to relocate the line on the State Road between Westport Factory and the Fall River city line, on account of the widening of said road for the benefit of the Dartmouth + Westport Street Railway Company.

This permit is granted upon the following conditions

1. All poles shall be reasonably straight and shall be located under the direction and supervision of the Selectmen of Westport.

3. Said Town of Westport reserves the right to attach and maintain the wires of its fire alarm and police telegraph system to any and all poles erected hereunder.

4. Upon the completion of the construction of said pole line said Company shall file a plan with the Town Clerk showing the places at which its poles have been erected, which thereupon shall be and become a part hereof.

Art. 14<sup>th</sup> To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new bin and screen to be used in connection with the stone crusher, make an appropriation therefor and take any further necessary action.
