Annual Town Meeting.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Bristol Co.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Westport, in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday the eighth day of March next, it being the second Monday in said month at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose the following officers for three years, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one member of the Board of Health, and two trustees of the Public Library; also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, three Fence Viewers, four Landing Commissioners, a Single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge. All to be voted for on the Official Ballot, also on the same ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?" And all other necessary Town Officers and Committees to be elected by hand ballot unless otherwise determined by the meeting.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: General Government, Protection to Life and Property, Health and Sanitation, Highways and Bridges, Charities, Soldiers Benefits, Education, Libraries, Recreations, Unclassified Bills, Cemeteries, Interest and Municipal Indebtedness.

Article 6th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the purpose of defraying one half the expense of building a suitable Union School House at Westport Factory, Mass. and to raise said amount by taxation or in any other manner which may be agreed upon and to take any further action which may be necessary.

Article 7th. To see if the Town will vote to build a school house at Westport Factory and to make an appropriation for this purpose and take any further action which may be necessary.

Article 8th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the new school building at North Westport and construct an additional story so that the building can be used as a four room school and that a committee be chosen and necessary appropriation be made therefor.

Article 9th. To see if the Town will vote to fence the new school house lot at North Westport and that the necessary appropriation be made and a committee be appointed therefor.

Article 10th. To see if the Town will vote to continue the macadamizing of the road beginning where the present macadam leaves off near the residence of John E. Donovan and continuing southerly to John Grinnell's corner, so called, thence westerly to Lysander White's corner, so called, thence southerly towards the end of the macadam extending northerly from Horseneck Beach; appropriate a sum of money therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 11th. To see if the Town will vote to continue the repairing with crushed stone on the Sodom Road, so called, and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 12th. To see if the Town will vote to macadamize or repair with crushed stone the road leading from So. Westport Corner westerly by Noquochoke Hall to Handy's Corner, a distance of about one mile, make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 13th. To see if the Town will vote to repair with crushed stone the highway from Westport Factory westerly and southerly to the Old County Road at or near the residence of George E. Gifford at the Head of Westport and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 14th. To see if the Town will vote to macadamize a portion of the Gifford road beginning at or near the Kirby place where the present macadam leaves off and continue southerly; and if the Town so votes, to make an appropriation therefor.

Article 15th. To see if the Town will continue the construction in a northerly and westerly direction of the West Beach road at Horseneck and that the necessary appropriation be made therefor. This appropriation to be expended on or before July 1st. 1915.

Article 16th. To see if the Town will vote to repair with crushed stone the stage road leading from the Head of Westport southerly to Snell's Corner and from Snell's Corner westerly to Booth's Corner, so called; and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 17th. To see if the Town will vote to repair with crushed stone the road leading from the State Highway to the Fall River line beginning where the present macadam leaves off near the residence of Arthur M. Reed leading in an easterly direction to the Steam Rail Road tracks; make an appropriation therefor and take any further action necessary.

Article 18th. To see if the Town will vote that that part of the Old New Bedford road lying between the junction of the State road and the Bodge place, so called, be graded so that the drainage will flow into the South Watuppa pond and that the necessary appropriation be made therefor.

Article 19th. To see if the Town will vote to repair with crushed stone a portion of the Line road between Dartmouth and Westport (Bull street so called) beginning where the macadam now ends and continuing southerly. And if the Town so votes to make an appropriation therefor.

Article 20th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$4,000.00 said sum to be equal in amount to a sum which may be appropriated by the State for the resurfacing of the main road between George H. Gifford's Corner and Westport Point, and to take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 21st. To see if the Town will vote to resurface some portion of

the Main road between George H. Gifford's Corner and Westport Point; make an appropriation therefor and take any other further action.

Article 22nd. To see if the Town will vote to use oyster shells on the avenues at Westport Harbor and make an appropriation of \$500.00 or some other amount therefor.

Article 23rd. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the way leading from Sanford road near Advent Chapel westerly to the South Watuppa pond and take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 24th. To see if the Town will vote to widen the bridge near the residence of Frank W. Francis on the Drift road, so called, appropriate a sum of money and take any other necessary action.

Article 25th. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchasing of tar to be used on the highways and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 26th. To see if the Town will vote to make any change in the road bed beginning from the present macadam to the State line on the road from Central Village to Adamsville, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 27th. To see if the Town will accept and allow the layout and re-location of the Drift road beginning at Handy's Corner and continuing southerly and westerly to the main road near the church at Westport Point as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 28th. To see if the Town will vote to accept and allow the re-layout of the Sodom road, so called, beginning at Macomber's Corner, so called and continuing in a northerly direction to Narrow Avenue as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 29th. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to lay out a town landing place on Horseneck Point at or near the northerly end of Gooseberry Neck Bar so called; and take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 30th. To see if the Town will vote to buy the Main Wharf

at Westport Point of H. K. Sheldon at a sum not exceeding \$1200.00 and take any other necessary action under this article.

