ANNUAL REPORT of the BOARD OF SELECTMEN

As the year draws to a close, we reflect back over a time both of sorrow and of accomplishment; Nineteen Eighty-Nine has been a demanding and challenging year.

In November, we were faced with the sudden loss of our Chairman, Ronald A. Desrosiers. His years of commitment and service will always be remembered as a highlight for the Town, and his absence will long be felt.

We have been struck by the loss of other distinguished public servants: Lieutenant Richard Parker, who served on the Police Department from 1968 until his death; Roxane "Rocky" Delano, former Administrative Assistant to the Board of Selectmen who went on to serve the Town as the law partner to our Town Counsel; George Mosher, a dedicated firefighter for 36 years; and John Long, Representative to the General Court for 23 years, representing Westport from 1975 to 1980.

Each had devoted their life to the service and betterment of our town, and it is to these people and others like them that we dedicate this Annual Report.

Staffing Changes

At the first of May, Selectman William R. Plamondon offered his resignation. Through a special election held on August 21st, we welcomed Francois A. Napert as our newest Selectmen.

Also in August, Claire Medeiros tendered her resignation as clerk in the Selectmen's office. Charlene Rousseau was hired on a temporary basis while we explored an office reorganization plan to better serve the needs of the Town.

Gary Sherman was appointed as Shellfish Constable following David Roach's resignation. Gary had served as Acting Shellfish Constable for several months prior to his permanent appointment.

In the wake of budget reductions, we notified the town of Dartmouth that as of July 1, 1990, Westport would no longer be able to participate in the shared Personnel Administrator position. With the elimination of this position, we have reorganized the office staff, rearranging one and one-half positions, creating a Confidential Clerk to the Board of Selectmen and a part-time clerical position to assist other departments and volunteer boards without clerical assistance of their own.

Financial Issues

In August we were astonished to receive a \$654,170 (15%) cut in the local aid received from the State, in response to the State's announced budget deficit for the current (FY90) fiscal year. Since appropriations had already been made for the year by the Annual Town Meeting, not anticipating the local aid cut, the Town was faced with Special Town Meetings to balance the budget.

After hard work by the Finance Committee and the many Boards, Committees, and department heads, Town Meeting voted on a plan to bring the budget into balance. The cuts made to department budgets were painful to the residents who count on the services that the Town provides, as we are faced with trying to meet the growing demand for public services with increasingly scarce resources.

These cuts were minor compared to the cuts faced for the coming fiscal year (FY91). Proposition 2½ severely limits the Town's ability to raise revenues to keep pace with the increasing costs of providing services; Federal Revenue Sharing has been eliminated; and now, local aid is being relent-

lessly cut at the State level.

PROJECT UPDATES

Water Main

After many years of working toward a water main extension, we were delighted to receive notification in August from the Executive Office of Communities and Development of a grant award in the amount of \$511,000 for the installation of a water main extension. The main will provide water from Fall River to the homes and businesses in the area of Route Six and Sanford Road now suffering from the effects of gasoline contamination in their private wells.

We have appointed a Water Advisory Committee who will assist in the processes involved in the project, and who will provide us with assistance needed in planning for future water main expansions.

Our sincere gratitude is extended to Representative Ed Lambert, Congressman Barney Frank, and Senator Tom Norton for their assistance in obtaining this grant award.

Town Building Committee

The Town Building Committee, which also serves as the School Building Committee, has made admirable progress in the Town's ongoing building maintenance plan. With a total of \$75,000 appropriated after budget cuts, the Committee has committed funds for the repair of the roof and replacement of the HVAC equipment at the Library, replacement of the roofs at the American Legion Hall and Police Station, installation of new heating systems at the American Legion Hall and the Highway building, and the installation of a fire prevention system at the Town Hall.

The Town Building Committee will continue to seek the necessary funding to continue with a sound maintenance schedule to protect these major Town assets.

Collective Bargaining Agreements

Negotiations were scheduled throughout the Spring of 1989 for three employee contracts due to expire on June 30, 1989. As of this writing, the Town Hall Departments and Police contracts were settled; and the Town has entered into formal mediation with the Fire Department to work together toward a fair contract settlement.

The Highway Department contract will expire on June 30, 1990 and negotiation sessions are expected to begin shortly.

Insurance Programs

We have launched into an aggressive and comprehensive evaluation of the Town's insurance programs. We are working to control the ever-increasing costs of providing insurance coverage, and to limit to potential drain on our resources caused by accidents and other losses. This "risk management" program is designed to address on the job injuries, property damage, and many other forms of potential liability to the Town.

Also, working with Town employees as an Employee Benefit Advisory Committee, we are investigating the spiraling costs of providing employee health insurance benefits. The Town has joined a

joint purchase group with a number of other Bristol County communities who will work together to bring the costs and benefits of the program under our joint control.

This Employee Benefit Advisory Committee is looking also to other ways of providing important employee benefits at a reduced cost to both the Town and its employees.

Charter Commission

The November Special Town Meeting gave our Board the authorization to undertake the necessary steps leading to an election of a Charter Commission. Under the Home Rule Amendment in the Massachusetts Constitution, the Town may elect a nine member Charter Commission to examine the existing governmental structure, and make recommendations for reworking it to provide a more responsive, efficient, and economical government in Westport.

The Commission will be charged with interviewing interested citizens, including past and present town officials; researching and discussing existing governmental units; and providing a final report on those units which are functioning well while offering recommendations on procedures and structures in need of modification.

We are looking forward to the Fall 1990 or Spring 1991 approval by voters for this Charter Commission, and the election of its members.

Affordable Housing Issues

As the cost of housing in Westport continues to rise, we see those who might otherwise wish to live in Westport being forced to seek housing in other communities solely for financial reasons.

To help us address this alarming trend, we have appointed a Fair Housing/Housing Partnership Committee to develop housing goals, overall housing strategies, and fair housing programs for the Town of Westport. This Committee is a coalition of local officials, housing advocates, clergy, business leaders, and other interested residents who will first work to determine the housing needs of the Town, then work to develop a set of goals and an action plan to help meet the needs of the community.

Gasoline Contamination Clean-up at the Head of Westport

We wish to thank the members of the Landing Commission and the Hazardous Waste Coordinator for their invaluable efforts in advancement of the clean-up efforts at the Head of Westport.

The progress has continually been frustrated by changing and overly demanding state regulations. The estimated cost for the work continues to grow without end in sight. We are seeking relief from the exorbitant costs by working with the State Auditor's Office to have a determination made as to whether this massive effort amounts to an "unfunded mandate" by the state under the provisions of Proposition 2½.

Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination

The Town has come into compliance with the many requirements placed on us under the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD), by putting into place formal policies on affirmative hiring goals, non-discrimination in housing, and contract compliance. These non-discrimina-

ation policy statements and the programs developed to achieve these goals are available for public review and we will welcome your comments.

Special Events

Westport, Massachusetts was proud to host the Fourth Annual World of Westports Convention over the Fourth of July weekend last summer. Host families in Westport welcomed visitors from Towns of Westport in Connecticut, New York, Washington, Missouri, California, Ireland, New Zealand, and Nova Scotia.

The Convention Committee combined events with the Town's own Fourth of July celebration to provide a parade, fireworks, and a number of other exciting events. Many new friendships developed, and all Westport residents received exciting invitations to attend future Conventions around the world!

In closing, we credit the employees of the Town for their dedicated and capable service to the residents of the Town. We thank the many appointed and elected officials for their time and efforts on behalf of the Town.

It is through the volunteer efforts of our fine community residents, who offer their valuable time and expertise, that we are able to develop policy direction for the Town. We look forward to enhancing our working relationships with the other Town Committees and Boards, and continuing to serve the residents of Westport.

We thank you for your support.

taining, repairing, or replacing, but not substantially changing or enlarging, an existing and lawfully located structure or facilities used in the service of the public and used to provide electric, gas, water, telephone, telegraph and other telecommunication services.

Section 3 PROCEDURES

All applications for permits, requests for determination of applicability, permits, determinations and conditions attached thereto shall be in conformance with and made under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 131, section 40.

Section 4 ENFORCEMENT

Any person who violates any provision of this By-law, any regulations promulgated hereunder, or permits or conditions of permits issued by the Conservation Commission, shall be subject to a penalty of One Hundred Dollars for each offense. Each day, or portion thereof, during which violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

Recharge Area: Any area of porous or semi porous or permeable geologic deposits from which the water drains or is held in storage;

Solid Waste: Rubbish, garbage, scrap, junk, refuse;

SPGA: The Planning Board acting as the Special permit Granting Authority;

Watershed: A drainage basin;

Water Supply Drainage Basin: An area within which there is water which is used as a water supply.

Aquifer Protection District:

The location of the Aquifer Protection District is the Bread and Cheese Brook Watershed.

Permitted Uses:

1. Single and two family dwellings as provided herein;
2. Conservation of soil, water, plants, and wildlife;
3. Recreation, boating, fishing, agriculture;
4. Operation of and maintenance of existing ponds, brooks and dams;
5. Public utilities and facilities which do not contaminate surface or ground water;
6. Development which does not render more then twenty-five (25.0%) percent of the lot impervious, as provided herein;
7. Low or no salt use in snow removal.

Prohibited Uses:

1. The rendering of impervious of more than twenty-five (25.0%) percent of a lot without SPGA approval;
2. Industrial, commercial or business uses which discharge wastewater of sanitary sewage without SPGA approval;
3. Outdoor storage of chemicals or road salt or calcium;
4. Disposal of hazardous wastes;
5. Underground storage of petroleum and petroleum products without SPGA approval;
6. Disposal of Leachate waste, solid waste, snow, herbicides, and pesticides, dry cleaning waste, laundry or automobile waste, water softening discharge;
7. Contamination of surface or ground water.

Uses Permitted by SPGA:

1. Changes or expansion of non conforming uses with SPGA approval;
2. Subdivisions within the meaning of the Subdivision Control Law with SPGA authority;
3. Public water supply with SPGA approval, 310 CMR 22.

Rules & Regulations:

The SPGA shall adopt rules and a set of regulations which shall prescribe the size, style, content of petitions under this By-Law; and this By-Law shall only become effective upon: public hearing by the SPGA on developing rules and regulations and the filing of rules and regulations with the Town Clerk.

ANNUAL REPORT of the WESTPORT ARTS COUNCIL

The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1989.

The Westport Arts Council was comprised of 12 members: Carol Long, Chairperson (term expired Oct. 24); Carmen Maiocco, Secretary; Kurt Wisneski, Treasurer (Chairperson as of Oct. 24); Janice Whalen, Treasurer (as of Oct. 24); Sarah Jackson, Recording Secretary; Beth Easterly, Publicity; and Charlotte Fitch, Sarah Jansen, Betsy Ann Szel, Deborah Collidge, Gladys Riemer, Clara Stewart.

Carol Long, Charlotte Fitch and Sarah Jansen faithfully served as members for the six year maximum term. Sarah Jansen served as the PASS Program Coordinator and Carol Long guided the Arts Council as Chairperson for 1 year. We thank them for their dedicated community service.

Two additional members were appointed by the Selectmen on October 30, 1989. They are Jacqueline Coyne and Anna Mason.

Twice a year, the Westport Arts Council distributes funds generated for the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council (MALC) by the MEGABUCKS game. Each town's allotment is determined on a per capita basis. The funding periods are announced in local newspapers and by posters distributed throughout the town. Applications are due in early October and early April. The grant applications are available at the Town Clerk's office throughout the year.

