

Annual Town Meeting.

Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
Bristol S. S.

To either of the Constables of the Town of
Westport in said County. Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to assemble at their respective polling places on Monday the tenth day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to choose the following officers, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Board of Health, one Fish Commissioner and two trustees of the Free Public Library each for three years, also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, three Fence Viewers, four Landing Commissioners, a Single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden, and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge, all to be voted for on the official ballot also on the same ballot "Yes" or "No" on the following question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" and to assemble at the town hall on Tuesday the eleventh day of March at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose all other necessary officers and committees.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees, and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th. To make appropriations for the following purposes, viz: General Government, Protection to Life and Property, Health and Sanitation, Highways and Bridges, Charities, Soldiers Benefits, Education, Libraries, Recreation, Unclassified Bills, Cemeteries, Interest and Municipal Indebtedness.

Article 6th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for tax to be used on the town roads and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 7th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5000.00) Dollars for resurfacing roads as follows viz: Sanford road \$2000. Old Bedford Road \$2000. and the Main road to Westport Point \$1000. said sum to be expended with like sums which may be appropriated by the State and also by the County it being understood however that said \$5000. if appropriated shall be expended on said roads although said State and said County fail to make similar appropriations therefor and take any other necessary action in relation thereto.

Article 8th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone the "Line Road" so called beginning near the residence of Antone Rose and continuing southerly; make an appropriation therefor and take any other necessary action.

Article 9th. To see if the town will vote to

macadamize a part of the Drift road commencing where the present macadam leaves off and make an appropriation therefor or take any other action necessary.

Article 10th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$300. for repairing with screenings or other suitable material, the Drift road beginning at the North line of Frank W. Francis and William H. Tillson's land and continue southerly as far as the appropriation will go.

Article 11th. To see if the town will vote to continue the macadamizing of the Drift Road from Handy's Corner southerly where the present sum now appropriated leaves off, make the necessary appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 12th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to build the road bed on the Drift Road from Handy's Corner southerly.

Article 13th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone the "Line Road" so called, beginning near the residence of Norman A. Waite and continuing northerly to Sherman's Corner; make an appropriation therefor and take any other necessary action.

Article 14th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for repairing with crushed stone the Old County Road from the residence of David R. Tripp easterly to Brownell's Corner.

Article 15th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone the road leading northerly from Akin's Corner to South Westport; make an appropriation therefor and take any other action necessary.

Article 16th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money to macadamize the road leading from Six Bridge to Central Village.

Article 17th. To see if the town will resurface the macadam on the highway known as Acoaset Avenue or River Road (so called) leading from the State line near Adamsville to Westport Harbor, or any part thereof and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 18th. To see if the town will vote to macadamize the town way or any portion thereof beginning at the junction of said way with the Westport Harbor Road near the residence of Gideon S. Coggeshall thence westerly to the turn in the road near the north driveway leading to the residence of Mrs. Fannie C. Springer and make the necessary appropriation therefor.

Article 19th. To see if the town will repair with crushed stone the whole or any part of the road bed on the public landing at Head of Westport; and make the necessary appropriation.

Article 20th. To see if the town will vote to repair with crushed stone, the road beginning at E. J. Sisson's corner, so called and leading easterly to the Dartmouth line and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 21st. To see if the town will vote to repair with oyster shells a part of the road leading from Westport Point Bridge toward F. B. Head's, and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 22nd. To see if the town will vote to widen the road from the residence of Ahira S. Nickerson in Acoaset southerly a distance of about 700 feet and make an appropriation therefor.

Article 23rd. To see if the town will accept and allow the layout of a way at Railroad Park beginning at the State Highway and continuing northerly and easterly to land now or formerly owned by Cynthia M. Pierce, as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 24th. To see if the town will accept and allow the relocation of a portion of the Drift road near the residence of Frank W. Francis as made by the Selectmen and on file with its accompanying plan in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 25th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a truck for the use of the highway department and make the necessary appropriation therefor, and take any other action necessary.

Article 26th. To see if the town will vote to purchase a road oiling equipment and make the necessary appropriation therefor, and take any other action necessary.

Article 27th. To see if the town will vote to continue the platting of the town, make the necessary appropriation and take any other action necessary.

Article 28th. To see if the town will vote to pay the Highway Surveyor a salary in monthly payments, and to determine the amount of said salary, and to take any other action necessary in relation thereto.

Article 29th. To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for moth work.

Article 30th. To see if the town will vote to offer a reward of \$200.00 to any person

furnishing the evidence which will lead to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons stealing hens in the town of Westport.

Article 31st. To see if the town will authorize the proper authorities to prevent the constant pasturing of cattle in the public highways according to the laws prescribed in our town by laws.

Article 32nd. To see what action the town will take in relation to the fees for slaughter house licenses issued in this town and take any other necessary action.

Article 33rd. To see what action the town will take regarding Stephen R. Howland's claim for damages to his automobile, and take any other necessary action in relation thereto.

Article 34th. To see what sum of money will be appropriated for a town memorial forest in honor of the town's roll of honor in the recent world war.

Article 35th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the maintenance and repair of the crusher plant and take any other action necessary.

Article 36th. To see if the town will appoint a committee of three persons to formulate a by-law or set of by laws relative to care and custody of deposits made with the town for the care of public and private burial lots, or to take any other action relative thereto.

Article 37th. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$904.69 to cover the net expense of Repairs to the North Westport road as per the Auditors Report.

Article 38th. To see if the town will instruct the Auditors to close the following accounts into the Revenue account through the Excess and Deficiency acct. Westport Harbor Macadam \$11.94, Westport Harbor Repairs to Avenues \$1.50, West Beach Road \$5.85, South Westport Macadam \$1.58, Road Grader \$4.00, Road Roller 11 cts, Oyster Shells at Horseneck \$64.15, James Smith Land damage \$215.00.

Article 39th. To see if the town will vote to raise the rate of interest allowed on deposits for Perpetual Care of Burial Lots and take any other action necessary.

Article 40th. To see if the inhabitants will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire such sum of money in anticipation of revenue as will be necessary to meet the current expenses of the year.

Article 41st. To determine the salaries, compensation or commissions of the Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Sealer of Weights and Measures, School Committee, Tree Warden, Draw Tender of Westport Point Bridge and Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery.

Article 42nd. To determine the wages for labor in connection with the stone crusher plant and macadamizing the highways for the ensuing year.

Article 43rd. To determine the wages for the ordinary repairs of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Article 44th. To determine the manner of raising the appropriations to defray the town's charges for the year ensuing.

The polls will be open for the balloting

for the officers and questions contained on the official ballot at ten o'clock A. M. and may be closed at two P. M.

And you are hereby directed to serve this warrant by posting five or more attested copies thereof in as many public places within said town at least seven days before the time of said meeting. Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

 March 11, 1919.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to assemble at their respective polling places on Monday the eighth day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to choose the following officers, viz: One Selectman, One Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one Member of the School Committee, one Member of the Board of Health, one Fish Commissioner, and two trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years, also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Assessor, to fill a vacancy, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, three Fence Viewers, four Landing Commissioners, a Single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge, all to be voted for on the official ballot, also on the same ballot, "Yes" or "No" on the following question: Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town? and to assemble at the town hall on Tuesday the ninth day of March at nine-thirty o'clock, in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose all other necessary officers and committees.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the town officers

and committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 5th.
