallop research geared solely towards fisheries management.

During the subsequent two years we have been studying scallop growth and reproduction. Results have given local management authorities keen insights to aid the decision making process effecting the fishing season opening date as well as adjustments, based on stock densities, of weekly and daily catch quotas. (A paper on the subject is available in the Selectmen's Office.)

Currently, a research proposal is under consideration before the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Sea Grant program to fund an investigation into a wide range of physical and biological factors influencing scallop and quahog larvae retention/advection mechanisms operating within Westport River. The proposal is designed to provide exciting information into the population dynamics of planktonic shellfish larvae (i.e. what happens the very young stages of shellfish larvae which are floating in the water column) which will provide an understanding of the major factors influencing shellfish recruitment (i.e. the ability of shellfish to pass through all of their life stage cycles and become legally harvestable adults) which, in turn, is fundamental to developing more intelligent and responsible management practices promoting maximum yield.

The investigation is also expected to help follow and evaluate the success of a new scallop propagation program to release, into the river, 2 1/2 million veliger stage scallop larvae.

Microscopic scallop larvae existing within the water column pass through a series of developmental stages. The final larval form, the veliger, leaves the water column to 'set' on the river bottom and metamorphose into the familiar adults. It is believed wild fluctuations of scallop abundance from year to year occur chiefly due to difficulties encountered in the early planktonic stages. The proposed project, if funded, represents an attempt to by-pass the scallop early developmental forms and concomitant losses, and introduce a larval stage more predisposed toward survival and successful 'setting' thereby building greater stock densities.

Shellfish stocks in general and quahaug and soft-shelled clam stocks in particular continue to wax and establish new catch statistic records. (See end of report for 1985 catch statistics.) Officials from the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries report that the coastal communities bordering Buzzards Bay are experiencing some of the best shellfish sets within the Commonwealth and of a magnitude not encountered since the end of the Second World War. Yet these officials do warn good shellfish sets are an ephemeral phenomenon. Accordingly, the Shellfish Department continues expansion of our principle propagative endeavors for the quahaug resource. (See previous Annual Town Reports for discussion on quahaug propagation).

During 1985 approximately 300,000 seed quahaugs were reared and then broadcast into the river. The figure represents a 30% increase in the number of seed processed over the previous year. In 1986 we hope to raise more than 350,000 seed quahaugs with a final goal of between 2 and 4 million by 1990. In other areas of direct stock supplement we relayed from Mt. Hope Bay to Westport some 1,400 bushels of mildly contaminated quahaugs. The relay was a gift from the Division of Marine Fisheries, saving the Town not only 14,000 dollars in relay costs but at the same time also augmented the fishery value by 35,000 dollars. (See the 1984 Annual Report for details and circumstances involving the relay)

In previous reports I have related that the major factor enabling expansion of quahaug propagation programs without budgetary increases over the last 4 years revolved around our experimentation and bring on line cost effective aquacultural growout devices and techniques. Over the last few years the benefits these programs have brought to the fisheries have been clearly seen and enjoyed by a great many of our citizens. Unfortunately, we have reached a point where

inflation and planned program expansion to further enhance the fisheries and/or off-set a set failure will require more monies. Your support for our quahaug and the proposed scallop propagation programs is desperately needed on the floor of the forthcoming Annual Town Meeting if we are to continue our work. In the mean time we continue to seek alternative funding methods.

The Westport Fishermens Association has granted to the Shellfish Department monies to expand the use of our hydraulic cultivator into a dredge and eductor. The cultivator new application as a dredge will for the first time allow the Shellfish Department to relay shellfish from contaminated or deeper water areas within the river to shoal clean areas thereby making more shellfish available for harvest and at the same reduce or eliminate the need for relay contract hire. The cultivator's use as a eductor or jet pump will remove seed shellfish from culture devices and eliminate the need to remove seed by the time consuming hand and shovel method. As a member of the Massachusetts Shellfish Officers Association's Board of Directors and its Legislative Committee we are filing with the State Legislator a bill to revamp and increase state reimbursements to cities and town for shellfish programs.