The members of the Westport Arts Council-all have related experience in the arts-decide which grants meet the criteria of the MALC and will benefit our community and then submit these decisions to the MALC for their final approval. The MALC was formed to stimulate and encourage the arts within cities and towns by administering the distribution raised through the arts lottery game conducted by the State Lottery Commission. Funded cultural activities and performances benefit the greater community and recently funded artwork is displayed at the Westport Library and the Town Hall.

During the October 1988 meetings, a total of \$4,435 was distributed for the January 1989 funding period and \$4,435 was distributed in the July 1989 funding period. Our October 1988 meetings funded 11 applications and the following represents a partial list of arts-related activities funded: Artist in Residency Program for the Westport High School; a Modern Dance and Lecture Event/a Flute and Guitar Recital at the Bell School House; 18th and 19th Century Westport House Research and Documentation; a Participatory Music Workshop; and the New Bedford Symphony Orchestra

Our April meetings funded 11 applications and the following represents a partial list of arts-related activities funded: Music and Storytelling by Yankee Notions for the Westport Recreation Commission; an Arts and Crafts Exhibition at the Westport Art Group; the Paul Cuffee School Harvest Festival Music Presentation; Magnolia at the Westport River Day for the Westport River Alliance; The Secrets in the Toy Room by the Lewis School for the Arts; Bennington Puppets at the Alice Macomber School; two musical concerts at the Westport Historical Society; the New Bedford Symphony Orchestra; and an adult festival for the Very Special Arts program.

We also funded applications targeted especially to Massachusetts school grades K-12 to encourage attendance at cultural performances. These Performing Arts Student Series (PASS) grants reimburse ticket prices up to \$5.00 per student for public/private educational systems. During the 1989 year, a total of \$1,077 was distributed in the January 1989 funding period and \$535 was distributed in the July 1989 funding period. Our October 1988 meetings funded 4 PASS applications for the January 1989 period and the following activities were funded: Macomber School, Zeiterion Theater; Paul

Cuffee School, Zeiterion Theater (two performances); and Westport Elementary School, Boston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concert. Our April 1989 meetings funded 3 applications for the July 1989 period and the following were funded: Paul Cuffee School, Boston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concert; Paul Cuffee School, Revel Inc. at the John Hancock Hall, Boston; and Macomber School, Zeiterion Theater.

The Westport Arts Council encourages applications by individual artists, musicians, performers, cultural groups and school teachers for projects which will benefit our community.

ANNUAL REPORT
of the
BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1989 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed thirty years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

The 1989 mosquito season began in early spring when mosquito larvae began to appear in large numbers throughout the county. Heavy rains during the end of the 1988 mosquito season and throughout the entire 1989 season created excellent breeding areas. This situation made the 1989 season one that would long be remembered as one of the worst mosquito infested seasons on record.

The calls for service during this year were double that of any previous year since the Project began 30 years ago. Sometimes during this year it was hard to know who was winning, the mosquitoes or our spraying efforts, but as no mosquito related health problems existed, it appeared we did accomplish our goal. It is impossible to totally control all of the mosquitoes in all areas but if they can be kept at tolerable levels without an outbreak of any mosquito related diseases then we feel we have provided a worthwhile service.

The Project answered all requests for spraying along with our regular spraying of known infested areas for a total of 3,393.9 sprayed acres.

MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT (cont.)

During the spring and summer months catch basins that were found to be breeding were treated. During the fall and winter months brush was cut from ditches to keep the water flowing.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

ANNUAL REPORT of the CONSERVATION COMMISSION SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD

The Conservation Commission/Soil Conservation Board respectfully submits its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1989.

The annual election was held in May with the following results: Calvin Hopkinson, Chairman; Anne Barnes, Vice-Chairman; Thomas Porter, Secretary-Treasurer; and Alan Manchester, Antonio B. Gracia, Donald Bernier, and David Dionne continuing to serve as Commission members.

Our staff, John Rockwell, Agent, and Sue Silvia, Senior Clerk, accomplished a great task maintaining progress in all areas, i.e., planning meetings, scheduling hearings, updating files, organizing, typing minutes, and reviewing engineering details. Acquisitions of a map draw has facilitated storage and relieved file space. Managing the paper trail is a major task in the office.

Due to the Town budget being reduced by State aid, the Commission's budget was reduced by \$11,550.

During the year, the Commission processed fifty (50) Notices of Intent, seventy nine (79) Requests for Determination, seven (7) Amended Orders of Conditions, forty (40) Certificates of Compliance, six (6) Enforcement Orders, six (6) Extensions, two (2) Abbreviated Notices of Intent, and one (1) Emergency Certificate. The Soil Conservation Board issued four (4) new soil permits and fifteen (15) renewed soil permits. Continued growth in all areas of Westport, the barrier beach, inland, and the river front, is reflected in aforementioned documents.

A very pleasant experience was enjoyed by the Commission when a research intern was employed from the Lloyd Center to monitor the piping plover along the Horseneck Beaches. This small and fragile member of the seashore bird community is an endangered species. While monitoring the plover, the intern checked the Town parking lots and the Horseneck Point Critical Area Treatment measures. Periodic and final reports were presented to the Commission and payment for the intern's services came from a grant from the Westport Watershed Alliance and the interest from the Conservation Fund monies.

The A.P.R. Program was again administered, although no new farms were added and the funds appropriated, \$10,000, at the Annual Town Meeting were deleted at a subsequent special meeting.

Beach grass growth on the Horseneck Point treatment area continued to provide good ground cover and reduced wind erosion of the dunes at Horseneck Point. Each year the S.C.S. District Conservationist inspects and evaluated progress of the plantings and other measures.

New and additional workshops were presented by D.E.P., Conservation Districts, and the M.A.C.C. Our Agent, Mr. Rockwell, and Commission members attended various training classes. One session, conducted by Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute, specifically dealt with the effect of rising tides on the east coast of Massachusetts.

Removal of underground storage tanks required inspection for leakage and soil contamination. The Hazardous Waste Coordinator, Anne Barnes, various Commissioners or their Agent, along with the Fire Department representatives were present for these tank removals.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION/SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD (cont.)

The Westport Conservation Commission/Soil Conservation Board at this time feels it must recognize Norman Sasseville, who served from 1/28/64 through 2/14/89 (twenty-five years) on the Commission. Mr. Sasseville, a member of the S.M.U. biology staff, will be fondly remembered for his dedication and service to the Town of Westport supported by the presentation of his views and knowledge.

Each year the Commission's work increases in quantity and complexity. As laws are revised and expanded and as more land contiguous to wetlands becomes available to developers, the Commission works diligently with the help of its staff to review in concert the work plans and insure that such do not adversely effect the wetland resources, vital parts of the water cycle.

The Commission wishes to thank its staff and other Town boards, departments, and private citizens for their cooperation. The decisions in 1989 were made with public interest in mind.

(Volunteer Income Tax Assistance), Walk-In Clinics (Nursing Department), Christmas Party (S.M.U.), Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinners/Baskets (Bristol Elder Services, Inc., A.B.C.D.E., American Legion, Kiwanis, Lion's Club, Westport Newcomers, and Westport High School).

NUTRITION PROGRAM

During the year, 8,824 meals were delivered to the homebound by the Fall River Nutrition program under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, and paid for, in part, by the Town of Westport. This is an increase of 2,027 meals over last year, with an addition of twenty-four clients for a total of 94 unduplicated homebound elders being served during this year.

FEDERAL FOOD AND SURPLUS GIVE AWAY & SEED PROGRAM

With the help of Rita Maynard, Maisie Boulds, Dot Kirby, Madeline Manchester, members of the "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", High School students and the Highway Department, 1,361 households and 2,101 low-income persons received federal surplus food products. Seventy-five persons received kits containing seeds for a complete vegetable garden.

ELDER VISITORS & COMPANION

The Elder Visitors and Companion made approximately 398 visits to the homebound a month bringing support and friendship as well as books and magazines to 176 elders.

COUNCIL ON AGING (cont.)

NEWSLETTER, "EVERGREEN"

Fourteen hundred copies are distributed monthly to area locations. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication and William A. Greeley for his assistance in the distribution.

CLINICS

A Podiatry Clinic was held every other month funded by client contributions. The two participating podiatrists are Dr. Kenneth Brum and Dr. Marshall Taitz. Clara Duquette is an assistant. Every Wednesday morning from 10 a.m. until 12 noon, the Nursing Department offers free blood pressure, urine and blood check-ups to Westport residents 60+ and a cholesterol screening the last Wednesday of the month, by appointment.

MEDI-MATE

Four Medi-Mate units purchased by the Council with a grant from the Romero Trust, are connected to St. Anne's Hospital emergency system. These "instant-alert" units are given to low-income Westport residents living alone and in precarious health. They will be kept by the Town to be used where needed. Two new units were given to the C.O.A. by the "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc."

"FRIENDS OF THE WESTPORT COUNCIL ON AGING, INC."

"Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", a non-profit organization has sponsored several successful events. The "Friends" are planning a long-range program to provide the elders of Westport with a Senior Center. Their current project is a Westport telephone book which is on sale throughout the Town. Evelyn Samson served as President for five years. Nancy Silva is the new President.

GRANTS

The Council received a renewal of its Discretionary Grant from the Massachusetts E.O.E.A. for \$4,400 to conduct an Elder Visitor Program for 14 hours a week in order to help low-income elders. A Grant of \$4,698 was also received to support a Companion/Elder Visitor program to sit with homebound elders while their caregivers may leave, and for a Needs Assessment, as the last one was conducted in 1981. The Consortium Grant first awarded in 1986 to Somerset, Swansea and Westport to train Home Health Aides is still running. We received an additional \$3,000 for Fiscal Year '89. Classes began in January, 1989 and twenty (20) Home Health Aides were graduated.

IN SUMMARY

While the overall population of Westport has decreased from 13,574 in 1981 to 13,235 in 1988, the number of people over 60 years of age has increased from 2,255 to 2,587 and they are living longer and more in need of assistance so that in spite of a budget crunch the load on the Council on Aging is ever increasing.

I would like to take this opportunity to express our bereavement on the passing of Selectman Ronald A. Desrosiers and retired Firefighter/EMT George F. Mosher.

The year 1989 was an active one for the Fire Department. We not only had two separate fatal fires, which claimed the lives of two people and the High School fire, which affected nearly everyone in the Town in some manner, but many programs and committees were instituted. Staff meetings consisting of the Chief Officers and the Line Officers were held on a regular basis to discuss the operation of the Fire Department as well as establish new policies and Rules and Regulations. The Reed Road Fire Station was changed from a full time, manned station to a Call station. Many hours were spent with the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee working on monetary solutions to the budget problems facing the Fire Department and the Town.

Through the cooperation of the Fall River Firefighters' Memorial Museum and the efforts of members of the Fire Education Committee of the Westport Fire Department, a Fire Education program has been established in the school system, as well as available to civic organizations and the general public.

A Firefighter Training Committee was established, which is responsible for devising a formal training program for the firefighters. This committee in turn selected a Drillmaster and an Assistant Drillmaster who are responsible to the committee and responsible for conducting the firefighting training. An EMS Training Coordinator was also designated, which person is responsible for all ambulance related training.

