Annual Town Meeting.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Westport, in said County. Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to assemble at the Town Hall on Monday the thirteenth day of March current, it being the second Monday in said month at 9.30 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose the following officers for three years, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one Fish Commissioner, one member of the Board of Health, and two Trustees of the Public Library, one member of the School Committee for two years (to fill a vacancy) also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, three Fence Viewers, four Landings Commissioners, a Single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge. All to be voted for on the Official Ballot also on the same ballot "yes" or "no" on the following question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" And all other ^{necessary} town officers and committees to be elected by hand ballot unless otherwise

determined by the meeting.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for the Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: General Government Protection to Life and Property, Health and Sanitation, Highways and Bridges, Charities, Soldiers Benefits, Education, Libraries, Recreations, Unclassified Bills, Cemeteries, Interest and Municipal Indebtedness.

Article 6th. To see if the town will vote to build a four-room school house at Central Village, make an appropriation therefor, and take any other necessary action in relation thereto.

Article 7th. To see if the town will vote to sell the school house and lot on the Sanford road.

Article 8th. To see if the town will vote to insure the new school-house at North Westport.

Article 9th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize or repair with crushed stone the Drift road from Handy's Corner southerly, make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 10th. To see if the town will

vote to macadamize the town way, or any portion thereof, beginning at the junction of said way with the Westport Harbor road, near the residence of Gideon G. Coggeshall thence westerly to the ^{the turn in} road near the north driveway leading to the residence of Mrs. Fannie O. Springer a distance of about one half mile and if it so votes, to make an appropriation therefor.

Article 11th. To see if the town will vote to continue the macadamizing of the road leading from John Grinnell's corner so called to Horse Neck Beach, commencing where the present macadam leaves off and continuing southerly, appropriate a sum of money for the purpose and to take any further action necessary.

Article 12th. To see if the town will vote to continue to repair with crushed stone the Sodom Road so called, and to make the necessary appropriation therefor or take any other action necessary.

Article 13th. To see if the town will vote to repair the road, from Brownell's corner leading westerly to Stony brook, with crushed stone a distance of about one mile and a half and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 14th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to continue the macadamizing of the Hix's Bridge road westerly from So. Westport where the present sum now appropriated leaves off.

Article 15th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone the Charlotte White road leading from Kirby's Corner to Woods corner and make the necessary

appropriation for the same.

Article 16th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize the Gifford road so called beginning at or near the John Briggs place where the present macadam leaves off and continuing easterly and southerly about three quarters of a mile to the end of said road and make the necessary appropriation and take any further action necessary therefor.

Article 17th. To see if the town will vote to resurface a portion of the Sanford road so called beginning at or near the residence of David Sanford and going southerly, and if the town so votes, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action that maybe necessary.

Article 18th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize or repair with crushed stone the Drift road so called, beginning at the Head of Westport and continuing southerly, make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 19th. To see if the town will vote to repair the macadam on the highway from Wordell's Corner to Macomber's Corner and also continue the macadam from said Macomber's Corner to A. M. Reed's store and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 20th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$4,500.00 said sum to be equal in amount to a sum which maybe appropriated by the state for the resurfacing of the Main road between Central Village and Westport Point, and to take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 21st. To see if the town will vote to resurface some portion of the main road between Central Village and Westport Point, make an appropriation therefor and take any other further action.

Article 22nd. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to macadamize the highway from the Fall River line at the Narrows to the present macadam near Thomas E. Borden's store.

Article 23rd. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the new road back of Horseneck Beach as laid out by the County Commissioners, the same to be a combination of cement with sand.

Article 24th. To see if the town will appropriate a certain sum of money for oyster shells to be applied on the road leading from Frederick B. Head's to Westport Point Bridge.

Article 25th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the way leading from Sanford road near the Advent Chapel westerly to the South Watuppa Pond and take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 26th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to be expended on the way leading from the State road northerly through Railroad park on Washington street so called to the railroad tracks and take any further action necessary.

Article 27th. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be expended on the path or way leading from Brownell's Corner southerly to the Charlotte

White road so called and take any further action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 28th. To see if the town will vote to widen the bridge near the residence of Frank W. Francis on the Drift road so called, appropriate a sum of money and take any other necessary action.

Article 29th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the purchasing of tar to be used on highways and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 30th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a two horse road grader, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 31st. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance and care of the crusher plant, and take any further action necessary.

Article 32nd. To see what action if any the town will take in relation to a public way in North Westport said way having been closed to public travel by the City of Fall River.

Article 33rd. To see if the town will accept and allow the layout of a landing place on Horseneck Point at or near the northerly end of Gooseberry Neck Bar as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 34th. To see if the town will accept and allow the re-location of the Sodom road beginning at station 4 on the

on the present layout and continuing southerly and westerly to station 6 as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 35th. To see if the town will accept and allow a layout of a way at Westport Harbor beginning at a point opposite a bound on the northerly side of Beach Avenue at the intersection of the proposed way and continuing southerly to the beach as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 36th. To see if the town will vote to employ a town veterinarian to inspect dairy cattle and issue certificates, determine his compensation and take any other action necessary.

Article 37th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for moth work.

Article 38th. To see if the town will accept the provisions of Chap. 423 Acts of 1909 as amended by Chap. 451 of the Acts of 1913.

