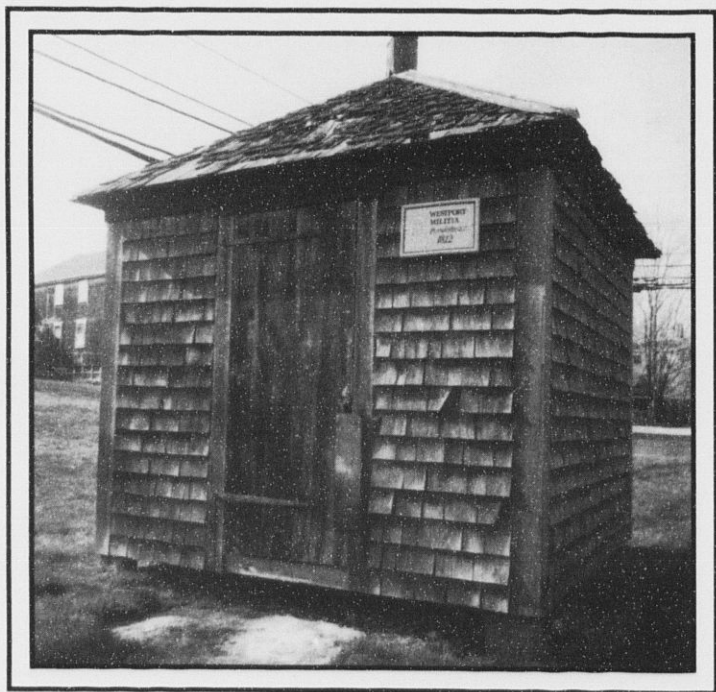


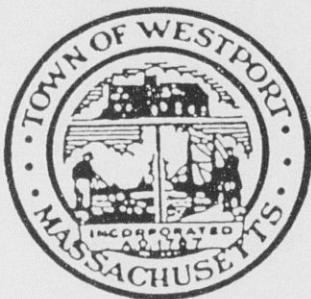

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Once again, we have had a very busy year in the Selectmen's Office! We continue to work on many positive new and continuing projects, and have continued to grapple with the effects of diminishing state revenue sharing.

In April, David P. Dionne was elected to the seat on the Board. Romeo A. Fortin, in the third year of his term, was unanimously chosen by the Board to serve as Chair. Thomas Perkins continued into his second year as the third member of the Board.

Carlton A. Lees was replaced as Town Counsel in July after long service to the Town. We thank him for his efforts on the Town's behalf.

J. Michael Buckley resigned as Town Accountant in November, and Katherine Benoit has been serving as Acting Town Accountant until a new Town Accountant is selected. Many thanks to Mike for his years of fine service to the Town.

PROJECT UPDATES

Grant Funds Awarded to Westport

We are especially pleased to announce that once again, our grant application to the EOCD has been selected for award. This means that \$327,700 in federal funding will be coming into town during 1992 for housing rehabilitation and a wide range of social services. Although we were disappointed that the portion of the application for assistance in building a senior center was not funded, we have received encouragement from the EOCD to reapply for the next funding year.

Payments In Lieu Of Taxes

We have taken the lead position by filing a law suit to compel the state to honor its obligation to the cities and towns by making the payments in lieu of taxes for state-owned lands as required by state law. A number of other communities, from Boston to small towns in the Berkshires, have joined as additional parties to the law suit, and we are hopeful for a favorable resolution sometime during 1993.

Water Main Installation

We are very pleased that the water installation project has finally been completed, bringing water service to the residents in the Six/ Sanford Road area. This project was made possible

through the efforts of Administrative Assistant Sally Adams, Representative Ed Lambert, and the Massachusetts Executive Office of Communities and Development (EOCD). Paper Recycling and Hazardous Waste Collection

This year, thanks to the efforts of the town hall employees and volunteers from the Solid Waste Committee, we have implemented an office paper recycling program. Additionally, we were again able to offer Town residents the opportunity to dispose of household hazardous wastes during a collection day at the Town Hall.

Financial Issues

For the fifth year in a row, the Town is facing fiscal uncertainty because of decreases in local aid from the State. This past year, we were able to prevent any further layoffs of town personnel and maintain most of the traditional service levels. However, with Proposition 2-1/2 limiting property taxes and decreases in local aid, we may not be able to meet the cost of providing the town services you are accustomed to receiving.

We are again projecting a several hundred thousand dollar budget shortfall for the July 1, 1993 to June 30, 1994 fiscal year. This Board is working with the Finance Committee and the other department heads to devise a strategy to meet the rising current costs of local services, and to fashion long-range financial planning goals and objectives.

Employee Health Care

Last year we joined with fifteen other municipal groups to form the Southeastern Massachusetts Health Group to preserve the level of health insurance benefits for our town employees. This year, the SMHG has continued efforts to provide quality health care options at affordable prices by introducing a Preferred Provider Option (PPO) as an alternative to the more traditional plans available to our employees.

Head of Westport

The Landing Commissioners continue to work with the engineering firm Tighe and Bond and our Administrative Assistant to finalize the gasoline cleanup at the Head of Westport. A waiver has been secured from the state Department of Environmental Protection allowing a limited and more carefully defined clean-up process.

CENTREX Service in Town Offices

Town telephone numbers have been changed to a new bank of numbers to allow us to take advantage of the improved service and

cost savings of the CENTREX system offered by New England Telephone. The new numbers are listed at the back of this Annual Report - please take note of these changes!

In closing, we wish to acknowledge and extend our appreciation to all who have offered their time and expertise to the Town.

We thank the many citizens who have served on the groups and committees formed to assist in developing policy direction for the town; and to the officials and employees for their continuing dedication and accomplishments.

It has been a pleasure to have had the opportunity to serve during the past year, and we look forward to 1993 as a year of renewal and accomplishment.

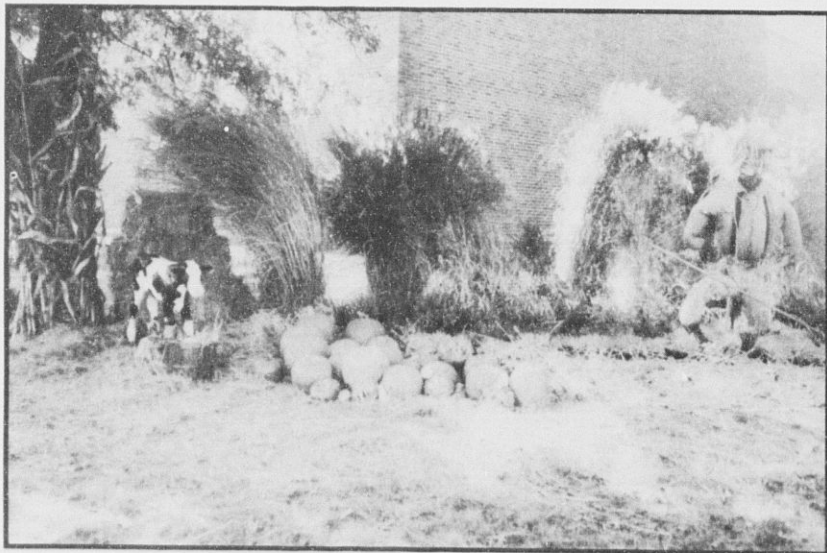

False alarm shall not include false alarms caused by earthquakes, violent winds, or external causes beyond the control of the owner or lessee of the alarm system.

4602. STANDARDS FOR ALARM SYSTEMS: Any alarm system intended to cause a Police or Fire Department response shall meet the following standards:

- (a) All alarm system shall be in compliance with NFPA 101, Life Safety Code, Section 7-6.1.3.
- (b) All equipment installed after the effective date of this By-law shall be Underwriters Laboratory approved.
- (c) All alarms installed after the effective date of this By-Law which has an audible type alarm shall be equipped with an automatic shut-off device which will shut off the audible component of the alarm within thirty (30) minutes of activation.

4603. FALSE ALARM CHARGES: Any person who maintains or has connected an alarm system which has caused any signal, message, or alarm to be transmitted to the Police Department or Fire Department either by direct telephone or other communication which has been determined to be a false alarm shall pay a false alarm charge to the Town as follows:

Any person receiving such a notice shall have thirty (30) days from the date received to show just cause why that alarm should not be disconnected. In

the absence of just cause, the alarm shall be disconnected at the end of the thirty day period.

4605. PENALTY: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of these By-laws shall be liable to a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each violation. Each day shall constitute a separate offense.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. Any holder of an elected office in the Town of Westport may be recalled therefrom by the registered voters of the town as herein provided, except, the maximum number of members of a board that may be recalled is a majority.

SECTION 2. Any twenty-five registered voters of the town may initiate a recall petition by filing with the town Clerk an affidavit containing the name of the officer sought to be recalled and a statement of the grounds for recall. The Town Clerk shall thereupon deliver to said voters making the affidavit copies of petition blanks demanding such recall, copies of which printed forms he shall keep available. Such blanks shall be issued by the Town Clerk, with his/her signature and official seal attached thereto. They shall be dated, shall be addressed to the Selectmen and shall contain the names of all the persons to whom they are issued, to name of the person whose recall is sought, the grounds of recall as stated in the affidavit, and shall demand the election of a successor in the said office. A copy of the petition shall be entered in a record book to be kept in the office of the Town Clerk. Said recall petition shall be returned and filed with

the Town Clerk within twenty days after the filing of the & affidavit, and shall have been signed by at least twenty percent of the registered voters of the Town, who shall add to their signatures the street and number, if any, of their residences.

The Town Clerk shall within twenty-four hours of receipt submit the petition to the Registrars of Voters in the Town, and the registrars shall within five working days certify thereon the number of signatures which are names of registered voters of the Town.

SECTION 3. If the petition shall be found and certified by the Town Clerk to be sufficient, he/she shall submit the same with his/her certificate to the selectmen within five working days, and the selectmen shall within five working days give written notice of the receipt of the certificate to the officer sought to be recalled and shall, if the officer does not resign within five days thereafter, order an election to be held on a date fixed by them not less than sixty and not more than ninety days after the date of the Town Clerk's certificate that a sufficient petition has been filed; provided however, that if any other town election is to occur within ninety days after the date of the certificate the selectmen shall postpone the holding of the recall election to the date of such other election. No person shall be subject to recall if his/her term of office expires within ninety days of the certificate. If a vacancy occurs in said office after a recall election has been ordered, the election shall nevertheless proceed as provided in this section.

SECTION 4. Any officer sought to be removed may be a candidate to succeed himself, and unless he requests otherwise in writing, the Town Clerk shall place his/her name on the ballot, without nomination. The nomination of other candidates, the publication of the warrant for the removal election, and the conduct of the same, shall all be in accordance with the provisions of law relating to election, unless otherwise provided in this act.

SECTION 5. The incumbent shall continue to perform the duties of his office until the recall election. If then reelected, he shall continue in office for the remainder of his unexpired term subject to recall as before, except as provided in this section. If not reelected in the recall election, he/she shall be deemed removed upon the qualification of his successor, who shall hold office during the unexpired term. If the successor fails to qualify within five days after receiving notification of his election, the incumbent shall thereupon be deemed removed and the office vacant.

SECTION 6. Ballots used in a recall election shall submit the following propositions in the order indicated:

For the recall of (name of officer)

Against the recall of (name of officer).

Immediately at the right of each proposition, there shall be a square in which the voter, by making a cross mark (X) may vote for either of the said propositions. Under the propositions shall appear the word "Candidates", the directions to the voters required by section forty-two of chapter fifty-four of the General Laws, and beneath this, the name of candidates nominated in accordance with the provisions of law relating to elections. If a majority of the votes cast upon the question of recall is in the affirmative, the candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. If more than a majority of the votes on the question are in the negative, the ballots for candidates need not be counted.

No recall petition shall be filed against an officer within ninety days after he takes office, nor, in the case of an officer subjected to a recall election and not recalled thereby, until at least ninety days after the election at which his recall was submitted to the voters of the town.