A Hazardous Materials Response Team has just recently been chosen. The members were selected on a voluntary basis, thereby individuals who have an interest and concern in this specialized field of the Fire Service comprise this team. The responsibilities of this team have not at this time been clearly defined, however the members have been attending various seminars to gain additional knowledge and expertise. Hazardous Materials is a very technical and dangerous aspect of the Fire Service, and we must face the fact that we can no longer ignore its existence. With all the trucks transporting hazardous materials through and within our Town, and the businesses selling and storing hazardous materials (including farms), we must assure that our personnel are properly trained in the handling of hazardous materials.

During 1989 the number of vehicle fires in the Town was decreased by approximately 40%. I attribute this substantial decrease to the dedication and hard work performed by the Fire Investigation Unit within the Fire Department. In 1989 there were 41 vehicle fires, of which 15 were proven to be intentionally set. Of these 15 vehicle fires 7 were solved as to who set the fire. These cases are presently awaiting processing by the Westport Police Department. The reputation of conducting thorough investigations by Westport's Fire Investigation Unit, has spread quickly into the area, thereby decreasing the number of vehicle fires intentionally burned in our Town, whereby other area Fire Departments are showing increases.

We also saw the Permanent Firefighters from the Reed Road Fire Station reassigned to the other stations, and this station becoming a call station. An attempt to gain the necessary funding to put personnel back into the station was unsuccessful with the defeat of an article on the August ballot to override Proposition 2½. Approval of this override article would have assured Permanent Firefighters in the Reed Road Fire Station as well as manning of two ambulances around the clock.

At the present time we have five permanent personnel out on extended sick leave or injured on duty leave. This has put a financial burden on the Town as well as the Fire Department. Because of

FIRE DEPARTMENT (cont.)

the present retirement system, we are placed in a very precarious financial situation. It is not an easy process to get an injured firefighter off of the payroll. These personnel cannot be replaced by Call Firefighters, because the Union Contract mandates a 100% work preference for Permanent Firefighters, meaning their replacement must be paid at time and one-half. This situation really "ties our hands" as to what relief we can obtain from this financially binding bureaucracy.

Because of the complexity of the present retirement system, I am taking the liberty at this time of setting out the steps required to get an injured Firefighter "retired"

Compensation for Firefighters injured on duty is covered under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 32 Section 111F, as opposed to the more common Workmen's Compensation Laws. If someone is injured on the job, through no fault of their own, they may be entitled to benefits under this law. If someone is injured on duty and the injury is determined to be permanent, they or the employer may file with the Bristol County Retirement Board (BCRB) for Accidental Disability. The BCRB then calls the injured employee before the Board for a hearing. The BCRB then refers the injured employee to a Board of three Doctors for their evaluation. The evaluation, along with their recommendation is then sent back to the BCRB, which will then review the report. The BCRB then has the power to approve the Accidental Disability Retirement, or appeal the decision to PERA (Public Employee Retirement Administration). The same steps as previously stated are followed. If a decision is still not reached or it is not agreeable to the BCRB, it can be referred to CRAB (Contributory Retirement Appeal Board), or in some circumstances, by the appropriate District Court. The CRAB board consists of three members, an assistant Attorney General, who acts as the chairman; the Commissioner of PERA or his designee; and a person appointed by the Governor. If the matter being considered by CRAB concerns a disability retirement, the Commissioner of Public Health or his designee substitutes for the Commissioner of PERA.

When an appeal is made to CRAB, they must assign the matter to an administrative magistrate from the Division of Administrative Law Appeals. The administrative magistrate conducts a hearing and issues a recommended decision. CRAB must review the recommended decision and issue its "Promulgated Decision" within six months after the conclusion of the hearing by the administrative magistrate. CRAB's final decision may be appealed to the Superior Court. There is presently one case in the Westport Fire Department that has recently been through all these steps and is being appealed to the Superior Court.

The Town's people have a lot of decisions to make in the very near future. I strongly believe the protection of life and property has to be their major priority.

The Westport Fire Department and I, as Chief, will continue to provide the best possible service and dedication as is humanly and financially possible.

This is my first annual report submitted to the communities that make up the Greater Fall River Vocational School District: Fall River, Somerset, Swansea, and Westport.

It is indeed a pleasure to be of service to a District that overflows in pride and community emphasis. I look forward to leading our district into the 1990's and beyond into the 21st century.

This report reflects a successful year for the Greater Fall River Vocational School District Committee in its continuing efforts to provide quality vocational education for the region's secondary, post-secondary, and adult populations.

Chapter 74 Evaluation

The educational experiences associated with the forthcoming Chapter 74 evaluation and subsequent curriculum development has benefited all staff members. We are ready for our Chapter 74 evaluation due March 21-22, 1990.

School Improvement Council

Our Governor's Alliance Against Drugs Council/School Improvement Council has been quite active in determining school needs and using the limited grant funds in meeting those needs. We have received School Improvement Council funds of

Program Advisory Committees

The Program Advisory Committees held their first meeting of the 1989-90 school year on October 19, 1989. The winter meeting of this group will be held on February 27, 1990. Our advisors have reviewed each shop program curriculum and have assisted in the selection of capital cost equipment.

Retirement

Mr. George Pickering began his teaching career at Diman in 1970 as an auto body instructor. In 1982 he was appointed auto body department head and served in that capacity until June 1989 when he retired. We wish George a very healthy and happy retirement and thank him for dedicating 18 years of service to the students in our district.

Co-op Program

One hundred fifty students participated in the co-operative education program. Each training site was visited frequently to assure that the outlined skills the student learned and strengthened on the job were appropriate and met his/her job needs.

Trade Fair

During the Trade Fair and Open House weekend over 2,000 visitors toured the high school and post-secondary facilities. Student projects were demonstrated and exhibited, and judges representing the various program advisory committees selected the first, second, and third place winners in each shop.

Admissions

The results of our recruitment efforts showed the number of applicants for grade 9 rising from 445 in 1988 to 454 in 1989. Three hundred and twenty-nine Freshmen started at Diman in September. Even though we no longer have a lengthy waiting list our overall enrollment reached 1,104 high school students. Every applicant who met our entrance standards was accommodated excepting those on the 502.4 waiting list. We should consider ourselves fortunate that we have been able to add programs and increase our enrollment when many vocational-technical schools are faced with sharply declining enrollments and the elimination of under-subscribed programs. With the use of EEOG funds, we received school committee approval to have a professionally made video tape produced to aid in our recruitment efforts for 1989. Each feeder school was given its own copy of the video. We continue to offer tours of Diman for prospective applicants, hold an information night in January, send out invitations to Open House, and visit feeder schools.

The summer exploratory program continues to help in our recruitment effort. In September 1989, one hundred three new freshmen had participated in the 1988 summer exploratory program.

Career Day

The Guidance Department sponsored our sixth College Career Day with 10 colleges and technical schools represented. A large number of seniors, juniors and some parents took advantage of the opportunity to speak with the representatives present and to collect valuable information.

Counseling

This year was the first year in which we have had the services of a part-time adjustment/crisis counselor. Deborah Andrade joined our staff in November 1988 on a two-day week basis. In September of '89 she increased to three days per week, however, she had additional responsibilities with our remedial reading program and working with special needs students in culinary arts. Mrs. Andrade is also an important liaison person with area referral agencies such as Corrigan Mental Health Clinic and Department of Social Services.

Follow-up Surveys

In April 1989, the Guidance Department sent out the Chapter 74 Completer Follow-Up form to 211 from the graduating class of 1988.

Of the 177 who responded or were contacted:

77	were working in areas related to their vocational training
60	were working in a non-related area
22	were pursuing additional education
13	were in military service
5	were unemployed

In late June and early July, the Guidance Department and the Job Placement Coordinator recorded the placement of the 1989 graduates.

Of 222 graduates:

133	were in trade related jobs
24	were working outside their Diman trade
11	were planning to enter the military
44	were planning further education

The overall average hourly wage was \$6.25, up from \$5.79 in 1988.

Orientation Programs

In late August, an orientation program was held in the school cafeteria for approximately 350 new students. Students were given instructions for the opening of school, handbooks and schedules were distributed and explained, and necessary forms and bus routes were given out.

A "Parent Night" was held on September 26th to familiarize parents of new students with school programs, the school's philosophy and its policies. School administrators were present to explain their roles to the parents who attended. Approximately 250 parents and students attended.

Testing

In October, the Guidance Department administered the state-mandated Basic Skills Tests in reading, math and writing to 313 grade 9 students and 85 grade 10 and 11 students who failed one, two or three parts of the tests given previously. The results should arrive in January 1990 and will be used to offer remediation to those who fail (below 65%) the reading and math portions of the Basic Skills Tests.

In April and May, approximately 380 newly accepted grade 9 students and those on the waiting list were tested with the results being used for academic and shop placement prior to their enrollment in September 1989. In October, 40 grade 11 students who are contemplating college after graduation were administered the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test.

The Guidance Director working with Mr. Bentley and Mr. Dugal arranged for the Annual Red Cross Blood Drive which was held on December 12th. This year teachers and students from Health Careers provided much assistance to the Red Cross workers during the day's activities. Fifty units of blood were donated by staff, faculty, and students, both technical institute and high school, and walk-in donors.

Attendance

I am happy to report that the average attendance through the last day of school in June was over 93% average daily attendance. I find this percent to be extremely indicative of the interest of the students who attend Diman and the strong school-parent-student partnership that encourages good attendance while having built-in safeguards against truancy.

Class Night for the Senior Class of 1989 was held on May 31, 1989, in the school's auditorium. The event was a most enjoyable and entertaining night for students, parents and invited guests. Graduation ceremonies were held on Sunday, June 3, 1989, in the school gymnasium. The event, albeit warm, was attended by over one-thousand invited guests.

The 1989-90 school year began with the highest ever student enrollment that Diman has experienced. At the high school level Diman opened with 1,104 students. Currently, the 1989-90 daily attendance is approximately 95% which indicates the high level of interest Diman students possess in the quality education they are receiving.

Summer School Programs

For the past several years the guidance counselors have spearheaded the recruitment of students for the very successful summer exploratory program. In the spring, counselors visit area feeder schools to inform grade 7 students about the exploratory program.

During the Summer of 1989, Diman continued its remediation programs for students. In addition, programs were offered for incoming 9th grade students and for current 7th grade students in our Exploratory Program.

Diman also became a Bristol County Training Consortium work-site for students enrolled in Diman who met the eligibility requirements. The summer school program was very successful with a total of 424 students in the following programs.

Post-Secondary Programs

After repeated attempts to save the Dental and Medical Assistant Programs, a recommendation was made to eliminate both courses of study. Program cost, enrollment, and space were considerations in reaching this decision. The school committee on October 26, 1989, approved discontinuation.

Three contracts with Bristol County Training Consortium and one contract with Job Training and Employment were negotiated for post-secondary students' expenses. Thirteen tuition waivers were also processed.

Continued affiliation with the Providence Veterans Administration Hospital has resulted in five of their employees being trained as L.P.N.'s and full tuition paid to Diman. In addition, the V.A. has provided a part-time instructor.

Through the generosity of the Truesdale Clinic, three students were awarded Pierce Foundation Grants of \$500.

National Honor Society

During this year the local chapter of the National Honor Society became a more active group participating in many activities. New members were formally inducted into the society last May during an evening ceremony. Dr. William J. Kelly, associate professor of English at BCC, served as the guest speaker at the induction ceremonies.

Student Government Day

Once again, Diman participated in the annual Student Government Day program. Eric Carvalho was selected as Diman's representative in an election that was conducted among all the members of the junior class. He attended a series of orientation workshops in Boston before actually participating in Student Government Day as a representative.

