Also to vote on the following questions: Acceptance of the following Articles of Amendment submitted by the Constitutional Convention:

## Article of Amendment No. 1.

The General Court shall have power to provide by law for voting by qualified voters of the Commonwealth who, at the time of an election are absent from the city or town of which they are inhabitants in the choice of any officer to be elected or upon any question submitted at such election.

## Article of Amendment No. 2.

Article XVIII. Section 1. No law shall be passed prohibiting the free exercise of religion

Section 2. All moneys raised by taxation in the towns and cities for the support of public schools, and all moneys which may be appropriated by the Commonwealth for the support of common schools shall be applied to and expended in, no other schools than those which are conducted according to law under the order and superintendence of the authorities of the town or city in which the money is expended, and no grant, appropriation or use of public money or property or loan of public credit shall be made or authorized by the Commonwealth or any political division thereof for the purpose of founding, maintaining or aiding any school or institution of learning, whether under public control or

otherwise, wherein any denominational doctrine is inculcated, or any other school, or any college, infirmary, hospital, institution, or educational, charitable or religious undertaking which is not publicly owned and under the exclusive control, order and superintendence of public officers or public agents authorized by the Commonwealth or federal authority or both, except that appropriations may be made for the maintenance and support of the soldiers' home in Massachusetts and for free public libraries in any city or town, and to carry out legal obligations, if any, already entered into; and no such grant, appropriation or use of public money or property or loan of public credit shall be made or authorized for the purpose of founding, maintaining or aiding any church, religious denomination or society.

Section 3. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Commonwealth, or any political division thereof, from paying to privately controlled hospitals, infirmaries, or institutions for the deaf, dumb or blind not more than the ordinary and reasonable compensation for the care or support actually rendered or furnished by such hospitals, infirmaries or institutions to such persons as may be in whole or in part unable to support or care for themselves.

Section 4. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to deprive any inmate of a publicly controlled reformatory, penal or charitable institution of the opportunity of religious exercises therein of his own faith, but no inmate of such institution shall be compelled to attend religious services or receive religious instruction against his will, or, if a minor, without the consent of his parent or guardian.

Section 5. This amendment shall not take effect until the October first next succeeding its ratification and adoption by the people.

## Article of Amendment No. 3.

The maintenance and distribution at reasonable rates, during time of war, public exigency, emergency or distress, of a sufficient supply of food and other common necessities of life and the providing of shelter, are public functions, and the Commonwealth and the cities and towns therein may take and may provide the same for their inhabitants in such manner as the general court shall determine.

Chapter I.

General Provisions

Section 1. These by-laws shall be designated as "By-Laws of the Town of Westport" as amended to March, 1918.

Section 2. So far as the provisions of these by-laws are the same in effect as those of previously existing by-laws, they shall be construed as a continuation of such by-laws, but all by-laws or portions thereof heretofore in force inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 3. In all the by-laws of the town, the words and expressions shall, unless inconsistent with the manifest intent, be severally construed as follows:

The words "public way" shall include any highway, town way, road, bridge, street, avenue, boulevard, roadway, parkway, lane, sidewalk or square; the owner or occupant of a building or land shall include any sole owner or occupant and any joint tenant and tenant in common of the whole or of any part of a building or lot of land; words purporting to give a joint authority to a board or committee shall give authority to a majority of such board or committee; the word "person" shall include corporations; words imparting the singular number shall apply to the plural number and words imparting the masculine gender shall apply to

the feminine gender.

Section 4. Whoever violates a provision of any by-law of the town, shall, unless other provision is expressly made, be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars for each offence.

Section 5. When in any by-law anything is prohibited from being done without the license or permission of a certain officer or officers, such officer or officers shall have the power to license or permit such thing to be done.

Voted: To adopt as Section 6 of Chapter I the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 6. These by-laws may be repealed or amended by a majority vote at an annual meeting of the town, or by a two-thirds vote at a special meeting when seventy-five voters are present, but in no case unless the particular by-law to be repealed or amended is specified in the warrant calling the meeting.

Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting shall be held on the second Monday in March of each year at 10 A. M. for the purpose of acting on all articles in the warrant except the election of officers for the ensuing year.

The article calling for the election of town officers for the ensuing year shall be acted upon on the third Monday in March at 10 A. M.

Voted: To adopt as Section 1 of Chapter II the following, viz:

Section 1. The Annual Town Meeting shall be held on the second Monday in March of each year at 10 A. M. for the purpose of acting on all articles in the warrant except the election of officers for the ensuing year and voting on all questions contained on the official ballot.

The article calling for the election of town officers for the ensuing year shall be acted upon on the third Monday in March at 10 A. M.

Voted: To adopt as Section 2 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 2. Notice of every town meeting shall be given by posting an attested copy of the warrant calling the same in as many public places in the town as the Selectmen may direct not less than seven days before the day appointed for said meeting: and the return of the officer, stating the manner of the notice, shall be indorsed on the warrant.

Voted: To adopt as Section 3 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen to call the Annual Meeting of the town according to Section 2 of this Chapter until otherwise ordered by vote of the town.

The Selectmen shall call special meetings of the town at such times as may be required for the transaction of necessary town business.

The Selectmen may also call special meetings upon the petition of ten or more legal voters for such purpose as may be set forth in the petition aforesaid.

Section 4. No business shall be transacted at any town meeting for town purposes unless the subject matter is contained in the warrant and no article may be changed except to perfect said article or to reduce the amount of money appropriated by said article.

Voted: To adopt as Section 5 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 5. At the Annual Meeting the following officers shall be balloted for: Town Clerk, Treasurer, and Collector of Taxes, each for one year; one Selectman, one Overseer of the Poor, one Assessor, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Board of Health, one Fish Commissioner and two Trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years; two Auditors, Single Highway Surveyor, Seven Constables, three Fence Viewers, four Landing Commissioners, Tree Warden, Draw Tender and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, each for one year respectively. If there is any vacancy to be filled in any town office at the Annual Meeting, the name of the

officer to fill such vacancy shall be inserted in said ballot in the order of the officers above named, together with the length of time said officer is to serve.

Voted: To adopt Sections 6 and 7 of Chapter II as printed, viz:

Section 6. All other officers required by law shall be elected by hand ballot.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to call every meeting for town purposes to order and read the warrant and said Clerk shall act as Chairman and have all the powers of a Moderator for the maintenance of order until a Moderator is elected and qualified, the election of whom shall be the first duty of the meeting.

Voted: To adopt as Section 8 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 8. The Moderator of any meeting may appoint tellers to assist in counting hand votes and to keep tally of the yeas and nays when the check list only is used. At all special meetings for town purposes the Town Clerk shall, and the Moderator may, appoint tellers to assist them in their respective duties at said meeting. All tellers shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties.

Voted: To adopt Section 9, 10, & 11 of Chapter II as printed, viz:

Section 9. The number of voters necessary to constitute a quorum at a Town Meeting shall be twenty-five except at a meeting devoted exclusively to the election of Town Officers.

Section 10. No sum of money shall be appropriated for any purpose at a special town meeting except by a two-thirds vote nor unless seventy-five voters are present.

Section 11. No vote of an Annual or special

town meeting appropriating money shall be rescinded unless seventy-five voters are present. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to poll the meeting before putting the question under the two preceding clauses of this section to see if the required number of voters is present, and the Clerk shall make a record of the poll and this quorum having been once determined shall suffice for the entire meeting.

Voted: To adopt as Section 12 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 12. The check list or ballot shall be used when requested by ten or more legal voters in voting upon any appropriation which exceeds \$1000.

Voted: To adopt Section 13 of Chapter II as printed, viz:

Section 13. The manner of voting on any question before any meeting for town purposes, when not otherwise specified in these by-laws or determined by vote of the meeting, shall be by hand ballot.