Much of the above report and the catch statistics contained in the end of the report demonstrate despite burgeoning fishing pressure and pollution the Westport River encompasses shellfish resources with tremendous capabilities for productivity if we only protect and foster those capabilities. Currently, though, we walk an environmental tightrope which on one side exists a healthy and thriving estuary and shellfisheries and on the other a lost resource. If we allow existing contamination problems to remain unchecked and expand we will surely lose if not the shellfish resources themselves then the ability to utilize the resources. (See 1984 Annual Report for overview of contamination problem.) To this end and over the last year many concerned citizens and governmental agencies from all levels have finally addressed the contamination issue and are working towards clean-up and protection. For our part, the Shellfish Advisory Committee and Shellfish Department sponsored study of the East Branch contamination problem is complete and the final report should be available sometime in early 1986. The study investigator and consultant, GHR Analytical Inc., is confident that the study results will lead to conditional openings for some but not all areas of the East Branch currently subject to shellfishing closures.

Other areas of 1985 activities include installation of a non-criminal ticketing system for shellfishing violations which should not only make law enforcement more effective but at the same time generate municipal revenues. We have also completed our field office.

REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL STUDY COMMITTEE -- 1985

In 1985 the members of the Solid Waste Disposal Study Committee pressed onward in their search for and analysis of the disposal options for the solid waste produced in Westport. Locally, the total non-agricultural waste generated was estimated to be 5200 tons/year from the population of 13,638 (20 tons/day x 5 days/week x 52 weeks/year). The SRPEDD 11/84 Study assumed 3/4 ton/person/year with a waste production in Westport of 10,229 tons/year. Whichever, in view of steady disposal into a 12.5 acre actual working landfill (from landfill plan by Brant Haworth, P.E.), the search for alternative disposal options and methods of reducing waste production have become very important.

Locally, it was estimated that 50% of the total waste was commercial/industrial and 50% was residential. In an effort to save space and prolong the landfill's life expectancy the following steps were taken: the Board of Health prohibited the disposal of refuse from roll-off containers early in 1985; stumps, boulders, and large brush have a disposal site at the Fagundes property on Pine Hill Road; and collection and recycling of newspapers and magazines (in roll-off containers), clean glass (in 55-gallon drums), and metals (ferrous and appliances in scrap pile) continues at the landfill property.

Three articles sponsored by the S.W.D.S.C. passed the April 1985 Town Meeting allowing the Board of Selectmen (36) to negotiate a contract with the City of Fall River for up to three years, (37) negotiate a contract for town-wide collection and disposal, and (38) negotiate a contract with SEMASS for disposal of solid waste from any source for a period of 27 years minimum. Shortly thereafter, the City of Fall River informed us that refuse generated outside the City would no longer be accepted at the incinerator. The SEMASS resource-recovery alternative in Rochester, Ma., at the preferred rate for municipalities turned to the market rate when no original "believing" contractual communities stepped aside for a "waiting-list" Westport.

We step into the next calendar year -- pursuing the options and the space saving methodologies, considering an up-dating study and consultants, and gratefully acknowledging all those Townspeople who have participated in the recycling program.

SRPEDD REPORT TOWN OF WESTPORT

During 1985 the Town of Westport continued its membership for the sixteenth year in the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District. SRPEDD is a planning and economic development agency formed under state law to serve twenty-eight communities in southeastern Massachusetts by providing a cooperative approach to regional issues.

The District is governed by a Commission consisting of a chief elected official or designee and a planning board representative from each participating municipality and six low-income and minority representatives. Westport's representatives are: Julia S. Enroth, representing the Board of Selectmen, who is also a member of the Executive and Finance committees and serves on SEED's Board of Directors; and Edmund Medeiros, representing the Planning Board

In addition to regional planning and economic development, SPREED assists member cities and towns. Through the free municipal assistance program, each community receives time for local projects and assistance in preparing applications for Federal and state funds.

The agency's purpose is to plan for regional land use, economic development, housing, transit, transportation, solid waste, energy resources and conservation, and air and water quality. Local participation in these regional plans enables communities to be eligible for Federal and state dollars.

Services to Westport this past year included:

- Cooperative water resource efforts with Fall River, Dartmouth, and Freetown
- Solid waste disposal options study
- Investigation of permits required to open the lot.

