To choose the following officers for three years, viz: one Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one member of the Board of Health, and two Trustees of the Public Library; also one Fish Commissioner for two years to fill a vacancy, also the following officers for one year, viz: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, one member of the School Committee to fill a vacancy, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five or more Constables, three Fence Viewers, four Landing Commissioners, one Tree Warden, one Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge, one or more Auditors, one Single Highway Surveyor unless the town votes to elect a board of Road Commissioners, all of the aforesaid officers shall be elected by ballot, also to elect all other Town officers and committees by hand vote, unless otherwise determined by the meeting.
