All to be voted for on the official ballot, also on the same ballot "Yes or No" on the following question "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?"

And to assemble at the Town Hall on Tuesday, the fifteenth day of March, at nine thirty o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose all the necessary officers and committees.

Article 3rd. To hear the reports of the town officers and committees and act thereon.

Article 4th. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer

for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport qualified to vote in elections and town affairs to assemble in their respective polling places on Monday, the 13th. day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to choose the following officers, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one Overseer of the Poor, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Board of Health, one Fish Commissioner, and two Trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years; also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Beech Grove Cemetery, five Constables, two Auditors, four Landing Commissioners, a single Highway Surveyor, a Tree Warden, and a Draw Tender for Westport Point Bridge.

All to be voted for on the official ballot. Also on the same ballot "Yes or No" on the following question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?"

And to assemble at the Town Hall on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

- Officers -

Article 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2nd. To choose all the necessary officers and committees.

To ask the voters of the town of Westport to support a motion asking for an appropriation of \$800.00 to place lights on Sanford road which appropriation will enable the Citizens to get electric current in their homes, unless the town votes to give us street lights our funds are not large enough to guarantee the Company's investment.
