must be done, and for this get coarse house flannel, which must be cut carefully and exactly to the size of the mattress. It takes several yards of flannel, as it must be very firm and hard, and when all pressed together should be quite an inch thick. These layers must be firmly sewed together, as the success of these pincushions entirely depends on their being firm and hard at top, at bottom and at the sides. Another necessity is the perfect regularity with which they are cut, the edges generally requiring to be sheared with very sharp scissors. It is possible to stuff the lining with horsehair or bran instead of flannel, in which case the covering must be made first; otherwise, sew the flannel into a case of cheap loose woven calico, through which the pins pass easily, using tape one inch wide for the sides.

Having completed this, the outer covering is a matter of taste, but plain materials are best. A good satin, silk or moire looks well, and indeed some of the finest flax linens of pale shades come out well when embroidered in white. A small design in one corner looks nice worked in silks, with gold and silver thread and a few beads or spangles if liked, but keep the embroidery to one color. There is no need to describe how to proceed, except that in putting the side pieces on they must be even, well stretched and tacked before oversewing with fine silk. These mattresses will take pins of every size at the side, with ordinary black and white at top, and the result when quite complete is well worth the trouble of their manufacture.

#### ST FROM JORDAN.

#### Bodies Found at Vineyard Identified.

Haven, Sept. 21.—The bodies found on the island a few miles west of West Chop were identified by Coroner Leach this after-

body was identified as M. Gloucester, Mass., a pocketing \$16, with the above address written inside having in the trousers pocketed ticket from Boston to enclosed in a leather case and in the same pocket. Body was apparently that of a man, and had both arms tattooed with ink, with a picture of an American flag and several hearts. He wore a dark striped overalls, a dark shirt, cotton underwear, and stockings.

Body found at Edgartown was identified as that of P. J. Kirby of Conn.

The identification that thoroughly satisfied the police that they had at last reached the solution of the mystery was made this morning by a brother of the murdered girl, and in speaking of the matter Superintendent Birmingham said:

"No further proof of the identification should be required than a glance at the brother's face. Every feature which was prominent in the face of the dead woman is duplicated in the features of the brother."

Furthermore, Superintendent Birmingham has all along maintained that the dead body was that of a country girl, and Miss Gill was born at Reynolds Bridge, Conn., and has always lived in the country.

She was 24 years old and had been employed as a domestic in the family of James H. Pratt, of Southington. It was apparent that the arrival of the brother was expected at police headquarters this morning, for when he reached here accompanied by a companion, he went at once to police headquarters, spoke to an officer in charge and was immediately admitted to the office of the chief, and then the entire party proceeded to the morgue.

The similarity of the features of the dead woman and the young man was too striking to admit a doubt but that the identification was at last made, though before there was an attempt to enter into the details the brother said: "If you can show me a brown mole on one side of the neck I will believe that it is my sister."

An examination was made, and for the first time the mole was observed.

The young man then broke down completely and for nearly 15 minutes the officials left him alone with his grief.

The party then returned to police headquarters, when further information was gleaned. The brother told how his sister started on a vacation, which she said was to be of two weeks and was to be absent according to her story at Lighthouse Point, New Haven.

At the end of the two weeks she returned home but announced to Mr. Pratt that she was ill and unable to work and was going away again; but wanted him to save her place. To her parents she stated that her suitor, Walter Foster of Hartford, had a sister living in Stratford, and that she had invited her to go and spend a week with them.

Mr. Gill stated that two letters were received from his sister while she was away and the first one stated that she was not feeling well and could not return as soon as expected. It has also been learned from the postmaster that a letter addressed to Miss Emma Gill has been in the Southington office, uncalled for, for more than a week.

After hearing the brother's story, Superintendent Birmingham telephoned to the Hartford police headquarters, asking them to get from Foster, who had been previously placed under arrest, the names and addresses of relatives in Stratford.

To the inquiry "Do you know that Foster has ever been in Bridgeport?" Superintendent Birmingham replied: "Yes; he has been here at different times, but I will say no more about that, however, as it might cause some people to leave town in a hurry, and





Gentlemen

I deem it my duty as one of the select men of the Town to make the following statement of facts as I understand them after a thorough & careful examination.

I have received of S Allen Treasurer of Finance Committee & Treasurer of the Town for recruiting purposes at home & in Rebel States at sundry times commencing Dec 20-1863 & ending Jan 14<sup>th</sup> 1865 - \$12,116.

I have paid to and for 68 Recruits 2 substitutes and in part payment of Albert J Trapp's Commutation all of which have been credited to the Towns quota \$10,932.

I have paid to State Treasurer for recruiting in Rebel States \$125- making a total sum for the above purposes of \$12,097

I find from examination of the Town Records that the Town voted to raise by tax to reimburse sundry individuals at the annual meeting in 1864 \$2260.00

The town voted to raise by loan a sum sufficient to pay 63 recruits at \$125- each amounting to the sum of \$7875.00

The town voted to raise by tax at a special meeting in May 1865 to reimburse \$3097.00

The same being the total sum expended by the selectmen \$3232.00

Above the \$125- per man See their report made April 29<sup>th</sup> 1865 - <sup>To the above sum add the amount paid</sup> into the State Treasury - \$1125-

and you have the total amount raised or paid by the Town - viz - \$1435.75 The town should only have raised a sum sufficient to supply the deficiency between \$3097- & \$2260 - viz - \$857

The balance \$2260 should have been paid or reimbursed by the finance committee

There is therefore a deficiency corresponding to this amount which must be paid into the Treasury.

Do you ask how this mistake occurred. I can only say that same mistake was made by the town in making appropriations for expense incurred in raising the Town quota.

The mistake was a singular one but I believe it was a mistake.

Our report was submitted to a special committee and afterwards considered in open town meeting.

Do you ask why I did not discover it I answered that I had not examined the Treasurer's books or the Town record that it was not my duty until I became convinced that something was wrong Since that time I have devoted a careful examination to it It has been my duty to attend to the recruiting and to keep that account correct and with all the difficulties attending this task I submit

it has been quite enough for me and my associate to attend to, & I think I may reasonably ask you why you did not discover it before. The deficiency ought & shall be restored to the treasury at an early day —

In order to relieve the minds of all present or absent who are or may be interested in this matter relative to the selectmen or of myself Allow me to state for your information that I have never had any funds in my possession which belonged to the town or to individuals which had not been already expended. In two instances the Selectmen have given their own Note to the bank for \$15.00 in each instance in anticipation of funds not yet collected and I may further say that there has been no time since Dec- 1863 in fact since June 1863 that I have not had some funds invested for the benefit of the town for recruiting purposes up to the present time which fact I am ready to demonstrate by vouchers & figures — I hold in my hand a final report which I propose to submit. And I shall ask for a committee to examine it all of which is respectfully submitted.