Additionally, SPREDD, working with scientists, public officials and concerned citizens from throughout the area, is helping to manage and implement an EPA-sponsored study of Buzzards Bay. This multi-year project is geared toward protecting and improving the quality of this irreplaceable resource. Westport is one of the communities which will benefit from this study.

Regional plans and other activities conducted this year benefiting all communities included:

Approval of over \$152 million in industrial revenue projects in the region, creating approximately 1,300 jobs.

Environmental assessment reviews of state and federally funded projects, and reviews of all local zoning amendments. The reviews are advisory and are oriented toward making proposals more cost-effective and feasible.

The annual update of the Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which makes member communities eligible for U.S. Economic Development Administration funding and a 10 percent bonus for public facility projects.

The annual update of the Transportation Improvements Program (TIP) which lists major projects in each community for federal and state funding. A project must be included in the TIP in order to be eligible for these funds.

Conducting a community education effort on the safe handling of industrial hazardous wastes under a contract with Southeastern Massachusetts University.

SEED, South Eastern Economic Development Corporation, established and staffed by SRPEDD, provides low-interest, long-term financing to small businesses in southeastern Massachusetts through the U.S. Small Business Administration's "503 Program" and the \$1 million revolving loan fund established in 1984. In 1985 SEED assisted businesses in total investments of over \$8 million and the creation of over 450 new jobs.

SRPEDD represents the collective will of its member communities. As the responsibilities and problems of municipalities become increasingly complex, the District can provide technical assistance to Local Boards, encourage cooperation among communities and provide a comprehensive approach to issues that cross local boundaries.

It is a pleasure to report that there have been no changes in the makeup of either the Board of Trustees or library staff. I would like to say that the town is fortunate indeed in the quality of the personnel who staff our library. They are knowledgeable, efficient, and professional and the Board of Trustees is eternally grateful that of all the problems that appear on our agendas personnel problems are few and far between.

In the field of adult programming the summer film series was entitled "Favorites of the Fifties" offering such classics as Singing in the Rain, The Caine Mutiny, and Bridge Over the River Kwai. The movies were shown every Monday night during July and August and were well received by all those attending.

Once again the Friends of the Westport Free Library presented an excellent selection of well attended programs. These included Ernest Desrosiers whose topic was "India" and Sanford Moss on "Sharks". In September there was a poetry reading featuring a variety of poems by Westport poets. The annual meeting presented a Fall River author, Peter Griffin, who spoke on Ernest Hemingway. In addition to the programs the "Friends" ran a successful second-hand book sale in November and entered a float in the Fourth of July parade. Proceeds from their fund raising efforts are used to enrich the library. This year we were the fortunate recipients of shrubbery for the front of the library. I am sad to relate, however, that the reason we needed new shrubbery was because a large

and lovely bush had to be removed. This bush bore juicy red berries which were an irresistible attraction to young vandals who created a constant mess on the grounds and defaced the front of the building.

The juvenile and young adult programming this year was well balanced between story hours, arts and crafts, and films. All programs were well attended by local residents with the welcome addition in the summer of families vacationing in the area. A popular attraction was the performance of a story teller, which was funded by an Arts Council grant applied for by Deborah Kubik. Another was decoration of an Easter Egg Tree.

This year the Outreach Program begun in 1982 included cooperation with the staff of the Middle School and the High School. Films were obtained by the library for classroom use and the library circulated books during the summer belonging to the High School, which were on the required summer reading list. Forty-five visits by library staff were made to both public and private schools in Westport and eleven tours of the library were made by various groups of children.

The juvenile and young adult nonfiction collections were brought up to date this year with particular emphasis on all areas of science. Additions to the fiction collections included an assortment of cassette books and records. Some of the purchases of both books and nonbooks were made with money coming from a variety of sources including the Heidi Briand Memorial Gift, Friends of the Library, Newcomers' Club, River Defense Fund, and Alice D. Tripp Fund. A gift of money has recently been received from the Westport Monthly Meeting of Friends.

Other noteworthy items during the year included installation of a light on the corner of the Middle School. This was done at our suggestion and adds much needed light to peripheral parking areas for both the school and the library. We are very grateful to the school department for their cooperation in this matter

Antonio "Tony" Gracia used the project room to provide free income tax preparation service to senior citizens--a service much needed and gratefully received.