Voted: To adopt as Section 14 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 14. No vote shall be reconsidered at any town meeting unless the motion to reconsider shall be made in writing by a voter who voted with the majority and seconded by one of the same majority nor shall it be reconsidered unless said motion is given to the Moderator within one hour after such vote was declared, but such hour shall not include the period of adjournment.

Voted: To adopt as Section 15 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 15. The first money appropriated at

any Annual Town Meeting shall be for General Appropriations, and Town Debt and Interest. After these appropriations have been voted the Moderator shall appoint a committee of three to determine and report to the Town Meeting the approximate rate of taxes necessary to meet the appropriations aforesaid and the probable increase in the said rate per thousand which will be necessary to meet further appropriations and no article appropriating money shall be acted upon until said committee has reported to the meeting.

Section 16. There shall be a standing Finance Committee to consist of six voters. The Moderator shall annually at the Annual Town Meeting appoint the six members of this committee and so far as possible from six different sections of the town.

The Moderator shall annually, at the Town Meeting, appoint six members to serve for the term of one year from the date of appointment; provided, nevertheless, that the term of service shall terminate at the dissolution of the annual meeting following an appointment. Any vacancy in their number shall be filled by a two-thirds vote of the committee, and the member then appointed shall serve for the unexpired term.

Voted. To adopt as Section 17 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 17. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to investigate and report to the town, with their recommendations, all pertinent facts relating to any articles in a warrant, and may cause any article to be placed in the warrant.

For this purpose the committee shall have access to all books, vouchers and other documents and papers belonging to the town.

Voted. To strike out Section 18 of Chapter II of the printed report, as recommended by the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 18. Whenever the warrant for any town meeting contains an article appropriating or involving the expenditure of money, creating a debt, or disposing of town property, the Selectmen shall send a copy of the warrant containing such article to the Finance Committee, six days before the day named in the warrant for holding said town meeting. ~~The Committee shall consider the same, and make report thereon with their recommendations to the town meeting.~~

Voted. To adopt as Section 18 of Chapter II the recommendation of the Committee of Seven viz:

Section 18. The Committee shall confer or consult with such departments, officers, employees, committees or citizens as may have information concerning the subject matter under consideration, and it shall be the duty of all departments, officers, employees, committees or citizens to communicate to said Finance Committee such information as they possess relating to the same.

Voted. To adopt as Sections 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 & 25 of Chapter II Sections 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 27 & 28 of the printed report, viz:

Section 20. The Finance Committee may also consider any and all municipal questions for the purpose of making reports and recommendations to the town.

Section 21. No motion to dissolve a town meeting shall be in order until every article in the warrant therefor has been duly considered and acted upon.

Section 22. The Moderator, while occupying the chair, shall not participate in any discussion before the meeting but may name any citizen who is a legal voter to perform the duties of the chair for a period not exceeding two hours.

Section 23. All motions shall be reduced to writing when required by the Moderator or Town Clerk.

Section 24. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record all motions entertained by the Moderator and the final action of the meeting thereon in the records of the town.

(by substituting the word "seven" for the word "six")

Section 27. Every question of order shall be decided by the Moderator, but upon appeal to the meeting from the decision of the Moderator, the ground of such appeal shall be briefly stated, and the question decided by the meeting without debate.

Section 28. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained except to fix a time to which an adjournment may be made; to adjourn without day; motion for the orders of the day; to lie on the table; for the Previous Question; to postpone definitely; to commit; to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are herein named.

and to omit Sections 25 & 26, of Chapter II of the printed report, viz:

Section 25. Every voter speaking upon a subject in any meeting, shall confine his remarks to the question before the meeting, avoid personalities, and be seated when he is finished.

Section 26. No voter rising to move a question shall proceed to speak thereon until the motion has been distinctly stated to the meeting by the Moderator, and no person speaking shall be interrupted by another, but by rising to state a question of order.