Key Club

Key Club members and Health Careers students visited the Kiwanis Pediatric Trauma Institute (K.P.T.I.) in Boston. The K.P.T.I. is affiliated with the Children's Floating Hospital. Key Club Advisor Suzanne Thibert, Health Careers Instructor Maureen Caine, and Henry Champagne served as chaperones. All persons toured the emergency room and hospital inpatient rooms. The history of the Children's Floating Hospital and Kiwanis involvement were discussed.

Kimberly Seyer, Key Club secretary, was awarded a Kiwanis Club Scholarship. Kimberly is studying at Johnson and Wales in Rhode Island. The scholarship was presented to her for academic excellence and for her involvement in Key Club.

The Key Club provided 25 food baskets for needy families. A donation of \$500 was sent by the Diman Key Club to K.P.T.I. and \$1,000 was given to the Salvation Army.

Staff Development

Various workshops were conducted on release days that emphasized interest areas within the different disciplines. In addition, teachers were urged to attend workshops, conferences, etc... sponsored by the Department of Education and other providers. The following represents some of the activities that our staff was involved in: Regional Academic Coordinators' Meetings where common problems were discussed searching for solutions; Human Sexuality Workshop; Model Academic Program Advisory Committee to develop a model math curriculum; Education Equality Workshop to develop curriculum needs for various leveled students; the Earth and Science Education symposium; a Lucretia Crocker Presentation; the B.C.C. Writing Conference; a School Management Seminar; the Principles of Technology Workshop, the S.M.U. Management Center; a Computer Grant Workshop; NESPA Conference for school newspapers; and NEATE Conference.

Special Education

This year necessitated the reassignment of several of our special education staff members and the appointing of one special needs academic instructor to meet the needs of Diman's increasing population. Our General Shop Parent's Night was well attended. Parents present expressed very positive feelings about the program.

Grants

Diman applied for and received funding for various grants which totaled \$164,074. The Carl Perkins Grant, P.L. 98-524, funded:

1. A culinary arts aide - This position enhanced the delivery of services to the special needs population.
2. A culinary arts counselor - Special needs students received career and vocational counseling.
3. A remedial math teacher - This program assisted those students who have failed the basic skills testing.
4. A disadvantaged counselor - This counseling position assisted students who failed the basic skills math testing.
5. Our health careers program - This project provided equipment and supplies which enabled the health careers program to institute a well-rounded curriculum which will enhance the opportunity for job placement of our students in the health professions.
6. Our air-conditioning and refrigeration shop - This project equipped the shop with the latest "state-of-the-art" equipment which will be utilized in training our students.

We also received grants for...

1. Our remedial summer program that provided instructional services to students entering grade 9 who were in need of remedial math and study skills services.
2. Our summer exploratory program that provided an occupational opportunity for 8th grade students to learn more about vocational education and thus enable them to have a better understanding of career choices.
3. Our special needs program that enabled Diman to purchase the services of 1 1/2 teachers. A one-half time clerk/typist and instructional supplies were also provided through this program.

4. Our Education Consolidation and Improvement Grant that allowed us to purchase textbooks for grades 9 through 12.

Housebuilding Program

Our housebuilding program continued to offer the students in our carpentry, plumbing, electrical, and painting and decorating shops excellent "hands-on" experiences. Our students completed their sixteenth house since the program started. This home was built on Veloze Avenue in Somerset for Mr. and Mrs. David Veloze and has approximately 2,000 square feet of living area with an attached two-stall garage.

School and Community Projects

Diman's shops, due to the nature of vocational education and its continuing emphasis on practical work, have been able to provide services to the Fall River Police Department, Fall River Heritage State Park, Fall River Government Center, Fall River Park Department, Fall River City Council, Fall River Fire Department and Traffic Division, Fall River Department of Public Works, Fall River School Department, Bank of Fall River, United Way of Greater Fall River, Swansea Council on Aging, Westport American Legion Post, Westport Fire Department, Somerset Library, Somerset Civil Defense, Police Athletic League, Massachusetts Army National Guard, "Day on the Hill", Massachusetts Commission for the Blind, Association for Retarded Citizens, and many other civic and charitable organizations within the Greater Fall River School District.

Auto Body

This was an extremely busy shop that serviced 54 private vehicles and many others such as city and town vehicles, trucks, school buses, etc. Students won the three top positions in the state VICA competitions. Chris Martin was named Outstanding Vocational Student in Massachusetts by the Massachusetts Auto Body Association, Inc.

Auto Mechanics

This year the shop competed in VICA and placed second in the state with a silver medal in the automotive machine contest won by John Furtado. In the AAA Chrysler-Plymouth contest the shop placed 8th in the state. Contestants were Kevin Soares, Gregory Teves, John Furtado, and Scott Collins. For the first time ever the Outstanding Vocational Student Award was presented to an automotive shop student — Gregory Teves.

Building Maintenance Program

The Building Maintenance Mechanics (BMM) Program will produce its first graduates in the spring of 1990. Approximately 175 of the jobs completed were directly related to either the improvement or repair of the existing school facility. The BMM program is currently in the process of integrating Competency Based Vocational Education (C.B.V.E.) into its curriculum. Work has begun on a preventive maintenance program which will ultimately encompass the whole school.

Culinary Arts

The Culinary Arts Department had a very successful year. In September they catered the annual fund-raising drive of the United Way and also created a shortening sculpture of a ship for the Bank of Fall River.

A turkey buffet was prepared in November as well as the bakery preparing in excess of 500 pies for the Thanksgiving holiday. In December two holiday buffets serving in excess of 400 patrons was

prepared. More than 25 Senior Citizen lunches were also catered. The National Guard luncheon for area guidance counselors was also prepared.

The Open House and Trade Fair highlighted many outstanding student projects that brought many compliments.

Kimberly Lawrence won a VICA medal at the state level in baking. Special thanks should go to Mr. David Viveros for his continued hard work with the VICA program at Diman.

Kimberly Seyer, a senior in the Culinary Arts Department, was honored at a dinner as one of the state's outstanding vocational students and Manuel Mello won a second place award at the third annual Durfee-Diman Bake-off.

Drafting

Our drafting shop, utilizing their CAD systems, was instrumental in providing updated floor plans of the school that included locating all fire extinguishers and the serialization of all outside doors in the building. They also prepared detailed drawings of various signs requested by our district communities.

Electrical

Four electrical students from within this program are worthy of recognition.

Five electronics students were named as members of the Top Ten students at Diman. Numerous awards and scholarships also were awarded to students.

General Shop

The General Shop Special Needs Program, under the direction of James Pereira, has continued to meet the needs of the .4 area population.

Since this program's inception, it has allowed special needs students the opportunity to experience vocational exploration. This program has directly led to integrated placement in other shop areas at Diman. The training these students have received has resulted in excellent job placement.

Graphic Arts

Our Graphic Arts department reproduced the curriculums and associated materials for the entire school in preparation for our Chapter 74 evaluation. This major task along with 54 community jobs and 156 school related activities all equate into a shop which is classified as a high production, cost-conscious, community-integrated showplace. The list of accomplishments by students and instructors alike has drawn praise and recognition both from within and outside the school.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT (cont.)

Health Careers

Five students participated in the Knowledge Bowl at the State VICA competition in Boston. Diman received honorable mention recognition (4th place). The students who participated were Meredith Magill (91), Kimberly Desrosiers (92), Jennifer Walsh (92), Tiffany Gillet (92) and Tina Lopes (92).

Health Careers conducted the Great American Smokeout project, sponsored a dance, and donated the proceeds, \$535.15, to the American Cancer Society.

The Junior Health Careers students completed a 12-day clinical affiliation at Clifton Geriatric Center in Somerset. They were able to participate in direct patient care, i.e. bathing, dressing, feeding, physical therapy, social interaction, etc.

Heating, Ventilation, and Air-Conditioning

Our HVAC shop is now in its second year and the new refrigeration and electrical trainers have offered our students state-of-the-art equipment to expand their talents. As a community service, the HVAC shop has added a spring cleaning and tune-up service on window air-conditioners into its curriculum, and domestic refrigeration repair work has been ongoing for public and civic organizations.

House and Mill Carpentry

During the 1989 calendar year the mill carpentry shop students produced the kitchen cabinets and vanities for our housebuilding project along with 18 school-related projects, 10 community jobs, and processed 4 job applications for in-house teachers.

One hundred seventeen student-exercise projects were undertaken and completed as part of their hands-on learning experience.

Machine Shop

Our curriculum has been updated to incorporate the addition of C.N.C., which brings our program in line with industry expected standards.

Edwardo Melo was a gold medal winner in the VICA state competition. He went on to the national competition and finished 5th in the nation.

Diman Machine Shop students saved Heritage State Park considerable costs by making numerous sailboat rigging parts which required special tooling.

Metal Fabrication and Welding

A total of five students competed in the welding and sheet metal areas in VICA district competitions. One student competed in welding and two in sheet metal at the state conference.

Our Metal Fabrication and Welding Shop has been involved in many projects for our district communities. In addition, the revised curriculum has been completed for the three shop components; general sheet metal, metal fabrication, and welding.

Painting and Decorating

This program continues to fulfill the many diverse needs of our school while undertaking a multitude of challenges from within the district. Numerous requests for items such as posters, banners, signs, and artwork of all descriptions for everyday use, seasonal display and ceremonial decorating are produced as an ongoing part of this program's curriculum.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT (cont.)

A major activity on which this shop spends a great deal of its time is directly associated with our housebuilding program. All the kitchen cabinets, vanities and millwork items produced for the house are stained and finished either in the shop or at the job site. The complete exterior painting of the house, along with the interior decorating, routinely includes all phases of preparation and application for paint as well as wall coverings.

Responding to the unique needs of various community organizations, as well as the basic requests for work to be done on projects such as furniture refinishing and screen-printing, has on many occasions made this shop look like Santa's Little Workshop.

Screen-printing of items such as hats, jackets and "T" shirts has become increasingly popular. Last spring 400 "T" shirts alone were produced for the Fall River Celebrates America festival. The work load in this shop continues to remain extremely high and both students and instructors are worthy of praise for their efforts and many accomplishments.

Plumbing

Diman has been the benefactor of having all its plumbing needs met by students from within this program who routinely accept the many in-house plumbing challenges which surface throughout the year. Our plumbing students receive the bulk of their hands-on-training within the shop area. However, our housebuilding program offers an on-site live-work opportunity which tests the skills of our future plumbers. All of the plumbing systems which are required to be installed in any residential dwelling are individually laid out and installed by students as part of their learning process. Some of the many systems may include waste and drain, hot & cold water, gas piping, baseboard heat installation, boiler installation, hot water tank connecting, as well as fixture and accessory installation such as sink, toilet, tub, shower, range, etc.

Since Massachusetts plumbing code regulations are extremely rigid in allowing students to work on only approved job sites, it becomes crucial that a program such as our housebuilding program be maintained in order to provide the opportunity for these students to apply their talents and learn on actual live work.

Business Contributions

Numerous businesses within the district have displayed their support of our programs in numerous ways. Letters of appreciation have been sent to Schwartz True Value Hardware, Munro Distributing, Almeida Electrical, City Hall Electrical Sales and Supply, Gemco Electrical, Paquette Electrical, Negus Lumber, Bolduc's Lumber, AC Lumber, Burns Power Tool and Machinery, East Main Hardware, Amiot Hardware, Lincoln Press, RESCO, Seekonk Plumbing Supply, Gerald G. Ancil Plumbing & Heating, and Fred York for contributions of materials.