Volunteers continue to work on indexing the Westport History Collection.

During the year patrons of the library may notice various displays, sometimes in the project room, in a glass display case, or elsewhere in the library. These are put together by groups in the town as well as the library staff. Among the displays this year was a replica of a local business, the Hoyt Manufacturing

Annual Wharfinger's Report to the Town for the Year Ending December, 1985

The Town Wharfs are currently accomodating some twenty-one docked commercial fishing vessels ranging in size from eighteen feet to seventy-two feet, and nine vessels ranging in size from twenty feet to fifty feet in length are enrolled on the Wharfinger's waiting list, plus eight vessels use the wharfs for loading and unloading.

The permit process for the dredging of the Mud Dock, so-called, is nearly complete. Dredging should commence and be complete sometime this coming March or April.

Repairs are being made to the wharfs in the worst-troubled areas first as money becomes available from the Town Meeting from wharf fees and Municipal Waterways Fund.

Revenues generated through wharf fees amounted to \$8,046 this year.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETINGS ARE OPEN

The Wednesday School Committee meets on the second and fourth Monday of each month, September through June unless announced otherwise in the news media. Meetings are held at the Westport Public School Administration Building, 856 Main Road at 7:00 P.M. in the School Committee Room and are open to the public.

ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS

Initial admission of kindergarten and grade one children is based solely on chronological age. Children who will become five years of age before October 1 are eligible for kindergarten in September of that school year. Children who will become six years of age by October 1 are eligible for grade one in September of that school year.

A vaccination certificate for immunization against diptheria, tetanus, pertussis, measles and polio must be presented to the school when the student enters for the first time, unless the child is exempted for medical or religious reasons.

A birth certificate must be presented by those pupils whose births were recorded outside of Westport.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1985 was a very busy year for the Westport School Department. The School Committee and the Administration spent countless hours on these major projects: Public School Improvement Act of 1985, Secondary Academic Programs, Elementary Academic Programs, Code of Discipline, Pupil Personnel Services, Business Operation and Negotiations.

PUBLIC SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 1985

The passage of the Public School Improvement Act of 1985 (Chapter 188) in July signaled a new era of education in Massachusetts. The act addresses the concerns of the citizens of the Commonwealth in regards to the equality of education offered to their children. The components of the legislation provides new opportunities and challenges to the Westport School Department and the Department of Education. While some sections of the act allow for an increase in local autonomy, others require increase in accountability. The created tension between local autonomy and accountability will eventually forge new partnerships in cooperation and collaboration between both the Commonwealth as a whole and communities in particular.

Most important however, is that the Public School Improvement Act speaks to those educational issues of major concern both nationally, statewide, and particularly in Westport; education finance, teacher quality, testing, basic skills remediation, drop-out prevention and early childhood education. We have, if we choose, the opportunity to assess resources, to improve our schools, to renew our teaching staff, and to gather data from the testing programs that we can use to assess our own progress.

Within a short period of time, the data gathered from the various programatic and assessment components of the act can help to determine whether we in Westport need additional assistance in providing quality education for our children, to reward us if we do provide quality education, or to recognize and encourage us if we have demonstrated that we have shown improvement. The Public School Improvement Act of 1985 not only looks ahead to equal educational opportunity but also to excellence.

The major challenge of the Public School Improvement Act to the Department of Education and to the Town of Westport in particular is its expedient and careful implementation. The department has marshalled its present resources to provide needed information to us resulting in the resources which the act offers have found their way to the Westport School Department.

At the present time, the Town of Westport will participate in the following: Equal Education Opportunity Grant, The School Improvement Council Grant, and the Professional Development Grant.

