The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Westport, Bristol County, Massachusetts, acting upon the foregoing petition, directs that the American Telephone and Telegraph Company of Massachusetts, its successors and assigns, be and the same is hereby given the right, privilege and authority to locate, construct, operate and maintain its line of poles, wires and fixtures upon the following certain public highways in the said Town of Westport, to wit: -

In the Fall River - New Bedford Road

To relocate about twelve (12) poles near the Ice House on account of the construction of a second track by the Dartmouth & Westport Street Railway Co.

This permit is granted upon the following conditions and specifications: -

1. All poles shall be reasonably straight and shall be located under the direction and supervision of the Selectmen of Westport.
2. The poles shall be of good sound cedar, pine or chestnut, and shall be so placed that the public use of the highways shall not be interfered with, the flow of water in ditches or drains interrupted, or entrances or gateways to buildings obstructed thereby.
3. Said Town of Westport reserve the right to attach and maintain the wires of its fire alarm and police telegraph system to any and all poles erected hereunder.
4. Upon the completion of the construction of said pole line said company shall file a plan with the Town Clerk showing the places at which its poles have been erected, which thereupon shall be and become a part hereof.

Greeting:

In the name of
the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to
notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport, qualified
to vote in elections and town affairs, to assemble at the Town
Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the twelfth day of March next,
it being the second Monday in said Month, at ten o'clock in
the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles
viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside in said
meeting, who shall be chosen by ballot.

Article 2nd. To choose the following officers for three years,
viz: one Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one
member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one
member of the Board of Health, and two Trustees of the Public
Library.

Also the following officers for one year, viz: Town Clerk,
Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery,
two or more Constables, three Fence Viewers, four Landings
Commissioners, one Tree Warden, one Highway Surveyor, one Draw
Tender, and one or more Auditors; all of the aforesaid officers
shall be elected by ballot.

Also to elect all other Town officers and Committees by hand
vote unless otherwise determined by the meeting.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and
Committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments
the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog
Fund "shal" be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes,
viz: Salary of the Superintendent of Schools, Services of Town
Officers, and Committees, Support of Schools, School houses and Lots,
School Supplies, Highways and Bridges, Paupers, Public Library,

Incidentals, State Aid, Soldiers' Relief, Town Debt and interest.

Article 6th. To see if the Town will vote to macadamize a piece of
road beginning where the present macadam leaves off near the residence
of Everett A. Dunham, and continue northerly, and make the necessary
appropriation therefor.

Article 7th. To see if the Town will vote to repair any or all
of the Sanford road with crushed stone, and make the necessary
appropriation therefor.

Article 8th. To see if the Town will vote to buy a lot, and
build a new School house at or near the Head of Westport, make
an appropriation therefor, and determine the manner of raising
said appropriation, and take any further action necessary.

Article 9th. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell
a part of the land belonging to the Town, near Hicks' Brook, so
called.

Article 10th. To see if the Town will vote to have three or more
polling places at State Elections, and if the Town so votes to
determine where such places shall be located.

Article 11th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Select-
men to enforce the law regarding the speed of Automobiles and
Motor cycles on the Highways within the Town.

Article 12th. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money
for the purpose of widening the road from near the School
house at South Westport Southerly to the line of Hannah L.
Allen.

Article 13th. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Health
to procure a building to be used as a pest-house make the neces-
sary appropriation therefor, and take any other action that may be
necessary in relation to the same.

Article 14th. To see what action, if any, the town will take
in relation to the fishery in the east branch of Westport River.

Article 15th. To determine the location of the High School for the ensuing year.

Article 16th. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Memorial Day, and choose a committee to receive and expend the same.

Article 17th. To see if the Town will authorize the Auditors to transfer sums of money from unappropriated money to other departments wherein there may be a deficit.

Article 18th. To see if Town will appropriate the sum of one hundred and ten dollars for perpetual care interest account.

Article 19th. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of sixty-two dollars and forty-four cents standing to the credit of the Westport Point bridge department, to some other department.

Article 20th. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote "past" at a special meeting held August 26th. 1905 whereby the town voted to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to hire the sum of Six hundred dollars appropriated to macadamize that portion of the road from Dartmouth line to the entrance to the New York New Haven and Hartford Rail Road and issue a note of the town therefor payable in the year 1906. And the debt incurred under the authority of this vote is hereby made payable from the taxes of said year.

Article 21st. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Fifty-two dollars and forty-nine cents standing to the credit of the department for macadamizing the road near Westport Factory Station to unappropriated money department account.

Article 22nd. To see if the Town will authorize the School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Single Highway Surveyor, and Board of Health to order bills against the Town for and on account of their respective departments.

Article 23rd. To see if the inhabitants will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire such sums of money in anticipation of taxes as will be necessary to meet the current expenses of the year.

Article 24th. To determine the salaries or commission of the Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Tree Warden, Draw Tender, and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery.

Article 25th. To see if the Town will accept the list of Jurors, as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article 26th. To determine the wages for ordinary repairs on Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 27th. To determine the wages for labor in connection with the stone crusher plant, and macadamizing the Highways for the ensuing year.

Article 28th. To see if the Town will appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay a proper charge of an insurance company for acting as surety on the official bond given to the town by its Treasurer and Collector of Taxes for the faithful discharge of his duties.

Article 29th. To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 30th. To see if the Town will vote to allow discount on all taxes paid before a specified time and if so to fix the amount or rate per cent of discount.

