Monday of said month, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose the following Officers for three years, viz: one Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one Road Commissioner, one School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one Member of the Board of Health and two trustees of the Public Library. - 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: For support of Schools, School Houses and Lots, School Furnishings, Highways and Bridges, Paupers, Public Library, Incidental Expenses, State Aid and Soldiers Relief. Also transporting pupils too and from the public schools.
- 6th. To make appropriations for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools, and for the services of Town Officers and Committees.
- 7th. To make an appropriation sufficient to pay the awards caused by widening the Highway from Dartmouth at Westport Factory Village, to Fall River at the Narrows.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize the road commencing at or near Brownells Corner, thence easterly and southerly to Central Village; and if so make an appropriation therefor.
- 9th. To make an appropriation sufficient to pay all maturing notes, and interests on all notes against the town for the ensuing year.
- 10th. To see if the town will elect a committee to inquire into our present school system and to suggest methods and plans whereby it may be made more effective by consolidating said schools under the present system, or a graded system, or both, and to make a report of their findings and doings to the next annual town election.

- 11th. To see if the town will vote to alter, repair and widen the present structure or to build a new bridge on that part of the highway in said town known as "Hicks' Bridge" and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

The Present School System.

We find the present school system to consist of eighteen buildings for school purposes situated as follows: one at North Westport, one on Sanford road, one near Mouse Mill, one at Brownells Corner, a two room building at Head of Westport, a Primary school building at same place, one building known as Eastside, one known as Westside, one at Kirby's Corner, one known as State-side, one at Macomber's Corner, one at South Westport, one at Hicks Corner, one at Acoaxet, a two room building at Westport Point, one on Horse Neck road, a joint interest with the town of Dartmouth in a two room building at Westport Factory village, and one building on the drift road not in use.

All of the above buildings are heated by stoves using as fuel either wood or coal (mostly wood) and ventilated by means of doors and windows except the building at Westport Factory village where a few years since the jacketed stove system of ventilation was introduced.

Board of Management.

We find that the Board of Management consists of a committee of three elected by ballot, one each year and a Superintendent of the joint Superintendent District of Dartmouth and Westport. We find further that at present the town employs eighteen teachers drawing their entire salary from Westport and two teachers at the Union school whose salaries are paid equally by Dartmouth and Westport.

Grade of Schools.

We find the grade of schools as at present constituted is known as the ungraded school system except the following, viz: the Primary and Grammar schools at the Head of Westport, the Union School at

Westport Factory, the school at Westport Point when two teachers are employed and the High School.

Studies and Text books.

The studies authorized are those prescribed by law for use in schools of like character throughout the state. Text books in use for principal and supplementary work are of recent date and based largely upon modern methods of teaching.

The Government of the Schools.

We find it hard to classify the existing methods of governing the schools. We may however state that the government is largely left with the teacher. Each teacher being allowed to employ such methods as he or she, may at their discretion think best adapted to accomplish the end sought.

The above outline briefly and concisely state the principal features of the present system of schools in the Town of Westport. That the system has much to recommend it we do not dispute yet we find it has also its weak inefficient and defective points as well, and it is this weakness inefficiency and defectiveness that has prompted the appointment of this committee to enquire into and suggest means whereby they may be mitigated or wholly overcome. Like the physician who makes a careful diagnosis of his patients disease before he prescribes for its cure, we have sought to find wherein it falls short of the purpose for which it was intended. The unthinking and heedless person will say there is no need of any change or improvement. It has answered the purpose of our fathers, grandfathers and great grand fathers. So the wooden plough and harrow answered the purpose of the generation in which they were used but which of you tillers of the soil would be willing to discard the modern plough and harrow for the substitution of the wooden implements of a past generation, the necessities of the present age demand the more thorough working implements of modern times, so the present age demands the improved methods for the preservation of health of both body and mind for education is nothing more or less than the development of a healthy mind in a healthy body.

We find the principal defects of the present system of schools to be as follows. Badly constructed school buildings as regards methods of heating, ventilating, the admission of light, hall room, necessary room for the display of maps, charts, blackboards and other necessary modern school appliances.

These defects apply in a greater or less degree to every school building in town but with greatest force to those school rooms that are overcrowded, the most notable examples of which are the Primary school room and High school room at the Head of Westport either of which is liable to be complained of and closed until proper sanitary conditions for the preservation of health are observed. The present means of heating (wood being the chief factor) are faulty as it in the hands of the most careful teacher creates an uneven temperature while in the hands of a careless or inexperienced teacher it becomes still more pernicious in its effects.

The present means of ventilation are still more faulty than that of heating. Ventilation by windows is dangerous because they create direct drafts of cold air across the room on a plane with the lungs when they are unprepared by proper protection to receive them.