SECTION 8. No person who has been recalled from an office or who has resigned from office while recall proceedings were pending against him, shall be appointed to any town office within one year after such recall or such resignation.

The Westport Arts Council respectfully submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1992.

Currently, the Westport Arts Council distributes funds allocated to the town from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, or MCC (formerly the Massachusetts Arts Lottery Council) and funds generated by application to the Helen E. Ellis Trust Fund. The MCC funds area generated by the state sponsored Megabucks game. The amount that each town in Massachusetts receives through the MCC is based on a formula of distribution by population.

Area artists, cultural groups and educational institutions submit proposals to the Council. The Council meets, reviews and votes on each proposal.

Massachusetts Cultural Council

One funding cycle occurred this year for projects to be completed in 1992. Fifteen projects were approved for a total of \$5,350.00.

Those projects were: music for a Senior Picnic for the Westport Council on Aging; a visit to the Rhode Island School of Design for fifth graders from the Westport Elementary School; a program at the Westport Public Library by poet/performer David Zucker; a lighting system for the Westport Art Group; a performance at the Westport Middle School by Tony Montanaro and Karen Hurl with mime, music, dance and masks; a performance by story teller Marc Levitt at the Westport Middle School; a performance by Jeff Benoit at the Westport Middle School; a performance at the Westport Middle School by the Roxbury Outreach Shakespeare Experience; music for Seniors by Bob St. Amour and others; support for the Westport Historical Society Alumni Hall

Series Summer Concert; support for the Bierstadt Art Society to present a series of lectures, workshops and demonstrations; support for the New Bedford Festival Theater Summer Apprentice Program; support for the New Bedford Symphony Orchestra performance of Elijah; support for the Eisteddfod Traditional Arts Festival at SMU; attendance for Westport Middle Schoolers at a performance of Theatreworks/USA under the PASS program.

Council met in October to distribute funds for the funding cycle of January - December, 1993. The state MCC has recently gone to one funding cycle per year due to a significant drop in available funds and an agency reorganization. The reorganization included a new set of guidelines for all Councils.

The allocation was for \$3,983 and the Council received requests totaling \$19,607. The Council approved five applications and is currently waiting for final approval from the state. The approved projects are: performances by story teller Tom McCabe at the Westport Primary and Elementary schools; performances by storyteller Michael Cooper at the Westport Middle School; performances by Street Singer Stephen Baird at the Westport Public Library; Linda Neves 11 storytelling performances in the Westport schools; support for a multi-cultural festival at the Westport Elementary School.

Helen E. Ellis Trust Fund Grant

The Westport Arts Council application to the Helen E. Ellis Trust Fund was approved for \$15,000. The Council began meetings in January, 1992 to distribute these funds. The Council received 65 requests totaling \$78,597 and funded 17 projects.

Those projects were: supplies for work and stained glass demonstration of work and extended exhibit at the Westport Library to Andrea and Brian Scholes; to Jane Dufault to work with fifth graders to rehearse and perform the musical Johnny Appleseed at the school and at the Harvest Festival; to Christine Mullen to buy supplies to create sets and props for the Johnny Appleseed musical; to Lewis Hammond Stone, poet works 4 weeks with Westport students at all schools to read and write poetry; to Lewis Hammond & Stone five actors/ storytellers/ musicians perform at Elementary School to promote reading and writing; to Andrew Macomber and Richard Wertz funds to produce 150 copies of "Westporters and the Civil War" to Walter Zembo funds to support community dances for all ages; to Westport Library to support appearance of Marcia Sewall, an author/illustrator; to Westport Elementary School for two basket weavers to teach skills to students; to William Shea to assist Westport Middle School students with producing local cable TV program "News from the Schools"; to William Russell for materials for a series of photographs on Westport farming; to Ruth Maynard Coffin to fund developing a program of poetry and dramatic readings; to Macomber

and Elementary School to support performances by African drummer and dancer; to David Allen to develop a photography exhibition on Westport schools for permanent display at the administration building; to Susan Mohl Powers to support an exhibit of fabric painting and sculpture; to Macomber School to present local illustrator of children's books in all classrooms; to Geraldine Millham to develop a series of five tapestries and visit the High School to present work.

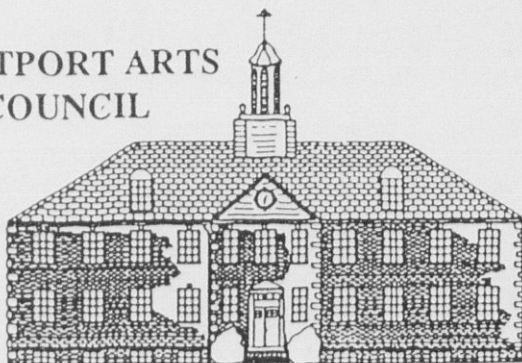
The Council has received another grant from the Helen E. Ellis Trust Fund of \$9,800 and has plans to begin accepting applications for funding in February, 1993.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS

During the calendar year 1992, the Appeals Board held 17 hearings. In addition, the Board rendered a decision concerning the status of Cahoons Lane. One petition required a variance and a finding.

Of the seventeen petitions heard, there were eleven requests for variances. Three variances were granted with conditions for set-backs; three variances were granted for trailers at East Beach; one previous variance was modified and two variance requests were withdrawn. The balance of the petitions were varied.

There were six applications for findings. Of the six petitions, one was withdraw, one was an amendment to a previous finding and the balance of the findings were made establishing new guidelines.

The Board granted one special permit for what has been known as the Westport Waterslide. This permit allows the petitioners to conduct the establishment as a private club for profit.

The Board was reorganized with James M. Morton III remaining as Chairman, Joseph L. Keith III as Clerk and Raymond Medeiros as Vice-Chairman.

The Board of Health has the following goals for the year 1993:

1. Commence Phase II of the Westport River Water Monitoring Program to locate and identify non-point sources of pollution.
2. Further develop a Quality Assurance Program for the continued certification of the Town Laboratory.
3. Continue well water quality testing program.
4. Implement an organized program for septic system inspection.
5. Conduct various sanitary surveys around local water bodies.
6. Purchase a septic leachate detector to help with the implementation of No. 5.
7. Submit an initial site assessment and a comprehensive site assessment to the Department of Environment Protection for the continued operation of the landfill.
8. Reconstruct and upgrade the recycling center.
9. Pass regulations dealing with farm run-off, aquifer protection and property transfer/septic system inspection.
10. Upgrade all current regulations.
11. Complete farm run-off projects to prevent river pollution.
12. Upgrade failed septic systems or septic systems in the water table.
13. Continue to upgrade/computerize Public Health Office systems.

ELEVEN BOARD OF HEALTH RIVER PROTECTION
ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 1992

1. Conducted Division of Marine Fisheries Shellfish Bed testing program resulting in opening of conditional areas of the West Branch of the Westport River.

2. Upgrade of Failed or Substandard septic systems which were causing septic pollution into the Westport River. This is an ongoing program and will continue until all failed or substandard septic systems have been repaired.
3. Weekly river testing for fecal coliform levels in conjunction with the WRWA.
4. Investigation of River tributaries for pollution sources. This is also an ongoing program.
5. Board of Health is in the process of forming a Farm Run-off regulation in cooperation with the Westport Farmer's Association which will include provisions to prevent cows from grazing in or near the Westport River.
6. The Board of Health has accepted and voted on a regulation written in conjunction with the Pollution Advisory Committee requiring the inspection of septic systems in the event of Property Transfer or change in use of a property. Implementation is awaiting Town Counsel approval. The Board of Health had submitted this regulation to Town Counsel on September 3, 1992.
7. The Board of Health has begun design plans to remediate the Farm run-off problems from a Drift Road Farm in conjunction with the Stormwater Management Commission.
8. The Board of Health has ordered a Gifford Road Farm to remediate its manure run-off problem which was running into the Westport River during the Summer of 1992. Berms have been built redirecting the water flow into a settling pond.
9. The Board of Health distributes literature to homebuilders/owners suggesting ways to prevent septic system failure and to encourage groundwater protection.
10. The Board of Health has re-written all of its regulations giving them real teeth and making them enforceable. These regulations are also awaiting Town Counsel approval since September 3, 1992.
11. The Board of Health has implemented a survey of all kennels in Westport to determine the final disposition of the animal feces from these operations. The Board will then determine if a regulation is necessary with regard to animal feces disposal.

When the State surveyor reviewed our department we had no deficiencies.

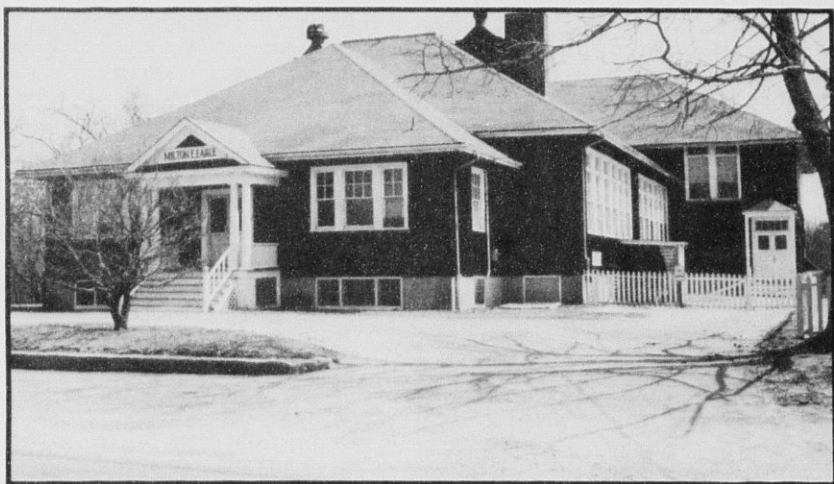
Our monthly Well-Child Clinic is coordinated by Dr. Jean Leimert, an area Pediatrician, as well as our nurses Lori and Pat.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
BRISTOL COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

On June 30, 1992 the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project completed thirty-three years of service to the cities and towns of Bristol County.

The mosquito control project works year-round in its efforts to reduce mosquito breeding sites and adult mosquito populations. The Project uses several different measures of control in its never ending fight against mosquitoes.

Winter Pre-hatch - To treat breeding areas that are accessible only on the ice during the winter months.

Spring and Summer Larviciding - To reduce the emergence of adult mosquitoes in areas where mosquito larvae is present.

Catch Basin Treatment - To stop mosquito emergence from rain-filled catch basins and storm drains.

Light Trapping Program - To monitor mosquito populations as to their type and number - a program necessary in encephalitis surveillance. Light trapping of mosquitoes is also useful to determine what areas have high mosquito populations and should be sprayed.

Water Management - A year round endeavor to clean and construct mosquito drainage ditches in lowland swamps to reduce their favorability as breeding sites for mosquito larvae.

It is the policy of the Bristol County Mosquito Control Project to use pesticides that are environmentally safe so that the safety of the people and environment are not jeopardized. We use as many of the biological insecticides as are practical with the environmental conditions present in the New England area. We are presently using three different formulations of B.T.I. in our larviciding program.

All of our spray equipment is calibrated periodically in order to insure that dosage rates remain at safe levels but are adequate to reduce mosquito populations. The operators of our spray equipment are state certified pesticide applicators that are required to attend classes on pesticide safety on a yearly basis.

During the spring of 1992 water levels in most wetland areas were lower than normal as a result of below average precipitation during the winter and spring. Because of many breeding sites having lower water levels the spring brood of mosquitoes was not as heavy as in past years.

Although water levels and mosquito populations were down the Mass. Dept. of Public Health was still concerned that the EE virus could become a problem during the late summer. The mosquito control and DPH worked together to monitor mosquito populations and keep abreast of any virus activity. Our light traps as well as those of DPH continued to show lower populations for the entire season than originally expected. Isolations of the EE virus were extremely low and there were no reported cases of EE in either horses or humans in Bristol County.

