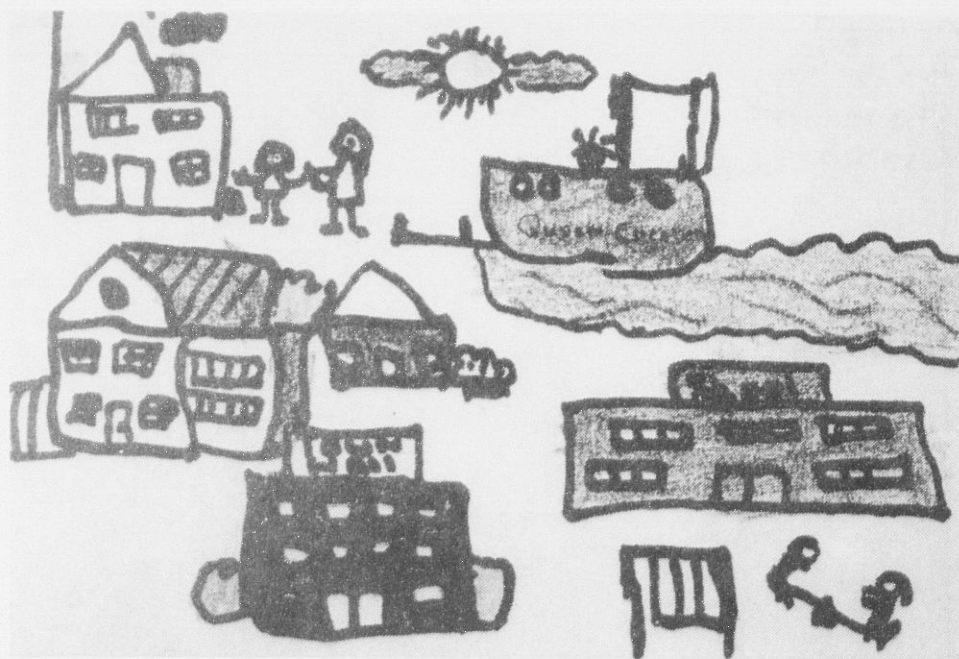

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

1990 was an exceptionally busy year in the Selectmen's Office and other departments, with staffing changes, lengthy discussions about the Town's financial position, new programs, and continuing projects.

In March, Romeo A. Fortin was elected to the seat on the Board left vacant by the untimely death of Chairman Ronald A. Desrosiers. George T. Leach, Jr. in the third year of his term, was unanimously chosen by the Board to serve as Chairman. Francois A. Napert continued into his second year as the third member of the Board.

Lorraine Payton, Personnel Administrator shared part-time with the Town of Dartmouth through a grant from the State Executive Office of Communities and Development, left Westport to work full-time in Dartmouth after budget cuts eliminated Westport's portion of the position. We were sorry to lose Lorraine and the opportunity to bring the Town's personnel policies and procedures up to date.

Denise Bouchard was hired as Confidential Clerk in the Selectmen's office during July after Teri Getty left the position to pursue other interests.

In October, we welcomed J. Michael Buckley as Town Accountant to replace Rose Rego, who left after more than four years' service to the Town in the Accounting Office.

Tom McGarr and John Coury left the Personnel Board, leaving members Brad Brightman, Kevin Hill, and Tom McCoy to greet new member Ed Towne to the Board. As of this writing, one vacancy remains on the Board, and we encourage anyone interested in volunteering for this community Board to apply.

PROJECT UPDATES

Water Main Installation

In September of this year, we were finally successful in getting federal funding released to begin construction on the extension of the Fall River water main to the long-contaminated Route Six/Sanford Road area in north Westport. Some forty households will have the opportunity to connect to the city water supply by June of the coming year.

We especially wish to thank Representative Ed Lambert, Senator Tom Norton, Congressman Barney Frank, and our staff members who spent untold hours to finally bring the Water Advisory Committee project into existence.

Harbor Dredging Project

Working through the State Division of Waterways, we have been fortunate to be chosen by the Army Corps of Engineers for a feasibility study for a dredging project at the Westport Harbor entrance. This feasibility study is expected to be completed within eighteen months, when the Army Corps of Engineers will present its recommendations on dredging to our Board. We will open the discussion on best alternatives for public review.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN (cont.)

Financial issues

For the third straight year, the Town is facing funding shortfalls because of decreases in local aid from the State. Even though the voters sent an overwhelming message in the November election to increase state aid to the communities to 40% of state revenues, there is no certainty that the incoming Weld administration will uphold the desire of the voters. With Proposition 2-1/2 limiting property taxes and the State decreasing local aid, we will not be able to meet the cost of providing the town services you are accustomed to receiving.

At the March 1990 election, Westport voters approved two debt exclusion questions to allow the Town to raise the cost to pay off the loan for construction of the Elementary School and to repay the cost of renovations for the school buildings. This has provided some relief to the budget restrictions, and we thank you, the voters, for your support and confidence.

Town Building Repairs

Thanks to the volunteer efforts of the Building Committee and Town Hall staff we have completed building renovation and repair projects according to schedule including projects in the American Legion Hall, Library, Town Hall, Highway building, and Police Station. We will shortly move into the second stage of renovation projects.

Health Insurance

In an attempt to gain direct control over some of the issues driving the rapid cost increases for employee health care, we have banded together with nineteen other towns and other public groups to form the South Eastern Massachusetts Health Group, to jointly purchase health insurance for our employees. We look forward to improving health care options for employees while taking steps to control the rising costs.

Head of Westport

The cleanup of gasoline at the Head of Westport is moving into to what is anticipated to be the final stages of remediation, thanks to the hard work of the Landing Commissioners and the Hazardous Waste Coordinator. The clean-up project was funded by Town Meeting after the State Department of Environmental Protection agrees with the Town to negotiate a limited and more carefully defined clean-up process. The Landing Commissioners have hired the engineering firm Tighe and Bond to assist in designing the action plan for clean-up.

GWEN

Finally, through the efforts of our appointed GWEN Monitoring and Reporting Committee and our state and federal level officials, the siting of GWEN network towers within Westport has been indefinitely delayed.

The U.S. House of Representatives has placed a prohibition on spending any additional monies on the GWEN network pending the outcome of a study on the health effects of such a low level radiation installation.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN (cont.)

We will continue to monitor the situation, and will take the necessary steps to protect the interests of our community should the Air Force reactivate the project with the intent to proceed with construction on a Westport site.

The Coastal Agricultural Community of New England

We are pleased that the Town of Westport has been designated by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts as "The Coastal Agricultural Resource Community of New England." This bill was initiated through a Town Meeting vote, and sponsored in the General Court by Representative Ed Lambert and supported by Senator Tom Norton.

Uniform Procurement Law

The state has added another unfunded law, Chapter 30B, which mandates that the Town follow rigorous procedures for all purchases over \$1,000. We were able to draft local regulations in time for the mandatory implementation date, but administering the program has placed a huge new burden on our office. We fully support the intent of seeking the most competitive prices available, but we are finding that in many cases costs have actually increased because of expensive specifications and advertising requirements in Chapter 30B. We look forward to working with our local legislators to modify the law to more workable standards.

Fair Housing/ Housing Partnership Committee

We want to recognize the overwhelming response to the housing survey questionnaire sent out by the Fair Housing/ Housing Partnership Committee last spring. The information the Committee received will help them immensely in developing housing goals and strategies, and many other projects they will undertake. We extend our appreciation to the members of this Committee for their hours donated to the fair and affordable housing effort.

Household Hazardous Waste Day

On a sunny Saturday in early November, a group of local volunteers assembled with the Town's hazardous waste disposal contractor to hold a household hazardous waste collection day at the rear of Town Hall. The turnout was enormous, with wastes collected from well over two hundred vehicles. Unfortunately, another one hundred cars were turned away. We will be asking for additional funding from the next Town Meeting to continue holding collection days, to help the citizens reach their commitment public safety and protecting the environment. Please contact our office for further information on hazardous wastes to be saved for proper disposal at future collection days.

In closing, we wish to acknowledge and thank the many citizens who have volunteered their time and expertise on the various groups and committees which have been formed to assist in developing policy direction for the town.

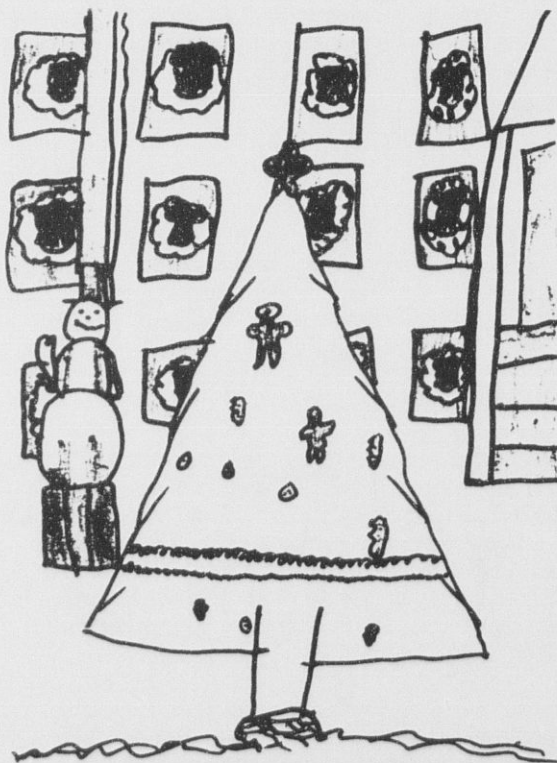
Thanks also to the appointed and elected officials who have worked with us this past year, and to the town employees for their continuing dedication and accomplishments.

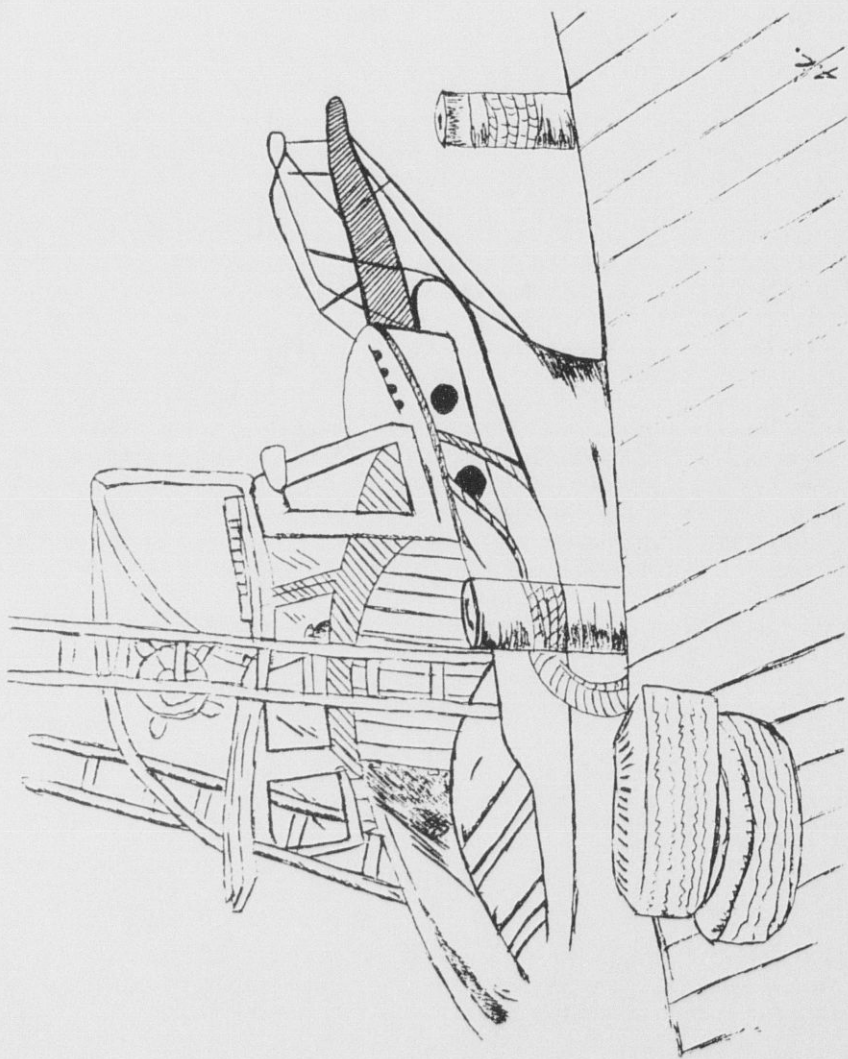

Section 3 PROCEDURES

All applications for permits, requests for determination of applicability, determinations and conditions attached thereto shall be in conformance with and made under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 131, section 40.