When called to order by the Moderator, the person having the floor shall be seated until the point of order is decided, and if the decision, be that the point of order is not well taken, the original speaker shall immediately be given the floor.

Voted. To adopt Section I of Chapter III as printed, viz:

Section 1. The Selectmen shall have full authority as Agents of the town, to institute and prosecute suits in the name of the town, to appear and defend suits brought against it, and to appear on its behalf in proceedings for any committee or tribunal, except as otherwise provided herein, and unless it is otherwise specially ordered by vote of the town as provided by law.

Voted. To omit Section 2 of Chapter III of the printed report, viz:

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, as agents of the town, to keep insured against loss or damage by fire, all insurable property of the town, both real and personal. Each department of the town, except the Board of Assessors, shall annually on or before the first day of April, render a complete list of all town property, both real and personal under its control to the Board of Selectmen, together with the description of said property and its estimate of the replacement value thereof.

Voted. To adopt as Section 2 of Chapter III Section 3 as printed, viz:  
Section 2. The Selectmen shall cause to be enforced all laws relating to the protection of life, property and morality of the town.

Voted. To adopt as Section 3 of Chapter III Section 4 as printed subject to the following changes, viz: by adding after the word "Selectmen" in the first line the words "and all other boards of officers" and by striking out in the second and third lines the words "the business transacted" so as to read as follows:

Section 3. The Selectmen and all other boards of officers shall keep an accurate record of all meetings held by them with the dates thereof and the votes taken. These records shall be printed in their annual report to the town and no business transacted by them shall be approved by the town unless so recorded.

Voted. To adopt as Section 4 of Chapter III Section 5 as printed:

Section 4. The Selectmen shall annually, not less than seven days before the Annual Meeting cause to be distributed among the tax payers, copies of the town reports.

Voted. To adopt as Section 5 of Chapter III the following:

Section 5. The report of the Selectmen shall

contain a concise statement of all receipts into and payments from the treasury; and for the several departments, together with a statement for which payments were made in the several departments, also the Collector's accounts, a statement of all moneys deposited in the town treasury for the care of burial lots, the amount of interest accrued thereon, the amount expended for the care of said lots and the amount due each lot at the end of each financial year, as compiled by the Auditors, and other such items as the Selectmen may deem useful to the inhabitants of the town, or such items as the town may from time to time direct. The report of the Overseers of the Poor shall contain a statement of the number of all persons aided during the year outside of Almshouse, number at the Almshouse at the beginning of the financial year, number received and number discharged during the year, and the number remaining at the Almshouse at the end of said year. The Town Clerk's Report shall contain a record of births, marriages and deaths during the year, also a copy of all warrants issued for the annual or special town meetings, and elections together with the records of each meeting in the order of their occurrence.

Voted. To omit Section 7 of Chapter III of the printed report as recommended by the Committee of Seven, viz:  
Section 7. The Selectmen shall cause every fifth valuation of estates made by the Board of Assessors, or abstract thereof, to be printed in sufficient number to be available for the distribution to tax payers at the office of said Assessors.

Voted. To adopt as Sections 6, 7, 8, 9 & 10 of Chapter III Sections 8, 9, 10, 11 & 13 respectively as printed except that in Section 10 of the printed report the words "one o'clock in the afternoon" shall be stricken out and the words "eleven o'clock in the forenoon" substituted, so as to read as follows:  
Section 6. The Selectmen shall have the power to rent the town hall for any lawful purpose, provided however, that at all times, such renting

shall be subject to the use by the town for town purposes.

Section 7. The town clerk shall keep a book of records for the sole purpose of recording the location of all highways and town ways within the town with an index thereto; shall notify immediately in writing, all committees that may be elected or appointed at any town meeting and the nature of the business upon which they are expected to act; shall notify the chairman of departments and committees and officers of votes of the town pertaining to their respective departments.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the auditors to examine all books and accounts of all officers and committees intrusted with the receipt, custody or expenditure of money and all original bills and vouchers on which money has been paid or may be paid from the treasury. They shall have free access to such books, accounts, bills and vouchers at all reasonable times and may make examination thereof as often as they shall deem necessary but shall examine the aforesaid books, accounts, bills and vouchers at least once a year and shall annually report in writing to the town as to their correctness.