With the exception of a few isolated areas which were mostly coastal saltmarshes the 1992 mosquito season was relatively quiet. Our tractors are currently correcting the drainage problems that caused problems in these areas.

The Project answered all requests for spraying along with our regular spraying of known infested areas for a total of 2,670.5 sprayed acres.

During the spring and summer months a total of 203 catch basins that were found to be breeding were treated. During the fall and winter months a total of 850 feet of brush was cut from ditches and 650 feet of drainage ditch was reclaimed.

I would like to thank the town officials and the people of Westport for their continued support and cooperation and look to serving them in the coming year. Should anyone have a question as to what might be done to relieve a mosquito problem in their area, whether it is water management work, treatment of a breeding site, or just having an area checked, please feel free to call our office.

The primary function of the C.O.A. is to take care of Westport's elder residents, particularly the frail, ill, homebound and poor. Our objective is to keep these people living at home with support services rather than in nursing homes where the cost, mainly to the taxpayer, is \$40,000 and more a year. We can accomplish this with social workers and outreach workers. Two social workers, Karen Martin and Donna Perry, are provided by Bristol Elder Services, Inc., the Area Agency on Aging, and

four outreach workers are employed by the Council on Aging. Three of the outreach workers are Elder Visitors, who check on the physical and emotional well-being of the homebound, and one is a Companion, who offers periods of respite (up to 3 hours) to "round-the-clock" caretakers of seriously frail elders. Two of these positions are paid for by a grant. The Elder Visitors and Companion made approximately 4,800 visits to the homebound last year, bringing support and friendship to 96 elders.

Our general purpose is to identify the needs of the community's elder population and to inform them of our resources. The office is the entrance to a wide-ranging network of services: legal, transportation, homemaker, home health aides, psychiatric, financial, guardian, abuse, alcoholism and drug problems, diabetes, hearing and vision impaired, advocacy, adult family care, fuel assistance, weatherization, federal surplus food, crisis intervention, identification cards, job opportunities, tax assistance, Meals-on-Wheels, emergency response units, podiatry clinics and general counseling.

We also offer classes of various types, including: bridge, knitting, crafts, and low-impact aerobics. The annual picnic was held at St. George School auditorium in September, and 176 seniors enjoyed the afternoon. The Council wishes to thank Mr. Al Lees for his most generous contribution of food and supplies.

The "Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc." is working to raise funds for a senior community center, which is a missing component in Westport's concern for its population. The Town applied for a Small Cities Grant to use for a new center, but the \$450,000 amount requested was denied in December, 1992. We are the only town in Bristol County which does not have a town-sponsored center, and we shall continue to work to obtain a center.

CLINICS

The Council on Aging sponsored three podiatry clinics, one legal clinic, and two S.H.I.N.E. clinics in 1992. Dr. Kenneth Brum, of the Somerset-Swansea Medical Center, was the participating podiatrist; Attorney George Phelan, of Bristol Elder Services, Inc., provided legal counsel; and Jackye Stowe, of the Attleboro Council on Aging, provided health insurance counseling at the S.H.I.N.E. (Serving Health and Information Needs for Elders) clinics; the S.H.I.N.E. clinics were added in 1992 to provide essential health insurance information to Westport elders.

FEDERAL SURPLUS FOOD AND SEED PROGRAMS

With the help of twenty-five individual volunteers, Westport High School students, and the Highway and Cemetery Departments,

270 households and 441 low-income persons received federal surplus food products. Fifty kits of vegetable seeds were also given to allow gardeners to increase their food supplies.

HOLIDAY CONTRIBUTIONS

The C.O.A. delivered holiday food baskets to homebound elders in November and December, and the Council would like to thank the following organizations for their contributions: St. John's Church, Westport Point United Methodist Church, Westport S.H.A.R.E., Westport Elementary School "Dimes for Deeds" students, Girl Scout Troop 906, Brownie Troop 675, Westport Grange, Figueiredo's Greenhouse, and the "Friends of the Westport C.O.A.".

"FRIENDS OF THE WESTPORT COUNCIL ON AGING, INC."

"Friends of the Westport Council on Aging, Inc.", a non-profit organization, continued to raise funds toward its goal to provide Westport with a Senior Community Center. In addition to revenues from members' dues, the "Friends" raised money through the telephone book project. Lucile Chase is the president of the "Friends", and Elizabeth Derbyshire is in charge of the telephone book.

GRANTS

The Council received two grants in 1992, including a formula grant of \$4,470 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs and a Title III-B grant of \$8,705.82 from Bristol Elder Services, Inc., Area Agency on Aging. The formula grant paid the salaries of an Elder Visitor and a Companion, and the Title III-B funds will be used to develop a Social Day Care Program. With renovation funds provided by the Town and the cooperation of the Westport Community Schools, the Council plans to renovate space at the Westport Middle School for its social day care program.

EMERGENCY ALERT UNITS

The C.O.A. has six medical alert machines available to low-income Westport elders in frail health and living alone. They are a gift of the Romero Trust and the "Friends of the Westport, C.O.A.". They will remain the property of the Town.

"EVERGREEN" NEWSLETTER

Fourteen hundred (1,400) copies are distributed monthly to area locations. The Council wishes to thank the advertisers whose support defrays the cost of publication and Lorman Trueblood, Joan Fradley and Peter Fradley for their assistance with the distribution.

NUTRITION PROGRAM

The Fall River Nutrition Program, under Title III and Title XX of the Older Americans Act, delivered 10,721 meals to homebound elders and served 3,055 meals at Westport's congregate meal site at Greenwood Terrace. 4,422 more meals were delivered to eligible homebound elders last year than in 1991. In November, Westport was limited to 265 meals per week due to budget constraints of the F. R. Nutrition Program; however, we were able to serve all Westport elders who required Meals-on-Wheels.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD

After twelve years of valuable service to the Council on Aging, Jean Lozinski retired as its coordinator in early October. Ms. Lozinski made a difference in the lives of many Westport elders, and she will be missed.

In mid-October, Jacqueline B. Hill was named as the new coordinator. Ms. Hill has been associated with the C.O.A. in many roles in the past, and her educational background includes degrees in business and sociology. She is pleased to be affiliated with the Council on Aging again and looks forward to working with Westport's elders.

IN SUMMARY

The total population in Westport was 13,459 in 1992, with 2,667 residents who were sixty or older. This represents 20% of the population. With the economy in recession, skyrocketing health care costs, and a reduction in state and federal elder assistance funds, the burden of caring for the frail elders falls on everyone--families, friends, and neighbors. The Council on Aging will continue to be a resource for these elders and their caregivers, but it has become evident that the Coordinator's workload has increased dramatically in 1992. The Council on Aging board notes that it has become impossible to accomplish the essential workload of the C.O.A. office on its currently budgeted 25 hours per week schedule. Last, we want to thank the more than 80 volunteers who helped us to carry out our many programs for frail and well elders in 1992.

ANNUAL TOWN REPORT

The following is a report of the Westport Citizens Betterment Committee for the year ending December 31, 1992.

The Board of Selectmen reappointed members Hilda Martel, Cynthia Rodrigues, Charlene R. Wood and Walter Craveiro as Trustees of both the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund and the Westport Citizens Betterment Fund. Shirley Desrosiers' term does not expire until the year 2000.

Due to the efforts of several volunteers, our concession at the Annual Harvest Festival during the two-day festival was a success. We also tried our hands at running a concession during the River Day celebration in June, but due to weather conditions, this venture did not work out as well.

Each year in the months of August, September and October, the Trustees solicit proposals from town agencies, citizen groups, non-profit organizations, and members of the general public for grant proposals. The Trustees then consider the proposals and award the grants to as many recipients as possible.

The Committee was ecstatic to receive an overwhelming response to our grant applications. We had a very difficult time choosing the grant recipients as so many worthwhile projects were submitted for the awards.

The accumulated interest earned through the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund was used for awarding a \$500.00 grant to the Westport Solid Waste Committee to hire an engineer to prepare a topographical plan of the recycling area in preparation for the design plan of the facility.

In addition, a \$100.00 grant was awarded to Gil Fernandez to help defray some of the cost of repairing, reconstructing and making essential improvements to existing osprey nest platforms in both branches of the Westport River damaged by Hurricane Bob. This is only a small token for the many years of time and money the Fernandez family and others have contributed towards this project which enriches the lives of many in our community and others as well.

We would like to take this opportunity to encourage you to consider contributing to the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund or the Westport Citizens Betterment Fund in memory of a loved one or for any other reason. As you can see, the Trustees are trying very hard to build up these funds for the betterment of the citizens of our community. Watch for other fund raisers in the near future.

Our thanks to all those who donated to both funds, the Westport Harvest Festival Committee and the River Day Committee. Also to the local newspapers, cable tv, and Al's Alamanc for their free publicity and last, but not least, the volunteers who helped us with the fund raisers and all the citizens who supported these efforts. This year we extend our special thanks to Ray Martel who volunteered to construct a wooden wind shield for our stove and grill. His craftsmanship and ingenuity is outstanding.

The balance in the Ronald Desrosiers Memorial Fund as of 12/31/92 was \$12,041.11 while the Westport Citizens Betterment Fund shows a balance of \$1,894.93.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FISH COMMISSIONERS

The 1992 activities of the Fish Commissioners were directed towards the following areas:

- (1) The number one priority of the Fish Commissioners has been to restock the Albert Rosinha Herring Run at Adamsville Rd. This project includes the assistance of Mass. Division of Marine Fisheries and the non-profit organization Alewives Anonymous Inc. Although we have introduced truckloads of spawning herring into the above pond, over a few years, it has been only slightly successful with only a few herring returning to spawn.
- (2) The Harbor Herring Run has been cleared of brush and debris to increase the number of herring upstream to spawn. This herring run which was once very productive has shown a marked decrease of spawning alewives over the last several years.
- (3) Over the last few years the Fish Commissioners have witnessed a decline in many fisheries such as winter flounder, fluke and herring. We feel there are several reasons for the decline in addition to overfishing such as:
 - (a) Acid rain is a form of pollution caused primarily by the burning of high sulfur coal in power plants and factories. It is blamed for poisoning thousands of lakes in the northeast United States and Canada.
 - (b) The last several years we have seen an explosion in the number of cormorants and osprey in the Westport area. Their prey varies from bait fish such as herring, pogies and silversides to perch and flounder, juvenile stripers and tautog. Managers in the States Marine and inland Fisheries are aware of the problem but these birds, like the seagull are federally protected.

GREATER FALL RIVER VOCATIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY

July 1, 1991 - June 30, 1992

I would like to take this opportunity to express my great pride in our district school and in our students' activities and accomplishments. It is exciting to see your children, our students, grow daily in their positive mental attitudes, in their skills, and in their school and community pride. Our report represents another successful school year and on behalf of the students, faculty, staff, and administration, I extend a sincere "Thank You" for your continued support of Diman Regional Vocational Technical High School and its students.

STUDENT SERVICES

Summer Programs

Diman Vocational conducted its 1991 summer exploratory program with a total of 366 students from our district participating by exploring six shops to determine if vocational education would be in their future plans. We were funded through a Special Needs Grant and the Bristol County Training Consortium program. Our make-up session was self-funded with an enrollment of 59 students.

Attendance

Our average student daily attendance during the 1991-92 school year was over 94.6%.

Orientation Program

On August 27, 28, and 29, an orientation program was held in the school cafeteria for all new students. A "Parent Night" was held on September 24 to familiarize parents of new students with school programs, the school's philosophy, and policies.

Admissions

In school year 1991-92, the number of applications for grade nine was up over the previous year from 435 to 470.

Testing

In January and February the Guidance Department administered the Massachusetts Assessment Test to all seniors.

Career Day

The Guidance Department sponsored our eighth College Career Day with 20 colleges and technical schools represented.

