

#### BOARD OF SELECTMEN

GREETINGS to the Coastal Agricultural Resource Community of New England!

Once again, 1991 was a busy year in the Selectmen's Office and other departments, as we worked with many positive new and continuing projects, worked through the havoc Hurricane Bob created, and sorted out the effects of diminishing state revenue sharing to the town's financial position.

In March, Thomas Perkins was elected to the seat on the Board. Francois A. Napert, in the third year of his term, was unanimously chosen by the Board to serve as Chair. Romeo A. Fortin continued into his second year as the third member of the Board.

Brad Brightman left the Personnel Board creating a second vacancy on the Board, leaving members Kevin Hill, Tom McCoy, and Ed Towne to greet new members June Labonte and Marjorie Holden.

#### PROJECT UPDATES

#### Water Main Installation

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We are very pleased that 1991 finally brought water service to the residents in the long-contaminated Route Six/Sanford Road area in North Westport. Working with the Massachusetts Executive Office of Communities and Development (EOCD), we were also able to extend the project to bring service along Old Bedford Road between Sanford Road and Route 6. More than twenty-five households and businesses have now been connected to the Fall River city water supply.

We especially wish to thank our Administrative Assistant, the Town's Highway Surveyor and their staffs for the many hours they spent to bring the project to completion.

#### Grant Funds Awarded to Westport

We are especially pleased to announce that the grant application submitted by our Administrative Assistant to the Executive Office of Communities and Development (EOCD) has been selected for award. This means that \$472,800 in federal funding will be coming into town during 1992 for housing rehabilitation and a wide range of social services! More information of availability of these funds to our residents will be forthcoming in 1992.

We can also look forward to working with the EOCD again this next year.

#### Hurricane Bob

The early morning hours on August 19, 1991 found town employees and residents hard at work making preparations for Hurricane Bob, which turned out to ravage Westport more than any storm since 1954. Most homes and businesses were without power and water for many days, and the town remained under a state of emergency until August 28th.

We were pleased to see the town residents come together to work through this emergency, and we wish to extend our special thanks to the employees of the Highway, Police, Fire, Community Schools, Building Inspectors, Civil Defense, Shellfish and Harbor, Nursing, Council on Aging, Veterans' Services, Board of Health, Conservation Commission, Cemetery and Accounting Departments; and to the American Legion, Lees Market, United Video Cablevision, New England Telephone, Eastern Edison, Commonwealth Electric, Red Cross, Massachusetts National Guard Company C, the state Departments of Civil Defense and Public Works; and to Representative Lambert, Senator Norton, and Congressman Frank for their exceptional efforts on the Town's behalf.

#### Army Crops of Engineers

After several years work with the state Division of Waterways and the Army Corps of Engineers, we received the results from the feasibility study for a dredging project at the Westport Harbor entrance. The Corps found the project would not generate enough economic benefit compared to the project cost, and is therefore not eligible for federal funding.

We will continue to work with the Corps, the Division of Waterways, and other agencies on other projects to benefit Westport, including a long-term resolution to erosion along East Beach.

#### **Financial Issues**

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For the fourth straight year, the Town is facing funding shortfalls because of decreases in local aid from the state. With Proposition 2-1/2 limiting property taxes and the state decreasing local aid we will not be able to meet the cost of providing the town services you are accustomed to receiving.

The budget shortfall projected for the July 1, 1992 to June 30, 1993 fiscal year is estimated at over \$1 million. We will place requests to override Propostion 2-½ before you, the voters, this next spring to help us decide the future direction of local services.

We are working with our representatives to the state to resolve the issue of payments in lieu of taxes owed to the town for the property at the Horseneck Beach and Reservation. Nearly \$200,000 owed each year by the state has not been paid, and we are seeking to recover these monies.

#### Employee Health Care

We are pleased to have been able to preserve the level of health insurance benefits for our town employees by joining with fifteen other municipal groups to form the Southeastern Massachusetts Health Group. Through this joint purchase group, we have brought in a new claims administrator and have been able to save hundreds of thousands of dollars in premium costs for Westport employees alone!

On the related issue of workers' compensation, we must continue to work with our employees to control the spiraling costs by providing and encouraging a safe workplace for all town employees.

#### Head of Westport

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The Landing Commissioners, working with the engineering firm Tighe and Bond and our Administrative Assistant, have made great progress toward finalizing the gasoline cleanup at the Head of Westport. Application has been made to the state Department of Environmental Protection for a limited and more carefully defined clean-up process, and we hope they will issue a final approval by the time this report is printed.

#### Non-Discrimination in the Workplace

Our work this past year to develop and implement a nondiscrimination policy and to provide training to supervisors has proven to be very timely indeed. We are committed to upholding this policy to promote affirmative action and non-discrimination in all town departments.

#### **CENTREX Service in Town Offices**

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Town telephone numbers are being changed to a new bank of numbers to allow us to take advantage of the improved service and cost savings of the CENTREX system offered by New England Telephone. The new numbers are listed at the back of this Annual Report — please watch for our advertisement in early 1992 for further information on when these new numbers will be in service!

In closing, we wish to acknowledge and extend our appreciation to all who have offered their time and expertise to the town.

We thank the many citizens who have served on the groups and committees formed to assist in developing policy direction for the town.

Thanks also to the appointed and elected officials who have worked with us this past year, and to the town employees for their continuing dedication and accomplishments.

We are pleased to again present the drawing (see following page) submitted by Courtney Toomey of the Westport Elementary School as a winner in the 1990 Annual Report, we inadvertently attributed her drawing to Steve Pettey also of the Westport Elementary School.


Congratulations again to Courtney for a fine drawing, and thanks and congratulations to Steve for receiving the Citizenship Award for bringing the error to our attention!

### **ARTICLE 37**

#### ARTICLE XXII DOG OFFICER AND RESTRAINT OF DOGS:

Pursuant to Chapter 140 of the Massachusetts General Laws as amended the following by-laws are adopted pertaining to the restraint of dogs:

2201.

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DEFINITIONS - As used in these by-laws the following terms mean:

At Large — Any dog shall be deemed to be at large when he is off the property of his owner and not under control of a competent person.

Dog Fund — The fees, fines, and reimbursements collected in connection with the licensing of dogs and the enforcement of this by-law.

**Dog Officer** — Officer(s) annually appointed by the Selectmen on May first to enforce the laws relating to dogs.

Dog Pound — Any premises designated by the Selectmen of the Town for the purpose of impounding the caring for all animals found running at large in violation of this by-law. Kennel — Any person, group of persons, or corporation engaged in the commercial business of breeding, buying, selling or boarding of dogs.

License Period — The time in between April first and the following March thirty-first, both dates inclusive.

Live stock or Fowls — Animals or fowls kept or propagated by the owner for food or as a means of livelihood; also deer, elk, cottontail rabbits and northern hares, pheasants, quail, partridge and other birds and quadrupeds determined by the department of fisheries, wildlife and environmental law enforcement to be wild and kept by, or under a permit from, said department in proper houses or suitable closed yards. This shall not include dogs, cats and other pets.

**Owner** — Any person, group or persons, or corporation owning, keeping or harboring a dog or dogs.

Restraint — A dog shall be deemed under restraint within the meaning of these by-laws if it is on a leash or other type of permanent physical control or controlled by a competent person and obedient to that person's commands, on or within a vehicle being driven or parked on the streets, or within the property limits of its owner of keeper.

#### 2202. LICENSES

- 2201.1 Any person who at the commencement of the license period, or who during any license period becomes, the owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over which is not duly licensed, shall cause it to be duly registered, numbered, described, and licensed until the end of such license period. In order to own or keep such dog after the beginning of the succeeding license period shall, before the beginning thereof, cause it to be registered, numbered, described, and licensed for such license period. Registration, numbering, description, and licensing shall be with the office of the Town Clerk.
- 2202.2 Kennel Licenses. Every person maintaining a kennel shall have a kennel license providing, however, it does not violate the provisions of the Zoning By-Laws. Kennel licenses under this section shall be issued by the Town Clerk. Such license shall be in lieu of any other license for any dog while kept at such kennel during any portion of the period for which such kennel license is issued. The holder of a license for a kennel shall cause each dog kept therein to wear, while it is at large, a collar or harness of leather or other suitable material, to which shall be securely attached a tag upon which shall appear the number of such kennel license and the year of issue. Such tags shall be furnished to such owner or keeper by the Town Clerk.

2202.3

Kennel Licenses/Tags/Certificates. Every holder of a kennel license, upon delivering an unlicensed dog to a purchaser or to any other person, shall attach to such dog a collar or harness which shall carry a tag marked with the name and address of such kennel licensee, and a number which number shall be properly recorded on the records of such licensee, and shall also furnish to the person to whom the dog is delivered a certificate bearing the same number and a description of the dog. Such certificate shall bear the date of purchase, exchange or gift and, with the tag, shall, for a period of two weeks following such date, be a legal substitute for a license. The purchaser of other recipient of a dog shall, within two weeks of the purchase or receipt of such dog, either return the same to the licensee from whom it was received, together with the collar or harness, tag and certificate, or return to such licensee said tag, and a certificate signed by the Town Clerk certifying that the dog has been licensed in the name of such purchaser or recipient or of some other person. If any such purchaser or recipient fails to comply with the preceding sentence, such licensee shall notify the Town Clerk of the purchase, exchange or gift of such dog and shall furnish to such Town Clerk the date thereof, and the name and address of the purchaser or recipient.

Kennel Licenses/Inspection of Kennels. The Westport Dog 2202.4 Officer, the Assistant Dog Officer, the Police Chief, the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Health, or any police officer authorized by any of said officials may at any time inspect or cause to be inspected any kennel and if, in their or his judgment, the same is not being maintained in a sanitary and humane manner, or if records are not properly kept as required by law, the Westport Dog Officer and the Board of Selectmen shall by order revoke or suspend, and in case of suspension, may reinstate such license. Upon the petition of twenty-five citizens, filed with the Board of Selectmen, setting forth that they are aggrieved, or annoyed to an unreasonable extend, by one or more dogs at a kennel because of the excessive barking or vicious disposition of said dogs or other conditions connected with such kennel constituting a public nuisance, said Board of Selectmen within seven days after the filing of such petition, shall give notice to all parties of interest of a public hearing to be held within fourteen days after the date of such notice. Within seven days after such public hearing, the Board of Selectmen shall make an order either revoking or suspending such kennel license or otherwise regulating said kennel, or dismissing said petition.

### 2203. RABIES

- 2203.1 Rabies, Description on License. Every license issued to the the owner of a dog shall have a description of the symptoms of rabies printed thereon.
- 2203.2 Vaccination of Dogs against Rabies. Whoever is the owner or keeper of a dog six months of age or older shall cause such dog

to be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian. Such owner or keeper shall procure a veterinarian's certificate that such dog has been so vaccinated and setting forth the date of such vaccination and the duration of immunity, or a notarized letter from a veterinarian that a certificate was used, or a metal rabies tag bearing an expiration date indicating that such certification is still in effect in order to obtain a license(s).

### 2204. FEES

The Board of Selectmen, as provided elsewhere in these by-laws, shall from time to time review and set any applicable fees for the registration, numbering, description, and licensing of dogs; for loss due to damages by dogs, and for expenses related to appraisal of such losses. Any fees or fines collected pursuant to this by-law shall be paid into the town treasury, along with any interest accrued.

#### 2205. RESTRAINT

No person owning or harboring a dog shall suffer or allow it to run at large in any of the streets or public places in the Town of Westport or allow it upon the premises of anyone other than the owner or keeper of such dog without the permission of the owner or occupant of such premises. No dog shall be permitted in any street or public place within the Town of Westport unless it is effectively restrained as above defined by a chain or leash not exceeding seven (7) feet.