Article 39th. To see if the town will vote to repair the barn on the town hall lot.

Article 40th. To see if the town will vote to paint the Town Hall.

Article 41st. To see if the town will vote to buy one or more pieces of fire apparatus and take any further action necessary and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Article 42nd. To see if the town will vote

to appoint a committee of three to report to the 1917 Town meeting on the advisability of installing electric street lights and take any further action necessary.

Article 43rd. To see if the town will accept and maintain the street lights, along the highway leading from the foot of the lane to Horseneck Point.

Article 44th. To see if the town will vote to divide the town into two voting precincts and take any further action necessary.

Article 45th. To see if the town will vote that the offices of Treasurer and Collector of Taxes shall be held by one person who shall receive a stated salary for his work and to take any other action necessary.

Article 46th. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to revise the by-laws of the town.

Article 47th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of clearing land for lots in Beech Grove Cemetery and take any further action necessary.

Article 48th. To choose a Committee to have charge of the Memorial Day Exercises.

Article 49th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for the George Washington Memorial Building, Washington D. C.

Article 50th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Auditors to transfer

deficiencies in the departments amounting to \$4655.93 to the excess and deficiency account and to transfer to this account the following amount from changing road-bed Central Village to Adamsville \$65.97.

Article 51st. To see if the town will vote to instruct the auditors to transfer from revenue the sum of \$4589.96 to balance the excess and deficiency account.

Article 52nd. To see if the town will vote to instruct its officers both elected and appointed to present a complete bill to the Selectmen on or before January 5, 1917 for all services rendered during the year 1916.

Article 53rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct all officers having authority when issuing bills for account of the town to render a duplicate to the Auditors within ten days of said issue.

Article 54th. To see if the town will instruct all officers when making payments to the Town Treasurer to notify the Auditors in writing of the date and amount of such payments within ten days thereof. This provision shall not apply to the Collector of Taxes.

Article 55th. To see if the town will adopt the following provision. It shall be the duty of the Town Clerk immediately after every town meeting to furnish the Auditors a statement of all moneys appropriated at such meeting, the purpose for which said moneys were respectively appropriated and the method adopted to raise said appropriations.

Article 56th. To see if the inhabitants

will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire such sums of money in anticipation of revenue as will be necessary to meet the current expenses of the year.

Article 57th. To determine the salaries, compensation or commissions of the Town Treasurers, Collector of Taxes, Sealer of Weights and Measures, School Committee, Tree Warden, Draw Tender and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery.

Article 58th. To determine the wages for labor in connection with the stone crusher plant and macadamizing the highways for the ensuing year.

Article 59th. To determine the wages of ordinary repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 60th. To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the town's charges for the year ensuing.

The polls will be open for balloting for the officers and questions contained on the official ballot at 10 o'clock A.M. and maybe closed at 2 o'clock P.M. And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting up five or more attested copies thereof in as many public places within said town at least seven days before the time of said meeting. Section 2. The Board of Selectmen shall have authority to grant such license to any person of good repute for morals and integrity who is, or has declared his intention to become, a citizen of the United States. Said licenses, unless sooner revoked by the Board of Selectmen shall expire one year after the granting thereof, and each person so licensed shall pay therefor a fee of five dollars.

Section 3. No hawker or pedler shall sell, or offer or expose for sale, any of the articles enumerated in Section 15, of Chapter 65 of the Revised Laws, or in any acts in amendment thereof or in addition thereto, until he has recorded his name and residence with the Board of Health, or such other board or officer as may be designated by the Selectmen. Every person licensed under the provisions of the preceding section as a hawker or pedler of fruits and vegetables shall record his name and residence in like manner with such board or officer.

Section 4. No person hawking, peddling, or carrying or exposing for sale any of the articles enumerated in Chapter 345, Acts of 1906, shall cry his wares to the disturbance of the peace and comfort of the inhabitants of the town, nor shall carry or convey such articles in any manner that will tend to injure or disturb the public health or comfort nor otherwise than in vehicles and receptacles which are neat and clean and do not leak.

Section 5. Every hawker and pedler licensed by the Board of Selectmen shall be assigned a number and shall be provided by the Board of Health with a badge which shall be conspicuously worn by him;

Section 6. Every vehicle or other receptacle used by a licensee as a conveyance for articles offered or exposed for sale by him shall have attached thereto on each side a number plate, to be furnished by the town with his license, bearing the number and date of expiration of such license.

Section 7. No person shall be registered or assigned a badge or number under the provisions of sections three and five of these by-laws, until he presents a certificate from the Sealer of Weights and Measures stating that all weighing and measuring devices intended to be used by such person have been duly inspected and sealed as required by law. The use of, or possession by such person with intent to use, any false or unsealed weighing or measuring devices shall be sufficient cause for the revocation of his license, or the cancellation of his registration.

Section 8. Any licensee who fails, neglects or refuses to exhibit his license when the same is demanded of him by a selectman, commissioner or inspector, or sealer of weights and measures, town treasurer or clerk, constable, police officer or justice of the peace, shall be subject to the same penalty as if he had no license.

Section 9. Nothing in these by-laws shall be construed as conflicting with any license issued under the authority of the Commonwealth.

Section 10. Any license granted under these by-laws or any by-law amendatory or additional thereto, may be revoked by the Board granting the same.

the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
