[2 March 1640 (1641)] Whereas divers and sondry treaties have beene in the publike & Generall Courts of New Plymouth, his maljes tie, our dread soveraigne, Charles, by the grace of God King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland &c, concerning the proper right and title of the lands within the bounds and limmitts of his said ma[jes]ties lettres patents, graunted by the right honorable and his maljes sies counsell for New England, ratifyed by their common seale, and signed by the hand of the Right Honorable Earle of Warwick, then president of the said counsell, to William Bradford, his heires, associats, and assignes, beareing date, &c; and whereas the said William Bradford and divers others, the first instruments of God in the beginninge of this greate work of plantacion, together with such as the alorderinge hand of God, in his providence, soone added unto them, have beene at very greate charges to procure the said lands, priviledges & freedomes, from all entanglements, as may appeare by divers and sundry deeds. enlargements of graunts, purchases, payments of debts, &c, by reason whereof the title to the day of this present, remayneth in the said William, his heires,

associats, and assignes, - now, for the better setling of the state of the said lands aforesaid, the said William Bradford, and those first instruments termed and called in sondry orders upon publike record, the purchasers, or old comers, witnes two in especiall, thone beareing date the third of March, 1639, thother in December ye first, 1640, whereunto these presents have speciall relacion & agreement, and whereby they are distinguished from others the freemen and inhabitants of the said corporation, - be it knowne unto all men, therefore, by these presents, that the said William Bradford, for himself, his heires, together with the said purchasers, do onely reserve unto themselves, their heires and assignes, those three tracts of lands mencioned in the said resolucion, order, & agreement, beareing date the first day of December, 1640, viz., first, from the bounds of Yarmouth, three miles to the eastward of Naemskeckett, and from sea to sea, crosse the said neck of land; the second, of a place called Acconquesse, alias Acockeus, which lyeth in the bottom of the bay adjoyneing to the west side of Poynt Perrill, and two miles to the westerne side of the said river, to another place, called Acquessent River, which entreth at the westerne end of Nickatay, and two miles to the eastward thereof, and to extend eight miles up into the countrey; the third place from Sowamsett River to Pathoquett River, with Causumpsit Neck, which is the cheef habitacion of the Indians, and reserved for them to dwell upon, extending into the land eight miles through the whole breadth thereof, together with such other smale percells of lands as they or any of them are personally possessed of or interested in by vertue of any former titles or graunts whatsoever. And the said William Bradford dotn, by the free and

full consent, approbacion, and agreement of the said old planters of purena together with the likeing, approbacion, & acceptacion of the other part of the said corporacion, surrender into the hands of the whole Court, consistinge freemen of this corporacion of New Plymouth all that ther right & title, por authorytie, priviledges, immunities, & freedomes granted in the said lettres patents by the said right hon[ora]ble counsell for New England, reserveing their personall right of freemen, together with the said old planters aforesal except the said lands before excepted, declareing the freemen of this prese corporacion, together with all such as shalbe legally admitted into the same associats. And the said William Bradford, for him, his heires and assigned further hereby promise and graunt to doe & performe whatsoever further to or thinges, act or acts, which in him lyeth, which shalbe needfull and exped for the better confirmeing & establisheinge the said premisses as by counse learned in the lawes shalbe reasonably advised and devised, when he shalb therunto required. In witnes wherof, the said William Bradford hath in pu Court surrendred the said lettres patents actually into the hands and power said Court, byding himself, his heires, executors, administrators, and assign deliver up whatsoever specialties are in his hands that do or may concerne

Memorand: that the said surrender was made by the said William Bradf in publick Court, to Mathaniell Sowther, especially authorized by the who Court to receive the same, together with the said lettres patents, in the name for the use of the whole body of freemen.

It is ordered by the Court, that Mr William Bradford shall have the kee of the said lettres patents, which were afterwards delivered unto him by th Nathaniell Sowther in the publike Court. [PCR, Court Orders II, 10-11]

This Court now grauntes and gives libertie unto the said Purchasers and old Comers that all ["and" stricken out] or whoseover amongst them will: shall have libertie to looke out and make choise of such place or places as they can find within this Government or Jurisdiction not graunted alreddy unto any provided they exceed not theire former proportions to accomodate them and theire heires withall and they have heerby libertie graunted them to purchase the said land of the natives by the approbation of the Court and soe many as shalbe thuse accomodated to Relinquish all theire Rightes Interest and title in former specify places made choise of by them and the Rest of the old comers and purchasers to take up theire particular proportions of land within the precinctes of the three former specifyed places all which to be performed by all the purchasers and old comers within fourteen month next ensueing this present Court; And alsoe It is further graunted by this present Court That all those as were att the Courts graunt of the abovemencioned two or three places: Inhabitants alowed and now are ffreemen, shall have the like libertie to looke out and make Choise of some place or places for themselves and theire heires as may affoard them a sufficient accomodation for their Comfortable Exsistance [? perhaps, mistakenly: assistance] within fourteen monthes after that if they Can find it; [DPL III (1): at the top of the fifth page of the alphabetical index of ca. 1671 emended by Josiah Cotton in 1716.