### 2206. IMPOUNDMENT

Any dog or dogs, found running at large if approachable and can be caught shall be taken up by the Dog Officer and impounded in the shelter designated as the Town Dog Pound, and there confined in a humane manner for a period of the number of days that the State mandates and may thereafter be disposed of on a humane manner if not claimed by their owners. Dogs not claimed by their owners before the expiration of the number of days that the State mandates may be disposed of at the discretion of the dog officer, except as hereinafter provided in the case of certain dogs.

- 2206.1 Immediately upon impounding dogs or other animals, the Dog Officer shall make every possible reasonable effort to identify the owners of such dogs or other animals, so impounded, and shall notify such owners within 48 hours of the conditions whereby they may regain custody of such animals.
- 2206.2 Any dog determined by the Dog Officer to be fierce, dangerous, or vicious shall not be redeemed unless the owner thereof shall agree to confine the dog within a building or secure enclosure that is approved by the Dog Officer.

### 2207. REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED ANIMALS

The owner shall be entitled to resume possession of any impounded dog except as hereinafter provided in the cases of certain dogs or payment of a \$5.00 reclaiming fee to the Town of Westport, and a \$2.00 per day Maintenance Fee for each day or part thereof, of the dog's impoundment, payable to the Pound Keeper.

2208. Any animal impouned under the provisions of these Regulations and not reclaimed by its owner within seven (7) days, may be humanely destroyed by the Dog Officer, or placed in custody of some person deemed to be a responsible and suitable owner, who will agree to comply with the provisions of these Regulations and such other regulations as shall be fixed by the Town of Westport.

### 2209. EMERGENCY TREATMENT

Any registered veterinarian who renders emergency care or treatment to, or disposes of, a dog or cat that is injured on any way, shall receive payment from the owner of such dog or cat, if known, or if not known, from the Town of Westport Dog Fund in an amount not to exceed twenty dollars for such care, treatment or disposal; provided, however, such emergency care, treatment or disposal shall be for the purpose of maintaining life, stabilizing the animal or alleviating suffering until the owner or keeper of such dog or cat is identified or for a period of twenty-four hours, whichever is sooner. Any veterinarian who renders such emergency care or treatment to, or disposes of, such dog or cat shall notify the Westport Dog Officer and, upon notification, such Dog Officer shall assume control of such dog or cat.

#### 2210. KILLING OF CERTAIN DOGS

If the dog deemed to be at large is determined by the Dog Officer to be dangerous, or worrying persons, or worrying animals, or a threat to private property, or is otherwise unapproachable, it will be executed by the Dog Officer or a duly appointed Police Officer.

### 2211. DAMAGE TO LIVE STOCK AND FOWLS

- 2211.1 The Board of Selectmen or their authorized agents thereto authorized in writing, may, after written notice to the owner or keeper, enter upon the premises of the owner or keeper of any dog known to them to have worried or killed live stock or fowls, and then and there kill such dog unless such owner or keeper whose premises are thus entered for the said purpose shall give a bond in the sum of two hundred dollars, with sufficient sureties, approved by the Board of Selectmen, conditioned that the dog shall be restrained for twelve months next ensuing. And if the owner or keeper of the dog declares his intention to give such a bond said Selectmen, Chief of Police or his or their agents, shall allow him seven days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, in which to procure and prepare the same and to present it to them, or to file it with the Westport Town Clerk.
- 2211.2 Whoever suffers loss by the worrying, maiming or killing of his live stock or fowls by dogs, outside the premises of the owners or keepers of such dogs, may, inform the Westport Police Department, who shall be designated by the Board of Selectmen to receive such information, and, if the damage is done in the Town, may notify the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, or if he/she is absent or ill, any one of the Selectmen, who shall proceed to the premises where the

damage was done and determine whether the same was inflicted by dogs, and if so, appraise the amount thereof it it does not exceed fifty dollars. If in the opinion of said police officer, Chairman or Selectman, the amount of said damage exceeds fifty dollars, the damage shall be appraised, on oath, by three persons, of whom one shall be such police officer, Chairman or Selectman, one shall be appointed by the person alleged to be damaged, and the third shall be appointed by the other two. The said appraisers shall consider and include in such damages the labor and time necessarily expended in the finding and collecting of the live stock or fowls injured or separated and the value of those lost or otherwise damaged by dogs. The police officer, Chairman or Selectman shall return a certificate of damages found to the Town Treasurer within ten days after such appraisal is made. The Town Treasurer, within thirty days shall examine all bills for damages, and may upon request of an interested party, summon the appraisers and all parties interested and make such investigation as they may deem proper, and shall issue an order upon the Town Treasurer for such amounts, if any, as they decide to be just and shall notify all interested parties of their decision. The Town Treasurer shall pay all orders drawn upon him in full, for the above purpose, in accordance with the reimbursement schedule as determined by the Board of Selectmen from time to time, and for the expenses of appraisal out of the money in the Dog Fund. All appraisers shall receive from the Dog Fund a sum of money as provided under Section 2204 for every such examination made by them and mileage one way for their necessary travel as provided under Section 2204.

2211.3 No owner of live stock or fowls shall be reimbursed for damages, as provided under Section 2204, inflicted by his own dog or dogs, nor shall he be reimbursed for any damage by any dog if, at the time such damage was inflicted, he was himself the owner or keeper of an unlicensed dog of the age of three months or older. No reimbursement shall be made on account of damages by a dog to deer, elk, cottontail rabbits, northern hares, pheasants, quail, partridge and other live stock or fowls determined by the Department of Fisheries, Wildlife and Environmental Law Enforcement to be wild unless they are kept by, or under permit from, said department, nor unless they shall be kept in proper houses or in suitable enclosed yards. No reimbursement shall be made for damage by a dog to dogs, cats and other pets. Awards shall in no case exceed the fair cash market value of such live stock or fowls.

### 2212. HUNTING DOGS

No leash or physical restraint shall be necessary if a dog is with his owner or keeper when said owner or keeper is hunting, providing that the dog is obedient to that person's commands.

#### 2213. INTERFERENCE

No person shall interfere with, hinder or molest the Dog Officer of this Town in the performance of his duties, or seek to release any animal in the custody of the Dog Officer, except as herein provided.

### 2214. RECORDS

- 2214.1 It shall be the duty of the Dog Officer to keep, or cause to be kept accurate and detailed records of the impoundment and disposition of all animals coming into his custody.
- 2214.2 It shall be the duty of the Dog Officer to keep, or cause to be kept accurate and detailed records of all bite cases reported to him and his investigation of the same.

### 2215. ENFORCEMENT

The provisions of this by-law shall be enforced by the Dog Officer of The Town of Westport and may be enforced by any Police Officer of said Town.

#### 2216. KILLING OF DOGS FOR HUMANE PURPOSES

When, in the judgment of the Dog Officer or any Police Officer, in this Town, an animal should be destroyed for humane reasons, such animal may not be reclaimed, and may be destroyed by the Dog Officer or Police Officer.

### 2217. DOGS ON SCHOOL PROPERTY: COMPLAINTS MADE TO DOG OFFICER

No dogs are allowed in school yards or on school property when school is in session or being used for school activities, whether at large or under restraint, seeing-eye dogs, so-called excepted.

- 2217.1 Notwithstanding the provisions of Sectin 2213., dogs under the control and restraint of any police or law enforcement officer or school authorities may be allowed on school property for offical purposes such as, but not limited to, bomb or drug searches, lectures, animal studies, etc.
- 2218. All complaints made under the provisions of this Section shall be made to the Dog Officer. Complaints may be made orally, provided, however, that such complaint is within forty-eight hours, reduces to writing and shall be signed by the complainant showing his address and telephone number, if any.

### 2219. RIGHT OF ENTRY

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In the discharge of the duties imposed by the By-Laws, the Dog Officer or any Police Officer of this Town shall have the authority at all reasonable times to enter upon any premises, but such authority should not include the right to enter any residence on such premises, to examine a dog or other animal which is allegedly in violation of a provision of these By-Laws. Such Officer shall have the further authority to take possession of any such dog or other animal and remove it from such premises.

2219.1 Dogs on Beach and Recreation Areas: No dogs shall be allowed on Beach and Recreation Areas, owned or under the control of the Town of Westport or any Boards or Commissions thereof, during the six months of May through October inclusive, whether at large or under restraint. Seeing-Eye dogs and dogs owned or under the control of the Police or any Law Enforcement Officer shall be excepted from these provisions.

#### 2220. ABANDONMENT OF DOGS OR OTHER ANIMALS

It shall be unlawful to abandon dogs or other animals within the Town limits.

2221. It shall be unlawful to allow or permit any dog to trespass on private or public property so as to damage or destroy any property or thing of value and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance and any such dog may be impounded by any Police Officer. Whenever it shall be affirmed in writing by three or more persons residing in or regularly employed in the neighborhood that any dog is a habitual nuisance by reason of trespassing, howling, barking or other noise, or damage to property, being vicious or by its actions potentially vicious or in any other manner causing undue annoyance, any Police Officer, if he finds such nuisance to exist, shall serve notice upon the owner or custodian that such nuisance must be abated.

#### 2222. PENALTY

Except as otherwise provided herein, any person convicted of violating any provision of these By-Laws may be punished by the payment of a fine of fifty (\$50.00) dollars to be recovered for the use of the Town and if such violation be continued, each day's violation may constitute a separate offense. The provisions and procedures in Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 140, Section 173A shall be followed and apply to violation of these By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE 38

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To see if the Town will vote to amend the by-law limiting the use of the town owned wharves located at Westport Point to commercial fishing boats owned by town residents, by deleting "owned by town residents," and/or take any other action relative thereto.

#### UNDER ARTICLE XL

#### NOISE POLLUTION CONTROL

#### PREAMBLE

The purpose of this By-Law is to prevent the occurrence of conditions of air pollution from noise where such do not exist and to facilitate the abatement of conditions of air pollution where and when such occur. They are designed to attain, preserve, and conserve the highest possible quality of the ambient air compatible with needs of society.

#### DEFINITIONS

When used in this By-Law the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them below:

AGRICULTURE means those practices involved with the cultivation of soil for purposes of crop production and/or the raising of livestock when such crops are produced primarily for commercial foodstuffs and such livestock are raised primarily for commercial foodstuffs or work purposes.

AIR means atmosphere.

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AIR CONTAMINANT neans any man-made physical phenomenon in the ambient air space and includes, but in not limited to sound.

AIR CONTAMINATION SOURCE means any place at or from which any air contaminant is emitted to the ambient air space.

AIR POLLUTION means the presence in the ambient air space of one or more air containinants or combinations thereof in such concentrations and of such duration as to:

- a. cause a nuisance;
- b. be injurious, or be on the basis of current information, potentially injurious to human or animal life, to vegetation, or to property; or

c. unreasonably interfere with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property or the conduct of business.

AMBIENT AIR SPACE means the unconfined space occupied by the atmosphere above the geographical area of the Town of Westport.

BEST AVAILABLE CONTROL TECHNOLOGY means an emission limitation based on the maximum degree of reduction of any regulated air contaiminant emitted from or which resulted from any regulated facility which the Town, on a case-by-case basis taking into account energy, environmental, and economic impacts and other costs, determines is achievable for such facility through application of production processes and available methods, systems and techniques for control of each such contaiminant. The best available control technology determination shall not allow emissions in excess of any emission standard established under the New Source Performance Standards, National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants or under any other applicable section of these by-laws, and may include a design feature, equipment specification, work practice, operating standard, or combination thereof.

EMISSION means any discharge or release of an air contaminant to the ambient air space.

NOISE means sound of sufficient intensity and/or duration as to cause or contribute to a condition of air pollution.

PERSON means any individual, partnership, association, firm, syndicate, company, trust or corporation.

SOUND means the phenomenon of alternative increases and decreases in the pressure of the atmosphere, caused by radiations having a frequency range of from twenty (20) to twenty thousand (20,000) cycles per second, that elicits a physiologic response by the human sense of hearing.

