Browse our collection of gardening and landscaping books. Check out copies of *Horticulture Magazine* and *Mother Earth News*. Looking for an outdoor evening activity? The staff is pleased to be circulating a telescope to individuals and families. Thank you Ned for taking time to meet with me.

Some personal history...

I have been a Westport resident for 13 years and Treasurer of FOWL for 4 years. My career began as a school teacher rising to school principal and successful elementary education book author. I retired from a second career in international consulting. Now I enjoy spending time with my children and grandchildren.

You're an active volunteer at the library...

I built a receptacle for Lees Market receipts to increase visibility and to remind patrons to donate their receipts. The reminder has worked. Each month the library receives about \$250 per month from Lees Market. I also created two educational exhibits for the Helen Ellis case. One featured rare coins, the other painter Mary Cassatt.

Favorite books?

Although there are many books I enjoy, *The Alienist* by Caleb Carr is my all time favorite. A thriller set in NYC at the turn of the 19th century, it features Theodore Roosevelt, a minor character, as the police commissioner. I am mesmerized by the many fascinating details in the story. Also enjoy mysteries by Grisham, and Lee Childs' Jack Reacher series. Recently found a new author when a Library patron was returning some Joseph Finder books. Started a conversation and on his recommendation checked one out. I'm hooked. Other books I gravitate to are about Art History, Landscaping and Gardening.

What might readers find surprising to learn about you?

I took a month long, full immersion French language course at the Sorbonne in 1963 and surprised myself when I began to think in French. In 1991 in Paris I chaired the first ever meeting of European Defense Ministers. Was shocked to learn they did not already know one another.

Life Lessons?

Being kind to people pays off in spades, and a good sense of humor can help carry the day.


kempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul.



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World of Books

Uncle Mike's Mobile Abode

A tidy and unassuming red trailer from the exterior, it became my home away from home, and again away from home in Boulder, while I visited family



during the Christmas holidays. Inside, for a book lover like me, nirvana. A voracious reader is Unca Mike, and, being not only literate but also exceedingly practical, he had insulated almost all available walls with books. But no higgle-de-

piggledy assortment.

Every space had if not its rhyme, its reason. Entry to the living area: several carefully bound collections; I recall Shakespeare, Dickens, Hawthorne. Another whole wall devoted to subjects seemingly arcane, but related, somehow, if I thought hard enough: a mathematician reads the newspapers, a treatise on rust, mathematical and computational theory and conjecture (even gossip). Further along the shelves, all kinds of joys and woes of baseball (Uncle Mike is an inveterate Red Sox fan) and many books in disparate flavors of karate, from an autobiography of Jackie Chen to various treatises on kung fu to *The Kata of Bunkai of Goju-Ryu* by Giles Hopkins (black belted Uncle Mike practices Goju-ryu).

Lighter fare in the bedroom: whodunits by names I knew (Dorothy Sayers, Margery Allingham), other I'd heard of, but have yet to read—Walter Mosley, Carl Hiassen. At the far end of the room, treasured children's lit: *The Call of the Wild, Treasure Island, The Adventures of Robin Hood.*

Various evenings I sat in the easy chair in the cozy side nook, reading Basil Thomson's *The Story* of Scotland Yard, a wonderfully second hand edition with a faint penciled \$3.00 on the flyleaf. But the most enjoyable moment was absolute proof of Mike's fireworks eclecticism, in plain view beside the easy chair. Sandwiched between spines bearing the high octane titles of *Wizard: the Life and Times of Nicholai Tesla,* and *Stradivarius's Genius:* a shorter, sturdy brown volume entitled *Nancy Drew and the Women Who Created Her.*