School Safety

Students as well as staff members were presented a professional hands-on fire-extinguisher demonstration by Fall River Fire Inspectors Michael F. Arruda and Michael Lesior. Students who are members of our Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) benefited two-fold. First, they learned about the various fire classifications and how to identify the correct extinguisher to use while putting out a fire. All students had an opportunity to physically put out a fire. Secondly, our VICA Safety Club accomplished one of its goals of having an outside live fire demonstration for our students.

VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT (cont.)

All vocational departments participated in a school safety program which required students to take a pre-test followed by a post-test based on a presentation of a safety film entitled "The Safety Factor." This safety awareness orientation film has received unanimous approval of all vocational instructors and has been incorporated into the curriculum of all vocational programs.

During the State VICA Leadership Conference, David Hickey, a junior in the building maintenance program, won second place for the safety scrapbook he entered into competition.

Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA)

During the 1989 school year, membership in Diman's VICA program surpassed all previous year records. As membership increased to 188 members, so has the number of shop programs which now participate in VICA. This year students from all 16 shop programs became actively involved in some form of VICA activity. Numerous advisors from our various program advisory committees helped judge our local hands-on competitions in the shop areas.

In Diman's district hands-on competition, 49 Diman students competed against approximately 600 students from 12 vocational schools which comprise the Southeastern District. Sixteen of our students finished either 1st, 2nd, or 3rd in their respective events and became eligible for state-wide competition. Those 49 students competed against 36 other vocational schools in the state competition. Twenty-seven of them won medals in various events.

Diman's Club Business Procedure organization placed fourth in their group and fifteenth out of thirty-eight.

Diman also competed in the International World Competition through VICA's National Gold Medal winner from Diman. Emile Chagnon came in a strong ninth place in Birmingham, England, giving the United States its highest placement in Culinary Arts in many years.

Junior Achievement

During the past year, Mr. Robert Ciosek became involved with the evening program of Junior Achievement along with John P. Harrington and other community and business leaders. Together, they have begun to help high school students apply their talents and skills into the business world by providing them with practical business experience and insights into the complexities of economics.

The Mill Carpentry shop students under the direction of Ronald Silvia are deserving of recognition for adopting Junior Achievement and providing wood items for various JA companies to sell.

Budget

The 1989-90 school budget was approved by the school committee in the amount of \$4,613,981, reflecting a 6.5% increase over the 1988-89 school budget. The increase is attributed to rising health insurance premiums, salaries, and operating costs.

Assessments to the member communities were increased by \$52,835 in the aggregate, a 17.1% increase over the preceding year. The school district was able to minimize the impact of state level funding by returning \$310,570 from surplus revenues to the communities.

ANNUAL REPORT of the HARBORMASTER

The 1989 Boating Season went along fairly smooth with boaters and mooring owners co-operating in a safe and enjoyable atmosphere. We had (5) minor collisions without any serious injuries and one run-a-way inboard that caused serious damage but no injuries during 1989. Increased harbor patrols (visible presence), slow/no wake buoys and the reasonable use of non-criminal violations (speed and wake infractions) helped prevent serious injury and over all, controlled boat traffic in an orderly fashion.

Boat thefts and vandalism of vessels was very limited, however, we lost about (7) channel markers in the East River due to either vandalism or horse-play (water skiing or boogy boarding) at replacement cost of \$1000.00.

With the addition of the second or new Harbormaster boat, this Department was able to provide extended coverage during the busy season both at the harbormouth and in and around the Westport Yacht Club, F.L. Tripp Marina area. We performed approximately (100) assistance or tow jobs and five or six rescues outside the Harbor. One rescue was in the mouth of the Harbor when (2) boats were flipped upside down by breaking seas. Two other rescues were out in the area West and North of the cement barge on the Hens and Chickens Reef and a Jet Skier East of Gooseberry Island. The most difficult rescue occurred off of East Beach in 35 knot winds with (2) sailors on top of a capsized Hobie Cat with a broken mast and nighttime approaching rapidly. Thanks to a USCG Helicopter from Otis and the help of Robert Chandanais at Chandy's by the Sea, we were able to put together a communications network that enabled these men to be rescued and assisted by the Westport Fire Dept. personnel in a very professional manner.

In 1989 fees collected were as follows:

Slip & Mooring (approx. 1185)	\$25,972.
State Boat Ramp	8,304.
Town owned Mooring Rents	1,425.

As in 1987, the Harbormaster's Department was responsible for the Rt. 88 State Boat Ramp and has plans for some improvements for the 1990 season. (Float tie-up).

It is my opinion that the boating public using Westport Waters are as a group, caring, knowledgeable of the rules and willing to pay user fees providing that services are maintained or increased and that monies collected be spent on those services provided. One must remember that in addition to the fees previously mentioned, the boating public pays to the Town of Westport approximately \$47,000.00 in Boat Excise Tax and \$13,000.00 at the Town Wharf.

I feel the Department has made progress in providing better service to the boaters and modernized it's equipment at the same time. Thanks go out to my Assistants, Roger Reed, Jr., Smith Dexter, Jonathan Paul and Everett Mills for a job well done. Also, a thanks to the girls at Town Hall in the Town Clerks, Assessors, Accounting, Treasurer and Selectmen Offices, Gary Sherman and the Westport Harbor Advisory Group for their assistance. Also, a special thanks to Milt Dunham who has set up our computer menu and Ann Chandanais at the Police Department who traced a lot of Boat MS numbers for the Department.

ANNUAL REPORT of the HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Historical Commission submits this report for the year ending December 31, 1989, during which time it carried out its dual responsibility as both Westport Point Historic District Committee and as the Historical Commission for the whole town.

As District Committee, we issued the following sixteen certificates for approved alterations: March 7 - Lot #3, Carter's Way: new construction; 7 Windward Way, renovation. April 11 - 1953 Main Rd., alterations. May 5 - 5 Windward Way, storage shed and hoop house. May 2 - 1913 Main Rd., attached garage. 1885 Main Rd., storage shed. June 6 - 11 Valentine Lane, addition of window; 1985 C Main Rd., renovations; 1933-35 Drift Rd., renovations. July 25 Lot #2, Carter's Way, new construction; 2019 Main Rd., renovations. August 15 - 1977 Main Rd., new windows. October 20 - Lot 45, Sunset Ave., new construction. November 7 - 2032 Main Rd., renovations; December 5 - Lot 35, Elm Street, moving and renovating; 1898 Main Rd., enclose side porch and add rear deck.

As Historical Commission, we sought to protect the interest of the Town in the disposal of Helen Ellis' personal property and real estate at Westport Point. The resolution of this matter is still pending. We continued to provide plaques for historic properties in the Town and to assemble historical information about them and their owners. We have overseen the restoration of the outbuildings at the Poor Farm and have initiated discussion about use of its land as park for the Town. We have discussed with the Massachusetts Historical Commission the appropriateness of nominating several properties in the town to the National Register of Historic Places and of creating several new national and state historic districts.

The terms of alternate members were extended on a staggered basis to three years. Norma Judson, after giving outstanding service as Treasurer, resigned because of other town commitments. Virginia Edgcomb was elected Treasurer and the Selectmen appointed Thomas Jansen to fulfill Norma Judson's term.

ANNUAL REPORT of the OPEN SPACE PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Open Space Planning Committee respectfully submits the following report for the year 1989:

The Conservation Commission formed an Open Space Planning Committee in January 1989. The purpose of the committee is to study and propose creative ways to preserve our open space in Westport for recreation and conservation. Once the plan is accepted by the Division of Conservation Services, we may apply for open space funding from state, federal, and private sources. Once approved by our town Planning Board, the Board of Appeals may use this when considering comprehensive plan submittals. The plan, once accepted, needs only to be updated every five (5) years to be viable for funding. Creating this plan is one of the recommendations put forth in the Growth Management Plan completed by the Planning Board in 1988.

Our town is growing and during this growth the community can direct the manner of growth. According to the 1987 Land Use survey, 95% of Westport residents feel that the rural landscape is important to preserve for their quality of life in Westport. This rural landscape is composed of approximately 7,000 acres of working farms, 6,000 acres of wetlands, 3,300 acres of water, 47.4 miles of tidal shoreline, 18,000 acres of forests, and one of the most scenic areas in the state. The Open Space Plan is geared to the preservation of the best of these natural resources.

During 1989 we accomplished:

- 1) Co-sponsored with the Planning Board and Conservation Commission, the slide program "Growing Smart"
- 2) Educational Display at Rivers Day 1989
- 3) Fund raising into Town Conservation Fund designated for Open Space Planning. So far we have raised over \$6,000 and donations are still being accepted
- 4) Inventory of all private and public open space in Westport with the help of WRWA
- 5) Farm survey of over 140 farmers
- 6) Contract with Land Use Inc. to help finalize plan

OPEN SPACE (cont.)

Overall Strategy for completing the plan:

- 1) Complete farm inventory
- 2) Complete scenic view inventory
- 3) Complete interviews with key individuals concerned with open space and recreation needs of the town
- 4) Analysis of water resources
- 5) Update Growth Management Plan information relating to open space
- 6) Create a parcel map of the town
- 7) Hold two (2) public workshops (one will be a slide show)
- 8) Complete plan by June 1990

We want to thank those who have given us such wonderful cooperation: our Selectmen, Planning Board, Conservation Commission, John Rockwell (Conservation Agent), Sue Silvia (Conservation Secretary), Assessor's office, Historical Commission, Westport River Watershed Alliance; in fact, everyone who has been contacted has given freely of their time and knowledge. Mr. Daniel T. George was appointed on October 16, 1989, to fill the vacancy of Francois A. Napert who was elected as Selectman on August 21, 1989.

The Board meets in the Planning Board room at the Town Hall on the first, third and fifth Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m.

During the past year, the Board held 36 meetings. The Board held 18 public hearings, one of which was held to consider proposed zoning amendments, 15 were held to consider proposed subdivisions (2 of which were withdrawn and resubmitted), one was held to consider a revision to a subdivision, and one was held as a rehearing due to lack of recording the plan in the Registry of Deeds in a timely manner. 12 of the new proposed subdivisions were approved, creating a total of 66 new lots (one of which was a carry-over from 1988). One subdivision was denied due to lack of access from an accepted way, and one subdivision has not been acted upon as of this date. Eight applications for preliminary subdivisions have been received, 2 of which were approved and resulted in definitive plans, 3 of which were approved and created 26 lots but have not yet resulted in a definitive plan, and 3 of which are being processed as of this date. In addition, one application for a definitive subdivision has been received and is being processed as of this date. The Board received 48 plans for division of land where subdivision approval was not required, which plans created a total of 66 new lots. Of the 48 plans, 8 were revisions to existing lots, 6 were for purposes of annexing parcels to adjoining land, and 2 were perimeter surveys. 3 of said 48 plans were determined to require approval under the Subdivision Control Law, one of which was subsequently endorsed as "Approval Not Required" after a variance was granted by the Board of Appeals. One of the 48 plans was endorsed as "Approval Not Required" after a Court judgment granted the division.

Edmund Medeiros was appointed as Planning Board delegate to Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) for the year. C. Lee Hopkins was appointed to serve on the Solid Waste Committee. Katharine H. Preston was appointed to the Zoning Core Committee.

