An Interview with Kathleen McAreavey

Interview with Kathleen McAreavey, Manager of Educational Programs at the Westport Historical Society

Your background is rich and varied:

I have worked for the Westport Historical Society since 2013, creating and presenting adult and children's programs. I am also the Education and Community Outreach Manager for First-Works in Providence, where I do similar work. I have a B.A. in Theatre Arts from Providence College and studied Textile History and Conservation in the Master's Program at URI, giving me the skills to conserve historic textiles, specializing in historic quilts. Past positions I have held: Director of Education at the Providence Preservation Society and Executive Director of the Attleboro Area Industrial Museum.


Tell me about your relationship with the Library and Westport schools:

I am always grateful for the support of the Library Staff and especially to Sue Branco, regarding the Historical Society's programs. The availability to have small exhibits in the Helen Ellis display case, the use of the Manton Room for larger exhibits, such as the MAC Quilt Project, community talks, postings on the Community Bulletin Board, all help to advocate for the Historical Society and help build a true sense of community.

One of our most successful in-school programs is about the origin of the Macomber Turnip and advocacy for the farming community. Currently, school programs focus mainly on Kinder-garten through 3rd grade, and 6th grade. This year we are piloting a program with pre-K and investigating ways to reach grades 4-6, to teach them about Paul Cuffe, a prominent farmer and merchant in Westport (1759-1817), of African and Native American ancestry.

In February you will have a Valentine exhibit in the Helen Ellis Case:

I will install an exhibit of Valentines to give people a perspective of what Valentines looked like in years past. Along with the exhibit, there will be some Valentine themed coloring pages for all ages.



Don't Forget the Cookbooks!

Growing up in my Italian home I was often in the kitchen. My mom is a great cook. From weekday meals to the expansive Christmas Eve feast with seven fishes, she put heart and soul into those traditional family recipes. My siblings and I learned from an early age watching and doing (the best way).

Mom's recipes were not always specific with amounts. "Season to taste" and "Season as you go" were her mantras. Even though I learned her recipes from watching her, she eventually put down our most favorite family recipes in her own cookbook—a passing of culinary traditions to future generations. So, of course that's my "go to" cookbook.

However, I do have a few other favorites whose recipes always seem to come out without fail. I do admit to tweaking some recipes a bit to my own taste but these books have provided me with solid recipes to start with:

-Marcella Hazan's *Essentials of Italian Cooking*– her Bolognese recipe is excellent—no tweaking needed!

-*Silver Palate Cookbooks*—received as wedding gifts so many years ago. The Chicken Marbella is not to be missed.

-Ina Garten's Barefoot Contessa and Barefoot In Paris—so many good recipes here from appetizers to desserts. I've never been disappointed. The Salmon with Lentils is hearty and comes out perfectly.

-Cook's Illustrated Cookbook—especially good to understand the science behind cooking and baking. It has recipes for everything and from various ethnicities and all are thoroughly tested in their test kitchen.

The Library has a number

of great cookbooks to check out. From the classics: Julia Child (*Mastering the Art of French Cooking*), Irma Rombauer (*The Joy of Cooking*) and Jacques Pepin to other familiar TV chefs: Ina Garten, Giada, Martha Stewart, Lidia Bastianich, Jamie Oliver,



Bobby Flay, and more, to the current food writing of Samin Nosrat (*Salt, Fat, Acid, Heat*) (excellent!) and Michael Pollan (*Cooked*). If it's a particular category you are interested in you'll find plenty including: grilling, bread baking, paleo, vegetarian, and many more.

You'd be surprised to know that cookery is one of our most popular categories at our annual book sale. If you don't have room for more cookbooks in your kitchen (I've run out!) then borrowing a cookbook from the Library is a great solution. You can copy recipes you want to try/keep without having to find a home for yet another volume.

So check out the cookbook section on your next visit to the Library. You won't be disappointed with the selection and you just might find a recipe that becomes a family favorite or a new culinary tradition.