The Selectmen, auditors and all boards of officers authorized by the town to order bills shall meet at the Town Hall on the first Saturday of the month at eleven o'clock in the forenoon to pass on all bills and to transact such other business as may properly come before them.

Section 9. No officer of the town shall have any interest in any loan, contract or employment made by, with or for that department of the town to which his duties pertain without the permission of the Board of Selectmen expressed in a vote which shall appear upon their records together with the reasons therefor. All contracts or employments made in violation of this law shall be void as to the town, and no bills therefor shall be approved or paid.

Section 10. The salaries, compensation or commission

of all town officers shall be fixed by the town meeting.

A Motion: To adjourn until one o'clock was lost.

#### Chapter IV

##### Financial Affairs

Section 1. The financial year shall begin with the first day of January in each year, and end with the last day of December following.

Section 2. The Selectmen and all boards, committees heads of departments and officials authorized to spend money shall approve and transmit to the town auditors as often as once each month all bills, drafts and orders chargeable to the respective appropriations of which they have the expenditure. The auditors shall examine all such bills, drafts or orders and if found correct and approved as provided for above shall transmit them to the treasurer for payment; but such bills, drafts or orders shall be valid only when signed by the official or a majority of the board or committee authorized to make the expenditure.

The Treasurer shall pay no money from the Treasury except as provided in Section 6 of this chapter without a voucher so signed.

Section 3. The town auditors shall keep a set of books wherein shall be entered the amount of each specific appropriation, the amounts and purposes of expenditures made therefrom, the receipts from each source of income, the amount of each assessment levied, and the abatements made; and he shall keep his accounts, so far as practicable, in conformity with the classifications and forms prescribed by the bureau of statistics of the commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of chapter three hundred and seventy-one of the acts

of the year nineteen hundred and nine. The auditors shall have custody of all contracts of the town, shall keep a register of the sureties on all bonds of indemnity given to the town, shall keep a detailed record of the town debt which shall show the purpose for which the same was issued, when issued, when due, the rate of interest and the provisions made for the payment of the debt.

Voted: To adopt as Section 4 of Chapter IV the recommendation of the Committee of Seven, viz:

Section 4. Whenever any appropriation shall have been expended or whenever, in the judgement of the town auditors it appears that the liabilities incurred against any appropriation may be in excess of the unexpended balance of said appropriation, they shall immediately give notice to the selectmen and to the board, committee, head of department, or official authorized to make expenditures from said appropriation. The town auditors shall at regular intervals and as often at least as once each month, send to the selectmen and to each board, committee, head of department or official having the disbursement of an appropriation, a statement of the amount of vouchers approved and ordered on behalf of said board, department or official during the preceding month, and a statement of the balance of such appropriation remaining subject to draft. Each head of a department, board or committee authorized to expend money shall furnish the town auditors at the close of <sup>the</sup> fiscal year, a list of all bills remaining unpaid, showing to whom the same are due, for what due, and the amounts; and the town auditors shall incorporate the same in their annual report covering the financial transactions of the town.

Voted: To adopt as Section 5 of Chapter IV the following: Section 5. The town auditors shall immediately upon the close of the fiscal year compile statements in tabulated form so as to show the amounts

appropriated, and the amounts expended from each appropriation during the preceding year, and the estimate for the current year, and shall forthwith furnish a copy of the same to the selectmen, or to such committee as the town may appoint to consider and report on proposed appropriations. The selectmen, or said committee when so appointed, shall, after due consideration, designate the amounts which in their opinion should be appropriated for the ensuing year, and shall accompany the same with such explanations and suggestions in relation to proposed appropriations as they may deem desirable for the proper information of the citizens. The selectmen shall cause this document to be printed and to be distributed in advance of or at the annual town meeting.

