### COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To either of the Constables of the Town of Westport in said County.

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to assemble at their respective polling places, namely:

Precinct A--North Westport Schoolhouse Precinct B--At Town Hall

on Monday the fourteenth day of March next, it being the second Monday of said month, at six o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to choose the following officers, viz: One Selectman, one Assessor, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, two members of the School Committee, one member of the Board of Health, one Fish Commissioner, and two trustees of the Free Public Library, each for three years; also the following officers for the year ensuing, viz: Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, two Constables, four Landing Commissioners, Single Highway Surveyor, Tree Warden and Drawtender for Westport Point Bridge, all to be voted for on the official ballot. And to assemble at the Town Hall on Tuesday, the 15th day of March at 9:30 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary officers and committees.

Article 3. To hear the report of the Town Officers and committees and act thereon.

Article 4. To determine the salary and compensation of all elected Town Officers

Article 5. To determine to what department or departments the money last received from the County Treasurer for Dog Fund shall be appropriated.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be considered necessary to defray the Town's expenses for the year 1932 and appropriate the same to the several departments.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to borrow during the financial year beginning January 1, 1932 in anticipation of the collection of revenue of said year, such sums of money as may be necessary for the current expenses of the town, but not exceeding the limit fixed by law, giving note or notes of the town therefor, payable within one year from the date thereof, and to renew such note or notes as may be given for a less period than one year, all debts incurred under this authority shall be paid from the revenue of the then current year.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such persons shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within from seven years from the date of its submission,"-be ratified by the General Court?

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Westport, qualified to vote in elections, to assemble at their respective polling places, viz:

Precinct A - at North Westport Schoolhouse

Precinct B - At the Town Hall

on Tuesday the sixth day of November next, it being the Tuesday after the first Monday in said month at 5:45 o'clock in the forencon.

To give in their votes for Governor; Lieutenant Governor; Secretary; Treasurer; Auditor; Attorney General; Senator in Congress; Representative in Congress; Councillor; Senator; Two representatives in General Court; District Attorney; Clerk of Courts; Register of Deeds; County Commissioner and two Associate County Commissioners.

Also to vote on the following questions:

Question 1. Shall a law drescribed as follows: -- This law amends General Laws, chapter 131, as previously amended, by repealing section 105A thereof and adding thereto three new sections 105B, 105C and 114A.

Section 105B. provides that whoever uses any trap or other device for capture of fur bearing animals which is not designed to kill such animal at once or to take it unhurt and which is likely to cause continued suffering to an animal caught therein; shall be fined fifty dollars, but traps or other devices for protection of property, set not more than fifty yards from any building, cultivated plot, or enclosures used for rearing poultry or game birds, to the use of which the presence of vermin may be detrimental, are excluded from the application of this section.

Section 105C provides for the submission to the voters at a municipal election in any city or town upon petition, of the question of whether the operation of section 105B shall be suspended or if it has been already suspended, of the question whether it shall again be operative in such city or town.

Section 114A provides that the Commissioner of Conservation may suspend the operation of section 105B for a period not exceeding thirty days within any speicifed territory under the control of his department.

The law also provides for the submission, by the Selectmen to the voters at a special Town Meeting in the current year upon petition, of the question as the whether the provisions of section 105B shall be suspended in any town; and which was approved by both branches of the General Court by vote not recorded, be approved?

Question 2. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of all alcoholic beverages (whisky, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages)?

Question 3. Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale therein of wines and malt beverages (wines and beer, ale and all other malt beverages)?

Question 4. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licenses horse races be permitted in this country?

Question 5. Shall the pari-mutuel system of betting on licensed dog races be permitted in this county?

The polls will be opened at 6:00 o'clock A.M. and shall be closed at 2:00 o'clock P.M. and you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies thereof in five or more public places within said town seven days at least before the time of holding said meetings.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon at the time and place of meetings aforesaid.

### REPORT

### TO THE VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF WESTPORT

We, the committee that was appointed from the floor of the annual Westport Town Meeting in 1935 to investigate and report back to the town Voters our findings relative to High School needs, submit the following report:

We find school housing conditions at the High School to be overcrowded. The new enrollment at the High School, approximately 165 students, with insufficient home room locations for each of these students on the main floor of the school. There are at present three rooms being utilized in the basement, two of which are used for home room purposes. These basement rooms are poorly heated and ventilated and the light is very poor.

State inspector - William H. Cairns, notified the School Committee that before these basement rooms could be used for class room purposes at the commencement of the next school year, the same would have to be re-modeled in order to meet with the laws of the commonwealth, otherwise the Town must provide other suitable housing facilities for pupils now using these rooms, and it is necessary that immediate steps be taken to correct the situation. Inspector Cairns has agreed to an extension of time in the use of the High School Building as it now stands pending the action of the town for the immediate construction of a new High School or suitable additions at the present location.

In case a new building is considered, some allowance for future increase should be made and this committee believes that such a new building should be ample to provide for 300 pupils and no smaller capacity should be considered in a new building. This committee also believes and recommends that an auditorium capable of seating 600 people should be constructed as a part of the building which would be a combination gymnasium and auditorium.

We recommend a new High School with facilities sufficient to accommodate 300 pupils and an auditorium with seating capacity for 600 people can be built for the sum of \$105,000. Of this amount the Government will grant the Town of Westport \$45,000. This is an outright grant from the Federal Government, under the P. W. A. The balance of \$60,000, to be paid by the town. Of this \$60,000 we have asked for the transfer of \$5,000 which was appropriated at the annual Town Meeting in 1935. As you remember this \$5,000 was for the remodeling of the basement in the present High School. The balance of \$55,000 to be appropriated and payable by the Town in notes to be paid over a period of 20 years.