Section 4 ENFORCEMENT

Any person who violates any provision of M.G.L. Chapter 131, section 40, and regulations promulgated thereunder, or any permits or conditions of permits issued by the conservation Commission, shall be subject under this By-law to a penalty of up to Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for each offense to be determined by the conservation Commission. Each day, or portion thereof, during which the violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

The provisions of the Westport Non-Criminal Disposition By-law M.G.L. Chapter 40, section 21D, shall apply to violations of the By-law.

Section 5 GENERAL CONDITIONS

This By-law is adopted under the Home Rule Amendment of the Massachusetts Constitution and the Home Rule Statutes, independent of the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 131, section 40 and the regulations thereunder.

8. To maintain the single-family character of the neighborhood, the entrance to the accessory apartment should be on the side or rear, if possible, but may be through the front door, if there is a vestibule.
9. The owner must occupy one of the two units.
10. There shall be no more than one accessory apartment within a single-family dwelling.
11. Accessory apartments shall be occupied by no more than two persons.
12. The family dwelling containing an accessory apartment shall be in conformity with By-law Permitted Uses, d. Renting of rooms or furnishing of board for not more than four persons in a dwelling regularly occupied for residential purposes.

- 10) M.S.D. (marine sanitary device) pump out facility;
- 11) Facility for the unloading and shipping of fish and shellfish.

ANNUAL REPORT of the WESTPORT ARTS COUNCIL

The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1990.

The Westport Arts Council was comprised of 10 members: Kurt Wisneski, Chairperson; Carmen Maiocco, Secretary; Marie Woollam, Treasurer; Sarah Jackson, Recording Secretary; Beth Easterly, Publicity; and Betsy Ann Szel, Deborah Coolidge, Gladys Riemer, Clara Stewart, Anna Mason.

Jacqueline Coyne served on the Council from January to June 1990 and resigned from the board because she moved to a new location.

Twice a year, the Westport Arts Council distributes funds generated for the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council (MALC) by the MEGAGUCKS game. Each Town's allotment is determined on a per capita basis. The funding periods are announced in local newspapers and by posters distributed throughout the town. Applications were due in early October and early April. The grant applications are available at the Town Clerk's office throughout the year.

The members of the Westport Arts Council (all have related experience in the arts) decide which grants meet the criteria of the MALC and will benefit our community and then submit these decisions to the MALC for their final approval. The MALC was formed to stimulate and encourage the arts within cities and towns by administering the distribution raised through the arts lottery game conducted by the State Lottery Commission. Funded cultural activities and performances benefit the greater community and recently funded artwork is displayed at the Westport Library and the Town Hall.

Voting for approval funding takes place approximately 3 months prior to the funding period. During the October 1989 meetings, a total of \$5388 was distributed for the January 1990 funding period and \$5408 was distributed for the July 1990 funding period. Our October 1989 meetings funded 11 applications and the following represents a partial list of arts related activities funded: Davison Paul'sw Images from a Westport Past; Sylvia Wallach's Intergrated Art's Workshop at the Alice Macomber School; Leland Faulkner Light Theatre and The Enchanted Circle Theatre at the at the Westport Elementary School; museum trips for the Alice Macomber School; and the New Bedford Symphony Orchestra.

Our April meetings funded 15 applications and the following represents a partial list of arts-related activities funded: musical entertainment for the Westport Council on the Aging; poetry readings at the Westport Free Public Library; Chinese dance workshops at the Alice Macomber School; two public concerts at the Westport Historical Society; a photographic exhibit of Westport residents by Carol Long; and the summer youth theatre festival at the Zeiterion Theatre.

We also funded applications targeted especially to Massachusetts school grades K - 12 to encourage attendance at cultural performances. These Performing Arts Student Series (PASS) grants reimburse ticket prices up to \$5.00 per student for public/private education systems. During the 1990 year a total of \$991 was distributed in the January 1990 funding period and \$991 was distributed in the July funding period. Our October 1989 meetings funded 4 PASS applications for the January 1990 period and the following activities were funded; Macomber School, Zeiterion Theatre and the Macomber Elementary School, Susan Klein performance.

The Westport Arts Council encourages applications by individual artists musicians, performers, cultural groups and teachers for projects which will benefit our community.

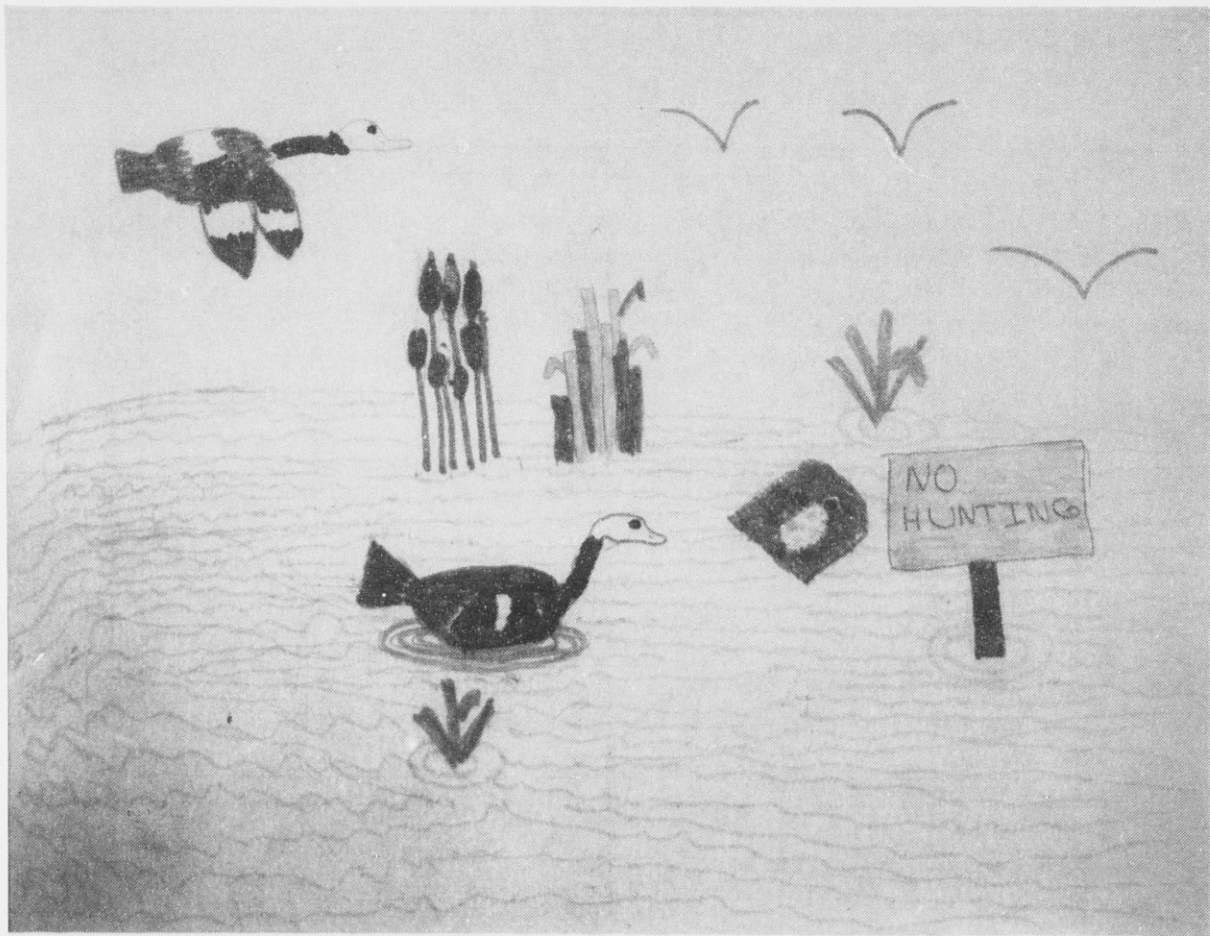

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

During the calendar year 1990, the Appeals Board held eighteen hearings as well as completed the hearings on the Comprehensive Permit application.

Of the eighteen petitions heard there were twelve requests for variances. One variance was granted with conditions; four variances were granted for exchange of square footage, set-backs and the addition of a third floor; three variance requests were withdrawn and four applications were denied.

There were three applications for findings. These findings were granted to allow gravel removal with conditions at one location and to add decks to existing buildings at the other two locations.

Two hearings were held objecting to the decisions of the Building Inspector. In both cases, the Building Inspectors decision was upheld.

There is one application for a special permit to allow a golf driving range at the old Westport Drive-In location which is still pending as of this writing.

The Board spent fourteen months and over one hundred hours considering the Comprehensive Permit for Pleasantview Estates located on the north side of Charlotte White Road which ultimately was approved for 46 dwelling units. Thanks to the participation and knowledge of the various Boards, Committees, consultants, and interested parties, we feel that this project was very thoroughly considered with the best interest of the Town and all parties concerned in mind.

The Board was reorganized with James M. Morton III remaining as Chairman, Joseph L. Keith III as Clerk and Raymond Medeiros as Vice-Chairman.

Commissioner Stafford Sheehan has received additional inquiries about contributions of funds in trust for specific purposes of the Town of Westport (i.e. Library books, school books, Police Department, etc.) and also helped in the drafting of a sample trust instrument whereby funds may be left to a public agency or department.

Commissioner Lori Szelag has been available to the Library Department to review and take whatever action was needed on requests for expenditures from certain Trust Funds for books to be purchased by the Library Board of Trustees.

Commissioner Roberta V. Costa has been the liaison between the Board and Fire Department in respect to the need for monies for equipment and repairs from the Ambulance Trust Fund.

ANNUAL REPORT
of the
BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1990 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed thirty-one years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitoes.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

By early spring of 1990 most criteria was in place to indicate the emergence of large broods of mosquitos and the potential for a severe outbreak of Eastern Encephalitis. The Bristol County area again had an exceptionally wet spring with heavy rains filling swamp areas with substantial amounts of water. These areas were to be large breeding sites from eggs that were laid by late season mosquitos from the previous year. As the season progressed, *Culiseta melanura* densities were significantly above the 7 year median. The Eastern virus was isolated in *melanura* mosquitos in late June which was the earliest isolations to be found since records have been kept. Each week virus levels climbed at an alarming rate. By early July mosquito control personnel and the State Public Health knew there would be a spill over of virus to human biting mosquitos that would eventually involve horses and humans in Southeastern Mass.

MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT (cont.)

The Bristol County Project began intensifying its ground ULV spraying in areas of high risk in order to protect the people from possible virus carrying mosquitos. All spray crews were put on a 6 day schedule with earlier hours to get as much coverage as possible. During this time plans were being made for a widespread aerial spray program but it was not until August 27th that the planes were finally in the air. We believe that our increased ground spraying during the several weeks before the aerial spray took place prevented any human cases of encephalitis in Bristol County. With the support of its member towns, the Project was able to respond to an extremely dangerous mosquito situation.

The Project answered all requests for spraying along with our regular spraying of known infested areas for a total of 2,199.9 sprayed acres.

During the spring and summer months a total of 90 catch basins that were found to be breeding were treated. During the fall and winter months a total of 2,100 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 1,900 feet of drainage ditch was reclaimed.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

ANNUAL REPORT of the CONSERVATION COMMISSION SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD

The Commission hereby submits a record of its actions, beginning July 1, 1990.

The last six months of 1990 were very busy ones for the Commission. Twenty (20) meetings were held, two hundred thirty (230) decisions were rendered, seventeen (17) violations were addressed with three (3) to be resolved. A new agent and senior clerk were hired and have become familiar with their work, with the result that office operations are normal. An inherited backlog of cases has been cleared up and all cases are now being taken care of within legal time limits.

The Commission has been issuing monthly reports of its actions to civic and civil bodies. We have been participating in the efforts of the Open Space Committee, Buzzards Bay Project, Conservancy Mapping Program, Core Committee and the Fair Housing Committee.