Article 31st. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five, each from different localities in the Town, to consider the advisability of erecting a new town house at some point near the center of population and to re-model the present town house for a school house; said committee to report at the 1916 town meeting.

Article 32nd. To see if the Town will vote to establish at least two additional polling places in the town, one of which shall be at North Westport and take any other action necessary to accomplish it.

Article 33rd. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a set of portable platform wagon scales and make the necessary appropriation therefor, and take any other action necessary.

Article 34th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a portable tar kettle, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 35th. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two pressure pumps for watering carts for the purpose of distributing bituminous road binders, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 36th. To see what action, if any the Town will take in relation to selling the old stone crusher and bin.

Article 37th. To see if the Town will vote to lay a suitable drain in the north side of the road near the So. Westport P. O. that will enable the abutters to prevent their houses, yards and cellars from becoming flooded; the highway surveyor to superintend the work and the expense to be taken from the appropriation for highways and bridges. Or take any other action thereon that may be suggested.

Article 38th. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$150.00 as their proportional part of the expense of building the tower for fire protection on Copicut hill.

Article 39th. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$200.00 for

the purpose of buying implements for fighting fire.

Article 40th. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to be used for the extermination of the gypsy and brown tail moth in this town, and take any other action necessary.

Article 41st. To see what action the Town will take to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the George Washington Memorial Building, Washington D. C.

Article 42nd. To see what action the Town will take if any, with regard to the planting of shade trees; and to appropriate at least \$150.00 for this purpose in order that the Town might enter the Shade Tree Planting Contest conducted by the Massachusetts Forestry Association.

Article 43rd. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chap. 209 Acts of 1908 as amended by Chap. 244 Sect 1, Acts of 1911; Called the permit act.

Article 44th. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of clearing land for lots in Beech Grove Cemetery and take any further action necessary.

Article 45th. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to employ legal counsel for our Constables and police officers when necessary.

Article 46th. To see if the Town will authorize and instruct the Selectmen to provide suitable protection against the depredations of people in our forests by cutting and gathering green trees and shrubbery previous to the holidays.

Article 47th. To see if the Town will require all Constables elected at the annual meeting or special constables appointed by the Selectmen to furnish a bond of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to protect the Town against any illegal action performed by said constables.

Article 48th. To see if the Town will vote to approve the action of the Overseers of the Poor in leasing the town farm and take any other action with regard to the matter that may be deemed necessary.

Article 49th. To choose a committee to have charge of the Memorial day exercises.

Article 50th. To see if the Town will vote to pay a bounty on foxes killed in said Town and take any other action necessary.

Article 51st. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Auditors to transfer deficiencies in the Departments amounting to \$1315.44 to the Excess and Deficiency Account and to transfer to this account the following amounts; from Soldiers Benefits \$100.00, from Public Service Enterprise \$6.92

Article 52nd. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Auditors to transfer from Revenue the sum of \$1208.52 to balance the Excess and Deficiency Acct.

Article 53rd. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its officers both elected and appointed to present a complete bill to the Selectmen on or before Jan. 5 1916 for all services rendered during the year 1915.

Article 54th. To see if the Town will vote to instruct all officers having authority when issuing bills for account of the Town to render a duplicate to the Auditors within ten days of said issue.

Article 55th. To see if the Town will instruct all officers when making payments to the Town Treasurer to notify the Auditors in writing of the date and amount of such payments within ten days thereof. This provision shall not apply to the Collector of Taxes.

Article 56th. To see if the Town will adopt the following provision. It shall be the duty of the Town Clerk immediately after every town meeting to furnish the Auditors a statement of all monies appropriated at such meeting and the purposes for which said monies were respectively appropriated.

Article 57th. To see if the inhabitants will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire such sums of money in anticipation of revenue as will be necessary to meet the current expenses of the year.

Article 58th. To determine the salaries compensation or commissions of the

Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Sealer of Weights and Measures, School Committee, Tree Warden, Draw Tender and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery.

Article 59th. To determine the wages for labor in connection with the stone crusher plant and macadamizing the highways for the ensuing year.

Article 60th. To determine the wages for ordinary repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 61st. To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the town charges for the year ensuing.

Article 62nd. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid after a specified time if so to fix the time interest shall begin and determine the rate of interest to be paid.

The polls will be open for balloting for the officers and questions contained on the official ballot at 10 o'clock A.M. and may be closed at 2 o'clock P.M.

And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting up five or more attested copies thereof in as many public places within said town at least seven days before the time of said meeting.

Resolution.

Resolved - That we, the citizens of the Town of Westport, in town meeting assembled do hereby protest against the methods employed by representatives of the Bureau of Animal Industry in handling the recent outbreak of Foot and Mouth disease in Fall River, Mass., for the following reasons:

In or about March 5th Foot and Mouth disease was found to be prevalent in Fall River, Mass. on two farms near the Rhode Island boundary line. On one farm 175 swine were exposed to infection; said swine were therefore transported into Westport for slaughter, over several miles of public highways in Fall River and Westport, on a dray which was not a proper conveyance for such swine; not being of sufficiently tight construction to prevent the excreta from such swine dropping upon the public highways and infecting them with the germs of such disease.

