Began to Perambulate, and divide the highway that was formerly laid out in the year 1718. from the North East corner of Robert Furby's homestead, northerly up to the head line of the town, & southerly down to the sea shore. —

Which said highway by an Act of the General Court, passed, in the year 1787, is established as a boundary line, between the towns of Dartmouth and Westport, and to be amended, and kept in repair by each town in proportion, with the tax No 5. —

And was Perambulated, & resurveyed, in the year 1790. which bounds, & courses, we have now followed, this 13th and 14th days of August 1798, and divided said highway to each town, as follows, Beginning at the said N.E. corner of Robert Furby's homestead, near Govit Cornells dwelling house, thence south about six degrees east, as the wall ~~is~~ stands, on the west side of the way, two hundred and fifty four rods to a bar way, thence south seven & one half degrees east, sixty three rods, and one half, to Job Arnys, orchard, thence south thirty eight degrees east, across the corner of the wall, ^{three rods to the wall} on the east side of said orchard, thence south about twenty one and one half degrees east, two hundred and eleven rods, to the corner of said Arnys wall, at the beach, thence on the same course, sixteen rods to a ledge of rocks, in the surf of the sea, at low water mark. —

All this first and aforesaid, part of the highway, is for the town of Westport to amend and keep in repair, (being five hundred & forty seven rods and an half.) 2nd Begun again at said Furby's corner, thence easterly three rods, and an half, across the drift way, to the corner of the wall, thence east twenty four degrees north, as the wall stands, fifty two rods to an elbow thence east twenty five degrees north, sixty five rods, and an half, to a corner, thence north, eleven degrees west, one hundred and thirty two rods, & an half, to the N.E. corner, of the land, that was Daniel Giffords, late deceased, thence north six degrees west, thirty five rods to an elbow, thence north, twenty four degrees, west, six rods, & an half, to a turn in the wall, thence north six degrees west, twenty five rods & one Quarter thence north twenty five degrees east, four rods, thence north, five degrees west, one hundred & fifty one rods

Weds to a stone heap, at the north end of Wilcoxes Barway near the southerly end of the long Bridge. —

All this second part of the highway, is for the town of Dartmouth, to amend and keep in repair, (being four hundred, & seventy five rods, and a Quarter,) thirdly from said stone heap, at Wilcoxes Bar way, thence north ~~west~~, about forty degrees East, over the swamp, by the Bridge, thirty eight rods, to a stone heap, by the way, thence north seven degrees west, forty six rods, to the south east corner of Timothy Giffords lot, thence north three degrees east, by the wall, forty eight rods, thence north twenty six degrees east, fifty nine rods, to a stone heap, laying four rods westerly of a marked rock, thence from said stone heap, north nineteen degrees east, sixty four rods to a saplin oak, with stones about, by the side of the path, thence north, eight degrees west, untill it comes to the second wall, from the south line of Peleg Butts land, (supposed to be about one hundred and forty eight rods,) All this third part of the highway is for the town of Westport to amend and keep in repair, being about, four hundred and three rods, fourthly from said second wall, on the same course north, untill it comes, to where was a winding Log, near the north west corner of Peleg Butts house, (supposed to be about sixty rods from said second wall,) and is two hundred and eight rods from said saplin oak, from thence north fifteen degrees west, untill it comes opposite to Giffords windmill, supposed to be about sixty rods, All this fourth part of the highway is for the town of Dartmouth, to amend & keep in repair, being about one hundred & twenty rods. —

Fifthly from said windmill, North fifteen degrees west, untill it comes to a stone heap, a N.E. corner bound of Paltman's land, (supposed to be about one hundred and twenty three rods, from the Wind Mill,) and is one hundred & eighty three rods, from said Butts house, thence north twenty two degrees west, one hundred & ninety three rods, ranging, with Cornelius Brownells wall, from the Sea to this place, the bounds and ranges are on the westerly side of the way, thence we crossed the way east, twenty two degrees north four rods, to a stake and stones on the east side of said way, laying by the fence, and,