THE EQUAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT

Equal Educational Opportunity Grants are available to school districts which spend less than 85% of the average direct cost per weighted FTE pupil in Massachusetts. Westport is eligible to receive \$13,074.00 which represents 1/6th of the difference between the actual per pupil cost of Westport and the average for the state. Westport has voted to accept this grant at its Special Town Meeting of October 22, 1985. The money which we will receive will be spent in direct pupil services.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL GRANT

One of the major sections of the Public School Improvement Act is to establish a School Improvement Fund from which are allocated grants to schools that establish School Improvement Councils. We have received a total grant of \$10,700.00 of which \$2,430.00 is for the Alice A. Macomber School, K-5, \$6,430.00 for the Westport Elementary School, K-5, \$1,840.00 for the Westport Middle School, grade 6 only. This year the program was established to only service grades K-5. However, next year the program will be for all the grades K-12.

These councils will provide our schools with an exciting opportunity to enrich their educational resources both through the expenditure of the monies that will be given to each school, and through the process of including principal, teacher, parents and the community in the educational decision making process for the schools.

The School Improvement Councils of these three schools are currently meeting to determine how they will utilize these funds. Once they have completed deliberation, the respective School Improvement Councils will present their proposals to the School Committee for its approval

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

Another grant which the Public School Improvement Act has established is the Professional Development Grant. Westport is eligible to receive \$47,971.00 on or before February 15, 1986 with additional money to be available for distribution on August 5, 1986, February 5, 1987, and August 15, 1987. (In accordance with Section 13 of the School Improvement Act, these funds are solely to be used for teacher compensation.) The School Committee has negotiated with the

bargaining group of the teachers to determine the rationale of the teacher participation and the distribution of funds.

SECONDARY ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Westport High School Accreditation

The Westport High School received a favorable report on its two year progress report, and was therefore awarded continue accreditation by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. High Schools that receive accreditation are responsible to report back to the commission after a period of two years to demonstrate to the commission that they are implementing recommendations made by the visiting committee. The commission commended Westport High made by the visiting committee in October of 1983. The commission praised especially the progress made by the High School to foster a unifying spirit in school and the deveopment of a new process for short and long term curriculum planning.

S.A.T. Review Courses

The scholastic apptitude test reviews, both verbal and math courses initiated three years ago, continue this fall, and the impressive improvement in both the verbal and math scores seem to indicate that these courses are having positive results.

Advance Placement & Honors Course

New courses introduced to the High School this year were: Advanced Placement Biology, Advanced Placement English, Marine Biology, and Spanish. We are currently in the process of formulating honor courses for underclassman who have aspirations to take these advanced placement courses as well as formluate honors and advanced placement courses in mathematics and social studies. The development of an honors program should give the students who participate in the programs the background and experience needed to be successful in both the advance placement course and the advance placement national exams.

CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

Writing Across the Curriculum

Evidence of vertical articulation was demonstrated this year when Middle and High School staff discussed proposals for the improvement of courses in Mathematics, English, Science and Social Studies. The English staff joined to react to the observations and experiences of Mr. James H. Howard, nationally recognized consultant to teachers of composition. We are hoping to establish a writing across the curriculum program such as was successfully introduced in Great Britian then in Canada, and finally in many parts of the United States. It is

imperative that we return to the stressing of writing throughout our system, and that our children be made to write early and more often.

UNITED STATES HISTORY

Meanwhile, the Social Studies department is proposing that the study of United States History be offered over a two year program rather than the one year program that is presently followed. This recommendation will be placed before the School Committee to be approved for implementation in the fall of 1986.

ELEMENTARY ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

New Math Textbook Adoption

This fall the children and teachers have begun working with a new mathematics series in grades K-5. This program was selected after teachers and students piloted three different series during the past school year. It is too early to access any results. However, with this new adoption, children in each grade in the Elementary Schools are being provided the same basic programs as well as excellent support in supplementary materials to facilitate and enrich their math learning.

COMPUTER EDUCATION

This year, with the enthusiasm of our computer specialist, Miss Cynthia Rodrigues, the computer program has been expanded on a limited basis to grades 1 and 2. This computer program provides the children in grades 1-5 a computer exposure which will serve to introduce the children to computer literacy, computer assisted instruction, word processing, and programming in Logo. As the program continues to grow, and indeed it will, it will be absolutely necessary to increase our computer inventory as well as our staff. The Science, Social Studies and Language Arts program continue to provide our students with the contents and skills to be successful in these areas. The efforts of the teachers to prepare our children in the basic areas has been successful.