Follow-up Surveys

In April 1992, the Guidance Department sent out the Chapter 74 Completer Follow-Up form to 227 students from the graduating class of 1991. Of the 161 who responded or were contacted:

- 50 were working in areas related to their vocational training
- 40 were working in a non-related area
- 31 were pursuing additional education
- 21 were in military service
- 19 were unemployed

Scholarships and Awards

At Class Night activities held for the Class of 1992 numerous scholarships and awards were given to graduates.

School Improvement Council and the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs

During the 1991-92 school year the Drug Free School/School Improvement Council met on a monthly basis. The Council received a Drug Free School Grant in the amount of \$3,644. With these funds educational materials were purchased to support anti-drug and alcohol abuse education. The School Improvement Council did not receive any state funding for the 91-92 school year. The Council, however, continued its work by incorporating handbook changes which improved the student, faculty, and administration relationships.

Grant Funding

With an Eisenhower Grant received, 9 of our faculty completed a three-credit Principles of Technology I: course through the University of Massachusetts. Fifteen teachers completed various computer courses at the Somerset Computer Technology Center through a Commonwealth In-Service Institute Grant.

In April of 1992 we were awarded an Environmental Protection Agency Grant of \$149,699 plus a no-interest loan for \$325,782 for a total of \$475,481 for the abatement of asbestos contained on the support structure of the building.

With a grant from Bristol County Training Consortium Diman introduced adult training within our day programs.

Co-op Program

The Greater Fall River area continues to experience one of the nations highest jobless rates. During the 1991-92 school year, Diman placed ninety-nine eligible seniors on Co-operative Education Training Sites with sixty-five Southeast Massachusetts and Rhode Island employers not affected by unemployment.

A total of 129 Co-operative Education agreements were initiated with private sector employers between July 1, 1991 and June 30, 1992, and filed with the Department of Education. Effective June 24, 1992 until September 4, 1992, a total of 29 juniors going into their senior year were placed on Extended Co-operative Education Training.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The October 1, 1991 report demonstrates Diman's commitment to service the special needs population of the district. Diman had enrolled 78 special needs students which equaled 26% of all newly enrolled students. This brought the total special needs population at Diman to 220 special needs students. This special needs population represents 20% of the total school population.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

Throughout the school year, academic departments have participated in a variety of activities. These student and teacher activities promote the philosophy and goals of Diman, and foster the intellectual growth of both the student body, as well as the faculty.

New Program: Chapter I Reading

The Academic Coordinator applied for and received \$56,169 to begin a Chapter I Reading Program. One teacher and an aide were hired. Students with the greatest need (36) were serviced and demonstrated a remarkable NCE average gain of 14.3.

ACTIVITIES

Activities at Diman include National Honor Society, Project Spotlight, Diman's newspaper "The Tradesman", Key Club, and VICA (Vocational Industrial Clubs of America).

First Annual Field Day

On June 15, 1992 Mrs. Jonsson and Mrs. Letendre conducted the First Annual Field Day with much success.

VOCATIONAL PROGRAMS

The 1991-92 school year proved to be a highly productive surpassing our goals and objectives. Diman's vocational programs have provided special services to both individual members of the district as well as the member communities.

Automotive Technology

Diman's Automotive Technology Program completed numerous repairs for the cities, towns and public including the maintenance of Diman's school buses.

Auto Body

The Auto Body Program was responsible for repairing a large number of vehicles which included those from the Public Works, Police and Fire Departments.

Building Maintenance Mechanic

The Building Maintenance program has done a remarkable job in keeping up with the hundreds of much needed repairs within the school building such as brick walls, doors, windows, etc.

Culinary Arts

Mr. Kerr is to be commended for his exceptional service to the community which included serving senior citizen groups, clubs, business, industry, various civic organizations and the general public.

Drafting

The Drafting students have been involved in several major projects and competitions.

Electrical

Our Electrical Department's attention focused on maintaining all the electrical services within our facility along with installing new equipment and the 1991-92 house built by Diman students.

Electronics Technology

Diman's Electronics shop repaired the school's VCRs, televisions, and some of our audio-visual equipment.

General Shop

Fifteen 502.4 students were admitted into this program and 12 were placed into various shops. Eight students received a modified curriculum while four have been mainstreamed.

Graphic Arts

The Graphic Arts department has been upgraded with six computers, high resolution printers, and major updated computer programs. All instructors are receiving special training. New light tables were purchased for the 1991-92 school year.

Graphic Arts students have completed hundreds of jobs needed for the day-to-day operations of the school and special projects for the communities and non-profit organizations.

Health Careers

Diman's Health Careers Program has much to be proud of affiliating with local hospitals and nursing homes.

Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning

The year 1992 witnessed the first graduating class in HVAC. Of the graduating students, 77.7% were placed in jobs. Numerous maintenance and installation jobs were completed with a savings of thousands of dollars to the school district.

Housebuilding Program

Diman held its twentieth Open House on June 14, 1992 in Somerset, at 190 Williamson Drive (Prospect Heights). The house was built by students from the construction cluster of shops (carpentry, electrical, plumbing, painting and decorating, and metal fabrication). The O'Donnell family was extremely grateful and pleased with the final results and efforts expended by Diman personnel, particularly Mr. Gerald Barboza, outside coordinator.

Mill Carpentry

Students built and installed cabinets and wardrobe units for all of the five new classrooms and the electric shop related room as well. Many specialty projects were constructed for the district communities, public schools, and non-profit organizations.

Machine Shop

The Machine Shop program strongly supported all shops' efforts to maintain their equipment by repairing old equipment and manufacturing parts to keep them running. Hundreds of jobs were completed with thousands of dollars in savings to the district.

Metal Fabrication & Welding

The Metal Fab shop completed many maintenance jobs for the school such as student desks, cafeteria tables, outside railings, vent systems for House & Mill Carpentry, exhaust systems for the Metal

Fab shop and the air system for the 1992 house. Many repairs and construction projects were completed for the Mass. Department of Public Works and Fall River Public Works.

Painting & Decorating

Students completed numerous jobs for the school district and communities--several city signs, refinishing of cabinets, posters, repainting of offices, classrooms, faculty rooms, and staining or varnishing areas within the school.

Plumbing

The Plumbing program was utilized to its maximum by plumbing a complete house, installing back flow prevention systems in the school, renovating the men's and ladies' rooms by the Tea Room for handicapped and field house bathrooms, and making numerous in school repairs.

Outstanding Achievement Award

On July 1 of 1992 Dennis Abdow was honored at a luncheon held in Fitchburg as Massachusetts Outstanding Administrator for his outstanding achievements. The award was presented by Mr. David Cronin, Associate Commissioner, Division of Occupational Education, Massachusetts Department of Education.

Junior Achievement

Fourteen of Diman's students participated in the Junior Achievement Night Time Program.

The enrollment as of October 1, 1991 for the L.P.N. program was 51 students with 39 completing the program and graduating in June. The tuition rate was set at \$4,000 and continues to support the operation of the program.

EVENING SCHOOL

In our effort to serve our adult community we continue to offer programs that are not only educational but provide for a career change. A total of 329 adults participated in our evening school for the 1991-92 school year enrolled in the following programs-

Journeyman Electric Code, Journeyman Plumbing Code, Electrical Code Update, Fireman First Class, Fireman Second Class, Arc Welding, Heating & Air Conditioning, Engineer Third Class, and Machine Shop.

GRADUATION

Our graduation ceremonies awarded 241 diplomas to the Class of 1992. Dr. Joseph Deck, Chancellor of the University of Massachusetts-Dartmouth was the main speaker.

RETIREMENTS

The following members of the Diman family retired in the 1991-92 school year: Charlotte Oliveira, cafeteria worker, Roland Hebert, custodian, and George Pouliot, school bus maintenance instructor.

GRANTS

Diman applied for and received funding for various grants which totalled \$373,748. Diman also received grants for:

1) The Summer Exploratory Program (\$49,541) provided an occupational opportunity for 8th grade students from the district to learn more about vocational education and thus enable them to have a better understanding of career choices.

2) The Special Needs 94-142 Grant (\$61,710) enabled Diman to institute a shop related tutorial program and purchase the services of two special needs teachers which were needed to provide direct student services.

3) The Education Consolidation and Improvement Grant (\$12,090) purchased textbooks to upgrade Diman's academic programs.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HARBORMASTER & STATE LAUNCH RAMP

The 1992 Boating season was unusually different from most years of bad weather, a sluggish economy and the after effects of 1991 Hurricane Bob. Transient boating traffic was noticeably off but permanent mooring and docking activity was within 3% of previous years.

Due to budget cuts (from \$33,000 to \$23,000) service was reduced to the boating public from June 28th through September 7, 1992, resulting in increased speed and wake conditions in the slow/no wake zones and around marinas. Also, no Harbormaster services will be provided for March of 1993. It is hoped that some of these services can be restored over the next several years because the boaters are paying enough through boat excise taxes and user fees to warrant such services. Approximately 1/3 less patrolling was done because of these budget cuts (200 engine hours rather than the normal 300 engine hours).

Revenues collected were within 3% of previous years and were as follows:

The Harbormaster Boat was called on (76) times between May and December 1992 for assistance. The 200 HP main engine Power Head was rebuilt, free of charge by Bayside Marine at the 760 Hour mark, even though it was beyond warranty. The 22' boat's engine (150hp) is still hanging on by a thread and its outlook is day to day. This engine runs the Boat Pumpout vessel which performed pumping duties from June 25 through September 22, 1992. As in 1991, Ocean Arks of Marion took all boat pumpout waste from our pumpout boat free of charge.

A 3,000 gallon pumpout holding tank was sighted at the Route 88 Launch Ramp in July of 92. This tank was funded by a \$2,695 Grant from the Buzzards Bay Project and should help ensure keeping disposal costs as low as possible in the future.

A 50 foot sunken wreck that was a menace to navigation (for 4 years) was removed by the Division of Waterways at an expense of \$18,000. It took four years but we finally got it removed at no expense to the Town. Also, through requests from the

Harbormaster Department and other Town Departments, the causeway to Gooseberry Island was repaved and opened for emergency use and eventually to all traffic at no expense to the Town.

Jack Sheppard at a meeting in late November 92, with the Harbormaster, gave a verbal commitment to rebuild the Route 88 State Boat Ramp (probably within 3 years) at a cost of up to \$200,000 to be paid for from his Public Access Board budget. This has taken 5 plus years but it is finally moving forward.

Thanks should be given to Rep. Ed Lambert's and Sen. Thomas Norton's offices for their help in this project.

Equipment needs for the future must include engine replacements for both boats and a separate article will be on the Town meeting warrant that will ask for monies from the Municipal Waterways Fund to provide for some of this equipment.

As Harbormaster, I believe that Boat Excise Taxes (Municipal Waterways Funds in particular) should be used for the equipment needs of water-related rescue & law enforcement boats, harbor maintenance projects and channel and navigational aids.

Hopefully, the 1993 Boating Season will be better than 1992 and special thanks to my assistants, Roger Reed, Jonathan Paul, Everett Mills and Ron Berube and Kitty in the Accounting Office and all the other Town Hall employees who help make my job easier.

We have instituted a preventive maintenance program which we hope will curtail future maintenance emergencies.

We have upgraded our maintenance capabilities also with the addition of a new tractor. Although we feel that the maintenance man has done an outstanding job keeping up the appearance of the facility, we, as a board, feel that there is a need for constant upgrading of the facilities in order to make Greenwood Terrace a more enjoyable place to live.

Under the direction and guidance of Sandra Keighley, our Executive Director, we have been able to improve the present facilities and have a constant working relationship with the staff.

Eligibility Requirements:

You must be 62 years or older and/or physically handicapped. Your income cannot exceed \$17,080. for one person, \$19,520. for two.

Your assets may not exceed \$15,000.

Greenwood Terrace is a seven-building, 48-unit complex; each unit consists of two rooms and bathroom; one room is a bedroom and the second room is a combination of kitchen-living room. When this complex was completed, four units were designated as handicapped accessible. Due to the change in the handicapped accessibility law, we plan to upgrade these units to conform with this law.