We want to single out the efforts of the Land Conservation Trust in their revegetation and dune preservation work at the Town's Cherry and Webb area. This model program is an accomplishment which benefits all of the Town citizens. We ask that everyone who enjoys this area cooperate with Land Trust efforts in preventing damage to this valuable resource.

The access road to the Town Beach will now be maintained to allow easier access to the area.

Road drainage and landfill issues were addressed through cooperation with the Board of Health and Highway Surveyor.

The Commission held an Environmental Concern Night in October. As a result of inputs submitted, we have issued an action plan dealing with issues of importance to our Town. We respectfully request the cooperation of those involved in carrying out these remedial action. We plan a continuing active role in solving the Town's environmental problems.

The Commission is supportive of Land Conservation Trust efforts in instituting conservation restrictions. We intend to continue cooperation in this area.

We encourage everyone contemplating activities in or near wetlands to contact us prior to the activity. We assure timely and considerate action. Anyone who is unsure about wetland designations can get a determination by contacting our office.

We appreciate the opportunity to serve the Town.

Seed Program, Meals-on-Wheels, Medi-Mate, Mini-van (information), Newsletter, Picnic, Podiatry Clinic, Referrals to Senior Citizen Lawyer Referral, Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinners/Baskets (Bristol Elder Services, Inc., A.B.C.D.E., American Legion, Kiwanis, Lions Club, Westport Newcomers, and Westport High School), V.I.T.A. (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) and Walk-In Clinics (Nursing Department).

Clinics

A Podiatry Clinic was held every other month funded by client contributions. The two participating podiatrists are Dr. Kenneth Brum and Dr. Harshall Taitz. Clara Duquette is an assistant. Every Wednesday morning from 10 a.m. until 12 noon, the Nursing Department offers free blood pressure, urine and blood check-ups to Westport residents 60+ and a cholesterol screening the last Wednesday of the month, by appointment until August, 1990 when the program had to be terminated because of Federal regulations.

Elder Visitors & Companion

The Elder Visitors and Companion made approximately 400 visits to the homebound a month bringing support and friendship as well as books and magazines to 143 elders.

Federal Food and Surplus Give Away & Seed Program

With the help of Rita Maynard, Maisie Boulds, Dot Kirby, Madeline Manchester, members of the "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", High School students and the Highway Department, 1,460 households and 2,256 low-income persons received federal surplus food products. Eighty-nine persons received kits containing seeds for a complete vegetable garden.

"Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc."

"Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", a non-profit organization, has sponsored several successful fund-raising events. The "Friends" are planning a long-range program to provide the elders of Westport with a Senior Center. Their on-going project is a Westport telephone book which is on sale throughout the Town. Nancy Silva is the President.

Grants

The Council received an extension of its 1989 Discretionary Grant of \$4,400 from the Massachusetts Executive Office of Elder Affairs for an Elder Visitor for 10 hours a week until October 30, 1990. At that time, the Elder Visitor was supported by our Formula Grant FY 90 of \$4,227 which also paid for our Companion and their mileage into 1991. Formula Grant 91 of \$4,105 will be used to continue the services of our Elder Visitor and Companion who visit the frail, homebound elders of Westport.

COUNCIL ON AGING (cont.)

Our Needs Assessment which was supported on a Formula Grant was completed in December of 1990 and will be published by the Spring of 1991.

Medi-Mate

Four Medi-Mate units purchased by the Council with a grant from the Romero Trust, are connected to St. Anne's Hospital and Melrose, MA emergency systems. These "instant-alert" units are given to low-income Westport residents living alone and in precarious health. They will be kept by the Town to be used where needed. Two new units were given to the C.O.A. by the "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc."

Newsletter, "EVERGREEN"

Fourteen hundred copies are distributed monthly to area locations. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication and William A. Greeley and Lorman Trueblood for their assistance with the distribution.

Nutrition Program

During the year, 8,173 meals were delivered to the homebound by the Fall River Nutrition Program under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, and paid for, in part, by the Town of Westport. This is a decrease of 651 meals over last year, with 34 fewer clients for a total of 60 unduplicated homebound elders being served during this year. The cut backs reflected a deficit in the program funds which required stricter screening for eligibility.

IN SUMMARY

Although the total population of Westport is dropping (1989 - 13,307 to 1990 - 13,241), a decrease of 66 persons, the elder population (60+) has increased from 2,768 to 2,828, a total of 60-persons. More significant for the work of the C.O.A. office is the increase in the 75+ group of elders from 871 to 931. Coupled with the state of the economy, the office contemplates a heavier case load of requests for assistance from this older, frailer group of residents.

The Board of the C.O.A. was pleased that the Town voted to accept an Accessory Apartment Zoning By-Law. To date, only two families have applied to add a "granny-flat", but this by-law makes it easier for families to take care of elderly relatives or receive assistance themselves.

The Needs Assessment was completed in December and will be tabulated and published in the Spring. A preliminary count indicates that an even greater number of residents are living at or below poverty level than in 1981.

**ANNUAL REPORT of the RONALD DESROSIER'S MEMORIAL FUND
WESTPORT CITIZENS BETTERMENT COMMITTEE**

On February 5, 1990, Shirley Desrosiers appeared before the Board of Selectmen and presented a Declaration of Trust which consisted of a donation of \$2500 to commence the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund in memory of her late husband and former Selectman.

The Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund consists of the original \$2500 donation and as of December 31, 1990, the total amount in the fund, including interest, was \$5,154.50. Donations made to this fund are to be kept permanently in a separate bank account and only the interest or income can be expended yearly by the Trustees making this a perpetual memorial for the purpose of the betterment and needs of the Town.

Under the Declaration of Trust, a Westport Citizens Betterment Fund was also established. This fund may accept donations of cash or any form of intangible property, including but not limited to, stocks, bonds, money market certificates and other similar property. In addition, donations for specific purposes can be made to this fund such as those already in existence for knitting and bridge classes sponsored by the Council on Aging and, likewise, the fuel assistance program. The balance remaining in this fund as of December 31, 1990 was \$660.44.

The Board of Selectmen appointed Shirley Desrosiers, Hilda M. Martel, Cynthia Rodrigues, William R. Plamondon and Charlene R. Wood as TRUSTEES of the Westport Citizens Betterment Fund and the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund.

Each year in the months of August, September and October, the Trustees will annually solicit proposals from town agencies, citizen groups, non-profit organizations, and members of the general public for proposed grants. The Trustees will then consider the proposals and award the grants to as many recipients as possible.

Whereas these Funds were just started this year, our goal for next year is to generate more funds through publicity and possibly a fund raiser. Any person or organization wishing to donate to either of the funds may do so through the Board of Selectmen's office.

During the year 1990, there was an estimated \$434,885.00 due to fire in Westport. This estimate includes all fires with an estimated loss over \$200.00. This total is broken down as follows:

During the year, 14 firefighters (2 permanent and 12 call) became certified to the Firefighter I level. These firefighters went through 44 hours of training and passed both a written and practical skills examination as required by the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy. We are hoping to be able to offer to these people the opportunity to become certified to the Firefighter II level next year.

Other firefighting training received by various members of the department in 1990 included: The burning process, ventilation, forcible entry, protective breathing, search and rescue, pumps and hydraulics, hazardous materials, flammable gas, incident command system, strategic analysis of fire department operations, arson investigation, structural hazards, firefighter safety, rural water supply, and structural firefighting.

EMS training received by various members of the department included: ALS/BLS interface, pre-hospital trauma life support, head trauma, rapid extrication, pediatric emergencies, disaster planning, hypothermia, pre-hospital administration/ cardiac patients, and critical incident stress. Eighteen EMTs also became certified in the use of the automated defibrillator. This is a vital machine that is utilized on patients who have gone into cardiac arrest. We are in the process of ordering 2 sets of defibrillators and hopefully they should be on the ambulances and in service by the end of January.

The fire department has in its possession two important pieces of equipment, a photoionization unit and an explosive meter. The photoionization unit will detect, measure and provide a direct reading of the concentration of a variety of hydrocarbons in the soil. The explosive meter will monitor ambient Oxygen for deficiency, Hydrogen Sulfide for dangerous levels, and indicate the hazard or presence of 34 common industrial toxic or combustibles.

Once again, firefighters donated their off-duty time in conjunction with the teachers at the Elementary and Macomber schools to present the "Be Fire Safety Smart Like Me" program which was designed by the Fall River Firefighters Memorial Museum. Over 400 children in grades K, 2, and 4 received 12 hours of fire education at their respective levels. An educational method such as this is important to teach children at a young age the difference between good fire and bad fire. This program has been well received by the parents as well as the children.

As in the past both the call firefighters and permanent firefighters associations have financially supported the fire education program as well as other programs within the community.

As in the past, the Westport Fire Department and I, as Chief, will continue to provide the best possible service and dedication as is humanly and financially possible.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL
DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT
July 1, 1989 - June 30, 1990

I would like to take this opportunity to express my great pride in our district school and in our students' activities and accomplishments. It is exciting to see your children, our students, grow daily in their positive mental attitudes, in their skills, and in their school and community pride. Our report represents another successful school year and on behalf of the students, faculty, staff, and administration, I extend a sincere "Thank You" for your continued support of Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School and its programs.

STUDENT SERVICES

Summer Programs

Diman Vocational conducted its summer exploratory program with a total of 260 students from our district participating by exploring four shops of their choice to determine if vocational education would be in their future plans. We were funded through EEOG, a Sex Equity Grant, and the BCTC program. It was the highest enrollment and largest Summer Session undertaken at Diman. The breakdown and enrollment of the programs were: Remediation/Make-up, 70 students, grades 9-12; Math Improvement, 53 students, incoming grade 9; Study Skills, 11 students, incoming grade 9; and BCTC, 30 students, for a total of 424 students.

Orientation Program

In late August, an orientation program was held in the school cafeteria for approximately 330 new students. Students were given instructions for the opening of school, handbooks and schedules were distributed and explained, and necessary forms and bus routes were given out.

A "Parent Night" was held in September to familiarize parents of new students with school programs, the school's philosophy and its policies. School administrators were present to explain their roles to the parents who attended. Approximately 250 parents and students attended.

Admissions

The results of our recruitment efforts showed the number of applicants for grade 9 holding at approximately 460 for 1990. Three hundred and twenty-one freshmen started at Diman in September. Even though we no longer have a lengthy waiting list, our overall enrollment reached 1,121 high school students. Every applicant who met our entrance standards was accommodated except those on the 502.4 waiting list. We should consider ourselves fortunate that we have been able to add programs and increase our enrollment when many vocational-technical schools are faced with sharply declining enrollments and the elimination of under-subscribed programs.

School Improvement Council and the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs

Our School Improvement Council was expanded this year and a major accomplishment was the complete review and modification of our student handbook as mandated by the Department of Education. A complete discipline code was adopted as well as

a revised attendance policy. Funding received from the D.O.E. for the School Improvement Council was \$2,662. Funding received for the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs was \$3,928.

An evening program for parental awareness of drug and alcohol abuse was very successful. Members of the faculty and administration along with community agencies such as the Fall River Council on Alcoholism, Charlton Memorial Hospital, and the District Attorney's office provided information about this topic.

We also conducted evening meetings for parents regarding the curriculum, college financial aid, special needs services, orientation program, testing, and career information.

In cooperation with Charlton Memorial Hospital, Diman provided drug and alcohol assemblies through the topic, "From an Employers' Pro-spectus", to all students. In addition, two multi-media assemblies provided students with drug and alcohol abuse education.

Testing

Our Guidance Department administered the Massachusetts Assessment Test to the senior class and also administered the Basic Skills Tests in reading, math and writing to 313 grade 9 students and 85 grade 10 and 11 students who failed one, two or three parts of the tests given previously.

Career Day

The Guidance Department sponsored our sixth College Career Day with 10 colleges and technical schools represented. A large number of seniors, juniors and some parents took advantage of the opportunity to speak with the representatives present and to collect valuable information.

Follow-up Surveys

In April 1990, the Guidance Department sent out the Chapter 74 Completer Follow-Up form to 216 students from the graduating class of 1989. Of the 190 who responded or were contacted:

- 80 were working in areas related to their vocational training
- 47 were working in 8 non-related area
- 34 were pursuing additional education
- 9 were in military service
- 9 were unemployed
- 11 were not in the workforce

Co-op Program

Our Co-operative Education training program began the year with placement of large numbers of eligible seniors. The overall average hourly wage was \$5.98, down from \$6.25 in 1989. In late June the Guidance Department and the Job Placement Coordinator recorded the placement of the 1990 graduates.