Voted: To adopt Sections 6, 7 & 8 of Chapter IV as printed, viz: Section 6. No money except state and county taxes, town debt and interest thereon shall be paid without an order therefor signed by a majority of the Selectmen, and by a majority of the board of officers, or by the officers authorized by the Town to order its payment.

Section 7. At the monthly meetings, all officers of the town excepting the Collector of Taxes shall notify the auditors of all money paid by them to the Treasurer during the preceding month.

Section 8. The Auditors are authorized after making their annual report, to close such accounts as they deem expedient, into the Revenue Act. through the Excess and Deficiency Act.

Voted: To adopt Sections 1, 2 & 3 of Chapter V as printed, viz:  
Chapter V  
Police Regulations.

Section 1. No person shall drive, wheel or draw any coach, cart, wheelbarrow, handcart or carriage, of burden or pleasure, except children's carriages drawn by hand, on any sidewalk of the town.

Section 2. No person except the highway surveyor, in the lawful performance of his duties, or those acting under his orders, shall make or cause to be made any excavation in a public street or way, for any

purposes whatever, without having first obtained written permission from the Selectmen. When an excavation is made in a street for any purpose, the person or persons by whom or for whom such excavation has been made, shall cause a rail or other sufficient fence to be placed so as to enclose such excavation and the dirt, gravel or other material thrown therefrom, and such fence shall be maintained the whole time that such excavation continues.

Section 3. Such fence, excavation and material excavated shall be lighted by a lantern, lanterns, or other proper and sufficient light, from the beginning of twilight throughout the whole of every night, during the entire time that such excavation or obstruction exists.

Voted: To adopt Section 4 of Chapter V as printed except that the words "for more than five minutes" shall be stricken out, so as to read as follows:

Section 4. No person shall obstruct a public street or sidewalk by placing or causing to be placed therein any article or thing whatsoever and suffer the same to remain in such position without first having obtained written permission from the Selectmen so to do, but nothing herein shall be construed to authorize the Selectmen to issue permits for the use of any portion of a highway for business purposes.

Voted: To adopt Section 5 of Chapter V as printed except that the words "and only between the hours of six o'clock Post Meridian, and seven o'clock Ante-Meridian" shall be stricken out, so as to read as follows:

Section 5. The contents of any sink, cesspool or privy shall be removed in a vehicle effectively covered, sealed and watertight, and the same shall not be emptied on any beach, or into the sea adjacent to any beach in the town, but shall be carried in such vehicle and disposed of in the earth or otherwise, as the Board of Health may by rules provide, but apart from dwelling houses.

Voted: To adopt Section 6 & 7 of Chapter V as printed, viz:  
 Section 6. No water from any conductor, gutter or pipe, shall be allowed to discharge on any sidewalk in the town in such manner as to flow over the sidewalk.  
 Section 7. No person shall fire or discharge a gun, fowling piece or firearm, on any public street of the town, except at a military exercise or review duly authorized by the military authorities of the Commonwealth, or on such occasions as the Selectmen shall specially permit, or in the lawful defence of his person.

Voted: To adopt Section 8 of Chapter V as printed, with the addition of the following words "unless the owner has first obtained consent from the Selectmen", so as to read as follows:  
 Section 8. No gate, door or other similar device, either for the use of persons, horses, cattle, carriages or vehicles of any kind, constructed in any fence, abutting on the highways of the town, shall open outward over the sidewalk or highway unless the owner has first obtained consent from the Selectmen.

Voted: To adopt Section 9 of Chapter V as printed, viz:  
 Section 9. No person shall for any cause leave any wagon, cart or other vehicle, wood, coal or other articles in any street, way or sidewalk, and suffer the same to remain over night, without maintaining a sufficient light over or near the same throughout the night.