In turning to other matters, recent studies regrettably indicate that conventional law enforcement methods are not controlling the nation's drug epidemic. ANNUAL REPORT of the SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

Calendar year 1989 was one of positive and negative experiences. The conditionally approved area in the East Branch (Gunning Island north to Cadman's Neck) was reopened. The Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF) opened the shellfish area on March 15th, much to the pleasure of many commercial and recreational fishermen who found an abundant crop of mixed sized quahogs. The area was worked until the official winter closing date of December 15th.

The DMF originally had planned to open a specific area of oyster beds in the conditional area, but unfortunately the water testing and lab analysis revealed negative results. With the cooperation of the DMF, the Shellfish Department (SD) relocated oysters from an area North of the conditional area, to a southerly location, where the oysters may be harvested in 1990.

The abnormally high rainfall over the summer period was the major factor in river closures and it proved nearly fatal as the results of DMF water sampling, tests and analysis had no other recourse but to order conditional closures in areas of the estuary.

At this writing, the SD in cooperation with the DMF are working diligently by sampling, testing and analyzing waters in specific areas in order to re-open the affected areas.

The scallop and quahog seed programs were again implemented this year with financial support of the Westport Fishermens Association who again came through when the State and Town funding was severely cut. Over 75,000 seed scallop were set throughout the East and West Branches. It was hoped that the program would help develop a scallop harvest, but again the rain contributed to a negative result.

On a more positive note, the quahog program was again a huge success. With over one million seed being reared in seed trays, their growth reached a size that increased their potential for survival. They were released throughout the entire estuary. We can look forward to another good harvest year, provided the temporary closures are reversed.

The DMF selected Westport as a site to relocate some thirty five bushels of soft-shelled clams. These clams were transported from the DMF Plum Island Depuration plant and broadcast in select areas of the estuary. These clams hopefully will be harvestable in March 1990, again if the closures are reversed.

Over \$1,500 in citations were issued to shellfish violators. The citations ranged from shellfishing in a closed area to shellfishing without a permit.

We constantly maintain a telephone "Hot-Line" to keep everyone apprised of river conditions. The number is 636-8566 so if you're in doubt, call the number and check out the conditions.

Our river produces a tremendous shellfish resource. It affects our commercial and recreational fishermen and it would be catastrophic to loose it to pollution. Be concerned and do what you can to help eliminate this cancer from our waters. Groups like the Westport Fishermens Association and The Westport River Watershed Alliance are constantly working to protect our interests in the river. Do your share to help.

ANNUAL REPORT of the SRPEDD

Report to the Town of Westport from the Commissioners of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District.

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District served the Town of Westport in 1989. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts dealing with issues being faced by each city and town in the region. In the past year, representatives of Westport serving on the SRPEDD Commission were Sally Adams representing the Board of Selectmen, and Edmund Medeiros for the Planning Board.

Some of the District's more significant accomplishments in 1989 were:

- Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- Completion of a regional groundwater (aquifer) project, including a map of the region's aquifers and a protection plan for these important resources.
- Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1988, SEED approved loans to 21 small businesses in the amount of \$3.57 million. These loans are projected to create 295 jobs and will result in the investment of \$12 million from private sources.
- SRPEDD continued to provide the planning services for the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA.
- SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed sixty-one such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- Seventy-six applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 through 1989 throughout the region.
- SRPEDD maintains a computer based Accident Filing System for eleven communities in the region. The service provides for rapid and accurate retrieval of detailed traffic accident information and is useful in identifying high hazard locations.
- The Buzzards Bay Project was a major focus for SRPEDD in 1989. The District worked with the EPA and the newly formed Buzzards Bay Advisory Committee, consisting of local officials, in the effort to clean up and preserve the water quality of this important resource.

SRPEDD (cont.)

- SRPEDD completed the Environmental Assessment and Engineering Study for the replacement of the Brightman Street Bridge and held a successful public hearing in the town of Somerset.
- A study and zoning bylaw for accessory apartments was prepared and distributed.

We look forward to serving the Town of Westport in 1990.

ANNUAL REPORT of the TOWN FARM

The Westport Town Farm had a relatively smooth year with good tenants and \$10,850 coming through in rents. In December our tenant of eight years moved but was quickly replaced with an equally good candidate. In November one of the boilers had to be replaced but thanks to a generous donation by an anonymous donor this potential fiscal disaster was taken care of without any expense to the town.

Substantial restoration has been undertaken on the buildings at the Town Farm. The south side of the main house now has a beautiful new doorway and new shingles. Sill work was also taken care of on this side. The small stone shed is now completely restored. Restoration of the corn crib and the barn are nearly complete, and work on the carriage shed is scheduled to begin in the spring. All of this work on the outbuildings has been made possible by a very generous donation by a Westport resident for which we are deeply grateful.

Plans for a Town Farm park for passive recreation, nature study and conservancy, school programs, and other town wide events are still being formulated. Suggestions and help from the community are welcome.

I am pleased to begin this report by saying that we have had no staff changes this year. We did, however, receive with regret the resignation in mid-term of one of our trustees, Charlotte R. Guimond, who moved with her family away from Westport. At a special town election held in August Ruth Manchester was elected to complete the unexpired term.

After four years of planning and preparation, the Library went online with an automated circulation system on November 30th. In preparation during the year the staff continued to input titles into the SEAL (South Eastern Automated Libraries) database. In addition, patrons were asked to re-register and were assigned barcodes. By December 31, 1989 we have 2,008 patrons registered on the automated system and 22,892 volumes listed in the database. We expect to bring up public access terminals early in 1990. The patrons will then be able to search not only our holdings but the collections of eleven other area towns. We are extremely grateful for the support of the Finance Board and the voters of the town who approved the initial outlay of funds to get this project started. It has proved enormously successful in locating books in other libraries as well as allowing for much closer control of our own inventory.

All town departments were affected by the budget restrictions necessitated by Proposition 2½. The Library's major cutback unfortunately had to be in service. Once again the hours from 6 to 9 p.m. Wednesday were discontinued. It is hoped that one day we will again be able to be open on Wednesday evening. Other cutbacks were made in supplies and postage; for instance, we no longer mail out overdue book notices to patrons. However, when a patron checks out a book, if he or she has other books out it is automatically noted by the computer at that time and a list of titles held by that person is printed out. Overdue books can then be called to the patron's attention.

Other roofs in town have received more publicity, but as reported last year ours is leaking too. Also, our heating/ventilating system is just about beyond repair. Fortunately at the Town Meeting funds were appropriated to remedy both of these situations. The Board of Trustees is working closely with the Town Building Committee, who have the ultimate fiscal authority. They have been extremely helpful and we are grateful for their technical expertise and assistance.

WESTPORT FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY (cont.)

The Westports of the World convention was held here in Westport, Massachusetts in 1989. The library served as a focal point, being used first for registration and then for the annual business meeting following the 4th of July parade.

The Library has received notice of a forthcoming bequest in the will of Hazel A. Tripp. When these funds are received a trust fund will be established in the name of Hazel A. and Lillian M. Tripp.

Under the direction of our Assistant Library Director, Susan Branco, there were many well attended children's functions during the year. Pre-school storytimes ran for 8-week sessions throughout the year and were open to all children between the ages of 3 and 5. A pajama storytime was held evenings during the summer.

A summer reading program is held for students aged 6 to 12. This consists of a weekly program based on a particular theme. This summer's program was "Hats Off to Young Readers" and certificates were given to children who read 5 or more books. This year 42 certificates were awarded. During one program, Michael Bresler, a Providence storyteller, entertained the children by bringing 50 different hats to share with them. The children acted out uses of the hats and Mr. Bresler told stories about them. This program was sponsored by the Alice Dennett Tripp Fund.

The Friends of the Library sponsored an appearance by the Port Clyde Puppets during August which 80 children and 30 adults attended.

Three after-school programs for ages 6 to 12 were held during October, November, and December where stories and crafts were shared around the themes of Halloween, dinosaurs, and Christmas.

Two pre-school storytimes were aired on cable television thanks to Bill Shea. These proved so successful that more are planned for next year.

Monday night at the movies during the summer was aimed at both adults and children and featured family films such as "Sunder" and "Captains Courageous".

The Friends of the Library which was founded in 1982 continues to be a marvelous source of both moral and monetary support to the Library. With funds from dues and money raised from the annual book sales, the Friends donated \$1,100 for the purchase of juvenile and adult books, \$100 for childrens records and cassettes, and a subscription to *Sports Illustrated for Kids*. Also, of course, was the aforementioned puppet show.

Just as important, however, are their contributions to the cultural activities of Westport. This year in May a local resident, Sanford Moss, spoke on the continent of Antarctica and a woman from Plimouth Plantation gave a presentation at the annual meeting in November. Also in November was the Friends annual book sale, which this year was their most successful to date.

The Board of Trustees was pleased to welcome at their monthly meetings a member of the Friends of the Library acting as liaison between the two groups. Virginia Guptill filled that position for several months, being replaced at our last meeting by Hartley Howe who is alternating with Ruth Jennings. Many thanks again to the entire membership of the Friends, but especially to the officers and small dedicated group who perform most of the hard work on our behalf.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETINGS ARE OPEN

The Westport School Committee meets on the second and fourth Monday of each month, September through June, unless announced otherwise in the news media. Meetings are held at the Westport Public School Administration Building, 856 Main Road at 7:00 p.m. in the School Committee Room and are open to the public.

ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS

Initial admission of kindergarten and grade one children is based solely on chronological age. Children who will become five years of age before October 1 are eligible for kindergarten in September of that school year. Children who will become six years of age before January 1 are eligible for grade one in September of that school year.

A vaccination certificate for immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, measles and polio must be presented to the school when the student enters for the first time, unless the child is exempted for medical or religious reasons.

A birth certificate must be presented by those pupils whose births were recorded outside of Westport.

SPECIAL NEEDS

The Department of Special Needs has undergone intensive evaluation during 1989. A review of Westport's ability to carry out the state mandated laws was conducted in April of 1989 through a State Department of Education Compliance Review. In addition, federally funded programs and services were judged as well.

These combined evaluations resulted in a commitment by the School Committee to upgrade and improve special education in Westport. In turn, their support provided the impetus to:

- develop system-wide policies on special education
- de-centralize the delivery of special education services to each school
- reorganize the process of special education to allow each school to search, refer, assess, and review students within their school building
- bring the Westport Public Schools into compliance

In summary, a reorganization plan has been designed to decentralize special education to Westport schools as centralized policies are developed.

The plan provided intensive in-service staff development to teachers over a four-month period from September to December of 1989. Teachers undertook the workshops voluntarily and were trained in diagnostic test assessment. Westport professionals Marcie Grant, Sharon Horton, and Brenda Stone offered complimentary training services to their peers. They will continue ongoing support to teachers for the remainder of the year.

The reorganization plan also provides for the use of existing professionals to act as Educational Team Leaders in their schools to organize and chair meetings, keep records, and monitor services to students.

The collaborative and volunteer nature of these efforts is noteworthy. Westport is fortunate indeed to have educators with such support for students with special needs.

The Westport special needs population is currently 318. As of October, 1989, these students represented 16.5% of the total school population. This figure compares comparably with communities of equal demographic status (16.1%), the region (15.9%), and the state average (16.8%).

However, Westport sends 2.6% of special needs students to collaborative, out of district public programs, as compared to 1.2% from similar communities. Out of district placements increased from 27 students in 1987-88 to 37 students in 1988-89. At present, there are 34 students served by such public and private programs. Resultant tuition and subsequent transportation expenses have driven costs upward.