Of 228 graduates:

- 109 were in trade related jobs
- 25 were working outside their Diman trade
- 20 were planning to enter the military
- 56 were planning further education

Scholarships and Awards

The Guidance Department was involved in the following scholarship and award programs. Attendance

The 1989-90 school year began with the highest student enrollment Diman has ever experienced. Our average student daily attendance during the 1989-90 school year was over 94%. This is an excellent attestation to the fact that our students desire a vocational education and more importantly want to be students at Diman. I am very proud of our student's accomplishments.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The October 1, 1989 report demonstrates Diman's commitment to service the special needs population of the District. Sixty-eight special needs students were accepted into Diman. Fifty-nine students enrolled which accounted for 19% of the total ninth grade class. This rate is equal to or exceeds the regional ratio of special needs students.

With the addition of these students, the special needs student population totaled 185 students. This equaled 16.7% of the total high school population. A half-time special needs instructor was added to the staff to ensure appropriate service delivery for the increased special needs population.

The Annual General Shop Parents' Night and Advisory Committee meetings were held with excellent attendance and very positive results.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Our academic program continues to offer options to meet the needs of the students enrolled at Diman. Our philosophy of keeping all options open and available provides our students with a choice of furthering their education or immediately entering their respective trade upon graduation.

Science Department

Our Science Department welcomed the addition of Principles of Technology to the curriculum this year. This course is a modular system of instruction emphasizing technical principles with "hands-on" learning and applying the basic principles of physics to specialized areas of modern technology.

A Diman graduate, Joao Teixeira, was honored by S.M.U. and received a Special Citation for Academic Excellence in Chemistry. Under the guidance and leadership of Mr. Roger Ramos plans are being made to begin our first science fair in the school year 1990-91.

Math Department

Our Math Department administered the 41st annual American High School Mathematics Examination to eleven seniors. The top three scorers were Keith St. Pierre, Christopher Guinen, and Amy Ainsworth. In addition, Mr. Robert Oliveira was nominated for the 1990 Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics Teaching. Diman's membership in the Somerset Computer Center afforded teachers the opportunity to improve their computer skills and to utilize those skills with their students. Two students received medals in VICA competition. William Zurawski was awarded a gold medal for his first place finish in Technical Math and David Coloumbe received the silver medal. Mr. Peter Goj, math instructor and varsity basketball coach, was recognized and honored for his exemplary coaching and instruction of high standards of sportsmanship by the Herald News.

English Department

Our English Department worked diligently with 328 students in preparation for the VICA Job Skills Demonstration. Diman students participated in the Massachusetts Bar Association Essay Contest, Project Spotlight at S.M.U., the Voice of Democracy Contest, the formulation of a literary magazine, and other activities. Mr. James Rillavey, faculty member, was featured in a newspaper article for his work of recording books on tapes to aid instruction. He has donated many of his works to Diman's library. In addition, Mr. Raymond Keough directed his students in broadcasting and writing commercials in conjunction with a radio station's project entitled the High School Radio Hour.

Social Studies Department

In efforts to continually update the Social Studies Department's curriculum, the staff reviewed and revised our Current Events and Human Science courses. They also worked collaboratively to determine and select an updated American Government textbook. Mr. Thomas Maiato, lead teacher, has attended various curriculum meetings with other regional vocational districts to improve our efforts in providing our students with the most current social studies programs.

In addition, our students and academic staff were involved in other areas that supplemented our academic offerings. Eight students participated in the Project Spotlight Program at S.M.U. They were: Richard Belanger, Jennifer Goff, Meredith Magill, Shelby Raposa, Jennifer Santos, John Camara, Joseph Guimond, Pedro Teixeira, and instructors Charles McPhillips and Dr. James Brosnan served as group leaders.

Drey Andrade, was nominated as Diman's outstanding junior to participate in Walt Disney's Doers and Dreamers program sponsored by the National Federation of State High School Associations.

The National Honor Society had a very successful year. A number of N.H.S. members once again participated in VICA's leadership event, Club Business Procedures. For the second consecutive year, the team won the state competition and advanced to the national competition. Also, the N.H.S. produced the school's first literary magazine, conducted the annual Daffodil Day fund-raiser for the American Cancer Society, and operated the snack bar during evening school.

Sue Costa, President of SADD, presented, on behalf of the club members, a club T-shirt to Governor Dukakis and thanked him for his support of SADD members throughout the state.

Julie Braga won first place in the Regional Vocational school's essay contest. Drey Andrade and alternate Jennifer Santos participated in the Student Government Day program in Boston and attended the Glass Bowl Drawing at the State House. Drey was seated at Representative Herrens desk for the days proceedings.

Key Club

Scott Oliveira and Tina Lopes helped the Kiwanis of Fall River in their drive for the Salvation Army by ringing the bell at Harbour Mall last December.

Key Club members raised \$3,657.03 in 1989 for the annual Christmas Food Drive for the needy members of our Diman community. Aiding in the donations were the Auto Body shop which raised approximately \$1,000.00, and the Auto Mechanics shop which raised approximately \$800.00.

In June, the Key Club donated \$1500 to the S.H.A.R.E. organization. S.H.A.R.E. develops adaptive electronic hardware to aid handicapped individuals. The presentation was made at a joint Kiwanis-Key Club luncheon hosted at Diman's Tea Room.

All of the academic courses and their activities are coordinated by Academic Cluster Supervisor Dr. James Brosnan and Academic Coordinator Mr. George Letendre.

VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS

This year as in past years we have provided numerous services to both individual members of the district as well as the member communities. In addition to service delivery, Diman is continually striving to upgrade our curriculum in an effort to maintain technological progress.

Diman experienced a very intensive Chapter 74 Department of Education evaluation of every program. This evaluation covered safety issues, curriculum, and shop facilities. We were extremely pleased when the D.O.E. reported that all programs met the requirements and were fully approved as Chapter 74 programs.

Diman and VICA played host to Governor Dukakis and his Export 90's Conference. This was one of the major highlights of our school year because so many students had the opportunity to meet the Governor of Massachusetts as he visited our shops and classrooms. Our Culinary Arts program hosted Governor Dukakis and his Export 90's conference. Special recognition by the Governor was bestowed upon our Culinary Arts students and faculty for their efforts to accommodate more than 100 members of the business community.

Kenneth Chalk, Auto Body shop, won the gold medal in the state VICA competition and competed in Oklahoma in the national finals placing third in the United States.

Diman was well represented in the Plymouth AAA Trouble Shooting contest. Diman was selected out of 38 teams to compete in the state competition. Qualifiers were Gerard Magnifico and David Silva. Students were accompanied by Mr. Phenix to Tri-County Vocational High School. Gerard Magnifico and David Silva were chosen for obtaining the highest scores in the written contest and placed fourth in the final state competition.

The Building Maintenance Program students have completed many building and grounds repairs. Special recognition was given to David Hickey for his efforts in producing a safety book. This book won a bronze medal in the state VICA competition.

Vocational Industrial Clubs of America (VICA) at Diman sponsored the annual shrimp dinner fund-raiser. This community project is a dinner held to give the public an opportunity to be informed of the Club's activities on the local, district, state, and national levels. David Viveros, culinary arts instructor, and the VICA students and advisors helped the Culinary Arts Department in the preparation and serving of the dinner.

Our Drafting program was extremely active. One student placed first in the VICA CAD competition and of the four students that competed, three won the right to attend the national VICA competition in Oklahoma.

Our Electrical department under the guidance of Mr. Daniel Pacheco became involved in a program with Eastern Edison Company which is helping schools and industry conserve energy. Approximately 2000 incandescent 60 watt lamps were replaced with 15 watt G.E. Compax Fluorescent lamps in an effort to cut the cost of electrical energy. It was suggested that Diman take part in an Eastern Edison program called "Project Brite" which requires that all current fluorescent fixtures be modified by replacing the existing balasts and light tubes. Mr. Pacheco along with Mr. Martel and his students began this process in the electrical shop and the plan is to expand the project during the 1990 school year to complete the entire school.

William Zurawski, an Electronics shop senior, won two VICA gold medals. He was also voted as Diman's Outstanding Vocational Student of the Year. In addition, eight students from the shop have been accepted to various colleges.

The Graphic Arts students worked on many projects some of which were Diman's applications, signs, forms and slips needed for the yearly operation of the school. Signs, banners and T-shirts were silk-screened to aid the "Fall River Celebrates America" extravaganza.

Diman's Health Careers students shocked the state VICA competition when our sophomores won a silver medallion competing in the Health Occupations Knowledge Bowl. All Health Careers students successfully passed their C.P.R. certification. They also held a walk-a-thon to promote physical fitness and to raise money for a local women's shelter. In addition they conducted an Egg Project that emphasized the responsibilities of caring for a newborn, and they also assisted in our annual blood drive.

One of Diman's newest shops--Heating, Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration has continuously serviced our coolers, freezers and culinary and kitchen cooking equipment.

Students in the House and Mill Carpentry shop have built the house cabinets as well as hundreds of student and school projects. Also, many of the projects were for the district communities' public schools, police and fire departments, and non-profit organizations such as Junior Achievement, and a TV production stage used for airing on cable TV, Channel 13.

Our Housebuilding Program was singled out in early February as being worthy of recognition by the United State Department of Education. Diman held its eighteenth Open House for the new home built by the construction-cluster of shops at 289 Blossom Hill Road in Fall River, and approximately 200 people viewed the work of our students. This 34' x 48' colonial home has approximately 1,700 square feet of living area with an attached two-stall garage. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cote were extremely pleased with the final results and all the efforts expended by Diman personnel, particularly Mr. Gerald Barboza, outside coordinator. Student guides during this Open House were VICA members Amanda Curry, Tiffany Gillet, Tina Lopes, and Richard Belanger.

Everett Medeiros, Machine Shop, was a state VICA gold medalist. In addition, this shop has been extremely active with various community projects. Scott Oliveira and Bill Bosse received an award for outstanding projects in our annual Trade Fair. It was also announced that Diman's Edwardo Melo was nominated to be a contestant in the 1990-91 Machine Shop International Trials to be held in September. Ed was chosen for his 1989 perfect score in milling, inspection, and CNC scores during VICA United States Skill Olympics last year. He attained second place in the final trials held in Chicago.

The Metal Fabrication and Welding program built a school trailer and this project received the outstanding shop project for Open House. Three students took part in the state VICA competition. A gold medal was won by David Croteau in metal fabrication.

The Painting and Decorating Shop has been called on daily to keep up the appearance of the school's doors, walls, and classrooms. They also played a major role in the completion of our annual housebuilding project. They did the wallpapering, painting, and staining of all wood. As usual, their work was top notch.

Our Plumbing Shop was also instrumental in our housebuilding project. Their hands-on installation of all fixtures provided excellent training for their future careers.

Diman's Job Skills Demonstration was conducted and the winners were: 1st place - Nicole Rogers, 2nd place - Meredith Magill, and 3rd place - Kevin Raposa. The local winners competed in the VICA District Competition held at Tri-County Regional. Diman students dominated the district competition with forty-six students participating in this activity. Winners were: Auto Body-Richard Gagne, gold, and David Pacheco, silver; Automotive Service Technology-Luis Medeiros, silver, and Gerard Magnifico, bronze; Baking-Jennifer Santos, trophy; Cabinetmaking and Millwork-Eric Resendes, gold, Gregory Cabral, bronze, and Richard Belanger, trophy; Carpentry-Louis Medeiros, silver, Kris Resendes, trophy; Metal Fabrication David Croteau, gold; Painting L Decorat-ing-Nicole Rogers, bronze; Precision Machining-William Bosse, gold, and Everett Medeiros, trophy; Residential Plumbing-Michael McCarthy, silver; Residential Wiring-Edward Levesque, bronze; Welding-Antone Estrella, silver, and Jeff Duclos, gold; and State Officer-Karoleigh Jackson, trophy.