Voted: To adopt Section 10 as printed except that the word "glass" shall be substituted for the word "ashes" so as to read as follows:  
 Section 10. No person, unless by leave of the officers of the town having charge of the repairs of highways, shall throw or deposit in any street or on any sidewalk, any glass, dirt, rubbish or filth of any kind, or any animal or vegetable substance.

Voted: To omit Section 11 of Chapter V of the printed report as recommended by the Committee of Seven, viz:  
 Section 11. No person shall erect or cause to be erected any fence or building adjoining any street or public ground

or set any posts without having first obtained the bounds for the same by application to the Selectmen for that purpose.

Voted: To adopt as Sections 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 & 16 of Chapter V Sections 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 & 17 of the printed report except that the word "written" in Section 14 of said printed report shall be stricken out, so as to read as follows:  
 Section 11. No person shall put or cause to be put in any catch basin or any highway, any filth, sewage, slop, or dirty water.  
 Section 12. No building shall be moved over a public street without a written permit from the Selectmen and before granting such permit the applicant therefor shall give to the Selectmen a bond running to the town in such sum as said Selectmen may require, to hold the town harmless against all damages, costs and expenses which it may be compelled to pay in consequence of the moving of such building, or of the acts or negligence of any parties connected therewith.  
 Section 13. Whoever paints, or puts upon, or in any manner affixes to any fence, structure, pole, rock, or other object, the property of another, whether within or without the limits of the highway, any words, device, trade-mark, advertisement or notice, not required by law to be posted thereon, without first obtaining the consent of the owner or tenant of such property, shall on complaint of such owner or his tenant, or any municipal or public officer, be punished by fine not exceeding ten dollars.  
 Section 14. Any word, device, trade-mark, advertisement or notice, painted, put up or affixed within the limits of a highway in violation of the provisions of the preceding clause shall be deemed to be a public nuisance, and may be forthwith removed or obliterated, and abated by any person.  
 Section 15. No person shall pasture any cattle or other animals, without a keeper, upon any street or way in this town. No person shall permit any horse, cattle, swine or sheep under his or her care to go upon any sidewalk in the town except

for the purpose of reaching the adjoining premises, or otherwise occupy, obstruct, injure or encroach upon the same, but he may use a horse in removing snow or ice from said sidewalk or in repairing the same.

Section 16. No person shall go about from place to place within the limits of the Town of Westport collecting by purchase or otherwise, junk, old metals, and second-hand articles without a license.

The Selectmen may as provided by Chapter 102 of the Revised Laws as amended by Chapter 187 of the Acts of 1902, license suitable persons as junk collectors to collect by purchase or otherwise junk, old metals and second-hand articles from place to place within the limits of the town.

Voted: To adopt Chapter VI as printed, viz:

#### Chapter VI

##### Inspection of Wires.

Section 1. The Inspector of Wires, who may be appointed by the selectmen in accordance with the provisions of Revised Laws, Chapter 122, Sec. 18 shall have supervision of all electric and other wires erected in, upon, over or under any street or building, and of all poles supporting wires or lamps and street lights, and shall require all persons and corporations owning or operating wires to conform to the conditions and requirements of said chapter.

Section 2. Any person or corporation operating electric or other wires within the town shall, upon request of the inspector of wires, furnish him with such information as may be necessary to the faithful and effectual discharge of his duties under this By-Law.

Section 3. The inspector of wires shall have access at all reasonable times to all wires, appliances, and apparatus in the interior of a public building or on private premises which are intended for carrying an electric light or power current, and no person shall arrange, affix or change any such wires or apparatus without giving the inspector of wires reasonable opportunity to inspect such wires and their arrangement and fixtures before the same are covered or enclosed; and no person shall place such wires in any

building in process of construction until all concealed gas, steam, sewer, water, and furnace pipes have been placed in proper position. No person shall connect such wires in the interior of buildings and on private premises with an outside circuit which crosses or runs along, over or under any street or way of the town, without written permission therefor having been first obtained from the inspector.

