- 19th To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to issue Town Bonds not to exceed Fifty Thousand dollars, Twelve Thousand Five Hundred dollars to be expended on the proposed bridge from Westport Point to Goshen, and the balance in macadamizing the stage road from said bridge to Dartmouth line.
- 20th To determine the location of the High School for the ensuing year.
- 21st To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the town charges for the ensuing year.
- 22d To determine the amount of wager per day or hour to be paid for labor on the Highway the ensuing year for the following purposes, viz: For a foreman, laborer, pair of oxen, a horse or a pair of horses, plow, cart, and scraper.