Ventilation by doors creates currents along the floor subjecting feet and legs to sudden exposure, in either case subjecting the child to sudden

colds and in due season chronic disease in the form of catarrh and bronchial affections. Keep the doors and windows closed says the unthinking person. Science tells us that want of fresh and pure air weakens the system and renders it susceptible to disease. It has also told us how to guard against defects in the construction of our school buildings. Under the present system some of our buildings now raising up between joints and enlarging so as to accommodate with comfort the number of pupils collected therein. The high school room needs remodelling both as to internal arrangement and its hall way. The Sanford school building will soon have to be enlarged if there is further increase of children in that vicinity. The Brownells Corner building needs replastering and other repairs. The building at the Point will need further repairs to make it tenable for school purposes. The building at Kirbys Corner needs new floor and reseating with modern seats. And all the school buildings need to be supplied with some method of ventilation that will insure pure air for the proper maintenance of the health and the intellectual vigor of the mind of the child. We also find inefficient work on the part of many of our teachers arising from various causes. We do not wish to be understood that our teachers are lacking in moral character or a sincere purpose of heart to fill the positions to which they are chosen to the utmost extent of their ability. The lack of special training is partly responsible for their failure, the innovations of modern methods of teaching thus overloading the teacher, the use of text books calculated for use in graded schools and our ungraded system of schools are responsible for the rest.

A comparison of the wages paid our teachers with the average wages paid to teachers throughout the state will perhaps index somewhat correctly the kind of work done in our schools. Pay of male teacher employed \$40. and \$55. per month. Average price ~~paid~~ paid for male teachers is \$136.03 per month throughout the state. Pay of female teachers is \$25. to \$36.00 per month, average price paid per month throughout the state is \$50.30.

Judging from the above comparison we are doing our teachers great injustice if the work they render the town is approximately near the average work rendered throughout the state by compelling them to accept wages far below the average wages paid for such work, or on the other hand the wage paid is an equivalent for the work rendered and a fair index of the character of said work.

We also find other reasons at work which are destined to exert a great influence in moulding the character of the public schools some of which we briefly enumerate as follows: The probable compulsory law of Superintendence, The probable law requiring special training on the part of the teacher for his or her work.

The ever increasing interest of the State in the needs of the smaller towns in education. The constantly widening field of employment for women thus enhancing their wages as indicated by statistics of all industry and especially that of teaching. The influx into our midst of more or less of foreign population until almost every school contains some pupils unacquainted with our language.

Suggestions and recommendations.

The geographical situation of the town its present valuation, its indebtedness, and high rate of taxation all enter into and largely modify the highest development of our schools. The ideal school of the present age is a full graded school but the scattered rural population prevent for the present that consummation of our school system. After considering the necessities of changing the present system of schools and the advantages to be gained thereby your committee submit the following as being under the ~~present~~ circumstances the best the situation will permit and consists of a High School, four intermediate schools, four primary schools, two ungraded schools,

and the present Union School. For the accommodation of the above schools we recommend as soon as the financial condition of the Town will allow the erection of the following buildings for school purposes. First. A three room building at Head of Westport, one room for the accommodation of the High School one for the grammar or intermediate and one for the primary school all under one roof and all on the ground floor, a two room building on or near the present school building site at North Westport utilizing if possible the present school building at that place, a two room building at or near Central Village, and a two room building near Hotel Westport at Westport Point, and make such changes in the Union, the one at Acavest and the one near Siker's Corner as may be needed for the health, comfort and intellectual advancement of the pupils therein. We further recommend that if this report is adopted that the three room building recommended to be located at Head of Westport be erected first and the others in such order as may be called for. We further recommend that all old buildings and their sites be sold when no longer needed for school purposes.

We further recommend lines of transportation to be established for all children not within walking distance when such buildings are completed and occupied as the situation calls for, for the accommodation of the pupils to be conveyed.

We further recommend that in the construction of new school houses that neat plain and substantial structures be erected of sufficient size for air space so arranged both externally and internally as to admit necessary light, and the display of maps, charts, black-boards and other school appliances necessary in each room also the use of best methods of heating and ventilation that science has proven feasible for buildings of like character, also halls of sufficient size to accommodate all pupils when not in their seats, and that all rooms be arranged on the ground floor.

We further recommend that the High School be permanently located at the Head of Westport as being the most central situation taking into consideration the means of conveyance of pupils thereto and the necessity of a properly arranged room for the greatest advancement of the pupils.

We further recommend that as soon as suitable roomware provided the adoption of the partial grading of the schools as may be best adapted to meet the situation, for all pupils not entitled to enter the High school not however overloading the teacher in any one room with an excessive number of recitations.

We further recommend that the promotion of the child from grade to grade and from room to room be based upon the qualification of the child so to be promoted rather than that of favoritism or age. We further recommend that trained and skilled teachers be employed when practicable to fill vacancies especially in the primary department. We further recommend that the courses of study be enlarged if found to be practicable, so as to cover the necessary qualification on the part of the High School graduate as will entitle him or her to enter the normal school or failing in that we recommend the studies used to correspond to the first and second or first, second and third years of the best city High School so those who desire may complete their education therein, for that purpose. We further recommend that suitable school appliances be supplied each room such as maps, charts, blackboards, globes and other apparatus necessary for the elucidation of the subjects taught therein, and that suitable cabinets or rooms be provided for their preservation and protection as found necessary.

We further recommend the continuance of the District plan of superintendence of our schools as being the best the situation affords. We further recommend that the remote schools at Acavest and Allen Neck be supplied with school appliances covering so far as practicable the appliances of the primary and intermediate schools of the consolidated plan. All of which recommendation are respectfully submitted.