Once again the Authority would like to express its gratitude to everyone who has participated in making Greenwood Terrace the outstanding Elderly Complex it is today.

We were sorry to lose the services of two of our long-time trustees this year. Edwina Cronin did not seek re-election, and Octave Pelletier resigned in December because of the increasing amount of time he was spending out of Westport. We will miss both of them, but we are happy to welcome Annamarie Towne who was elected in March.

The circulation in calendar year 1992 was 85,085, up from 75,498 in 1991. The circulation in 1987 was 57,582. This shows an increase in five years of 48% with no concomitant increase in staff. At this time our staffing is insufficient to adequately meet the needs of the library users, especially at peak times. Without the computer, I daresay it would be nearly impossible.

The budget again was an overriding concern. Our initial cut for FY'93 was 13%. This brought our budget below the level needed to meet the FY'93 Municipal Appropriation Requirement, which is a mandatory level set by the state for library certification. Without certification a library loses state appropriated money (for us, this year, it would have been a loss of \$10,950), it loses the ability to apply for state and federal grants, and could possibly lose the ability for patrons to borrow books from other public libraries in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. We apprised the Finance Committee of this predicament, and it was most fortunate that they were able to transfer \$4,760 to the library. This made our budget cut only 10% and was enough to enable us to maintain our eligibility for certification for at least another year. The state fortunately realizes that towns have budget problems and has temporarily lowered its standards for certification.

Meanwhile to augment our income the library launched an adopt-a-book and adopt-a-magazine scheme, wherein individual patrons donated the money to pay for a specific book or magazine subscription. This was started in July of 1992 and in the next six months \$665.99 was given for magazines and \$1,787.55 for books. We are most grateful to all the patrons who have been so generous.

We were also able to continue our ever popular children's programs with the help of the Westport Arts Council. They supported two presentations: in March, a story teller, Marc Joel Levitt, who entertained 150 children and adults; and a return visit in August from David Zucker, whose presentation of "Poetry in Motion" was enjoyed by a similar group of 100. In October Marcia Sewall, a Boston children's author/illustrator, presented a program for about 100 children and parents on children's book illustration techniques. This was funded by the Helen E. Ellis Trust Fund.

At their annual meeting in November the Friends of the Westport Library presented Elizabeth Acheson who spoke on the whole language method of learning to read and write. The Friends also continue to support us with generous gifts of books and supplies.

The trustees and staff of the Westport Free Public Library want our library to be the best that it can be in serving the needs of the people of Westport. The trustees, library director, and assistant library director, therefore, have formed a committee to evaluate our strengths and weaknesses, to find out what our needs are and to set both short and long-term goals to meet them. We are examining all phases of our operation including the physical plant, the staff and materials, as well as such things as our written policies and by-laws, the role of the trustee, and last, but not least, funding. When these needs are established we will incorporate them into a 5-year plan which will be reviewed annually.

With this clearly developed plan for library service it is hoped that the Westport Free Public Library will be as successful in its second century as it was in its first.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MODERATOR

I am pleased to submit my First Annual Report as Moderator of the Town of Westport.

During the calendar year of 1992, the Town elected a new Moderator due to the retirement of Bradford W. Sherman, who did not seek re-election after eighteen years. I would like to thank him for the years of service he gave to the Town and wish him success in his future endeavors.

The following actions were taken by Moderator Sherman in 1992, before the expiration of his term of office.

He accepted with regret, the resignation of Mr. Richard P. Carlson, who served on the Finance Committee for almost nine years. Mr. Carlson was a valuable member to the Committee and will be surely missed.

He also made two appointments to the Finance Committee; Mrs. Veronica F. Beaulieu of Kirby Road who replaced Mr. Borden C. Tripp, term expires June 30, 1994, and Mr. George Costa of Old County Road who replaced Mr. Richard P. Carlson, term expires June 30, 1992.

After the election of April 13, 1992, I presided at all Town Meetings, attended my first Annual Meeting of the Massachusetts Moderators' Association, and made appointments and reappointments to the Finance Committee.

TOWN MEETINGS

During the year, the Town held four Town Meetings; the Annual of June 9, the Special of June 9, the Special of September 29, and the Special of December 15.

I am grateful to all, for making these meetings a success.

I would especially like to mention the Special Town Meeting of September 29. This meeting had the largest attendance of any Town Meeting in the history of the Town of Westport with 1562 registered voters (1571 with Officials and Press).

The meeting was held in three rooms to provide adequate seating. In order for each room to be in communication with the other, United Video Cablevision provided us with split screen viewing and a three way public address/speaker system. Ham Operators volunteered their services to keep the Moderator in communication with the two Assistant Moderators.

The Meeting required adequate staffing of Police, EMTs, Pollworkers, and Tellers. The Meeting included the cooperation of all Town Departments, bus and baby-sitting service and extra handicapped parking. All of these and many other elements added to the success of the meeting.

Many contributed to the efforts of the evening. It would be difficult to thank everyone individually. However, I will extend my special thanks to Mrs. Charlene Wood of the Selectmen's Office and Mrs. Wilma Woodruff of the Registrars Office, whom I worked with very closely to coordinate the events of the evening. Many thanks to Mr. Harold E. Lawton, Jr. and Mr. Robert A. Young, the two Assistant Moderators as well as the many tellers who performed their duties with excellence.

We met the challenges of the evening to provide maximum seating in a safe environment as well as every voters right to listen and be heard.

Due to the large attendance and unusual circumstances of one of the articles on this warrant, I decided to call a Paper Ballot to ensure the security, accuracy, and confidentiality of the counted vote. I thank the voters for their patience that evening.

MASSACHUSETTS MODERATORS' ASSOCIATION

I attended my first meeting of the Association accompanied by Vice Chairman Woodruff and Secretary Holden of the Finance Committee. I invited two members of the Finance Committee to gain insight into Town Meeting procedure. We found the meeting to be very helpful as Moderators from all over the Commonwealth discussed many items which effect our duties as Moderators. Many towns face the same concerns and most deal with them in similar fashion. We all came away with the feeling that the meeting was well worth our attendance and I will continue the practice of inviting other members of the Finance Committee every year.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

During the year, I acted on the following, regarding the Finance Committee, whom the Moderator appoints.

First, my own election as Moderator created a vacancy where I served for almost five years. Second, I accepted with regret, the resignation of Mr. Harold E. Lawton, Jr. from the Finance Committee. Mr. Lawton has served with distinction for many years.

I appointed to a three year term, Mr. John J. Baughan of River Road whom replaced myself, term expires June 30, 1995 and to a

two year term, Mr. Richard E. Huczek of Gifford Road whom replaced Mr. Lawton, term expires June 30, 1994.

I re-appointed to his fifth consecutive three year term, Mr. James E. Britland, Jr. of Gifford Road, term expires June 30, 1995 and to a three year term Mr. George Costa of Old County Road, term expires June 30, 1995.

Member Jean Paul Desrosiers, who was appointed on 11/25/91 to fill a vacancy, served until the April 1992 elections. Daniel George served as Chairman until 4/22/92.

The Board meets in the Planning Board room at the Town Hall every other Monday at 7:00 p.m.

During the past year, the Board held 35 meetings. The Board held 8 public hearings to consider 8 proposed subdivisions. Of said 8 subdivisions, 7 were approved creating a total of 17 new lots, one of which was a revision and created no new lots; and 1 subdivision creating 6 lots is pending as of this date. Another revised subdivision which created no new lots was approved, the hearing for which plan was held in 1991.

Four applications for preliminary subdivisions were received. Two of said preliminary plans were subsequently withdrawn; one was approved and evolved into a definitive plan as included hereinabove; and one was disapproved for the reason that it proposed a secondary road to serve as access for more than 4 dwelling units.

The Board received 20 plans for division of land where subdivision approval was not required, which plans created a total of 24 new lots. Of the 20 plans, 2 were revisions to existing lots, 6 were for purposes of annexing parcels to adjoining land, 1 was a re-endorsement due to the lapse of the six month recording period, and 1 was deemed to require approval under the Subdivision Control Law.

Timothy Gillespie served on the Solid Waste Committee. John Montano served on the Historical Commission and Fair Housing Committee.

In July the Board applied to the Executive Office of Communities and Development for a grant under the Municipal Strategic Planning Program. 146 communities applied for the grant, and the Town, which received an \$18,000 grant, was one of 18 such communities which succeeded in receiving an award.

SHELLFISH DEPARTMENT

Once again the Town's Shellfish areas were hit hard by closures due to high fecal bacteria counts and indications are that the problem is not getting better. This past December, the Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF) put a seasonal opening on approximately half the estuary. It allows shellfishing to take place between December 30 and March 15 without any closures due to rain. The area specifically is: portions of the East Branch from Julius Way to the signs on Gunning Island to Pettey Heights Lane at the signs and southerly to the Route 88 bridge including the Let and Fisherville Lane; portions of the West Branch from Canoe Rock to 1785A Scotch Pine Lane northerly to 370 River Road and Grasshopper Point. This excludes the inner most part of Hicks Cove. This is not the cure to the problem, and once again is a temporary fix to the problem. The land pollution is finding its way into the water. There may be some regulations coming in the next few months to help with the problems but they will have to be maintained carefully if they are to have enough impact on the river to open more shellfish beds. This should be a positive step in the right direction.

Our shellfish efforts in the contaminated relay area worked well this year with a different twist. We used volunteers and staff to move approximately 800 bushels of oysters into a normally open portion of the East Branch. Much THANKS to the commercial and recreational people who helped dig and transplant this valuable resource to enable an oyster harvest later that year. We will be doing it again in the spring.

Quahogs this year again were over 1,000,000 and the growth rate was very good. Our success with this program enhancing areas around the river is working well. The 1993 planting may not be as large due to budget cuts. These quahogs should be harvestable within two to five years.

The scallop project this past year, in my estimation, is probably a direct reflection on this winter's crop. A crop which was a lot larger than anticipated although not rivaling any of the large past crops. We may be trying a little different approach this coming season and put an all out drive to increase the amounts of seed scallops in the estuary from existing seed stocks.

This year the DMF in Sandwich and Newburyport rejected approximately 500 bushels of soft shell clams. Our Shellfish Department was able to get these clams with help from the Highway Department. We planted them in closed areas around the river until they depurated sufficiently enough to meet federal meat

standards. It's our intent to continue such programs when they become available.

I want to thank all of the people and organizations throughout town who were instrumental in helping the Shellfish Department provide another successful year for all the shellfishermen.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL STUDY COMMITTEE

The Solid Waste Disposal Study Committee submits the following report for the year of 1992.

The committee wishes to express gratitude to Alvin Norcross, who resigned in 1992, for his faithful and productive service on the SWDSC since 1988 and the Recycling Subcommittee since its inception. Gregory Barnes was added as an alternate, and, when the committee created the position of Solid Waste Coordinator, he was appointed as such. Veronica Beaulieu became the representative of the Finance Committee replacing Michael Rodrigues. Alternate Member Rhoda Sheehan became a Member-At-Large.

The SWDSC and some former members worked closely with the Board of Health and the Director of Public Health to achieve mutual goals in the field of solid waste. Todd Cormier, Al Norcross, and Gregory Barnes (as Solid Waste Coordinator) worked for several months with the Public Health Director and the Health Board to create the volume-based fee system, a first step in the long process of landfill closure. Detailed flyers announcing the landfill fees (effective 1/2/93) and the recycling and composting program were distributed in a town-wide mailing to residences.

In June 1992, the SWDSC and the SWDSC Master Plan Subcommittee released the Westport Solid Waste Management Master Plan. The Master Plan Subcommittee Chairman, Todd Cormier, worked with Alvin Norcross and Gregory Barnes on this sizeable project. After input from public hearings, the developed plan was voted out by the SWDSC and forwarded to the Board of Health to be available to the public.