Mayor Carlton M. Viveiros proclaimed the week of March 11 through 17 as Vocational Education Week. The week's activities gave students a chance to show the public what they know and what they can do in a variety of fields. Participation in VICA and other special programs supplements the practical and technical training our students receive in school by giving them practice in decision making, organization, and cooperation to meet a goal. During this week our annual Trade Fair and Open House was held and attended by more than 2,000 visitors.

At a banquet in Worcester, Edward Levesque of Diman was named the Outstanding Vocational Student for the state of Massachusetts. With 50 area schools being represented Ed was the essence of 'Diman Pride' as he attained the outstanding vocational student award from a field of over 10,000 students. He received a trophy, plaque, and a check for \$1,000. Ed's instructors in the electrical program at Diman were Mr. Armand Duquette, Mr. Rene Martel and Mr. Daniel Pacheco.

Fifty Diman students participated in the 16th Annual State Skill Olympics and Leadership Conference. Thirty-five Massachusetts vocational schools were involved. Diman entered twenty-four events out of the possible fifty that were available. In these (24) events Diman received a total of 33 medals, 16 of these were gold, 7 silver and 10 bronze. The following students were recipients of the medals: Gold - Richard Belanger, cabinetmaking & millwork; Peter Hardro, computer-aided drafting; David Croteau, metal fabri-cation; Everett Medeiros, precision machining; William Zurawski, technical math; Drey Andrade, Edward Levesque, Jason Lebeau, Meredith Magill, William Nelson, Peter Hardro, Jennifer Santos, and William Zurawski, club business procedure; Kevin Raposa, job skill demonstration (traditional); Nicole Rogers, job skill demonstration (non-traditional); and Kenneth Chalk, display. Silver medal recipients were Eric Resendes, cabinetmak-ing & millwork; Amanda Curry, Tiffany Gillet, Tina Lopes, Daphne Martins, and Michelle Santos, health occupations knowledge bowl; and David Coulombe, technical math. Bronze winners were Jodi Fiola, outstanding club national level; David Hickey, safety; Rebecca Banville, Melissa Bouchard, Sandra Bruneau, Trisha Doughty, Jennifer Raposa, Lynn Raposa, and Lynda Santos, opening & closing ceremonies.

The National Skill Olympics was held in Tulsa, Oklahoma from June 25 to June 30. Our state gold medal winners once again showed Diman's quality and pride. Fifty states including Canada and the Virgin Islands competed. Nicole Rogers, from Painting and Decorating, placed 6th and Revin Raposa, from House and Mill, placed 10th in Job Skill Demonstration. Peter Hardro, from Drafting (CAD Machine) placed 5th. Kenneth Chalk,

from Auto Body shop, placed third in Display. Richard Belanger placed 15th in Cabinet-making with a near perfect score in jointery. Everett Medeiros finished 21st in the Machine Shop competition and was offered a job and educational training by Gillett in Boston, Massachusetts.

Diman's Outstanding Vocational Student Awards Banquet was held to recognize the following as their shop's outstanding vocational student: Richard Gagne - Auto Body, David Silva - Auto Mechanics, Michael Martin - Building Maintenance, Susan Costa - Culinary Arts, Peter Hardro - Drafting, Edward Levesque - Electricity, William Zurawski - Electronics, Jacqueline Chace -Graphic Arts, Kris Resendes - House & Mill Carpentry, William Bosse -Machine Shop, Joseph Pirri - Metal Fabrication & Welding, Lori Sardinha -Painting & Decorating, and Christopher Bernier -Plumbing.

Diman nominated Mr. Bernard Skelly, the business manager of Carpenters' Union Local 1305, to receive the 1990 Commonwealth Partnership Award sponsored by the Massachusetts State Council on Vocational Education.

Junior Achievement

During the past year, Mr. Robert Ciosek became involved with the evening program of Junior Achievement along with John P. Harrington and other community and business leaders. Together, they have begun to help high school students apply their talents and skills into the business world by providing them with practical business experience and insights into the complexities of economics.

In April of 1990 the company called PRIDE won the Company of the Year award. Douglas Garcia, the only Diman student involved with this company, was on hand to be recognized at McGovern's Restaurant for his participation.

The Mill Carpentry shop students under the direction of Ronald Silvia are deserving of recognition for adopting Junior Achievement and providing wood items for various JA companies to sell.

The 1989-90 school year was dedicated to improving safety to comply with all city, state and federal regulations such as (OSHA) Occupational Safety and Health Association. Every instructor was given a handbook specifically printed for vocational education. All vocational departments participated in a school safety program which required the students to take a pre-test and post-test based on a presentation of a safety film entitled "The Safety Factor". New safety glasses were purchased for the students. These safety glasses meet or exceed the ANSI Z 87.1 safety performance standards.

All of the vocational programs and their activities are coordinated by Occupational Cluster Supervisor Mr. Robert Ciosek and Occupational Coordinator Mr. Dennis Abow.

POST-SECONDARY PROGRAM

Post-secondary student, Katherine Clifford was awarded the 1989-90 Catherine T. Garrity Scholarship Award through the L.P.N.M.I. Three contracts with Bristol County Training Consortium and one contract with Job Training and Employment were negotiated for post-secondary students' expenses. Thirteen tuition waivers were also processed.

Continued affiliation with the Providence Veterans' Administration Hospital has resulted in five of their employees being trained as L.P.N.s and full tuition paid to Diman. In addition, the V.A. has provided a part-time instructor.

Through the generosity of the Truesdale Clinic, three students were awarded-Pierce Foundation Grants of \$500. They were: Michelle Ponte, Donna Casmira, and Katherine Clifford.

An up-dating of the nursing curriculum has been a major focus of the staff. This material was available for the Chapter 74 evaluation and the Nursing Board of Registration review. All 40 graduates of the 1989-90 class successfully passed their nursing boards.

EVENING SCHOOL

In our effort to serve our adult community we continue to offer programs that are not only educational but provide for a career change. Auto Mechanics, Basic Computers, Electrical Code, Electrical Code Update, Fireman 1st Class, Fireman 2nd Class, Gourmet Cooking, Machine Shop, Plumbing Code, Sheet Metal Appren-tice, Welding, and Woodworking were offered.

Enrollment showed 313 adults participated in our programs.

The 1989-90 school year was highlighted by the following students being recognized for their athletic abilities. GRADUATION

Our graduation ceremonies awarded 229 diplomas to the Class of 1990. Mr. Mark Montigny, Executive Director of the Greater Fall River Chamber of Commerce, was our main speaker.

RETIREMENTS

The following members of the Diman family retired in the 1989-90 school year: Mrs. Lydia Remiesiewicz, reading instructor; Mr. Stanley Dobek, plumbing instructor; and Mr. Edward Silvia, custodian. We thank them for their many years of dedicated service to the district and we wish them well.

GRANTS AND BUDGET

Grants

Diman applied for and received funding for various grants which totaled \$228,420. The Carl Perkins Grant PL 98-524 funded:

- 1) A Culinary Arts Aide -- This person assisted the special needs population.
- 2) A Culinary Arts Counselor -- Special Needs students received career and vocational counseling.
- 3) Remedial Assistance Program -- This program assisted those students who failed the basic skills reading test.
- 4) A Disadvantaged Counselor -- This counselor assisted all students in the Remedial Reading Program.
- 5) Building Maintenance Program -- Two vocational instructors were provided through this program.
- 6) Drafting Improvement Program -- This project provided the latest state-of-the-art CAD systems for our students.

We also received grants for:

- 1) The Remedial Summer Program providing instructional services to students entering grade 9 who were in need of Remedial Math and study skills services.
- 2) The Summer Exploratory Program provided an occupational opportunity for 8th grade students to learn more about vocational education and thus enabled them to have a better understanding of career choices.
- 3) The 94-142 Grant enabled Diman to purchase the services of 1 1/2 teachers. A 1/2 time clerk/typist and instructional supplies were also provided through this program.
- 4) The Educational Consolidation and Improvement Grant purchased Principles of Technology supplies for our new physics program.

Budget

The 1989-90 school budget was approved by the school committee in the amount of \$4,613,981, reflecting a 6.5% increase over the 1988-89 school budget.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HARBORMASTER

The 1990 Boating season pretty much followed the 1989 season in number of vessels registered 1,200 and monies collected (\$27,665) and general activity. Overall less non-commercial violations were issued indicating that the boating public is informed and familiar with Westport Waterways Rules and Regulations.

Around the clock service was provided as much as level funding permitted. The State Boat Ramp saw the addition of 80' of floats in 1990 that were built and installed by Smith Dexter and myself with help from the Highway Department.

The old Harbormaster boat's leaking condition was fixed and in service throughout the summer. It is hoped this vessel will be adapted to help provide vessel pump-out for the 1991 season.

Marine thefts and accidents were minimal and we had no boating fatalities or serious injury reported for the 1990 season.

Ten (10) people were rescued from two (2) over turned boats within a two day period. (6) people in a skiff going from one mooring to another and (4) people capsized off the Town beach in the breakers. A special thanks goes out to Assistant Jonathan Paull who rescued those (4) people under extremely difficult conditions.

One large 40' Schooner was rescued from being aground off the Town beach and thanks go out to Assistant Smith Dexter in that particular episode.

The Housing Authority Board of Commissioners is composed of five members, four of the members are elected, the fifth is named by the Governor of Massachusetts through the Secretary of Communities and Development.

The Board of Commissioners and the Staff are very proud of Greenwood Terrace and want you to know that we will try to carry on in a tradition of excellence as Mr. Tweedie would have done. We currently have a long waiting list of applicants, but unfortunately, not many Westport Residents. We welcome all qualified applicants. Applications can be obtained from Westport Housing Authority Office, 666 State Road, or by calling the Authority at 675-2039 during the hours of 9 a.m. and 1 p.m., Monday through Thursday. If you have any questions regarding Westport Housing Authority or the application process, please call.

Eligibility Requirements

1. 62 years or older and/or physically handicapped.
2. Income not to exceed \$15,736, for one person or \$17,984, for two persons.
3. Assets not to exceed \$15,000.

Greenwood Terrace is a seven-building, 48-unit complex; each unit consists of two rooms and bathroom; one room is a bedroom and the second room is a combination kitchen-living room. The Authority cannot do its job alone. It needs the help of many individuals and agencies to conduct its affairs. We wish to acknowledge all those persons who have contributed to the success of the housing program.

ANNUAL REPORT of the LANDING COMMISSION

Faced with escalating costs for superintending the landings, the Commissioners instituted a new fee-rate for all tenants. The sum of ten cents (.10) per square foot on landing areas involved is now uniformly charged to tenants who assume the one- year leases.

Bids were solicited and received for mowing the vast area on the Head Landing. The present park-like condition of this scenic area is attracting an increasing number of artists, canoeists and picnickers. The Highway Department resurfaced the upper Drift Road exit in front of the Bell School, a great improvement on that part of the landing.

The annual tour of the landings was taken on August 1st and all were found to be in excellent condition. Trash and litter removal was accomplished weekly from Spring to Fall.

All regular monthly meetings were deeply involved with the continuing Head Clean-Up project. At year's end, five proposals were received and studied. One company will be chosen to carry forth an approved Short Term Measure in an effort to reduce the site to a non-priority status. All steps in the clean-up process are mandated by the Massachusetts Contingency Plan (MCP) and regulated closely by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

The Landing Commission voted unanimously to terminate the sale of gasoline on any town landing.

The Open Space Planning Committee, a sub-committee of the Conservation Committee, respectfully submits the following report for the year 1990:

The Open Space Planning Committee continued to work on the Open Space/ Recreation Plan which was begun in January 1989.

During 1990 we accomplished:

- 1) Surveyed over 100 farmers for their thoughts.
- 2) Completed over 60 interviews with town elected officials and commissions and from private organizations and citizens at large concerned with open space and recreation needs of the town.
- 3) Updated information from previous studies such as the Growth Management Plan; added to this information where needed.
- 4) Gathered data and maps to complete the inventory.
- 5) Held over 60 meetings in 1989 and 1990 open to the public.
- 6) The creation of a parcel map of the town based on assessors maps and at a scale 1:500 to be used for long range planning.
- 7) Held two public workshops (June & Nov.) to provide opportunity for all citizens to give their thoughts.
- 8) Obtained comments on the final draft from town boards and organizations.
- 9) Presented the final draft to the Mass. Division of Conservation Services for their approval (Dec. 1990); once accepted, hopefully by March 1991, this plan has to be updated every five years to be valid for state and federal funding.