(1) No person owning, leasing, or controlling a source of sound shall willfully, negligently, or through failure to provide necessary equipment, service, or maintenance or to take necessary precautions cause, suffer, allow, or permit unnecessary emissions from said source of sound that may cause noise.

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(2) The provisions of this By-Law shall pertain to, but shall not limited to, prolonged unattended sounding of burglar alarms, construction and demolition equipment which characteristically emit sound but which may be fitted and accommodated with equipment such as enclosures to suppress sound or may be operated in a manner so as to suppress sound, suppressible and preventable industrial and commercial sources of sound, and other man-made sounds that cause noise.

(3) The provisions of this By-Law shall not apply to sounds emitted during and associated with:

a. parades, public gatherins, or sporting events;

b. emergency police, fire, and ambulance vehicles;

- c. police, fire, and civil and national defense activities;
- d. domestic equipment such as lawn mowers and power saws between the hours of 7 A.M. and 9 P.M.;
- e. Agricultural operations;
- f. public facilities;
- g. motor vehicles;
- h. trucks and/or truck equipment, and/or other equipment regulated by the Environmental Protection Agency, Department of Transportation, or Federal Agency, which are in conflict herewith.
- i. any regulations adopted under any Federal or State Agency which are in conflict herewith.

Fishing Vessels

#### PRESUMPTION:

Between the hours of 9:00 P.M. to 7:00 A.M. any noise which is emitted into the ambient air space above a person's private property exceeding the level of 60 decibels will be presumed to be intrusive and a nuisance and a violation of these standards provided for in this By-Law.

Any noise emitted into the ambient air space that causes sound levels to increase 10 decibels or more above the background noise levels shall be presumed to be intrusive and a nuisance and a violation of these standards provided for in this By-Law.

### PENALTY AND ENFORCEMENT:

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be subject to a penalty of \$50.00 for the first occurrence, \$100.00 for the second occurrence, and \$200.00 for each subsequent occurrence. This By-Law may be enforced through the Non-Criminal Disposition Provisions, the Criminal Procedures for enforcement of By-Laws, through restraining orders and other Court procedures or any combination thereof.

#### INVALIDITY:

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Invalidity of any section or portion of these By-Laws shall not affect the remaining sections or portions thereof.

#### **ARTICLE 40**

- any premises Licensed under the provisions of the Westport By-Laws Article XXVI - Garage and Service Station Regulations
- e) contractors' equipment

#### DEFINITIONS

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Motor Vehicle — shall include motor vehicles as defined by the Massachusetts General Laws and including, but not limited to, automobiles, trucks, recreational vehicles, motor homes, trailers, mobile homes, snowmobiles, motorcycles, trailbikes, minibikes, and other forms of motorized or self-powered vehicles.

#### PERMIT FEE AND TERM

The permit fee for each location shall be Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per year or any portion thereof. All permits issued under these regulations shall expire annually on the 31st day of December. Permits may be issued in November and/or December to be valid for twelve months beginning the next succeeding first day of January.

#### HEARINGS

The original annual permit shall be issued only after written application has been filed with the Board of Selectmen and after the Board of Selectmen hold a public hearing thereon. Notice of the public hearing shall be published by the Board of Selectmen once in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town at least three (3) days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the public hearing. The applicant for such permit shall give written notice to the abutters and owners of the land lying directly across the street from the property on which the permits is applied for, at least three (3) days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) prior to the hearing, by registered mail, certified mail, or other appropriate legal service. The cost of the newspaper notice of the hearing shall be borne by the applicant.

The Notice shall contain the name and address of the applicant, the address of the premises to be licensed, a description of the activity to be licensed, and the time, date and place of the hearing.

#### **TEMPORARY PERMITS**

Temporary permits may be issued by the Board of Selectmen to any person for any reason, without public hearing, for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days.

### RENEWAL PERMITS

Permits may be renewed annually in November and/or December, without formal written application or hearing.

### MOTOR VEHICLE DEALERS

Any person licensed by the Board of Selectmen under the provisions of M.G.L. Chapter 140, Section 57 thru 69, inclusive, may in the sole discretion of the Board of Selectmen be licensed under these regulations without formal application and hearing.

### TRANSFERS OF PERMITS

Whereas the permits issued hereunder are issued to a specific person and location, any change of ownership or change of location will require an application and hearing for an original annual permit.

#### STANDARDS

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The Selectmen shall make their decision on the issuance of any permit hereunder with regard for the promotion of health, safety, convenience, morals, and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town. The applicant must show that the proposed activity is not detrimental to the neighborhood.

In this regard the Selectmen may impose conditions applicable to each individual permit.

### PENALTY AND ENFORCEMENT

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of these By-Laws or of the conditions imposed at the time of issuance of the permit shall be subject to a penalty of fifty (\$50.00) dollars per day. Each day the offense continues shall be considered a separate offense. These By-Laws may be enforced by the Board of Selectmen or any Police Officer through non-criminal disposition, civil mandate action or criminal penalty procedures.

#### INVALIDITY

The invalidity of any Section shall not affect the validity of any other Section of these regulations.

The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1991.

The Westport Arts Council had 10 members: Kurt Wisneski, Chairman; Carmen Maiocco, Corresponding Secretary; Marie Woollam, Treasurer, Sarah Jackson, Beth Easterly, Betsy Ann Borba, Deborah Coolidge, Gladys Riemer, Clara Stewart and Anna Mason.

Sarah Jackson and Kurt Wisneski completed their six-year maximum terms on the Council in 1991. Carmen Maiocco became Chairman in July, 1991, replacing Kurt Wisneski.

The Westport Arts Council distributes funds allocated to the town from the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council. The funds are generated by the state sponsored Megabucks game. The Council supports cultural and educational activities in town.

Area artists, cultural groups and educational institutions submit proposals to the Council. The Council meets, reviews and votes upon each proposal.

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Two funding cycles occurred this year; one beginning January, 1991, and the other beginning July 1, 1991.

For the January, 1991 cycle, 10 projects were funded for a total of \$3,816. Two of the 10 approved projects were PASS activities, a program that funds attendance at cultural performances for students grades K-12. The 10 approved projects for the January, 1991 cycle were: a trip to the Rhode Island School of Design for fifth graders, a musical performance for senior citizens, a slide show


presentation of post card views of Horseneck Beach, a master tape for newly composed music, a theatrical production for 3rd to 5th graders, a music/dance workshop for 3rd and 4th graders, a musical performance at the Westport Historical Society, a presentation of African American music, history and folk tales at the schools, a trip to the Zieterion for students at the Elementary School and a trip to the Zieterion for students at the Macomber School.

For the July, 1991, funding cycle, eight projects were funded for a total of \$3,812; one of the eight projects was a PASS activity. The eight projects approved for the July, 1991 cycle were: materials for a senior citizens watercolor class, a steel band performance at River Day, a trip to the Rhode Island School of Design for students at the Elementary School, a story teller at the library, materials for a local artist (painter), a musical performance at the Historical Society, a song and dance performance at the Elementary School and a trip to the Zieterion for students at the Elementary School.

For the two 1991 funding cycles, the Westport Arts Council funded 18 projects for a total of \$7,628.

In late December, 1991, the Westport Arts Council received notification from the Helen Ellis Trust Fund that the Council had been granted an award of \$15,000 to support artistic and educational activities in Westport. The Council plans to begin accepting applications for funding from the Helen Ellis Trust Fund in early 1992.

The Westport Arts Council encourages applications from individual artists, community groups and educational institutions which will enrich and enliven the cultural life of our town.



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### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

During the calendar year 1991, the Appeals Board held sixteen hearings including a petition that was remanded to the Board for reconsideration.

Of the sixteen petitions heard, there were twelve requests for variances. Three variances were granted with conditions for setbacks; one variance was granted for office or professional use and one variance legalized a lot containing an existing dwelling; five variances were granted for trailers at East Beach (one was for a year-round trailer and most of the requests were due to damage to dwellings from Hurricane Bob); two variance requests were withdrawn.

There were three applications for findings. One finding has been appealed, one finding was for an addition and one finding request was withdrawn.

The Board granted one special permit for a temporary trailer at Tripp's Boat Yard.

All of the Board of Appeals' decisions from the date of its inception in 1957 through 1987 has been entered into the computer. Thanks to Denise Bouchard, this project should be completed within the next two months.

The Board was reorganized with James M. Morton III remaining as Chairman, Joseph L. Keith III as Clerk and Raymond Medeiros as Vice-Chairman.

Permits were issued to residents for keeping 1-4 pigs at no cost.

The Board of Health has the following goals for the year 1992:

1. Reorganize the Board of Health Office:

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- a. Improve efficiency of the office help including office protocol and arrangement.
- b. Restructure or update Board of Health fees including perc test fees.
- 2. Coordinate efforts of the Board of Health with the Department of Marine Fisheries, Shellfish Department and the Conservation Commission to submit data for DMF's data base to be used in forming parameters for conditional openings of the shellfish beds.
- Certify town lab for well water testing with the State. Reinstitute well water testing. Coordinate work of volunteers. Standardize data protocol.
- 4. Pinpoint pollution sources of the Westport River and other water bodies and develop mitigating measures for these sources.
- 5. Study and formulate alternatives to the Westport Landfill in preparation of closure.

Research the feasability of a Betterment Bond to update failing septic systems and underground fuel storage tank removal. Finish placing monitoring wells at the Westport landfill for re-permitting in July, 1992.

- 6. Coordinate efforts with the School Superintendent, nurses, and the community for education in schools regarding health related issues.
- 7. Coordinate efforts of the various environmental advocacy groups to network volunteers for pollution control work.

Identify and apply for various grants for town projects as they relate to the health and welfare of Westport residents.

Work with the Farmer's Association to improve farm management operations as they pertain to health and the environment.

Disseminate educational information on the preventative care and maintenance of septic systems.

Produce a bi-monthly cable T.V. program designed to educate and inform the public on Board of Health projects, health issues, etc.

Provide information on local endemic/epidemic health issues. Educate the community and students on recycling and composting.

- 8. Aid the Westport Harbormaster in design criteria (Memorandum 87-7) for an onshore septic holding tank for boat pumpout.
- 9. Work with the State DPW to use road salt alternatives to reduce sodium contamination of drinking wells along state maintained roads.
- 10. Design and implement plans for the removal of underground storage tanks. (U.S.T.'s.)
- 11. Provide information for health exhibits for public gatherings such as River Day, Westport Agricultural Fair and the Harvest Festival.

Commissioner Stafford Sheehan received \$2,500.00 from the Edythe M. Pelletier Trust and deposited that amount in a six month Certificate of Deposit at the Durfee Attleboro Bank, Fall River (No. 319 4800) at an interest rate of 4.40%. That CD will be reissued on January 9, 1992 with an account balance of \$2,575.61.

Commissioner Sheehan also met with the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Counsel to discuss handling of town trust funds in the future. It was agreed that the Treasurer should be the custodian of all trust funds in the future.

Commissioner Lori Ether has been available to the Library Department to review and take whatever action was needed on requests for expenditures from certain Trust Funds for books to be purchased by the Library Board of Trustees.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1992 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed thirty-two years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The Mosquito Control Projects works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitos.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding — To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitos in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program — To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number — a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitos is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management -A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

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It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis. The water level in most swamps in the county were normal in the spring of this year. Mosquito larvae began to appear in mid-March in some of the smaller breeding sites with larvae counts being about average. Since the 1990 mosquito season had extremely high EE virus levels it was felt that the 1991 season could also be a problem. The Mosquito Control Projects and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health met several times during the spring to work on a strategy to combat any EE threat for the season.