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

This year our English as a Second Language Program (ESL) has been expanded to include services for both Elementary and Middle students. These services were being provided on a part-time basis by Mrs. Judith Souza and Mrs. Natalia Silva, teacher and aide respectively. Together they have worked diligently to meet the needs of those students. At the same time the school department has screened the student population to determine whether additional students are in need of the ESL service. The screening resulted in fifty-eight students being identified and forty-

eight students as needing ESL services. Therefore, we reflected this need with a request for a full time ESL teacher for the 1986-1987 school year as required by law

GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM

Upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools, the School Committee authorized the formulation of a study committee to thoroughly study the needs for a Gifted and Talented Program for the Westport Public Schools. This committee is made up of parents, teachers, administrators and a member of the School Committee. The committee has worked long and hard to meet the charge given to them by the Superintendent of Schools. The study is now completed and will be presented to the School Committee at its January meeting. Hopefully, the recommendations of this committee will gain School Committee approval and will be implemented at the earliest possible date. This program has long been overdue in Westport.

CODE OF DISCIPLINE

The Westport School Committee revised its Code of Discipline which is currently being implemented by this administration to provide a positive educational milieu which is most conducive to maximizing each student's potential. The School Committee also stipulated that students who accumulate more than 10 days of suspensions will automatically be referred to the Superintendent of Schools for his recommendation for further action, which should culminate in certain cases in the exclusion or the expulsion of students. The education of the majority of the students will not be interrupted because of the actions of a few disorderly students.

Meanwhile, the Middle School, under the leadership of the new Principal, John Mello, initiated a Saturday In-School-Suspension Program. This program is to supplement the suspension programs that are currently being implemented.

PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

Special Education

This past year the Special Education Department has served approximately 280 students. The services range from classroom teacher consultation, to those which require programs in out of district places.

There were several significant developments in the area of Special Education. Among them was the development of two new programs at the Westport Middle School to serve those students whose needs would have required out of district

placement; had it not been for the development of these programs. I am proud to say that these programs are operating very effectively. Credit must be given to Mrs. Christine Carlile, and Mrs. Jeanne Leona, newly hired Special Needs Teachers for the development of these new programs as well as to Mrs. Mariette Vadeboncoeur, and Mrs. Joan Hickey, who have served as paraprofessionals in these programs. Also crucial to the success to these two new programs is the support which the rest of the Middle School staff, faculty, clerks, custodians, and cafeteria workers have given. Without the full support of the staff, no program can succeed.

GUIDANCE SERVICES

The guidance staff in the Westport Public Schools continues to provide exceptional service to the students, parents and faculty. However, more and more time is being placed on the crisis area with corresponding time loss and preventive programs. This is particularly true in the Middle School age group. Students approaching their adolescent years continue to exercise bad judgement in making certain social related decisions. The addition of Mr. Robert McCullen as the School Adjustment Counselor has made a significant difference in attempting to deal with some very serious issues concerning our young people.

At the same time, we have been fortunate to receive part-time services from the Fall River Department of Mental Health during the past two years. The arrangement allows us to have at least ten hours of psychological services each week. Many of the concerns with these young people go beyond the capabilities of any one agency and more and more cooperation between public service agencies is needed in order to adequately address these concerns.

SCHOOL NURSES

Our school nurses continue to work hard in providing the health services to our students. In addition to the emergency first aid procedures, our nurses must check the immunization records of all students, administer vision and hearing tests to all students, and supervise the Scoliosis screening of the majority of our students.

The nurses we have are dedicated, conscientious, hard working group, and we are extremely proud of them.