The SWDSC lost the position of Recycling Monitor in 1992 because of budgetary constraints. However, the position was restored under the Board of Health budget, assisted by a balance

available in the SWDSC budget, and the SWDSC paid for oil disposal at the 1992 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day.

In 1992, three major goals of the committee were realized: the collection of tires and drain oil at the landfill for recycling began, with fee receipts offsetting disposal costs. Then, through a state grant written by the Director of Public Health, the Town received two 40-cu.yd. rolloff containers for the transportation of recyclable glass. In summary, \$1,263 was received for 158 net tons of scrap metal picked up in 1992, \$35 for 3302 pounds of Town Hall office paper, and \$136 for 21790 pounds of #2 plastics. Recycled were over 2420 pounds of loose corrugated, 16.5 tons of glass, and truck loads of newspaper removed every few weeks by Westport farmers for cow bedding and composting.

The committee thanks Ms. Leila Gillespie's Cub Scout Pack No. 5, which built three large work tables to assist in the glass sorting at the recycling center and Tim Gillespie, who contributed materials and labor. Finally, the committee appreciates the Ron Desrosier Memorial Fund contribution of \$500 towards the engineering of a new site for the recycling center and/or potential transfer station.

Goals for the coming year 1993 include the following: (1) Find the most cost effective and environmentally sound method for Westport's solid waste disposal for the future, following the closure of our landfill; and (2) Continue enhancement of our recycling and composting programs.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL PLANNING AND ECONOMIC
DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SRPEDD)

The Southeastern Regional Planning and Economic Development District continued to serve the Town of Westport during 1992. SRPEDD (pronounced sir-ped) is a locally run regional agency serving southeastern Massachusetts.

It continues to be a difficult period for local government in Massachusetts, with the fiscal crisis and the economic recession providing double trouble for the region. We spent a considerable part of 1992 on these two issues, working on regional approaches to both problems.

During the past year, the Town of Westport was represented on the SRPEDD Commission by Romeo Fortin and Timothy Gillespie. The Joint Transportation Planning Group representative was Paul Pereira and James Morton as alternate.

Some of SRPEDD's more significant accomplishments in 1992 were:

- * Completion and certification of the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) which set regional priorities on federal and state grants for transportation and economic development projects.
- * Staffing of the South Eastern Economic Development (SEED) Corporation, which makes loans to small businesses for expansion. In 1992, SEED approved loans to 15 small businesses in the amount \$2 million. These loans are projected to create 87 new jobs and will result in the investment of over \$3.5 million from private sources.
- * SRPEDD reviewed the environmental impact of larger development projects in the region to insure that potential harmful impacts will be addressed. This year, we reviewed 28 such projects, commenting on the impact on traffic, water supply, sewage disposal, wetlands, and other development-related issues.
- * 13 applications for federal and state funds were reviewed to insure consistency with other plans and efficient use of public funds.
- * SRPEDD conducts a district-wide traffic counting program and maintains a computer file of all available

traffic count data for the period 1980 to the present throughout the region.

- * SRPEDD worked with both GATRA and SRTA on issues such as route evaluations, marketing, service to elderly and handicapped persons and overall data compilation and analysis.
- * SRPEDD continues to provide computerized accident filing for 13 towns and has provided pavement management assistance to 6 towns.
- * Under contract to Boston Edison, SRPEDD organized the third Earthlab Conference held at Bridgewater State College in November.
- * SRPEDD organized a regional economic development coordinating effort in Bristol & Plymouth Counties called the Massasoit Compact.
- * SRPEDD participates actively with the Buzzards Bay Project in the multi-agency effort to clean up and preserve Buzzards Bay.
- * SRPEDD set up a new Data Center to coordinate information gathering and dissemination to the public. Its first task was to update the Southeastern Massachusetts Fact Book, which contains data on all aspects of the region.
- * After an absence of several years, the municipal assistance program was resumed in 1992. The principal activities are a reference library of municipal zoning and land use regulations, a catalogue of state grant programs and a municipal advice workshop to be held in the spring 1993.
- * SRPEDD worked with the Massachusetts Office of Technical Assistance (OTA) to establish a Southeastern Massachusetts Source Reduction Advisory Committee. This committee is made up of representatives from fifteen local businesses and three Chambers of Commerce and will address industrial use and production of hazardous materials in the manufacturing process.
- * SRPEDD is undertaking the development of a regional multi-modal transportation plan which is mandated by the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA).
- * Under development is a regionwide travel demand model

which will simulate traffic conditions into the 21st century.

- * SRPEDD obtained in 1992 a Geographic Information System which greatly enhances our ability to manipulate data and produce thematic maps.
- * SRPEDD started a project to assist thirteen towns to develop an economic development strategy. The project will examine current economic conditions, attitudes towards business, local zoning and land use regulations, and development policies.

We look forward to serving in 1993.

TOWN BEACH REPORT

The Westport Town Beaches were patrolled by four full-time lifeguards and one part-time lifeguard. All lifeguards are certified in lifesaving, first aid and CPR. Our duties include patrolling Cherry & Webb Beach (seven days a week) and East Beach (on weekends). The Town Beach lifeguards are also responsible for cleaning the beaches and the beach parking lots.

Portable radios allowed us to communicate with the police and ambulance in case of emergency.

The Highway Department provided us with a vehicle to get to the beach or from the beach to the street quickly in case of emergency. The vehicle was also used to pick up beach trash. The garbage is put into a dumpster located at the Cherry & Webb parking lot.

Two port-o-johns are provided by the Beach Department. One is located at the Cherry & Webb parking lot and the other is located at the East Beach parking lot.

1992 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TOWN FARM

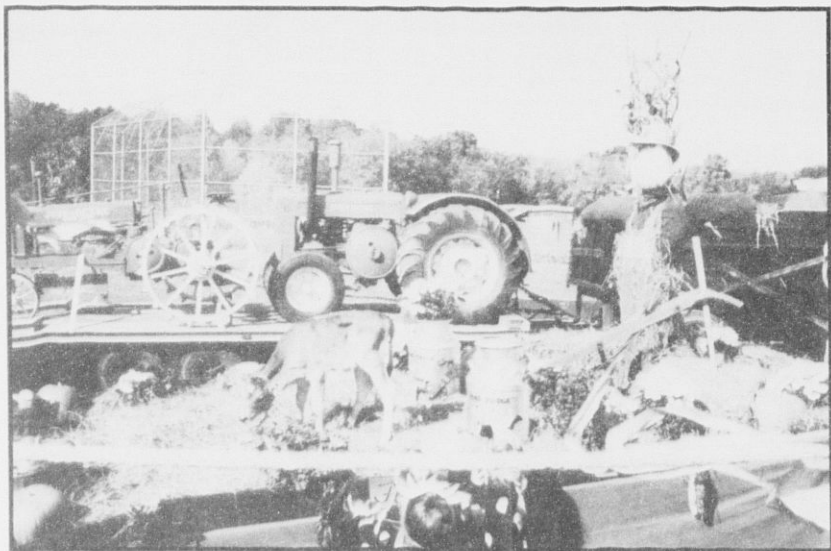

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Regular meetings are usually held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month and are open to the public. Each agenda opens with a "Comments and Statements from the Public" opportunity for parents and interested parties to express their concerns or to have questions answered.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION OFFICES

The School Administration Offices are open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. daily through the school year. Summer and school vacation hours are 8:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M.

NO SCHOOL ANNOUNCEMENTS

If there are no "No School" days because of weather conditions or other emergencies, the 1992-1993 school year will end on June 23, 1992.

It is the policy of the School Department to issue no school bulletins or announcements through radio stations: WSAR, WBSM, WALE, WPRO, WHJJ, WHIM, WHDH, WBBF, WJFD-FM, and TV stations Channel 10 and Channel 12, whenever driving conditions are, or seem likely to be dangerous. On doubtful mornings, the family radio should be turned to one of the above stations for the no school announcements. Please depend upon your radio rather than your telephone for obtaining this information, as telephone lines have to be kept open. School may be cancelled during school hours due to inclement weather or emergencies. Parents should make provisions accordingly.

Parents must use their own judgment in regards to whether it is suitable for their children to attend school in stormy weather.

ADMISSION TO THE SCHOOLS

Initial admission of kindergarten and grade one children is based solely on chronological age. Children who will become five years of age before October 1 are eligible for kindergarten in September of that school year. Children who will become six years of age before January 1 are eligible for grade one in September of that school year.

A vaccination certificate for immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, measles and polio must be presented to the school when the student enters for the first time, unless the child is exempted for medical or religious reasons.

A birth certificate must be presented by those pupils whose births were recorded outside of Westport.

WESTPORT COMMUNITY SCHOOLS
REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The Community can be justly proud of the effort being made in the Westport Schools to increase student achievement and to restructure the operations of the system to bring more direct service to students than ever before. Since our report last year we have continued to

- train teachers in new techniques and the new knowledge base for teaching and learning
- improve the physical environment of the schools through major renovation projects and interior improvements
- increase parent communication through more active parent organizations
- transition many of our offices and systems procedures to a computerized format
- focus on issues of school improvement in all aspects of our operations.

Under the direction of a pro active School Committee and with the help of teachers, parents, and community members, we completed a strategic plan for school improvement. The plan contains goals for the next five years. We point to the publication on the plan entitled "Building a Learning Community" as their most significant benchmark in the community's schools in the past twenty years. We firmly believe that if we implement the plan's goals, every student in the school system will benefit through increased achievement.

Although we believe that we have succeeded in effecting a number of positive changes this past year, our expectations are that we will see more significant change and improvement in the coming year. We are always looking forward to higher expectations for everyone. It is very clear that we have continued to take a positive and pro active attitude in spite of dwindling resources and lower budgets.

While we have absorbed the impact of fiscal constraints, the schools will clearly need an infusion of funding over the next five years, if we want to maintain a viable K-12 school system. We want to continue to serve the students of the community by preparing them for 21st century careers, and to accomplish this goal, we must complete the task of replacing the old tools of learning with the technological information systems that are required to survive and prosper in a 21st century world. To do this will require a substantial investment in technology and teacher retraining. We began that process this year and we look for community support to continue the process.

The individual school reports that follow will provide you with an overview of our school level accomplishments. Each

school has implemented programs to bring parents closer to their school, each school has improved their curriculum through the purchase of new texts and materials, and each school staff has focused on student achievement. The Business Manager's report shows that we have also continued to aggressively seek grant funds to supplement many school services and have implemented cost savings measures in several operational areas.

The community can take pride in the efforts of this school community to serve the larger community by improving the efficiency of our operations, by focusing more direct services to students, by increasing expectations for achievement, and by implementing learning programs that connect us more directly with the larger community.

PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES

During the past year, many improvements were made in order to organize and coordinate all of the Pupil Personnel Services to function as efficiently as possible. Guidance and Counseling Services, Health and Medical Services, Health Education, Summer Programs, and Special Education are provided to enhance the quality of the educational experience for Westport students and to prevent problems which might affect student health, safety, and school success.

Guidance and Counseling Services

Guidance counselors at all levels effectively organized the smooth, efficient building level implementation of the Massachusetts Educational Assessment Program, which was given to fourth, eighth, and twelfth graders in January and March, 1992. A significant change in the standardized testing program occurred with the a change to Fall administration of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills to students in grades 3-10. This change from Spring to Fall testing was made to provide teachers with more up-to-date information about their individual student's skills and abilities as early as possible in the school year. In each of the schools, counselors assumed responsibility for scheduling the testing sessions, the coordination of materials before and after testing sessions, and the dissemination of results to students and parents.

Counselors and school psychologists have effectively utilized teamwork whenever possible to improve the coordination and delivery of counseling services throughout the school system. The use of the team approach in dealing with crisis intervention and making referrals to various outside agencies has been refined

and expanded to include members of other helping professions wherever appropriate.

