

- 8th. To determine the inducement the town will offer by the way of discount for the prompt payment of taxes and fix the time during which discount may be allowed and paid.
- 9th. To consider the propriety of demanding and collecting interest from taxpayers that have not paid their taxes on or before a specified time.
- 10th. To determine the compensation that shall be allowed the Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- 11th. To determine the compensation that shall be allowed per day or hour for labor, etc., on highway, viz: For Surveyors, common laborers, one pair horses, one horse, one pair oxen, use of cart, plough, scraper, and stone digger.
- 12th. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors prepared by the Selectmen.
- 13th. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money if necessary in anticipation of the tax.
- 14th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen at their discretion, to transfer and add to either department of the town appropriations, any money that may be in the treasury that is not otherwise appropriated.
- 15th. To see if the town will authorize the boards of officers to order bills against the town for and on account of their respective departments.
- 16th. The Town Clerk, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor, Assessors, Treasurer, Collector, School Committee, Fence Viewers, Constable, Landings Commissioners, Auditing Committee, and Superintendent of Town Cemetery all to be voted for on one ballot; also at the same time on a separate ballot, yes or no on the following question: Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?