The Open Space Recreation Plan sent to the state in December is a document to "GUIDE" citizen effort in an area of utmost importance to the towns residents: maintaining the rural and natural character of our town. We are a town of farms, beautiful scenery, of people who live from the water, of small businesses and of homes. Each of these aspects of our town is characterized and strengthened by the superb natural resources to be found within our town borders. The key to our recreational resources also lies with our natural environment. Encouraging growth and change in a manner that protects those resources is the primary goal of this plan.

The five sweeping goals are:

- 1) Protect the working rural landscape of the town. This includes agriculture, aquaculture, and silvi-culture.
- 2) Protect the environment and ecology of Westport for future generations.
- 3) Provide open space areas necessary to maintain the quality of the Town's natural resources.
- 4) Protect the character of Westport's historic villages.
- 5) Meet the recreational needs of our residents now and in the future.

The Westport Open Space Planning Committee is indebted to the Town Officials and the residents who have contributed valuable time and information to this plan. We are also indebted to all of those who have preserved the open space in Westport that we so enjoy today. We hope that we, as Westport citizens, can leave such a legacy to our children.

The Board meets in the Planning Board room at the Town Hall on the first, third and fifth Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m.

During the past year, the Board held 39 meetings. The Board held 15 public hearings, of which 2 were held to consider proposed zoning amendments, 2 were held to consider amendments to the subdivision Rules and Regulations, 1 was held to consider a revision to a subdivision, and the remaining 10 were held to consider proposed subdivisions. Of said 10 subdivisions, 8 were approved, creating a total of 41 lots; 1 subdivision was disapproved; and 1 was withdrawn. The revised subdivision, which consisted of 9 lots, was approved.

Five applications for preliminary subdivisions have been received which were approved, 2 of which evolved into definitive plans and are included hereinabove, and the remaining 3 which created 41 lots have not resulted in definitive plans to date. 3 additional preliminary plans were approved which were a carry-over from 1989, 2 of which evolved into definitive plans and are included hereinabove, and 1 creating 2 lots has not resulted in a definitive plan to date. The Board has received 1 request for a rescission of an approved subdivision which is being processed as of this date.

The Board received 28 plans for division of land where subdivision approval was not required, which plans created a total of 48 new lots. Of the 28 plans, 4 were revisions to existing lots, 5 were for purposes of annexing parcels to adjoining land, and 3 were perimeter surveys. Edmund Medeiros was appointed as Planning Board delegate to Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) for the year. Daniel George was appointed as the Selectmen's delegate to SRPEDD. C. Lee Hopkins was appointed to serve on the Solid Waste Committee. Katharine H. Preston was appointed to the Fair Housing Committee, Historical Commission and to the Zoning Core Committee. Joseph R. J. Castonguay was appointed as the Board's delegate to the Open Space Committee with Daniel George appointed as an alternate.

The Planning Board has been working on revisions to its Subdivision Rules and Regulations and is in the process of instituting review fees and further revisions to the Rules and Regulations.

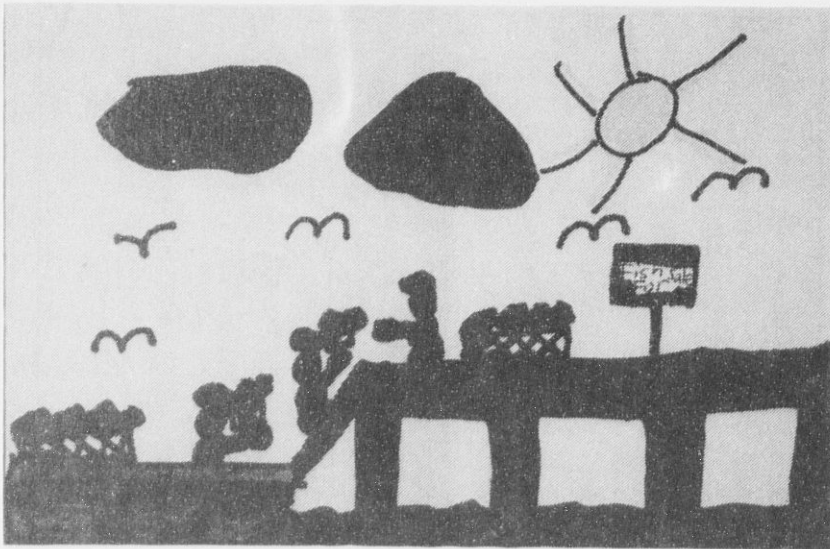

SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

The 1990 shellfishing season was very successful. With the rearing of over 1.2 million quahog seed, positive results were noted by a combination of consistent care in maintaining the rearing (growing) trays to the rich and the abundant food source naturally provided by the river. The seed after fully developing in the fall, were broadcast throughout the estuary.

Our seed scallop program will experiment with a new plan designed to develop the scallop to full maturity while in the seed trays. We received over 200 thousand seed and hopefully it will provide a spat to propagate the river. The new method will utilize specially designed trays to hold the seed, which will be suspended from the Route 88 Fountain Bridge. The trays will be below water at all times and should keep predation loss to a minimum. This department hopes to add to the number of seed to increase the odds of success.

This year, with the approval of the Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF), hundreds of bushels of oysters were relocated from the Hix Bridge area to cleaner waters south of Gunning Island. Some of last years relocated oysters were harvested this fall. We are presently relocating more oysters to provide a source for harvesting in the 1991 fall season.

The Shellfish Department (SD) completed the federally mandated sanitary surveys with support and assistance from DMF. The East Branch was completed on schedule and the West Branch will be completed shortly.

The SD is working with the Pollution Control Advisory Committee (PCAC) and Selectmen's office in order to implement a pollution source program. This program when implemented, will divert storm water run-off into a holding area where the water will filter itself before entering the river. This is a very positive element in turning pollution from storm water run-off. Storm run-off has long been considered as the highest source of river pollution.

New regulations should be implemented to track septic pumping, installing fencing and constructing burms in order to keep surface run-off from entering the river and streams. Boat waste and pump-out facilities will be instituted this coming season. The town received a \$5,000 mini-grant from the Buzzards Bay Action Committee (BBAC) to begin such a program.

The SD is monitoring the waters weekly, to establish the general condition of the river. We hope to see marked improvements after some of these proposed programs are implemented.

Another possible pollution problem addressed, is oil spills. The voters at the Annual Town Meeting earmarked funds for oil spill containment.

The BBAC recently matched those funds and we have begun training people to maintain placement of the special containment booms. We anticipate the involvement of area marinas to enhance speedy containment if required.

Our rain data collection program is still underway. The data is monitored daily and recorded for the DMF (monthly) as well as for the SD. We would like to express

appreciation to Fire Department personnel for their assistance in tracking and reporting this valuable data.

Thanks to the Highway Department for many services provided, and the Police Department and their personnel for assisting us throughout the year. Shellfish violations increased this year, and their help in court was much appreciated.

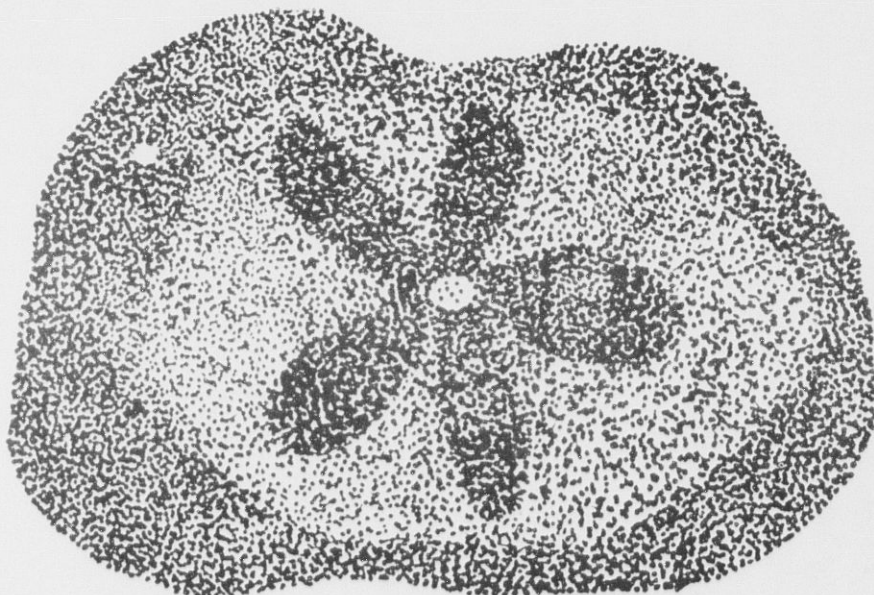

The Solid Waste Committee respectfully submits the following report for the year ending 1990.

It has been a busy seven months for the Solid Waste Committee. The Town now has a Recycling Center at the landfill, recyclables are; newspaper (which a few farmers are using for bedding for their animals), aluminum, metal, plastic, glass and corrugated. Except for newspaper, all have been contracted out for removal and the Town is being reimbursed for glass and metal.

On 1 July 90, we hired a Recycling Monitor, John (Jack) Pacheco, a Westport resident who is an invaluable asset. Moreover, since that date there has been a dramatic increase in collections of recyclables thanks to the enthusiastic cooperation of our Westport residents.

The landfill also has a drop-off/pick-up center for usable items and an area for clean lumber (no chemicals) for people to take on days when the monitor is on duty, which are; Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

On Saturday, October 20, 1990, the committee along with Town Officials, our State Representative and Senator, and many Townspeople contributed to the success of the Grand Opening of the Recycling Center . At the Grand Opening a plaque was given dedicating the Recycling Center to the late Ronald A. Desrosiers and Anne Barnes, both having worked very hard for the Solid Waste Committee.

The committee is working toward the collection of tires and oil for recycling and hope to have that project accomplished in the near future.

All of the recycling efforts are helping save the life span of the landfill and other alternatives are being considered. We will continue to work with the Board of Health toward the objective of keeping our environment safe and clean.

ANNUAL REPORT of the SRPEDD

Report to the Town of Westport from the Commissioners of the Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District.

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Westport in 1990. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts dealing with issues being faced by each city and town in the region. The year 1990 was a difficult one for SRPEDD and for all of southeastern Massachusetts. The economy went into decline and all levels of government had to cut back, reducing the services they could provide. At SRPEDD we found more demand than ever for the regional approach to individual city and town problems. And we found more support for certain state government functions to be decentralized to the regional level.

In the past year, representatives of Westport serving on the SRPEDD Commission were Dan George representing the Board of Selectmen, and Edmund Medeiros for the Planning Board. The Town's representative on the Joint Transportation Planning Group was Russell Hart, Paul Pereira, and Sally Adams as alternate.

Some of the district's more significant accomplishments in 1990 were:

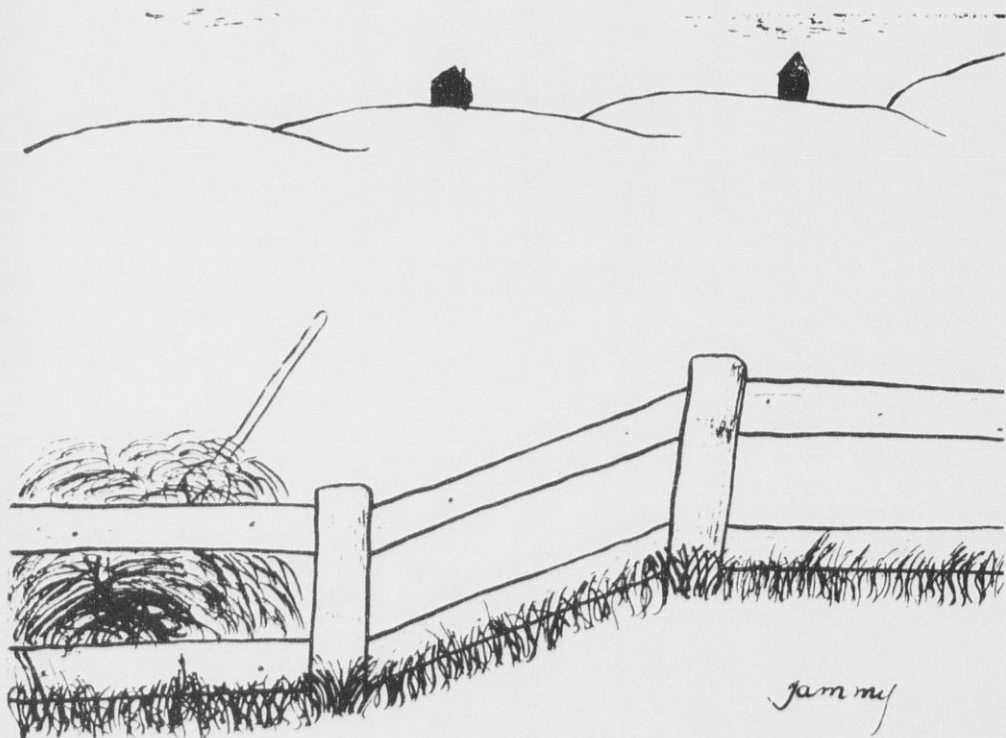
- * Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- * Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1990, SEED approved loans to 7 small businesses in the amount of \$1.3 million. These loans are projected to create 130 jobs and will result in the investment of over \$5 million from private sources.
- * SRPEDD continued to provide the planning services for the two regional transit authorities, GATRA and SRTA.
- * SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 43 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- * Nine applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- * SRPEDD conducted a district-wide traffic counting program and maintained a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 through 1990 throughout the region.
- * SRPEDD conducted workshops for local boards on Title V regulations (Health) and revolving accounts for review fees (Planning and others).