Article 31st. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid after a specified time, if so to fix the time said interest shall begin and determine the rate of interest to be paid.

The Town Clerk, Selectman, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Overseer of the Poor, Assessor, Member of Board of Health, Member of the School Committee, Single Highway Surveyor, Trustees of the Public Library, Fish Commissioners, Constables, Fence Viewers, Landing Commissioners, Auditors, Tree Warden, Draw Tender, and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, to be voted for on one ballot. Also at the same time and place to bring in upon a separate ballot "Yes" or "No" upon the following question, "Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town".

To choose the following officers for three years, viz: one Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one member of the Board of Health, and two Trustees of the Public Library; also the following officers for one year, viz: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, two or more Constables, three Fence Viewers, four Landings Commissioners, one Tree Warden, one Highway Surveyor, one Draw Tender, and one or more Auditors; all of the aforesaid officers shall be elected by ballot; also to elect all other Town officers and Committees by hand vote, unless otherwise determined by the meeting.

Article 5th. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 6th. To determine to what department or departments the money

last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 7th. To see if the town will vote to fix the rate of taxation per thousand before the appropriations are made.

Article 8th. To see if the town will vote to hear the report of the Town Treasurer to give in the indebtedness of the town and balance of cash if any.

Article 9th. To see if the town will vote to raise a certain sum of money to conform to the rate of taxation voted upon for all necessary expenses; said sum to be distributed on articles inserted in the Town warrant according to their "merits" for the best interest of the town, said sum to include State and County Tax.

Article 10th. To see if the town will vote not to allow any contract made by any committee or town officers to build or construct any buildings or purchase any material for building the same without one half of the legal voters of the town being present at any special town meeting, or appropriate any sum of money exceeding one hundred dollars, said articles taking effect upon their passage, All previous articles being "nul" and void.
(Notice is hereby given that section 7, of Article 2 of the Town By laws is hereby repealed.)

Article 11th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: Salary of the Superintendent of Schools, School Physician, Support of Schools, School houses and lots, School supplies, Services of Town Officers and Committees, Highways and Bridges, Paupers, Public Library, Incidentally, Military Aid, State Aid, Soldiers relief, Treasurers Bond, Town Debt and interest.

Article 12th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Road Machine, and if it so votes, to choose a committee to purchase said machine, and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 13th. To see if the Town will vote to re-set the wall to line on the south side of the causeway at the Narrows, beginning at a point about 100 ft east from the Fall River line, and continuing easterly to a point nearly opposite the store of A. M. Reed, a distance of about 380 ft and to cause a suitable "berrier" to be placed thereon. Also to raise the road bed to correspond with the north side of the causeway, and if the town votes to do all or any part of the work called for in this article, then to make the necessary appropriation.

Article 14th. To see if the town will vote to continue the macadam from where it ends near William Almy's residence southerly to the seashore and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 15th. To determine how the highway from the "Town Landing" to Westport Point Bridge or any part of it shall be repaired, and if with macadam to make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 16th. To see if the town will vote to repair the remainder of Sanford road with crushed stone and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 17th. To see if the town will vote to macadam a portion of the Gifford road (so called) commencing at Beulah Corner and thence southerly toward the Head of Westport, and to make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 18th. To see if the voters of the town of Westport will make an appropriation to repair or macadamize the road known as "the Drift road" in said town, so that it may be reasonably safe for traffic for man and beast, and so that a draft horse may be able to pull something more than a Shetland Pony's load over said road.

Article 19th. To see if the Town will vote to macadamize the stage road leading from the Head of Westport southerly to Snell's Corner, and from Snell's Corner westerly to Booth's Corner so called, and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 20th. To see if the Town will vote to macadamize the road leading westerly from the Head of Westport to George H. Gifford's Corner, and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 21st. To see if the Town will macadamize or otherwise improve the road from Central Village westerly to the State line, and if so to appropriate money therefor.

Article 22nd. To see if the town will macadamize or otherwise improve the river road from the State line southerly to Westport Harbor; and if so to appropriate money therefor.

Article 23rd. To see if the town will authorize the Highway Surveyor (in case the town should vote to do any macadamizing) to leave crushed stone not less than two hundred tons to be kept to mend said macadam road, and to make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 24th. To see if the town will vote to have all macadamizing done by contract.

Article 25th. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to relay the town way beginning at the State line in the village of Adamsville, R.I., thence southerly and easterly to the Atlantic Ocean, (said way being known as the old road from Adamsville to the Atlantic ocean) said way or road being covered by two different surveys one made in the year 1800, and covers the northerly portion of said way as far south as the southwest corner of the place now occupied by Charles H. Simmons, and the southerly portion by a survey made in the year 1841. Also the way beginning at the corner near Ahira Nickerson's, thence westerly to the Little Compton line a distance of about $\frac{1}{3}$ mile.

Article 26th. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to lay out a public highway in Acoaxet known as Beech Avenue, beginning at Acoaxet St. so called and continuing easterly to the land of the United States called Point of Rocks; said way to be Forty feet wide from Acoaxet Street easterly to the easterly line of land of E.P. Charlton, thence easterly thirty feet wide to said land of the United States.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to furnish a new pump at Borden's well so called on Sanford road, and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 28. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to repair pipe and place the same below level of spring at fountain foot of Handy's Hill so called, for the purpose of insuring a supply of water during all the year.

Article 29th. To see if the town will vote to build a school house at or near Central Village, on condition that the Central Village Improvement Society shall first procure for the town a lot upon which such school house may be erected. Also to make the