Corner. Bound, thence from said elbow in the wall, north three degrees east, fourteen rods and an half, to a stake. thence north about seven degrees east, fifty rods to a stake & stone heap, thence east forty two degrees north, seventy five rods to a stake, and stones in the westerly line of the land, formerly belonging to Joseph Allen deceased, thence on said course, fifteen rods further, to a saplin black oak, leaning northerly, over the path, thence east, twenty five degrees north, nineteen rods and an half to a great white oak, thence north fifteen degrees east forty six rods, to a small white oak, thence north, about forty degrees east, fifty six rods, to a stone heap, at the parting of the way, being a bound of the way, that comes from Packards saw mill, All this fifth part of the highway is for the town of Westport, to amend & keep in repair, ^(being) about six hundred and ninety five rods.)

Sixthly from said stone heap, at the parting of the way, thence north, half a degree east, two hundred and four rods, to the place where formerly was a pine tree marked, X thence north fifteen degrees east, two hundred & six rods, to a stake by the wall, thence north three degrees west, one hundred and thirty six rods, to a stone heap on the south side of the Country road, four rods easterly from Guffs corner, all this sixth part of the way is for the town of Dartmouth to amend and keep in repair, (being five hundred and forty six rods, Seventhly from said stone heap on the south side of the Country road thence north twenty degrees east, thirty seven rods, to a stone heap, thence north nineteen degrees west, one hundred and eighty two rods, and an half to a white oak saplin, thence north thirty three degrees west, twenty rods to a stake and stones, on a hill at the parting

parting of the way, thence north thirty three degrees west sixteen rods, over the swamp, to a stone heap on the left hand side of the way, in this last course we crossed the way, and bounded it on the westerly side thereof, as follows, from the said stone heap north fourteen degrees west, about thirty five rods and an half, to a stone heap. All this seventh part of the highway is for the town of Westport, to amend and keep in repair, (being two hundred and ninety two rods, and an half.) Eighthly from said stone heap, last mentioned, north fourteen degrees west, twenty seven rods, and an half, to a stone heap, by the corner of the fence, near opposite, to Maesumbers house, (formerly Moshers) thence north, nineteen degrees west, sixty rods, to the bank of the River a little above the saw mill, called Potters, thence north, nineteen degrees west, about three rods, across the river, to a stake, with stones about it, from thence north, eighteen degrees west, two hundred and sixty rods, to a pine tree, marked, Y. thence north twenty two degrees west, three hundred & forty eight rods, to a stone heap, by the north east corner of William Pettys old house All this eighth part of the highway, is for the town of Dartmouth to amend and keep in repair, (being six hundred and ninety eight rods,) and further each town is to have all the timber, & wood included in each part of the highway, as herein before divided unto them, & the remaining part northward from Pettys old house, we have not divided the highway, but the bounds and courses, are from said house, north eight degrees and an half west, three hundred and thirty rods, to a stake and stone heap, on the southerly side of the way, that leads over Bread and Chase Brook, from thence on the same course to Pretown line. Whereas Samuel Willcox of Westport in the County of Bristol hath represented to us the subscribers, two of the Justices, of said town duly chosen and engaged, that that he is desirous of improving in severally, the land given to him and Humphry Willcox by Samuel Willcox late deceased in his last Will and Testament, and to have a partition fence between them in the line, where the same has been divided, by a committee appointed by the Judge of Probate of Wills &c. for that purpose, and that the said Humphry Willcox has refused and neglected, to divide the line where the fence ought to be built, and hath therefore requested us, to divide the same, and to assign to each party his share thereof according to Law.

Wee therefore having given due notice to the said Humphry Willcox, have divided and assigned each ones part of said fence, in the line mentioned in ~~the~~ ^{the} division, of said land by the committee aforesaid, as follows, viz —