A concerted effort to offer programming within Westport for students currently served out of district has begun. A \$9,700 grant will serve to identify students' needs and match these with program design. The result will allow for the return of a portion of this population to schools within the community at reduced costs.

The upcoming months will provide a professional challenge to all as we learn to do more with less for the special needs children of Westport.

DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

This year we have undertaken a major initiative in the area of curriculum. During the first half of the year the specialized subject areas of Art, Music, Physical Education, Computer Education, and Health Education were thoroughly reviewed and revised for all grade levels. K-12. A Curriculum Handbook, containing the mission statement and scope and sequence of instruction in each of those subject areas was prepared by curriculum teams made up of parents, teachers, and administrators. Individual subject area Curriculum Handbooks were subsequently accepted and adopted by the School Committee.

Curriculum teams for Reading, Mathematics, English, and Science were organized in the fall for the purpose of reviewing and revising curriculum in the major academic subject areas. Those teams have all had a number of preliminary workshops to review current research, to formulate mission statements, program goals, and program objectives. Completed Curriculum Handbooks will be available this coming year. This is being done in order to improve the individual programs within each building and to coordinate the programs at the different school levels.

In addition to the curriculum work, a number of in-house staff development programs were held throughout the year in order to provide training and enrichment experiences for the teaching staff. Classes were offered in computer use, video production, writing process, math manipulatives, and a number of other areas. In order to encourage participation in after school in-house as well as off-site training programs, the school system this year adopted a Professional Development Credit policy which enables teachers to accrue in-house credit for workshop training and attendance at educational seminars. Many teachers have applied for and received such credit for attendance at such nationally acclaimed programs as "Math Their Way" and "Great Books".

Teacher training was also enhanced by the participation of six teachers who were awarded grants to participate in National Science Foundation programs. Peter Holt, David Sullivan, and Donna Goodrich of the Middle School were selected for an NSF Training Institute at Bridgewater State College. In addition, the Museum Institute for the Teaching of Science awarded summer studies grants to elementary teachers Helene Auger, Renee Teotonio, and Judy Carlson.

Parent participation in curriculum development has been especially noteworthy and extraordinarily beneficial over the past year. Members of the Parent Advisory Committee for the Curriculum participate fully in the curriculum workshops along with the teachers and administrators. The PACC was also successful in disseminating their first community-wide school system newspaper. Parents Peg Harris, Cindy Lavoie, Lorraine Kaiser, Kathy Grundy, Jean Prior, Sheila Martel, Dee Sylvia, Dottie Ryan, and Donna Pelchat contributed many commendable hours of PACC volunteer work.

The Health Education curriculum was substantially enhanced by the addition of the D.A.R.E. drug and alcohol awareness program which is being co-sponsored by the Westport Police and School Departments in a cooperative effort to provide our young citizens with the skills and training needed to cope with peer and social pressures. Detective Mario Lewis is now making this program available to students in grades five, eight, and nine. Additional health programs in peer-counseling and substance abuse issues have been provided for both teachers and students with funding from the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs.

Elementary level teachers have made great strides in revising the Reading and English programs through the implementation of whole-language and process approaches in these subject areas. Teacher initiative in developing these new techniques have led to a number of staff training programs in the

process approach to the teaching of language. Open Court Reading, a whole-language approach, is being piloted in three elementary classrooms and a number of other teachers will soon be piloting additional new materials.

The efforts made in the past year to specify and to coordinate the school curriculums and to provide ongoing training to teachers in new instructional materials and techniques will be carried into the new year as we continue to advocate for continued student success, achievement, and well-being.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL

Westport High School was awarded a second year Carnegie implementation grant from the State of Massachusetts. The grant is designed to encourage public school employees to plan and develop innovative organization and management systems at the school building level in order to produce better learning opportunities for students and to empower parents, students, and school professionals. The grant program involves the sharing of decision making and is coordinated by Planning and Steering Committee Chairman, Dr. Anthony Coelho; Carnegie Facilitator, Virginia A. King; and Steering Committee Members, Dianne Rezendes, Mary Anne McQuillan, Manuel Cabral, Harry Proudfoot, Louis Finucci, Charles Menard, Paula Smith, Chester Millett, and Anthony Melli. Having this grant has allowed the high school to implement the following positive changes during the past year:

The new Governance system, under the constitution developed by the Carnegie Governance Committee and presented to the school committee during 1988-89 has become a reality. Members of the faculty, students, and parents have been elected as part of a legislative body which will help determine school policies. Full Assembly meetings are being held the first Friday of every month.

The Carnegie Instruction Committee organized a series of workshops on Co-operative Learning over the last eight months. They have also established a co-operative learning support group of 10-12 faculty members which meets monthly to discuss the use of that method of their classrooms.

An eight week workshop program on computer use for teachers was attended by more than forty faculty and staff members. An advanced course concentrating on Computer-Assisted Instruction and evaluation of software has been planned for early in 1990.

In addition, the Instruction committee has designed a three year in-service program that will expose teachers to a variety of classroom techniques and strategies. This winter, Dr. Anthony Rosselli will hold a workshop for interested staff on Advanced Organizer methods, while in the late Spring, a workshop on Inquiry will be held.

The Curriculum Committee has been investigating the Tech 2 + 2 program in conjunction with B.C.C. in hopes of offering a challenging and systematic program of study for high school students whose career choices will likely not require a four year degree. The following teachers attended special training programs at B.C.C. during this past summer: Mrs. Barros, Mr. Millett, Mr. McCabe, Mr. McMullen, Miss MacDonald, and Mr. Allen. The Curriculum Committee has also overseen the computerization of all course descriptions and orientation materials so that upcoming

WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL (cont.)

changes, additions, or deletions can be promptly processed. They have also researched and obtained a number of instructional tapes which can be utilized in different subject areas.

The Carnegie Curriculum Committee also recommended a study of an interdisciplinary curriculum project. After preparation of a mock lesson plan, the staff was given the opportunity to draw up several possibilities and plans are presently underway to develop an interdisciplinary model which will organize all subject areas to utilize the interdisciplinary approach in presenting a one-day unit.

An informative monthly Carnegie Newsletter including a calendar of upcoming events and activities has been prepared under the direction of Public Relations Committee Chairperson, Dianne Rezendes. This newsletter is disseminated throughout the Massachusetts educational community as well as being mailed to the homes of all Westport students in grades 7-12.

Mr. Melli, Guidance Counselor at the High School, with the assistance of members of the community and the Carnegie Grant has initiated three new programs.

- 1) Founded a local chapter of the Key Club with the help of businessman, David Branco. A program was developed to provide services for students and citizens of Westport. The poor and elderly were some of the first groups to be helped. Members also sponsored an extremely successful Career Day Program with the Kiwanis Club at Westport High School involving over thirty five businessmen and women from our community, Bristol Community College, and Southeastern Mass. University.

- 2) SADD - Students Against Driving Drunk, sponsored a number of workshops and assembly programs. Presentations were made at Westport High School, Westport Middle School and at various parent and student meetings. Students learned about the problems involved with drinking alcoholic beverages and how drinking and driving has been fatal to almost 50,000 Americans each year.

- 3) PEER COUNSELING - Students began to realize that they could provide insights to their fellow students. Students first attended weekly seminars. Subject matter included: peer pressures, alcohol and drug abuse, rape, pregnancy, suicide, divorce, and communicating with peers and parents. Students were instructed in role modeling and performed improvisational skits which they shared with fellow students, parents, and faculty at various events throughout the school year.

Under the auspices of the Carnegie Program, Mr. Manuel Cabral, Robert McMullen, Betsey MacDonald, and Diane Silvia attended a drug and alcohol course at Brown University. The object of the course was to insure that the school community recognizes its responsibility to discourage drug and alcohol abuse by its students and to develop objectives and an action plan for how this could be carried out.

Finally, in November, 1989, Westport High School officially became a Professional Development School in conjunction with Southeastern Massachusetts University. Dr. Armand Desmarais, Chairman of the Education Department at the University, and Mrs. Virginia King of the High School will coordinate this cooperative venture designed to improve professional development opportunities for both new and experienced teachers.

WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL (cont.)

The past school year has been one of very positive growth and development in the area of computer information systems. Both college preparatory and standard course students have taken advantage of microcomputer systems in the learning process. C.I.S. instructor, Mr. Donald McCabe, was chosen as a technical support specialist by the national Appleworks User Group and has been listed as such by the nationally prestigious magazine.

Westport High mathematics students, under Advisor, John Izzi, joined the New England Mathematics League. The League is composed of approximately 250 teams. In its first match, the mathematics team scored higher than 200 other schools and was in first place in its Bristol County Division.

The Journalism program at the High School continues to flourish. Today, the school paper, *The Villager*, is a professionally printed format published on a regular schedule. Each issue has twelve or more typeset pages containing 24-30 stories, 8-14 paragraphs, and over \$200.00 worth of advertising. Over thirty students are actively engaged in producing the *Villager*. The *Villager* won several state, regional and national awards and received a first-place ranking in American Scholastic Press Association competition and a second-place ranking from Columbia.

The International Exchange Club celebrated its tenth year of exchange with Futenma Senior High School in Okinawa, Japan. Westport High School students, faculty and parents hosted students from Futenma once again. Former Westport High School graduate, Ms. Kerry DeJesus, Class of 1985, served as advisor and chaperoned this year's contingent of Westport High School students who spent June and July in Japan. Ms. DeJesus, a graduate of Bates College, class of 1989 and a former Exchange Club member, majored in Japanese and is presently working and residing in Japan.

The new Interdisciplinary Study course developed by staff members, Louis Finucci, Bob Rayno, Betsey MacDonald, and Merry Hurley provides for students who are interested and qualified whose needs may exceed the current curriculum and/or who may have scheduling difficulties. This program provides creative cross-academic alternatives for students. Mrs. Hurley, who is presently monitoring the program has students involved in teaching a science unit at the Westport Elementary and others writing a musical. I.S.S. students are also provided with a specialist/mentor for assistance.

In June 1989, Mr. Edmie Bibeau (37 years), Mr. Richard Rego (26 years), and Mr. Richard Condon (22 years) retired from the Westport School System. These positions and that of Mr. Conca, industrial arts teacher who was rified, were not filled.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

WESTPORT MIDDLE SCHOOL

Westport Middle School students have enjoyed a most successful and productive school year despite the limitations brought about by reductions in both staff and supplies. Areas affected include the flexibility in the scheduling of grades 7 & 8 students which was adversely affected by the elimination of one of the four teams of teachers serving this group. The suspension of our late bus program, as well as most of our afterschool activities, has made it difficult to meet the needs of our students beyond the normal school day. Finally, participation in the Lloyd Center Environmental Studies Program which won national recognition in the *National Teacher*, has been decreased across the grades and most drastically in Grade 8. However, in spite of the limitations placed upon programs during the 1988-1989 school year, the faculty, students and administration have met the challenges with great determination.

The Drama Club presented two highly successful productions. "Charlotte's Web" and "Scrooge" both received acclaim.

The Lion's Club members continue to be most generous in their support of Quest, a prevention program, which is a major component of our health curriculum.

Student projects included the following: members of the Honor Society took part in a community service activity by working several weekends in a soup kitchen program in Fall River; and the Student Council organized a fundraiser to purchase a copy machine for the Media Center and a new scoreboard for our gym.

Our School Improvement Council allocated funds to provide enrichment materials to the social studies and art departments, as well as, audio visual equipment for the Media Center.