By mid-May adult mosquito populations were high enough to start our Fogging Program. Calls for service were high in some areas but lower than normal in others. As the season progressed, dry weather conditions caused many breeding sites to dry out which significantly lowered the mosquito population. Our mosquito surveillance, light Trapping Program was also showing much lower counts than last year. The virus levels never reached a point of concern as had been anticipated earlier in the season. There were no human cases of EE in the state this year.

The project answered all requests for spraying along with our regular spraying of known infested areas for a total of 2,442.2 sprayed acres.

During the fall and winter months brush was cut from ditches. Our crawler tractor also dug 5,430 feet of drainage ditch.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look forward to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD

During 1991, the Conservation Commission held 45 meetings, conducted 420 site visits, administered 29 violations, processed 13 soil removal permits and performed approximately 300 other administrative actions.

During the year we received notice that man-made ponds which were not created by impoundment were no longer considered to be regulated wetlands, due to a Supreme Judicial Court decision. Governor Weld also appointed a committee to assist the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), in formulating guidelines to define agricultural exemptions to wetland regulations.

The Commission continued its involvement with other Town bodies; Stormwater Management Committee initiated by Selectman Napert to provide local action on curing pollution problems, Open Space Committee, Grapling of Rivers test data with the Westport Fishermen's Association and Shellfish Department, Solid Waste Committee, Local Emergency Committee, Cluster By-law Committee, Fair Housing Committee, Buzzards Bay Action Committee (BBAC). The Commission also participated in W.R.W.A.'s River Day and Wetlands Awareness month, as well as in the activities of the Westport Land Conservation Trust.

The Commission's monthly "Environmental Night" meeting met with limited success due to lack of interest and will be discontinued as of January 1992, to be resurrected if adequate interest is expressed. One worthy outcome was the completion of storage tank procedures, done in cooperation with W.R.W.A. personnel and submitted to the Board of Health for implementation.

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The C.K. Smith Texaco station on Route 177, was declared a high-priority hazardous site by DEP in February and they officially assumed responsibility for its clean-up. The Country Cottage hazardous site on Old County Road was de-rated to a non-priority site in December.

The Commission unsuccessfully applied for grant money to perform manure clean-up measures on one of the local farms. Grant money was approved for publication of Dune protection brochures which will be available during this year's beach season. Work was initiated by the Commission on the Tripp Farm at Pine Hill Road. This work, which was carried out to clean-up manure pollution to the River, was stopped prematurely due to howls of protest raised by various environmentalists. The Commission has decided not to initiate such actions in the future.

We are continuing work in the areas of; Dune and Town Beach Management, pursuing of A.P.R. farm buy outs, providing of periodic reports to the Board of Selectmen, wetlands mapping and pursuit of the State Conservancy maps.

The Commission is in the process of recommending acceptance of land which are being offered for conservation purposes.

In other special actions, the Commission has; updated its Soils By-Law bonding procedures, catalogued the extensive file of information in its office and dealt with approximately 100 emergency permits due to Hurricane "Bob".

Conservation members wish to acknowledge the competent and dedicated work of our Secretary, Mrs. Sharon Martori and our Agent, Mr. John Ciccotelli. We are thank ful for their faithful service on behalf of our Town.

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Social Workers were provided for the Town of Westport by Bristol Elder Services, Inc., the Area Agency on Aging. They were: Karen Boyle and Donna Perry.

The primary function of the C.O.A. is to take care of Westport's elder residents, particularly the frail, ill, homebound and poor. Our objective is to keep these people living at home with support services rather than in nursing homes where the cost, mainly to the taxpayer, is \$35,000 or more a year. We can accomplish this with four outreach workers: three (3) Elder Visitors to check on the physical and emotional well-being of the homebound. We also have a Companion who can offer periods (up to three [3] hours) of respite to "round-the-clock" caretakers of seriously frail elders. Two of these positions are paid for by a grant.

Our general purpose is to identify the needs of the community's elder population and inform them of our resources. The office is the entrance to a wide-ranging network of services: legal, transportation, homemaker, home health aides, psychiatric, financial, guardian, abuse, alcoholism and drug problems, diabetes, hearing and vision impaired, advocacy, adult family care, fuel assistance, weatherization, federal surplus food, crisis intervention, identification cards, job opportunities, Meals-on-Wheels, emergency response units, podiatry clinics and general counseling.

We also offer classes of various types: bridge, knitting, wreath making, exercise, etc. The "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc." is trying to raise funds for a SENIOR COMMUNITY CENTER which is a missing component in Westport's concern for its population. We are the only town in Bristol County which does not have a TOWN-SPONSORED CENTER.

#### Clinics

Only three foot clinics were held in fiscal year 1991 because of changes in the Medicare-Medicaid rules. Dr. Kenneth Brum and Dr. Marshall Taitz were the participating podiatrists. Clara Duquette was the assistant. Every Wednesday morning from 9 A.M. until 12 noon, the Nursing Department offers free blood pressure, urine and blood check-ups to Westport residents 60+ and a cholesterol screening the last Wednesday of the month, by appointment. This program was terminated because of Federal Regulations but has recently been reinstituted. Flu shots are offered every fall.

### Elder Visitors & Companion

The Elder Visitors and Companion made approximately 400 visits to the homebound a month bringing support and friendship as well as books and magazines to 170 elders. Thirty more homebound persons required visits this year than last.

### Federal Food and Surplus Give Away & Seed Program

With the help of Rita Maynard, Maisie Boulds, Dot Kirby, Madeline Manchester, members of the "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", high school students and the Highway Department, 1,308 households and 2,116 low-income persons received federal surplus food products. This represents 140 fewer persons who came to pick up supplies. One of the reasons for the smaller numbers is that there were fewer items offered at some of the deliveries and no cheese was offered. One hundred (100) kits of vegetable seeds were given to aid gardeners increase their food supply.

#### "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc."

"Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", a nonprofit organization, has sponsored several successful fund-raising events; a dinner dance, Cabaret and Fine Arts Festival, Garden Tour and Pancake Breakfast. The "Friends" are planning a long-range program to provide the elders of Westport with a Senior Community Center. Their on-going project is a Westport telephone book which shall be offered free of charge. Nancy Silva is the president. Elizabeth Derbyshire is in charge of the telephone book.

# Grants

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The Council received a formula grant of \$4,470 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs which pays for one of our Elder Visitors and a Companion. We also participated in the Small Cities Grant, requesting a feasibility study for a suitable site for the Westport Senior Community Center, submitted by the Selectmen.

Our Needs Assessment which was supported by a Formula Grant was tabulated and completed in the spring.

### **Emergency Alert Units**

The C.O.A. has six "instant-alert" machines available to lowincome Westport elders in frail health and living alone. They are the gift of the Romero Trust and the "Friends of the W.C.O.A." They will remain the property of the Town.

### Newsletter, "EVERGREEN"

Fourteen hundred (1,400) copies are distributed monthly to area locations. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication and William A. Greeley, Lorman Trueblood and Dorothy Miller for their assistance with the distribution.

## Nutrition Program

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During the year, 6,299 meals were delivered to the homebound by the Fall River Nutrition Program under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, and paid for in part, by the Town of Westport. Last year it represented a decrease of 651 meals with 34 fewer clients. This year there is a further decrease of 1,874 meals and the number of clients served was cut from 60 to 50 with a cap of 30 clients at a time, because of federal cutbacks in the nutrition program which required stricter screening for eligibility.

## In Summary

The total population of Westport has been dropping since 1980 from 13,604 to 13,371 in 1991. However, the elderly population has increased during this period from 2,042 to 2,841 residents over the age of 60. This represents 21% of the population. The number of people over the age of 75 has risen from 482 in 1980 to 952, with 80 people over the age of 90. These are significant figures at a time when the economy is in recession, health care and health insurance costs are extremely high and federal and state funds have been severely reduced in the area of assistance to elders. The burden of caring for these frail elders falls on all of us, families, friends, neighbors. The last, and often, their first, resource is the Council on Aging.

We want to thank the 77 volunteers who helped us this year to carry out our many programs both for the frail and the well elders of Westport.

Each year in the months of August, September and October, the Trustees solicit proposals from town agencies, citizen groups, non-profit organizations, and members of the general public for proposed grants. The Trustees then consider the proposals and award the grants to as many recipients as possible.

Thanks to the tremendous success of the First Annual Harvest Festival and our committees' opportunity to operate a concession booth during the two-day festival, we were able to raise enough funds to cover our expenses, deposit monies into the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund and the Westport Citizens Betterment Fund.

During the year 1991, there was an estimated \$762,150.00 loss due to fire in Westport. This estimate includes all fires with an estimated loss over \$200.00. This total is broken down as follows:

Once again, firefighters donated their off-duty time in conjunction with the teachers at the Elementary and Macomber Schools to present the "Be Fire Safety Smart Like Me" program which was designed by the Fall River Firefighters Memorial Museum. Over 400 children in grades K, 2 and 4 received 12 hours of fire education at their respective levels. An educational method such as this is important to teach children at a young age the difference between good and bad fire. This program has been well received by the parents as well as the children.

As in the past, both the Call Firefighters and Permanent Firefighters Associations have financially supported the Fire Education Program as well as other programs within the community.

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The Call Firefighters also were responsible for purchasing a great deal of equipment for the rescue boat. With the financial restraints that presently exist, this is truly appreciated and I would like to publically acknowledge their efforts.

I would also like to acknowledge the fact that Officers and Firefighters (both paid and call) have volunteered many off-duty hours in various programs run by the Fire Department. The Town could not afford to pay for all of the services which are presently available to the people of Westport without the willingness of many people to donate their time. Many hours are spent behind the scenes to not only make the Fire Department the best in the area, but also provide programs for the public.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FISH COMMISSIONERS

The 1991 activities of the Fish Commissioners were directed toward the following areas:

- 1. The Fish Commissioners in conjunction with Alewives Anonymous Inc. of Rochester, Massachusetts are making plans to relocate spawning herring to the Albert Rosinha Herring Run located at Adamsville Pond. This program has been ongoing for several years with only limited success.
- 2. The overall decline in spawning herring in Westport waters has been observed during the past few years. This situation is not unique to Westport, but the entire New England coast. Although it is impossible to pinpoint the exact cause of this decline, it has been suggested by experts that toxic material in waters along the coast may effect the eggs of spawning herring and many eggs do not reach the hatching stage. The Fish Commissioners tend to lean toward the possibility of over fishing as a reason for their decline and are taking steps towards this area in Westport. An early 1992 meeting with a biologist and president of Alewives Anonymous has been scheduled with the Fish Commissioners to review the present herring runs in Westport for possible reconstruction.
- 3. The Commercial Shell Fishermen in Westport have expressed serious concerns about their future livelihood on the river. During the 1991 year the Westport River has had hugh problems with closings which directly effect their income. It is hoped that this problem will be turned around in 1992 and only drastic action can restore clean waters.

The Westport Fish Commissioners will continue to promote positive and progressive programs to benefit the Westport Fishing Industry and invite any constructive input that will make our activity more meaningful.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HARBORMASTER AND STATE LAUNCH RAMP

The 1991 boating season was pretty much like the 1990 season in number of vessels registered (1,200) and monies collected through boat user fees and revenues from the Route 88 State Launch Ramp.

Service was provided around the clock from mid June through Labor Day weekend with the level funding that was provided. Hurricane Bob on August 19, 1991 interrupted river traffic for twelve days and put a strain on equipment and man hours. The Town lost three (3) of the largest slow/no wake buoys plus six (6) channel markers. On October 1, 1991 on the recommendation of the Finance Committee the expense side of the Harbormaster budget was cut \$3,000 and personnel services cut \$2,000. Needless to say, if this money isn't restored or some other department picks up the bill, the boating public is going to suffer because equipment can't be maintained and operated and 24 hours a day on-call services will not be possible.

