

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act
thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last
received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: General Govern-
ment, Protection to Life and Property, Health and Sanitation, Highways

Article 17th To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee of three to make an investigation as to the advisability of building a road beginning at Horseneck Point westerly back of the cottages on the Horseneck Beach, and as to methods and material to be used in building said road. The committee to report at the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 18th To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to layout a public highway to cover the present road bed beginning at Sanford road near the Advent Chapel continuing westerly to land of James Tickle

No person shall hawk, peddle sell or expose for sale any of the articles enumerated in the Statutes of 1906 Chapter 345 without being licensed to do so by the Selectmen after first recording his name and residence with said Selectmen and upon being assigned a number of such license painting the same with the name of the person to whom the license was given in figures and letters at least two inches in height upon the vehicle or receptacle in which said hawker or pedler shall carry or convey such articles.

Licenses so granted shall expire on the first day of May and may be revoked at the pleasure of the Selectmen.

Hawkers and pedlers of fruits and vegetables who are not engaged in the pursuit of agriculture shall be required to pay a license fee of Eight Dollars (\$8.00)

Anyone violating this by-law shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20.00)

Article 20th To see what action the Town will take with regards to licensing hawkers and pedlers of fruit and vegetables who are non-residents of the Town.

Article 21st To see if the Town will adopt the following by-law in relation to the collection of junk and old metals.

No person shall go about from place to place within the limits of the Town of Westport collecting by purchasing or otherwise junk, old metals and second hand articles without a license.

The Selectmen may as provided by Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws as amended by Chapter 187 of the Acts of 1902 license suitable persons as junk collectors to collect by purchase or otherwise junk, old metals and second hand articles from place to place within the limits of the Town.

Whoever violates the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20.00)

Article 22nd Shall an act passed by the General Court in the year 1908 entitled, "An Act to provide for the protection of forest or sprout lands from fire" be accepted by this Town?

Article 23rd To elect an Agent to have charge of the suit brought against the Town by George E. Tripp in an action of contract. Said suit being in relation to the building of a new school house at Central Village and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 24th To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to continue the wall on the west and south sides of Beech Grove Cemetery.

And if the Town so votes then to take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Grossman, also one on Sanford road belonging to Charles Duffany. These lots however are not for sale. It was the sense of the meeting that the Bodge lot be bought for the purpose. It was also the sense of the meeting that the building should consist of four (4) rooms.

As to the number of children that would be accommodated in a

four room building the Secretary of the School board thought that by closing the North Westport, Gifford road and Sanford road schools that there would be about 100 pupils to attend the new school at North Westport.