The Medieval Faire, a sixth grade project, was again a most successful and rewarding experience for all who participated.

Our grade 7 students participated in a grant-sponsored, study of the history of the whaling industry at the Head of Westport. "In Our Own Backyard" provided students with information related to the development of Westport.

Students continue to be recognized for both academic and athletic accomplishments. They are invited to attend honors assemblies, honors luncheons, and evening awards dinners held in our diningroom.

In June of 1989 these retirements occurred. Mrs. Joan Bell retired following twenty-three years of service, Mrs. Elsie Mello after sixteen years of service and Mrs. Gertrude Maduro after twenty-one years of service.

The administrators of the Westport Middle school are proud of our accomplishments and stand ready to meet the challenges that are before us. Our goal is to work closely with parents, staff and students in providing the best possible education for each of our students.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

WESTPORT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

I appreciate this opportunity each year to share with you the highlights of the events at the Westport Elementary School. Three key issues are presented for the Westport Elementary School in this annual report. First because of fiscal problems in Westport, as well as throughout the Commonwealth, many reductions or changes to programs and personnel have occurred. A second topic is the Westport Elementary School Parents and Teachers Organization's (WESPAT) activities as they continue to provide many exciting and motivating programs/experiences for our children. Finally, students at the Westport Elementary School in Grades 3, 4 and 5, this past spring continued to demonstrate their learned skills on the IOWA Test of Basic Skills and, for those children in Grade 3, results on the Massachusetts Basic Skills Tests were excellent. We can be proud of their continued hard work and successes.

REDUCTIONS

The student population at the WES continues to be approximately 570 students. However, the services for 300 of these children in grades three, four and five have changed significantly. Rather than five teachers at each of these grade levels working with students, one teacher from each grade level was eliminated. The result was that the class size jumped from an average of 17/22:1 per class to class sizes of 27/28:1. In actuality some classrooms increased by 7-11 students limiting the time that a teacher has to work with individual students.

Also, the WES's ability to provide an instructional program designed for independent and dependent learners was reorganized into heterogenous classrooms in Grades 3, 4 and 5. The necessary time for working with individuals, especially required by "at risk" students on a daily basis, was effectively eliminated. An evaluation of these changes will have occurred at the conclusion of the 1989-1990 school year.

The Science Lab program will no longer be provided by a science specialist with a "hands-on" activity for children each week. All science instruction will now take place in the regular classroom.

Finally, the Media Center staff was reduced by one paraprofessional. This reduction eliminates the library skills program for students. The story telling program for primary students has been severely reduced, as well. Hopefully, a Volunteer Program recently started will lessen the effects of this reduction.

WESPAT - Westport Elementary School Parents and Teachers

WESPAT continues to gain the support of the Westport Elementary School community with its fund-raisers. This year a budget of \$10,500 was established by the Advisory Board under the leadership of Mrs. Nancy McMillan, President. Then through two major events; the Bike-A-Thon, chaired by Mrs. Maxwell and the Christmas Bazaar, chaired by Mrs. Reynolds, this total was reached for enrichment activities and programs for the coming year. We hope that you will continue to support our fund-raising efforts.

Special programs held at the WES for the children with funding from WESPAT were: Len Cabral, Storyteller; "Robin Hood" by the Hampstead Players; "The Lorax" performed by the Enchanted Circle Players and "Tales of A Chinese Grandmother" by the You and Me Puppets.

WESTPORT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (cont.)

In addition to these programs which were brought to the Westport Elementary School, the children took field trips as follows: Kindergarten, the Dartmouth Museum; Grade 1 Roger Willisms Park in Providence; Grade 2 Boston Aquarium; Grade 3 Plimouth Museum and Mayflower in Plymouth; Grade 4 The Newport Mansions; and Grade 5 New Alchemy Institute in Falmouth. Many thanks from the children for all your support for their enrichment programs.

WESTPORT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL TESTING RESULTS

This past year the children did very well in both the Iowa Tests of Basics Skills and on the Massachusetts Tests of Basic Skills. The following results are evidence that the programs and efforts of the teachers at the Westport Elementary School have been most productive.

Grade 3 - IOWA Results: Average grade equivalency of 4.41. The typical pupil at the Westport Elementary School scored as well or better than 70% of Grade 3 pupils in the country.

Grade 4 - IOWA Results: Average grade equivalency of 5.8. The typical pupil at the Westport Elementary School scored as well or better than 78% of Grade 4 pupils across the country.

Grade 5 - IOWA Results: Average grade equivalency of 6.31. The typical pupil at the Westport Elementary School scored as well or better than 64% of Grade 5 pupils in the country.

Massachusetts Basic Skills Tests are administered to the students in Grade 3 each year. This program was initiated to determine whether each school district in Massachusetts was providing a basic skills curriculum for all children. The passing mark for students on this test is a 65%. Our results this past year were excellent. They follow:

Reading - 99% (percent) of the students passed this test - only one (1) child did not meet the standard for this test, every other child had a 75% or higher grade.

Mathematics - 97% (percent) of the students passed this test - only three children were unsuccessful on this test and a total of five (5) had scores below 75%.

Writing Sample - 99% (percent) of the students passed this test - only one (1) child did not write an acceptable writing sample.

We can be proud of these results. I firmly believe that the Westport Elementary School's teaching staff and its academic curriculum demonstrate from these results the excellent programs and instruction that occurs at the WES. You, as taxpayers, can be proud of your support for these programs. Please continue to provide the necessary funds to ensure their continuation.

PERSONNEL CHANGES

Congratulations to Mrs. Phyllis Briggs, cafeteria manager at the Westport Elementary School who retired at the end of the school year. After thirty years of service to the Westport Schools, Mrs. Briggs will now enjoy some leisure time and her many hobbies in her retirement. Again, I wish to thank her for her dedicated service to our School/Town and wish her much happiness and fine health in the future. Mrs. Claire Gagne, former Assistant Manager at the Westport Elementary School, has been appointed as the new cafeteria manager at the Westport Elementary School. Along with Mrs. Briggs' retirement other changes in the area of personnel have occurred at the Westport Elementary School

during the year.

Mrs. Susan Amato, Computer Specialist, is now assigned full-time at the WES. This change increases the time children in Grades 1-5 are scheduled for computer instruction to 40 minutes a week. Additionally, Health instructional time has been increased for Grades 1-5 at the WES to 40 minutes a week. Miss Frances Melvyn, Health Specialist, serving as a long-term substitute, is providing the instructional needs in this area. Mrs. Elizabeth France was reassigned from Grade 5 to Grade 2. Mr. Robert St. Laurent was reassigned from a Grade 3 classroom to Grade 5. Finally, Mrs. Lynn Anderson, Special Needs Teacher, will be filling the maternity leave of Mrs. Elizabeth O'Hara.

Summary

This year saw many changes/reductions because of the fiscal crisis which exists in Massachusetts. We need your support at Town Meetings and with the School Budget so that other reductions do not occur. It is my feeling that the children of Westport are our most important product. I hope that you agree with me.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

ALICE A. MACOMBER SCHOOL

The following is a summary of the Annual Report for the Alice E. Macomber School. Included are some of our accomplishments for the year.

(1) **Personnel Changes:** This year the Macomber School has seen several changes in personnel. They include:

- (a) Mrs. Conboy appointed school nurse
- (b) Mrs. Tripp appointed custodian
- (c) Mrs. Silva (aide) transferred to the Middle School
- (d) Mrs. Michael transferred to the computer teacher position
- (e) Mrs. Fisher new speech teacher
- (f) Mrs. LaBran new guidance counselor
- (g) Mrs. Albanese new health teacher

(2) **Basic Skills Testing:** Again, I am pleased to announce that our grade 3 students did extremely well in the annual Massachusetts Basic Skills Testing Program. The summary reads as follows:

Reading	100% passed
Math.	only 1 scored below 65%
Writing	100% passed

(3) **Budget Cuts:** Because of limited funding for our school budget, the following areas had to be eliminated:

- (a) One paraprofessional position
- (b) Our Science-lab program
- (c) Science Express

ALICE A. MACOMBER SCHOOL (cont.)

(4) **School Improvement Council:** This year our funds have been utilized in the following manner:

- (a) Math. manipulatives for **Math. Their Way** and **Math. Their Way of Thinking**.
- (b) Trade books for reading
- (c) Cultural Programs

Note! School Improvement Council funds were reduced to 1/3 as a result of the state budget problems.

(5) **Macomber Parents' Group:** As usual, our Parent Group is extremely helpful to our school. Their activities include:

- (a) Volunteer help in special needs
- (b) Room mothers
- (c) Fundraisers for monthly-cultural programs at school
- (d) Santa's Workshop
- (e) Fashion Show
- (f) Spaghetti Supper
- (g) General assistance (i.e. Open House, Christmas and Spring Programs, etc.)

(6) **Spectrum Program:** This year we have been able to expand our Spectrum Program to all grades. The schedule incorporates the following:

- (a) Grades 1-2-3 20 minutes per day
- (b) Grades 4-5 25 minutes per day

(7) **Sports Program:** We continue to provide intramural sports for students in grades four and five. Flag football and softball are offered. Play-off games, topped by a championship game, conclude the programs.

(8) **Language Arts:** We continue to promote language arts as a program involving reading, writing, and spelling (using "Reading and Writing Process"). In addition, we are piloting a new reading series in grade four ("Open Court") that emphasizes this language arts concept.

(9) **Special Programs:** The Macomber School continues to offer a variety of special programs for our students. These programs supplement the regular academic offerings. They include:

- (a) Reading (Open Court, Stevenson)
- (b) ESL (English as a Second Language Program)
- (c) Chapter 1 (remedial reading)
- (d) Behavioral Modification Program
- (e) Learning Disability Programs
- (f) Project D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education)
- (g) Junior Achievement

By working together (School Committee, Administration, and Schools), we hope to continue to provide the best education possible for our students.

BUSINESS OPERATIONS

FOOD SERVICE

This program has been and is operating in a very satisfactory manner. Improved accounting procedures have been instituted that provides early identification of problems. Recent substantial cutbacks in surplus foods (meat, cheese, poultry, etc.) and recent food price increases will be a financial problem for the program.

BUILDING ACTIVITY

Design service for the Middle School Roof, Macomber Roof, High School Roof and High School Window Project are nearing completion. It is hoped that the projects will be completed during the 1990 summer period. We anticipate starting other Design Programs in the near future.

CUSTODIAL SERVICES

Due to recent budget constraints, three custodial positions have been eliminated. These reductions occurred at the Middle and High Schools. These cutbacks are posing problems for these two buildings. Instead of areas being cleaned every day, there are some areas being cleaned on alternate days. This is not a satisfactory arrangement.

RADON GAS TEST

All school buildings have been tested for radon gas exposure. Out of 165 tests only three areas (Macomber Crawl Space and Garage and one room at the Middle School) had readings above an acceptable limit. These areas are in the process of being retested. In addition, we will be retesting two rooms at the Elementary School, even then the readings were in an acceptable range.

MIDDLE SCHOOL BOILERS

Three new boilers have been installed at the Middle School. They appear to be functioning very well. In order to promote a better environment, number 2 fuel is now being used instead of number 4 fuel with the new boilers. We anticipate that at a later date a gas line will be installed so that the school will have an alternate fuel system available to it.

HIGH SCHOOL SEWERAGE SYSTEM

This project has been completed. The Sewerage Pit and Syphon System have had extensive repairs. The pre-existing sewer line was left intact. To date we have witnessed no problem with the new system.