In 1991 the old boat (22' Angler) was retrofitted with a 200 gallon tank and pump for boat septage pumping. The boat pump-out program was carried out by the Harbormaster Department and septage waste was picked up free by Ocean Arcs of Marion. This program started off well and can work with the equipment provided through a \$5,000 grant from the Buzzards Bay Project. An additional \$3,000 grant is available for a shore side holding tank if the program is continued in the 1992 season.

As was the case for the last two years, 1991 saw over (90) response calls handled by the Harbormaster Department. These calls all required the use of the Harbormaster Boat and resulted in the rescue of (18) people and many (over 70) tow jobs of disabled vessels or objects. Many boats were dewatered (pumped out) after the three major storms of 1991 using the equipment on the Harbormaster Boat.

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Our harbor faired quite well compared to other area harbors during Hurricane Bob and credit should be given to the Westport Harbor Advisory Committee who over the last five years helped establish new guidelines for moorings and tackle and to F. L. Tripp & Sons for their part in adopting these regulations as well as giving their expertise in the mooring tackle area. With the cooperation of F. L. Tripp & Sons, the W.P.D. and the Harbormaster Department using available equipment and manpower (helicopter and barges) things were back to normal in a short period of time following Hurricane Bob.

The State Boat Ramp sea wall was repaired with a \$3,000 grant from the State Access Board. Also, an area across from the State Launch Ramp was opened up for approximately thirty (30) additional vehicles and trailers with funds (\$10,000) provided by the State Access Board. A special thanks to the Highway Department and Paul Pereira for getting the work done in a timely fashion. Also, thanks go out to Representative Ed. Lambert, Senator Thomas Norton, Charlie Dane, Ann Stempk, Tony Medeiros, Westport Harbor Advisory Committee, Donald Bernier and Jim Britland for expediting and seeing this project to its completion.

A special thanks goes out to Assistant Roger Reed who helped rescue a ten-year-old adrift off of East Beach just before dark and two (2) Hypothermic windsurfers off of Gooseberry Island.

Hopefully, the 1992 boating season will see continued service on a 24 hour-a-day basis from June through Labor Day if monies are made available. Also, it is hoped that the boat septage pumpout program is allowed to be continued with funds from the Municiple Waterways Fund.

Thanks go out to Assistant Roger Reed, Jonathan Paul, Everett Mills and newcomer Sam Tweedy and Ron Berube for a job well done. As usual, a thanks go out to the girls at Town Hall who help make my job easier and the Police, Fire, Shellfish, Highway Department and Harbor Advisory Committee for their on-going support.

The Commission transcribed the *First Book of Records of* the Town of Westport and indexed them by subject and proper names. These were and are available in the Town Clerk's Office.

The Commission continued to seek a fair distribution of the Helen Ellis bequest to the Town by encouraging its non-profit groups to apply for grants from the trustee; several did so with notable results.

# LANDING COMMISSION

The firm of Tighe and Bond of Westfield, Massachusetts was chosen to engineer the Short Term Measure required by D.E.P. to continue addressing the contamination problem on the Head Landing. Of the five considered, this company was most optimistic that the enormous expense of Phase II and Phase III would not fall upon the town if a floating product layer could not be found with additional wells and additional testing. This has proved to be the case thus far.

Removal from the Massachusetts priority list should occur when adjacent house wells are re-tested and basement vapor tests prove negative.

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
The Board has received significant support and direction from Sally Adams and Representative Ed. Lambert in the Head Clean-Up Project.

The following chart reflects the successes of the Legal Department over the last three years.

It should be noted that there were 2 major cases that we successfully defended by the Town involving requests for substantial damages. The other 4 cases successfully defended by the Town were inconsequential or no damages alleged but rather were seeking the issuance of licenses of permits or matters of that nature.

The only case that was not resolved in favor of the Town involved the refusal of the Planning Board to endorse a plan in which the Land Court ruled the plaintiff was entitled to such endorsement. As part of this case damages were alleged and dismissed, however, the damage portion of the case can be reinstituted through filing with the Superior Court. This case was not handled through the Town Counsel's office, however, with the dismissal of the damage portion the net result was that all cases seeking damages against the Town were successfully defended in 1991.

It is worthy of note that in the years that have elapsed since the Legislature adopted the tort claims law eliminating municipal immunity and allowing persons to bring legal action against the Towns, substantial court cases and litigation has evolved. It is further worthy of note that the Town has successfully defended approximately 12 million dollars in claims, paid less than five thousand dollars in claims, and has received over ten thousand dollars for the benefit of the Town.

The number given for holdings is for books alone. The library also has a collection of periodicals, newspapers, records, and some children's cassettes. The circulation is rising steadily, up from 69,022 in 1990.

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There was only one personnel change during the year. The custodian, Albert Audette, retired in September after seven years of service to the library. Mr. Audette was the kind of employee that every department hopes to have working for them. We were indeed fortunate to have him for seven years. Our new custodian, James Peirce, joined the staff in November.

Due to constraints in the budget, we once again had to close the library on Saturdays during the months of July and August. In spite of their own budget crisis, the state was able to find money for the Eastern Massachusetts Regional Library System to purchase 77 fax machines for the public libraries of Eastern Massachusetts. These are used for rapid dissemination of information between libraries, but their primary function is to make the delivery of magazine articles for patrons faster and more efficient. One of these machines has been installed here in Westport.

Our children's programs continue to grow reaching an increasing number of children. There were 61 pre-school storytimes for ages 3-5 with a total of 686 attendees, the after-school programs for ages 6-12 had 232 children enrolled for 7 programs. The same age group had 12 programs for the summer reading club with 373 children participating. The summer reading party was enjoyed by 75 children and 35 adults.

Visits were also made to local schools; 4 to the Westport Country Day, which reached 45 children; 15 classes at the Macomber School and 12 at the Westport Elementary School for a total of 601 children.

During the year there were also 3 special programs for children, two funded by the Friends of the Westport Library and one paid for with a Westport Arts Lottery Grant. These were:

- 1. Len Cabral, Storyteller (lottery grant) 60 children, 60 adults
- 2. David Zucker; Poetry in Motion (FOWL) 70 children, 40 adults
- 3. Jack Gantos, author (FOWL) 110 children, 90 adults

All of the adult programs were sponsored by F.O.W.L. These were:

1. The 6th Annual Poetry Reading

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- 2. Edward Yeomans speaking about his book "Nourishing the Spirit"
- 3. Susan Bush on "Sites and Sights of China"
- 4. Dr. Parveen Shaukat, "Women in Islam"

A total of 152 people attended these 4 programs.

The Friends of the Library held their annual book sale in November and have donated money for books, records, and cassette/ books as well as sponsoring the above-mentioned programs.

The Village Store donated \$103.50 from the sale of "Coastlines" which is a poetry anthology and \$100.00 from the sale of Jack Gantos books sold in connection with his talk. Three new trust funds have been started this year. They are the Hazel and Lillian M. Tripp Westport Free Public Library Fund, the Edythe M. Pelletier Trust, and the Harry R. Hoyt Trust Fund. In this time of increasing budget difficulties, the interest from these trust funds is an extremely important and very welcome addition to the money received from the Town of Westport and the State of Massachusetts. It is interesting to note that these 3 new trusts represent 3 different ways to give money to the library; a bequest in a will, a memorial, and an outright donation from a concerned citizen. We are extremely grateful for all of the above.

The Library has been proud to be a partner in a new venture, "The Literacy Connection". This was established to train volunteers to tutor adults who want to learn to read, as well as to help those with some reading ability increase their skills. Margaret Panos and Lori Dias-Mitchell ran the first training session in February and March. A second training program was held in October and November. It is also hoped that volunteers will be able to work with slow readers in the school system. This group has received help from Albert E. Lees of Lees Supermarket, and S.M.U. (now U. Mass.-Dartmouth). The University has been especially generous with photocopying time.

The project room is still used by various town groups for meetings. A new addition is Representative Edward Lambert who has office hours on Fridays and Saturdays. We are glad to be able to offer this space to him so he can be more readily available to Westport residents.

The Board meets in the Planning Board room at the Town Hall every other Monday at 7:00 P.M.

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During the past year, the Board held 46 meetings. The Board held 9 public hearings, two of which were to consider amendments to the Subdivision Rules & Regulations, 1 was held to rescind a subdivision upon request of applicant, and the remaining 6 were held to consider proposed subdivisions. Of said 6 subdivisions, 4 were approved, creating a total of 41 lots; 1 subdivision was disapproved; and 1 subdivision creating 2 lots is pending as of this date.

## No applications for preliminary subdivisions were received.

The Board received 29 plans for divisions of land where subdivision approval was not required, which plans created a total of 30 new lots. Of the 29 plans, 5 were revisions to existing lots, 6 were for purposes of annexing parcels to adjoining land, and 3 were deemed to require approval under the Subdivision Control Law.

Edmund Medeiros was appointed as Planning Board delegate to Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District (SRPEDD) for the year. Upon Medeiros' resignation, Timothy Gillespie was appointed as delegate to SRPEDD. C. Lee Hopkins was appointed to serve on the Solid Waste Committee, and upon his resignation, Gillespie was so appointed. Kathryn C. B. Duff was appointed to the Historical Commission and the Pollution Advisory Committee, and upon her resignation, Montano was appointed to serve on the Historical Commission. Montano also serves on the Fair Housing Committee.

The Planning Board has revised its Rules and Regulations to provide for professional, technical expertise in reviewing subdivision applications. The cost of the professional engineers and/or conssultants, as needed, will be borne by the developer at no cost to the Town.

I hereby submit my report as Recreation Coordinator, for the year ending December 31, 1991.

The enthusiasm and participation in our Wrestling Program has again been overwhelming. As we enter our sixth year we expect the program could possibly double in size due to it's growing popularity. Offered three times each year, the six-week sessions conclude with an exhibit for the public.

Bicentennial Playground was the setting for our Annual Easter Egg Hunt and eight-week Summer Program. The site has been maintained reasonably well through the efforts of commission members, Highway Department and volunteers from the high school.

Due to circumstances beyond our control surrounding the hiring of qualified instructors, we were unable to offer a Swimming Program this year. However, tennis, wrestling and playground programs showed increased participation and all sessions were successful.

In keeping with the spirit of Westport's First Annual Harvest Festival, the commission sponsored a "Harvest/Halloween" house decorating contest.

In December, in addition to our Annual Santa's Visit to our school children, the Recreation Commission participated in the Christmas celebration at the Town Hall.

Tickets for a local children's television show were made available to our youngsters during the month of December.

An Adopt-A-Bike Program has just begun. Commission members will be collecting used and discarded bicycles during the winter months. The bicycles will be repaired and made available in the spring to any child who needs one.

Currently we are in the planning stages of putting together a Street Hockey Program, a Cosmetology Workshop and a series of Art Classes designed for adults.

Based on the availability of funds, we hope to continue developing new programs and expanding the recreational opportunities for our townspeople. My sincere gratitude to the Selectmen, Finance Committee, Town Hall Staff and the residents of Westport. Your support and assistance throughout the year has been greatly appreciated.

Be it known to all concerned that in accordance with General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapter 98, Section 41, Public Notice is hereby given to all persons having usual places of business and using a weighing and/or measuring devices (for the purpose of buying and selling goods, wares of merchandise) that between January 1 and December 31, 1992 such devices must be checked and sealed at least once. Such inspection and sealing is controlled by the Board of Selectmen and done at the expense of the person owning or using the weighing or measuring device.

#### SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

The Town's Shellfish area this year was hit hard by closures due to high fecal bacteria counts. At the time of this report, Westport has a mere 200 acres open for direct harvest of its shellfish out of nearly 2,800 acres. The Division of Marine Fisheries has a proposal which will open most of the estuary at different times of the year and other portions around rain events. This is not a cure to the problem, it's a temporary fix giving more time with hopes of alleviating the land pollution which finds its way into the waters. This land pollution must be cured or a worst scenario will occur.