Voted: To adopt Section 1 of the by-laws for the government of public and town landings as printed except that the word "four" shall be substituted for the figure "3" so as to read as follows:

#### By-Laws

For the Government of Public and Town Landings.  
Section 1. The inhabitants of said Town shall at their annual meeting in each year, choose <sup>four</sup> persons who together with the Treasurer of the Town for the time being, shall constitute a Board of Commissioners of the Public and Town Landing Places therein, and who shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties:

And the said Commissioners shall make a report of their doings at the annual meeting of the Town with a statement of the financial condition of the Board which shall be signed by the Chairman and countersigned by the Treasurer.

Voted: That Section 12 of Chapter III be made Section 15 of the by-laws for the government of public and town landings, viz:  
Section 15. The Landing Commissioners shall not lease on the Horseneck Landing more than one lot to any person, nor shall any lot upon which there is not a dwelling house of at least four rooms, be leased to any person unless said person agrees in writing to erect such a dwelling house upon the said lot within the term of the lease and said person shall give a satisfactory bond to the Landing Commissioners to perform the same as agreed.

Voted: That Section 15 of the By-laws for the

government of public and town landings as printed be numbered Section 16.

Voted: To adopt the following as Sections 2 to 16 inclusive of the by-laws for the government of public and town landings, viz:

Section 2. The said Board of Commissioners shall appoint from their number a Clerk who shall keep a true record of their doings.

Section 3. The Treasurer of the Town shall collect, take charge of and disburse under the direction of the Board all moneys due or payable on account of said landings and shall have the custody of all the papers pertaining to said landings.

Section 4. The said Board of Commissioners shall take charge of all Public and Town Landing Places in said Town, and ascertain as far as practicable the true boundaries of said landings, and establish suitable monuments to designate the same, and if such cannot accurately be ascertained, or where buildings stand in part on said landings, said Commissioners are hereby empowered in behalf of said Town to make such compromises, agreements and conveyances, or take such other legal measures as shall be necessary or expedient in the premises to determine the extent and boundaries of said landings, and adjust all differences in relation thereto.

Section 5. Said Board of Commissioners may, for such consideration as they shall judge proper and for terms not exceeding five (5) years lease such portions of said landings as are not needed for public use and for purposes not inconsistent with public or private rights or with the provisions of an "Act for the Regulation of the Public and Town Landing Places in the Town of Westport," in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty-Eight; and said Commissioners shall cause to be removed from said landing places all incumbrances thereon.

Section 6. All rents and other moneys accruing from said landing places shall be appropriated by said Commissioners to the payment of the expenses of

superintending the same, and in making such alterations and improvements thereon as they shall deem necessary; And for the purposes of this section the landings at the Head of the East River shall be considered as one landing.

Section 7. The Commissioners are hereby empowered to make such agreements as they shall judge expedient with any person to decorate with trees, shrubbery or otherwise, such portions of said landings as shall not in their judgment be needed for landing purposes and to lay out the same with appropriate walks. Provided the same shall be done without expense to said Town and under the direction of the Commissioners: and upon making such agreements the said Commissioners are to make such covenants on the part of the Town that such ground so improved shall be permanently kept open for the use of the public, as shall not be inconsistent with law or the Act aforesaid.

Section 8. If any person shall hereafter put upon any portion of said landings any building and suffer the same to remain thereon more than forty-eight hours without license from said Commissioners or a major part of them in writing, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of One Dollar for every twenty-four hours that said building shall be suffered to remain thereon after the expiration of said forty-eight hours.

Section 9. If any person shall hereafter enclose or cause to be enclosed with fence or otherwise any portion of said landings, and keep the same so enclosed more than one week without license therefor first had from the said Commissioners or a major part of them in writing, he shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding One Dollar for every twenty-four hours that such fence or enclosure shall be kept up after the expiration of one week.

Section 10. If any person shall place, cause to be placed or allow to remain, any article or building on said landings deemed by said Commissioners to be an incumbrance or detriment and shall neglect