BUSINESS OPERATION

Maintenance of Building

A goodly portion of this years school business was devoted to the maintenance of school buildings and grounds. To name a few projects:

ASBESTOS - REMOVAL AND ENCAPSULATING

The School Department witnessed a difficult year in regard to the removal and encapsulating of asbestos. Due to Town insurance liability requirements, it was necessary for us to remove or encapsulate asbestos which was identified at the High School, Middle School, Alice A. Macomber School, and the Administration Building. The Town, at a Special Town Meeting, approved \$67,200.00 for this project. The Alice A. Macomber School posed a major problem for us. This problem was located in the crawl space located under the school. This problem originated in 1958 when the order was given to remove the asbestos from the pipes which the asbestos covered. They were removed and simply allowed to lie on the ground of the crawl space until now, when the situation was identified as hazardous. We are addressing this problem presently. The Town has graciously granted the School Department funds to alleviate this situation.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PLAYGROUND

Gutters were installed at the Elementary School during the fall of 1985. Hardtop was applied to the sloped area of the playground, after a better drainage system was installed. The Town Highway Department, under the supervision of Mr. Russell Hart, rendered valuable assistance to the School Department in this activity, and we are grateful for the cooperation extended by Mr. Hart and his department.

Additional gutters will need to be installed and will be in the near future. More work will also be done on the playground area.

Student playground injuries have been substantially reduced as a result of the improvements made.

SCHOOL ROOFS

Major roof work has been accomplished for portions of the High School and the Alice A. Macomber roof. We are presently studying the Westport Elementary School roof to determine whether any repair is needed and if so, of what magnitude.

Last year in our annual report we reported that we had received grants totaling \$87,767.15 to be paid over five years for energy savings grants. Presently we have applied for additional state grants which will reimburse to the Town approximately 55 to 60% of the cost of the roof repairs previously done. At the

same time, we have submitted applications for a technical energy audit grant for maintenance and energy work at Westport High School.

PERSONNEL

Negotiations

Numerous hours were spent negotiating with administrators, teachers, clerks, paraprofessionals, custodians, and cafeteria workers. We have signed three year contracts with the administrators and the teachers, and we are presently in mediation with the other group.

Retirement

This year, the Westport School Department accepted the retirement of Mrs. Irene Mickelson, English teacher at Westport High School after 18 years; Mr. Clayton Emery, Industrial Arts teacher at Westport High School after 18 years, Mr. George Salvador, Social Studies teacher at Westport High School after 27 years. We wish these people well in their new endeavor and at the same time we thank them for their years of service to the youth of Westport.

Administrative Changes

The School Department accepted the resignation of Dr. Nicholas Balasalle, Mr. Donald Brightman, and Mr. Robert Bray, Principal of the Westport Middle School, Principal of the Westport Elementary School, and Assistant Principal of the Westport Middle School respectively. The School Committee appointed Mr. John Mello as Principal of the Westport Middle School, Mr. Robert Smith as Principal of the Westport Elementary School and Mrs. Mariette Paine as Assistant Principal of the Westport Middle School. At the same time, Mr. Manuel Cabral was appointed Assistant Principal at the Westport High School replacing Mr. John Mello.

In conclusion, I express my deepest appreciation to the parents, students, teachers, administrators, and townspeople for helping to make 1985 a successful year.

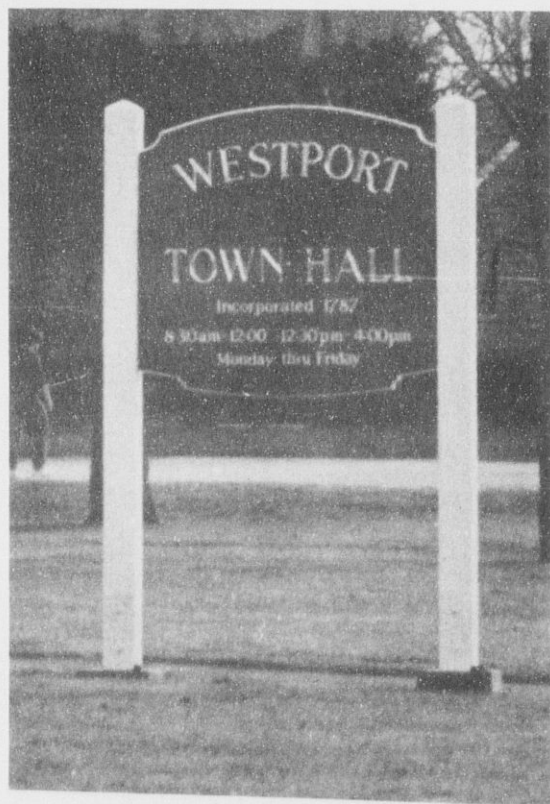