As for the ongoing projects that the Shellfish Department is continuing include the 1,000,000 Juvenile Quahog Propagation Program — this project is more beneficial to the town in times such as now. With areas shrinking, the need is real to provide the insertion of more quahogs. It takes from two to five years from the time we release the seed until they are at the legal size limit.

Our Seed Scallop Program, through the efforts of the Westport Fisherman's Association financing, is another endeavor to obtain a viable crop. The Shellfish Department built trays to house approximately 10,000 of the 70,000 3/4 inch stock in efforts to eliminate predation and contain a population in historically predominant scallop areas. We hope to establish a trend that will produce large numbers of scallops. This year's scallop crop was minimal but some seed was seen in a few places. As we are finding, it takes the right combination of elements to produce the scallop crops. Hopefully we are working in the right direction with the Seed Program.

We were able to obtain a permit to transplant oysters from the Hix Bridge area where pollution is overwhelming our resource and move a small amount of oysters to a normally cleaner part of the estuary. This effort will continue.

Hurricane Bob came swiftly and left equally as fast leaving much destruction. The Shellfish Department had damage to the propagation pens housing the 1,000,000 juvenile quahogs and lost part of the seed as a result of the hurricane damage. It may be difficult to recover with the town's financial crunch playing the leading role in determining what gets spent where.

As oil spill coordinator for the town, I was able to procure a grant to be used on equipment that would help contain a spill if it occurred. We have purchased some of the equipment and are in the process of building a trailer that will house it and make the equipment swiftly accessible to any point its needed. This project will be completed as will the training program for the volunteers in the near future.

As a member of the Stormwater Commission, I see many areas of potentially high contamination being worked on. We need to continue the work of cleaning up the problems on land to relieve this fecal burden from our waters. We are continuing our weekly town water sampling program as well as the Division of Marine Fisheries sampling to enable us to more clearly define areas that need more work.

I want to thank all the people and organizations which volunteered both money and physical labor towards these projects. Let's not lose sight of the fact that the river and its resources belong to *all the people*, and everyone loses when it's shutdown.

The Solid Waste Disposal Study Committee has no secretary at this time.

Since our Annual Report of 1990, the SWDSC has had several changes in its membership and accomplished some goals while others are still being worked on.

Mr. Timothy Gillespie replaced Mr. C. Lee Hopkins as the representative from the Planning Board. Mr. Richard Lambert replaced Mr. Claude Ledoux as representative from the Conservation Commission. Mr. Michael Rodrigues was added to the committee as the representative from the Finance Committee replacing Mr. Arthur Schene. Mr. Charles Goldberg was added to the commitreplacing Mr. John Jennings as an alternate member.

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Finally, Mrs. Barbara Lambert resigned as secretary to the committee this year due to time constraints. Mrs. Lambert has donated her time for over a year to the committee and her help will be sorely missed.

The SWDSC saw some successes in the field of recycling this year and some setbacks as well.

In the area of accomplishments, the committee purchased a 40-cu. yard roll-off container to collect and transport corrigated and cardboard. On December 9, our Recycling Monitor went from part-time to full-time (five days). With our Monitor at the landfill every day of operation we hope to soon implement the collection of drain oil and tires. These items represent some of the most difficult to handle and recycle materials for most municipalities, but the committee is confident that collection of both can be achieved expediently.

The Recycling Center this year had to restrict the number of types of plastic that it was able to accept at the Center from three types to basically one. This was due to a weak market for plastics. However, the SWDSC joined with several Town committees and boards in supporting state legislation which would bolster markets for recyclables. The committee also purchased another bin for tin cans and a separate bin for plastic bottles.

A sub-committee consisting of Alvin Norcross and Todd Cormier has been working with neighboring towns and Westport officials to formulate a comprehensive plan for landfill closure and future solid waste disposal in Westport. This study committee will be working closely with our new Director of Public Health.

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Finally, the SWDSC notes the passing of landfill worker, Mr. Manuel Peixe. Mr. Peixe's helpfulness and cheerfulness will be greatly missed.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Westport in 1991. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving Southeastern Massachusetts. The year 1991 was a difficult one for all levels of government. In addition to cutbacks at the state and local levels. Southeastern Massachusetts experienced the worst recession in many years. At SRPEDD we found the demand increasing for regional solutions to state and local problems, but we also encountered fiscal and political obstacles to regional solutions.

In the past year, the Town of Westport was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by Daniel George, Edmund Medeiros and Timothy Gillespie. The JTPG representatives were Paul Pereira, James Morton, Russell Hart and Sally Adams.

Some of the district's more significant accomplishments in 1991 were:

- Completion of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1991, SEED approved loans to 10 small businesses in the amount of \$1.1 million. These loans are projected to create 93 new jobs and will result in the investment of over \$3.1 million from private sources.
- SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 32 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- Seven applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.

- SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available traffic count data for the period 1980 to the present throughout the region.
- A regional industrial land plan was completed in 1991. The plan shows that despite plenty of land in the region zoned for industry, we do not have enough prepared industrial sites available for immediate development.
- SRPEDD sponsored a very successful conference on the topic of "Rethinking Government in the '90's" that offered innovative solutions to many of our problems.
- SRPEDD sponsored two seminars for industry on methods to reduce the output of toxic wastes.
- SRPEDD worked with both GATRA and SRTA on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis.
- Commuter rail was a top concern in this region in 1990-91. SRPEDD has strongly supportd the extension of the Old Colony line to Middleborough/Lakeville, but has raised concerns over the Stoughton line extension to Fall River and New Bedford.
- SRPEDD continues to provide computerized accident filing for eleven towns and has provided pavement management assistance to six towns.
- SRPEDD continues to provide information and technical assistance to business and municipal clients. Scores of developers and businesses receive information from SRPEDD.
- Under contract to Boston Edison, SRPEDD organized the second Earthlab Conference held in Carver in October.
- SRPEDD participates actively with the Buzzards Bay Project in the multi-agency effort to clean up and preserve Buzzards Bay.

We look forward to serving you in 1992.

The Westport Town Farm has had a smooth year. With a tenant change in the fall it is now fully rented with payments received in rents for two apartments and the land. The present tenants have made major improvements to the interior of the house at their own expense and labor.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WHARFINGER

It was with regret and sorrow that the Board of Selectmen accepted the resignation of Richard J. Hart as the Town's Wharfinger. He has devoted many unpaid hours and donated his own material and equipment for repairs to the dock.

During the last six years, Richard has greatly improved the facilities at the Town Dock which accommodates approximately thirty commercial fishing vessels ranging in size to sixty-five feet in length. There are in excess of twelve vessels using the wharf for loading and unloading.

The monies appropriated at the Town Meeting are transferred from the Municipal Waterways Fund and are used for the general operating budget and for repairs and maintenance to the Town Docks such as new railings, replacement beams, and painting.

Dockage fees collected in 1991 totaled \$13,512.00.

In closing, we wish to thank Richard for all he has accomplished, for his unselfish time and effort, and for his cooperation with the general public, town officials and employees.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my great pride in our district school and in our students' activities and accomplishments. I extend a sincere "Thank You" for your continued support of Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School and its students. The following represents a brief summary of the entire annual report that is on file in the Town Clerk's office.

The 1990-91 school year began with one of the highest student enrollments (1,119) Diman has ever experienced. Our average student daily attendance during the 1990-91 school year was over 94.3%.

The Guidance Department was involved in the following scholarships and awards programs. Presidential Academic Fitness Award: David Croteau — Electonics, Tracy Rego — Electronics, Meredith Magill — Health Careers, and Michael J. McCarthy — Plumbing. Representative to Hugh O'Brien Youth Foundation Seminar: Melissa Cookson — Health Careers. Representative to American Legion Boys' State: Joseph Guimond — Electronics.

Representative to American Legion Auxiliary Girls' State: Jenny Ainsworth — Graphic Arts. Fall River Elks Teenagers of the Month 1990-91: Shelby Raposa — Graphic Arts, David Croteau — Electronics, Jennifer Santos — Culinary Arts, Drey Andrade — Machine Shop, Maria Santos — Machine Shop, Mark Costa — Carpentry, Brantley Hunsinger — Drafting, Juliette Pacheco — House & Mill Carpentry, Melissa Bouchard — Health Careers, Scott Reis — Electronics, Adelaide Borges — Culinary Arts, Michael McCarthy — Plumbing, Jodi Fiola — Culinary Arts, and Matthew Ploud — Electronics.

The academic department continues to exemplify the goals and philosophy of Diman. Year long activities are aimed at providing students the opportunity to grow intellectually and become independent thinkers in an increasingly complex society.

Once again, a Diman student, Jessica Hendry won 1st place in the Regional Essay Contest. Matthew Plaud was also a winner in the Voice of Democracy Contest.

David Croteau was recognized as Diman's highest scorer on the 42nd American High School Math Exam.

Under the direction of Roger Ramos, the Science Department conducted its first science fair in February with 241 exhibitors from the 9th, 10th, and 11th grades.

Science fair winners were as follows: Experimental Biological — Christopher Fay, Karen Martin, Matthew Santana; Descriptive Biological — Christine Barrette, Jonathan Terrio, William Travers; Experimental Physical — John Barreira, Steven Benfeito, Christopher Kachanski; and Descriptive Physical — Matthew Bell, John Malloy, and Pedro Teixeira.

The Kiwanis Club of Fall River donated the TRU-VU Geography program to Diman. A geography component will be developed for the Social Studies Department utilizing this important teaching tool.

Key Club members raised approximately \$3,500 in 1990 for the annual Christmas Food Drive for the needy members of our Diman community. Families of students in Fall River, Somerset, Swansea, and Westport were given groceries for a full week.

The Outstanding Athlete of the Year was Mike Souza.

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This year as in past years we have provided numerous services to both individual members of the district as well as the member communities. In addition to service delivery, Diman is continually striving to upgrade our curriculum in an effort to maintain technological progress.

#### Greg Costa placed fourth in Automotive Machine Technology.

David Pacheco placed second and Russell Brillo placed fourth in the VICA auto body competition.

Christopher Rego and other members of the Building Maintenance Mechanics Program pooled their efforts to enter a Safety Scrapbook into the Massachusetts VICA state competition. Christopher received a second place medallion for his entry on safety.

The Culinary Arts Program was honored with a Massachusetts gold medal in Culinary Arts won by Michael Ferreira.

John Camara in the Drafting Program spent a week at a Leadership Conference in Wisconsin, and George Confoey, Drafting Program, was named Diman's Outstanding Vocational Student for 1991.

Our Electrical Department's attention focused on maintaining all the electrical services within our facility along with installing new equipment such as the clothes washer for Culinary Arts.

Pedro Teixeria, a junior from the Electronics Program, won numerous awards from Junior Achievement, first place in the Regional Science Fair, gold medal in the VICA Club Business from Massachusetts and competed in the nationals in Louisville, Kentucky.

Students in Graphic Arts completed nearly 300 shop jobs this past year, many directly associated with school activities.

Diman's Health Careers Program graduated its first class of seniors. Health Careers students were awarded a bronze medallion in VICA competition.

1992 will witness the first graduating class from the HVAC Program.

Diman held its nineteenth Open House on June 9, 1991 in Westport, Massachusetts at 388C Old Bedford Road. On display was 36' x 84' tri-level home built for Mr. & Mrs. Roland W. Lavoie. Student guides during the Open House were Adam Lavoie, Steven Rioux, and John Whitbeck.

Mill carpentry students built and installed a wardrobe and base cabinet units for various classrooms within Diman's new addition. Also, many specialty projects were constructed for the district communities' public schools.

Kevin Sousa from machine shop placed third in the VICA district competition, Eugene Monte received an award for his outstanding project at the annual Trade Fair, and Edwardo Melo placed second in the international trials held in Chicago.

Tom King, from the Metal Fabrication and Welding Program, took a second place medal in welding at the VICA district contest.

Painting and Decorating students completed numerous job requests for art work and refinishing projects for all segments of the school and community.