Said swine while awaiting slaughter were permitted to be sheltered in the basement of a barn, the upper portion of which was occupied as a stable for six cows at the time, thus exposing said cows to the infection.

About March 18th these cows were found to be affected with Foot and Mouth disease and were duly slaughtered the following day March 19th.

No facilities existed at said slaughtering premises for

rendering the offal from said swine sterile and such offal was removed from said premises over public ways to a neighboring farm, where it is rumored, they were fed to swine.

Such swine could not have been lawfully removed from the premises where Foot and Mouth disease was known to exist without the knowledge and consent of the Bureau of Animal Industry or its representatives.

The re-introduction of Foot and Mouth disease into this town has resulted in the destruction of a valuable herd of cattle, at much expense to the state, has caused a further imposition of hardships on owners of cattle and may seriously reduce the milk supply of two large cities, Fall River and New Bedford, in the near future.

Therefore, we, the citizens of Westport, respectfully ask the Governor of this State to cause a thorough investigation of this particular case of Foot and Mouth disease to be made, in order to place the responsibility for its re-introduction into this town; to trace the disposal of the offal; and take such other action that will prevent a repetition of the same methods.

Article three of the articles of amendment to the constitution of the commonwealth is hereby amended by striking out in the first line thereof the word "male".

Article of Amendment.

Full power and authority are hereby given and granted to the general court to impose and levy a tax on income in the manner hereinafter provided. Such tax may be at different rates upon income derived from different classes of property, but shall be levied at a uniform rate throughout the commonwealth upon incomes derived from the same class of property. The general court may tax income not derived from property at a lower rate than income derived from property, and may grant reasonable exemptions and abatements.

Any class of property the income from which is taxed under the provisions of this article may be exempted from the imposition and

levying of proportional and reasonable assessments, rates and taxes as at present authorized by the constitution. This article shall not be construed to limit the power of the general court to impose and levy reasonable duties and excises.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday the thirteenth day of March current, it being the second Monday in said month at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose the following officers for three years, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one member of the Board of Health, and two Trustees of the Public Library, one member of the School Committee for two years (to fill a vacancy) also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, three Fence Viewers, four Landings Commissioners, a Single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge. All to be voted for on the Official Ballot also on the same ballot "yes" or "no" on the following question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" And all other ^{necessary} town officers and committees to be elected by hand ballot unless otherwise

determined by the meeting.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for the Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: General Government Protection to Life and Property, Health and Sanitation, Highways and Bridges, Charities, Soldiers Benefits, Education, Libraries, Recreations, Unclassified Bills, Cemeteries, Interest and Municipal Indebtedness.

Article 6th. To see if the town will vote to build a four-room school house at Central Village, make an appropriation therefor, and take any other necessary action in relation thereto.

Article 7th. To see if the town will vote to sell the school house and lot on the Sanford road.

Article 8th. To see if the town will vote to insure the new school-house at North Westport.

Article 9th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize or repair with crushed stone the Drift road from Handy's Corner southerly, make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 10th. To see if the town will

vote to macadamize the town way, or any portion thereof, beginning at the junction of said way with the Westport Harbor road, near the residence of Gideon G. Coggeshall thence westerly to the ^{the turn in} road near the north driveway leading to the residence of Mrs. Fannie O. Springer a distance of about one half mile and if it so votes, to make an appropriation therefor.

Article 11th. To see if the town will vote to continue the macadamizing of the road leading from John Grinnell's corner so called to Horse Neck Beach, commencing where the present macadam leaves off and continuing southerly, appropriate a sum of money for the purpose and to take any further action necessary.

Article 12th. To see if the town will vote to continue to repair with crushed stone the Sodom Road so called, and to make the necessary appropriation therefor or take any other action necessary.

Article 13th. To see if the town will vote to repair the road, from Brownell's corner leading westerly to Stony brook, with crushed stone a distance of about one mile and a half and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 14th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to continue the macadamizing of the Hix's Bridge road westerly from So. Westport where the present sum now appropriated leaves off.

Article 15th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone the Charlotte White road leading from Kirby's Corner to Woods corner and make the necessary

appropriation for the same.

Article 16th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize the Gifford road so called beginning at or near the John Briggs place where the present macadam leaves off and continuing easterly and southerly about three quarters of a mile to the end of said road and make the necessary appropriation and take any further action necessary therefor.

Article 17th. To see if the town will vote to resurface a portion of the Sanford road so called beginning at or near the residence of David Sanford and going southerly, and if the town so votes, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action that maybe necessary.

Article 18th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize or repair with crushed stone the Drift road so called, beginning at the Head of Westport and continuing southerly, make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 19th. To see if the town will vote to repair the macadam on the highway from Wordell's Corner to Macomber's Corner and also continue the macadam from said Macomber's Corner to A. M. Reed's store and make the necessary appropriation therefor.