Health and Medical Services

Regularly scheduled staff meetings with the school nurses have continued to be very productive throughout 1992, resulting in the updating of the Medical Policy Handbook, and the development of new systemwide forms for Emergency information and Accident Reports. These meetings have helped to identify problem areas as well as improving communication and sharing ideas. Among the significant outcomes was the training provided to every school staff member in the proper "Universal Precautions" to be employed when someone is injured or ill. All staff members were also provided with latex gloves to be utilized when dealing with body fluids. Concern about disease prevention as well as the development of good student hygiene habits led the nurses to advocate for the placement of antibacterial soap dispensers in all lavatories and classrooms at the elementary level. The importance of proper handwashing was emphasized by teachers, as well as the nurses, and positive student outcomes were observable.

In addition to their work providing excellent health services during the school day for Westport students, all four of the school nurses voluntarily participated in evening meetings of the Westport Health and Human Services Advisory Council and actively assisted in the development of the policy for dealing with AIDS in the community.

Health Education

The comprehensive health education program was partially restored in 1992, with the appointment of a full-time health educator, Mrs. Beverly Hoag at Westport High School. In addition to regular classroom instruction in a variety of health areas, she has also been instrumental in planning special health-related programs and activities for the high school population.

Mrs. Constance Strauss, Middle School Health Educator, was appointed to the additional part-time position of system-wide Health Education Coordinator. She has served as a representative on the townwide AIDS Action Committee, and worked closely with Health Agent John Ciccotelli in the development of the Condom Availability Policy approved by both the School Committee and the Board of Health. This policy has since become a model for other area communities.

Substance abuse prevention programs continued to be coordinated with Westport Police Department staff under the auspices of the DARE program. Various other substance abuse

programs are partially funded by the Governors Alliance Against Drugs Grant, coordinated by Mrs. Strauss.

As an additional component of the health education program, all teachers and administrators at the Macomber Primary School and the Westport Elementary School were trained in August, 1992 in the QUEST Self-Esteem Program. Continued participation in this nationally recognized program was made possible through the generosity of the Westport Lions Club which furnished funding for classroom materials for all students in grades K-8.

Summer Programs

Under the able direction of newly appointed Summer School Director, Mr. Gerald Poisson, the Westport Community Schools Summer School Program provided classes at the Middle School in a variety of course offerings for approximately seventy students. Mr. Poisson also supervised a Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) Program at Westport High School, which was funded by a grant received through the Bristol County Training Consortium. Under this program, eleven Westport residents between the ages of 14 and 18, who met income guidelines, were employed for 8 weeks (June 29-August 21, 1992) in a variety of town departments and also participated in a school program focused on academic remediation and job skills in data processing.

Special Education

For 1992, the total number of special education students, 365, is slightly more than the 1991 end of year total of 358, but more of these students are spending considerable time mainstreamed into regular education classes. Out of district placements of Westport students in collaborative and private school programs were reduced to 20 as of December 1992. During the past school year, eight students were successfully integrated back into the Westport Schools (Two at Westport High, three at Westport Middle, one at Westport Elementary, and two at the Macomber). The hard work and dedication of Westport's professional staff members was the crucial ingredient in making the transition process work for every one of these students. The considerable tuition and transportation savings achieved would not have happened without their phenomenal team effort.

Special Education programs continued to be upgraded and improved during 1992. In line with both national and statewide efforts to promote the integration and inclusion of special education students in regular classroom programs, a number of new programs and procedures were put into place.

At the Macomber School, the newly integrated preschool program successfully provides an outstanding early school experience for thirty students. With a long waiting list of

students for the preschool, expansion of the Integrated preschool program to accommodate larger enrollment should take place as soon as possible. One of the first grade classrooms has also been transformed into an integrated classroom to meet the needs of children with significant language disabilities. These students are now learning along with other first graders who serve as language models. Special education, Chapter 1, and speech therapy services are all provided within this classroom, rather than pulling children out for services. In September, 1992, the Headstart Program located at the Macomber was expanded to a full day classroom program with a capacity of 18 students.

At the Westport Elementary School a Teacher Assistance Team has been established to implement a pilot pre-referral process designed to provide help for students within regular education programs. Fully integrated programming for severely handicapped students is also being successfully provided.

Middle school teachers have developed teams including both regular education and special education teachers in a variety of subject areas. These teams co-teach combined groups of regular and special education students for one or more periods each day.

High School special education students are succeeding in many more regular classroom settings, due to the expanded efforts of regular education teachers, special education teachers, and paraprofessionals in providing modifications and assistance. Computerized instruction in the writing process was also begun in 1992. Due to increased enrollment of special education students at the high school, Mrs. Joan Blake was appointed as a special education teacher in September, 1992.

A part-time Language Intervention Tutor/Consultant, Chris Ash, was added to the system-wide staff to provide mandated services to identified students with significant handicaps in the language area. A part-time Licensed Occupational Therapist, Terri Ferro was also appointed in late 1992, after a very lengthy search.

During the past year, considerable time and effort was expended by the Pupil Personnel Services Office in the process of seeking grant funds amounting to over \$160,000 and managing grant programs, once funding was received. Mrs. Lucille Bouchard, the PPS Clerk, organized separate files for each grant and willingly extended her responsibilities to include keeping track of bills, reports, and inquiries related to each of these programs. Without her able assistance, it would not have been possible to accomplish this success.

During 1992, Westport teachers participated in a variety of training opportunities. Many workshops were offered, with administrators, clerical staff, and paraprofessionals included

along with teachers. Computer courses were offered at the elementary, middle, and high school levels with each emphasizing the importance of using the newly purchased SPED computers as a learning bridge between regular and special education classes. Grant funding obtained through the Massachusetts Commonwealth Inservice Institute and a variety of other sources was also utilized to present courses related to Cooperative Learning Strategies, Peer Coaching for teachers, the Writing Process, Integration of Occupational Therapy Services in the classroom, and on Developmentally Appropriate Practices. Attendance levels in all of these courses were very high, and participants have requested additional offerings in areas related to the process of integration. Inclusion of paraprofessionals, parents, and interested community members will also be considered in the planning process for all upcoming staff development programs.

In addition to the many on-site workshops and courses offered, staff members were encouraged to utilize available grant funds to attend professional meetings and conferences in their subject and skill areas, as well as in the general areas of Integrating Regular and SPED Programs and Educational Restructuring. Most staff members who were able, for the first time in a number of years, to attend programs outside the school system found the opportunity very stimulating and said it helped to renew their enthusiasm for teaching and learning.

In April, 1992, a very well-attended workshop program, conducted by Dr. Robert Brooks on "Self-Esteem," was co-sponsored by the Special Education Parent Advisory Council (PAC), the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs, and the Middle School PTO. Utilizing grant funds of \$1,000 received for the 1991-92 School Year, the PAC also assembled a library of pamphlets, books, and audio/video tapes designed to help the parents of children with special needs. This collection is available to community members at the Westport Public Library.

In 1992, a task force chaired by the PPS Director began to the lengthy process of making major revisions of the discipline code and handbook for the school system. A committee was also established to investigate Westport's compliance with the newly enacted Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) in terms of handicapped accessibility. The work of these two groups will continue in 1993.

In addition to the areas mentioned in this report, the PPS Director and staff members have also taken an active role in a number of exciting system-wide school improvement projects, including the Strategic Planning Initiative and training in Outcome-based Education. With such a highly motivated and dedicated professional staff, the Westport Community Schools

will continue to maintain high expectations for the success of all students.

WESTPORT HIGH SCHOOL

Four hundred and seventy-two students are presently enrolled at the High School. There are thirty-five regular classroom teachers, two guidance counselors, and two administrators on the professional staff.

One hundred twelve seniors received their diplomas at graduation on June 7, 1992. Members of the graduating class received substantial scholarship and financial aid awards in some cases reaching up to twenty-one-thousand dollars per year. Thanks to community groups and local businessmen \$28,700 in scholarships were also awarded to graduating seniors.

Thirty-six of the graduating seniors are attending four year colleges, thirty-two are attending Junior Colleges and eleven are attending other Post Secondary Institutes, two joined the Military and thirty-one joined the work force.

Over sixty of the seniors took the Scholastic Aptitude test (SAT). The mean scores were:

Verbal Boys 435	Math Boys 505
Girls 405	Girls 449

We wish to recognize the following teachers for their dedication to the students of Westport High School over the years and wish them health and happiness over the years to come: Patricia Marujo (34 years), Raymond Ready (25 years), Joseph Szala (29 years), Merry Hurley (19 years), Betsey McDonald (7 years), Michael Burke (6 years).

This past year has been an extremely busy and significant one for the staff at Westport High School.

The High School is in its second year of its self-evaluation preparing for its accreditation through the New England Association of Schools and Colleges and its first year in creating school conditions for success in the Outcomes Driven Developmental Model.

The purpose of the N.E.A.S.C. process is dual ...evaluation and accreditation. Evaluation is process during which a school conducts a self study and then hosts a Commission Visiting Team which evaluates the school in terms of its stated goals and the Commission's Standards for Accreditation. Accreditation signifies that the school has met Commission standards, is willing and able to maintain those standards, and will improve its educational programs by implementing valid recommendations of the Commission's Visiting Committee. Member schools are required to conduct a comprehensive self-study and to host a Visiting Committee once every ten years.

The value of Accreditation may vary according to point of view. The taxpayer is assured that tax money is supporting a school facility and programs that have been judged worthwhile against a national standards. The reputation of the school and larger community benefits from accreditation since retention or the loss of accreditation has a demonstrable effect on property values. Dianne Rezendes and Louis Finucci were appointed co-chairs of the Westport High Accreditation Committee.

The High School ODDM Leadership Team is composed of seven teachers: Louis Finucci, Janice Migneault, Dianne Rezendes, Mary Anne McQuillan, David Allen, Donald McCabe, Harry Proudfoot and Principal Charles Menard.

The Leadership Team received two days of intensive training from Dr. John Champlin the Director of the National Center for Outcome Based Education in early September. The rationale, the beliefs, the research, the organization of the model were topics explained by Dr. Champlin. School teams which included all staff and teachers were organized by the school leadership team. In this way all members of High School family received ODDM training. In December the ODDM instructional model was presented by Seven Olson from the Juab School District, Nephi, Utah to the ODDM Leadership team. The entire teaching staff is presently being trained by the ODDM leadership teams in the instructional model.

In conjunction with the ODDM training, a Self-Esteem course is being presented by Dr. Milton Young to the entire school system. Twenty five High School staff members are enrolled in the Self-Esteem course. The course is designed to introduce staff to the concepts related to the building of healthy self-esteem. Staff examined a wide variety of programs and all constructed their own self-esteem programs.

Dave Moran from the Institute for Reality Therapy presented a workshop at the High School designed to teacher concepts of control theory and reality therapy. The workshop was held on two consecutive weekends (Friday afternoon, Saturday and Sunday) and was attended by Donald McCabe, David Allen, Edith LaBran, Robert

Wood, Manuel Cabral, and Charles Menard.

A full time health position replaced a physical education position. Grade ten and eleven students are assigned to health. Grade twelve now may elect family living and the health teacher is scheduled to a student drop in center to assist students who have personal problems or had been assigned by the school crisis team.

Westport High physical education policy meets state requirements despite the elimination of the physical education position. Grades 9 and 10 have physical education two days each six day period. Grades 11 and 12 may elect physical education or take one hour of physical education per term.

The High School daily schedule was changed from seven periods to six periods. The new schedule is a six day rotating into each block. The last period of the day is scheduled to meet from 12:43 to 1:58. The first 46 minutes is a regularly scheduled class period. The extra time is used for individual student help, projects, enrichment and make-ups. There are no regularly scheduled study halls for students and each teacher spends approximately an added 30 minutes a day teaching with the new schedule.

Mr. Frost was appointed to a full time music position at the High School. In the past only two music classes were scheduled. With the appointment of a full time teacher a sectional rehearsal class and two midi music lab classes were added. The electronic midi lab is designed to teach students the use of computers and synthesizers how to create, arrange and record their own music.