Michael M. McCarthy III, a 1991 Plumbing Program graduate, was honored on June 20, 1991 by the Massachusetts Associations of Plumbing, Heating and Cooling Contractors. He was recognized for his achievements in winning first place in the local, district and state VICA competitions. In June Michael represented the state at the national competition and was awarded a silver medallion for his efforts and will be given the opportunity to compete in the VICA international competitions in Taiwan, China during 1992-93.

Diman's Outstanding Vocational Student Awards Banquet was held to recognize the following students as their shop's outstanding vocational student: Dennis Roy, Auto Body; Roberto Ferreira, Auto Mechanics; Jason Viveiros, Building Maintenance; Adelaide Borges, Culinary Arts; George Confoey, Drafting; Adam Mandeville, Electricity; Scott Reis, Electronics; Jennifer Goff, Graphic Arts; Meredith Magill, Health Careers; Richard Belanger, House & Mill Carpentry; Timothy Donnelly, Machine Shop. 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The enrollment as of October 1, 1990 for the L.P.N. Program was 50 students with 46 completing the program and graduating in June. All 1989-90 students passed the L.P.N. licensing examination.

In our effort to serve our adult community we continue to offer programs that are not only educational but provide for a career change. A total of 363 adults participated in our evening school for the 1990-91 school year.

#### NO SCHOOL ANNOUNCEMENTS

If there are no "No School" days because of weather conditions or other emergencies, the 1991-1992 school year will end on Friday, June 19, 1992.

It is the policy of the School Department to issue no school bulletins or announcements through radio stations: WSAR, WBSM, WALE, WPRO, WHJJ, WHIM, WNEV, WSVF, WFFD-FM, and TV stations Channel 10 and Channel 6, whenever driving conditions are, or seem likely to be dangerous. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be turned to one of the above stations for the no school announcements. Please depend upon your radio rather than your telephone for obtaining this information as telephone lines have to be kept open. School may be cancelled during school hours due to inclement weather or emergencies. Parents should make provisions accordingly.

Parents must use their own judgment in regards to whether it is suitable for their children to attend school in stormy weather.

#### ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS

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Initial admission of kindergarten and grade one children is based solely on chronological age. Children who will become five years of age before October 1 are eligible for kindergarten in September of that school year. Children who will become six years of age before January 1 are eligible for grade one in September of that school year.

A vaccination certificate for immunization against diptheria, tetanus, pertusis, measles and polio must be presented to the school when the student enters for the first time, unless the child is exempted for medical or religious reasons.

A birth certificate must be presented by those pupils whose births were recorded outside of Westport.

#### WESTPORT COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

This past year has seen significant changes in the School Department. The physical changes are the most obvious. The relocation of the School Administrative offices from the former Earle School to the High School was effected with minimum disruption and will result in a significant cost savings over time. Further savings were effected by consolidating all elementary grades K-1 at the Macomber School and grades 2-5 at the Westport Elementary School.

Both physical moves also represent significant management and educational initiatives. The relocation of the administrative offices has brought school management closer to the source of our efforts. It is hoped that by being in closer proximity to the students, the school administration will be more student-centered and service oriented. The early childhood initiative at the Macomber School marks a significant educational reform in the way the young children of Westport will be educated. Our goal to improve instruction and learning by making school more child-centered is becoming a reality. Mrs. Marylou Clarke joined the administrative staff as principal of the Macomber School and has done much to promote developmentally appropriate practice at that level. She has developed a strong parent involvement program and has formed an ongoing business partnership with Lees Super Market.

The Westport Elementary School has focused on improving teaching and learning especially in the areas of reading and writing. Whole language and reading-writing process techniques have been firmly established. Teachers continue to learn more about effective teaching practices from each other and have developed a peer exchange program to share the best of their teaching strategies with each other.

The Westport Middle School has responded to current research on how to increase student achievement and self-esteem by working to provide more heterogeneously grouped classes. This has been a major change for both staff and students. Most teachers have received training in cooperative learning and Principal John Mello arranged to have as many teachers as possible attend outside conferences and workshops, on a variety of instructional strategies. Teachers who attend workshops share their experiences with their colleagues on a routine basis. The Middle School Parent Group has also seen a resurgence this past year, thanks to the interest and efforts of many dedicated parents ably led by Mrs. Cindy Reynolds. The Westport High School continues to find ways to respond to the need to upgrade our programs. This past year saw the phasing out of the early release practice for senior students who now spend a full instructional day at the school. Teacher training continues to have a high priority at the school and this past year teachers at the school provided inservice instruction to their colleagues in the area of Computer Application and Cooperative Learning. And, again this year, many of our high school graduates distinguished themselves both academically and in athletics.

The School Committee's year was very busy with collective bargaining and labor-related issues. Contract negotiations with both teachers and support personnel were continued past contract expiration dates and were still unresolved at year's end. In other important matters, the Committee took a solid position behind advocating for higher performance expectations for all personnel, improved building maintenance and upkeep through in-house and bond issue work projects, health education and basic skills testing for students and a school budget which reflects the resources and needs of the community.

Reports of individual school principals and administrators contain more detailed information about this past year's school programs and activities.

In closing, I suggest to you that one significant benchmark of this past year says much about this past year's journey for the School Department — The name Westport Public Schools has been changed to Westport Community Schools. This name change conveys the spirit of our public service initiatives to serve not only our young people, but to be of service to the large community as well.

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#### PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

All student services, including Special Education, Guidance, and Health are administered by the Director of Pupil Personnel Services. During 1991, staff members in all of these areas worked cooperatively using a team approach to improve the coordination of services provided to Westport students through the school system. A direct result of this approach was the development and implementation of Crisis Intervention Teams at each of the schools. These teams provide assistance to students and families in making the best use of school services and also assist them with outreach to other community agencies.

Guidance counselors at all levels also worked very hard this year to insure smooth, efficient building level administration of standardized testing programs such as the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test) and the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills. They assumed responsibility for scheduling the testing session, and the dissemination of results to students, teachers, and parents. The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills were administered to students in grades 3 through 8 during the week of March 18-22, 1991.

In addition to serving as very active members of their school crisis intervention teams, all of the school nurses met regularly during 1991 to develop a revised Policy for Administration of Medication to Students which was approved by the School Committee. Another product of these meetings was a printed pamphlet describing health services in the Westport Schools. This pamphlet was sent home to all parents in September, 1991, along with the emergency forms which must be completed by parents. The nurses also led a major effort to encourage parents to have physicals at the required intervals completed by the student's own physician, in order to provide more complete information about health problems. The excellent response of many parents to this request has resulted in improved delivery of health services.

In the Area of Health Education, the Middle School Health Program continues to offer regular classes to all students in grades 6-8. In addition to other classroom activities, the Quest Program sponsored by the Westport Lions Club has been an important part of the Middle School Health Program. Members of the Westport Health Advisory Council have met during 1991 on a monthly basis to address health-related issues and to administer programs funded under the Drug Free Schools Grant Program. Substance abuse prevention programs are being coordinated with Westport Police Department staff under the auspices of the DARE Program which has gained wide community support, and was recently awarded a special program expansion grant through the Governors' Alliance Against Drugs. Westport also continues to support other health programs in the areas of peer counseling, and AIDS education.

Special Education Programs saw dramatic changes and improvements during 1991. With the addition of PPS Clerks at each level of the school system, more careful attention is now paid to the process of documentation, in compliance with the newly revised Chapter 766 Regulations. As a result, student records and folders are much more complete. In addition, great progress was made in completing the translation of materials into native languages. Computers have been purchased or upgraded for each special education classroom in order to foster the use of educational technology as a bridge between regular and special education classrooms. The Shop Program at Westport High Schoo, where many special education students are mainstreamed, has also entered the high technology era with newly installed IBM computers used in CAD Drafting and Design instruction.

A significant amount of grant funding has been obtained through the Commonwealth Inservice Institute to provide professional development workshops for both regular and special education staff members at all levels in areas such as computer aided instruction, peer coaching, and cooperative learning strategies. Other grant funds obtained in 1991 through federal and state funding sources help Westport to provide mandated psychological services, occupational and physical therapy, and early childhood programs, as well as supporting continued efforts toward the integration of regular and special education services.

During 1991, the pre-school and kindergarten screening processes were changed significantly to better meet the needs of young children and their families. The assistance of Town Hall personnel with address labels from 1991 Census database, resulted in better communication with the parents of 3 and 4 year olds. A newly designed Integrated Preschool Program with separate classes for 3 and 4 year olds and a Head Start Center, under the auspices of Fall River Head Start, were established at the Macomber Primary School.

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The current number of special needs students in Westport is 358. As of December, 1991, these students represented approximately 18% of the total public school population. This percentage remains slightly higher than that of similar neighboring communities, and reflects a continuing need to provide more educational flexibility within the regular classroom in order to effectively meet the needs of students with diverse abilities. Out of district placements of Westport students in collaborative and private school programs decreased to 18 as of December, 1991. This lower number represents considerable savings in tuition and transportation costs, and signals the return of an increasing number of special needs students to high quality public school programs designed to meet their needs. Additional Language Intervention classes were added in September, 1991 at the Westport Elementary School and at Westport High School.

The Westport Parent Advisory Council (PAC), also received grant funds to develop a parent reference library and programs for parents in areas related to special education. On January 2, 1991, the council hosted a presentation by Dr. Anne Davidge of New Bedford Child and Family Services on the subject of children with ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder), and in October, 1991 the PAC sponsored a lecture by humorist Loretta LaRoche attended by over 300 people.

Throughout 1991, faculty members have worked cooperatively at a wide variety of program improvement initiatives designed to meet students' changing needs as they grow and develop into the adults of the 21st century. Westport's professional staff members have continued to demonstrate their high level of dedication in meeting the increasing demands today's society makes upon the educational system.

#### WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL

Westport High School students and staff have developed a great sense of pride in the many improvements and are thankful to the community for its support of the bond issue that made many of the renovations possible. As a school community we will continue our Teacher-student Volunteer Program. Efforts will include painting, plastering, repairing or working on school grounds.

The High School underwent some major changes during this past year. In a cost saving measure the School Administrative Offices were moved from the Earle School to the former High School kitchen/home economics area. In a true community effort students at the High School, administration, staff, Mr. Simmons Director of Maintenance, Margot desJardins Superintendent, School Committee and other elected officials combined efforts and resources to renovate the school building. Much needed furniture was also purchased for students. Some of the renovation, repairs or replacements were:

- A. An enclosed heated walkway was constructed connecting the cafeteria to the main building.
  - B. Windows and shades replaced old windows which were not air or water tight.
  - C. Forty year old student bathrooms were partially renovated and painted. Handicapped bathroom facilities were completed.
- D. Many student cafeteria tables and student desks were replaced.
- E. Halls and classrooms were painted by volunteer teachers and students.

Preparation began for the High School accreditation through the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Merry Hurley, Diane Rezendes and Louis Finucci were appointed as Tri-chairs.

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The accreditation process is extremely rigorous and demanding. The process involves two phases: A self evaluation lasting approximately two years to complete and a formal evaluation conducted by the N.E.A.S.C. when a team visits the school for four days. The purpose of the 24-month self-study is to provide an opportunity for staff to review all educational programs in order to determine the degree to which our school meets those standards of the N.E.A.S.C. The standards were established to ensure that the necessary ingredients for effective education exist within the school. A major requirement for accreditation is that the entire school be evaluated following the extensive self-study by the staff. The evaluation is conducted by a visiting committee of professional educators, by the commission, to review all materials prepared by the faculty in the self study, visit classes, talk with students, teachers and administrators during their visit.

The steering committee in charge of the entire process is composed of the tri-chairs and Edith LaBran, Paul Leite, and Robert Wood.