* SRPEDD worked throughout 1990 to expedite completion of the Old Colony Line, which will provide MBTA service into the region with a terminus in Lakeville. A 1992 completion date is projected.

* A regional industrial land plan was begun in 1990. The plan will determine if more land for industrial development is needed to meet future growth.

* SRPEDD has worked with Boards of Health, Wastewater Treatment Plant operators and septage haulers to assess the needs for appropriate septage management strategies for the Buzzards Bay area.

We look forward to serving you in 1991.

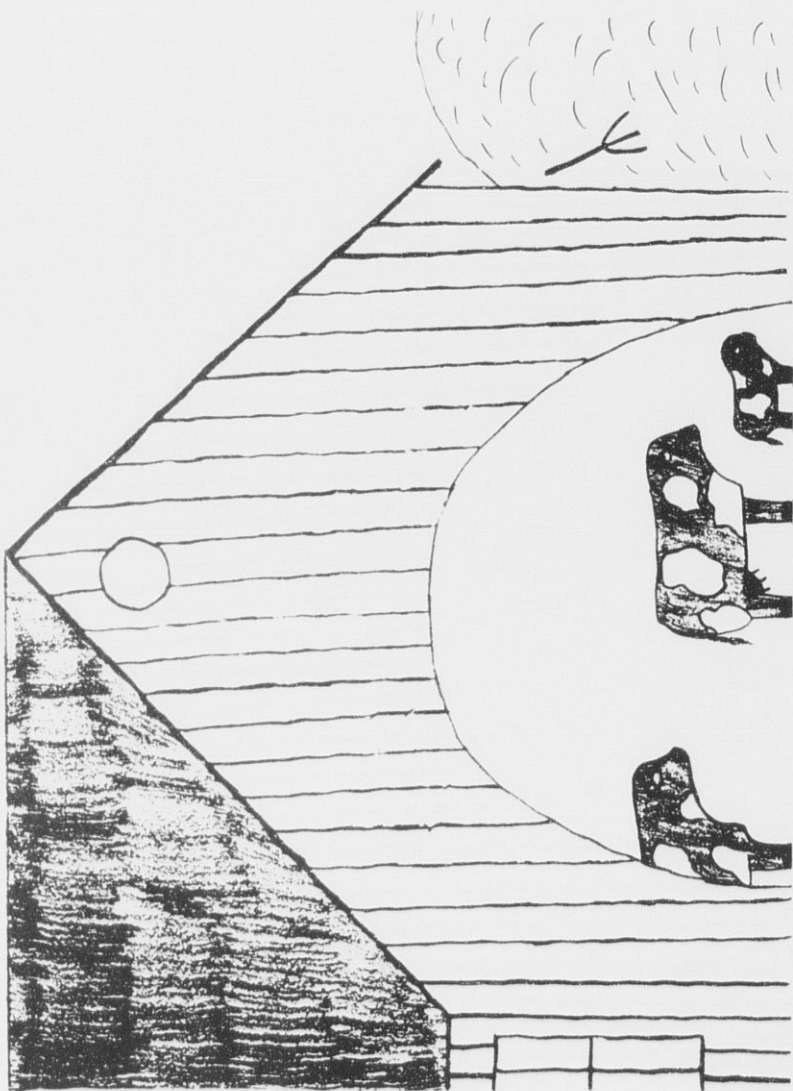

As with every other town department, a major concern this past year was the budget. The possibility of even further cuts was very real, so it was with some relief that we were able to maintain a budget level with 1989. Even with level funding, further cuts in service were necessary. Wednesday evening closings, instituted last year, remained and closing on Saturdays in July and August was reluctantly adopted. Other minor cuts in the budget were made that had no direct effect on our service to patrons. Even with the lesser hours the total book circulation for 1990 was 69,022 compared to 63,445 volumes for 1989.

1990 could be known as the year of new roofs in Westport including, we are pleased to report, the roof on the library. A new heating and ventilating system (HVAC) was installed as well. The old unit, which had sat on the roof, was removed and the new unit was put in place on the ground behind the library. I am not so pleased to report that, in spite of protective chain link fencing completely surrounding the unit, vandalism of fairly severe proportion has already occurred along with damage to the plumbing vent pipes. The total extent of the damage has not yet been determined, but we are sure that repairs will be at least several thousands of dollars. Fortunately the unit is working, but one toilet has been put out of service and is unusable until repairs are completed.

(Parents -- Do you know where your children are and what they are doing when they are not at home?)

On a brighter note, we have successfully completed a full year with our automated circulation system. The public access terminals are now operative and in constant use. Even some of us old-timers who have never dared touch a computer have been known to use these terminals in search of books--and have even found what we were looking for! The savings in time and labor with these instruments is truly remarkable.

Children's programs continue to be one of our greatest assets. There were pre-school storytimes for ages 3-5 and a summer reading club for ages 3-12. 25 children from 3-5 participated and received certificates in the Read-To-Me-Club while 75 children from ages 6-12 received certificates for reading 5 or more books during the summer months. Congratulations to all of them. They have started a habit which will give them a lifetime of

pleasure. In August a puppet show based on the theme of the summer reading was held and extremely well attended by 80 children and 30 adults. After school programs were held in the fall with stories and crafts shared around the theme of Halloween, Children's Book Week and Christmas. A highlight of the year was a program presented by Molly Bang, an author and illustrator of children's books. A total of 75 children and adults thoroughly enjoyed her talk in which she showed them how everyone has artistic ability and each is an artist in his own way.

Our children's librarian continued her outreach into the community by visiting classes at the elementary school, explaining to the children how the automated interlibrary system works. At the same time library cards were updated with the new identifying barcodes.

The Friends of the Library sponsored programs which included the already mentioned puppet show and author, Molly Bang, as well as a most informative talk by Henry Callan who shared his knowledge of antiques with us. There was also a talk by Elizabeth Roberts on the animals of Africa and at the annual meeting Dr. Alan Poole of the Manomet Bird Observatory spoke on Belize: Conservation Problems in a Developing Country.

The Friends annual book sale was in November and as usual was successful in raising a substantial amount of money. With this and other money obtained from dues and donations the Friends have purchased both adult and children's books, as well as children's records and the always popular cassette/books.

Realizing that the body as well as the mind must be fed, the Friends were ever generous in providing refreshments for programs and special events. This year the annual summer reading party was given in memory of Edythe Pelletier, a founding member and tireless worker for the Friends. Also dedicated to Edythe was an anthology of poems selected from submissions to and poems read at the 5th annual poetry reading. This was a fitting tribute to a truly gracious lady who is very much missed by all who knew her and worked with her.

Many people and groups have contributed in their own way to the smooth operation or enjoyment of our library. We give special thanks to them, some of whom include:

Lynn Carter, for the loan of Geochron—a global time indicator—and an absolutely fascinating instrument.

The Zoning Core Committee met often during the early months of the year prior to the Annual Town Meeting. The committee placed eleven zoning articles on the 1990 Annual Town Meeting warrant. Of those eleven articles, the committee moved to pass over three of the articles. The remaining seven articles passed. Those articles created a new zoning format, changed several sections along Route 6 from "unrestricted" to "business", changed the zoning district "residence" to "Residence/Agriculture", and created an accessory apartment provision.

Since the Town Meeting the committee has met only a few times but subcommittees currently are working actively on Shoreland Zoning, Affordable Housing/Multi-family housing, and an Open Space Conservation and Residential (OSCAR) alternative development provision. Three other subcommittees are being formed at present: water/aquifer protection, site planning, and the special permitting process. People interested in working on any of the subcommittees should submit their names to the Zoning Core Committee through the Board of Selectmen.

The Zoning Core Committee hopes to be able to present zoning articles at a Town Meeting during the year 1991.

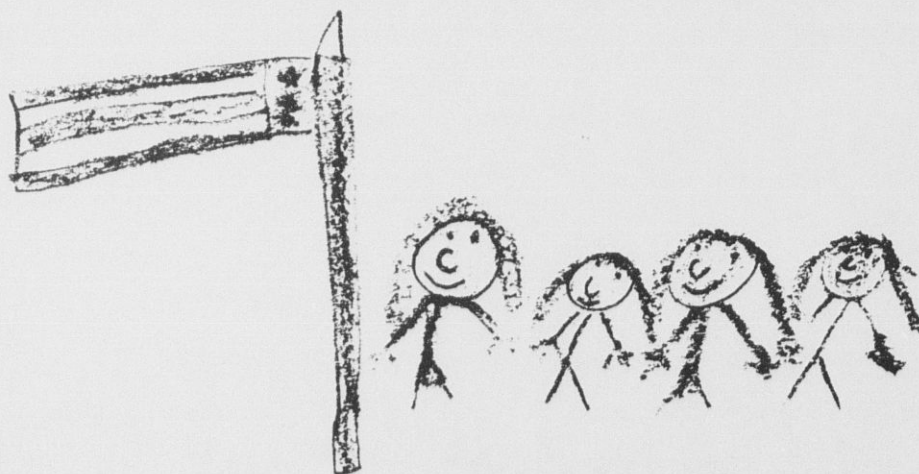

SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETINGS ARE OPEN

The Westport School Committee meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, September through June, unless announced otherwise in the news media. Meetings are held at the Westport Public School Administration Building, 856 Main Road at 7:00 P.M. in the School Committee Room and are open to the public.

ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS

Initial admission of kindergarten and grade one children is based solely on chronological age. Children who will become five years of age before October 1 are eligible for kindergarten in September of that school year. Children who will become six years of age before January 1 are eligible for grade one in September of that school year.

A vaccination certificate for immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, measles and polio must be presented to the school when the student enters for the first time, unless the child is exempted for medical or religious reasons.

A birth certificate must be presented by those pupils whose births were recorded outside of Westport.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

For the year 1990, the Westport Public Schools is probably best summarized by the words "change" and "transition". Following an eight year tenure as Superintendent, Mr. Patrick Soccorso retired. The School Department then lost a most valuable and loyal advocate with the passing of Business Manager Mr. Leon Lakin. The resignations of Dr. Nancy Young, Pupil Personnel Director, after one year, and that of Mr. Robert Smith, Westport Elementary School principal, after five years of dedicated service, also took place before the reopening of school in September. With a new cast of personnel in these positions, it is expected that the coming year will be characterized by new and different leadership styles.

In addition to significant personnel changes, this past year marked the beginning of an intensive project to renovate the deteriorating school buildings through a 2.2 million dollar bond issue which was voted by Town Meeting the previous year. Finally, work has begun on the renovation of the burned out section of the High School a covered walkway, is being constructed, and the original windows and exterior doors at the High have been replaced. The Middle School walkways and windows are also being renovated and new roofing at the High, Middle, and Macomber has been completed. The School Committee architect, Mr. Roger Hoit of Strekalovsky & Hoit from Hingham, Mass. is in the process of submitting plans for substantial heating system repairs at the High, Middle, and Macomber. The community has every reason to take great pride in the fact that these renovations are being done and the schools have made great efforts to improve the general appearance of the buildings as well.

