

in 1823 the same landing was again resurveyed by a Committee chosen for that purpose - whose report in some particulars does not seem to agree with the foregoing description - from the fact as is believed, that they had not then all the documents now in our possession -

Your Committee therefore have not been able to ascertain from the records - the original laying out and limits of that portion of the landing - which they believe necessary for establishing the required monuments, - and the original is moreover not what we now claim. - some legislation may be deemed necessary before such monuments can properly be erected. - of that the Court will judge. - and take such further order in relation to the subject, as under the circumstances may be thought necessary and expedient -

as to the residences on the landing east of the River - it is believed that Thomas Munster has between 50 and 60 rods of land enclosed - with a Barn, carriage house & other buildings thereon -

Stephen D. Cornell - has about 8 rods, with a dwelling house as does some small buildings thereon -

Grace Francis - has a Masons with shop & appurtenances and the heirs of Thomas W. Cifford Esq. have a Ware House and shed - believed to be on the landing -