Because of the state economy the Carnegie Grant was not funded this year. Despite the lack of funds teachers and students volunteered to serve on the Senate and Assembly. A variety of bills have been considered in both legislative branches. Distribution of condoms, a ban on smoking, changes in physical education requirements, dress code, class rank, graduation requirements, were only some of the subjects covered by the high school legislation branches. Students serving in the assembly now meet in weekly caucus preparing for their monthly assembly meetings. Connie Allen and Cindy Lavoie continue to serve as community representatives to the assembly.

The school discipline code was modified by a bill filed by the administration allowing students to fill out learning packets emphasizing correct behavior and character development rather than serve out of school suspension. The change was a result of a poll of parents conducted by the Carnegie discipline sub committee. The school community endorsed the change enthusiastically and the school administration welcomed the flexibility in judging infractions.

A rotating schedule was introduced at the school this year. The schedule is based on days of the week rather than a continuous cycle. The new system makes it possible for students to have each of their classes in the morning at least twice a week, which will benefit them academically. With the new schedule, the Senior Work Study/ Early Release Program had to be dropped. The Work Program was replaced by a Community Service Program. The pilot program has over forty students involved in working in the community. The students are expected to spend 130 hours at their chosen pursuits. They must keep a journal that reflects not only their day-to-day activities but records their feelings about what they are doing. The idea came from a Boston-based organization, the Thomas Jefferson Forum. Its focus since 1985 has been to encourage young people to serve their community. Four teachers presently are serving as advisors to the community service students, Merry Hurley, Michael Roy, Anthony Sardinha and Edith LaBran. The administration and the teaching staff have made a serious commitment to community service and, with the assistance of Thomas Jefferson Foundation, are applying for a Federal Grant to help expand the program.

The High School student population continued a recent trend with a shift towards more students electing the College Preparatory Program and the High School receiving a large number of transfers (39) students from surrounding schools.

The English and Social Studies Department with a grant funded by the Polaroid Corporation initiated a pilot interdisciplinary program. Mr. Finucci and Mrs. Hurley have developed curriculum which allows them the opportunity to share common course objectives with their ninth grade honors class. Also Mr. Allen and Mr. Coelho are in process of developing an interdisciplinary course curriculum.

Tanya Pacheco winner of the Annual Westport Lions Club Youth Speech Contest went on to win the Regional Competition at Bristol Community College and placed first in the state and district competitions at Hyannis. Her winning speech carried a strong message about taking care of the environment before the world destroys itself. Elizabeth Thompson secretary to the principal retired after seventeen years of distinguished service. Mr. Leonard Freeman transferred from the Middle School Science Department to replace Ms. Betsy MacDonald who was on a leave of absence.

The student newspaper, *The Villager*, won a number of national and state awards last year. In the spring, the paper took an overall first place ranking in the American Scholastic Press Association competition. Beth Manchester and Jeremy Piques received second place for news writing in the Massachusetts Newspaper in Education Council Competition for their stories on Question #3. The paper scored 915 out of 1,000 in the Columbia Scholastic Press Association competition and received a first place rating for the third consecutive year.

During April vacation forty-two members of the band traveled to Virginia to compete in the Fiesta — Val Band Competition. Despite the drizzle and rain they returned to Westport with a first place Stage Band trophy, a third place Marching Band trophy, and a plaque for excellence.

1991 was another excellent year for Westport High Athletics. The winter season saw both the girls and boys basketball teams finish in second place in the Mayflower League. (Boys 15-5; Girls 14-6). Both teams qualified for the State Tournament with the girls advancing to the South Section quarter finals.

The spring season was a rebuilding year for both baseball and softball. Baseball finished fourth in the Mayflower League with a record of 9-10. Softball finished with another league title (18-4) and advanced to the South Section quarter finals.

Fall of 1991 saw the cross-country team have an excellent season finishing third in the Mayflower League (9-4). The volleyball team finished in second place (15-4) and qualified for State Tournament. Field Hockey struggled in a very difficult conference finishing 3-14-1. The soccer team captured its third consecutive league title finishing 12-5-1 and qualifying for the State Tournament.

In closing I would like to thank the staff, parents and students who volunteered their time to continue the Carnegie iniatives. Year one after Carnegie has been a successful one and we hope to build upon this success in the coming year.

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#### WESTPORT MIDDLE SCHOOL

The 1990-91 school year proved to be productive, as well as rewarding, for the students at the Westport Middle School. Students continued to be recognized for their academic excellence at "honors assemblies" and "honors parties" held at the end of each term.

A major change in our grouping policy was implemented this fall and has resulted in heterogeneous grouping for approximately 80% of our students. Teachers have participated in an extensive onsite, in-service training program. In addition, many teachers are participating in various seminars related to the areas of cooperative learning, whole language, mixed ability math instruction, math manipulatives, and the Great Books. For example, Fred Gross, a Lucretia Crocker Fellow will be working with Middle School and grades 4 and 5 math teachers during in-service training sessions. Mr. Gross has written a math program for mixed ability groups which has received state-wide recognition. We were most fortunate to have been selected as one of the schools working with him in the 1991-92 school year.

Four grade 8 students participated in the advanced study program. Project Contemporary Competitiveness, held at Bridgewater State College during last summer. Twenty-one, grade 8 students received Presidential Academic Fitness awards for earning an average of B+ or better on their report cards. Additionally, twenty-three, grade 7 students met criteria set by the John Hopkins Center for Talented Youth for eligibility in the SAT out-oflevel Program. Courtney Vien, Westport Middle School Spelling Bee Champion, competed in a commendable fashion, in the Standard Times Regional Spelling Bee held at Dartmouth High School.

Ernie DeGregorio, former Providence College and NBA player, was featured at a special drug education assembly sponsored by the Bristol County District Attorney's Office. The Dare Program, under the direction of Detective Mario Lewis, continues to stress the importance of staying "drug free". We are also most appreciative of the Lions' Club's commitment to support the Quest Program which is a major component of our health curriculum.

The Westport Middle School Drama Club, under the direction of Nancy DeFaria, presented a most successful production of "Babes in Toyland". Once again, Grade 8 students journeyed to our nation's capitol in June. The regular School Department budget was unable to provide the financial resources necessary to fund our Interscholastic Sports Program. However, thanks to a major fund raising project and the efforts of students, teachers, and administrators combined with tremendous community support, our students have had the opportunity to participate in this facet of the Middle School Program.

The W.M.S.A. has been working vigorously to promote increased parent involvement in various activities. Parents have assisted at our "honors parties", published a newsletter, brought in cultural assemblies, and organized an after school activity program staffed by parent volunteers, teachers, and members of the community. This strong parental commitment to enrich the lives of our students is greatly appreciated.

The completion of major building improvements at our school during the past year are as follows:

- completion of boiler replacement project
- conversion from oil to gas as a fuel source
- renovations to boiler room to ensure air quality
- repair of all exterior walkways, walls and bridges
- student lockers repaired and refinished.

Janice Baker, Grade 7 and 8 Science teacher, is the only new addition to our staff. She replaced Leonard Freeman who was transferred to Westport High School.

#### WESTPORT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

As Principal of the Westport Elementary School, I would like to summarize our 1991-1992 school-year at the Westport Elementary School. As you are well aware, the restructuring of our two elementary schools was the focal point of our school year. The Macomber School became a primary school — for grades pre K - 1. Westport Elementary: grades 2-5.

This important change will have a long-term effect on our Westport Community School System. Presently, I am happy to report that the adjustment has been a positive one. We will continue to improve upon this new structure as we enter the 1990's.

- I. Staff Changes: Wholesale changes were made as grade levels moved. All of the system's 2-5 grade teachers were transferred to Westport Elementary School. Pre K to grade 1 moved to Macomber. Specialists were assigned to both buildings on a day-to-day basis. Special needs, Chapter I, para-professionals, etc. were also assigned according to need. Also, a new principal (Mrs. Marylou Clarke) was appointed for the Macomber Primary School.
- II. Curriculum: Several commitments for curriculum improvement have been initiated:
  - 1. Strategic Planning groups
  - 2. Peer observations (classroom activities)
  - 3. Teacher Support Group (after-school sharing ideas)
  - 4. Curriculum Conferences (update curriculum issues)
  - 5. Teacher Inservice (increased opportunities to learn new strategies)
  - 6. Heterogenous grouping (piloting new materials and techniques, cooperative learning, etc.)
- III. Activities: Several new (and previous) activities have been incorporated at the Westport Elementary School. They include:
  - 1. A new W.E.S.P.A.T. organization that combines both Macomber and Westport Elementary.
  - 2. After-school activities for WES students: (Newspaper, computer, Art, Music, Phys.Ed., etc.). Additional academic assistance is offered to students both before and after school.

- 3. Friday Night Prime Time: (overnight reading activities) will continue in the spring.
- 4. Book Buddies Program: (grades 2-5 at WES, and grades K-1-3-4 at Macomber and WES) has been organized in both buildings.
- 5. Media Center: Coverage for both Macomber and WES has been formulated. Scheduling has been set up to accommodate both schools.
- "Teacher Sharing": Teachers at Macomber and WES who have a certain "expertise" in a particular area — would visit classrooms to share these experiences.
- Community Visitors: Several classrooms are scheduling visits with local community members. These individuals discuss various topics — and include the students in the activities planned. Topics included: programs for education on retarded citizens, D.A.R.E., fishing, flying, dentistry, etc.
- IV. Testing/Evaluation: Westport Elementary Students continue to excel in their standardize testing. Yearly tests include the following:

IOWA Tests of Basic Skills MASS. Basic Skills Testing MASS. Ed. Assessment Testing

We are also reviewing carefully, the newest techniques in student evaluation for grades 2-5.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Committee, the Central Office Administration, staff, parents and students for their cooperation. We will always continue to strive for excellence in education.

#### ALICE A. MACOMBER PRIMARY SCHOOL

I am happy to report to you significant events of the first six months of the recently re-dedicated Alice A. Macomber Primary School. Effective September, 1991, the Macomber School houses 318 Preschool through Grade One students, as well as a Home Base Headstart Program.

In the early fall, an enthusiastically attended Open House and Rededication Program was held, introducing all staff members, and providing parents with an opportunity to visit our classrooms.

Ms. Nancy Raczka is serving as Lead Teacher at the Macomber, and we welcome Mrs. Susan Dumais, who is serving as a substitute classroom teacher in the absence of Miss Linda Stafford, Grade One teacher. Mrs. Debra Proulx is serving in the role of SPED Para Professional, and Mrs. Janice Piexoto as substitute SPED Para Professional in the absence of Mrs. LuAnn Paulls.

The organization of several unifying school projects, such as the adoption of a school mascot and creation of a Visiting Reader Program are credited to the ongoing dedicated volunteerism of our parents.

The Macomber School is piloting the Building Based Support Team concept, with a focus on continuous refinement of the special education referral process, as well as providing maximum teacher/ student support mechanisms to enhance instruction and improve student achievement.

This is the first year of implementation of the fully integrated developmentally appropriate preschool concept for three and four year old children on-site at the Macomber School.

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One of our primary objectives is to facilitate the transition of our Grade One students to the Westport Elementary School. Through our Book Buddy Program between Macomber Grade One students and Westport Elementary School fourth grade students, our prospective second graders will form bonds with future 1992-93 Grade 5 students, while nurturing their love of reading.

The Macomber School Improvement Council, representative of faculty, parents, and community members continues this year to act in an advisory role to our school. A generous business educational partnership has been formed in which the Macomber School has been "adopted" by Lees Supermarket. This will allow us to provide valuable educational enrichment and to develop programs which extend the classroom "beyond the schoolhouse doors".

The children, parents, staff, and townspeople should reflect proudly on the educational atmosphere in the community, which has been conveyed to me during my first several months serving in the role of Principal.

In closing, we continue to focus all efforts on the aims of the Westport Community Schools, with specific concern towards providing our children with a strong foundation on which to launch their school careers.