Student achievement in the schools has also seen a dramatic change. The recent MEAP testing program administered by the Commonwealth revealed that grade 4 students in Westport topped their prior performance in these tests and scored at a level well above the surrounding communities. We take great pride in this accomplishment and hope to extend this success to other grade levels.

Staff changes at the schools were substantial this past year due to budgetary restrictions which forced the layoff of a number of teaching personnel. Increases in class sizes and a decrease in elective offerings have been the result of the stiff cutbacks. Additionally, fund-raising events have been sponsored at the Middle and High Schools in order to continue the athletic programs. In spite of the hardships imposed by lowered funding levels, the schools continue to seek to provide quality instruction and programs.

The coming year promises to be an exciting and challenging one. The changes within the school department over the past year will, hopefully, result in a revitalization of our efforts to establish new and stronger linkages with the community, to develop a stronger and more effective instructional program, and to advocate for improved student outcomes.

REPORT OF THE PUPIL PERSONNEL DIRECTOR

During 1990, the Special Needs, Guidance, English as a Second Language, and Health programs were grouped together into a single department administered by the Director of Pupil Personnel Services. This organizational change was planned to provide more coordination of these services provided to Westport students through the school system. The development of a team approach where all student service providers communicate more frequently and work together to solve problems in helping staff members deal effectively with student crisis intervention, program planning, and outreach to other community agencies.

Although the Health Education Program was curtailed at the high school and elementary levels due to deep budget cuts, the Middle School health program continues to offer regular classes to all students at that level. Many of the important health related and substance abuse prevention programs are now being continued and coordinated with Westport Police Department staff under the auspices of the DARE Program which has gained wide community support. The Westport High School Carnegie Grant Program, and the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs Grant Program are also sharing resources to support programs in peer counselling, AIDS education, and substance abuse prevention.

Following the 1989 Compliance Review of Westport's ability to meet state mandated special education requirements, the School Committee made a strong commitment to upgrade and improve special education programs in Westport. By October 1990, a detailed action plan for correcting deficiencies, providing documentation, and developing system-wide policies was submitted to the State Department of Education.

The effort to decentralize the delivery of special education services to each school, begun in 1989, is moving ahead. Counselors, school psychologists, and speech therapists have been reassigned to either elementary, middle, or high school levels, rather than travelling system-wide. The addition of PPS clerks has allowed the schools to begin the lengthy task of reorganizing the required documentation process of special education. This will allow each school to search, refer, assess, and review students utilizing a building-based personnel team.

The current number of special needs students in Westport is 336. As of December, 1990, these students represented 18% of the total public school population. This percentage is slightly higher than that recorded for similar neighboring communities, and reflects a continuing need to provide more educational flexibility within the regular classroom in order to effectively meet the needs of students with diverse abilities.

Out of district placements of Westport students in collaborative and private school programs decreased from 34 in 1988-89 to 20 as of December, 1990. This lower number represents considerable savings in tuition and transportation costs, and signals the return of our special needs students to newly created public school programs designed to meet their needs. Special Language Intervention classes were added in September, 1990 at the Westport Elementary School and at the Middle School. A new Early Childhood Developmental Program at WES is also welcoming and successfully serving a number of students who formerly were placed outside our school system.

Throughout a difficult year with many funding cuts, organizational and staffing changes, faculty members have persevered in their efforts to meet student needs in a highly commendable manner. Westport's professional personnel have continued to demonstrate their competence and dedication by working together to provide the best possible learning environments and student services for all students.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL AND CARNEGIE TEAM

Westport High School was awarded a third year Carnegie Implementation Grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The grant is designed to encourage public school employees to plan and develop innovative organization and management systems at the school building level in order to produce better learning opportunities for students and to empower parents, students, and school professionals. The grant program involves the sharing of decision-making and is coordinated by the Planning and Steering Committee chaired by Dr. Anthony Coelho. Other members of the Steering Committee include: Di-anne Rezendes, Mary Anne McQuillan, Harry Proudfoot, Charles Menard, Edith LaBran, and Anthony Melli. Despite the grant being funded at a substantially lower level this year because of the budget crisis faced by the Commonwealth, the school continued implementing the following programs:

1. The new governance system under the Carnegie Constitution passed a number of bills that were submitted to the School Committee for its approval. Among these was a bill requiring all students to take a 2 1/2 credit computer course starting with the Class of 1994. The Assembly and Senate are currently examining a variety of bills ranging from graduation requirements and an eight-period day to recycling of aluminum and banning parking in front of the building along Main Road..
2. The Carnegie Instruction Committee has established support groups for teachers beginning to use cooperative learning and computer-assisted instruction. Eight to twelve teachers participate regularly in each group.

The committee also sponsored an eight-week computer course last Spring to introduce teachers to advanced computer techniques applicable to class preparation and classroom use. In addition, teachers were given in-service training in Advance Organizer theory, a method of designing lectures that are more easily retained by students.

Finally, three members of the committee presented in-service workshops in cooperative learning to teachers in the other three buildings.

3. The Curriculum Committee instituted the Tech 2+2 program in conjunction with BCC. Because of budget constraints and staff reductions, only the business component of the program was begun.

The Committee also organized two Interdisciplinary Day programs at the school. For these two days, all subject areas were organized to teach a one day unit on a specific subject emphasizing the connections between disciplines. The first, on Earth Day, drew considerable attention from outside media and portions of the program were shown on local cable television. The second, in December, concentrated on two heroes—Ben Franklin and Sir Isaac Newton—and their contributions to a variety of areas of knowledge.

The Curriculum Committee has also sponsored a thorough review and revision of the Math and English Curricula this year. The English Department has begun to pilot implementation of major changes in the way literature and writing are taught with an eye to improving the linkages between courses and improving students critical thinking abilities. The Math department has also begun to expand the curriculum for non-college prep students to expose those students to algebraic concepts in addition to basic math skills.

The Committee has also begun to explore the possibility of introducing heterogeneous grouping at the high school level. During the summer, a group of teachers met to consider a model for teaching heterogeneous groups of students. This fall, a different group was sent to Pioneer Valley Regional High School which has implemented a fully heterogeneous system over the past ten years with considerable success. All members of the group - even those who were initially opposed to the concept - came away impressed with what they had seen there. Further visits to Pioneer Valley are planned and a group of teachers from the school will be invited to talk to teachers at the High School in the spring of 1991. However, the Committee wants to emphasize that no decision will be made on a change of this magnitude without input from parents, teachers, and students as well as the community at large.

The Committee is also investigating a number of other issues ranging from the term paper to the possibility of requiring all students to take a shop course before graduating.

4. The Interdisciplinary Independent Study (IIS) Program entered its second year under the sponsorship of the Curriculum Committee. Through IIS students earn credits for projects which directly benefit the school and the community. Students have undertaken a variety of projects ranging from teaching science and social studies at the Westport Elementary School, and giving music lessons at the Middle School to producing a weekly news program for local cable television that focusses on the Westport School System.

5. The School Committee, at the urging of the student activities directors has granted permission for a "Latch Key" Program to be established at the High School. This program will provide a safe, creative, and nurturing environment for Westport children enrolled in Grades K-5. High School students who have an interest in child care services, under the direction of a certified child care specialist, will help younger students grow in a positive and supportive atmosphere.

6. The Carnegie program has established a Community Service Committee. That committee has begun to explore a number of ways in which high school students can become involved in service to the community while learning valuable life skills. The committee is investigating the possibility of setting up a Day Care Center at the High School. Meetings are scheduled with state officials and Mr. Viera of Fisher Junior College for January of 1991.

The committee has also begun to explore the possibility of creating a Big Brother/Big Sister Program with the cooperation of the Big Brother/Big Sister Association of New Bedford. The program would involve Westport High School students with students at both the Macomber and Westport Elementary Schools through a Read-to-Me program.

7. The Director of Student Activities has been involved in a variety of projects under the auspices of the Carnegie Program. Last year we ran our second annual Career Day Program at the High School. The Peer Counselling group participated in an AIDS workshop this fall.

8. Last spring students at the High School aided in bringing the Kid Pix Identification Program to students at the Middle School and both elementary schools. The program was sponsored by Polaroid, our business partner under the Carnegie Program.

9. Last spring Westport High School hosted a conference for all the other Carnegie Schools featuring Roland Barth from Harvard University who did a day long workshop on restructuring.

10. The Carnegie Newsletter, an informative monthly publication about Westport High School that includes a calendar of upcoming events and activities has continued this year. The newsletter is disseminated throughout the Massachusetts educational community as well as being mailed to the homes of all Westport students grades 7-12.

Finally, last spring, Westport High School worked out the terms of an agreement with Southeastern Massachusetts University under which the High School has become a Professional Development School. This marriage has created a cooperative venture between SMU and WHS designed to improve professional development opportunities for both new and experienced teachers. In the first step of this program, students from SMU are being trained at the high School in teaching methodology and practices. Students are currently observing classes and taking part in occasional seminars provided by Westport teachers.

Westport High Mathematics students, under Advisor, John Izzi, did extremely well in the New England Math League last year. The league consists of 250 teams. Westport finished first for the year in the Bristol County Division.

The Journalism program at the High School continues to grow and improve. This year 40 students are involved in producing one of the best newspapers in the Commonwealth. The Villager runs 12-16 pages and is produced every three weeks by the students of Westport High School. Last year the paper received awards from the Massachusetts Newspaper in Education Council for both news writing (first) and editorial writing (third). The Villager received overall first place rankings from both the Columbia Scholastic and American Scholastic Press Associations.

Last spring, the Drama Club produced "The Art of Dining", a two act play that was well received by all in attendance.

The DARE, SADD, and Peer Counselling Programs continued at the High School with a number of students making regular trips to other schools in the system to make presentations to younger students.

Staff reductions cut four positions from the faculty. Math and Foreign language each lost one position. In addition, the health position and the school adjustment counselor positions were cut. Math teacher, John Izzi, was transferred to the Science Department to replace Betsey MacDonald who has taken a one-year leave of absence. Adjustment Counselor, Robert McMullen was transferred to the Middle School and Health teacher, Joan Albanese and French teacher, Ann Kamm, retired. Their positions were not filled. Lorraine Brown was transferred to the Middle School after the Guidance Secretary position was cut. That position was reinstated and is now filled by Natalia Silva.

WESTPORT MIDDLE SCHOOL

Westport Middle School students have experienced a most successful and productive school year in spite of the limitations brought about by reductions in staff, supplies and services. Specific areas affected by the loss of funds include one teacher of remedial reading and two grade 6 teaching positions. In addition, the Lloyd Center Environmental Program which provided the excellent Farms to Fish Program for all students and our sports program were also cut from the budget.

A major fundraising effort which included participation by the student body, faculty members and administrators, as well as, the support of many community members produced the one-time funds needed to sponsor a modified sports program. However, it must be noted this method could not serve as a source of funding for our program on a long term basis.

The Lions' Club members continue to be most generous in their support of Quest, a Drug use prevention program, which is a major component of our health curriculum. Also, many students in grade 8 were introduced to the Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program (D.A.R.E.) under the direction of Detective Mario Lewis. Finally, George Cumby, a former Green Bay Packers was the guest speaker at a special assembly for grades 7 and 8 students which focused on drug and alcohol abuse.

The Drama Club presented a highly acclaimed production of the "Wizard of Oz" and will perform "Babes in Toyland" in January. Jennifer Rezendes, Westport Middle School Spelling Bee Champion, competed in the Standard Times Regional Spelling Bee in a most commendable fashion.

In the Channel 12 "Kids Quiz" competition, the Westport Middle School continues to be undefeated winning once again in their 3rd appearance by defeating champions, Winman Jr. High. A Bus Driver appreciation day was held in an effort to recognize the outstanding work performed by all of them. Selectman Frank Napert visited our school and met with a group of grade 8 students to discuss issues related to town government.

Finally, this administration wishes to recognize the dedication and excellent service provided to our students by the following individuals who have taken positions in area school systems: Anna Marie Cote, Ronald Dumais, Marion DiGiammo, Patricia Rogler, and Janice P. Willimas. New staff members include: Rita L. Anderson, Nancy Gorman, Hazel Lam, Paul Menzies and Robert McMullen.