The Westport High School Band competed in Toronto, Canada with "Music in the Parks." The band competed in stage band and marching band event. They placed first in marching band and second in stage band. In the stage band competition student Brian Silvia won an award as outstanding Jazz soloist on the saxophone.

The great success of the band during this past year can be credited not only to Mr. Frost but the tremendous support of the Music Boosters, Mrs. Patricia Souza, Mrs. Cynthia Lavoie and all the Band Parents have been instrumental not only in the success of the band but also the growth of the music program.

Students continued to volunteer their time and service to agencies and schools in Westport. Over sixty seniors took part in the community service program. Community Learning a new program combining the Science Department (Environmental Science), the English Department and Computer Technology was introduced as a pilot program. Seventeen seniors followed a community based curriculum not only performing community service but using the

community as a learning laboratory.

The Westport High School Athletic Department enjoyed an excellent '91-92 campaign. Over one hundred and fifty young men and women were able to enjoy the enjoyment and challenges of Interscholastic Athletics at Westport High. The program offered competition at nine varsity level teams, 8 junior varsity level teams and one freshman level team. Westport High won its third consecutive Small School Division Soccer Championship, finished in second place in Volleyball, boys and Girls Basketball and Softball and had five State Tournament appearances. The athletic program continued to flourish due in great part to the continued support it received from the Athletic Boosters. All the Booster parents and presidents Dee Silvia and Louise Carvalho are to be commended for their service to the community.

The French Club under the advisor ship of French Teacher Mrs. Lynette Ouellette and Guidance Counselor Anthony Melli took students to the Winter Carnival in Quebec City. This four day trip was highlighted when they met President Nixon when visiting the Palais de Glace. President Nixon shook hands, spoke to the students and posed for pictures with students from the French Club.

Parents, students, staff and teachers through the Carnegie initiative continued to discuss and pass legislation. The Carnegie Senate and Assembly passed legislation raising the passing grade from 60 to 65, had input on proposed changes in the requirements for physical education, security in the school parking lots, dress code, student schedules, early dismissal for seniors, constitutional change that will allow two students to serve in the senate.

The Villager earned another high ranking award in national competition. They received a first place rating from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association at Columbia University, New York. The CSPS considers five major categories or divisions: coverage, writing and editing, design, hands on production, and business. Special accolades go to the Editor-In-Chief, Erica Kaiser and Villager Advisor, Harry Proudfoot.

Staff and students at the High School were limited by the number of night activities by the loss of the school generator in early February. The Drama Club, the Band, the Cheerleaders, class activities and the Sports program were all impacted.

Three teachers joined the High School staff. Anne Sebestyen who replaced Merry Hurley in English, Joan Blake, an additional Special Needs teacher and Beverly Hoag who will teach the reinstated health course.

All High School seniors took the Massachusetts Educational Assessment Program Test (MEAP). The test are broad ranging achievement tests in each subject area and consist of over 3,000 test items, including multiple choice and open ended questions. The test are given every two years on three levels, 7th, 8th, and 12th grade. The test is a curriculum assessment not a student assessment. At the 12th grade level, scores in reading, mathematics, science and social studies all fell within above the comparison score bands for similar communities. It was felt seniors had difficulty with the open ended questions because they had not gone through the writing process program that is now part of the Westport School System curriculum

As part of Polaroid's Project Enterprise Science Teacher Jane Dybowski and John Moniz are presently working on a project that involves forensics. Forensics is the use of biological and chemical techniques to solve crime-related problems such as murder. The object of the project is to acquaint students with techniques such as DNA fingerprinting, blood typing, human bone identifications and, more importantly the use of science techniques as a means of problem solving.

In closing, I would like to thank the staff, parents and students who gave freely of their time to help make this past year a successful one.

WESTPORT MIDDLE SCHOOL

The 1991-92 school year proved to be both productive and rewarding for students and faculty at the Westport Middle School.

During the school year, teachers and administrators were actively involved members of the various Westport Community Schools Strategic Planning Committees. This plan will serve as a guide during the restructuring years ahead.

Staff development continued to be a top priority. Teacher-training was ongoing within the framework of in-service programs, off-site professional development seminars and after-school course offerings. Numerous faculty members also participated in workshops during the Summer of 1992. The areas of training included skills development in heterogeneous grouping, cooperative learning, Outcomes Based Education, process writing, Great Books, self-esteem and integration.

Fred Gross, a Lucretia Crocker Fellow, has been working with our staff in the areas of individual student portfolio assessment and teaching mathematics to heterogeneously grouped students. He continues to be valued resource for our teachers.

We have updated our textbooks. Math books are from the Houghton-Mifflin Series and are part of coordinated 2 - 8 program. Silver Burdett and Ginn have been selected to improve our reading program and Holt, Rhinehart has been selected as our Language Arts texts. Our science program will have an updated text in the spring of 1993.

Students are participating in a variety of projects under the auspices of Project Enterprise. Some of the interdisciplinary projects include working with the Zeiterion Theatre, designing a playground and developing a bicycle path. The program is sponsored by the Polaroid Company and has stimulated a great deal of interest and enthusiasm among students and faculty.

Budget cuts resulted in a major change in the delivery of the English program. All teachers now teach a writing process based Language Arts class in addition to their regular teaching assignment. A teacher support group was formed to provide a forum for sharing ideas and concerns related to the new Language Arts program.

Our school system has contracted with the towns of Danvers and Randolph to share the costs of training staff members in the skill areas required for implementation of "Outcomes Based Education". Teacher-teams from each of the Westport Community Schools have been engaged in the training program which began in the fall of 1992.

The Westport Middle School was selected as a founding member of the Southeast Middle School Regional Alliance. Schools included in this history-making organization include Brockton, Norton, Barnstable, Hanover, Harwich, Mansfield, Raynham and the SMARTS Collaborative. The goal of the project is to provide the resources for teacher training and the sharing of ideas and resources among all member schools. Thus far, the process has been most productive. Through cooperative planning the experience should prove to be invaluable to us in the years ahead.

Additionally, a book fair, spaghetti supper and a "Thank You Social" for volunteers were also most successful. They all reflect the interest and dedication of our parents. We are most appreciative of their efforts and look forward to their continued support.

We continue to recognize students for their academic effort

and excellence in the classroom setting through honors assemblies and honors parties. Student Council fundraising has once again provided the resources to support our athletics program and various other student activities. One example of an activity sponsored by the Student Council is the successful trip to "Water Whiz" in Wareham, Ma. to which all students were involved.

Last May, our Drama Club was once again successful when it presented the production, "Long Live Rock and Roll". Mary Ann Goulart and Betty Shannessy served as co-advisors and we wish to commend them for their efforts.

Carrie Costa won the Spelling Been and represented our school in fine fashion at the Regional Spelling Bee held at Dartmouth High School.

Grade 8 students were once again given the opportunity to learn about Washington, D.C. and its history. They spent four exciting days under the supervision of Mr. Glenn Gardner and Mr. Andre Provost who served as co-advisors for the trip. Janice Baker, teacher of grades 7 and 8 Science, and Evelyn Rivet who will teach Reading in grades 7 & 8 are the two new members of our staff.

We are in the second year of restructuring - and by all indications, the Westport Community Schools have been very successful in moving into a new positive direction, a direction which will make our schools compatible to the changes necessary to be successful in the 21st century.

I. Students: The enrollment at WES continues to run at approximately 600 students in grades 2-5. We have 6 homerooms at

each grade-level, with class size ranging from 20 to 28 students.

Activities: Some WES student programs include:

- After school activities (newspaper, computer, art, music, phys. ed., science, etc.)
- Book Buddies (with Macomber)

II. Staff: It is refreshing to see that WES personnel is engaged in a wide variety of training programs this year. Some include:

- F. Other: Project QUEST (self-esteem)

- Heterogeneous grouping for all classes
- Cooperative Learning
- Writing/Reading Process
- Teacher Exchange: sharing ideas that "extend" basic curriculum
- Team Teaching

V. Physical Plant: The current custodial staff continues to make significant strides in improving the atmosphere at WES. Painting projects, floor-way problems, and other building issues are being addressed. In addition, our White Pine Environmental Center has been cleared, and is ready to be utilized again by our staff.

VI. Parent Participation: We continue to encourage positive school/parent relations. Parent involvement continues to be a significant goal of our school. Current activities include:

- WESMAC P.T.O. (WES & Mac parents and teachers)
- Parent Volunteers (we have over 50 parents who assist at WES on a weekly basis)
- School Climate Committee
- Parent Advisory Council (Chapter I)

VII. Community: WES continues to extend our "education" into this most valuable resource. Some of the specifics include the following:

- Project Enterprise (Sandra Wellens - working for Polaroid- has organized school/community projects involving our students)
- Dr. Elizabeth Acheson - a retired English Professor from Rhode Island College - works closely with WES staff on "While Language" approach.
- Guest Reader Program
- Community Visitors (areas, such as handicapped awareness, farming, fishing, dentistry, etc.)
- Community Service (WHS) Students come to WES to assist in various areas of the school operations
- Harvest Festival

In closing, I would like to thank the School Committee, the Central Office Administration, the WES staff, the other Community Schools, parents, and students for their cooperation. We will always continue to strive for excellence in education.

ALICE A. MACOMBER PRIMARY SCHOOL

I am pleased to report a synopsis of the year's most significant accomplishments at the Macomber School.

We welcome both Mrs. Jane Dufault, serving as an Integrated Arts teacher and Mrs. Joanne Morris, serving in the absence of Miss Linda Stafford, Grade One teacher. Mrs. Janice Piexoto continues in the role as substitute SPED Paraprofessional in the absence of Mrs. Luann Paulls. The Macomber School has been impacted by the loss, through staff reduction of Mrs. Marcie Grant, Educational Diagnostician.

Our Headstart program, staffed by Mrs. Sharon Gonsalves,

Mrs. Kathy Medeiros, and Mrs. Claudette Rusin, has expanded to include a full-day program which is in session Tuesdays through Fridays in addition to the Home Base component established in September, 1991. Both programs are fully enrolled, but we invite your requests for fall, 1993 registrations.

Macomber's integrated preschool, also at capacity enrollment is currently participating in a validation program through the National Academy of Early Childhood Programs in Washington, D.C. The joint preschool and Headstart staffs have been the recipients of a significant staff development through a collaborative Department of Education grant with two area communities, leading to preparation for the voluntary program validation.

Westport has been selected as a standardization site for research being conducted at the University of Michigan on a recently published screening process, the Early Screening Inventory for three, four, and five year old entering students. Staff training as well as complete screening materials have been provided free of charge to our community for our participation in this study.

Our pre-referral child study team continues to meet to consider individual student needs and has successfully provided program modifications or critical preventative early intervention services to enhance student success.

Mrs. Inge DeFusco, first grade teacher and Mrs. Marcia McOsler are team teaching a Language Integrated First Grade Program. In this effective teaming model, students with identified individual educational plans for language development concerns and their peers receive integrated instruction in a developmentally appropriate setting, focusing on extensive language development activities, using a variety of instructional techniques.

Macomber's ongoing school business partnership with Lees is expanding to include joint activities coordinated with the Westport Community Schools' link to Polaroid Corporation's Project Enterprise.

In the area of curriculum, our staff has dedicated itself to the implementation of the developmental math approach and Quest program. Our Quest committee, composed of parents and teachers, meetings to share aspects of the program, and met regularly to exchange ideas on how to maintain a positive learning climate in our school.

Our playground improvement project has been an example of dedicated community and parental support. Building on the architectural "dreams" of our students for the ideal play space,

professional blueprints were drawn and dedicated, along with construction services, materials, and time to the expansion of the current play area to expand access and age appropriateness.

Our Visiting Reader program, initiated last year continues to prosper by expanding its circle of readers. The value of this volunteer program to both the readers and children is immeasurable.

It is with continued pride that I commend the Macomber School family for making our school a "great place to learn"-from the well-maintained physical plant to a high level of caring and dedication to the improvement of our programs.
